

## REFORM WINS NOTABLE VICTORY IN MONTREAL.

### Reduction of Aldermen and Board of Control Approved by Big Majority.

#### OVER EIGHT TO ONE IN FAVOR.

##### An Important Object Lesson to Other Cities of What the People Will Do When Aroused.

Montreal, Sept. 21.—The reform cause won a sweeping victory yesterday, when the city decided to reduce the number of aldermen to one for each ward, and to establish a Board of Control.

The proposal to form a Board of works was defeated.

#### A CIVIC REVOLUTION.

A civic revolution was quietly effected by the silent marking of ballots by the people of Montreal, without the usual noise of elections, the thinking citizens turned out in their thousands, and by a majority of eight to one declared that the state of affairs which had been exposed by the Royal Commission could be continued no longer, and that after next election the Government of the Canadian metropolis should be in the hands of a reduced council with merely legislative attributes, while the administration should be in the hands of a board of control. No more impressive exemplory of the force of quiet public opinion could be imagined than that shown at the polls yesterday. Even the most ardent supporters of the reform movement were amazed when the figures came in, and they saw to what an extent the people of the city were disposed to trust in their proposals. Despite the fact that little organized effort was made to get out the vote, and that the polls and other conveniences to which people had become accustomed at ordinary elections were absent, 21,225 out of 61,440 qualified voters marked their ballots.

#### ONLY TWO POLLS AGAINST.

And of this number the vast majority voted the straight ticket for a reduction in the number of the City Council to one alderman for each ward, and the creation of a Board of Control. The majority in every single ward of the city was immensely in favor of the change, while, almost every polling subdivision spoke in the same way. In fact, from end to end of the city only two polling subdivisions, in St. Mary's Ward, earned the unenviable notoriety of opposing

## TWO AUTOMOBILE FATALITIES.

### One Man Struck and Killed, Another Dies of Injuries.

#### CHAUFFEUR HELD UNTIL AN INVESTIGATION IS HELD.

New Haven, Conn., Sept. 21.—North Haverhill, aged 50 years, was struck and killed at New London, by an automobile driven by Benjamin Erickson. Erickson was held by order of the coroner pending investigation, bonds of \$1,000 being required and furnished. According to Erickson's story, he stepped from the curb directly in front of his machine. Frank Butterfield, of Southfield, who was hit by an automobile last Friday evening, owned by C. S. Swartz, of Chicago, and driven by his son, Wadsworth Swartz, died Monday night of his injuries. The chauffeur, Frank Allen, who was in the car when he had his license revoked by the secretary of state.

#### A BIG PIAZZA.

Sutton, Que., Sept. 21.—(Special)—Mr. Lewis Laflair, who purchased the house above the Canadian school of C. R. Tarte, formerly known as the Sutton Springs House, has had a very wide piazza put clear across the east and south sides of the house, which makes a great improvement in the building.

#### LESSON TO COUNTRY.

In fact the lesson to the city—and the country at large—of the election was the absolute unanimity of the mixed population of the greatest city in the Dominion, when the people were called upon to settle a vital question regarding good government. It was well remarked by ex-Mayor Laporte and other leaders of the reform movement that after so great an evidence of the solidarity of the people in the face of every effort to raise race crises there should in future be more room for efforts to give success to attempts on the rights of the people by separating them on artificial lines. For once the people of Montreal united, and having found the strength of such union it is not to be expected that they will speedily allow the cries of self-seeking demagogues who try to graft on the city under the guise of patriotism to disunite them.

The attitude of the public on the trinity of questions submitted to them was curious, especially in view of the fact that the gist of the recent campaign has been in support of the Board of Control idea. The greatest number of ballots marked were on the question of the reduction of the City Council to one alderman for each ward. For this 21,225 ballots were marked. Almost as many, 20,941, voted on the question of the Board of Control. But evidently the idea of a Board of Works had been relegated to such realms of impossibilities that much fewer people even bothered to vote against it, since only 3,050 ballots were marked, and the vast majority of those were against the proposition.

While the number of votes cast might be considered small in a city of the size of Montreal, it was decidedly impressive under the circumstances. Every ballot marked represented a citizen who went to the polls by his own initiative, guided by no other inducement than that of trying to improve the government of the city. Well over a third of the voters qualified exercised their franchise on a question which was absolutely foreign to the usual lines of political strife, in which none of the usual arguments were offered, from which personal considerations were conveniently for conveying lazy voters banished, and in which the customary to the booths were left out. That under such circumstances 21,225 out of a possible 61,440 went to the polls is ample proof that the events of the past year have given the citizens ample ground for thought, and that very many of them had reached conclusions which they desired to express on their ballots.

#### MONTREALER DIES A LONELY DEATH.

### Coroner Says Death Due to Neglect of Railway Officials.

#### HAD SUFFERED GREATLY BEFORE-DEATH TOOK PLACE.

St. Louis, Mo., Sept. 21.—(Special)—The death of John A. Brown, of Montreal, after a week's suffering in a lonely spot near East Alton, was in part due to neglect on the part of the Chicago and Alton Railway employees according to the verdict of a coroner's jury yesterday.

"The crew of a Chicago and Alton train saw a man tossing about on the ground near the track last Thursday," said Coroner Streper. "They reported the matter to the stationmaster at East Alton but the village authorities did not hear of it until last Thursday when Marshal Hawkins heard of it by accident. He sent medical attention but the man had been dead twelve hours. With medical attention could have been saved. A circular space fifteen feet in diameter gave evidence of Brown's struggles before he died. The ground has been torn up and weeds beaten down. One foot had been cut and the man had tied a handkerchief about the wound."

Streper thinks blood poisoning resulted from this injury, and exposure to the weather caused death.

## GOVERNOR JOHNSON DEAD.

### Was Prospective Democratic Candidate in Next Presidential Campaign.

#### HAD A NOTABLE CAREER, AND WAS SON OF POOR EMIGRANTS.

Rochester, Minn., Sept. 21.—(Special)—Governor John A. Johnson, of Minnesota, and prospective Democratic candidate in next presidential campaign, died here at 3 a.m., today. He never rallied from the operation for appendicitis last Wednesday.

The deceased had a notable career; was the son of poor Swedish emigrants and he himself started out in life as a printer.

He was the most popular governor Minnesota ever had, and in spite of the State going Republican last time, he was re-elected.

## TEACHERS' CONVENTION AT DUNHAM.

### INSTRUCTIVE ADDRESSES ON SCHOOL WORK WERE GIVEN.

Dunham, Sept. 21.—(Special)—The Teachers' Convention held here last Saturday was presided over by the Rev. E. M. Taylor, while the principal speaker was Inspector A. L. Gilman, of Huntingdon District. This gentleman delivered his lectures on school arrangements and method of teaching.

Miss Hedges, the new principal at Dunham Ladies' College, and former principal of King's Hall, Compton, gave a very pleasing address on educational conditions in South Africa. Miss Hedges is a self-possessed speaker, who pleases and instructs her listeners.

## MISS GOBEIL BEFORE POLICE MAGISTRATE.

### Pleads Not Guilty to Charge of Causing James O'Neil's Death

#### LIBERATED ON BAIL YESTERDAY ON FURNISHING \$2,000 BONDS.

Montreal, September 21.—Miss Virginia Gobeil, who keeps a sanatorium at 1139 Cowan street, in St. Denis Ward, and was arrested on Saturday, appeared before the police magistrate on a charge of causing the death of Mr. James O'Neil, of Coaticook, by starving him. She pleaded not guilty and was held until the afternoon, when it was decided to release her on bail offered by two bondsmen for a thousand dollars each. She was remanded to Friday next for enquete.

Most of Miss Gobeil's patients are people who have been given up by the doctors and have gone to her as a last resort. She uses no drugs in her treatment, relying mostly on fasting, vegetable drinks and massage treatment for cures.

## SHIPPING CREAM TO UNITED STATES.

### Eastern Townships Creameries Are Making an Experiment.

#### IT IS ANTICIPATED THAT PATRONS WILL RECEIVE LARGER RETURNS.

Stambridge East, Sept. 21.—(Special)—A new arrangement has been entered into in connection with the Stambridge East Creamery. The executive has decided to stop making butter for the present, at any rate, and will sell the cream to a Boston firm.

It is expected that owing to the high price paid that the patrons will receive a much larger return than formerly.

## STOLE EMPLOYER'S SILVER AND GOLD.

### Young English Lad Was Making Off With Goods Valued at \$150

#### WAS ARRESTED NEAR BRIGHAM.—HAS ONLY BEEN IN COUNTRY A MONTH.

Sweetsburg, Sept. 21.—(Special)—Yesterday Mr. Albert Hawley, of the Township of East Farnham, was relieved of goods to the value of about \$150, consisting of watches, bracelets, rings and silverware. The goods were taken when he was absent from the house in the afternoon. The house was left in charge of Arthur Marston, an Old Country lad of about eighteen years, who had been placed by the Government immigration agent.

When Mr. Hawley returned, about five o'clock, he was told that the lad had left and had been seen on the road to Cowansville. Mr. Hawley followed, and came up to him when near Cowansville. He endeavored to get him to return, but he refused to do so, and gave as an excuse for leaving that he was homesome.

It was when he returned the second time that Mr. Hawley found the articles mentioned had been stolen. He at once got into communication with High Constable Boisvert, who in turn issued directions to have men put on to all the roads that Marston would be most likely to take.

Constable St. Martin and Mr. Hawley took the road to Brigham, and caught up with him between Brigham and Brigham Junction. Marston was then resting beside the railway track with a valise which contained the articles stolen.

Marston was brought to Sweetsburg, where he was met by the High Constable, to whom he admitted his guilt.

He has only been in this country about a month.

He will come up for preliminary hearing before Judge Mulvena on the 24th of September.

## THREE MEN KILLED AT QUEBEC.

### Montreal Express in Collision To-Day.

#### FIREMAN AND ENGINEER KILLED.—NO PASSENGERS INJURED.

Quebec, Sept. 21.—(Special)—Three men were killed here early to-day when the Montreal express, bound for Montreal to Boston, crashed into the rear of a disabled Quebec express from Quebec to Boston about one mile and a half from this station.

The dead are Engineer John H. Callahan, of Concord, N.H., of the Montreal express; Fireman George Parmenter, and an unknown tramp who was riding on the Montreal express.

No passengers were injured.


