CANADIAN TROOPS LED GREAT COMMANDO RAID HEAVY DAMAGE INFLICTED ON DIEPPE COAST AREAS

Heavy Assault Preliminary To Real Invasion

British Broadcast Corporation reiterates warning to French population not to regard largest raid of war to date as real invasion—Tank and Infantry supported Commandos destroy coast batteries.

London, Aug. 19.—(C.P. Cable)—Fighting in the Dieppe raid was still going strong at 3.30 p.m. (10.30 a.m., E.D.T.). Waves of Allied planes continued to roar across the Channel.

CANADIANS ACHIEVE OBJECTIVE

London, Aug. 19.—(C.P. Cable)—A force of Canadians fresh from commando attack training fought the Nazis on the French coast about Dieppe today and are known to have achieved their objective of destroying a gun battery and ammunition dump.

The Canadians were not identified but a Combined Operations Headquarters communiqué said the force consisted mainly of Canadian troops. They were accompanied by American Rangers, British special service troops and some fighting French.

The Canadian Press learned that Canadian troops comprise the main body of the landing forces, constituting about one-third of the total personnel taking part.

The raid, by virtue of its larger scope, was seen as marking an important forward step in a planned programme of offensive action.

No matter what the result, an operation of this size is sure to provide invaluable experience in the employment of substantial forces and in the transport and use of heavy equipment.

For the fighting French it was their first landing on French soil since they were evacuated to Britain after the fall of France in 1940. The American Rangers are a picked outfit from the United States army forces in Britain, named after a colonial American fighting unit which won fame in the French and Indian wars.

The landing was made at several selected points in the early hours of today and heavy fighting is proceeding.

The Canadians, who recently participated in the greatest attack manoeuvres ever held, took tanks with them against Dieppe.

There was strict secrecy surrounding the raid and it was not until some hours after it was announced that fighting was in progress against heavy opposition that it was made known that Canadian forces made up the bulk of the attack.

This was the first opportunity since the Canadians participated in the famous Spitzbergen raid that they had to carry out an attack for which they had been especially trained.

That they had learned their tasks well was shown by the combined operations report that one landing party was initially repulsed but managed to carry the beach by assault.

R.C.A.F. units co-operated in forming an umbrella protection for the Canadians as they landed and fought.

MINERS RESUME OPERATIONS ON PACIFIC COAST

Thirteen Hundred Men End Two-Day "Holiday" After Submitting Wage Demands to War Labor Board.

Cumberland, B.C., Aug. 19.—(C.P. Cable)—Thirteen hundred British Columbia miners returned to work today, ending a two-day "holiday" that followed the miners' demand for a thirty per cent wage increase.

Six hundred miners at Nanaimo and 700 at Cumberland, all employees of Canadian Collieries (Dunsmuir) Limited, voted yesterday to return to work pending hearing of their demands by the National War Labor Board. The Cumberland miners went back to work on the late night shift.

John Stokeluk of Calgary, Vice-President of United Mine Workers of America, District 18, will leave tomorrow for Vancouver.

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Shift In British Middle East Command Stamps Region As New Base For Offensive Operation

London, Aug. 19.—(C.P. Cable)—The infusion of new brains and new blood on Britain's Middle Eastern front, coupled with the close attention Prime Minister Churchill gave it on his way to Moscow, stamped that battle theatre in many British minds today as a zone of impending major action.

North Africa has immense strategic potentialities. It might become the United Nations' second front. With only a thin eighty miles separating his armies from Alexandria, on the other hand, Hitler scarcely could neglect that arm of his vast Middle Eastern pincer if his goal is to master the trans-Caucasus by winter.

Britons, therefore, weighed these sudden developments with some optimism and some anxiety:

1. Mr. Churchill's stop-over in Egypt en route to his talks with Stalin, during which he inspected the front at close hand and came within earshot of the enemy and met virtually the whole "Who's Who" of the United Nations leadership in North Africa;

2. The announcement, swiftly following his visit, that Gen. Sir Harold Alexander had been called to command in the Middle East in place of Gen. Sir Claude Auchinleck. Sir Harold, "the last man out of Dunkerque," headed the 1st British Division in France and was visited by Lt.-Gen. A. G. L. McNaughton and his staff soon after the First Canadian Division reached Britain in 1939.

3. The arrival in Egypt of new United States contingents, including ground staffs for the American Army Air Forces whose medium and heavy bombers already are in action and whose fighter planes have completed their last desert training.

Prime Minister To Explain Plan For Meeting Manpower Problems

Ottawa, Aug. 19.—(C.P. Cable)—Prime Minister Mackenzie King, who outlined Canada's selective programme in a House of Commons address last March, may sketch new blueprints for manpower treatment in a radio address tonight.

The Prime Minister goes on the air over the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation's national network starting at 9 p.m., E.D.T., and his half-hour speech is expected to contain the why and wherefores of impending changes in the selective service programme.

In his first important address since he spoke on the conscription-enabling bill July 7th, Mr. King is expected to reveal some of the important decisions which the Government is known to be planning for guiding more and more men and women into war industry and the armed forces.

The Prime Minister's office announced yesterday that the address will deal with "additional measures being taken to ensure the efficient use of the services of all the people of Canada for the winning of the war." The wording suggested plainly enough that the broadcast will deal almost exclusively with manpower.

The expectation here is that Mr. King will lay stress on the reasons for the proposed new policies, leaving a detailed announcement to the men responsible for formulating them. It has been previously reported that the new regulations will be formally announced by Elliott M. Little, Director of National Selective Service, possibly next Tuesday.

One suggestion already advanced is that the recruiting policies of the armed forces may be co-ordinated more closely with Mr. Little's department, which up to now has been concerned chiefly with labor supply.

WAR BULLETINS

London — Flensburg, the Nazi submarine and shipbuilding centre almost at the Danish border, was the chief target of R.A.F. and R.C.A.F. bombers last night, their second night in a row over Northern Germany, the Air Ministry announced today.

A communiqué said four of the raiders were missing.

London — Reuters quoted a Rome dispatch today claiming that Axis North African troops recently captured a nephew of Gen. Sir Harold Alexander, new commander in the Middle East. The nephew's name was not given in the Stefani agency report.

New York — A \$300,000 gift by Harold S. Vanderbilt to the United States Navy Relief Society, largest so far received from any contributor, was announced yesterday.

Clarence Dillon, National Chairman of the Society, said the sum represented the entire purchase price paid Vanderbilt by the United States Government for his new 117-foot motor sailor, "Vagrant," taken over by the Navy last March.

DEMOCRATS OF NEW YORK TURN ON ROOSEVELT

State Convention Faces Floor Fight on Gubernatorial Nomination After Rejecting Roosevelt Plea.

New York, Aug. 19.—(C.P. Cable)—Failure of a last-minute effort by President Roosevelt to effect a compromise in the battle over a New York Democratic gubernatorial nominee sent delegates today to a final scramble for delegates today as the party's first state convention floor fight in twenty-four years impended.

No quarter was asked or given by either side after rejection of a peace plea by the President, read last night by Governor Herbert Lehman at a four-hour "harmony" dinner that left party leaders still at odds as the convention opened in Brooklyn today.

INTERNATIONAL CONTROL OVER RESERVES SEEN

Centralized Body to Control Resources Essential if Peace Is to Be Maintained After War.

Lake Couchiching, Ont., Aug. 19.—(C.P. Cable)—Following consideration yesterday of the broad post-war picture in Europe and Asia, the Canadian Institute on Public Affairs today turned to more minute scrutiny of specific problems involved in post-war settlement.

In the morning they will hear Dr. Hans Simons of the University of Chicago, speaking on practical problems of international organization in the post-war world.

His address will be followed by a panel discussion in which Prof. Jacob Viner of the University of Chicago, John H. D. Jones, Toronto, and S. MacLennan, formerly of the Geneva Office of the League of Nations, will participate.

The final session of the day will be featured by an address on the economic problems of Great Britain in the post-war period by Redvers Opie, economic adviser to the British Embassy at Washington.

Yesterday, Dr. Simons drew for the Institute members a sketch of post-war Europe in which national governments had become secondary to an international controlling body. This body would allocate the products of European factories, instead of leaving them at the disposal of militaristic local governments.

Last night, L. K. Rosinger of the Foreign Policy Association, New York, spoke on the future in the Far East. He noted the decline of the colonial system accompanying the rise of nationalism in Asia and advised that if the United Nations were to succeed, it must combine military and political aims.

He said that there was no solution to the problem of Japan that "does not involve the internal reorganization of Japan."

"Under her present semi-feudal regime, Japan cannot hope to survive without rapid expansion," he said.

Moscow, Aug. 19.—(C.P. Cable)—Soviet troops fell back again yesterday in the Don Bend and a counter-offensive Southwest of Stalingrad appeared spent, but a communiqué said Germany's gains since May 15 have cost 1,250,000 casualties—twice those of Russia—and that Hitler is draining reserves from all Western Europe.

Red army men gave ground before reserve-bolstered Nazi columns in the region of Pyatigorsk, in the mid-Caucasus 170 miles Southeast of Nazi-occupied Maikop, but repulsed repeated attacks in the Krasnodar area, the Russians said.

While the Germans "succeeded in somewhat pushing back our troops" in the Pyatigorsk sector, Cossacks cut down 300 of them with sabres in a surprise raid, the Soviet Information Bureau announced at midday.

Defenders of the Krasnodar region of the Western Caucasus, counter-attacking at intervals, routed a German infantry regiment and destroyed many trucks and seven German tanks, the Bureau said.

While the Germans gained in a Don bend sector, three vain attacks were cited in which they lost four tanks and more than 300 men. More than 100 German automatic rifle men were reported slain on the approaches to a village.

Southwest of Stalingrad, Red Army patrols were active overnight and one was credited with the destruction of seven Nazi supply trucks, a searchlight installation and two anti-aircraft guns behind the German lines.

Fighting flamed again on the Bryansk front Southwest of Moscow. The Information Bureau said a German artillery battery repulsed eight attacks, wiped out a river crossing and killed at least five hundred Germans.

Midnight reports indicated a resurgence of Nazi effort along both arms of a pincer grouping toward Stalingrad and the Volga, while the Red Army counter-attacked in the Krasnodar sector and stood off assaults in the Pyatigorsk area of the Caucasus.

Already wedged into Russian positions in one section of the Don bend front, the Germans massed large formations to strike elsewhere. Southwest of Kletskaya and forced a Russian unit to retreat, the Soviet Information Bureau announced.

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Union Workers Take Strike Vote In Huge Nova Scotia Steel Mill

Halifax, Aug. 19.—(C.P. Cable)—While four thousand employees at the huge Sydney steel plant prepared for a strike vote, another 150 Nova Scotia workers—in the colliery town of Inverness—faced today the prospect of a mass exodus in search of work as the Provincial Government announced closing of a mine there.

The Sydney men, employed at Dominion Steel and Coal Corporation's plant, were to vote tomorrow on the question of striking for higher pay. Decision to call the vote was taken last night by the executive of the Sydney Steel Workers' Union in the face of a telegram from Labor Minister Mitchell that the matter "should not be brought up at this time."

The Regional War Labor Board turned down an application for wage increases at the plant. Last night C. H. Millard, Canadian Director of the United Steel Workers of America, told the Sydney Union its request for a strike vote also had been turned down by the Federal Labor Department, which planned to appoint a commissioner to investigate the situation at Sydney.

Demands of the Sydney men were for an increase in the basic hourly rate from 43½ to 55 cents, adjustments for skilled and semi-skilled workers, higher "incentive bonuses," and vacations with pay and extensions of Sunday rates.

Closing of the Inverness Mine—No. 4—was announced here last night by Mines Minister L. D. Currie. Two other Government-operated pits at Inverness—Nos. 3 and 5—will continue operations, the Minister said.

Mr. Currie said the 150 men to be displaced would have to find work elsewhere, as they could not be absorbed by the other pits. But he said they would be able to get work in other Nova Scotia coal areas.

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Canadian Forces In Britain Are Strengthened By New Contingent

Somewhere in England, Aug. 19.—(C.P. Cable)—The attacking power of the Canadian army has been strengthened with the arrival in Britain of support formations for armored troops already in the country, while the first member of the Canadian Women's Army Corps, the first naval nurse and the first members of a social service corps now are at work.

Artillery and other auxiliary units of the armored forces, bolstered by small regimental and headquarters formations, already are established at camps at the Canadian army area in Southern England where they will be joined later by the main body of their force.

The newly-arrived soldiers—who numbered in the thousands—were accompanied by Allied forces trained in Canada—including Belgian soldiers and merchant seamen and soldiers of the Netherlands army.

The convoy which brought the soldiers carried Maj. Alice Sorby of Winnipeg, first member of the C.W.A.C. to reach Britain. She will serve as a staff officer at Canadian military headquarters.

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ARMY MAKEOVER FIRST SECTION SAVES COUNTRY IN EQUIPMENT

Careful Salvaging and Co-operation with Other Sources Makes Useable Material from Obsolete Articles.

By JAMES MCCOOK, Canadian Press Staff Writer, Ottawa, Aug. 19.—(C.P. Cable)—“New equipment from old” is the slogan of men supplying Canada's modern army. Usually after every war an army is left with masses of equipment which is likely to be useless in later years because of changes in uniform and in armament.

In the present war, Canadian army officers noted some of this obsolete equipment was the 1908 pattern web equipment, part of which is a two-inch strap, 40 inches long. Another piece of obsolete equipment was a two-inch brass buckle. The ordnance workshops brought the two together. About 40,000 waist belts will be made when the conversion is complete, at a cost of five cents each. These belts will be used in place of a new article which costs 32 cents.

Lt.-Col. W. J. B. Dailey, Chairman of the Army Salvage and Disposal Board, told a House of Commons War Expenditures Committee that the savings made possible by ingenious use of old and worn equipment. Condensed tents are examined for pieces of canvas still serviceable. This is used for the manufacture of pin bags, laundry valises, clothing valises and other articles required by the army. A manufacturer quoted a price of 50 cents a pair for ski boot covers. The ordnance corps manufactured the covers from serge and frieze with soles made of old web equipment. The cost was about 10 cents a pair.

Costs supplied for prisoners of war were of a special mackinaw type costing about \$6 each. Obsolete army greatcoats were being mutilated and disposed of by the army. But the authorities decided that by dyeing the greatcoats black and sewing the regulation red patch on the back, economy could be effected. It was, about 10,000 of these coats for prisoners have been made at a cost of about \$2 each, a saving of \$4 over the former cost.

Because of their distinctive military appearance, unserviceable battle-dress blouses could not be disposed of, when unfit for troops, until they had been completely mutilated. This arrangement offended the sensibilities of salvage authorities.

An arrangement was made with the Indian Affairs Branch to purchase these blouses at 25 cents each, to be dyed black or dark blue. Before handing them over, the returned stores group removes the shoulder straps and salvages the rubber buttons and the nickel-plated buckles.

The dyeing operation is arranged for by the penitentiaries branch, and to date 15,000 of the blouses have been converted to the use of Indians.

What the army can use no longer, others may find of value. Old-fashioned waist belts numbering 8,000 have been sold to the Air Raid Precautions service for 15 cents each, although some 5,000 supporting straps from 1908 equipment have gone to ordnance workshops for the manufacture of handles of ammunition boxes. Examination of other obsolete supplies has shown several parts can be used with the most modern equipment.

OF NEWS PARTY NOW OVERSEAS

Representatives of Canadian Publications to Report Upon Activities of Canadian Troops Abroad.

London, Aug. 19.—(C.P. Cable)—The first section of a party of twelve Canadian writers representing news services, daily and weekly newspapers, farm and business papers and magazine groups arrived in Britain today.

They are in the United Kingdom to report on operations and work of the Canadian armed forces and civilian overseas. They are traveling as guests of the Canadian Government, on joint invitation of the three Ministers of National Defence and War Services Minister Thorson.

Those who arrived today are: Charles Bruce, General News Editor, The Canadian Press, Toronto; Percy Cole, Monetary Times, Toronto; Herve Major, Montreal La Presse; Maj. Bert Wemp, Toronto Telegram; H. Napier Moore, Maclean's Magazine, Toronto; G. H. Sallans, British United Press, Montreal; and J. R. H. Sutherland, New Glasgow (N.S.) News.

It is expected the party will spend from four to six weeks in Britain.

water bottle carriers, 2,000 pair of shoulder braces, 35,000 supporting straps and 15,000 bayonet frogs could be saved.

The army rules water bottles unserviceable when water becomes rusty after a considerable period of time, but many condemned for the use of troops are serviceable provided the water is not left in them for more than 24 hours.

After having tested such bottles, the A.R.P. authorities received 10,000 condemned by the army, which will eliminate the necessity of buying new ones.

In the past, badly-soiled army mattresses and pillows were burned. The Salvage and Disposal Board found they could be effectively cleaned by a special solution. Thousands of mattresses and pillows are made serviceable in this way each month. These unfit for cleaning are no longer destroyed but are sold at prices from 25 to 35 cents.

Ordinance establishments used to purchase rags costing from 15 to 20 cents a pound at a time when rags from condemned clothing were being sold to dealers at from two to four cents a pound. The Board arranged for the washing of rags to be added to existing laundry contracts and was able to supply ordnance needs at less than 10 cents a pound. Further investigation showed laundry costs in some areas at eight cents a pound while in others it was as low as 2 1/2 cents a pound. The board took action to eliminate the high laundry costs and an average of four cents a pound now prevails.

With cases and cartons costing ordnance more than \$200,000 a year, action was taken to stop such articles being given away or destroyed. Cases and cartons not required at the point where they are delivered are sent to the “returned stores group” to be mended, cleaned and sorted. The residue, which cannot be used, is sold as scrap at prices from \$8 to \$12 a ton.

Scrap metal in all military establishments is being collected as salvage. Instructions were given on packing so costs would not be too high. All textiles now are baled, machines readily available in depots being used.

Col. Dailey said that when army disposal stores have been collected, Royal Canadian Navy and Royal Canadian Air Force stores officers are invited to examine them to see if there is anything of use for their services. Considerable quantities of rope and cordage have been transferred to the navy for training purposes.

CLOSELY-KNIT POLICY URGED UPON ALLIES

Speaker Declares United Nations Must Become a Fighting Combination Not a Loose Coalition.

Lake Couchiching, Ont., Aug. 19.—(C.P. Cable)—The United Nations at war against the Axis in the Pacific must become “a fighting combination rather than a loose coalition,” L. K. Rosinger of the Foreign Policy Association, New York, said in an address to the Canadian Institute on Public Affairs here last night.

Stressing the need for fuller co-operation of one another's war aims on the part of the anti-Axis powers, Mr. Rosinger said these aims must not be considered as merely military. A political system conducive to peace in the Far East must also be considered. He said the United Nations must be a fighting combination, not a loose coalition. He suggested that with the decline of the colonial regime in the East, Asia might come to exerted Europe in importance. Already, he pointed out, the peoples of Asia are playing a much more important part in this war than they did in the First World War in which little took place in the Far East which greatly affected the outcome.

In this war China was one of the most important of the nations resisting Axis aggression and might prove the leader of the Asiatic peoples in the war against Japan should old distrust of the white races in the East prevent full co-operation with the other United Nations, he said.

Nazi material losses in the period were said to include 3,390 tanks, 4,000 guns of various calibre and not less than 4,000 planes, against Soviet losses of 2,240 tanks, 3,152 guns and 2,198 planes.

The Government announced in June the Germans had lost 10,000 men in the first year of the German-Russian war, of which 4,500,000 were killed. Part of the new three-month figures was included in that total.

SOO WORKERS FAVOR STRIKE

Sault Ste. Marie, Ont., Aug. 19.—(C.P. Cable)—Algoma Steel Corporation workers voted 3,149 to 22 in favor of a strike to enforce their demands for an increase in basic wage rates from 46 1/2 cents an hour to 55 cents an hour, it was announced today. Five ballots were spoiled.

William Mahoney, Secretary of the union, announced before result of the ballot had been made known that whatever the result of the vote, a strike would be called only “as a last resort.”

Decision to take the strike vote was made Monday at a mass meeting after workers heard the Ontario Regional War Board had refused to approve the increase in the basic wage rate.

Decision of the War Labor Board was reported to the meeting in communication from Hon. Peter Heenan, Ontario Labor Minister.

CONTRACT FOR ARMY SKIS
Edmonton, Aug. 19.—(C.P. Cable)—The Alberta Motor Boat Company has received a \$112,933 contract from the Dominion Government for the manufacture of about 590 sets of skis for the Canadian army. J. W. Weir, manager of the company, said recently.

Vancouver, Aug. 19.—(C.P. Cable)—Dealers predicted here that no cement would be available in Greater Vancouver for building or commercial use for the next month or six weeks due to the entire output being used for various Government construction projects.

AIRMEN HELP IN HARVEST

Weyburn, Sask., Aug. 19.—(C.P. Cable)—Members of the air training school at Weyburn, all from England, have volunteered their services to aid in harvesting operations for which there is a drastic labor shortage. They have offered their services after regular hours and during their forty-eight-hour leaves.

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against a stiff defence force. It is understood that Canadian air units participating included army co-operation planes and fighters which roared across the Channel in an unending stream all day.

Especially on the left flank of the Canadian attack was heavy opposition encountered while tanks were landed in the centre and troops on the right flank achieved their objective.

The right flank force knocked out a six-gun battery, destroyed an ammunition dump and then re-embarked, combined operations headquarters said in a noon communique while the fighting continued.

The Canadians had been waiting for just such a chance as the Dieppe raid since they began training with the commandos headed by Vice-Admiral Lord Louis Mountbatten, who watched their most recent attack training.

The fact Canadian soldiers were participating in the raid was known only to the highest Canadian air authorities but more than one soldier noticed the absence of Lt.-Gen. A. G. L. McNaughton, Canadian army commander, from the Canadian forces track and field championships Saturday, and the fact that the command was making last-minute arrangements for the embarkation of his troops.

It seemed unlikely that the Canadian army commander was along on the raid, however, as he conferred with Maj. C. G. Power, Canadian Air Minister, on Monday and it now is known that the Canadian commandos started off on the raid before that date.

Announcement that the attack met with stiff opposition means that for the first time the Canadian land forces have been in action with the Germans. Canadians who had reached France just before Dunkerque in 1940 were ordered back.

The BBC, from the early morning on, continued warnings to the French populace, emphasizing the “limited and temporary” character of the operation, adding that it had “nothing to do with the military decision taken at Moscow recently.”

While fighting is still continuing on the French coast, it is known that Canadian flying fighter planes have caused damage among the Nazi air opposition, including one plane damaged and one probable.

At the same time, in connection with the Dieppe attack, it is known that other Canadian air squadrons were forming a screen of high-level bombing operations.

In the morning it is believed that Maj. Power, now in Britain inspecting the R.C.A.F., is getting a first-hand picture of the operations connected with the commando raid. He spent the day at Bomber Command headquarters with Air Marshal Sir Arthur Harris and Capt. Harold Balfour, Under-Secretary of State at the British Air Ministry.

Observers on the British South coast said there were more aircraft than ever before seen and heard over the Channel, as bombers and fighters shuttled across to assault or reload. Indicating the size of the present operation, it was recalled at least one previous occasion, 1,600 fighters participated in a sweep across the channel.

The raid, first announced at 6.45 a.m. (1.45 a.m. E.D.T.), was still continuing at noon when a supplementary communique was issued.

After that, as the mist burned away and a fine, fair day developed, persons on the English Coast still could hear the heartening sound of offensive battle.

Informed quarters cautioned, however, that for all the broad participation of troops, tanks, naval guns and planes, the raiding forces would be withdrawn when they had achieved their objectives. This was not a second front.

Their objectives obviously were extensive, since it was the first time landing parties have used tanks.

The objectives appeared to be these: to test the enemy's defence organization and to test the Allied plans for landing and the air force's ability to cover a big landing force. Additionally, it was bound to disclose disposition of German troops and equipment in the cross-Channel area that once was a vacation resort and now is a nest of Nazi fortifications.

NAZI RADIO ADMITS LAST RAID SEVERE

Berlin, (from German broadcasts) Aug. 19.—(AP)—DNR reported today that British commando forces launched an attack on a broad front with tanks and heavy air support in the region of Dieppe on the French Channel coast early today and claimed hundreds of the attacking commandos have been killed.

The attack, on a larger scale than previous landing and exceeds the usual proportions of so-called British commando operations, the Germans said.

DNR claimed that several transport ships were sunk or set afire before they reached the coast.

A Nazi counter-attack for “the final mopping-up of the landing force is in progress,” the Nazi news agency said.

The attack was aimed at the town and harbor of Dieppe and developed on both sides of the town, it reported.

The broadcast several hours after the start of the raid, whether there are still British troops in the town or harbor of Dieppe or whether they now are only on both sides of the town along the coast could not be ascertained here at this moment.

Strong air and naval forces backed up the British attack which was carried out with the aid of tanks, DNR said.

Speaking at the Canadian National Federation of Home and School Conventions, Miss Schatzmann said she believed that some 1,000 United States schools will not open next fall. A recent survey, she said, showed that from 1,500,000 to 2,000,000 young people will be needed for defence and industry in the United States shortly.

Rotary Fair To Be Operated In Belvidere Street Armory In Latter Part Of October

Unless unforeseen developments occur, the local Rotary Club will once again operate their Fair in the Belvidere Street Armory during the latter part of October, it was announced at the club's noon meeting yesterday by President Everett Goodenough. Definite dates are to be decided on in the near future.

Guest speaker was Lucien Hebert, local representative of the Wartime Prices and Trade Board, who gave a brief explanation of the reason for the establishment of an organization to control prices and explained various features of the control system. Mr. Hebert expressed his thanks to the Rotarians and the citizens of Sherbrooke for the co-operation he had received since he took over the duties of the office.

Shortly after the outbreak of war, it was pointed out, there was a marked tendency for prices and costs to rise, and drastic steps had to be taken to remove the threat of inflation. It was for this reason that the Government undertook the most revolutionary programme of price control ever adopted by a free people.

Mr. Hebert pointed out that it is almost one year since prices were pegged at the level between September 15th and October 11th, 1941, and said that the success of the scheme is evident if current prices are compared to those prevailing during the war of 1914-18.

It was pointed out that rents would have gone sky-high if they, too, had not been fixed, and conditions would have been intolerable, with living space far too expensive for a large proportion of the population. Use of subsidies to encourage production by farmers was also dealt with, as well as the rationing of certain products to assure an equitable distribution.

Introduced by President Goodenough, Mr. Hebert was thanked by Rotarian C. E. Soles, who pointed out that more than 400,000 sugar ration cards had been issued by the local office in the last six weeks.

Rotarian Joseph Booth, who has been on the sick list for some time, was given a warm welcome, and expressed his thanks to the members for their many kindnesses to him during his illness.

Four Girls Who Ran Away from Girls' Cottage Industrial School Between 12 and 16 Years.

Sweetsburg, Que., Aug. 19.—District police authorities today continued their search for four girls between the ages of twelve and sixteen years who escaped Monday evening from the Girls' Cottage Industrial School.

School officials stated today that three of the girls are from Montreal and the other from the Eastern Townships and they were seen Monday evening on the road leading to Knowlton.

Two of the girls are dressed in pink, one is colored and the other has black hair. The two others are dressed in blue shorts and white blouses; one is fair and slight and the other is dark and stout.

WOULD EXTEND WORK OF ADULT EDUCATION BODY

The adult education programme set up in the Eastern Townships in 1938 has now spread to other sections of the province, Rev. E. C. Amaron, President of the Eastern Townships' Adult Education Council, which has been an advisory council to the Macdonald College Rural Education Service, declared in addressing the Council's annual meeting at Camp Macdonald on Lake Memphremagog. "Consequently," he said, "the time has come when the Council should consider enlarging its functions to include communities outside the Eastern Townships."

Mr. Amaron pointed out that the Quebec Council for Farm Forums represented 125 Farm Forums both in the Eastern Townships and elsewhere, and it seemed appropriate to set up a parallel council for community schools to be called the Quebec Council of Community Schools. A draft constitution for this new Council was drawn up and it is being submitted to the twelve Community Schools in Quebec for discussion and ratification in November.

The Quebec Council for Farm Forums under the chairmanship of P. D. McArthur, of Hawick, also held its regular meeting at Camp Macdonald, where it was decided that the family fee would not be collected until November and that a series of organization conferences should be held in various sections of the province in October.

Camp Macdonald was the second annual camp for adults promoted by Macdonald College. Sixty-six campers were registered from Sherbrooke, Lennoxville, Scottstown, Sawyerville, Ashcroft, Danville, Magog, Pith Bay, Stangeville, Stanstead, Ayer's Cliff, Dundee, Ormstown, Huntingdon, Hawick, Montreal, Ottawa and Winnipeg.

Dr. E. C. Silcox, of the Canadian Association for Adult Education, delivered two lectures dealing with adult education and morals. Mrs. J. J. Plummer, of the McGill University Department of Physical Education, was in charge of recreation. R. Alex Sim was the camp director.

Members Of Delegation Were Deeply Impressed By Visit To Three Filtration Plants

That the City Fathers were impressed by what they saw of the Farnham, St. Johns and Lachine filtration plants was easily learned from conversations today with various members of the local delegation which visited these cities yesterday, but whether they were convinced that something will have to be done about the Sherbrooke water remains to be seen.

Mayor A. C. Ross, Ald. Guy Bryant, City Engineer Armand Crepeau and others, interviewed today, reported a highly enjoyable trip. A local touch was given the visit to Farnham where Lieutenant Colonel Aime Biron, V.D., Officer Commanding Les Fusiliers de Sherbrooke, and the Regimental Band, met the delegation as they left their cars at the filtration plant. Mayor Ulge Fortin and Councilors gave a reception for the Sherbrooke party.

At St. Johns, after making a

thorough inspection of the filtration system, the group was entertained by Mayor George Fortin and his associates on the Council, and at Lachine the hospitality of the city was extended by Mayor Edgar Ledue and his colleagues.

The filtration plant at Farnham has a capacity of one million gallons. That is, it can filter this quantity of water during a twenty-four hour period. The plant was erected in 1924.

The Lachine plant, plans for which were drawn up by Mr. Crepeau, was built in 1931. It has a capacity of 6,000,000 gallons per day, and was built at a cost of \$210,000, the buildings and basins costing \$145,000 and the equipment \$65,000. One pound of chlorine is used for 1,000,000 gallons of finished water, it was learned from Mr. Crepeau, while in Sherbrooke eight pounds of water are used for a similar quantity of water.

If a filtration plant is built here it should be constructed for a capacity of 8,000,000 gallons, Mr. Crepeau said. Comparative cost would not be as high as at Lachine, because here there is pumping equipment already in use which had to be purchased at Lachine, and the building would not have to be as large, since there is already a pumping station, which would be used to pump the water from the filtration plant, which has a capacity of 17,000,000 gallons. Sherbrooke also has sufficient piping, Mr. Crepeau explained, and the principal item of expenditure would be the purchase of cement for the construction of basins.

It was pointed out that certain concerns which carry on dyeing processes are heavy consumers of water in Lachine and St. Johns. Industries of this type are few here because the cleanest water possible is needed, and the probability is that if a filtration plant were installed here industries would be attracted to the city.

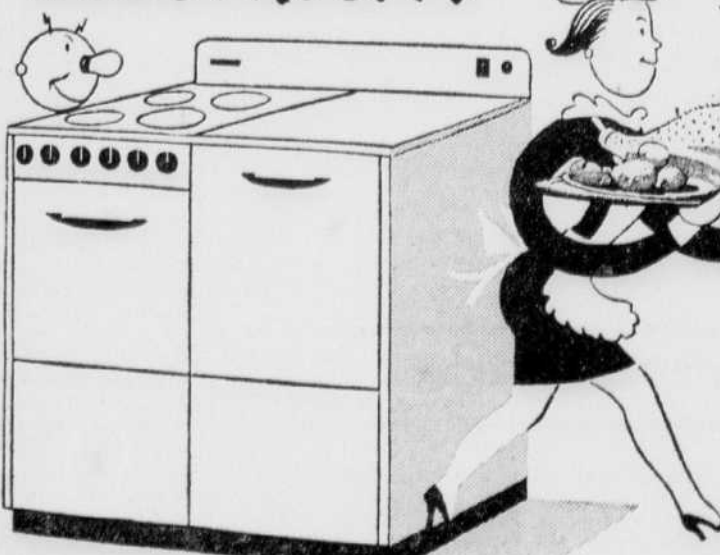

JAPANESE-RUSSIAN RELATIONSHIPS

The recent Churchill-Stalin conferences in Moscow indicate that for Russia this is still a one-front war. She wants a second front, but she wants it in the right place. The parley, while reaffirming the alliance of the three great powers whose lands girdle the globe and whose forces fight the enemy on all the seas and all but one of the continents, emphasizes once more the Soviet's anxiety to confine her share in the war to one front until her allies can marshal the power and choose the time and place for the second.

Japan was not mentioned by name in the communiqué which announced the results of the Moscow conference. But the care taken, obviously at the insistence of Joseph Stalin, to exclude Japan from the announced scope of the decisions showed clearly that the threat of Hirohito's army in Manchuria was never far from the minds of the conferees even as they grappled with the deadly urgent problem of stopping Hitler.

For the second time in ten weeks the leaders of the United Nations have made this pointed exception. Monday's announcement declared again that the agreements concluded early in June were against "Hitlerite Germany and her associates in Europe."

The United States and Britain, much as they may hope to see Eastern Siberia ultimately available as a base of operations against Japan, are compelled to accept their Ally's single-front stand with sympathy and understanding. One of the great dangers confronting the United Nations is that the much-debated second front will be opened by Japan before Britain and the United States are ready to strike, that it will come at the Eastern extremity of the great Eurasian land mass instead of the Western.

Certainly this is no time for Russia to challenge the Mikado's Kwantung army, which reports from many quarters described as growing steadily in numbers and striking power, ranged along the Amur and Ussuri rivers, ready to thrust deep into Siberia in the fine autumn weather that begins in a week or two in Northeastern Asia.

Russian-Japanese relations are regulated, according to repeated official statements, by the neutrality treaty the two powers signed at Easter, 1941, in Moscow. Although Japan has been at war for nearly nine months against her two principal allies, Russia insists on holding with rigid correctness to the letter of her engagement. Does the Kremlin really believe that Japan will honor her pledge a day longer than it fits her purposes? Or is Stalin trying merely to avoid giving the provocation that might be all the eager Kwantung army would need to send against Vladivostok?

What Russia hopes for or expects from Japan remains one of this war's great mysteries. Obviously, however, that is not the time from Russia's or her allies' points of view to complete the global nature of the war by turning Siberia and Manchuria into a battleground.

That may come later, when the German phase of the war gives way to the Japanese. All signs now point to this conflict being a two chapter affair, with the decision in the Orient postponed until Hitler is disposed of. One of the most convincing of such signs is that phrase in Monday's communiqué—"Hitlerite Germany and her associates in Europe."

Meanwhile it may be that a far-away third front is playing a telling part in the United Nations' urgent effort to ensure that they and not Japan shall open the second front. The Battle of the Solomon Islands remains obscured in the muck of tropical rains and official secrecy, but indications grow that this may become a vortex which will draw an increasing share of Japan's naval and air strength into battle.

She dares not let this contest go by default. She confronts the danger that in the Solomons the Allies may definitely reverse the tide which Japan set in train with her December 8 assaults on the Philippines and Malaya and carried to the flood in New Guinea and at the gates of India.

THE CHINESE VIEW THE SOLOMONS

The resounding blows of the United States forces in the Solomon Islands, which are attracting widespread attention and stimulating hope in Chungking, soon will relieve Japanese pressure on China in the opinion of a Chinese Government spokesman, who declared that it is an epoch-making battle which is sure to have important repercussions in China. The Solomons campaign, by drawing substantial portions of Japan's naval, land and air forces into the mid-Pacific, will inevitably force the Japanese to revise their campaign on the continent of Asia.

The American action in the Solomons is a demonstration of "exceptional courage and an impressive proof of the might of America," the spokesman asserted.

"We are deeply impressed by the immensity of the effort."

He said there was a basic difference between Japan's capture of these almost unfortified islands and their recapture by American troops after the Japanese had converted them into strong bases.

"It's a global war," he added, "and success or failure on any sector is bound to have immediate effects on other sectors."

POST-WAR POLITICAL PROBLEMS

One of the outstanding facts brought out by the war is the world-wide weakness of the present system of political control and absence, generally speaking, of a sufficient number of highly-trained men in the governments of the world.

The trade union movement was brought about by the need of labor to ensure decent living conditions and a measure of security. The rapid advance of the use of machinery still further complicated the situation for though the machine operator through his ability to make the machine turn out more and better articles was able to have his wages boosted, the white collar worker, the laborer and the farmer had no such preferred position.

Now with the extension to all countries of the latest in scientific and mechanical means of production there still will arise a greater need than ever for a knowledge of the fundamentals of government, a thorough schooling in economics and how to apply such knowledge on a world-wide plan instead of by the hit and miss nationalism which has sufficed heretofore and which, no doubt, has had some part in bringing about the present war.

The whole matter is evidence enough that such men as Hitler, who is an example of extreme nationalism, are not equipped with sufficient knowledge to occupy a place in world government. Hitler, of course, has never travelled nor had the benefit of studying other peoples, their needs and peculiarities, nor has he cultivated a desire to widen his viewpoint.

The new world will need men who have a grounding in world economics and who have made a study of the various elements which compose the two billion or more inhabitants of the globe, their religious beliefs, customs and a thousand and one characteristics which serve to make the difference between the Easterner and the man from the West, the American and the European.

All these people cannot be put through one moulding machine and made alike but it is possible with careful planning and intelligent application by men who have been trained thoroughly in political economy to improve on our present methods of approach to the matter of keeping peace between the various nations. So long as men are elected to Parliament because they are good fellows and amusing talkers at a political gathering there cannot be much improvement. It would seem that we will have to go a step farther and set up an educational degree in world-wide political economies so as to insure that disturbance in world affairs would, like the first tremors of an earthquake, immediately notify us of dangers ahead. While it is quite true that many warnings were sounded as to the approach of the present cataclysm it also is true that steps were not taken to hang out the danger signals from the headquarters of government for all to see, but that each of the soon-to-be belligerents were doing their best to turn the blind eye in the hope that the spectre would pass and business as usual go on its way rejoicing.

Like a good doctor, trained men at the top, charged and responsible to be on the lookout for such disturbances, would have taken steps to stop the disease before it got out of hand.

OUR COMMON RESPONSIBILITY

London Financial News

At the end of a war which will have torn the world to pieces, how can the possibility be re-created of a decent life for its inhabitants? The task is common to both countries, and they bear a common responsibility for seeing that it is accomplished. The penalty of failure is a setback from which civilization may not recover for decades, perhaps for centuries. The job of exploring tangible possibilities lies squarely on the two Governments, and they ought to be working on it continuously. "The problem at issue is not to consider how we can each protect our own interests, but how we jointly, and incidentally the rest of the world, can struggle out of the Slough of Despond." That is a profound truth, and the F. B. I. (Federation of British Industries) has done public service by stressing it. That issue, though some of our well-meaning Utopia builders are apt completely to forget it, is vital.

AN EVER-PRESENT DANGER

While riven tanks exude what is literally our elixir of life, due to the explosion of shells or bombs, may well be one of our nightmares, we should not permit it to become an hallucination, for our water supply, although precarious because of our dependency on rainfall, is unique in the fact that it is so widely distributed. Whereas many larger communities are dependent for water upon a reservoir or reservoirs tapping a river or lake, our supply is scattered throughout the islands in hundreds of tanks of varying capacities. Nevertheless, any widespread destruction of these tanks could place us in grievous straits, subject us to acute suffering and render us helpless in the face of an enemy attack. It is indeed urgent that we should heed the warning that we must now rely on ourselves in this vital matter of the water supply.

But Gen. MacArthur, who comes first, and our P.W.D. trucks are already overburdened with it. They cannot be diverted to water-carrying for civilians except under the greatest emergency, and then to only a very limited extent. Shipping facilities, we know, are cut to the bone, and there is no hope of cargoes of water arriving regularly or even irregularly to meet the deficiencies of our own catches and tanks. What we have and can catch we must make last as long as possible and go as far as possible, and the method of waste must be reduced to the last thin shadow. . . . In the little drops of water which refresh our land and replenish our tanks are all the elements of defence, of life, and of death. Infinitely precious, they cannot be too strictly guarded.

THE INFLUENCE OF WOMEN ON HISTORY

Washington, Merry-Go-Round

All through history, from Helen of Troy to the Duchess of Windsor, women have influenced the tide of fate. And if it had not been for a woman in the life of Gen. Douglas MacArthur he probably would not have been in a position to perform his heroic defence of the Philippines and command Australia today. Just after the last war, the belle of Washington society was vivacious Louise Brooks, step-daughter of the millionaire Edward T. Stotesbury, a partner of J. P. Morgan. She was the toast of Washington. Gen. Pershing, just returned from France, was one of her most devoted attendants. Admiral Beatty, hero of the battle of Jutland, was another.

Once, after a dinner at Mrs. Marshall Field's both Pershing and Beatty escorted Louise to her car, nearly had an altercation over who was to take her home.

But Gen. MacArthur, then superintendent of West Point, stepped in and married the lady. Shortly thereafter, Gen. Pershing, not at all happy over MacArthur's victory, transferred him to the Philippines.

MacArthur and his wife were stationed in the Philippines for several years. And although the marriage later ended in divorce, it was MacArthur's tour of duty in Manila which acquainted him with Filipino leaders and later brought about his return as Field Marshal of the Philippine Army.

If Pershing or Lord Beatty had married the lady, history might have been different.

ANXIOUS TO AID BLIND CHILDREN

To the Editor of the Record.

Dear Sir:—If your readers know of any English-speaking child who is absenting himself or herself from school on account of impaired vision, we shall be glad if they will send the name and address to our institution. It is very important that all blind and partially blind children should be educated, and the School of the Montreal Association for the Blind is well-equipped for this purpose. The children are taught to read and write by means of the Braille System, and in addition to the subjects taught in the ordinary public school, instruction is given in music and typewriting, and the pupils are trained in some useful occupation which will enable them to become self-supporting citizens.

We have a Sight-Saving Class too, where children read and write in large type. Frequently by placing children with weak eyes in a Sight-Saving Class such as is operated by our School, present vision is preserved for many more years than would be the case if the pupils stayed in regular classes with consequent eyestrain.

Extensive grounds are attached to the school building with suitable apparatus for recreation. Only those parents who are in a position to do so are expected to contribute towards their child's maintenance.

Your co-operation in the work of locating the English-speaking blind and partially blind children will be very greatly appreciated.

Her soul of Christian mother, patriot, friend.

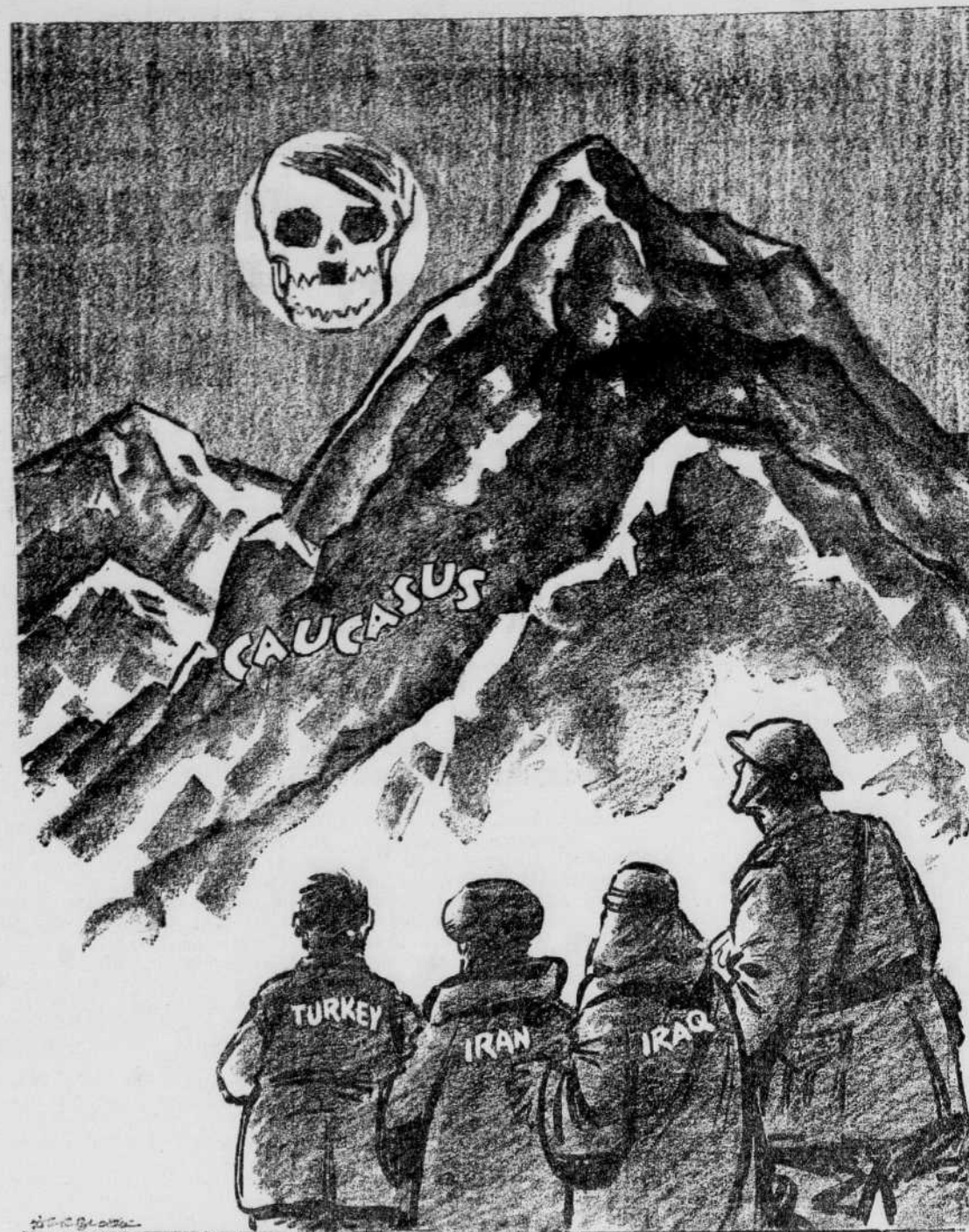

PLAYING HIGH HONOR CONFUSES DECLARER

Here is another hand showing a common situation where a defender, playing second to a trick, must jump up with an honor that the third hand can kill.

On the first trick North wins the king of hearts with the ace, then leads a low diamond. East must play the king.

The reason for this play is East's precise holding of three cards including the 10 and king, or queen, under the ace-jack-nine. From the lead it can reasonably be inferred that North lacks the other high honor, the queen. His normal play will then be to take a finesse of the nine, and it happens, this will drive out West's queen, leaving dummy with a major tenace over East.

By playing the king, East forces the declarer to guess how to play the suit. The finesse against the 10, which East knows will win, is shut out. Instead, declarer is allowed to kill the king if he wishes, but he will have to guess what to do on the second round.

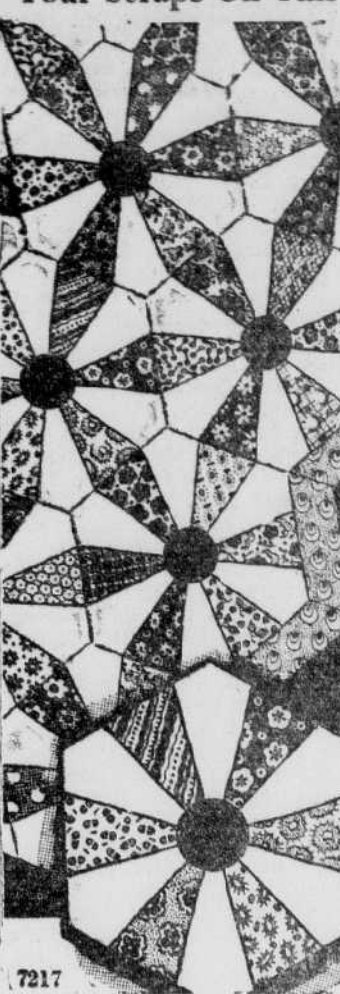

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CARDINALS CUTTING INTO DODGERS' LEAD

Top Cubs 5-0 As Phils Surprise Brooklyn 3-1

St. Louis Still Trails by Six and a Half Lengths But Has Knocked Three Full Games Off Dodger Lead in as Many Days—Hubbell Beats Braves 1-0 for Giants—Red Sox Shade Yanks 8-7.

After nearly everybody except their relatives had given them up for lost, the St. Louis Cardinals are threatening at last to make a race out of the National League pennant drive.

They still trail the front-running Brooklyn Dodgers by six and a half lengths, but they have knocked three full games off the Dodger lead in the last three days and apparently have gathered enough steam to make things hot the rest of the way down the stretch.

With southpaw Max Lanier hurling seven-hit shutout ball, the Cards ran their latest winning streak to five in a row last night by beating the Chicago Cubs and Claude Passeau, 5-0.

The Dodgers dropped into Philadelphia for a one-night stand and were joined, 3-1, by the Phils, whom they had expected to roll over and play dead.

That defeat was the second straight for the Brooks, who have lost five of their last ten games. The Cardinals have won ten of their last twelve.

Carl Hubbell pitched the Giants to a 10-2 triumph over the Boston Braves yesterday, scattering six hits as his boss, Mel Ott, chipped in with his 21st home run and took over the leadership of the league.

The Pittsburgh Pirates dropped Cincinnati five games behind the Giants by whitewashing the Reds, 3-0, on the six-hit hurling of Johnny Lanning in another night contest.

In the American League, the Boston Red Sox ran their winning streak to five games by edging out the New York Yankees, 8-7 in ten innings.

Denny Galehouse turned in a seven-hit shutout in a night contest as the St. Louis Browns whipped the Chicago White Sox, 7-0, and climbed to within a single game of the third-place Cleveland Indians, who were idle. Jack Wade gave the Browns their first hit of the game in the sixth inning but they buried him under a six-run assault in the seventh and continued their eleven-hit attack on Joe Haynes.

The Washington Senators came from behind to trip the Philadelphia Athletics, 2-1, in another eye light tilt, with Alex Carrasquel shading Phil Marchiondi in a mound dueling.

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JACK DILLON'S DEATH RECALLS OLD RING DAYS

Honest John Kelly Once Offered to Bet \$100,000 Giant Killer Could Beat Jess Willard.

New York, Aug. 19.—(AP)—Passing of Ernest Cutler Price is reminding of the time Honest John Kelly offered to bet \$100,000 that Jack Dillon could beat the gigantic Jess Willard. For Jack Dillon was the ring name of Ernest Cutler Price, one of the more colorful fighting men.

One of Dillon's sparring partners for the Frank Moran fight—at old Washington Park, Brooklyn, in June, 1916—was a bronzed youngster from out of the West. It was his success in workouts with Dillon that convinced Jack Dempsey he could win the heavyweight championship.

Dillon fought Frank Klaus in the first open-air night fight on record. It was not held in New York and promoted by Tex Rickard, as most people suppose.

Promoters Bingham and Cross put it on in Indianapolis, May 29, 1913, the night before a 500-mile automobile race. George Engle, who had Klaus, still laughs about how he laughed and guessed himself out of \$5,000.

Engle couldn't understand anybody promoting an outdoor fight at night, suspected Bingham and Cross were kidding when they offered Klaus a \$4,000 guarantee and expenses for three for such a thing.

But when Klaus and Engle arrived the night of the battle, they found the joint packed. There were no boxing commissions in those days, so Engle demanded \$5,000, although he originally rejected \$31.3 per cent.

Manager Engle argued that the promoters had misrepresented things to him, told them that he could count a house as quickly as anyone in the business.

"There is at least \$15,000 in here and I want \$5,000, or \$31.3 per cent," he demanded. Knowing there was more than \$30,000 in the place, Bingham and Cross readily consented.

Bingham and Cross showed Tex Rickard and the rest how to get the more important money in boxing—under the arcs at night.

Dillon, never much more than a light-heavyweight and standing no more than 5 feet 7 1/2, became known as the Giant Killer largely because of his knockout of Tom Cowler and the whipping of Jess Willard, neither of whom could fight a great deal.

But Dillon fought all the great fighters of his time, for eleven sizeable years—from 1908 through '18—and was good enough to convince Honest John Kelly that he could lick the marauding Willard to the extent of \$100,000 worth.

It was Jack Dillon's slambang style that gave Jack Dempsey the idea that brought the \$1,000,000 gates.
