

# Old School Building To Go In New Recommendations On Addition To School

The Huntingdon Board of Protestant High School Commissioners met at the school, on Thursday evening, for the regular July meeting with all members present.

After the reading of the minutes and passing a number of bills, a tender was read for painting six rooms at the school. The tender was for \$1,900.00, which the Board considered too high. It was finally decided to have the caretaker do some of the work and pay him extra for it. It was decided to have three rooms done for \$100 each with the Board supplying the paint. If when these are completed and both parties are satisfied, they wish to continue with the other three, the same agreement will prevail.

A letter was read regarding permission to make a loan to buy the balance of the Walsh property and the secretary was authorized to proceed with the next steps to close the sale.

Chairman Lyell Graham reported to the Board on the visit of an Engineer from the Dept. of Education, Quebec, on June 24th, to advise the best course to be followed in regard to the addition to the school. He advised the Board to pull down the old school and the corridor between the two schools and build onto the remaining portion. This would give a building 93 feet long by 60 feet wide and match up with the existing building. In a rough sketch he showed there could be nine more classrooms, a teachers' room and a

principal's office and a laboratory. He suggested that Home Economics room remain where it is and that a partition be taken out of the lunch room to make a larger manual training room. The cafeteria could be placed in the basement of the new building. He estimated the cost of this for the building at \$220,000 and a total including extras and the interest on the bonds at \$254,000.

He explained that the architect could draw plans to fit in the rooms to suit the requirements of the Board and with the necessary fittings and accessories.

The Board after discussing the matter came to the conclusion that this was the better plan and decided to call the architect to meet with them in the very near future to discuss new plans and then draw them up.

Following this, discussion centered on bus routes and contracts and it was decided to meet the bus drivers and talk this matter over with them and present the findings at the next meeting. During the discussion it was revealed that some bus drivers were picking up passengers and bringing them to town. It was warned that this would not do, but it is not possible in case of an accident and the drivers are to be asked to discontinue this practice.

The meeting adjourned to the call of the chairmen when the architect could arrange to meet with the Board.

# Nothing To Prevent Alderman C. Lalonde Retaining Council Seat

According to advice received, Alderman Lalonde's seat on the Huntingdon Town Council is safe. He has received a letter from the Deputy Minister of Municipal Affairs, which states that an amendment was made to the law whereby persons holding a grocery store permit to sell beer, are not subject to the restrictions applied to other vendors of liquor. Therefore, he is not required to resign his seat on the council.

A controversy was caused by a lawyer's letter sent to Alderman Lalonde, which demanded his resignation in view of the fact that he sold beer on a grocery permit and therefore was not eligible to serve as alderman.

The present letter should clear up any doubt as to Alderman Lalonde's eligibility to serve on the council of the Town of Huntingdon.

# Promoted To Rank Of Colonel

OTTAWA — Army Headquarters have announced the following appointment: Lt.-Col. Herve Charlebois, CD, RCAC, 45, of Valleyfield, Que., now Deputy Director of Chaplain Services (Roman Catholic), Army Headquarters, Ottawa, to be appointed Director of Chaplain Services (RC) and promoted to the rank of Colonel, effective 1 July, 1957.

Col. Herve Charlebois, CD, RCAC, was born in Valleyfield, Que., in February, 1912, and is a graduate of the University of Montreal in arts and theology.

He joined the Canadian Army in September, 1940, and during the Second World War served in the United Kingdom, Italy and Northwest Europe.

On his return to Canada, Col. Charlebois held various chaplain appointments with military districts across Canada until March 1947, when he was appointed Command Chaplain at Headquarters, Prairie Command, Winnipeg.

In October, 1950, he was promoted to his present rank and appointed Command Chaplain at Headquarters, Central Command, Oakville, Ont. Three years later he was appointed Command Chaplain at Headquarters, Quebec Command, Montreal.

In April 1954, Col. Charlebois was appointed to his present post as Deputy Director of Chaplain Services (RC) at Army Headquarters, Ottawa.

Col. Charlebois was assistant parish priest at St. Joseph's Church, Huntingdon, from 1937 to 1940.

# Violent Electrical Storm Little Damage Reported

After a weekend of storms during the recent holiday week-end, this district was treated to another violent outburst on Wednesday evening, which lasted well into the early hours of Thursday. Threatening at about 6 o'clock, the storm burst in fury at about 7 p.m. and plunged the area in almost total darkness except for the brilliant flashes of light. A heavy downpour of rain in cloudburst proportions preceded the electrical part of the storm and then accompanied by high wind, hail began to fall about the size of marbles. Severe lightning bolts, with occasional claps of thunder, added to the terror of the storm.

Almost at the start, the lights and power were shut off in a few parts of town and later the power was restored. The damage for about one hour. Again trees suffered damage and some of them were struck by the lightning bolts. Streets were soon running inches deep in water as the sewers were unable to carry the torrents of water which poured down from the skies. The storm eased up several times, only to return with almost equal violence and more rain and hail. It was 9 p.m. before the storm violence and rain subsided somewhat and the lights and power came back on.

It is reported that two cows in the barn of Harvey Campbell were struck during the storm and killed. Mr. Campbell was in the barn at the time milking, when a cow behind him suddenly fell to the floor, but fortunately was not hurt. The bolt struck two other cows further along the line and missed one cow between the two. These cows were killed by the shock, although there were no marks on them to indicate that they had been struck. Several phones were put out of order in various parts of the district and some transformers were struck which caused the power to fall.

peacefully, harmoniously, neighborly. To be able to discuss our problems and to reach fearless decisions which will be upheld at all times. Sure, we have discussed matters with Russia, but never have we arrived at a truly satisfactory solution to the problems involved.

Could it be that this new move on the part of Russia is a sign of fear of the strength of the Western world? Is she at last beginning to realize that we are not bluffing and that we can meet any threat she may wish to make?

Khrushchev would seem to have obtained for himself, the same, or even greater power than that held by Stalin. After Stalin's death, the power in Russia was divided among several of the prominent heads and there has been much division on the important matters since. From reports received, it would also seem that orders have already gone forth which will allow the ordinary Russian subject more freedom from regimentation of the Communist regime.

There has been much talk of late about living in co-existence. According to the dictionary definition, this means "Existence at the same time with another; contemporary existence." The word Existence — "The state of being or existing; continuance of being; that which exists; an entity." As we see it, this is nothing new, it has been going on since the world began. What we want, is to live

a Commonwealth Trade Agreement. Today, Canada has so many natural resources which are needed in Commonwealth countries, but payment being necessary in dollars is a deterrent to the trading. No doubt if a trade conference could be held, these matters and any difficulties could be ironed out to the betterment of all concerned.

We believe the Prime Minister is on the right track and if his plan can be worked out, that it will mean continuing prosperity for this country and for all countries of the Commonwealth. Neither do we think that it would have any repercussions in regard to trade with other countries, or a lessening of investments in Canada. In fact, it might well be that more would wish to invest in this country. It would also seem that conflicting goods imported into this country could be better controlled by balanced trading in the goods most needed by each of the countries.

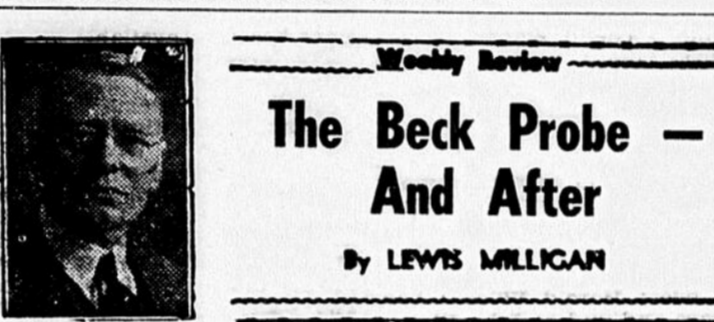
Looking Back Along the Trail

"Echoes of the Past" A Reminiscence of the Skirmish at Baker's

John Anderson of Elgin, died on Saturday, February 19, 1898, at the patriarchal age of 86. He was an early settler and in 1837 joined the volunteer units and was present at the unfortunate affair at Baker's on the 8th Nov, 1837, at which Wm. King was shot.

The skirmish happened about half past 3 in the afternoon. The weather was cloudy, and rain, in big drops was beginning to fall. Our company was between the road and the river when the order was given by Colonel Campbell to retire.

Such was the account given of his neighbour's death by Mr. Anderson, the early settler, who had been in the Indian and cowardly, for had he not given the fatal order to retire the rebel position would have been carried, and in all probability, without the loss of a single life.
