## Permits for gardeners proposed

Trades people and others doing work in Westmount but not based here and not previously required to have permits may come under more city hall control by a measure expected to be brought before City Council at its mid-month meeting Tuesday evening.

A problem to police and works people for some time has been, in particular, contractors who remove snow in winter and do gardening in summer on private properties.

Among the many reputable operators who practice good housekeeping there are others who are known to push snow into the streets and likewise to put garden refuse on the pavements.

The permit measure would allow city authorities to identify all operators and to control them, with the ultimate sanction being the withholding of renewals for consistent offenders.

Among other tentative agenda items is a change in the building regulations to permit lower ceilings in schools — which has been a constant problem in most older school buildings in the city in recent years.

Ald. Charles Aspler is expected to report on a Montreal Urban Community transportation meeting he was attending this week.

The Westmount Spring Flower Show, which traditionally has opened on the Wednesday before Easter, is slated to do so this year — on March 25.

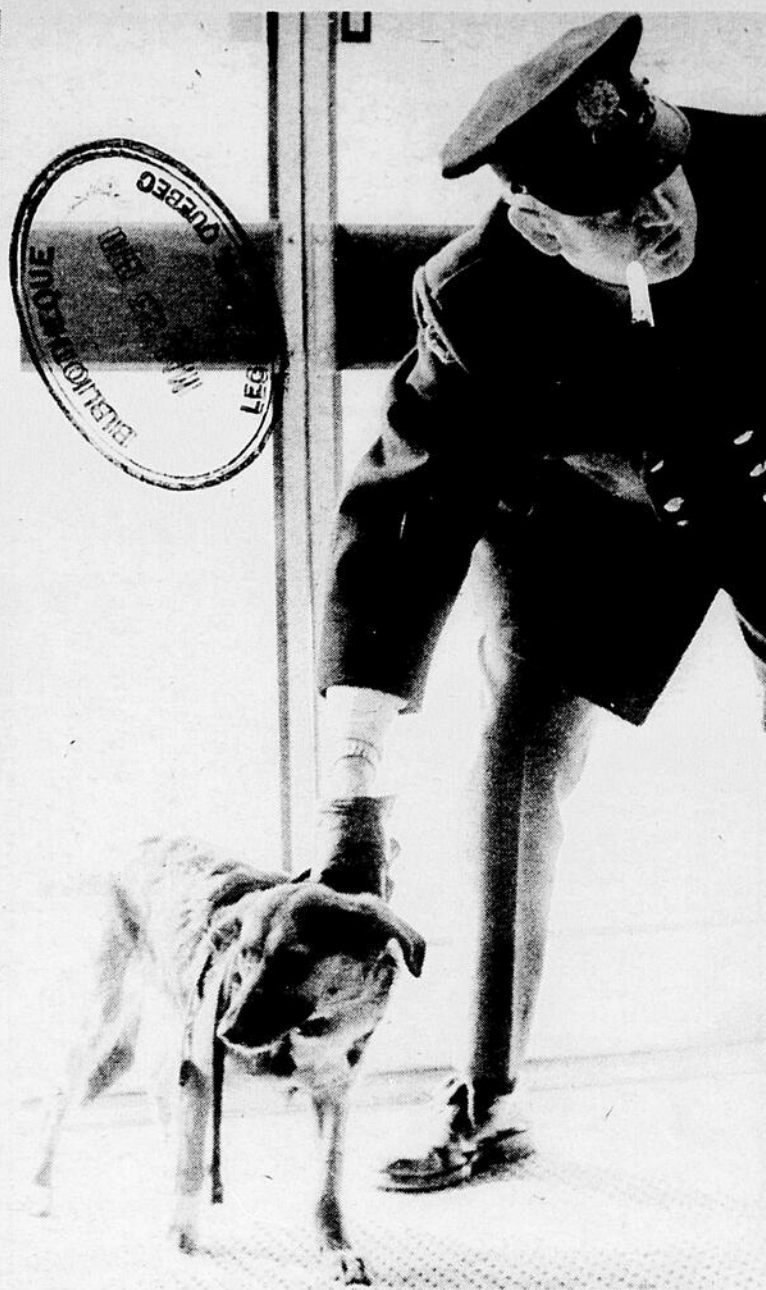
A set of 1970 licence markers was reported last Wednesday lost or stolen from the trunk of a car parked, when the discovery was made, outside 444 Elm avenue.

# Pocket picked Flying chrome on 105 bus; hits boy, 8, fraud nipped in Cote crash

A Westmount resident who had his pocket picked late Friday afternoon on a crowded 105 MTC bus at Clarke avenue and Sherbrooke street west may not have got complete satisfaction for his wallet and the 133 in cash it contained.

Pick-pockets don't often get caught at the specific crime.

However, he no doubt was gratified to know that a man was arrested Saturday morning in Eaton's store downtown on a fraud count when he attempted to use our citizen's credit card.

It was too soon for the loss of the card to have been notified to store staff; security people simply were suspicious to the would-be shopper.

The frisking victim said he was briefly jostled by a man who blocked his way to the exit from the bus. He discovered his pocket-book missing a couple of hours later, after he got home, and reported the incident to Westmount Police.

An eight-year-old boy on his way home from school told his parents he had been involved in an automobile accident last Wednesday afternoon.

And indeed he had — he had cuts on his leg from a piece of flying chromium to prove it. Westmount Police believe he was incredibly lucky not to have suffered worse.

Richard Graham, the school-boy, was on his way home to 492 Strathcona avenue when at Cote St. Antoine road and Lansdowne avenue a 1969 Chrysler, driven south by Dr. Suraj Prakash of Montreal, failed to halt at the stop sign and was in collision with a 1968 Plymouth driven west by Jean Samson of Laval, whose car suffered \$250 damages.

Dr. Prakash's vehicle continued down the steep Lansdowne slope, mounted the sidewalk, struck a tree outside Nos. 449 and 447, bounced off and ended up against the verandah of No. 445. The doctor's car is estimated to have suffered 1,500 worth of damage.

# Psychiatric aid service in community, schools outlined

Efforts of a new comprehensive plan that provides social services and psychiatric aid to the Westmount community and schools are directed toward home - school - nurse co-ordination, it was learned Monday night at the March statutory meeting of Westmount school board.

"This provides a follow-through on care and treatment."

Child Psychiatrist Dr. Helen Cvejic, who outlined the program for human development to board members, said the plan intro-

duced last year by the Westmount Municipal Association was now effectively established. Liaison was operating between the

schools and the social worker and several detached workers of the YMCA, which has the more difficult cases because so many are transients.

"The focus is not on cases," Dr. Cvejic said, "because in spite of the fact that we have taken on a new psychiatric social worker, Mrs. Marjorie Bedukian, we have not enough staff. We are largely concerned with preventative medicine."

## High school cases

Dr. Cvejic said that in the high school she was surprised how many acute problems were drawn to the attention of the school nurse and guidance counsellors. "In elementary school we might have to

trace a particular child's fear of dogs," but high school students have sometimes severe difficulties such as over-anxiety, hyper-ventilation which is breathing too fast until they are rigid, adapting to city life and feelings of isolation if they are from country districts, and the adjustments of twins. Referrals are often made

to the Children's and Queen Elizabeth hospitals but both are unfortunately overcrowded.

Dr. Cvejic spends half-days each week in various Westmount schools and with workers of the YMCA. She holds noon meetings with teachers to discuss child-behavior management and special problems. "If a child is over-active in class I see this as a symptom," she explained.

She has also met with teenagers of Westmount High School to see how they feel about various matters.

## TILLEY ON BNA

### Parents afraid in drug 'war', Dr. Elder says

Chairman A. Reid Tilley of the Protestant School Board of Greater Montreal had this to say this week:

"Stories carried by the Montreal press imply that the PSBGM is going to apply to the federal government under section 93 of the BNA Act to have Bill 62 disallowed. Such an implication is completely unfounded. The board, like other interested parties, will submit a brief to the educational committee of the National Assembly and in fact copies of this were delivered to the government on Tuesday and have since been made public. If and when Bill 62 is passed the board will then consider its position constitutionally and decide whether or not to contest it in the courts."

It's a war - students use marijuana to fight their parents, several school commissioners agreed Monday night at the Westmount board's meeting attended by Child Psychiatrist Dr. Helen Cvejic of Westmount's human development program.

"Parents are afraid. They often won't acknowledge or admit a drug problem because it may involve criminal charges," Dr. John Elder, chairman of the board's health committee said.

Dr. Cvejic said that parents in elementary schools are active but parents of high school students are not. She would like to have more "feed-back" from them explaining if they are aware of the unrest in youth and how they see the problem.

She said she has observed there is quite a core of youthful drug users in the community but perhaps no worse than any other, "although the Alexis Nihon Plaza seems to be a locale - it's like a fair, a hive of activity".

Dr. Cvejic remarked that all sorts of drugs were used including pills with strychnine and detergent. Teachers felt parents need education and parents feel teachers do.

"The problem is there is no outlet for youth and parents who are worried. And we need drop-in clinics for transient youth."

Dr. Cvejic said the health committee is interested in extending the drug information program to elementary schools.

Dr. Cvejic and Mrs. Marjorie Bedukian, psychiatric social worker with the human development program, will address a group of parents of elementary school children in Westmount Park School in April on this subject.

## THE PROTESTANT SCHOOL BOARD OF GREATER MONTREAL

Important Notice to Parents or Guardians Whose Children Would Normally Attend A School Operated By The Above-Named Board.

In accordance with the recently passed Quebec Order-in-Council No. 674, forms issued by the Department of Education for the enrolment of pupils for the 1970-71 school year will be distributed to parents through the schools.

Early in March pupil enrolled in one of this Board's schools will be asked to take home an enrolment form for the use of parents or guardians.

If a child presently enrolled fails to bring home a copy of the form, OR

if one or more children in a given family will be enrolling in school for the first time in September 1970, the parents or guardians are asked to notify the Principal of the nearest Protestant school at once and obtain a copy of the required form.

The schools administered by this Board are listed in the telephone directory on page 1319.

**Re. pupil enrolment:** The Board has already issued a form in order to secure some necessary advance information, but for each child who will be in attendance at one of the Board's schools next session parents are required to complete a separate form issued by the Minister of Education.

**Re. choice of language:** The information prepared by the Minister of Education on procedures concerning the choice of language of instruction will also be distributed through the schools. For parents who do not have children presently in school, appropriate forms will be available, on request, from the Principal.

The next of the forms and the procedures to be followed in using them are in strict accordance with instructions of the Minister of Education.

Completed forms should be returned to the local schools before April 1, 1970.

## Academy road plan settled

Plans for Academy road fronting Westmount Park School will proceed according to the original agreement drawn up by the City of Westmount and the PSBGM, it was announced by A. Reid Tilley, chairman of the PSBGM at the meeting Monday of School Commissioners of the Municipality of the City of Westmount.

The move, which will mean closing the street as a hazard to children and painting the pavement green, will involve only moderate cost as opposed to the more elaborate plans suggested by the City, he said.

## 12 years too young for H.S. school commissioners told

Is a child too young at 12 to enter high school?

Local citizen, Mrs. Elizabeth O'Connell advised school commissioners for the Municipality of the City of Westmount at their meeting Monday evening that a group of parents are concerned and would shortly present a brief to that effect. She suggested that use be made of space apparently available in

Westmount Park School to provide Grade VII classrooms for pupils from Westmount Park and Roslyn schools.

Board members A. Reid Tilley, chairman of the PSBGM; Dr. John Elder, Mrs. D. Lloyd-Smith and J. Iain Gow explained such a change-over would entail many administrative problems and mean a drop in the student population of Westmount High School.

The trend is to larger schools. "Large schools give students the benefit of the best specialists," Dr. Elder explained.

While some parents had qualms, there were many elementary school pupils eager to get into high school and bored with the curriculum in the lower grades by the time they reached Grade VII, board members agreed.

It was decided cost and other factors would be examined.

**Beaupré chairs Appeal giving by employees**

T. N. Beaupré, 3207 The Boulevard, chairman of the employee giving division of the 1970 Federated Appeal campaign, says that while giving at work is not a way of life in Montreal, it is the most efficient and practical manner of supporting the campaign.

Mr. Beaupré, chairman and president of Domtar Limited, said: "The number of companies who have agreed to handle their employees canvass through the payroll deduction method has doubled from last year."

Mr. Beaupré said that there has been a substantial decrease in the number of employees who

previously had been reluctant to accept the payroll deduction plan. The employee canvass is now underway with 60 full time volunteer "loaned executives" now calling on management and employee representatives in 1,500 companies to help run the internal employee canvass.

During March, Montreal employee groups in stores, offices, industrial concerns and public services, are being canvassed. The objective of the employee canvass is \$3,373,000 out of a total campaign objective of \$11,400,000.

Mr. Beaupré said that last year 23 percent of the total amount raised was through the employee canvass in Montreal. In Toronto the percentage raised through this method was 59 percent while the North American average is 61 percent.

The Federated Appeal campaign supports 110 health and welfare agencies in Greater Montreal.

**James renamed, 1970 president of Institute**

Lt.-Col. Roswell Tees James, president of Tees and Co. Inc., was re-elected president of the Mechanics' Institute of Montreal at the 130th annual meeting held Monday at the Atwater avenue institution.

In his report to the members, Col. James remarked that the annual fee for associate members had been raised to \$10 but that two new classes of membership had been added, senior citizens and students, both at \$5. Many persons had taken advantage of these memberships.

Col. James thanked Scott Brooks and Ernest Thorne for their organization of film showings and music appreciation

concerts on Wednesday evenings from October to March. These programs, which are provided free as a public service, had been well attended throughout the season. The excellent publicity for these events received from press and radio was greatly appreciated.

Col. James expressed gratitude to the Provincial Government for a grant of \$10,000 and to the City of Montreal for \$5,500 as well as donations from other foundations, companies and individuals, making a total of \$19,000.

The librarian, Miss Sybil Grimson, reported a busy and successful year in the library. While membership remained about the same, 1,532 persons, circulation of books reached 101,919, an increase of 35 percent in fiction and 20 percent in non-fiction. There are over 56,000 books in the library.

Besides Col. James as president, the following officers were elected for the ensuing year: G. Scott Brooks, vice-president; J. McN. Charlebois, secretary; W. Watson Ogilvie, treasurer. Elected to the general committee of management for two-year terms were J. A. Campbell, J. A. Forbes, J. H. McCulloch, K. E. McNamara and E. A. Thorne.

Also serving on this committee are T. G. Anglin, D. R. Anstice, E.S. Booth, Norman English, L. A. Verdicchio and Past President W. A. Eversfield.

## We Say

### Ottawa is culprit in postal mess-up

Our MP and senior federal cabinet minister, Hon. C. M. Drury, noted in his column on this page last week: "The government cannot... condone the disruption of services, violence and intimidation" in the Montreal postal situation.

Yet that is just what federal authorities have been doing for weeks. We forgive Mr. Drury, who has been on a well-earned West Indies holiday, for not realizing it. We can't imagine what excuse his colleagues, left behind in Ottawa, are using for the wholesale and repeated interference with the mails here - still, we understand, a federal offence and until recently a serious one.

Our sympathy is swinging to the postmen: carriers and clerks. They are months overdue on new contracts being negotiated by the Treasury Board, of which the same Mr. Drury is president.

The big trouble in this whole situation is that both Mr. Drury and Mr. Kierans, the postmaster-general, are both effectively expatriate Montrealers.

If they had been personally suffering the daily cost, inconvenience and uncertainty of this disgraceful example of government incompetence, perhaps service long since would have been restored or not even disrupted in the first place.

### Why mid-winter for new markers?

We make no apologies for repeating a suggestion we made just a year ago:

Change automobile licence renewal time to a more suitable season.

A recent morning, along with probably thousands of other motorists we were freezing our hands wrestling with the rusty screws holding muckladen 1969 plates. Alternatively, shedding our do-it-yourself instinct, we might have queued up to have

the job done at a service station.

It is the most illogical of seasons for this annual ritual.

Mid-winter, in our climate, is a brutal time, specially for those of us who prefer carpools to heated garages and others forced by circumstances to keep their cars outdoors.

Furthermore, February is almost precisely in the middle of each new-model year.

In most places outside North America a permanent registration number stays with a car for its life - surely a much more economical plan. Only beneficiary from our system is a metal products firm making plates which, in any event, become torn and bent before 12 months have gone.

### Changes in the estimates

There are two noteworthy aspects of the federal Government's estimates for 1970-71 which I tabled in the Commons last month.

One deals with form, the other with substances.

In the past a great deal of criticism was directed at federal administrations for failing to provide in the estimates (or "Blue Book") adequate information about the various federal departments expenditure programs and objectives. The Blue Book appeared to be no more than a compilation of figures which perhaps meant something to some officials but was not of great benefit to Parliament which, after all, must appraise and approve the government's spending plans.

More often than not House committees would spend inordinate lengths of time on non-essential items; then because of the time factor Parliament would be asked to approve tremendous sums of money in a matter of minutes for what purpose no one was certain.

### New form

In the current estimates (1970-71) the form is radically different from anything that has come before. For the first time expenditure proposals respecting departments and agencies are clearly formulated in terms of programs. The objectives and sub-objectives of each program are stated and the nature of the program further amplified through a description of the

activities carried on in pursuit of program objectives.

For instance, the objective of the Canadian International Development Agency (CIDA) is "to assist in the economic, technical, educational and social development of developing countries." Its six sub-objectives include promoting the expansion of industrial and agriculture production and alleviating hunger and other hardships. Its various programs (with description) include aid administration, technical assistance and grants to multilateral international assistance programs.

What all of this means is that departments are having to define their objectives both for their own benefit and for the purpose of aiding Parliament (and the public) in determining where the federal government's funds are going and for what purposes.

Moving now to the substantive side of the estimates (which received considerable attention by the press and electronic media) there are ample figures to demonstrate the government's determination to restrain its own expenditures. I stress "its own expenditures" because of an important distinction that must be made between two types of expenditures, statutory and non-statutory.

Statutory expenditures result from firm commitments provided for in existing legislation. The public debt and programs jointly-financed with the provinces are examples of this.

Non-statutory expenditures, for which Parliament is asked to

Québecers during the past year. Of course there is a case in equity to be made out to show that since Québec did not enter the medicare scheme in 1969, the amount of money which Ottawa collected but did not have to spend in Québec should be returned to the Québec taxpayers. Legally, however, there is no case to be made since the federal government has never said that the special tax was collected to cover medicare costs.

### Incompetent?

In order to base its claim in equity the Québec Government would first of all be obliged to admit to its own incompetence in having failed to implement medicare in Québec in 1969 as had been provided in the negotiations and agreements between the two governments.

The major weakness, however, in the whole argument which is being made by our provincial authorities, is that having tabled spending estimates for next year of close to \$4,000,000,000, the Union Nationale would try to have us believe that a transfer by Ottawa of \$200,000,000 would solve all of the financial problems being faced by Québec today. Let them try a more effective and direct approach, and together with all Québecers of goodwill, concentrate on creating that kind of political climate which will restore the confidence of Canadians as well as foreigners in the brilliant future that awaits a serious and hard-working Québec.

## Examining the Files

### Thirty-five Years Ago March 8, 1935

Westmount had its day in Québec City to fight the proposed Montreal Bill on Taxation.

"With derisive laughter meeting their remarks on the 'sanctity of contracts', the Westmount representatives, including Mayor John Jenkins, saw their hopes dashed Wednesday when the private bills committee of the Québec Legislature voted 31-6 in favor of the principal of the bill which, among other imposts, will increase the water rates in Westmount from 4 to 7½ percent despite the fact that this municipality has a contract definitely laying down the rate as the 4 percent which is now being paid."

"The water tax clause will mean an increase annually of \$125,000 here."

### Twenty-five Years Ago March 9, 1945

A regular "Examiner" feature of this period was a column by Howard S. Ross in which "Subjects of general interest are discussed". This week, the column was very interesting, especially in retrospect.

"The U. S. A. has had a Negro problem on its hands for many years and it is likely to be intensified after the war. The 700,000 Negroes in the U. S. Army can justly claim that they are fighting for the oppressed people in Europe and for more freedom and equality of opportunities at home."

### Fifteen Years Ago March 11, 1955

It seems that the debate over Bill 62 is 15 years later than another educational battle.

"Education, just like everything else in the world today, is moving ahead, according to Heber Matthews, principal of Aberdeen School.

"He pointed out that there was a war being waged in education these days with two groups of thought doing battle. On one hand there is a group which says education is going to the dogs' and maintains that schools are nothing but large playpens and the teachers sitters. These are the traditionals, he said.

"Another group on the 'lunatic fringe' of education would make the schools into giant playpens if given a free hand, Mr. Matthews said."

### Five Years Ago March 12, 1965

With the Montreal Urban Community now at work our lead story from only five years ago is very interesting.

"The Westmount Municipal Association has launched an all-out campaign to prevent the 'strongly rumored' implementation of recommendations contained in the Blier report.

"If the Blier recommendations, now being studied by a special cabinet committee, are implemented they would set up a Montreal General Council through which suburban municipalities would be dominated by the City of Montreal."

## Christians, be radicals, Rev. E.A. Kirker preaches

Christians need to be radicals, Rev. E. A. Kirker told his St. Andrew's congregation recently, but they must be radicals in the sense of getting at the roots of faith and life.

In a sermon entitled "On Being a Radical", he described how the people of Jesus' day failed to recognize any need for change in their society, often begging him to leave their communities because of his disturbing influence. Rejecting this reactionary position, Mr. Kirker noted that "revolution is the only hope for many people in our world, but we must differentiate between the revolution which frees and uplifts and that which devastates and destroys."

Tracing the idea of creative revolution from the Judeo-

Christian teaching about the Messiah and his kingdom, the St. Andrew's minister described the revolution initiated by Jesus as quiet but permanent, resulting in the impulse to human freedom and dignity, the basis of democratic government, the growth of humanitarian concern for the poor, the weak and the helpless, the alleviation of suffering, disease and ignorance, the challenging of such giant evils as race prejudice, economic exploitation and war.

Radicals who will go back to such fundamental issues are desperately needed today, he said. "Don't waste your energies and imaginations on second-rate causes or irrelevant matters," Mr. Kirker cautioned the young people. "Rebel against materialism, escapism, irrelevant religion if you must, but let your rebellion be creative. To be creative and lasting it must have roots which are nourished and sustained by the basic truths of our faith and the One who first proclaimed these."

# ARE YOU SELLING YOUR HOUSE IN WESTMOUNT?

Perhaps you have been thinking about it for some time — your daughters are now married and gone and your son is in his graduating year at university and after that he will be gone, too.

No doubt about it, there's just too much house for two people. You hate the thought of leaving but it makes sense to sell and so you call an agent.

Perhaps your wife has died and you are alone now and you can't wait to get out of your home with its haunting memories.

Perhaps your husband has been transferred to another city and suddenly you and your family must uproot and sell in a hurry.

Or perhaps because every street in Westmount is decorated with "For Sale" signs, you figure you'll get on the bandwagon and sell, too. Whatever the reason, you will call a real estate agent.

## How it goes

It is just possible that something like this might happen:

You really don't know whom to call because you've never sold a house in Westmount before, but you've noticed a sign on the house next door and one down the street and another across the street all from different agencies and they have been there for years so you know for certain that you won't call those agencies.

After careful consideration you decide on a small agency — after all, they should give individual attention. So you call one of these companies and after listening to a sales pitch from the owner for 10 minutes, you manage to get your name and address in and the very next day a charming, little, grey-haired lady who looks like butter wouldn't melt in her mouth arrives at your door. You sit down and have a polite chat and then slowly and carefully you make the inspection tour.

Your hands are wet and you are wondering what sort of impression your house is making, for it suddenly dawns upon you that your house is a very personal thing — the colour of the paint, the pattern on the wallpaper, every painting, every piece of furniture, every pot, every pan is you, the private you, and here you are showing it off to a stranger!

After the furnace room you return to the "L R 30 x 14.6, OFP" for the final financial talk. You will find that if you have a mortgage it isn't big enough, if you haven't a mortgage you will probably have to take one yourself at 3 percent for 20 years, or if you have a good mortgage at 6½ percent with 8 years to run you will find that it's a pity it hasn't another 20 years to go.

## Much talk

After much talk the lady asks you what you want for your house. Now you probably think your house is worth a fortune — after all, you've lived in it for many years haven't you? But you know in your heart that the Swanson's down the street only got \$40,000 for their house last year, and you know what everybody is asking and not getting for the houses in your neighborhood. And so a nice warm glow spreads over you when the agent mentions a figure about \$9,000 in excess of what you have ever expected to get and you feel like clutching this dear, little, well-groomed lady to your bosom for being such a sweet-heart!

Now comes the clincher — of course, she can have exclusive listing; that way you pay only 5 percent instead of 6 percent commission? At the price she's going to get for your house! Yes, yes, yes — where's the contract — fetch me a pen quick — where do I sign?

Exit sweet-talking, well-groomed, little, old lady.

You clean your house from top of bottom, sort and shuffle and tidy like you're moving out the next day. At first you are even afraid to go out without leaving someone in charge to take all the phone calls from all the anxious buyers. But alas, the only call you receive is a weekly call from above-mentioned I.O.I. saying she can't understand it, but she just hasn't had any response to her ads. What ads you ask? And you are advised that there was one in last evening's newspaper. You put on your reading glasses and at the very bottom of the page you find a minute little ad giving the agent's name and telephone number.

## Calls stop

Eventually the calls stop coming altogether and after a month of silence you call the company yourself only to receive the same sales pitch for 10 minutes from the owner. When he stops to draw breath, you point out that he has already had your house listed exclusively for those months with Miss So-and-So and where is she? Oh, she is out of town and has been for over a month, you discover. Is this the individual attention of the small agency, you wonder?

You've wasted 3 months of precious selling time. Let's try the Big Ones now — after all, with all those signs around they must be doing plenty of business. So with those potentials in mind you call a neighbor who must know; in four years she has gone through as many agents. The first on your list you cancel out — neighbor had that company exclusive and the agent promptly went off to Greece with his family for three months as soon as he took the listing. The next on your list brought only one person through her house in 6 months. So you feel well warned and you call the Big Beautiful Company geared to handle a gorgeous home such as yours.

How pleased you are when you are advised that they are sending their top agent to take your listing! He arrives two hours late and right at meal time, but he is thorough in his inspection and not the least bit concerned with the financial arrangements. Furthermore, you know he has your interests at heart when he says "Take a Photo Multiple Listing — you have a better chance of selling".

But you are more than a little disappointed when he names a selling price well below anything you had ever dreamt of. He assures you, tho', that with everybody working together (as they do in his agency) there should be no trouble in disposing of your property tout de suite. In fact, the very next day he would like permission for his colleagues to see through the house. How many? Oh, 15 or so!

Well — this is it, you think, you spend a sleepless night wondering you should have cleaned the windows and washed the curtains. The next day eight people arrive at various times and beat Roger Bannister by several seconds in their inspection tour.

## Last you see

This is the last you see of Big Agent.

B. A. is too busy to bother to return your telephone calls. On the one occasion when he does call to make an appointment he doesn't show up. Nor does he bother to call to say he isn't coming. Obviously B. A. isn't interested. Result — Big Silence!

lence when you've let the silver go unpolished and yourself likewise. Quick clean-up by you — greased lightning inspection by

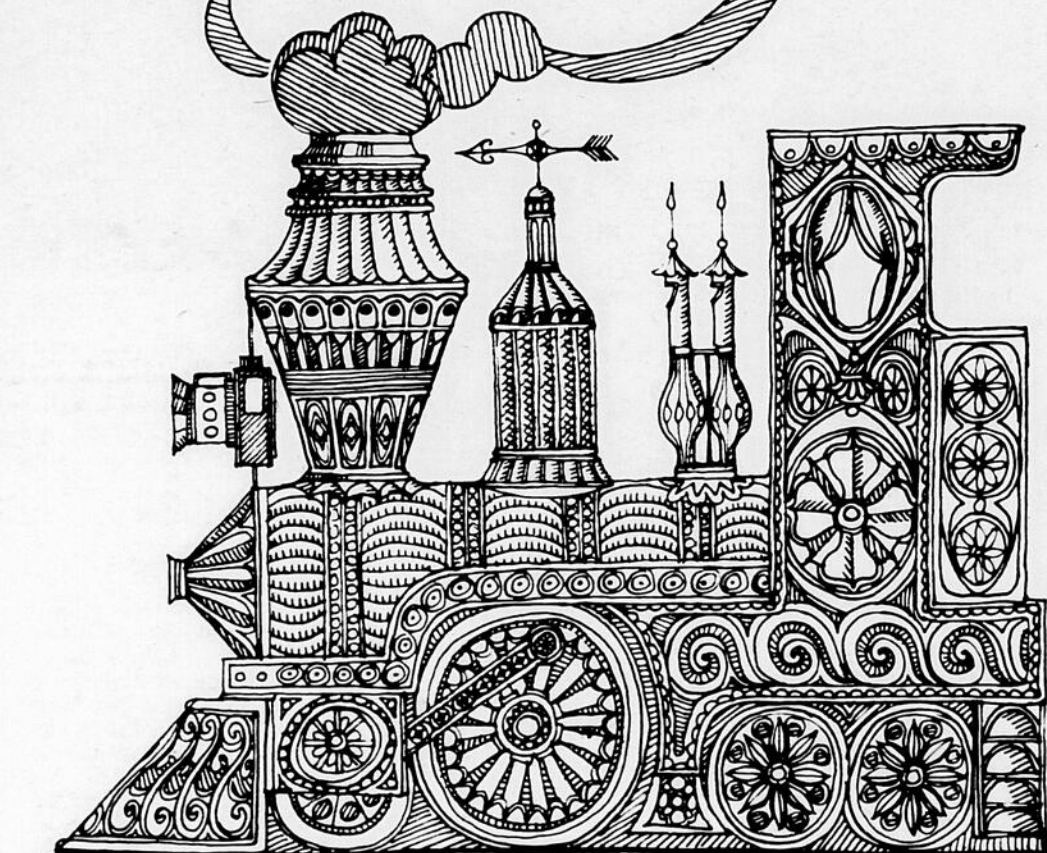
agent. And never has the nasty word "Client" or "Buyer" or "Prospect" or "Purchaser" been mentioned!

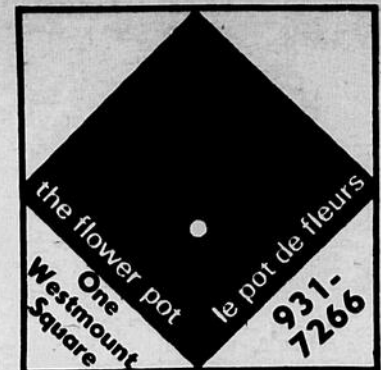

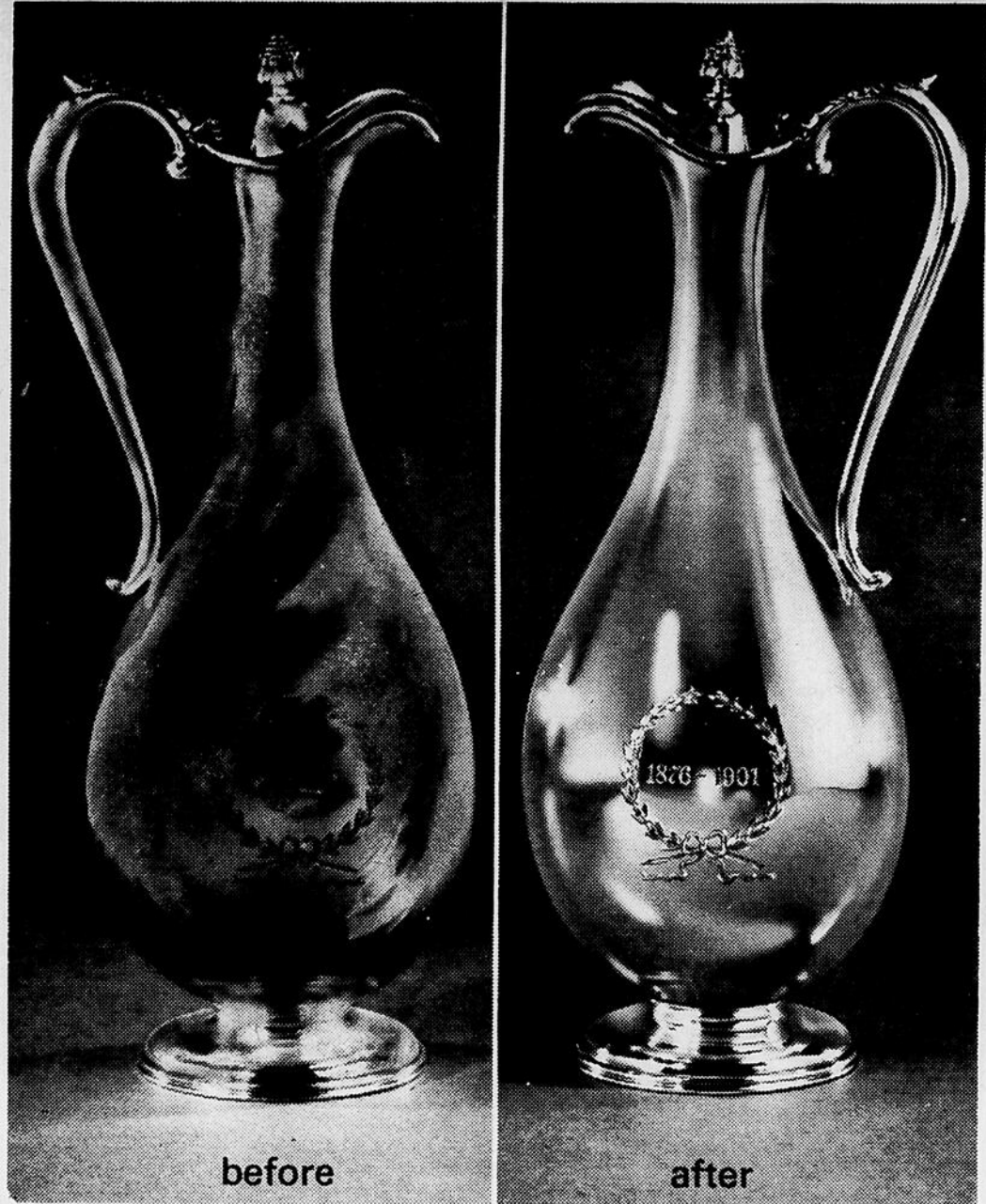

## Orthodox mark special Sunday

Since it is common faith, and not administration, that unites all Orthodox Christians of different nationalities, they celebrate the great yearly occasion of the Sunday of Orthodoxy together.

The Montreal celebrations will be held this Sunday at 7:30 pm in St. George's Greek-Orthodox Cathedral, 2455 Côte St. Catherine road. It is organized by the Eastern Orthodox Clergymen's Association of the Province of Québec, which consists of priests from the Antiochian, Greek, Roumanian, Russian and Ukrainian Orthodox Churches of Montreal. A main feature of the ceremony, in which all the priests and various choirs will take part, will be a procession around the church by the priests carrying icons.

## 'Substance' topic for Scientists

The contentment that comes only with spiritual progress will be emphasized at services in all Christian Science churches this Sunday in the Bible lesson on "Substance." Typical of Scripture selections is this from Matthew: "No man can serve two masters: for either he will hate the one, and love the other; or else he will hold to the one, and despise the other. Ye cannot serve God and mammon."

Explanatory passages from the denominational textbook will include: "The denial of material selfhood aids the discernment of man's spiritual and eternal individuality, and destroys the erroneous knowledge gained from matter or through what are termed the material senses".

appropriate funds, relate mainly to exclusively Federal Government programs.

It is in this latter category that the government has flexibility in the allocation of financial resources.

The validity of the distinction between statutory and non-statutory expenditures is borne out by figures. The budgetary estimates for 1970-71 amount in total to \$12,910 million, approximately \$892 million or 7.4 percent more than the total estimates of \$12,018 million for 1969-70. Statutory expenditures, however, are going up by 11.5 percent, while non-statutory expenditures are being restrained to a rate of 3.8 percent.

One word of caution here. When the Federal Government talks about restraint, it means just that. Instead of going ahead with three capital projects we are proceeding with two. Instead of slashing our existing manpower by 25 percent we are making very slight cutbacks and hiring fewer people.

There are obviously areas where the Federal Government has decided to increase spending and as well to decrease or hold spending. National Defence's spending, for instance, is being frozen at \$1.8 billion for the next three years. Increased spending in areas such as national unity, education and economic development here in Canada and in the developing countries indicate the government's basic priorities.

Finally, I would suggest to those who are at all interested in how the Federal Government is managing its financial and manpower resources, to pick up a copy of the '70-'71 estimates at the Queen's Printer shop on St. Catherine street.

The controversial white paper on taxation gets critical scrutiny by a panel at Mount Royal Town Hall next Wednesday at 8 pm. Eldon Woolliams, QC, MP, Hon. Hugh John Flemming, PC, MP, John Meyer, managing editor of The Gazette, R.J.P. Dawson, CA, Mayor of Mount Royal, and Dr. J.R. Peters, economist, Morgan, Ostiguy & Hudon, get together in the prime minister's own riding to exchange views on the proposed government tax reforms. The general public is invited.

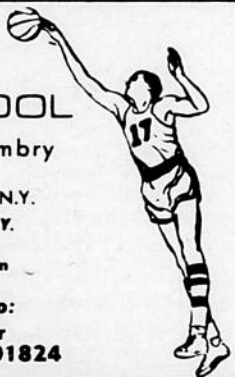

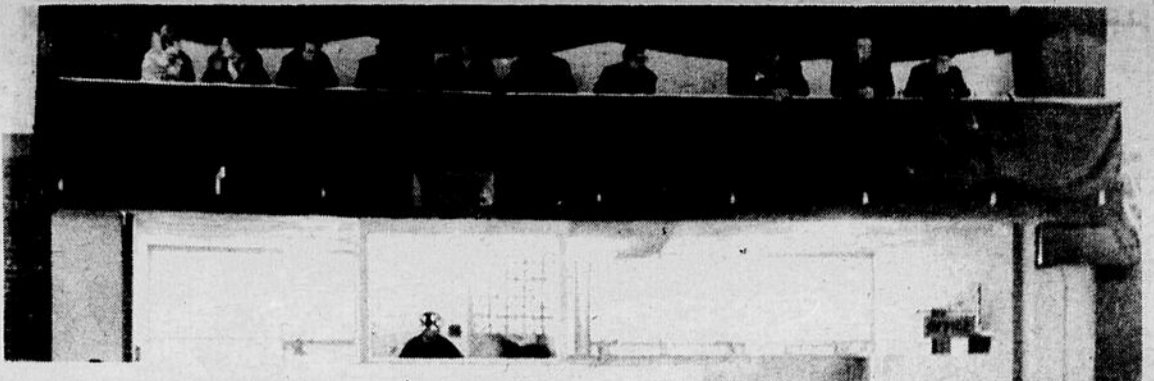
