THE LATE TRAGEDY AND FIRE.

This morning, at eleven o'clock, the funeral of the late lamented Major SHORT, will take place from the Citadel to the English Cathedral, thence to the Grand Trunk Railway. The body will be taken to Kingston, at the request of the deceased gentleman's friends and relatives. Yesterday the Coroner held his inquest on the remains, and a verdict was returned in accordance with the facts. The funeral this morning will be a very large one, for Major Short had many warm personal friends in our city, both military and civil, and the manner of his death has provoked feelings of universal sympathy all over the town. There will be a very large procession of soldiers, the members of the various military organizations of Quebec taking the opportunity of paying their tribute of respect to a gallant comrade in arms. Of civilians, of course, there will be a great representation in all walks of life. The death of Sergeant WALLICK occurred at about nine o'clock on Thursday evening, at the hospital. In his case death proved a great relief. He will be buried from the Citadel, on Monday afternoon, at half-past two o'clock, and the body will be taken to the English Cathedral and thence to Mount Hermon Cemetery. The funeral will also be a military one. Elsewhere in the columns of the CHRONICLE this morning, the reader will find some reminiscences of Major Short, touching gallant deeds of his within a few years ago. But Major Short was always doing something for others, and many acts of kindness performed by him, never found their way to the public eye. Few men courted notoriety less than he, but he was ever doing chivalrous things for their own sake, and because he believed that it was his duty to help his fellow-man whenever he found him in distress, or in need. He has passed from among us now, and the scenes where he played a conspicuous part will know him no longer, but he has left behind him a memory which the people of Quebec will treasure holly, and not willingly let die.

THE VICTIMS OF THE FIRE.

Inquest on the Remains, SYMPATHETIC ROYALTY. Preparation for the Funerals "PRIMATEUR EXPLOSION FROM A SPAK." St. Sauveur's Remissness Properly Pointed Out. THE JURORS ULTRAZIE THE DECEASED. The inquest upon the bodies of the deceased Major Short and Sergeant Wallick was held at the Citadel Hospital yesterday afternoon by Dr. A. G. Belland, district coroner. The jury was composed as follows:— Messrs. Simon Peters (foreman), Robert Kane, Stuart Dunn, Edmund H. Duval, Henry Sharples, John Hamilton, Peter Johnston, George C. Housack, Arthur F. Hunt, J. A. Seoretan Dubar, Alfred White, William Selby Desprover, Osborne Lambie Richardson, Elton "Baker," G. R. White, and John Barville. The jurors were sworn in and then viewed the remains. Dr. Sewell identified the remains of both the deceased. All that remained of the body of Major Short was the head, the trunk and one arm. The head is not severed from the body as reported yesterday. Alfred Lyndon, Sergeant Major of "B" Battery, was examined. He left the Citadel in order to attend the funeral of the late Major Short, between one and two o'clock Thursday morning for the scene of the fire in St. Sauveur which was reported to have been caused by the explosion of a shell in the hands of the late Sergeant Wallick being amongst them, and the late Major Short being present.
