Fire At Tanner's

Fire of unknown origin, completely destroyed a garage and warehouse building belonging to Victor Tanner of Shawville, on Wednesday night April 24.

Discovered about 10:30 p.m. the Shawville Firemen fought a losing battle as several drums of oil and cases of small cans of oil exploded and added more danger to the fire. They did however save the Cement Block Manufacturing Plant, which was just a scant 25 feet west of the garage, as well as the new office across the road from the burning building. Flames were quite visible from the Ontario side of the Ottawa River.

Destroyed within were about 450 bags of cement, just recently placed there, a 1960 Model 3 ton truck, which Mr. Tanner used for distributing his White Rose gasoline and oil, several barrels of oil as well as cases of it, and a quantity of new car and truck tires. Another 3 ton truck, used for the delivery of cement blocks which was parked close to the side of the building, was also badly burned. Loss is estimated at about \$15,000, partially covered by insurance.

Mr. Tanner took over the agency as White Rose Farm Fuel Oil Distributing agent for Pontiac late in 1962, and this fire took place on the eve of a 2-day

2.5 Percent Of Ballots Rejected

Martineau Wins by One Vote As Denzil Moodie Breaks Tie

421 electors in this riding lost their votes last week as Judge St. Marie ruled against that number of ballots in the judicial recount at Campbell's Bay. The rejected ballots were examined by a battery of lawyers representing both Paul Martineau and Paul Goulet. Reason for rejection was in every case failure to conform with the rules for voting as posted in every poll.

The one man in Canada who didn't get a secret ballot in the recent election is J. Denzil Moodie. Locally we do not believe the widely circulated story that he left the decision to the toss of a coin for the simple reason that he proclaimed his vote before even glancing at where the coin fell.

Then the swing to Martineau began as the Temiscamingue boxes were opened and the swing continued until Thursday when the game was over and the count stood tied. "The eyes and the ears of the world" turned to Denzil, who by law as the returning officer was required to break the tie.

So he did by process verbal, proclaiming the Honourable Paul Martineau as our Member of Parliament for the next session of Parliament which convenes May 16th.

A VOTE FOR EVERYONE — OR NOT

The recent experience in Pontiac-Temisamingue where over four hundred people were unable to mark their ballots in accordance with the law brings us to a crossroad.

Either we wish things to remain as they are with about three ballots out of every poll being rejected or we should press the government to so change the electoral rules that everyone could understand them.

In the first case there may be a good argument for rejecting ballots of people unable to follow the simple directions. One might say that if a person hasn't enough brains to put an X after a name he shouldn't be allowed to take part in an election anyway.

Some people put two x's after their choice. Some people made their X sideways which looked more like a plus sign. Some just put in a check mark and all these were rejected in the judicial recount although in many cases the deputy returning officer had allowed them.

A wiggly line with another across it doesn't qualify and neither does a properly marked ballot which has any other mark on it. It seems possible that one wouldn't have to be stupid to make some of these mistakes; one might be elderly and feeble or hurried.

Then there have been some very smart people who have had their ballots rejected because they used a pencil or pen other than that provided in the election booth. Nothing but a firm X mark standing alone after one name made with the soft pencil provided is considered legal and 39 out of every 40 voters in our riding were able to follow those directions. These are the ones whose votes counted.

If on the other hand we wish everyone to have a vote even if they aren't quite bright enough to read and follow directions, we've got to have the laws simplified.

A method used in Belgium has been suggested where beside each candidate's name is a black square with one little white spot in it. All the voter has to do is blacken the white spot. This has been thought to be simpler than writing an X. We're not entirely convinced but one thing is clear and that is that we should seek out a better way than the one we have if we want everyone's vote to count.

'Rogues Harbour'

Below is an extract from a book written by J. L. Gourlay A.M. in 1896 "History of the Ottawa Valley".

Thought it might be of some interest to your readers.

The Quion Village was not formed early and was small until after the building of the "Chats Ship Canal". The line of settlement went on merely as a line, not spreading out till long afterwards, so that as the land pleased them they sat down beside one another on both sides of the line rather than go back from it.

The line was prolonged with settlers into Bristol, which was chiefly taken up by Scotchmen. Prominent among these was Mr. Wm. King, educated for the law, he, however, did not take to it, but with a widowed sister, Mrs. Laird, and her two children, Mr. James Laird and Miss Laird, a very superior young woman, came and built a mill on a creek nearly mid-way westward in Bristol.

Being a scientific man and well trained he was of much service to the new settlement and the Presbyterian congregation, giving a healthy tone to both. The land being good the settlers came in from Beckwith and Ramsey filling up in a few years. But the line of road was continued into Clarendon, lumbering preceeding occupation of lands, and the road being at first that cut to reach the shanty to get in provisions for work, the timber roads crossing this as they led from the groves to the river or the creeks that could float it to the Ottawa River.

Clarendon became a great attraction with its thick covering of white pine on its level good lands, and as the laws had not got above the Long Sault they could as in Israel when they had no King, do what was right in their own eyes. Multitudes were driven into it, not so much from persecution as to enjoy immunity from the incessant annoyance and torture of creditors, whose polite duns became very irritating. There were fellows so vicious among these creditors as to nickname the happy retreat of these escaped victims "Rogues Harbour". In spite of all these drawbacks the place was not only popular but became populous, so that Clarendon Centre soon became a village.

Mr. Shaw kept store in the place and gave it his name, and it is now Shawville, through which runs the Chapleau and Church Railway.

Still further west Scotchmen flocked from Ramsay, and other parts of the County of Lanark to Letchfield filling it with enterprising farmers, many of whom lumbered and built beautiful houses and made fine farms, raising good stock of various kinds.

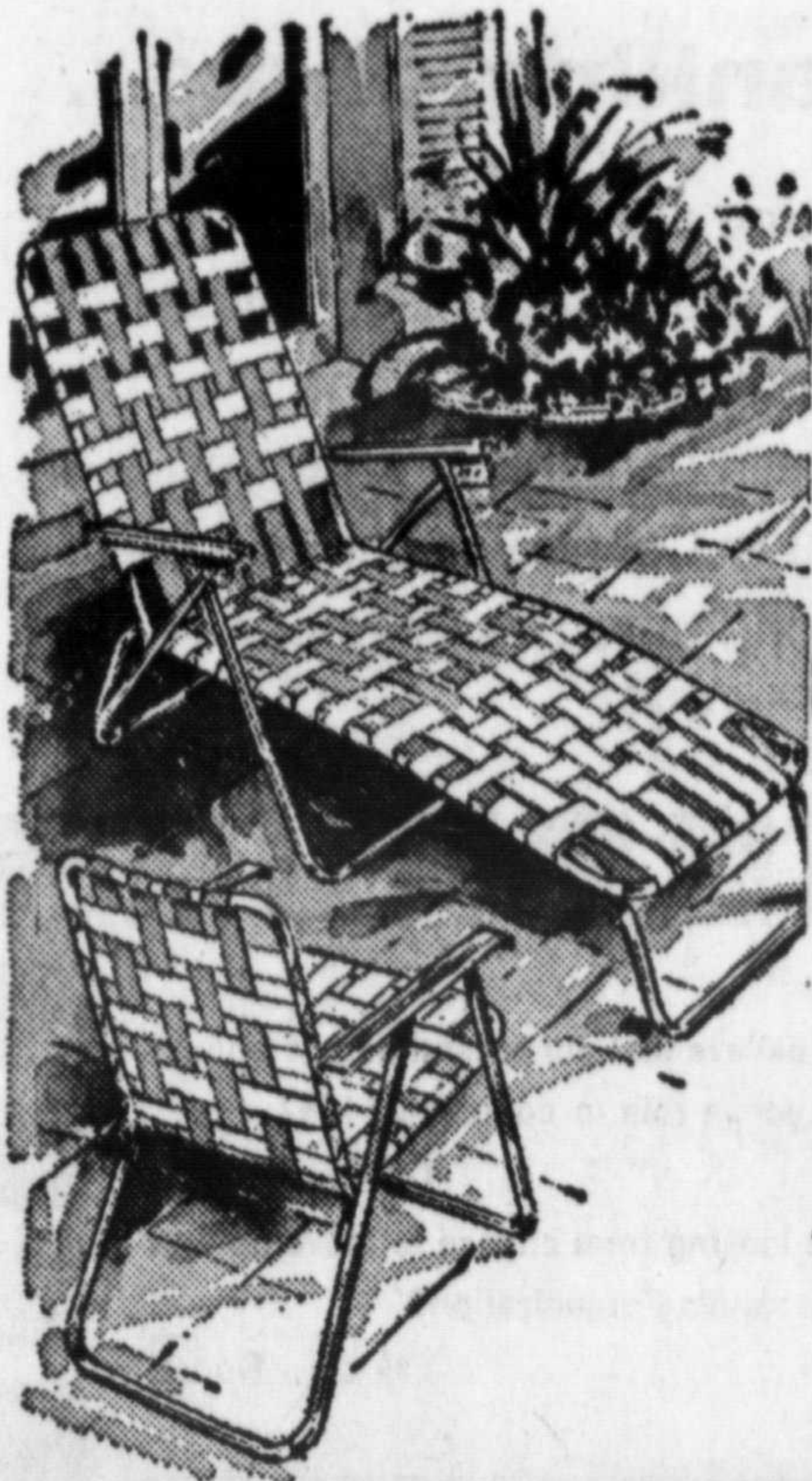

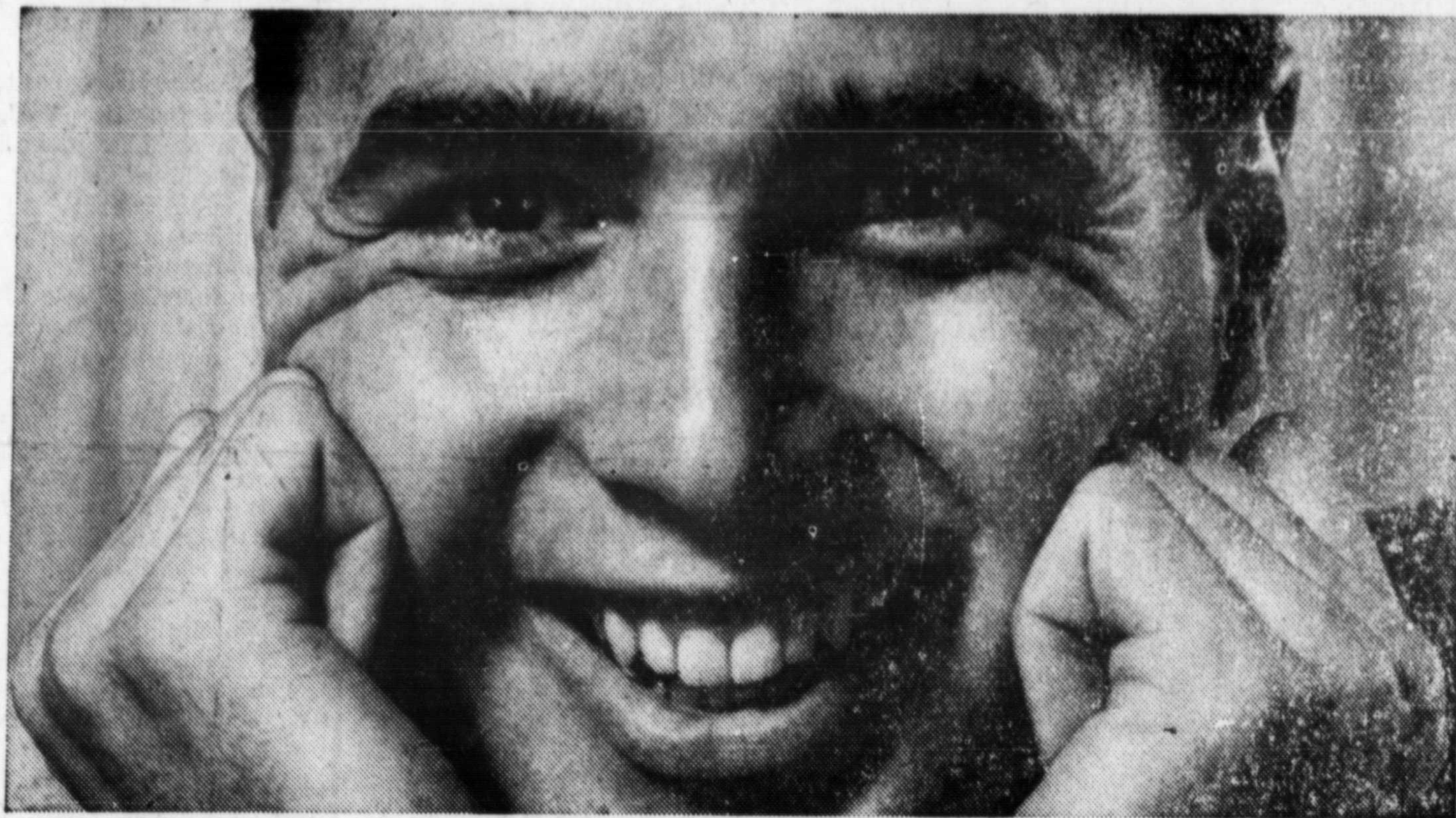

Wind Fans Fire At Norway Bay

Fire, fanned by 40 mile an hour winds, destroyed three cabins and Wayside Inn at the Norway Bay summer resort on Monday night, April 29. Owned by Mrs. George Herman, who has been in the Ottawa Civic Hospital for several months, the cabins were used only for sleeping, and the Wayside Inn, also known as the Tea Room, was used to accommodate the guests at mealtime. The buildings were all of frame and wood construction, the large one being about 35 feet square. The dining room seated about 30 guests and there were 10 bedrooms. But for the past few years, the Inn has not been used for this purpose, but has been rented during the summer months to a family in the Ottawa district. Contents of the buildings were destroyed.

Five other cabins were not damaged, but another suffered scorching on the side facing the Inn. The store, a well known spot to many people, did not suffer damage either.

For the past few years Mrs. Herman has been accommodating her summer guests at Burnham Hall, across the road from the store, Inn and cabins establishment.

Cleaning up was reported to have been done on the first of the week by members of the Herman family, and although they

believed it to be safely extinguished, the wind which flared up later in the evening, probably fanned a small ember to life. However it may have been caused, it was discovered around 10 p. m. and spread quickly in the pine needles, engulfing the three cabins and the Inn. Flaming debris was blown to the top of a 25 foot sand embankment at the rear of the Inn where firemen from Shawville and Hilton Mines managed to check a number of jump fires. A progressive jump fire was halted as far north as the Anglican cemetery, which is located north of the road between this and a larger cemetery.

Huge Norway pines took fire on top just like lighted match heads, and even though firemen fought a tough battle with them the other cottages seemed to escape because the fire had chosen this way to travel.

After a news flash on CFRA a lot of uneasy folks who had cottages in the Bay, drove hastily from Arnprior, Ottawa and other points over treacherous slippery roads as the rain began just about the time the alarm was sent out. Firemen gained control of the fire about 12:30 a.m. Community effort also did its share in halting the flames.

At this time it is not possible to get an accurate account of the total damage.

The chairman's report on the Ade Home was that everything there is in excellent shape. He also said that the bills for work done there have been turned in and the money should be forthcoming soon. He had special words of commendation for local businessmen who had faith in the hospital and continue to provide goods and services regardless of slow payment of accounts.

He said that repairs are going satisfactorily at the hospital.

Mrs. McDougal's report included her highest praise for Miss Lee Ann Smith and Pierre Bilodeau for their work in the laboratory and the X-ray room respectively.

Mrs. Maitland's report from the Ade Home was equally interesting. She said it was filled to capacity of 14 beds with a waiting list of six. The patients are chronic and convalescent, aged 55 to 95. There have been 28 admissions, 14 discharges, 4 deaths since the Home opened.

The Early History of Pontiac Families

from the files of Rev. Jos. E. Gravelle
THE EADES FAMILY

One of the early families that came from Ireland to find a new life in Clarendon, originated in Parsontown, King County. We know of two brothers, John and Joseph. The former came out as a young married man in the early 1830s and raised all his children here. The latter Joseph, died in Ireland, where all his children were born, but his children followed their uncle John to this country.

It is not known which of these two brothers was the elder, John the farmer or Joseph the blacksmith, but it is thought, from the ages of their children and from the fact that he was the first to venture across the ocean, that it was John, born in the year 1798 in Parsontown.

John, who married Ann Gunning, born in 1813, also in Ireland had eight children as we said all born in Canada, while Joseph, who married Louisa Coughlin in Ireland, had at least five children, four of whom came to Canada.

John's family was related to the Wilsons, the Findlays, the McLarens, the McTiernans and a branch of the Prendergasts, while Joseph's family was related to the Browns, Ralphs, another branch of the Prendergasts and to the Connellys.

As these two brothers are the only EADES that we have recorded as coming to Clarendon, all those, whose fathers or mothers bore that name, should try to trace back to one of these. Here is the information we have been able to gather, for which credit is due to Geo. W. Eades of Carleton Place for his untiring efforts in this regard.

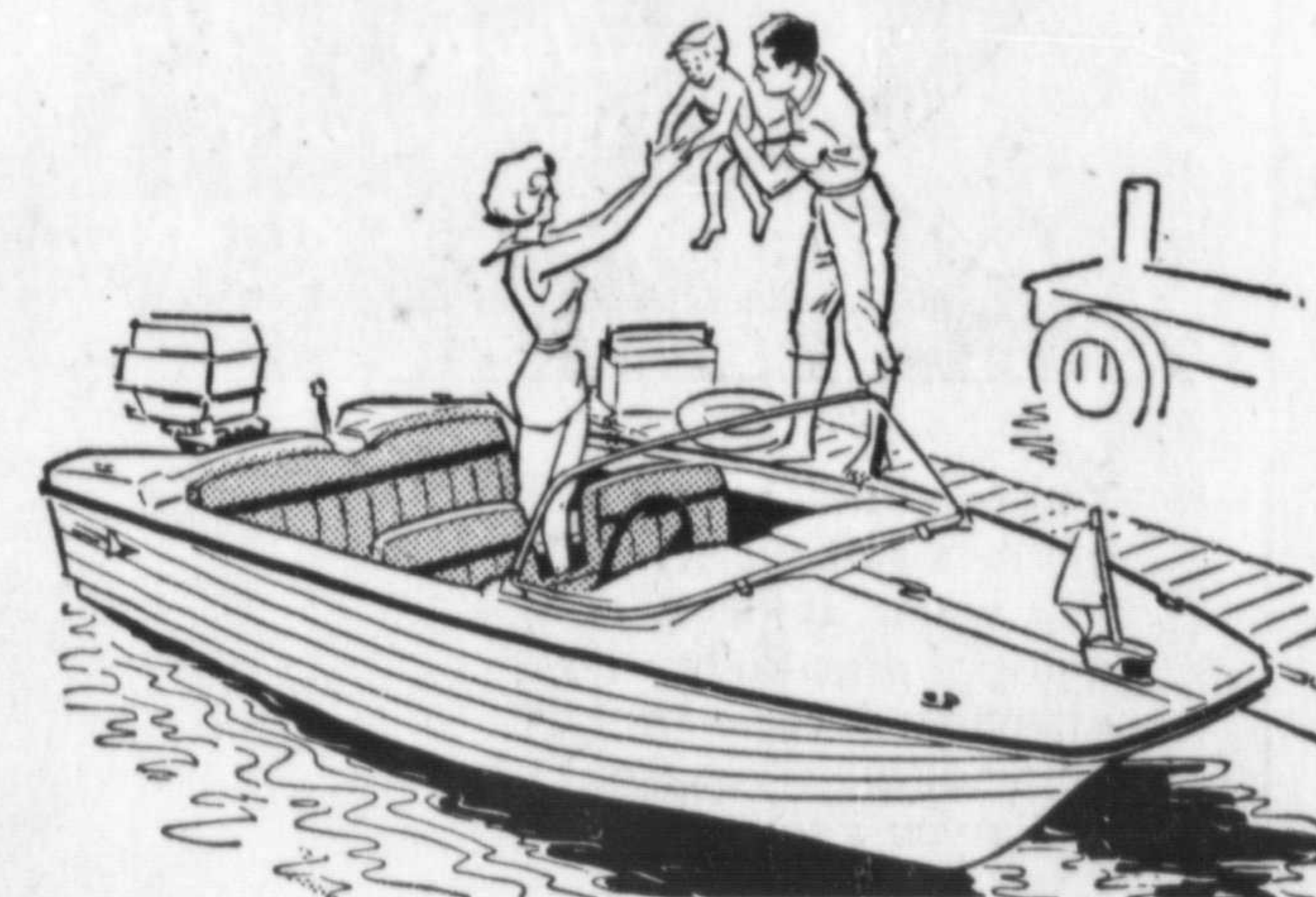
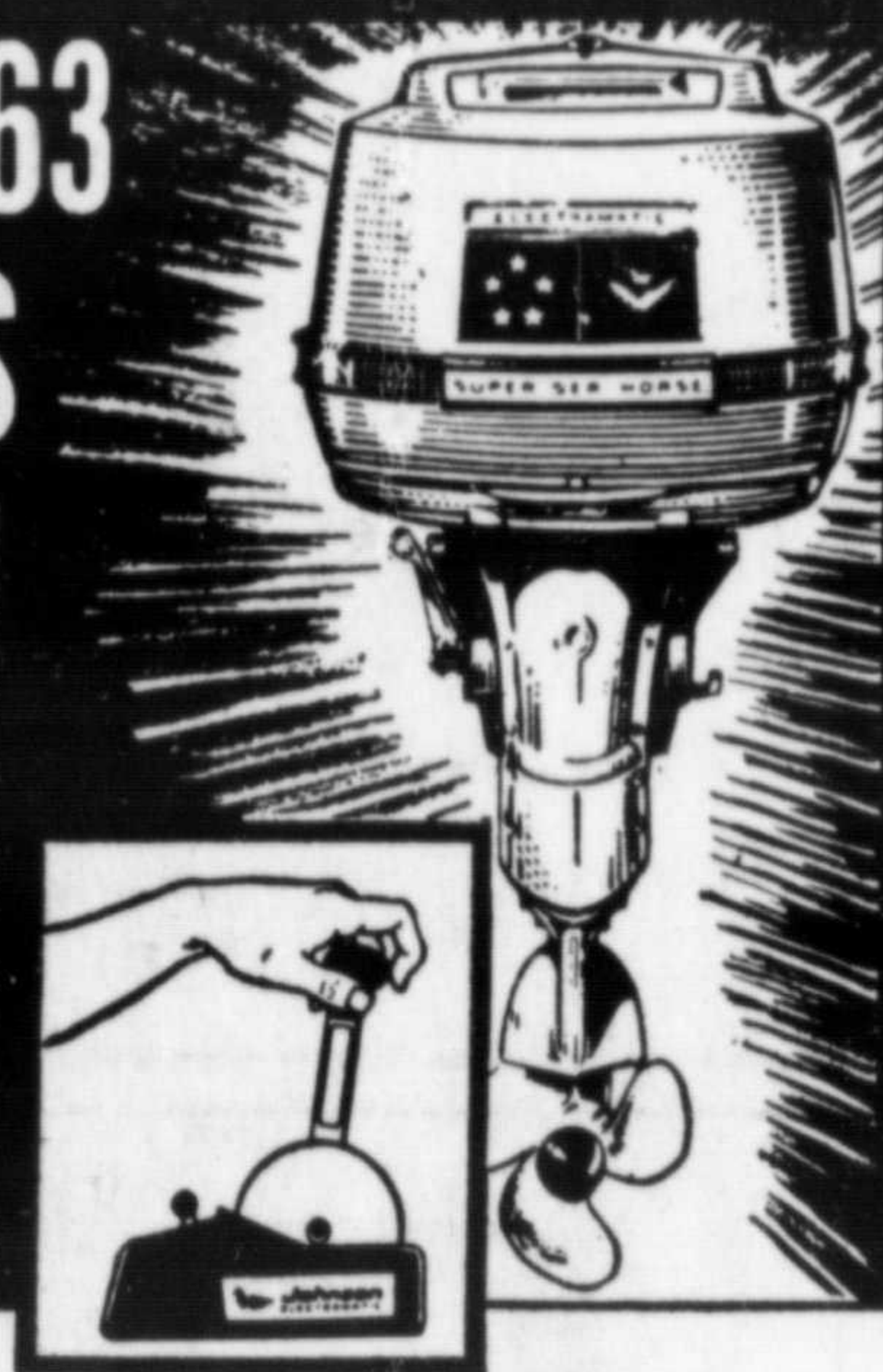

METHOD: Blend shortening, salt and vanilla. Add sugar gradually and cream well. Add eggs singly beating well after each addition. Add chocolate and blend. Sift baking powder with soda and flour. Add flour to creamed mixture, alternately with milk, mixing after each addition until smooth. Add coconut and blend. Bake in 10 x 6 x 3 inch greased loaf pan in moderate oven (350°F) 70 minutes. When cool spread with vanilla cream frosting.

Nancy McCredie Beats Pan-American Shot-Put Record

A pretty auburn haired girl, whose home is in Brampton, Ont. has brought honour to her city and her country. However perhaps, her family, her relatives and friends in the Ottawa district are the happiest of all with the fact that Nancy McCredie, 17 year old daughter of Flight Sergeant, Gordon McCredie and his wife Lois, has brought to Canada one of its three coveted gold medals earned in the Pan-American games in Sao Paulo, Brazil. Her feat was the throwing of the shot, a distance of 50 ft. three inches, to crack the Games record and win the women's shot put. Miss McCredie, a five-foot 10 inch, 178 pounder, was surprised as she cracked the shot put record of 48 feet two inches by more than two feet, and beat her own previous best by nearly four feet.

A High School student in Brampton, Nancy has undergone intensive training under coach Lloyd Percival, coach of Don Mills track club. She was actually discovered by her lady school coach who sensed her strength and capabilities and suggested that she see Mr. Percival. With less than a year's training, Nancy proved that she has the potential to compete with the world's best in an event that requires from 8 to 12 years to master.

Nancy faced her first international challenge at these games April 27 and 28, when she competed against the top athletes from all over U.S. South and Central America. She defeated Cindy Wyatt a 22 year old student at the University of Hawaii. She must still compete against Cindy in the discus and javelin throwing contest in these games.

In preparation for this event Nancy stepped up her training period early this year to three or four evenings a week and five to six hours on Saturdays and Sundays. She works out in a hangar
