## Al Davis elected ODHA director

The dedicated promoters of Al Davis of Bryson, who had previously nominated him as a director in the ODHA annual election, came away from the meeting held at Smiths Falls, Carusel Motor Hotel on

Saturday, May 1st, very elated with the results. Al was voted director with 83 out of a possible 113 votes, while Wilf Lebar of Pembroke, who sought re-election, took 91 votes. These two delegates topped the polls among the directors. Fifteen were nominated for 6 seats in this capacity. Two were re-elected and four new faces were elected, while 9 were defeated, 8 of whom were St Lawrence Valley nominees.

Silas Millar of Cornwall was returned by acclamation as President; Jean Cadieux of Hull is Past President; Wm. Dillabough of Morrisburg was returned by acclamation as first Vice President after Wilf Lebar declined nomination. Norman Saunders of Brockville, who a week ago, was elected President of the Central Jr A Hockey League, defeated Smiths Falls James Hallinan from the second Vice President chair by only two votes. Tom Coghlan of Ottawa retained the position of third Vice President and in this capacity is also the Chairman of the Minor Hockey Managing Committee. The secretary-registrar being the only person receiving a salary, which ruling only came into effect last season, will be hired at the next Executive meeting. Pat Smith of Cornwall served in this office last year.

The four remaining directors elected were Ken Wark, who will represent Ottawa and was last season President of the National Capital Commission, Jean Marc Lalonde of Rockland, Jacques Langevin of Hull and Jack Wylie of Brockville. This of course, shows how well the representation is now spread out, which previously was strongly controlled by the St Lawrence Valley towns.

However this year, due to many unsatisfactory decisions and the poor co-operation of this Executive, it was felt by everyone that the time was ripe for a thorough change in the administering officers. The Shawville Hockey committee in working hard at a pleasurable task, sought the support of the clubs in all Pontiac County, which included four Intermediate "B"s; one Intermediate "A" and one Jr "C". However, they also had the strong support of Deep River, Petawawa, Barry's Bay and Eganville, which have all Junior "C" Clubs. Pembroke Jr "A" Club and the other Jr "A" clubs of the Central League, Renfrew's Jr "B"; West Carleton, Almonte, Carleton Place, Hull, Buckingham & Rockland. ## All Pontiac Mayors plan to attend Municipal Conference in Quebec

The twenty five mayors who make up the Pontiac County Council will travel by Pontiac Bus to Quebec City on May 27th-28th to meet with mayors from all Quebec and officials of the Department of Municipal Affairs at a Provincial-Municipal Conference.

Island East and Allumette Island West, Pontefract and Mansfield and Fort Coulonge. It then proposed making one municipality out of Leslie, Clapham and Huddersfield, Litchfield, Campbell's Bay, Calumet

Island, Bryson Village, Portage Du Fort, Clarendon, Shawville, Thorne and Bristol.

There seems to be no answer to the question of what would happen to the rest of Pontiac County, that is to say the vast forest and lake land north of the municipalities which is now under the jurisdiction of our County Council.

who holds no particular objection to the plan is Mayor Paul Dontigny of Lac Cayamant who would not object to a municipal alliance with his close neighbors in the Gatineau. But Mr Dontigny would rather see those municipalities join the Pontiac than for Dorion and Church to join the Gatineau. He will attend the Conference in Quebec and agrees with the other Pontiac Municipalities in their desire to keep Pontiac together.

## First session for first warden from Otter Lake

The purpose of the conference is to discuss the recently produced White Paper on the restructuring of municipalities in this Province.

Although many of the municipalities in Pontiac had not yet this week received copies of this White Paper, they have been required to send their opinions, favorable or unfavorable, to the Dept. and are asked that their resolutions will be motivated by sound judgment.

This White Paper was received at THE EQUITY in March and was described in the March 17th issue. It proposed placing Dorion, Church, Allyn and Cawood in a municipality with Maniwald and that area. Lac Cayamant and Danford Lake are in this part of Pontiac and they would then be in a municipality which is mostly Gatineau. It proposed putting Aldfield, North Onslow, South Onslow and Ouyon in a municipality with Aylmer, Hull and so forth.

It then proposed making one municipality of the following: Aberdeen, Rapide des Joachims, Malakoff, Esher, Sheen, Chichester, Waltham and Bryson, Chapeau, Allumette

votes were not solicited by his committee. However, Al captured the interest and attention of many of the voting delegates by the questions and suggestions he presented during the brief business period.

Now that Pontiac has finally got its foot in the door of the ODHA after its first attempt to have representation, it is hoped that a convener will be named from here in the Minor Hockey division as it does not have the power to vote at the annual meeting.

Basil Quaille is the first Warden of Pontiac ever elected from Leslie-Clapham-Huddersfield. Pontiac has had a Member of the Legislative Assembly from there, who eventually became the Minister of Revenue for the Province of Quebec, but there was never a County Warden from Otter Lake until Basil Quaille succeeded William Burke to that office this year.

His first meeting was a special one, called to discover the wishes of all Mayors with regards the Provincial-Municipal Conference coming later this month.

Known as the County of Ottawa before 1855, Pontiac has been served by a total of 39 wardens, four of whom were present at this week's meeting: Basil Quaille, the present warden, William Burke, Mrs Elsie Gibbons and S Wyma MacKechnie, past Wardens, all of whom expressed their favorable opinions on the united stand being taken by Pontiac County Mayors at present.

Of the 30 Wardens who have served since 1847, four each were from Allumette Island, Clarendon, Litchfield, Onslow and Portage Du Fort, three each from Campbell's Bay, Chapeau, Chichester, two each from Bryson, Calumet Island and Ouyon, and one each from Bristol, Mansfield, Shawville and now Otter Lake.

Eight municipalities have as yet not had a County Warden. These are Wolf Lake, Danford Lake, Cayamant, Fort Coulonge, Sheenboro, Ladysmith and Waltham.

With a couple of French copies around to refer to and with the help of newspaper reports of the White Paper, the County Council met Monday to draw up a group opinion which would be motivated by sound judgment.

A great deal of time was taken up with making the decision to attend the conference in force. The possibility of sending one spokesman for the whole County was considered but it was then pointed out that it was to each municipality's advantage to be present and see for himself what is happening at this most important juncture in the municipal life of this area.

Also it was agreed that it would be advantageous for Pontiac County as a whole if it could be represented at this conference by 100% of its mayors.

Nineteen of the twenty five councils in Pontiac have already passed resolutions objecting to the White Paper. Several of those who haven't yet passed these resolutions will have done so after their May meetings. Perhaps the only Mayor

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## ONE VOICE

The special meeting of County Council this week did actually accomplish a great deal, though it may not have been apparent to all those present at the time.

Out of the meeting have come several facts of utmost importance to the whole County of Pontiac.

One is that the entire group is willing to place County solidarity before any other consideration and that they intend to state this fact before the Provincial-Municipal Conference in Quebec City later this month.

In the face of the recently discovered strong popular wish for Pontiac County to leave the Province of Quebec, we thought the Mayors at County Council might take steps or make enquiries in that direction. But with the pressure of the Provincial-Municipal Conference upon them, it was all they could do to organize themselves for this one event.

So they are organizing. And a preliminary letter to the Union of County Councils of Quebec, will clearly state the feelings of the Mayors which, in our belief also reflect fairly well the feelings of the people of Pontiac.

The request of Pontiac will be for special status within Quebec. The County letter to Quebec expresses our fears and alarm with regards to the recent abolition of our protected status by a mere action in the Quebec Legislature. It also objects to the repeated determination to establish French as the language of Quebec by legislation despite the fact

that Pontiac County is predominantly English speaking.

The letter going from Pontiac County to Quebec also flays the linguistic attitude of the various Departments of Government which indicates that no study has been made of our region, or if such a study has been made, that no consideration is given thereto.

It says that correspondence in French to the English speaking municipalities causes an inconvenience because translations are necessary of communications which are "often not too precise in the French text."

The conclusion of the letter, which will also be accompanied by resolutions from the individual Municipal Councils objecting to the plan which will result in the dissolution of Pontiac as it is today, is a strong statement of unity of people here.

Unless the Department of Municipal Affairs can advance an arrangement that can meet the needs of the whole area of Pontiac County democratically, recognize and respect our rights by communicating in our language, by accepting us as citizens and allowing us to continue to foster and retain that perfect relationship between French and English that exists in Pontiac today, and found in few places on this earth, it would be to our advantage to seek other areas of municipal partnership along the lines of our ethnic conditions. This is what our County Council has written to Quebec, with the backing of twenty five Mayors of Pontiac and the blessings of a very large percent of the population.

Anyone involved in public life in this community is aware of the gradual breakdown in communication. They can plainly see the handwriting on the wall. And they know in which language the words are written. Apparently there is an organized attempt to discredit English as a working language in Quebec unless, of course, the Government seeks tax money, license fees, etc.

The 97% who wish to live outside of this Province indicates: (a) They want to remain Canadian and not to be a part of a new Republic or State of Quebec. (b) They are suspicious of attempts to dis-member the County of Pontiac. (c) They have no faith in any provincial political parties to protect their language rights.

### THEY FACE REAL AND PRESENT DANGERS!

Over 150 years of continued social and economic progress built around an Anglo Saxon culture can be lost within one year. But let us hope and pray that Pontiac can remain in Canada and that its citizens can continue to enjoy the freedom of expressing themselves in their own traditional language. 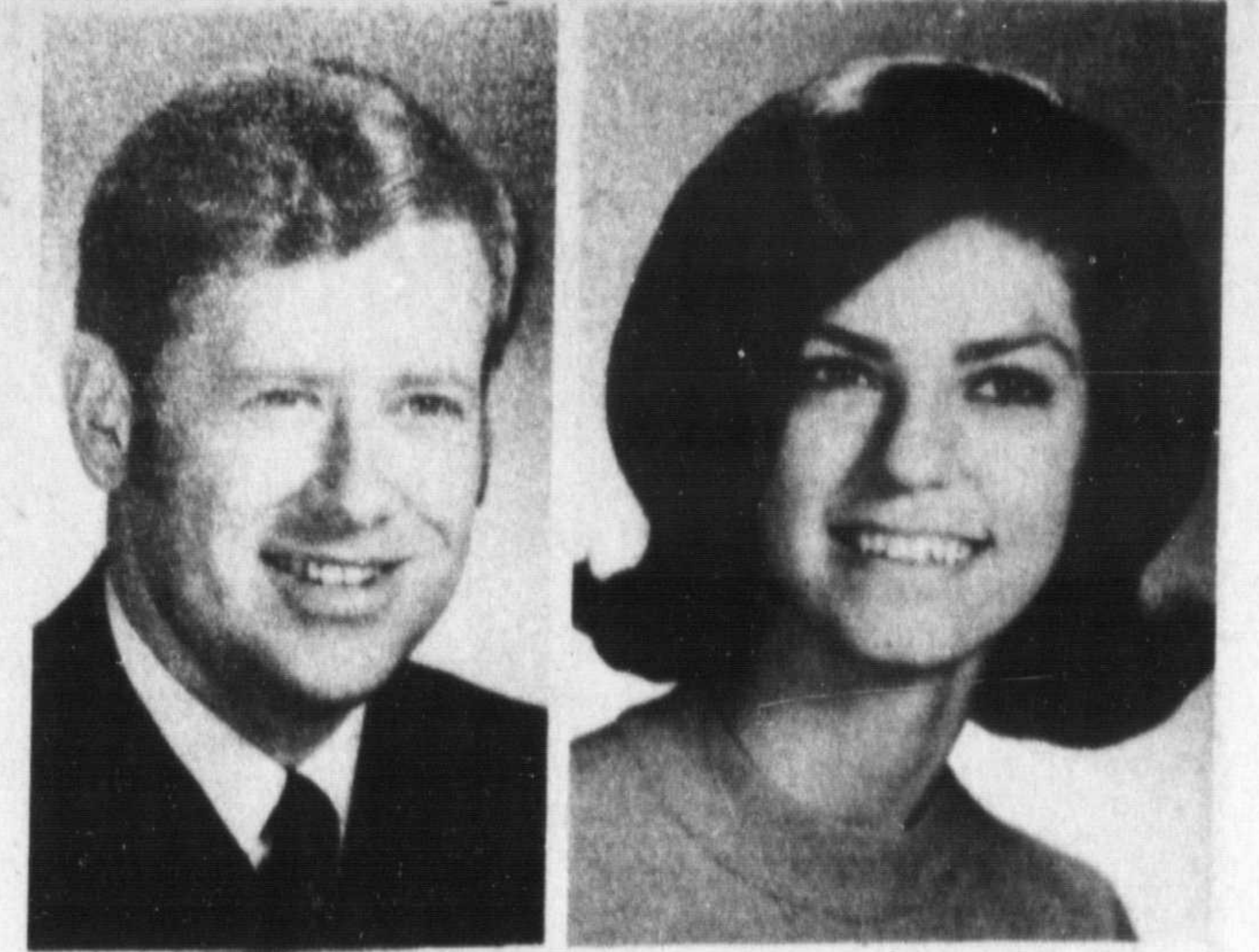
There is a deep need for certain equipment at the Pontiac Community Hospital and there is no money to purchase it.

## Teacher displays work

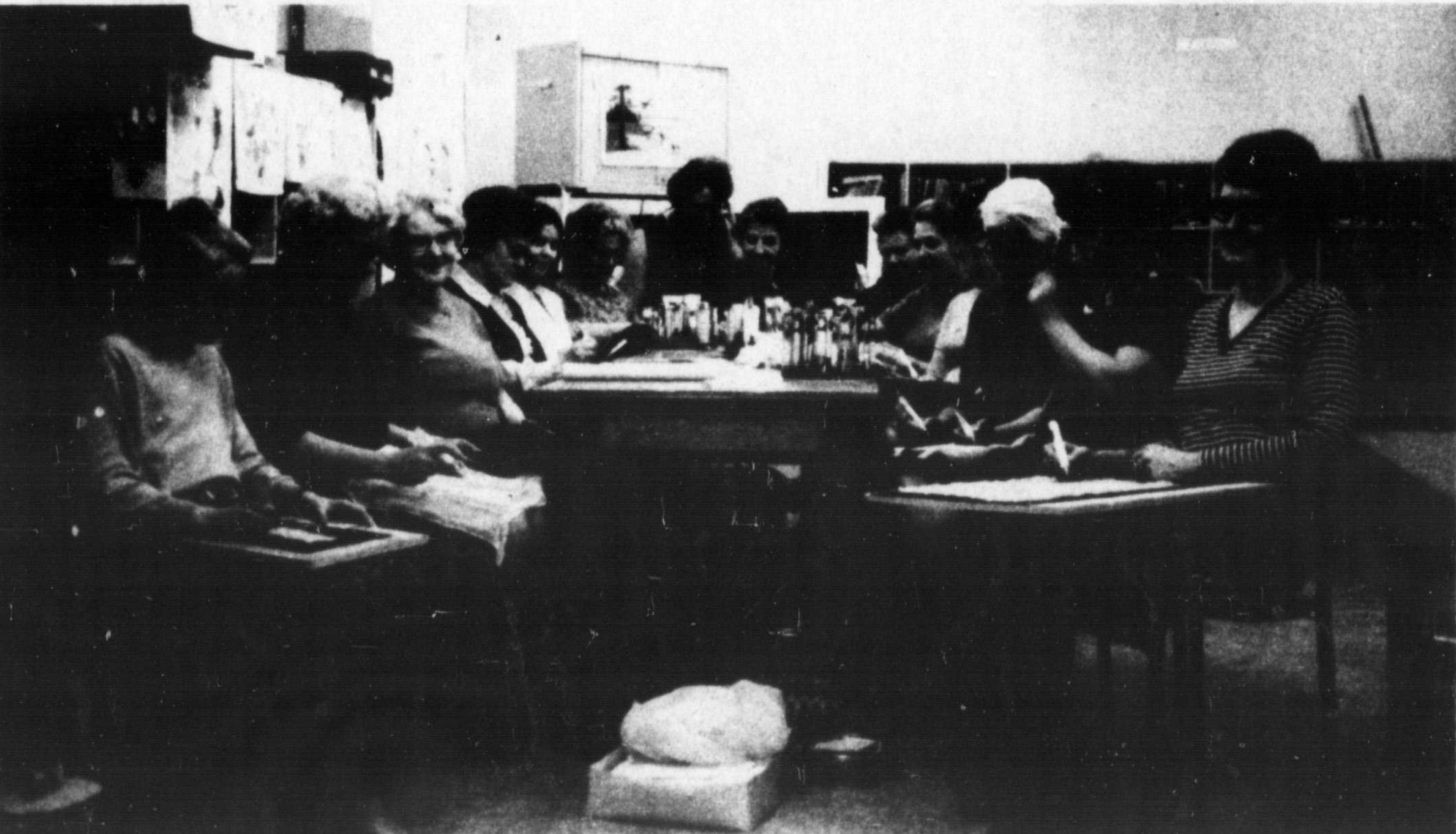

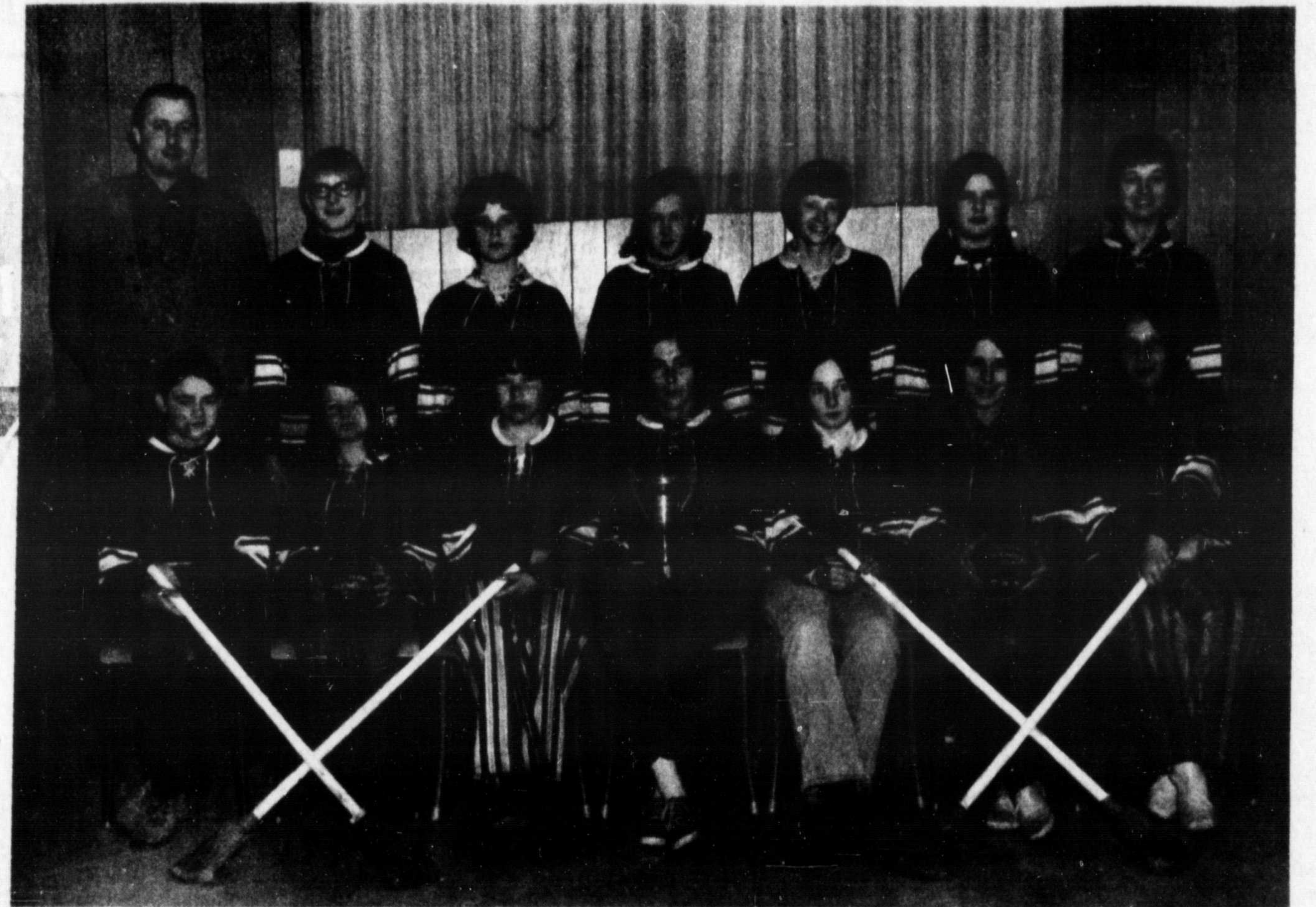

"Willing to donate my time if and when needed on any organizing."

"We would like Pontiac County to become a province by itself and we

would like to have Bible study in schools and encourage children to keep God's Day (Sunday) as the Bible teaches, then God will bless us and guide us."

"Almost anything is better than the way we are headed now."

"It's time for a change and the sooner the better... if we wait till the next provincial election we may not have another chance. I'm one of those that fed up with this situation and I'm going to give the Pontiac all the support I can."

"Anything except being part of Quebec."

"Would prefer Temiskaming with Pontiac if possible."

"Attempt to become a part of a new federal district which could be with the appropriate funds turned into one of the most beautiful areas of all of Canada."

"Rebuild No 8 Highway from Quyon to Ottawa. Commuter's bus service operating in business hours. Bridge across Ottawa River from Quyon to Fitzroy Harbour, Ontario. Clean up of old cars and scrap yards that line Number 8 highway."

"I strongly believe it is no longer a question of what we want but what we'll get if the people of Pontiac do not make known their needs. The majority is silent and therefore that is the problem."

"We have always liked Pontiac as it has been but if there has to be a change we would prefer Pontiac to join Ontario."

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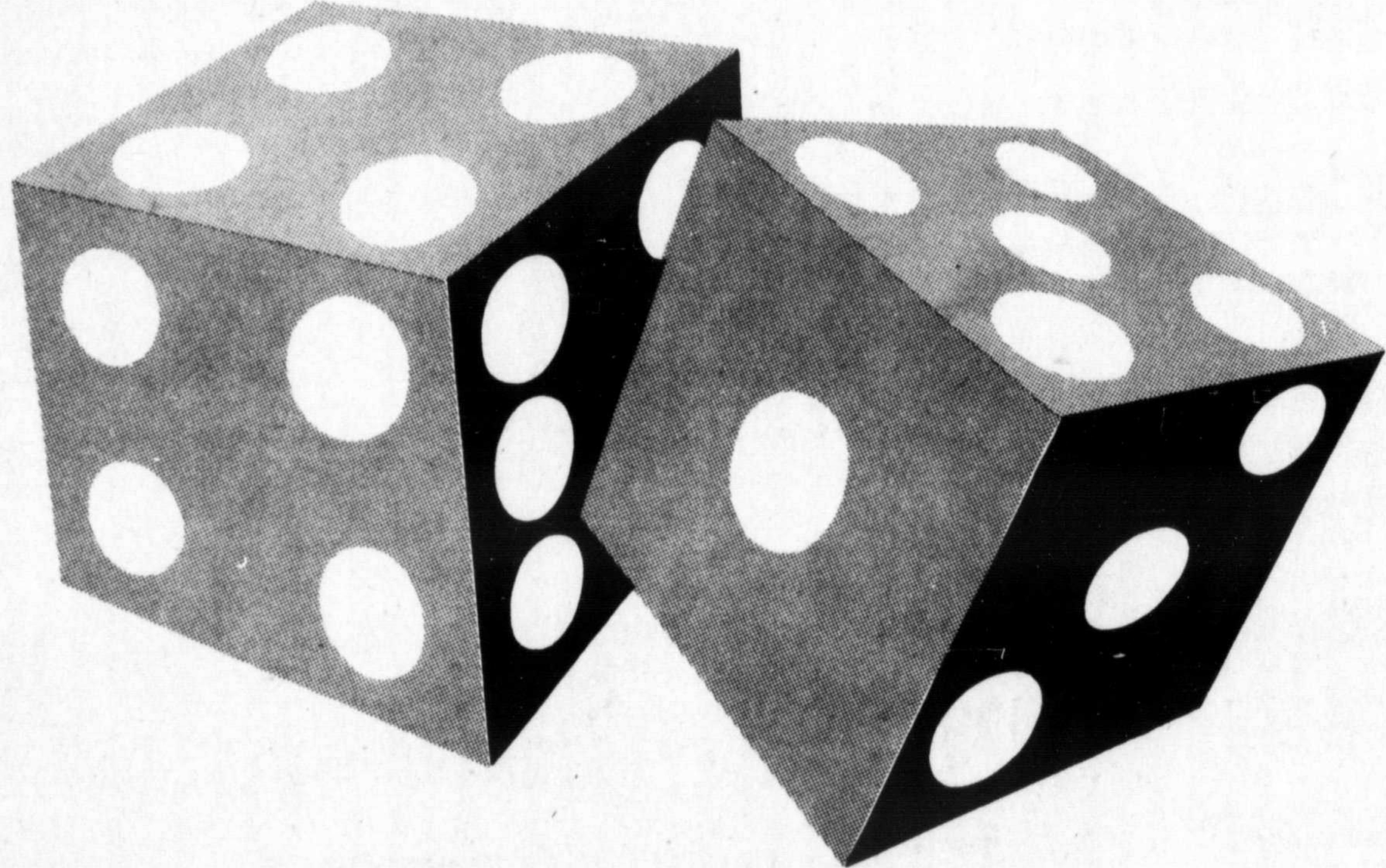
