STATUS OF IMPERIAL OFFICERS IN CANADA

Britain and Canada Should Recognize One Another's Commissions.

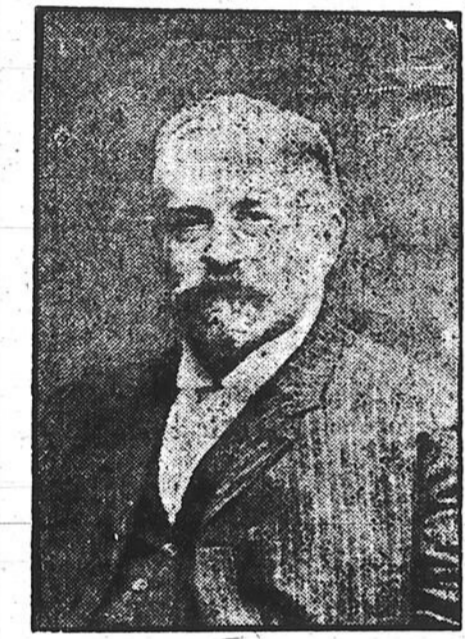
Ottawa, Ont., July 12.—(Special.)—Negotiations are proceeding between the Dominion Government and the Imperial authorities in regard to recognition of the status of imperial officers in Canada and that of Canadian officers in the United Kingdom. By a statute of last year the precedence which imperial officers in Canada used to enjoy was abolished. Now the War Office has asked that Canada should recognize the rank of imperial officers when on duty in Canada, which would oblige the necessity of giving these officers commissions in the militia during their stay here. There seems to be no objection to this, provided the Imperial authorities reciprocate when Canadian officers are on duty in Great Britain. As a matter of fact the movement has been started by Great Britain and Canada to have interchange of officers. The first step in this recognition will be the retention of a number of Imperial officers with the Canadian garrison at Halifax.

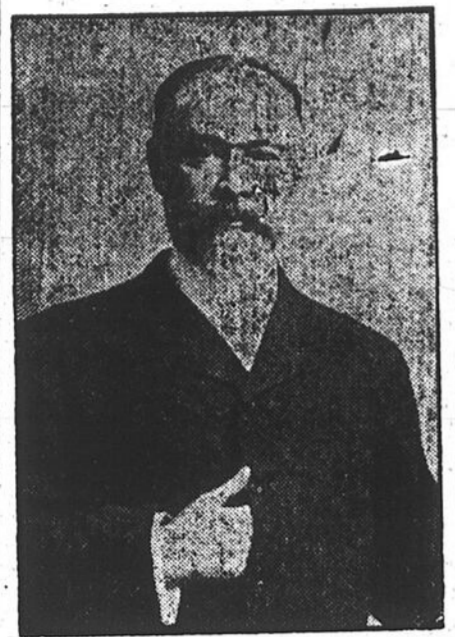

THE INTERNATIONAL WATERWAYS COMMISSION—Mr. Louis Coste, C.E., Port Colborne, Ont.

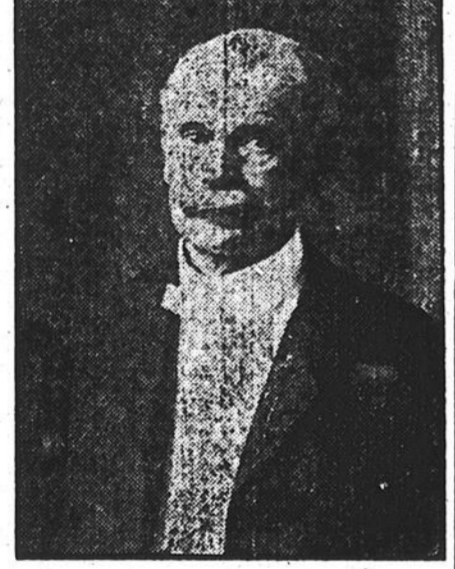
surdy untrue. He states there is no movement to expel the Grand Trunk from the passenger association, as it has not been a member of that association for many years; nor has it violated any agreement as alleged. The Grand Trunk declined to participate in the recent arbitration and gave due notice in advance of its reasons therefor, the justness of which has been fully recognized by the Erie and the latter line is now heartily cooperating with the Grand Trunk. It is further pointed out that lines operating through populous districts naturally can afford to maintain more and faster through trains than those comparatively sparsely settled districts. Differential fares were established many years ago by arbitration as a fair method of equalizing the unequal conditions as far as practicable. Notwithstanding this fact, the Vanderbilt lines have been trying an excessive proportion of the total business, and their efforts to increase this proportion by lower fares over the Michigan Central, one of their family, at the expense of their competitors, instead of fairly distributing what they now enjoy equitably as between their own lines, is the sole cause of the present difficulty.

THE FORESTRY CONVENTION.

BRITISH GUNS GOT KILDA'S CREW FREE

Russian Cruiser Dneiper Was Kidnapping Them From Port Said.

Marseilles, July 12.—It is stated that the Russian converted cruiser Dneiper, which arrived at Port Said, had the crew of the British steamer St. Kilda, which the Dneiper had sunk. The British complained to their consul that the captain of the Dneiper was determined to take them to Russia. The consul, accompanied by the commanders of the British cruisers Lancaster and Suffolk, boarded the Dneiper, and requested that the British subjects on board be liberated. The captain of the Dneiper rudely refused the request, whereupon the consul informed him that if they were not released within an hour, special measures would be taken. The consul and the officers accompanying him then left the Russian warship. Immediately after, the Lancaster raised anchor and swung round, ready to approach the Dneiper. This hint was sufficient for the Russian captain, who instantly sent the St. Kilda's crew ashore. They were brought here on a P. & O. liner.

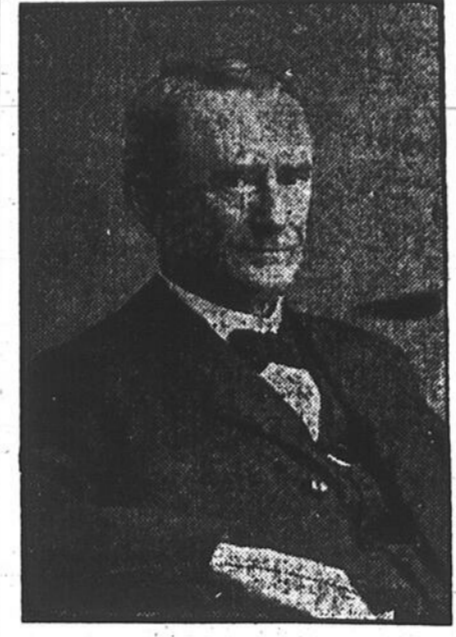

PRIVATE FISHING BOAT SEIZED AT VANCOUVER. Had No Papers, No Crew List and No Port—Seizure Likely to Check American Poaching for Time.

Yancouver, B.C., July 12.—(Special.)—Dominion Government's fisheries protection boat Kestrel, came in yesterday towing the Seattle schooner North, over which floated the blue ensign, signifying that the vessel was a British Kestrel, while planting oysters and lobsters on the west coast of Vancouver Island, saw the schooner well into the straits of Juan de Fuca, into Sano Sound. Her four dories were out poaching halibut.

The schooner, which has an auxiliary engine, at once took to flight. Captain Newcombe, gathering in two of the dories, while she picked up the others, signalled her to stop. The boat was within three miles of the coast, carried by the Government steamer, and she did not need any second bidding. Captain Newcombe immediately ordered her on board, took her in tow and brought her here.

When examined she proved to be a veritable pirate, having no papers and no crew list, and apparently not belonging to any port. She is a new boat and but six days out on her first trip. She carries ten men who are now close prisoners, her hold when taken. Cargo and vessel are owned by John Strand, of Seattle, Washington.

This seizure is likely to check poaching of American schooners on Canadian halibut banks, of which there have been many complaints during the last year or two.

SHUVALOFF DIED FOR A SUSPECT'S ARREST. Apparently There is Little Political Significance in Murder.

St. Petersburg, July 12.—The murder of Prefect of Police Shuvaloff, of Moscow, who yesterday was assassinated while receiving petitions, according to the latest information, was inspired by motives of vengeance on the part of the assassin, who held at Count Shuvaloff's door the responsibility for his recent arrest, though there is absolutely no evidence that the prefect personally had any connivance in the murder.

London, July 12.—The St. Petersburg correspondent of the Standard pays tributes of esteem and respect to Count Shuvaloff, who, when he was governor of Odessa, was exceedingly upright, conscientious and painstaking. The correspondent says that his charming manner and amiable disposition made him an ideal governor, that was altogether distinct from the type of the conventional Russian bureaucrat.

On the other hand, the St. Petersburg correspondent of the Telegraph paints a somewhat different picture. He says that Count Shuvaloff was one of the czar's few close confidantes. He was distinguished by his courtly manners, his aristocratic bearing and his devotion to the czar, who received him often, and trusted him implicitly.

The St. Petersburg correspondent of the Times says the assassination of Count Shuvaloff creates a surprise. It is one more evidence that government by the police will never pacify the country. The whole Russian press, with the exception of a few organs devoted to the bureaucracy, dism this obvious truth daily into the ears of the Government.

The amendment was to the effect that after January 1 of the present year any new debt contracted for administration purposes except for the financial statement before the meeting should be paid by means of a special tax to be imposed on St. Henri Ward alone, in addition to the ordinary tax on property. 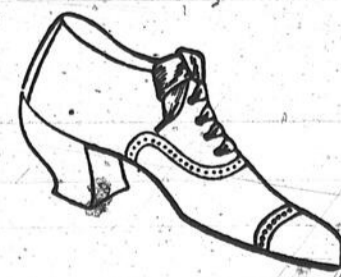
