Third Edition. THE ENGLISH CROPS. The London "Times" Review of the Situation—What the Best Crop of the Year. SPECIAL TO THE STAR. LONDON, August 27.—The Times publishes the following about the English crops: "What comes out of the best crop of the year, as was to be expected. It is not so great a crop, however, as a few weeks ago a few enthusiasts were hoping for. The cold winter and spring and the absence of rain when the plants were young were bound to have their effect, and it now happens that in a wheat crop the summer crop though good, is not an extraordinary one. The land is not now in such a high state of cultivation as it was in 1874 and 1886, when these wonderful crops were reaped. Those who have thought over the report of enquiry made on the drought of 1863 for the Royal Agricultural Society, cannot fail to be struck with the fact that the high state of cultivation of land, the excellence of drainage and the tillage had much to do with the production of the best crops in that year. The quality of the crops will be high, and we may take it for granted that a crop of about thirty-two bushels of sixty pounds each will be gathered. We may put wheat as producing a crop of a little over 9,000,000 quarters gross, giving a crop to sell of a little over 7,000,000 quarters. This will leave us dependent on foreign supplies for the drought of 1863 for the Royal Agricultural Society, cannot fail to be struck with the fact that the high state of cultivation of land, the excellence of drainage and the tillage had much to do with the production of the best crops in that year. 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
