Monsignor Barry speaks to Clarendon Ministerial Association about work of Vatican Council

The Clarendon and District Ministerial Association held its monthly meeting at St. John's Rectory, Quyon, with the President, the Rev. V. O'Brien, in the chair.

The Rt Rev Mgr Barry, Secretary to Bishop W. Smith, D.D., of Pembroke, addressed the members on the way the Church is facing the problems of the world, through the work of the Vatican Council, convened in St. Peter's Basilica, Rome, by Pope John XXIII and his successor, Pope Paul VI. He described the organization and planning behind the sessions by several Commissions of the Church.

The changes of the Liturgy brought about the administration of the Sacraments in the vernacular. These white new, were being accepted and participated in by more of the laity.

The Mgr. spoke also of the restoration of a permanent diaconate; especially in the missionary areas of the world.

Several reports on education were presented by committee convenors. This included one on the Regional System, A Conference on Religious Education for Retarded Children on April 22nd in Montreal was also mentioned.

Bryson wants a bank and a doctor's office

The paper mill to be erected by Consolidated Paper Corporation will be only two and a half miles from Bryson which is situated in the center of four Municipalities with a total population of over four thousand who must depend on either Shawville or Fort Coulonge for their medical needs. Twenty-six hundred of these must travel to Shawville or Campbell's Bay for their banking needs.

Bryson enjoys one of the lowest tax rates in the County and one of the most up to date water systems in the area. With these

advantages the local Council believes a bank and doctor's residence will be established in the village in the very near future.

At a special council meeting held in the municipal hall on March 1st, council voted unanimously to grant a two year tax exemption to anyone erecting a home or establishing a business in the village. The Corporation owns sixty lots which will be sold for five dollars per lot. Purchasers must build on these lots within one year or lot reverts back to the Municipality.

Social Service

Retarded Children

Last week, we discussed about the Child Care Department. Today, we will again talk about children services, but with a different approach; we want to explain our services in regard with mentally retarded children.

Mental retardation has many degrees and aspects, but its effects are very important. Many children suffer from little retardation: they have trouble to follow the normal classes, and, often, it results in doubling school years.

Others are more affected: they might go to school for years, without making any progress. This group is causing a lot of problems to school teachers: they are a cause of disturbance, and are often responsible of a loss of time for a whole class.

What to do with them? Just send them back home? Maybe, but what will they do later? Here comes the utility of a

Psycho-Social Clinic. At our clinic, we have psychologists, social workers, and a psychiatrist. The children referred to the clinic are submitted to various tests specially designed to determine the intellectual capacity (I.Q. of an individual).

These tests tell to what extent a child is retarded, to what group he belongs. If he is only lightly retarded, then he can be educated if he is placed in a proper climate. Such children are unable to follow normal school programs, but they can have some schooling, if they are in a special class.

For the area, such special classes are being developed, in cooperation, by the Ottawa Valley Regional School Board and the Hull Association for retarded children.

Another group consists of more affected children. Schooling as such is impossible. These children are only trainable. Still, they can be taught a trade and access to a certain independence. When they grow up as adults, they might be able to look after themselves.

Finally, there is a third group where mental resources are so weak that nothing can be done.

The clinic evaluates the child stating how serious the problem can be and indicating where stands the best solution, that is: to what group belongs the child, and what can be done to help him most properly.

Great local interest in Western Quebec PTA

Celebration of the 10th anniversary of English-speaking Catholic Parent-Teachers Association for the Western Quebec area in Aylmer on March 28th brought forward the urgent need for retaining in this area of facilities for training and increasing the qualifications of English-speaking teachers. President Harry McClory and Chairman of the resolutions committee, Bernie Amsden, paid tribute to the fine work being done by St. Mary's Teachers' College at Chapeau — but pointed out that under the recommendations of the Parent Report, the training of teachers, particularly for the secondary level and beyond, must be closely linked with a university, whether of limited charter or otherwise. The Outaouais Regional School Board has requested the early establishment of a university "centre" in this area, and all delegates seemed to be in firm agreement that there should be no difficulty in having an English-language affiliate attached. Aylmer, Hull and Deschenes sponsored this recommendation.

A further resolution asked that the Quebec Department of Education provide special consideration for this area regarding teacher qualifications

and salary schedules in view of the fact that most of the teachers are coming from the Ontario system where salaries are generally higher.

Other resolutions included one asking for training in the French language commencing at Grade 1, a request that kindergarten classes be made available by September 1965, an approved list and source of supply of school text books, physical training for all children under a qualified teacher, a basic curriculum so that interprovincial transfers will not work a hardship on the children now being taught in Quebec, provision of a summer course to enable teachers to increase their certification.

Two allied resolutions dealing with the teaching of religion in the schools were tabled for further study when informed that the present religious courses were undergoing intensive study at the provincial curriculum conferences in Quebec and that there might be some drastic changes in 1965-1966.

Mr. McClory said the Western Quebec PTA Association was the father of the provincial association and the largest, in the province.

12 units representing 900 members are active, with two new groups being formed at Camp-

"... A little common-sense and a lot of goodwill can still produce some very far-reaching effects ..." he said, and asked PTA members not to relax in their efforts to push for educational reforms where they felt they were still needed, and to support the organizations, such as regional school commissions, that were trying to further the work of bringing a good, up-to-date education to the doorstep (or bus-stop) of every child.

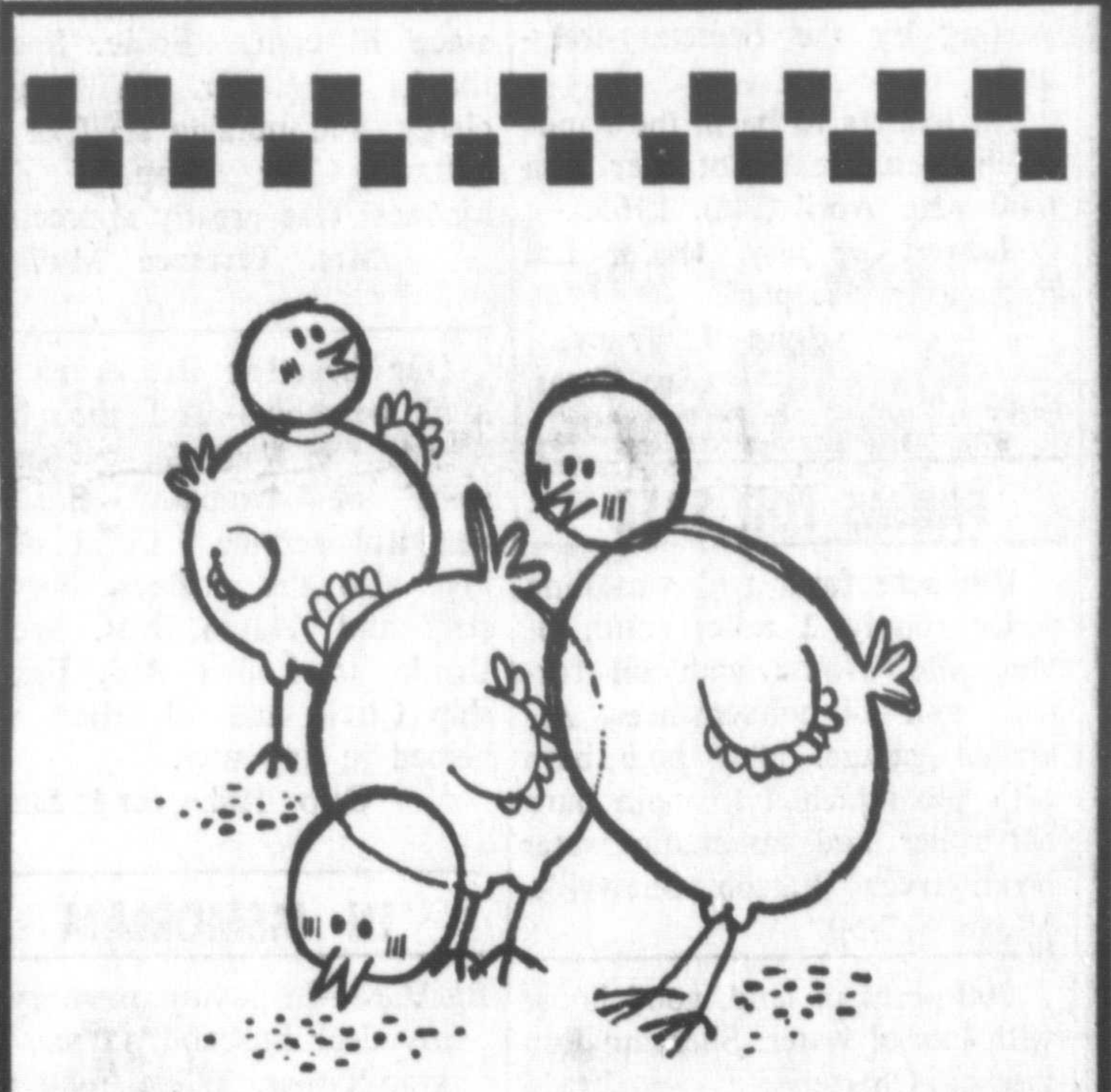

Quebec, March 18, 1965—A geological report on the Mount Logan area, Gaspé peninsula, has been released for publication by the Department of Natural Resources of the Province at Quebec. The area described is 220 square miles in extent, and is some 40 miles southwest of the town of Matane. It is largely in Matane county, with a few square miles in the extreme northeast lying in Gaspé-North county. The report was prepared by C. R. Mattinson for the Geological Exploration Service of the Department.

The area, which forms part of the Appalachian mountains, is traversed by the Shickshock range with bordering lowlands to the north and south. The Shickshocks form the most extensive range of high ground in the peninsula and are of considerable interest to students of geology and of geography. They are composed of highly deformed sedimentary and volcanic rocks and are bordered on the north and south by sedimentary rocks. Copper mineralization is widely scattered through the area.

Copies of the report (G.R. 118), along with the accompanying colored geological map at the scale of 1 mile to 1 inch, can be obtained, for \$1.00 a copy, from the Department of Natural Resources in Quebec City and from its regional offices in the Province.

Country Notes

By Walker Riley,

Macdonald College, Agricultural Extension

If Quebec's twenty-one thousand maple syrup producers want greater returns for their product, they must do it by cutting costs and not by increasing prices.

This is the view of J. O. Vaillancourt, vice-president of Quebec's largest maple co-operative, the six thousand member Producteur de Sirop d'Erable at Levis, Quebec.

Speaking at the Maple Day at Macdonald College, Mr. Vaillancourt said, "A man said that we should try to get a higher price for maple syrup. We tried. But when you are selling you have customers, and then people have to be ready to pay a higher price. Personally, I feel we have reached a good level. We should first try to stabilize that price, and second try to give better means to our producers to produce at a cheaper price. This is the only way to make money."

"Following our own experience, when we were able to sell maple syrup at 59 cents a bottle in the store, we sold lots. But as soon as the price reached 63 to 65 cents, the sales decreased very rapidly."

Fifty per cent of the province's \$10,000,000 maple harvest goes to the United States. Another one per cent goes to Australia, Denmark, France, Sweden and the United Kingdom. The rest is used at home. Mr. Vaillancourt feels that we can and should develop the overseas market and the home market. "We depend too much on the United States for an outlet right now, he said.

This co-op is already doing more than perhaps any other firm to develop these overseas markets for maple products. With the assistance of the Department of Trade and Commerce, it took part in at least four European trade fairs last year. At the present time there is one in London, England. Mr.

Vaillancourt reported that they were sold out in the first few days; and had to send more maple products over by air to keep the display going.

So the Europeans obviously like our maple syrup. The market possibilities appear excellent. It is one distinctively Canadian product, for which we do not need to fear competition or surplus.

In my report two weeks ago on Maple Day, I quoted figures on sap flow comparing pipelines with buckets. Dan MacArthur in Woodlot Management tells me that the picture is not at all clear. Different studies have given different results.

Here at the College, our results give evidence but not proof that properly installed plastic tubing gives yields at least as good as buckets and spouts.

Regarding top-hole sterilants (PFA and Chlorodex), these did not appear to make any difference in our operation in 1964. Other operators have reported significant increases. While the use of these materials is not illegal providing minimum standards are met, the Quebec Department of Agriculture is

discouraging their use for fear of unfavorable reaction in the market.

★

Several new bulletins are available through the College's Extension Service. There is an excellent five-part one from the Canada Department of Agriculture on "Growing Strawberries", and for apple growers, "New Early Apple Varieties". This year's provincial herbicide recommendations for all field and vegetable crops are ready in the form of a wall chart. For those interested in corn, Philippe Granger, the farm manager at the Ste. Hyacinthe school, is co-author of a very good new bulletin, "Le Mais-grain", publication No. 312. I am hoping that it will soon be translated.

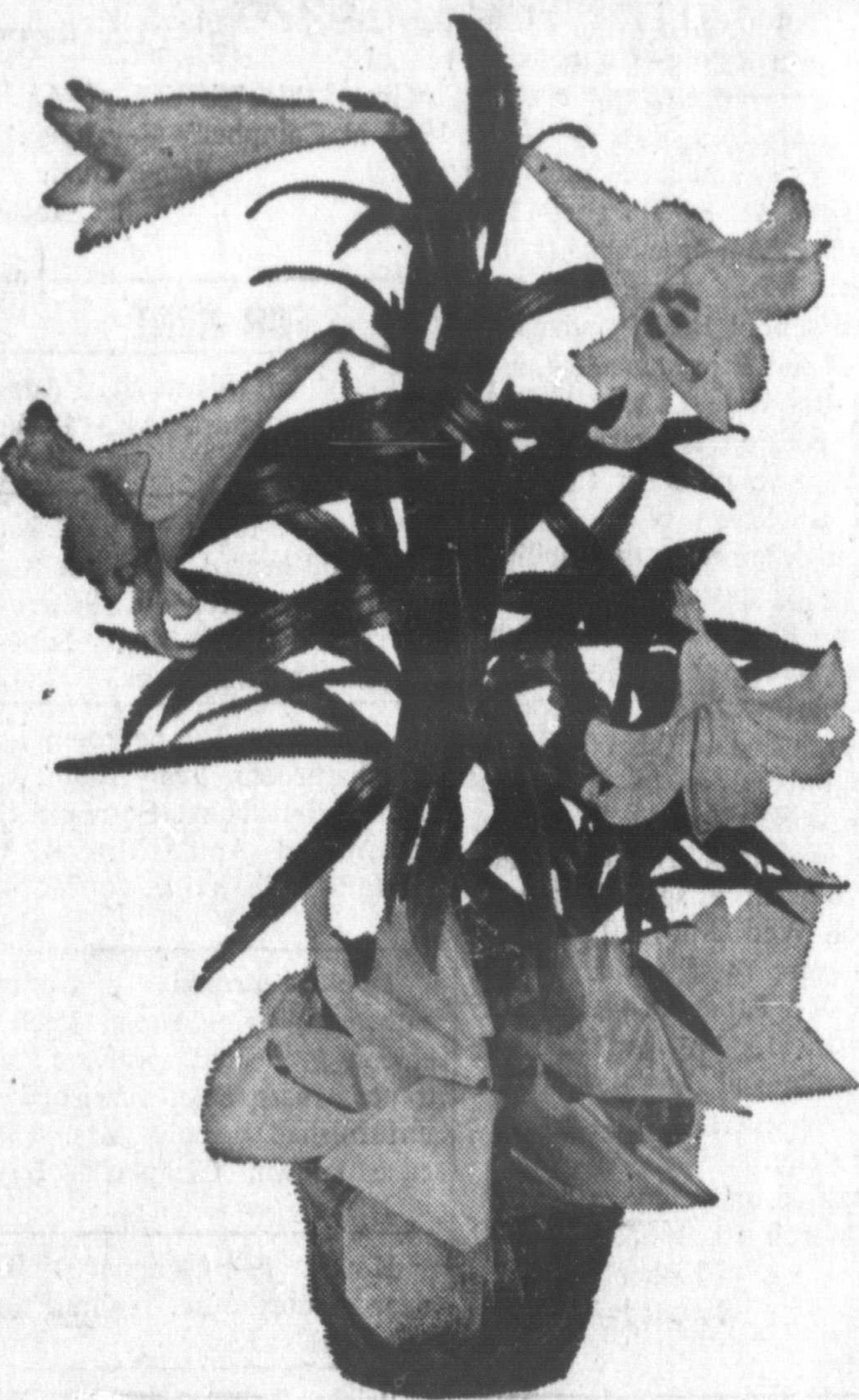
