Consolidated merger with Bathurst Paper

Consolidated Paper Corporation Limited and Bathurst Paper Limited have decided to merge by an exchange of a new issue of Consolidated preferred shares plus warrants for the Class A and Common shares of Bathurst.

G. M. Hobart, Chairman of the Board and President of Consolidated, says a merger will create opportunities for close

mutual support in manufacturing, market development, sales and research.

R. L. Weldon, Chairman of the Board of Bathurst, and R. A. Irwin, President, say a merger of the two companies will provide a broader integrated participation in forest product and packaging markets and strengthen by mutual support, the activities in which both companies are engaged.

"Venturers"

A new Scout program

Six Boy Scout executives spent two and a half years to draft guidelines for a new program in Scouting which will go into effect in Canada on January 1, 1967. The program is called "Venturers" for boys 14 to 17 years old.

Cubs are in packs, Scouts are in troops but Venturers will be in companies. They will wear a distinct uniform for dress but the design of dress at meetings will be determined by each company.

The symbol is a big V with a bird in flight through it. Each company will have a president, vice-president, secretary, treasurer and executive responsible for handling funds and administration. To be a Venturer it isn't necessary to have been a Cub or Scout and the Venturer's promise is to love God, respect and help one's fellow-man, honour and serve one's country.

Although it is not official yet, there are already ten thousand Venturers in Canada sponsored by various schools, churches and youth organizations, businesses, industries and associations and trade unions.

Venturers must engage in activities that will involve them at least once a year in each of the following areas: Competence — development of adult skills like driving, hunting safely, first aid, ham radio operation.

Cultural and Social like art, music, drama and hobbies.

Exploration to meet and know people outside the immediate circle of friends—this is an exploration of people, not places.

Fitness to develop physical capacities to the full, by participation in a variety of interesting challenging physical activities of sports and camping.

Service to and respect for one's fellowman such as making special equipment for use in a home for handicapped.

Vocational, such as gaining experience in a variety of vocations with an eye on the future, visiting local plants, inviting speakers, watching films on various occupations.

Some activities of Venturers so far have been felling trees, to build two log cabins, furnished with rustic chairs, tables and bunk beds also made by the group, for a place to stay with ready access to miles of forest and bush, near Peterboro.

Another company of Venturers has a Sweizer 2022c Sailplane and its members over 16 are taking gliding instruction while the younger ones take flying instruction.

Other groups do something and ter they study navigation, theory of flight, cloud formation, meteorology, aerodynamics, maintenance and repair.

skin diving and a group in Hudson Heights has developed itself into a highly skilled search and rescue team. A Toronto Venturer company builds and races go-carts and develops skills such as welding, motor mechanics and road safety.

In Calgary a Venturer company is practicing techniques of mountain climbing and another is camping in the Rockies with pack horses.

An Ottawa company goes on canoe trips in Algonquin Park; one in Lethbridge is studying courses in law and law enforcement with full co-operation from the police forces and OPP the course being awarded.

Venturers in Toronto are taking pictures of Scouting in Action, have bought photo equipment and are developing and printing their own work, studying photography with experts.

In Burnaby, Venturers are making a study of every business in town and another group has organized a summer employment service. In Scarborough Venturers started their own plastics company where they manufacture and sell "woggles".

BREAD OF LIFE

When it was found that prepared grain, when dampened and heated formed an edible substance that satisfied hunger, maintained health and provided energy, primitive man stopped his nomadic wanderings in search of food and settled down to a tribal and domestic life.

The discovery of bread is one of the world changing events in history, equal in importance to the discovery of fire and the invention of the wheel.

Through the ages bread has taken its part in the lives of the rich and the poor, the civilized and the savage, and has even been woven into the fabric of certain religions.

In 1953, the Food and Drug Act in Canada was amended by the federal government so bakers could use enriched flour making white bread the carrier for iron and the three vitamins of the B-complex group, thiamine, niacin and riboflavin. Each one-ounce slice of white bread now provides 2.5 grams of good quality protein, at least 20 milligrams of calcium and a high level of easily digested carbohydrates and contains about 75 calories—the same as a glass of skim milk.

The reason for the addition of vitamins to bread was that surveys after World War II indicated that a large segment of the population suffered from vitamin deficiency diseases and mild anemia.

Bread is one of the most inexpensive foods, pound for pound, on the market today.

No it isn't Bread Week or anything like that. It's just a good time, with the rising cost of food getting so much attention, to mention that good old bread is still around to be eaten alone, with butter, peanut butter, jam, honey etc . . . or as a sandwich, or in some other way such as meat loaf or bread pudding, being not only cheap but nutritious. Also it's good.

Pioneers

The Editor,
The Equity,

My grandparents, Alexander Kilgour and his wife Janet Norval were married in Fifeshire, Scotland in 1824. He was a stone-mason and this being so, we often wondered why he passed Ottawa, as stone-masons were in good demand in Byetown (Ottawa) at the time. They had six children and in the year 1840, they heard that it was easy to obtain land in Canada. Therefore they decided to give it a try. They sold their stone-house in Scotland and embarked on a sailing ship for the trip to Canada. I think the ocean crossing and getting settled in Clarendon is worthy of note, which I will try to relate with my limited ability and meagre information.

The sea journey was a heart-breaking experience: storms, contrary winds, and damaged sails caused consternation and distress. My grandparents were six weeks on the ship before reaching Montreal. How they got to Clarendon or how long it took them, I do not know. But, I do know that they bought Lot two on the Seventh range of Clarendon. It was all bushland. Their first cottage was built about 300 yards from the 7th line near a good Creek at that time and an excellent Spring so they had drinking as well as washing water. What a setting for a young wife with 6 children, the youngest only one year old; and she herself only 38 years old.

With very limited means when the flour got low, grand father would pack his Mason tools and go to Ottawa, and with his earnings he would buy some flour and send it up the Ottawa River by boat.

To create a farm from the virgin forest constituted a lot of hard work: huge timber had to be cut, brush piled and burned, and stumps removed. Harvests were gathered by the wielding of scythes and cradles from dawn to dusk. After a day of that work, they did not need any beauty-rest mattresses or sleeping pills to encourage sleep. Their cottage or shanty served the purpose for a period and later they built a good log house with a stone fireplace and stone chimney. Also a log barn and stables about half a mile from the 7th Line between where the present homestead is situated and worked by the third and fourth generations.

The fields are now reaped by combines and bailers. My father, George Kilgour was the only one of the family born in Canada. My mother was Mary Jane Hammond, who married my father on June 12, 1879. In spite of the fact that their work was strenuous they both by reason of strength, plus the Scots special rolled oats porridge reached the four score mark.

Not many young girls today would care to go into a farm home, raise a young family and care for two aged people in their declining years; as well as entertaining uncles and aunts coming around to see that all was well. Mother told me a great deal of their first years together and of the family history as they related it to her. They were Presbyterians and as such, Sunday was strictly observed for rest and worship. Every night before retiring, grandfather would read a portion of his Gaelic Bible. They all got down on their knees and thanked God for His care over them. Worship was held in their home and others homes until the first Methodist Church was built at the front of the old cemetery many years later.

Mother was never noted as a singer, but she did sing a lot as she worked, which caused grandmother to remark in her Scottish brogue. "A contented mind finds no slavery".

My grandfather was known as a very muscular man. Building and handling stone from an early age contributed greatly to this end. Father told me that even when he was a man, and grandfather was well on in years that he could not equal him in a day's work. I have no evidence that grandfather entered into politics of any kind. He devoted his time to home-making and left politics to the Irish who had settled in Clarendon Centre as it was called at that time. Some years later it was called Shawville.

Many important things happened during the year grandfather came to Canada. To mention two viz: (1) This was the year that New Zealand celebrated the signing of the Peace Treaty with Britain. (2) Governor Charles Thomson, late Lord Sydenham, persuaded Upper Canada's (Canada's compact) to join Lower Canada by promising that their heavy public debt would be shared equally; that English would be the official language and that each Province would hold an equal number of seats in the joint Assemblies. Little opposition was offered by Lower Canada's "Chateau clique" nor by the French speaking population, whose Assembly had been suspended since the Rebellion. The Act of Union was passed in 1840. We have drifted a long way from that. Personally I think with many others and like the USA that one language official for all is more conducive to comradeship and mutual understanding.

It seems that Mr. Masse and other French politicians want all communication in Quebec to be expressed in French only, and that both English and French should be used in all other parts of Canada. I know a little Hamlet up the Ottawa, called Shawville, whose inhabitants will not agree with Mr. Masse's views. What kind of a place is it around Shawville? I say good, when I arrived at first I could not walk a step and had to be carried from place to place. In fact I did not walk much for there. I repeat "What kind of over a year. You see I was born people live around there? Well, I can tell you that if anyone has a misfortune, as we did when, in the Fall of 1923 we lost our son's crops in it. Getting my large bank barn with the sea-hands and feet badly burned, letting out calves—they could only come to one conclusion, viz the Shawville and district folk are wonderful. At that time the friends and neighbors contributed generously of their time and

I have found it very hard to commit the mortal remains of many friends to their last resting place. Although I have been a minister and preaching for over 30 years, it seems that I am more impressed than I have ever been about the brevity of time and the certainty of Eternity. One is increasingly glad that we have a glorious Gospel of Good News embodied in the Person of our dear Lord Jesus, who is worthy of our highest commendation, for He has abolished death and brought immortality to light by the Gospel.
