ANOTHER SMELTER BLOWN IN. B. C. Copper Co. Blew in Smelter in Boundary Country Yesterday.

PRESENT CAPACITY OF 300 TONS WILL BE VASTLY INCREASED. (Special to the Star.)

GREENWOOD, B. C., February 19.—Boundaries second smelter was blown in yesterday. Within fifty minutes after firing up matter commenced to run. The reduction works of British Columbia Copper Co. of New York, have a daily capacity of three hundred tons, built principally to treat ore from the company's mine, the Mother Lode, in Boundary country. It will also do custom work. Besides eight thousand tons on hand from the Mother Lode, shipments from Little Belt, No. 7, and Gold Bug, have been received.

The works are located within a few minutes' walk from the centre of Greenwood, and the site is an admirable one for smelting purposes, on account of the elevation, the fumes pass up Copper creek, thereby avoiding injury to vegetation. Paul Johnson designed the smelter and superintended the building of the same. The E. P. A. Co., of Milwaukee, supplied the machinery. The plant is up to date in every respect and is constructed with a view to ultimate expansion in order to treat 2,000 tons daily. Already orders have been placed for a converting plant to be installed during the summer and it is probable the matter will be stored here pending the building of the converter, instead of sending to eastern refineries. The smelter has a payroll of fifty employees. The Mother Lode mine is situated three miles from Greenwood and is being worked by complete plant representing the most modern practice in machinery. The E. P. A. Co., of Milwaukee, built the plant, which is the largest ever shipped into district. Shares in company are selling in New York and Boston markets around twenty-one.

DE WET WAS FOILED

He Failed to Reach His Objective Having Been Headed Off by British Troops.

KITCHENER AT PRETORIA NOW

He Reports That His Troops Are Prepared For Any New Move on De Wet's Part.

LONDON, February 19.—Lord Kitchener, Commander-in-Chief of the British troops of South Africa, telegraphing from Pretoria to the War Office under date of February 18, says:

"De Wet is reported still moving north and is now west of Hope town. He will probably double back to the southwest. The troops are prepared for this. A train was detailed between Verrening and Johannesburg this morning but the Boers were driven off before they secured much."

A correspondent of the Daily Mail, who is with the British column pursuing General De Wet, says:

General De Wet has failed to reach his objective, having been headed off in turn from Strydenburg and Hopetown. Last night a meeting of burghers was held in General De Wet's camp to protest against the indiscriminate flogging of men, and half the force threatened to surrender. Eventually the malcontents decided to fight independently."

BRISTOWEN, February 19.—It is reported that the Boers have occupied Vaurburg, communication with that place having been interrupted. It is asserted that there are one thousand Boers at Vaurburg and others at Houwater, twenty-one miles from Britstown.

THREATS OF DE WET. (Special to the Star.)

CAPE TOWN, February 19.—It was Gen. Froman and not Gen. De Wet who captured a British train near Springfontein last week. It is stated that Gen. De Wet expresses the intention of commandingeer all the Dutch Colonists under penalty of death.

TYPHOID AMONG TROOPS. The Number of Cases in South Africa Steadily Increasing.

LONDON, February 19.—Questions in the House of Commons yesterday regarding the war in South Africa did little toward really enlightening the situation. Secretary of State for War gave ever increasing number of cases of typhoid fever among the troops, thus partially accounting for the long casualty lists. In October there were 522 cases and 307 deaths. In November, 1,213 cases and 207 deaths. In December, 1,652 cases and 286 deaths. The total since the beginning of the war to December 31, is 19,101 cases and 4,233 deaths.

SOUTH AFRICAN POLICE. Ottawa is Making Ready to Receive the Western Recruits.

(Special to the Star.)

OTTAWA, February 19.—The preparations for receiving the western section of the recruits for the Canadian Police force, on their mobilization at Ottawa, are progressing rapidly. The arrangements will be the same as for the mobilization of the conscripts. Acting on the instructions of the War Office, the Militia Department have been in negotiation with Montreal shipping houses regarding the chartering of a vessel as a transport for 1,200 of the Baden-Powell

Police force to South Africa, but so far nothing definite has been authorized by the Imperial Government.

MAJOR ARNOLD'S PORTRAIT. WINNIPEG, Man., February 19.—The presentation of the portrait of the late Major Arnold, to the city, was made last evening in the Council Chamber at the City Hall. Acting Mayor Fry presided. Speeches were delivered by Hon. H. J. Macdonald and others, and Mr. E. L. Drewery, the President, on behalf of the society.

AFRAID OF INVADERS. (Special to the Star.)

CAPE TOWN, February 19.—The Military authorities have thrown up entrenchments at Somerset East and Nitenburg, to guard against attacks by the Boer invaders. The circulation of the Dublin Weekly Freeman and the London Sporting Leader has been prohibited in the Cuddebeck District. The Military authorities have given notice that any person found with the same proclaimed newspapers in their possession will be liable to punishment.

TO INCREASE THE FORCE. LONDON, February 19.—The Daily Chronicle says it understands that several officers of high rank from India are going to South Africa and that Lord Dufferin, General Kelly-Kenny and General Leach, also are going out again. According to the same authority it has been practically decided in connection with the scheme of army reform, to increase the forces by 150,000 men, to secure whom it is proposed to increase the pay of the soldiers.

FLAQUE IN CAPE TOWN. (Special to the Star.)

CAPE TOWN, February 19.—Another case of plague was reported in Cape Town on Monday. There was also one death from the disease here. Two Kafirs who were detained at the contact camp have developed the disease.

WANTS BOERS TO SURRENDER. TORONTO, Ont., February 19.—The Pretoria correspondent of the Standard says it is reported that Gen. Schalkberg is doing his utmost to induce a general surrender of the Boers in the northern part of the Transvaal.

CROKER WILL STAY IN ENGLAND. LONDON, February 19.—Mr. Richard Croker is increasing his landed possessions in England, and clearly has no intention of abandoning his English home in King Alfred's Sixton corner. Reporters are ever at his gates, and income tax assessors are harassing him for contributions to the war chest for financing the campaign, but he is repairing and improving his property and increasing his acreage, and evidently expects to live and die among Saxons like William Waldorf Astor.

THE KING IN LONDON. (Special to the Star.)

LONDON, February 19.—The King and Queen have returned to London quietly and of the week when they will again spend Sunday in the country, at either Windsor or Sandringham. MANCHESTER, February 19.—The court has ordered the compulsory winding-up of the Bostock and Company, sugar refiners, of Liverpool, to whom was traced the supply of arsenated invert sugar, the use of which in the manufacture of beer resulted in the poisoning of a large number of people.

FOR THE PHILIPPINES? CINCINNATI, Ohio, February 19.—Orderville have been received at the recruiting station to enlist immediately all available men possible, to serve in the infantry or cavalry in the Philippines. The local station is advised to use all haste in enlisting men.

LEADER WRITERS PUZZLED. They are at a Loss to Find Motive for Von Walderees Expedition Into Heart of China.

LONDON, February 19.—Interest in the Chinese question is reviving. The mystery with regard to the motive which has induced Von Walderees to start on a big expedition into the heart of China is puzzling leader writers in the daily papers.

DAILY NEWS' OPINION. THE DEFENCE OF ENGLAND.

The English magazines just now are indulging their readers with numerous articles on the subject of British Army reform.

Dr. Conan Doyle in his book on the South African campaign, discussing the means for repelling an invasion of England.

The slow development of Canada in industry and population as compared with the United States Mr. Clergue attributes to the fact that the crude products of Canadian farms, forests and mines have been shipped to the United States to be manufactured into finished products.

Mr. Clergue holds that the immigration projects of the Dominion and Provincial Governments have been worse than useless. He says they have simply wasted the people's money in bringing labourers to a market already glutted with labourers.

Mr. Clergue has hit the nail on the head, but Canadians in general are beginning to realize the opportunities their country affords. The idea that we must always be hevers of wood and drawers of water for our neighbours to the South is rapidly passing away.

A FREE TRADERS' COMBINE.

The idea that there could not be a successful combine to control a market and regulate prices without a protective tariff has been exploded more than once during the last few years, since the trade combine has become the craze of the day.

THE MAN WHO SELLS HIMSELF.

In ancient Greece and Rome men sold themselves into slavery much in the same way as they do now in South Carolina, but while men became slaves in Greece and Rome, whereas in South Carolina the

practice is confined to the sale of coloured men. In both Athens and Rome freedom in want of money often borrowed it on the condition that if it were not paid within a certain time the borrower should become the slave of the lender.

The South Carolina negro who sells himself into slavery is not acting very differently from the Canadian who borrows money binding himself to pay exorbitant rates of interest. The chief difference is that the Canadian borrower has a choice of occupation, while the South Carolina negro has not. A clause in the contract between the South Carolina negro and his master provides that the latter shall have the right to transfer his interest in the contract to any other party and the negro agrees to work for the assignee the same as for the original party of the first part, who lends him the money, for which he sells himself into slavery.

CANADIAN LACK OF FAITH.

WIDENING ST. PETER

Nothing Yet Done Towards Straightening This Important Thoroughfare.

MR. CORISTINE ON SITUATION. Holds That City Must Make a Move in Matter and That Immediately.

It would seem that the hurried solution of widening the street in the district and making other improvements considered necessary, or at least, very desirable, by a majority of the citizens, is as far from being realized as it was the morning after the fire nearly a month ago.

For the most part the members of the City Council are prepared to admit that something should be done in the way of widening the streets in this particular section, but at the same time the majority seem ready to postpone the plan which has been proposed as well as high impossible owing to the expenditure. The Esplan plan, as it is now known, meets with very general favour, but the same time the City Fathers are inclined to think that it is entirely out of their reach.

Mr. James Coristine, the largest individual property owner in the district which suffered from the January fire, is disposed to meet the city even more than half way in any project for widening the street. He is willing to turn over no inconsiderable amount of his property in order to straighten St. Paul street between St. Nicholas and St. Peter streets, and the city will do something toward widening the thoroughfare. In speaking of the matter, Mr. Coristine pointed out that the lower, or south side of St. Paul street, is almost without exception filled with buildings of an inferior kind—a good many of the Coristine and Nelson buildings on the north side the structures were, as a rule, of a superior kind.

THE CITY MUST MOVE. Asked if there was any chance of the present plan for widening the street getting together for any concerted action, Mr. Coristine said that he did not think it was possible. He said that they all agreed to do something, but as these were of wide diversions he did not think that they could, as a body, come to any understanding on the subject if the city did not move in the matter, no move would be made.

He regretted the spathy of the city, for it seemed that the plan for widening the street would be erected in the place of those burned. People would not build high class structures on these streets as they stood to-day, and the city would lose money by the policy of non-action.

AN EXCEPTIONAL OPPORTUNITY. Now that exceptional opportunity is offered for the extension of Lemoiné street from St. Peter through to St. Nicholas, the Commission on the subject of widening the street is in a position to make a move again in the matter. The proposed extension of the street is by no means a new project. Upward of twenty-five years ago the Corporation and Nelson buildings on the north side the structures were, as a rule, of a superior kind.

RAILWAY CLOSURES. Not Considered, However, That This Will Interfere With Mr. Mullarkey's Plans for Extension Into the City.

The Montreal Terminal Railway Company has changed hands, and while Mr. J. P. Mullarkey, the general manager and moving spirit in the enterprise, remains in the ascendancy as of old, the entire board has been practically reorganized.

Mr. W. Dale Harris, of Ottawa, who has been identified with the Montreal Terminal Railway for a matter of some five years, in fact, ever since the company began the building of its line, has sold out his interests and resigned the presidency. Mr. Harris was not only the president of the company, but represented one-half of the stock.

Messrs. Chas. Magee, Dennis Murphy, H. H. Melville and Col. McNaught. The remainder is owned by Messrs. J. P. Mullarkey, Alex. Desmarquet and G. H. Catell. There are also a few scattered holdings.

There is good authority for stating that in the new deal just put through a serious difference of opinion arose between Mr. Mullarkey, the general manager of the Belt Line Railway and some of the directors, including Mr. W. Dale Harris, the president.

Mr. Harris, it is stated, has withdrawn from the company in consequence and is not in a friendly attitude towards Mr. Mullarkey and the present directors. He is, it is said, decidedly opposed to some of the financial propositions advanced by Mr. Mullarkey and took sharp issue with him upon one point in particular.

The reorganization of the company will not cause the abandonment of the plans which Mr. Mullarkey is said to have in view, looking to the extension of the road's line into Montreal, and it is believed that he will now have a free hand to carry out his ideas, which Mr. Harris and certain of his directors objected to.

The purchase price of the Terminal Railway in the recent transaction was \$500,000, which includes the first mortgage bonds on the property. There are in all five thousand shares of subscribed stock, of this 4,750 shares are divided among

FLOATING OF LOAN.

No Progress Has Yet Been Made in This Direction by City Council.

ALD. MARTINEAU'S OBJECTION.

Mayor Brings Up the Matter of \$10,000 Grant to Entertain Royalty.

The present administration at the City Hall is having infinitely more trouble about getting its proposed \$10,000 loan before the public than the old Finance Committee did when it handled its famous three million loan. The old regime did not believe in discussion over the floating of the loan, and, after holding a lot of meetings in secret, placed the loan without tenders being asked.

The Finance Committee of to-day has taken the opposite course. It has held its \$10,000 loan placed before the public for competition, but so far without success. At the meeting of the City Council yesterday it was the order of the day to discuss the matter, but there was no more trouble about the matter, but there was, and now another meeting will have to be held to consider the matter over again.

So soon as the opinion of the City Attorneys had been read yesterday, that the city could legally place a proposed loan through the Bank of Montreal, the bank asking for tenders for it. Ald. Martineau, the Mercantile Bank of Montreal, was requested to give an opinion on clause 32 of the charter, which clause dealt exclusively with the issuing of bonds. He concluded that the opinion just read based upon clause 31 of the charter, dealt with the \$200,000 portion of the \$1,000,000 loan. It was only a question of the change in both sections of the charter. The \$1,000,000 was made up of two distinct loans, one being the consolidation of various bonds, and the other the 10c per cent. increase on real estate.

The Mayor also said he thought the advice of Ald. Martineau should be carried out.

HOPED IT WOULD STOP.

Ald. Laporte—"I trust there will not be much more opposition to the placing of the proposed loan before the public than the market now, and I think the members of Council should not continue to raise technical objections. At the same time I have no objection to an opinion being given as desired." The speaker also accepted a suggestion that Ald. Laporte, Lebeuf and Martineau should question the validity of the loan with the Finance Committee.

Ald. Ames—"In the next opinion from the City Attorneys let us have both the \$1,000,000 consolidated loan and the \$200,000 loan, increase on real estate, dealt separately with. We shall then know just where to stand as to the legality of both loans."
