CANADIAN.

MONTREAL, October 12.—The announcement this morning of the death of Hon. Edward G. Penny, editor-in-chief of the Montreal Herald, and Senator of the Dominion, although not unexpected, has caused profound grief throughout the city. Penny was born in Haverly, England, on the 15th May, 1820, and was therefore 61 years of age. He came here in 1844, and after studying for the bar was admitted to practice in 1849. In 1874 he was called to the bar by the Senate, and was subsequently appointed by the Administration to represent Canada at the World's Fair, Philadelphia in 1876. He had been 40 years editor of the Herald, and probably was the oldest journalist in Canada. He was universally respected by all who knew him and his loss will be greatly felt.

FRANCE.

TUNIS.

TUNIS, Oct. 12.—The Bey has signed an order authorizing the occupation of Kairwan by the French troops. Heavy siege artillery are being mounted at the Citadel and in the large fort which is the principal citadel of the city. The insurgents attacked a strong French force near Suse, when the French suffered some loss. They fell upon an ambuscade. Despite the large French garrison at Suse, the insurgents captured many cattle close to the town and pillaged several villages in the vicinity.

LEBON, October 12.—The British steamer "Cerberus" has foundered in Cape Horn. Part of the cargo was damaged.

AUSTRIA.

VIENNA, Oct. 12.—A commission of experts appointed by the Government has decided in favor of maintaining the prohibition against the importation of American pork.

SPAIN.

MADRID, October 12.—The cholera and cattle plague has broken out in North Java and the Soe Loo Archipelago.
