

ADRIANOPLE COMPLETELY HEMMED IN BY BULGARIAN TROOPS

Turkish Force Defeated at Lule Burgas and Town Captured by Bulgarians—Intervention of the Powers Expected—Latter Will Not Allow Bulgarians to Enter Constantinople—Turkish Squadron Bombard Bulgarians on Black Sea Coast

London, Oct. 31.—(Special)—The Turkish army, after its defeat at Luleburgas, retreated toward Tchatalja. Adrianople is completely hemmed in by Bulgarian troops.

TURKS WERE DEFEATED AFTER FIERCE FIGHTING.

London, Oct. 31.—(Special)—The Bulgarian army has completely defeated a Turkish force, estimated at 20,000 men, at Luleburgas after three days' terrific fighting, according to a news agency despatch from Sofia. The Bulgarian cavalry is pursuing the retreating Turks.

INTERVENTION OF POWERS.
London, Oct. 31.—(Special)—What ever the result of the great battle now being fought between the Turkish and Bulgarian armies in the eastern part of the Balkan peninsula, its conclusion will probably give occasion for the intervention of the European Powers.

CANNOT ENTER CONSTANTINOPLE.

In despatches from Vienna it is asserted that the foreign ministers of the European Governments have reached a tentative agreement in this matter, and in any event the entry of Bulgarian troops into Constantinople will not be tolerated by the Powers. Even Russia is disinclined to permit such an occurrence. It is also understood in diplomatic quarters in the Austrian capital that the Balkan nations have made known in an unofficial manner that they are prepared to accept intervention by the Powers at any moment now.

TURKS BOMBARD BULGARIANS.
Constantinople, Oct. 31.—(Special)—It is rumored here that Bulgarian troops are being bombarded by the Turkish squadron on the Black Sea coast, and under cover of the firing a body of Turkish troops has been landed.

BULGARIANS CLAIM VICTORY.
Sofia, October 31 (1.30 a. m.)—After two days fighting the Bulgarian army has gained a complete victory over the principal Turkish forces. The Turks have retreated in disorder. The town of Lule Burgas has been taken.

Public attention has been centred in the operations around Adrianople and the movements of the Bulgarians against Lule Burgas. This town is an important point in the Turkish second line of defence, which stretches from there westward to Demotica. Its capture indicates that this second line has been broken. The Turks will probably retreat to Tcheorlu, where they might possibly make a stand.

TURKISH ATROCITIES.
Athens, October 31.—New and more terrible Turkish atrocities in twenty Christian villages in the Janina region are officially reported. The villages were destroyed, the inhabitants massacred, women and children being burned alive.

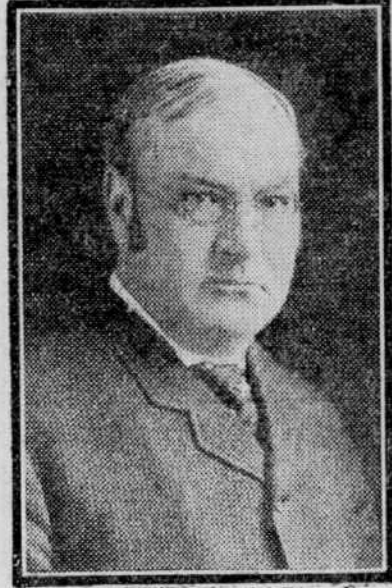
It is also officially reported that three-fourths of the Turkish wounded at the beginning of the fighting were Christians. Now only about one-fourth of the wounded are Christians, which is taken to mean that the Christians were placed in the forefront of the battle. Five hundred Greeks enrolled in the Turkish army, who managed to de-

VICE PRESIDENT SHERMAN DEAD

Passed Away Last Night After Long Illness

LITTLE HOPE HAD BEEN ENTAINED OF HIS RECOVERY FOR SOME TIME.

Utica, N.Y., October 31.—After a long illness Vice-president James Schoolcraft Sherman died at his home in this city at 9.42 o'clock last night of uremic poison caused by Bright's disease, complicated by heart disease and arterio-sclerosis. He had been sinking since early

morning and it was realized that death was a question of only a few hours. There was slight relief shortly after 7 o'clock, caused by an apparent improvement in the condition of the kidneys, but it did not prove real or lasting and at best gave only temporary hope. At 9 o'clock his temperature rose to 106. From that time his condition rapidly passed from bad to worse until the end. He was unconscious when the end came and had been in that condition for hours, with but slight change.

MR. J. H. ROBERTS AGAIN THREATENED

"Citizen" Sends Him a Note Telling What to Expect

WRITER SAYS SECRETARY TOOK AWAY HIS RIGHTS AS A CITIZEN.

Montreal, October 31.—Secretary Roberts, of the Dominion Alliance, was yesterday the recipient of another of those cheery missives from one of his unknown friends who follow his pugilistic experiences with interest. In his mail box was a typed letter on plain paper bearing date of 29th in this city. The writer, who was too modest to divulge his identity more than by describing himself as "A Citizen of Montreal," said: "Dear Sir,—It is a source of great pleasure that the writer sees how you were handled in St. Hyacinthe. You are about to get what has been coming to you for a long time. You seek of cheap notoriety, particularly in the 'Daily Witness.' You presume you have the right to do away with my personal rights as a citizen of this city. Well, I will watch my chance to give to you what is yet coming to you."

ANGLO-GERMAN UNDERSTANDING

Business Men of Both Countries in Conference

SPEAKER SAYS ENGLAND AND GERMANY WILL STAND TOGETHER TO MEET AMERICA.

New York, Oct. 31.—(Special)—A London cable says: "The Anglo-German understanding conference, composed of hundreds of representatives of commerce between Germany and England, met at the Guildhall yesterday. Sir William Mather said the two countries are united and would prevent war for evermore troubling the world. 'Hermann Hecht, of Berlin, said England and Germany should stand together to meet the danger which may come from America, where great industries are being rapidly developed. 'Many speakers criticized Lord Roberts for his Manchester speech, in which he said that war between Germany and England is inevitable, the consensus of opinion being that when England realizes that Germany is not seeking territorial aggrandizement there will be no more talk of war.'"

TWO REAL ESTATE DEALS YESTERDAY

Cantin Property and Lacrosse Grounds Changed Hands.

FORMER PURCHASED BY GEORGE POVEY AND W. H. SOUTHWOOD AND LATTER BY EDWARDS' REALTY CO.

Two important real estate deals were completed yesterday. The first was the sale of the Catin property on Wellington street south to Messrs. George Povey and W. H. Southwood. Southwood.

This property has a frontage on Wellington street of 66 feet and a depth of 145. It is situated between Legare's new block and LeBaron's garage. The price was in the vicinity of \$12,000.

LACROSSE GROUNDS SOLD.
The second transfer was the sale of the lacrosse grounds to the Edwards' Realty Company. The deeds were signed yesterday, the purchase price being \$4,000.

This property consists of four acres of land and the grand stand. For many years the grounds have been operated at a loss, and in order to settle up accounts that have been long outstanding the trustees decided to sell.

CHURCHILL ON BALKAN EVENTS

Hopes to see Powers United When Smoke Clears Away

SIGNS THERE ARE THAT POWERS WERE HONESTLY TRYING TO ADJUST THEIR DIFFERENCES.

London, October 31.—Winston Spencer Churchill, First Lord of the Admiralty, speaking at Sheffield last night, devoted remarks to Balkan events. He expressed the fervent hope that when the war was ended the nations would be found united in the resolve that about Balkan difficulties there should never be another war, and that the long dismal chapter of human misery unfolded in that region of the world should in one way or another be closed once for all. There happily were signs, he said, that all the powers were honestly striving to adjust their differences and bring their combined influence to bear to make an end of the long fierce and disastrous struggle and to secure a settlement just to the belligerents and beneficial to the populations concerned.

LARGEST DOCK IN THE WORLD

WAS BUILT IN ENGLAND AND IS FOR PORT OF MONTREAL.

New York, Oct. 31.—Sir Arthur Trevor-Dawson, the English engineer, who arrived yesterday on the Oceanic with his wife and two daughters, said that he had a dry dock, which had cost \$250,000 to build at Barrow, being towed out by two tugs to Montreal. He said that it would accommodate a vessel of 27,500 tons, and was the largest floating dry dock in the world. He leaves for Montreal today to make arrangements for the dry dock.

QUEBEC MAN KILLED AT MAGOG

Attempted to Board Moving Train and Had Legs Cut Off.

WAS ABOUT TO START FOR HIS HOME IN QUEBEC CITY AS HE WAS NOT WELL.

Magog, Oct. 31.—(Special)—A serious and painful accident occurred yesterday, and which later proved to be fatal, occurred here in the afternoon. The victim was Mr. Joseph Forcord of 119 Dorchester Street, Quebec, a man about 52 years of age. He was not very well known here, having been here only a short time in charge of the iron work at the Dominion Textile Co. extension. During the last two days he had been somewhat indisposed and yesterday morning decided to go home and packed his two valises and went to the station, it being his intention to go to Quebec via Sherbrooke. As he would have to wait over in the latter place if he took the regular noon passenger train for Sherbrooke he wished if possible to get there by a freight train and it is supposed that with this in view, he endeavored to board a moving freight train and get permission to go but, unfortunately, he slipped in endeavoring to do so and fell beneath the wheels with the result that both legs were severed below the knees. Among the first to reach him was Chief of Police Gendron, closely followed by Mr. E. D. Smith. The former immediately took his name, address and other details, while Mr. Smith proceeded to bind up his wounded legs to prevent his bleeding to death. Drs. Cabana and Guertin were soon on the scene and took care of him and had him taken to the creche, where he was given every attention possible, and it was thought he would come out of it all young girl, 12 years old, who is in Unfortunately his system was too great and he succumbed about 7 in the evening.

Halbrite, Sask., Oct. 31.—Yesterday morning three little children, belonging to Mr. and Mrs. Frank Garriah, died in a burning house on the outskirts of Halbrite. Mrs. Garriah had been helping her nearest neighbor during the night, whose child was sick. Yesterday morning Mrs. Garriah put on a fire in her own house and ran across to see how the sick child was. The fire started from some unknown cause and had gained great headway before her attention was called to it. The alarm was given and chemical engines from town were soon on the scene and the fire was gotten enough under control to enable the firemen to remove the bodies, which were badly charred. Mr. and Mrs. Garriah are both hard working, industrious people, who came from New Brunswick about one year ago, and everything they possessed was in the house. They are destitute and a benefit fund has been started.

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MANITOBA HAS PAYING CROP

Minister of Agriculture Says It is Best in a Decade

THIS, TOO, IN SPITE OF THE RECENT STORM AND CONTINUED WET WEATHER.

Winnipeg, Man., October 31.—Manitoba's crop this year will be one of the best paying in the last decade, in spite of the recent storm and the wet harvest season.

This statement was made by Hon. Geo. Lawrence, minister of agriculture. Mr. Lawrence says that the stor of Monday evening will not do a great deal of damage, because most of the wheat that was in stock has been threshed. There are still some oats and barley lying out in stock, he declares, but the bulk of all grains is either stacked or threshed.

"Stacking, however, is not complete protection against such a storm as we had Monday night," said the Minister. "In 1901 a similar snow fall occurred on October 30, and much stacked grain was spoiled because the ice clung to it, and was carried into the bins with the grain."

EX-SERVICE MEN AND EMIGRATION

Plans Unfolded at a Meeting in Toronto

WILL, IF NECESSARY, ADVANCE MONEY FOR THEIR PASSAGE TO CANADA.

Toronto, Oct. 31.—The plans for the naval and military league, whose objects are to give advice on emigration to ex-service men, to find openings for them in the Dominions, to advance money, if necessary, to enable them to emigrate, and to look after them upon reaching their destinations, were unfolded yesterday by E. T. Scammell, honorary secretary of the meeting of prominent military officers and citizens in the council chamber of the Board of Trade. After hearing the statement the gathering unanimously passed a resolution commending the proposals to the favorable consideration of the Dominion Government.

Montreal, October 31.—Large receipts of butcher cattle which are coming forward at present because of the lack of pasture feed and grain, the cattle being spoiled to a large extent by continued rains, in both this province and Ontario, keeps the price of beef down.

The demand for beef is small. There was, however, an improved demand yesterday over Monday for hogs, but prices show no change. The feature of the smaller meats was the stronger feeling in the market for lambs. Choice lots brought 1c. more per lb.

There was a very firm feeling for select hogs. Supplies of live pork were plentiful, but a large percentage were of a rough variety and mixed grades.

Receipts of butcher cattle estimated 1,600. Market steady to easy. Best butcher steers, \$6.25 to \$6.50; good, \$5.85 to \$6.00; fair, \$5.35 to \$5.60; medium, \$5.00 to \$5.25. 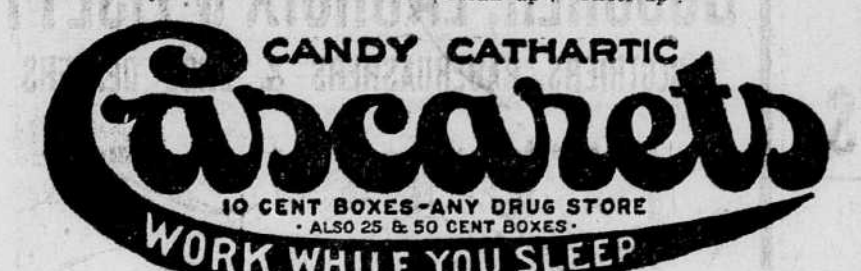

LETTERS TO THE EDITOR

EMIGRATION FROM GREAT BRITAIN.

Editor Record,

Sir:—I have read Mr. I. Herbert W. Edmond's letter in your issue of October 21st re emigration from Great Britain to the Eastern Townships with great interest and from actual experience I can fully endorse the plan that he outlines. It would be a great waste of time and money to give lectures in the southern counties of England (except Kent where I got good results). I have tried and they were the only parts of England from which I did not succeed. In securing emigrants for Canada the farming class (the towns are no good), especially the laborers in the southern counties have not the grit and the go that the farming and working class have in the Midlands and Northern counties of North Yorkshire, Cumberland, Westmoreland, North and South Wales have. These men are accustomed to working the land in the hills and dales of their native land and would make the most successful emigrants for the Eastern Townships. You want to go among the men and women in these districts and by lectures show them the advantages that the Eastern Townships offer them. I was an emigration agent in England for 30 years and although I lived in a small town of 3,000 inhabitants I became the most successful local agent in England. In 1880 I was sent out by four of the leading newspapers in Yorkshire to report on Canada as a field for emigration. I was here eight weeks and sent home two columns per week. They were afterwards published in pamphlet form by Sir Alex. Galt, the then High Commissioner. I distributed by mail 25,000 copies among the farmers in the north and east riding of Yorkshire and the following spring there was a great exodus to Canada every week from April 1st to June 30th. I took large parties to Liverpool, none less than 100. I was so successful that the Allan Line offered me their travelling agency which I accepted. My modus operandi was to write to the Vicar or Rector of the village and ask him to let me have the school room for a lecture on Canada. In nearly every case they consented and also took the Chair and in many cases entertained me for the night. They were all kind and assisted me in every way by giving advice to all enquirers and in many cases helping deserving families to emigrate. I always sent hand bills and posters and at each lecture distributed pamphlets. In February 1882 I gave 13 lectures in South Lincolnshire and on April 26 I had a special train from Spalding with 300 as fine men and women as have left England. The Bishop of Liverpool, Bishop Kyle, gave them an address and his benediction (I have a slide of the scene). I returned to Canada in 1883 and on my return used line light slides which were a great attraction. I lectured in London, Oxford, Cambridge and all the large towns, but mostly in the large villages from which I always got the best results. During the 19 years I lectured I never failed to get good and attentive audiences. Often, years afterwards, when seeing parties off on the steamers, young men and women have come to me and said: "Me, Jaques, do you remember me." I would say, "No." Then they would say do you remember lecturing at such and such a place. I would say, "Yes. Well I was a school boy or girl as the case might be and I heard you lecture and have been saving up ever since and I am now going out. You cannot always get immediate results. It is hard for a man with a family, however much he may wish to go, to strike his tent stakes and go at once. The lectures sink deep into the minds of many and bear fruit in after years. I have here over 100 slides of Canadian scenery, many of which might be utilized. I resigned my connection with the Allan Line on account of ill health. For years I suffered from bronchial asthma but lost it when I came to reside in Canada. I am personally acquainted with the best emigration agents in England and Wales and count many of them among my dearest friends. Scotchmen would make good emigrants for the Eastern Townships or they are used to hills and dales and are hardy and thrifty. I should be willing to go to England for the winter and spring and lecture and help Dr. Pelletier in his work by my personal knowledge of the Eastern Townships and its requirements and I am sure good results would follow.

KAISER HONORS FRANK BRAN-
GWIN.

London, October 31.—Frank Bran-
gwyn, A. R. A., has received from
the German embassy a gold medal
given to him by the German Emper-
or in recognition of his work as an
artist. This is the first time such
an honor has been conferred on a
British painter.

HON. FRANCES HOWARD OPERAT-
ED UPON.

London, October 31.—Lord Strath-
cona's grand-daughter, the Hon.
Frances Howard, whose engagement
to Flag Lieutenant Buller Kitson
was recently announced, underwent a
successful operation for appendicitis.
The patient is making good progress.

TIME CLOCKS FOR POSTAL MEN.

Washington, October 31.—Electri-
cal clocks, designed to prevent excu-
ses on the part of the tardy clerks,
have been installed in the postoffice
department over the elevators.
There are several hundred clerks in
the big building, and as most of
them wait until the last moment be-
fore reporting, there is a congestion
at 9 a. m. that the elevator facili-
ties are inadequate to care for.

MARCONI CONTRACT DEFENDED.

New York, October 31.—The press-
ing needs of imperial defence, the
danger of war and the threat that
the Marconi company would link up
with Germany were offered as expla-
nations of the Marconi contract by
Sir Alexander King, secretary of
the postoffice, before the select parlia-
mentary committee, says a London
despatch to the New York Herald.

ARMY REFORMS IN BELGIUM.

Brussels, Belgium, Oct. 31.—It is
stated that the government has de-
cided to carry out important army
reforms. The changes will be based
on the enrolment of two sons per
family instead of one. This will en-
sure a minimum annual contingent of
30,000 and a war footing of 250,000.
With the reserve and the territorial
army formed by the civic guard, the
strength of the whole army will
amount to 500,000 men.

ROOSEVELT GETS OVATION

Thousands Gather to Hear Him in
New York

SHOWED NO PHYSICAL EVI-
DENCE OF THE SHOCK OF
HIS ATTEMPTED
MURDER.

New York, October 31.—Showing
no physical evidence of the shock of
his attempted assassination in Mil-
waukee, October 14, Colonel Theo-
dore Roosevelt last night faced for an
hour and twenty minutes a Progres-
sive political rally which gave many
thousands of his fellow New Yorkers
a chance to accord him an uproarious
welcome.

For forty-two minutes after his
entrance into crowded Madison Square
Garden, Colonel Roosevelt stood at
the edge of the high-perched speak-
ers' platform unable to make him-
self heard above the din of cheers,
songs and band music. His gestures
to the crowd for silence served only
to intensify the noises, and when,
after twenty minutes of cheering, Col-
onel Roosevelt made a determined ef-
fort to begin his speech the immense
audience was swung off into another
period of cheering by the beginning
of the chant: "We want Teddy; We
want Teddy."

Colonel Roosevelt refused to sit
down, or to leave the rail that edged
the dimly platform. Senator Dixon
and Governor Johnson urged him to
be seated, but he maintained his
standing position throughout the en-
tire demonstration; and when oppor-
tunity finally came for him to begin
his speech, he began it with a re-
quest to the police to maintain order.

WAS SHOT BY BOY WHO HELD
AN AIR GUN WHILE IN THE

Brown's Hill, Oct. 31.—(Special)—
The following from the Concord, N.
H., Monitor gives an account of an
act of malicious injury to Miss Hazel
White, who is a daughter of Mr. and
Mrs. E. E. Temple of this place:
"A case of malicious injury with
an air rifle was reported to the police
and they are now investigating the
case, with a prospect of criminal
action to follow."

"The victim was Hazel White, a
young girl, 12 years old, who is in

"ELIJAH" OPERA AT HIS MAJESTY'S

An Historic Performance For
Sherbrooke.

PRINCIPALS, ORCHESTRA AND
CHORUS WERE EXCELLENT.
HOUSE WAS CROWDED.

Mendelssohn's masterpiece—"Eli-
jah"—in opera form, was presented to
a crowded audience last evening.
The adaptation for the stage was
identical to that produced in London,
and one easily followed by those fam-
iliar with the oratorio score.

After witnessing the performance
the most conservative listener would
be convinced that this great and dig-
nified musical setting of the story of
"Elijah" was intensified through the
sense of sight and stage settings. One
welcomes this stage triumph provid-
ing its performance always reaches
the standard of last evening; but one
trembles for Mendelssohn and these
great religious truths should the art
ever be sacrificed for sordid finance.

By having a double cast of princi-
pals the Majestic Opera Co. have
started well. Last night Mr. Bernard
Fergus represented Elijah. His splen-
did timbre of voice and great dra-
matic power left nothing to be de-
sired. He was the artist through-
out. Space does not permit of de-
tails, but what a said of Mr. Fergus
can be equally said of the remaining
principals. All were especially suited
to their respective roles. There was
no part overshadowing another—a
rare condition in touring opera com-
panies. Contralto singers heard "O
Rest in the Lord" for once as Men-
delssohn desired it. There was no
sentimental dragging in this famous
aria, while "It is Evening" was a
work of art and good acting.

THE ORCHESTRA.

Here was a feast for Sherbrooke,
rarely enjoyed. How intensified stage
surroundings become with such a
body of players supporting it. Here
one heard every player as an artist,
responding to every inflection of the
able conductor's baton. One earnestly
wishes such a body of players could
be here always. The departure
leaves an aching void. The orchestral
world is a sphere in which Sher-
brooke only catches a glimpse. Many
happy returns. To be critical one felt
that in the aria, "Is not his word
like a fire," greater attention to the
sudden pianissimo after each forte
would have helped the soloist's ar-
ticulation and voice. It seemed excite-
ment without artistic restraint.
Every other number, including the
overture, was well high perfect.

THE CHORUS.

It is something to hear Men-
delssohn's choruses sung with such pure
quality of tone and declamation. It
is stupendous to also memorise them
and fall in with the general stage
plan without a hitch.

Combine the principals, orchestra
and chorus; here is the secret of suc-
cess in their conductor, Sig. Arturo
Bovi. "No animal can exist without
its head." To the head all must un-
reservedly give the praise for the
"tout ensemble" which made one har-
monious whole which will live in the
memory of those present for many a
long time to come.

In concluding Manager Duncan must
not be forgotten. He deserves and
most certainly has the gratitude of,
not only music lovers, but all inter-
ested in a greater Sherbrooke.



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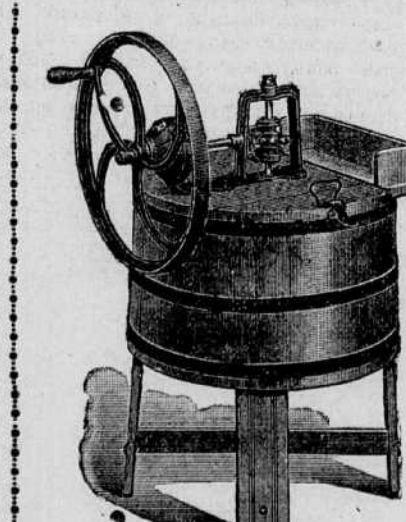
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
