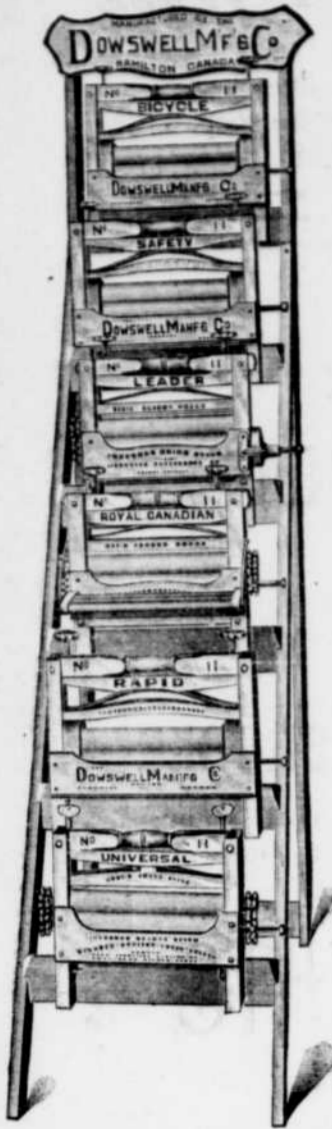

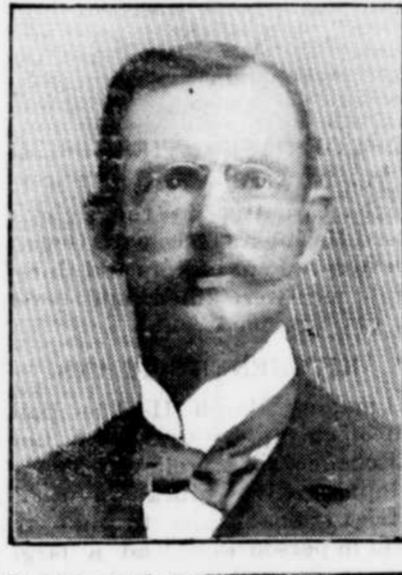

BANQUET TO ALDERMAN H. B. AMES.

Was Guest of Y.M.C.A. Lyceum and Spoke on City Problem.

The complimentary banquet to Alderman H. B. Ames of Montreal, by the Sherbrooke Y. M. C. A. Lyceum was one of the most successful gatherings of this nature that has been held in Sherbrooke for some time, and the members are to be congratulated on their initial effort in this direction. The guest of the evening confined his remarks to municipal affairs and took as his text "The City Problem." His speech was listened to with close attention, and those who did not enjoy hearing him can gather much from his published remarks. Alderman Ames is the recognized leader of good municipal government in Montreal, and it was in some way to offer their tribute to his efforts in this direction that the Lyceum invited him to their banquet. In honoring him they were honoring themselves. The addresses during the evening were all bright, happy and to the point.

forest, the farm, the mine within easy reach; your magnificent water powers, as yet but partially developed, affording the means of converting this raw material into which there is demand. Your advantageous situation as a distributing centre, its railway communication in all directions, and moderate prices for the necessities of life, and most of all the spirit of your people as set forth in your motto, "Onward," all convince one that there shall here arise, at no very distant day, an industrial centre of magnitude. Already your city is the second manufacturing centre in the province of Quebec, so that if you have no problem to-day, your problem will come, and that right soon. Perhaps, then, as one having some experience in municipal problems I may venture to diagnose and prescribe. I venture to do this in Sherbrooke where I might not elsewhere because your conditions are similar in many ways to those of the city with which I am familiar. Yours is an industrial centre. So is ours. Yours is governed under the British municipal system. So is ours. Your city contains a mixed population, speaking different languages. So is ours. The difference then between the conditions here and the conditions in Montreal is one, not of kind, but of degree. Yours is our problem in embryo. While it may require a microscope to discover yours, ours is apparent with the naked eye. But what is ours to-day will be yours tomorrow. By

this time you will doubtless ask what is it that you mean by the city problem? Having a dash of Scotch blood in my veins, I answer your question by presenting another. What is a city? A city is a place inhabited by a permanent and organized community. And what is it for? What is the purpose of the end of associated life? There are two different conceptions concerning the purpose of associated life. First, there is the business idea that the individuals of a community are united together for the promotion of the prosperity and material advancement of that community; the standard of measurement employed to ascertain whether their success or failure is consequent. The standard of measurement is expressed in the promotion of population, of wealth, of trade, of commerce. This conception has evidently been permanent in the minds of the citizens of Sherbrooke, both past and present. You have granted bonuses to manufacturing industries; you have given exemptions to industrial enterprises; you have offered inducements to railroads to enter your borders. Judged from this standard Sherbrooke is prosperous. But the conception of the industrial century which has just passed is not the highest conception of life. Life is more than meat and the body than raiment. I would consider it rather the uniting for common welfare. Each for all and all for each. In the old days of the Greek games many towns sent athletes to compete, and he alone who first reached the goal was adjudged the victor. Of all other competitors nothing was known or cared. It might happen that a town sent many competitors, but only to that place which produced the victor did honor accrue.

rate larger than that to be found in many cities less favourably situated. Suppose the death rate could be lowered to 18 per cent. Do you realize that that would mean a saving of one hundred lives a year. The expenditure of your health department is but a few hundred dollars per annum. Is that all that is necessary in view of these figures? Have the babies of Sherbrooke their opportunity, and if not why not? And looking over your police reports, what does one see? Out of 208 arrests, there were 106 of persons under thirty years of age; out of 208 arrests there were 118 for the first offence; out of 208 arrests there were 185 persons who were not of temperate habits. In view of these figures might I ask are the young men of Sherbrooke having their chance, their opportunity, or are there agencies here which tend to deprive them of it? If I may be allowed so to do, I would venture to prescribe two remedies. There are many remedies, but two are to my mind most important, and in the use of these remedies, I am not a homeopathic. I would not label the bottle poison, and you may take the doses as frequently and in as large quantities as you desire. First, I would say that in dealing with your municipal problem it is of importance that you maintain that interest in municipal government with which you are proverbial. But mere interest is not enough. There should be added thereto capacity, intelligence, devotion. Do you ever stop to think what it would mean to have the absolute control of one of our great cities, for a reasonable period, in the hands of a body of thoroughly capable, honest, and unselfish men? The benefits to be derived would be simply incalculable. It is considered a high honour to represent the city of Sherbrooke at Ottawa, it is considered a glory to represent it at Quebec; and it is considered of no honour to represent it at Sherbrooke, and yet, judged by its importance, it is the greater contribution. My second suggestion would be in the line of calling your serious attention to the importance of a city like Sherbrooke to the young men of your community. What you are they later on will be. The problem of our cities is the young men. Capture them but for one single generation for righteousness and your problem is solved. We are met here tonight under the auspices of an association which in my mind has contributed more towards the building up and development of sound character among our young men than any other similar institution on the continent. I refer to the Y.M.C.A. It was founded primarily as a religious institution, but it has become a potent factor in the development of twentieth century men. Its object is to reach out for the young men and lead them to that which is wholesome, and develop them socially, physically, mentally, morally and imprinting upon them the thought that their responsibility towards their fellow men and the community which they live in, is a duty which cannot be surpassed. One of the latest developments of this association is to advance the work along the line of good citizenship. To prepare by study, by training, by practice, by inspiration the young men with whom it comes in contact to take an intelligent and effective part in the municipal life of our great cities. Hundreds of associations throughout the great cities are bending their energies to this work and are laying the communities in which they are situated under everlasting obligation to them. This work you are doing in Sherbrooke. We are trying to do it in Montreal. With honest, intelligent municipal government, with active work for young men by young men, your city problem should be solved before its presence can make itself known.

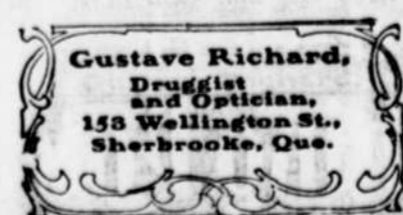

PUBLIC OPINION. London, March 11 - Ear Roberts' appeal for a suspension of judgment on General Methuen is generally accepted without hesitation.

THE DAILY TELEGRAPH SAYS: "The Boer commander in his latest exploit as well as in his previous exploit has shown what no other leader on the side of the enemy has ever done."

It appears from the despatch to hand that the men who were chased four miles by the Boers from the scene of action, and which the pro-Boer Daily News, says "is terrible, a most humiliating statement for any Englishman to read," were not regular soldiers.

They were jingoes. Rudyard Kipling's waifs and strays from a system of recruiting which would never bear examination.

It is believed that the bulk of General Methuen's column consisted, and many of whom are assumed to be raw and untrained.

The serious criticism of the press, on the whole, may be summed up in the statement that the reverse is grave and humiliating, tending to add months to the duration of the war, but that the net result can be easily exaggerated.

General Kitchener is commended for taking a proper course in sending immediate reinforcements to rectify the position.

An incident at home has aroused even greater indignation than the disaster itself. This is the manner in which the news was received by a section of the Irish members of the House of Commons.

When Secretary of War Brodrick read the despatches in the House, Messrs. Redmond, Dillon, O'Connor and other prominent Irishmen displayed no concern in them, but Mr. MacNeil and other minor extremists, burst into triumphant guffaws on hearing of General Methuen's capture and the flight of the troops.

Subsequently the Irish shouted "Hear, hear," to Mr. Brodrick's tribute to General Methuen.

The incident, however, has created a bitter feeling towards the offenders, many Liberals resenting their attitude equally with the ministerialists.

Lord Roseberry alluded to the incident in his speech at Glasgow. He used it to clinch his renewed contention that it was utterly impossible to entrust such men with the control of an independent parliament in Dublin.

He said that even if Mr. Gladstone should rise from his grave he could not assent thereto.

KITCHENER'S DESPATCH. In a despatch, dated Sunday, March 9, Lord Kitchener says that when the British were attacked Lord Methuen was moving with nine hundred mounted men, under Major Paris, and three hundred infantry, four guns and a pom-pom, from Wynburg to Lichtenburg, and was to meet Grenfell, with 1,300 mounted men, at Rovirairens Fontein today.
