PROVINCIAL PARLIAMENT.

LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL.

Toronto, Feb. 22, 1859.

The Speaker took the chair at 3 o'clock. Among the petitions presented was one by Col. Prince, from R. W. Crown, praying that an Act may be passed to relieve him from the effects of the late judgment of the Court of Queen's Bench, by which he had been rendered ineligible to hold any office under the Crown.

It was moved by the Hon. Col. Prince, seconded by the Hon. Mr. Simpson, that the second reading of the McLean Divorce Bill be taken to-morrow fortnight, when both parties may be heard by the learned Judge of the Court of Queen's Bench.

After the routine business, the Hon. Mr. Simpson, in reply to an inquiry by Col. Prince, stated that the question of placing the Indian Lands under the exclusive control of the Crown, and that Department had been some time under the consideration of the Legislature, and he hoped a definite decision would be arrived at and communicated to the Legislature during the present session.

The House then adjourned.

HOUSE OF ASSEMBLY.

Yesterday, when the voting for the day had closed, Mr. Rodier took his place on the balcony at the usual hour of 5 o'clock, and addressed the crowd below.
