AIRSHIP REACHED LAKEHURST THIS MORNING Second Liberal May Enter Local Bye-Election Fight

Giant Zeppelin Completes Trip Across Atlantic

ZR-3 Was Safely Moored at Her New Berth at the Naval Air Station at Lakehurst, N.J., This Morning—Giant Air Vessel Made Journey from Friedrichshafen, Germany, to New Home, a Distance Estimated at Five Thousand Miles, in Eighty-One Hours and Twenty-Five Minutes—Crowds Shouted Welcome in Seeing Zeppelin Early This Morning Over New York—Was Escorted to Airdrome by U. S. Airplanes.

AIRDROME, LAKEHURST, N.J., October 15.—The giant Zeppelin ZR-3 was safely moored in her berth at the naval air station, airdrome, Lakehurst, at 10.45 a.m. today.

She completed her journey from Friedrichshafen, Germany, a distance estimated at five thousand miles, in eighty-one hours and twenty-five minutes.

MARKS FOURTH SUCCESSFUL ATTEMPT OF HUMANS TO SPAN WATERS OF ATLANTIC IN NON-STOP FLIGHTS

(Associated Press Despatch.)

AIRDROME, Lakehurst, N.J., Oct. 15.—The safe arrival of the ZR-3 from Friedrichshafen, Germany, marks the fourth successful attempt of humans to span the waters of the Atlantic Ocean in nonstop flights.

Aeronauts experts of army and navy regard it as the most significant, if not the most spectacular flight. They declared today as the huge liner ended the longest continuous aerial passage in history and headed toward her berth to settle peacefully and be tied up, that the world was witnessing undeniable evidence that the dirigible was destined to be the inter-continental passenger ship of the near future.

It has been five years since the forerunners of this latest feat were recorded, since 1918, when the perilous currents hovering over the North Atlantic were negotiated in land-to-land ventures by United States seaplanes.

FEAT OF BRITISH AVIATORS

The British team of Alcock and Brown, Royal Flying Corps men, took the air at St. John's, Newfoundland, in a Vickers Vimy biplane on June 14, 1919. They dropped their landing gear on the rock-rimmed coast and headed eastward. Sixteen hours and twelve minutes later, having traversed 1,932 miles of sleet and fog, they plunged with their craft into a bog near Clifden, Ireland.

The machine was a wreck, fit only for transportation to a London museum. The two aviators were battered in the crash, but a record that still stands had been made.

Hawker and Greaves had tried the stunt before, and had been plunged into mid-ocean when their motor failed. They were rescued by a tramp steamer.

CROSSED OCEAN TWICE.

Hardly had nations ceased to gasp over the audacity of Alcock and Brown when the British dirigible rose from East Fortune, Scotland, one day in July.

One hundred and eight hours that flight continued. At the end the R-34 hovered over Mineola, Long Island, an officer descended 2,000 feet by parachute to direct her landing and the big bag was drawn down.

A few days later she headed homeward, arriving in England after a comparatively uneventful passage. She had crossed one ocean twice.

The use of non-explosive helium gas as a substitute for the treacherous hydrogen promises to make dirigible transit of the future safer than airplane travel is today.

Officers of this field, who have seen the Shenandoah perform under helium, witnessed her miraculous survival of a terrific storm, and now watch her leisurely progress on the western rim of the United States, declare that all the terror has been removed from lighter-than-air aeronautics.

They point to the recent experience of the blimp TC-5 at Langley Field. A bomb exploded aboard as she was high in the air. Had her glistening skin held hydrogen a bundle of charred wreckage and a few mangled bodies undoubtedly would have been the result.

GENERAL BEDLAM BROKE LOOSE WHEN ZEPPELIN SIGHTED OVER NEW YORK

(Associated Press Despatch.) NEW YORK, Oct. 15.—The ZR-3 was sighted over New York at 7:50 o'clock this morning.

She first came into view at Coney Island, flying high and headed toward the heart of New York City. Crowds hurrying to work halted in groups on the streets and look upward as the giant zeppelin, escorted by two airplanes, sailed majestically over their heads.

The zeppelin passed swiftly over Brooklyn, where cheers of welcome rose from thousands of throats. Hats were tossed into the air and general bedlam broke loose as the delighted

BY-LAWS WERE EXPLAINED TO RATEPAYERS

Little Criticism Offered by Citizens in Attendance at Public Meeting Held Last Night.

Although there was a fairly large number of city real estate owners present at last night's public meeting, which had been called by His Worship Mayor Braut to consider and discuss the five by-laws amounting to \$607,000 to be used for different city improvements, very little criticism was offered by the public. Each alderman clearly explained the by-law which he was fostering, and explained to the ratepayers why he considered the by-law should be passed, and just what effect it was expected to have upon the city and ratepayers in future.

The meeting was presided over by the Mayor, who explained the reason that the meeting had been called, namely, in order that the city ratepayers and aldermen might get together to thoroughly discuss the by-laws, also to give the citizens a chance of asking any questions regarding the by-laws and to clear up any difficulties which might exist regarding them. The Mayor told the meeting that the aldermen were fostering the by-laws were present and would in turn explain the object and advantages of the by-laws and answer any questions which might arise.

By-law Regarding Electrical Department.

Ald. Newton was called upon by the Mayor to explain by-law 451, which is in connection with the electric lighting system of the city. Ald. Newton called the attention of the public to the present condition of the electrical department. This department, the speaker remarked, is being very well managed, and the expenses of the department this year were of the department with the gas department this year were \$21,000 less than last year.

Ald. Newton stated that the work called for in the by-law was absolutely necessary, and only work which was absolutely necessary was even considered. He expressed the hope that the ratepayers in general would bear in mind that the passing of the by-law would not in any way change the present electric light rates, and citizens would not under any circumstances be required to pay higher rates. He also remarked that if the by-law was not passed, the present electric light rates would have to be raised in order to make the necessary changes.

Sewers and Underground Work.

Ald. Fortier explained the programme that had been drawn up concerning sewers and underground work which was to be done. Following Ald. Fortier's remarks, Ald. Skinner spoke on the same subject. The underground work is far more important than the surface work, the speaker remarked, and the work which is called for in this by-law will have to be done in some way or other, for if the city does not do it willingly it may be compelled to do so by the Provincial Health Department.

This by-law calls for \$44,000 for the construction of sewers and \$33,000 for the installation of water conduits.

One of the chief improvements called for in this by-law is the construction of a tile sewer, starting from Prospect Street, following Ontario Street, going south to Russell Street, following Russell Street to Vimy Street, then going south from Vimy Street until a point 185 feet north of Portland Avenue; from Vimy Street, a tile pipe of about 150

FAIL TO AGREE ON QUESTION OF DISARMAMENT

Swedish Cabinet Tenders Its Resignation to King Gustave—Premier and Ministers Requested to Retain Office for Present.

(Associated Press Despatch.)

STOCKHOLM, Sweden, Oct. 15.—The Swedish Cabinet tendered its resignation to King Gustave yesterday in consequence of divergent views between it and Parliament on the question of disarmament.

Ernest Trygger, the Premier, and his ministers were asked by the King to retain office for the present. After the resignation of the Cabinet had been tendered, Premier Trygger declared that as under the decisions of the Geneva conference, a general conference on disarmament would be summoned for next summer, it was his opinion that it would be injurious to the country for Parliament to undertake a solution of Sweden's defense questions at the present time. A majority of the Riksdag members, however, did not seem to share his view.

Railway Board Issues Order Disallowing Crow's Nest Pass Rates And Requiring Them To Be Withdrawn Within Two Weeks

Premier Oliver of British Columbia States Three Prairie Provinces Will Appeal Against Board's Decision, Which Overrides an Act of Parliament—Manitoba Free Press States Crow's Nest Pass Agreement Will Constitute Major Politics for Western Canada for Next Ten Years.

OTTAWA, Oct. 15.—The Board of Railway Commissioners yesterday issued an order disallowing the Crow's Nest Pass rates and requiring them to be withdrawn from operation within fifteen days from yesterday.

WILL AID BRITISH COLUMBIA FRUIT GROWERS

(Associated Press Despatch.)

VICTORIA, B.C., Oct. 15.—Removal of the Crow's Nest Pass rates will aid British Columbia fruit growers materially by reducing the discrimination against them in competition with Ontario growers, Premier Oliver said yesterday, when informed by the Canadian Press of the action of the Railway Board.

"At the same time," he added, "the Board's order does not fulfil our contention that the whole structure of the west should be altered so as to remove the present flagrant discrimination against British Columbia. It merely removes the glaring discrimination created by the enforcement of the Crow's Nest Pass rates. What the attitude of my Government will be I cannot say until I have considered the matter, but I am quite sure that the three Prairie Provinces will appeal against the Board's decision, which overrides an act of Parliament."

Three Cornered Fight In Sherbrooke Is Strong Possibility--Executive Of Liberal Party To Hold Special Meeting Tonight

Although Reason Not Officially Announced, It Is Believed that Executive Will Meet to Discuss Calling Another Liberal Convention—Felt in Some Quarters that Last Convention Which Appointed C. E. Therrien as Liberal Candidate Was Irregular—New Roll of Delegates May Be Called Out to Select New Standard Bearer—Names of Dr. Wilfrid Begin and Dr. Ludger Forest Said to Have Been Suggested.

A decided impetus was given today to the political ball in Sherbrooke County when it became known that certain members of the executive committee of the Sherbrooke Liberal Association had requested the secretary to call a meeting of the executive for this evening at eight o'clock. Although no official reason for the meeting has been announced, it is commonly thought that the meeting has been called to decide whether or not another convention of the Liberal party will be called for Sherbrooke County. If such a course is decided on and the convention takes place, there is a strong possibility that the convention will place another candidate in the fight for the seat in the Provincial Legislature made vacant by the death of the late Moise O'Bready, K. C.

Mr. E. P. McCabe, president of the Liberal Association, had no statement to make when he was consulted this morning by the Record, while the secretary, Mr. Charles MacKenzie, simply stated that he had been requested by certain members of the executive to call a meeting for this evening.

Stated Many Are Dissatisfied.

In the absence of any official announcement there are only rumors to go by, and no pronouncement can be made. The commonly expressed opinion, however, is that a large group of the Liberal party is dissatisfied with the manner in which the last convention was conducted, and hold that the election of Mr. C. E. Therrien was not the real expression of the gathering. It is thought therefore, that at tonight's meeting the executive will vote upon the question of calling for new delegates for another convention. If they decide to do this, no doubt mass meetings will be called for next Sunday in Sherbrooke city and in various parts of the county when the members will be asked to appoint delegates for a convention. It is said that this convention may be held on Monday or Tuesday. Then, if the convention takes place, a new standard bearer may be selected to contest the riding.

LONDON, October 15.—Lloyd George will not be opposed in Carnarvon by a Conservative candidate. LONDON, Oct. 15.—Premier MacDonald was given an enthusiastic send-off from Glasgow yesterday morning on his motor car election-circuit tour. The car was held up at one point by the density of the crowd.

The Premier made a series of brief speeches from his car while en route. In the course of these he referred to the Conservative and Liberal agreements in Glasgow and numerous other places, not to run candidates against each other. He said Labor's opponents seemed to be "funking." "We have frightened them so," Mr. MacDonald said, "that they are laying their heads together lest we squeeze in between them. It is not good old-fashioned politics. The more united they are against us the greater will be our victory. The Conservatives and Liberals are fighting under the banner of the white feather."

Labor, when it entered office, the Premier continued, found that owing to Tory mishandling there was ill-feeling between the Dominions and the Mother Country, which might have been critical. The Dominions had not been properly consulted in connection with the making of the Treaty of Lausanne, he said, and he had the greatest difficulty in getting the Dominions finally to consent so that the treaty might be ratified.

"My father says the Labor Government has won the confidence of the nation," said Miss Isabel MacDonald, daughter of the Premier, speaking at her father's meeting in Glasgow last night, "but he is too modest. The Government has won not only the confidence of the nation, but the confidence of the world."

"I meet ambassadors and other people from other lands and they have to admit, though perhaps not very keen to do so, that in the Labor Government of this country the world has found a friend."

Conservative Meeting on Saturday.

No further steps will be taken by the Conservative party until after their big meeting called for this Saturday night at the City Hall. At this meeting the result of the secret ballot to secure a list of suggested candidates will be announced by the committee appointed to study the ballot, and no doubt a definite date will be set for the Conservative party convention, which will be held to definitely select a candidate.

SOUTHERN CANADA POWER COMPANY EXTENDS ITS PLANT.

Canada is particularly blessed in the matter of water from which electric power may be generated. A year ago those in charge of the Southern Canada Power Company had visions of a giant power plant at Hemming's Falls on the St. Francis river. This scheme has become a reality. A sturdy concrete dam harnessing the St. Francis, has been built, as well as a power house in which during the winter six great waterwheels connected with electrical generators are to be placed. Before spring it is expected that the water of the St. Francis river will be turned through these wheels, and the electrical energy it contains will be available for use in factories, homes and streets. To ensure good service, parallel lines are being built by the company to all the points served, so that if one circuit becomes disabled another can be used. To encourage the coming of industries, an industrial department is continually at work to induce manufacturers to locate, thus building up the industrial life of the territory.

So accustomed has the public become to the convenience of electricity that the wonderful changes it has brought into life are sometimes lost sight of, as well as the care and forethought necessary to ensure a good service.

MEETING OF Y.M.C.A. BOARD OF DIRECTORS.

Last night the regular monthly meeting of the board of directors of the Sherbrooke Young Men's Christian Association was held in the board room with the president, Mr. G. S. Lothrop, in the chair. After routine business, several matters arising out of the minutes were considered. The first had reference to the proposed harvest festival, the secretary stating that only one letter had been received that was entirely favorable. The convention is to be one of the most important of Y.M.C.A. gatherings, with three outstanding world Y.M.C.A. workers, John R. Mott, of New York; the general secretary of the Scottish National Council, and the general secretary of the Chinese National Council, as chief speakers.

ELEVATE CODE OF ETHICS, SAYS PROF. I. SAWDON

Delivered Stirring Appeal for Support of Sherbrooke Symphony Orchestra at Rotary Club Last Evening.

Professor Irwin Sawdon made an eloquent appeal for a more general public interest and support for the Sherbrooke Symphony Orchestra in an address delivered last evening to the members of the Sherbrooke Rotary Club at their dinner at the New Sherbrooke House.

The ethical standards of the time and the development of the symphony orchestra as a business man's proposition was the subject of his remarks.

"Mankind is gradually getting rid of his prejudices," said Mr. Sawdon, "mankind is assuredly reaching out towards the light of the ethical standard of the kingdom of the soul, the divine order of living, accomplishing, creating."

"We have got to acknowledge that Germany, with its culture and business acumen made a fair bid to dominate the world, but unfortunately for them and fortunately for us, their military spirit, that cursed spirit of Cain, prevailed with them; the result is now history the downfall of the German Empire."

The permanent conquest of the world will never be through the force of arms, but rather through a common universal understanding of a unifying purpose, a unanimous exercise of the ethical standard commonly called the Golden Rule, developing a broader understanding compatible with the scientific and artistic culture of each era of history.

"Of the arts, music is fitted to be and is recognized as the language of the soul, may it be more than a language, it is not confined to any nation, its appeal is universal as Hayden said to Mozart when asked if he were not afraid to visit a foreign country because he did not speak its language: 'My language is spoken all over the world'."

"By virtue of Beethoven the years 1770 to 1820 present, perhaps, the greatest example. Musical art has become the main element of aesthetic culture throughout the civilized world and it is reasonable to suggest, is the gateway to that greater soul-life of which the Christian era is the forerunner. Beethoven's call was of the spirit. He dwelt with the soul. His life was full of the purest effort towards the greater soul-life, scornful of all tending to mediocrity or worldly social advantage, a life coupled with the scientific development of his time, from her earliest years striving unselfishly for the common good, unequalled may be since the time of two thousand years. His immortal symphonies embody practically all that musical science and spiritual aspiration has reached, and in the abstract sense Beethoven may be said to have pierced the veil. With the advent of the sonata and symphonic forms in music and the perfection of musical instruments, musical art received a new birth, raised from the limitations of language to heights eternal, the soul sublime."

"Where language fails music takes up the task of thought and reveals the most beautiful and perfect within. Therefore, is it unreasonable to suggest that through the power of music a common understanding shall universally prevail, that through the power of music all men shall be lifted up?"

"I am here to state that the ethical standard in particular the development of symphony orchestra, has today become a business man's proposition. I am here to state that thoughts are things just in the same proportions as brick is building material."

MUST ELEVATE CODE OF ETHICS

"We pay dearly for our mental entertainment. Our pleasures are dearly bought. What should be ethical art is exploited by agents who are invariably little more than stock jobbers out to make money irrespective of the artistic ideal they are supposed to represent. The effect on the general public is as harmful as it is distressing and will improve unless we sponsor and make strong demands for better artistic service."

"The tragedy of today is that mankind is securing authority over the secrets of nature without the moral power of using that authority wisely. This lowering of the ethical standard, this lack of moral power as a danger to civilization is now occupying the minds of our greatest financiers and business men. Business men act upon knowledge not upon supposition. We know that we are the captains of our souls. We are the masters of our fate. This we do know that the destiny of life is ours to make or mar, and without this moral force—the development of this higher self—the whole business machinery which goes to make up civilization is in danger of going to pieces."

"Ethical values are at least coming into their own, we are getting down to the rock bottom of soul effort where actual thoughts are proving to be actual things. The world's financiers are getting down to ethical facts, are studying ethical standards and including them as an imperative part of business activity. This is the silver lining, when the world's business men get together on the ethical basis, something is going to happen, the heaven hoped for has its chance of becoming a reality."

"The masterpieces of the world were created by simple men of great ethical ideals and were intended not for the smart or select few but as legacies as soul food for mankind universally."

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it should be the first objective in the education of our youth 'Seek ye first the kingdom of heaven,' should have a logical and permanent meaning in every day life. The instruments of the modern orchestra, the education of its players, its music, the biographies of its giants, should be a household words. The performance of at least one masterpiece should be a daily fact in every community."

"The dignity of the modern orchestra is unquestionably revealed when heard in full ensemble, but this instrumental realm contains an infinite variety of resource, full of tender modes of expression of immeasurably greater value than the mere display of its strength bulk or weight."

"Just as the Esperanto language has for its object the closer fellowship of nations, so must we invite all people, give art a chance of eternal possession in us, draw then nearer with the help of 'its spirit,' develop that spiritual union as of a newly created world, radiant with sunshine, jubilant with the sounds of angelic strains."

CANADIANS APATHETIC

"The citizens of Philadelphia have subscribed \$5,000,000 to make permanent their symphony orchestra. All the American cities are in line and are rapidly attaining European standards in all branches of musical art, but what of Canada? The material is here but for an organized symphony orchestra we have absolutely nothing. Spasmodic attempts are made by isolated devotees, but as a permanent force there is no outstanding example for smaller communities to imitate. The situation while discouraging is not hopeless. Canadians made imperishable history during the war and rightly directed, Canada, with (Continued on page Nine)

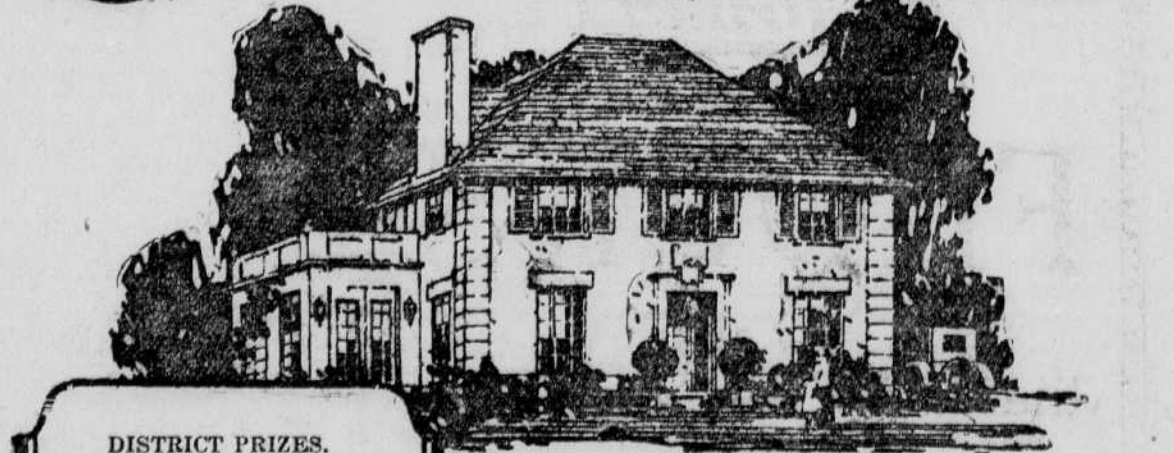

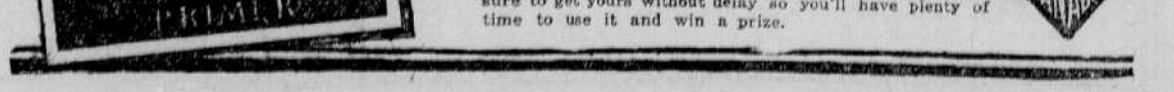

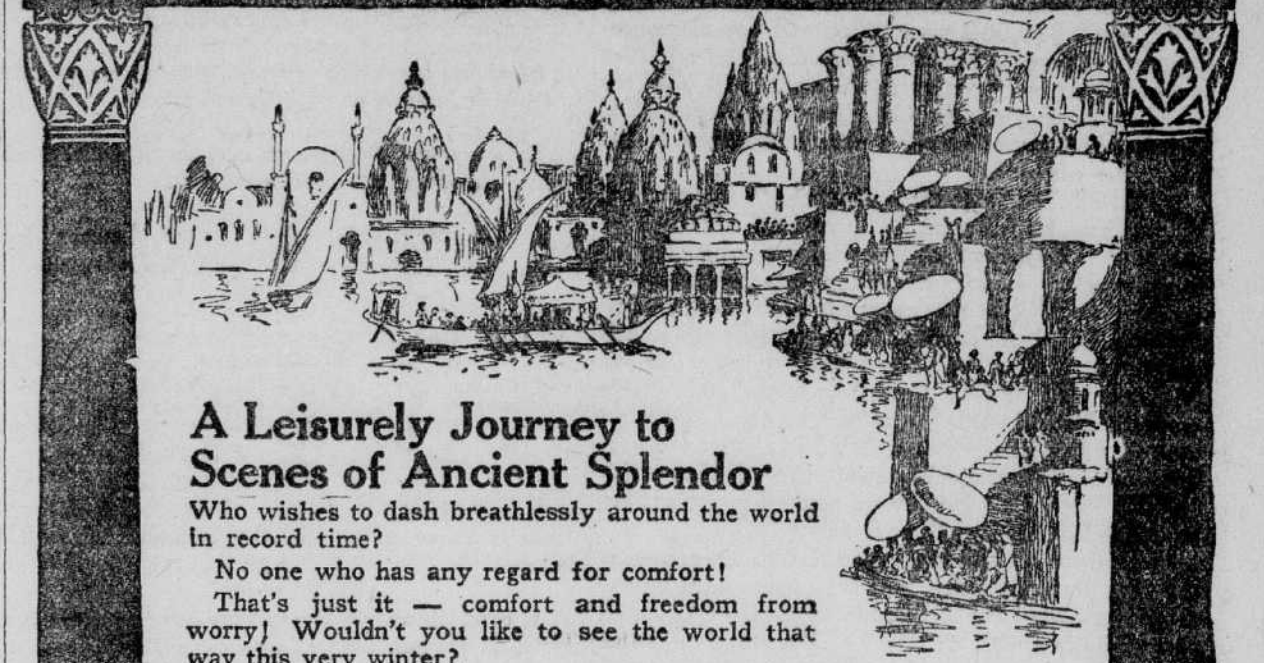

THE CITY BY-LAWS.

Five by-laws are to be voted upon by the ratepayers on Monday next. A perusal of these shows how inadequate is the information given out to the public by the Council through the short official summary published in the papers.

By-law 451, which calls for \$80,000, reveals the fact that the Electric Department is not building up adequate sinking funds. In 1918, or six years ago, \$90,000 was borrowed for improvements. These bonds are now expiring and the department has accumulated only \$10,000 towards their payment. Consequently, \$80,000 is being asked for to cover a new bond issue to replace the old one.

Article 9 of this by-law sets forth the method of payment as follows: "The annual revenues of the said department of electricity of the City of Sherbrooke, less administration expenses thereof, shall be applied to the payment of interest and to the portion of the capital of the said bonds which are redeemable yearly, and if said revenues are not sufficient to pay the interest and the above annual instalments, a sufficient annual tax, to make up the difference is hereby imposed on all the assessed immovable property of the municipality and shall be levied annually, according to the valuation roll then in force."

By-law No. 452 is intended to help square the City Hall account. \$75,000 was voted by the ratepayers for City Hall construction. \$127,649 was actually spent, or \$52,649.09 more than was voted. On a number of by-laws previously voted small amounts were left over after the expenditures had been made. This sum totals \$36,036.46. Something must be done with this surplus and the Council has devised the plan of using it as far as it will go to wipe out the City Hall over cost. Hence by-law 452.

By-law 453 is a further call for money for sewer construction. The amount asked for is \$77,000. The by-law enumerates the work that is to be done in various parts of the city. The by-law, also, provides that one-half the cost shall be reimbursed to the city over a period of forty years.

By-law 454 refers to the new Police and Fire Station and seems to be arousing special interest. In a sense it is comparable with the City Hall situation. The ratepayers originally voted \$55,000 for the construction of the new Fire Station, having sold the old one. The new by-law now calls for an additional \$65,000 for further construction and equipment. These expenditures include sheds and garage, \$10,000, automobile ladder truck, \$21,000, automobile patrol vehicle, \$2,400 and new fire alarm system, \$29,600. Considerable opposition is being manifested in regard to this by-law on the ground that costs in connection with the new fire hall are excessive and could have been to a considerable extent avoided.

By-law 455 has to do with the paving programme and calls for \$385,000 in this connection. Sidewalks construction and the macadamizing of certain streets is also provided.

The failure of the City Council to place the complete by-laws before the public caused the Citizens' Association to move for a public meeting, and to secure copies and translations of the by-laws in order that they might be examined.

Under the law, money by-laws must contain information with regard to the indebtedness of the municipality. This information is set forth in detail in by-law No. 451 and shows that the present bonded debt of the city amounts to \$5,757,000.

The total valuation of city property is \$33,353,415. Of this \$8,136,700 is non-assessable. The total assessable is, therefore, \$25,216,715. Of this \$21,948,215 is assessable for municipal purposes. \$1,608,000 is exempt from municipal tax only. \$2,160,500 is represented by machinery, taxable for school purposes only. The non-assessable is \$8,136,700.

The above summarizes briefly, but as clearly as possible, the situation before the ratepayers. The total amount of borrowings which the ratepayers are asked to approve is \$607,000. This is divided among several by-laws so they may consider each proposal independently. The present city debt and its continual growth has to be considered in this connection.

All ratepayers owe it to themselves and to their city to study the situation carefully in order that they may vote intelligently upon these important proposals.

THE MEETING AT DRUMMONDVILLE.

The Eastern Townships Associated Boards of Trade is going to Drummondville for its Fall meeting. This will be the first meeting of the Association to be held in this manufacturing town which has sprung up on the lower St. Francis.

One of the chief benefits derived from these E. T. Boards conventions comes through the getting together of Eastern Townships citizens in different centers of this Southern Quebec territory. They become acquainted with each other and with the whole section of country from which they have taken the name of their organization. The meeting in Drummondville is a week from today and if the weather is favorable it is expected many will motor over the excellent highways to spend an interesting and profitable day together.

THE BANK AMALGAMATION.

(Toronto Globe)
The latest bank amalgamation is fortunately not an emergency measure designed to forestall another disaster. Both institutions are entirely sound, and they have combined not because of the compulsion of present circumstances but with an eye to the future. The Standard Bank was founded more than half a century ago, and has played an important part in the development of Ontario especially, 116 of its 163 branches being in this Province. The smaller bank, the Sterling, is about twenty years old, and has been so conservatively managed that it has an extraordinary high percentage of quick assets, chiefly in Government and municipal securities. Although the two banks combined have 240 branches throughout Canada they are duplicated in only five places, an important factor in favor of the employees.

The amalgamation of the Standard and the Sterling is the twenty-fourth in Canada since 1900. The process cannot go much further, as most of the banks have reached proportions which preclude further concentration on the grounds urged in the past.

SERVING THE INVESTOR.

(Toronto Financial Post)
The annual meeting of the Investment Bankers' Association of America, at Cleveland, was the most successful in its fourteen years' history. In a general way the gathering showed the tremendous development of savings and investments among the masses of the people throughout the United States and Canada—for leading Canadian investment houses are members of the association.

Perhaps the next most important feature was the growing and very definite recognition on the part of the investment banker of his responsibility for the securities which were sold to his clients, and the intensive methods he took to gain information affecting those securities and the efforts he was making to protect them. Finally, there was a recognition of the great value of publicity. Not only were the meetings open to the press, but every effort was made to supply the press with advance copies and stenographic reports of discussions within an hour after they had taken place. The Association had employed a New York expert to specially look after the service. In this respect they set an example that should be followed by the Canadian investment bankers who always meet behind carefully closed doors.

THE LAST STROKE OF THE PICK.

(San Francisco Chronicle)
It is the last stroke of the pick that uncovers the gold. Up on the Mother Lode near Sutter creek, a mine once owned by Hetty Green, who permitted it to remain idle because her intuition told her there was no gold in it, has suddenly developed into a bonanza. Had Hetty Green not been influenced by a wrong "hunch" and had raked a few more dollars in sinking the shaft just a little deeper the gold that is there might have strengthened her position as the "richest woman in the world." But she did not, and any way she did not need the money, so it is likely just as well that the treasure is uncovered by those who probably do.

California as a gold producer is by no means worked out. There is many a rich vein awaiting the last stroke of the pick, many a vein left by some disheartened miner who lacked the courage and the faith to persevere. There have been many cases like that in the history of California gold mining. Notable one is that of an old Frenchman in Nevada County who, after months of labor, abandoned his claim as worthless and went his way to new diggings. Other prospectors took over his workings and the very first shot they fired in the shaft uncovered a ledge that yielded millions in gold and developed a mine that is still a big producer. The old Frenchman had bored to within a few inches of the treasure when his hunch played him a mean trick.

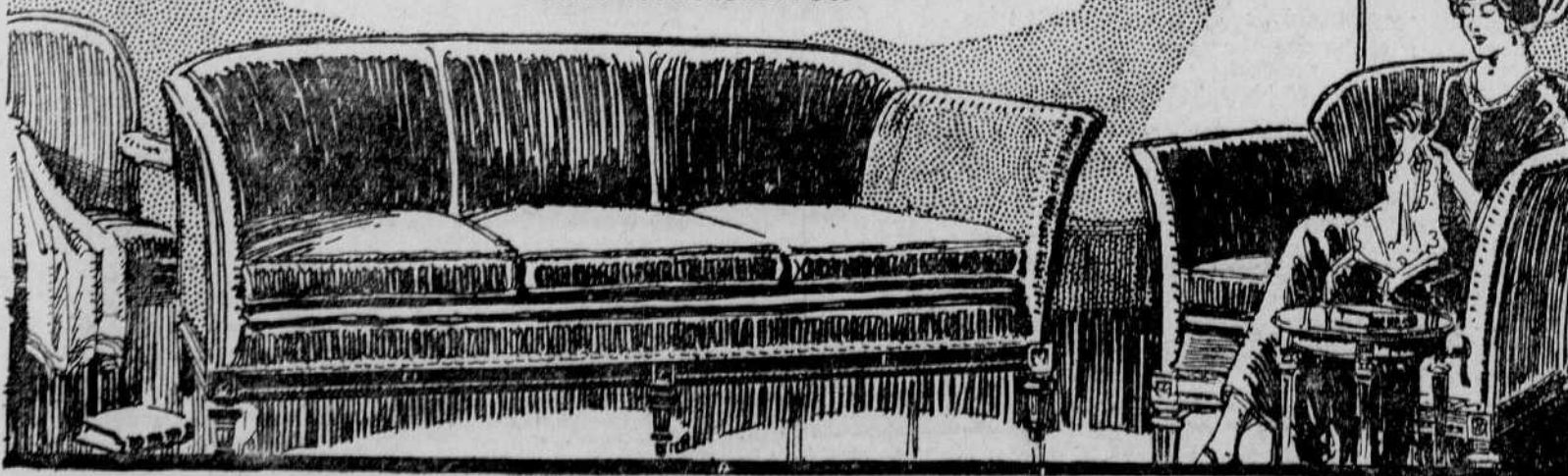

The Milagrosa.

The affair at Maracaybo is to be considered as Captain Blood's buccaneering masterpiece. Although there is scarcely one of the many actions that he fought—recorded in such particular detail by Jeremy Pitt—which does not afford some instance of his genius for naval tactics, yet in none is this more shiningly displayed than in those two engagements by which he won out of the trap which Don Miguel de Espinosa had sprung upon him.

The fame which he had enjoyed before this, great as it already was, dwarfed into insignificance by the

fame that followed. It was a fame such as no buccaneer—not even Morgan—has ever boasted, before or since.

In Tortuga, during the months he spent there refitting the three ships he had captured from the fleet that had gone out to destroy him, he found himself almost an object of worship in the eyes of the wild Brethren of the Coast, all of whom now clamoured for the honour of serving under him. It placed him in the rare position of being able to pick and choose the crews for his augmented fleet, and he chose fastidiously. When next he sailed away it was with a fleet of five fine ships in which went something over a thousand men. Thus you behold him not merely famous, but really formidable. The three captured Spanish vessels he had renamed with a certain scholarly humor the Cloth, Lachesis, and Atropos, a grimly jocular manner of conveying to the world that he made them the arbiters of the fate of any Spaniards he should henceforth encounter upon the seas.

In Europe the news of this fleet, following upon the news of the Spanish Admiral's defeat at Maracaybo, produced something of a sensation. Spain and England were variously and unpleasantly exercised, and if you care to turn up the diplomatic correspondence exchanged on the subject, you will find that it is considerable and not always amiable.

And meanwhile in the Caribbean, the Spanish Admiral Don Miguel de Espinosa might be said to use a term not yet invented in his day—to have run amuck. The disgrace into which he had fallen as a result of the disasters suffered at the hands of Captain Blood had driven the Admiral all but mad. It is impossible, if we dispose our minds impartially, to withhold a certain sympathy from Don Miguel. Hate was now this unfortunate man's daily bread, and the hope of vengeance an obsession to his mind. As a madman he went raging up and down the Caribbean seeking his enemy, and in the meantime, as an hors-d'œuvre to his vindictive appetite, he fell upon any ship of England or of France that loomed above his horizon.

I need say no more to convey the fact that this illustrious sea-captain and great gentleman of Castile had lost his head, and was become a pirate in his turn. The Supreme Council of Castile might anon condemn him for his practices. But how should that matter to one who already was condemned beyond redemption? On the contrary, if he should live to lay the audacious and ineffable Blood by the heels, it was possible that Spain might view his present irregularities and earlier losses with a more lenient eye.

And so, reckless of the fact Captain Blood was now in vastly superior strength, the Spaniard sought him up and down the trackless seas. But for a whole year he sought him vainly. The circumstances in which eventually they met are very curious.

An intelligent observation of the facts of human existence will reveal to shallow-minded folk who sneer at the use of coincidence in the arts of fiction and drama that life itself is little more than a series of coincidences. Open the history of the past at whatsoever page you will, and there you shall find coincidence at work bringing about events that the merest chance might have averted. Indeed, coincidence may be defined as the very tool used by Fate to shape the destinies of men and nations.

its glorious heritage and possibilities will not be found in the sphere of organized art. Canada shall find its national soul. Here is where it concerns us as citizens of the Eastern Townships. Why should not we set the example for the whole of Canada? We have the goods, all we now need is to get together and push this objective to its highest issue.

"I should be very sorry if I had wasted the time you have allowed and honored me with. You are all busy men, in fact, in this mad rush for financial success, many of us have scarcely time to think of the finer material that goes to make life possible. We must not forget that without the ethical standard, business and even civilization would be impossible.

SHERBROOKE'S ORCHESTRA
"Yet let me say, we in Sherbrooke have in the Sherbrooke Symphony Orchestra an organization to be proud of, and it is on behalf of this organization that I have prevailed with you and which calls for your serious consideration. Unlike the larger orchestra of America, whose players are mostly foreigners, our plan is to develop the talent in our own midst. Our players are your citizen's sons and daughters striving to emulate the highest and noblest that life offers, and be it said there is absolutely nothing that gives a greater return for community advancement than the true type of citizenship than the development of its symphony orchestra. All phases of intellectual emanate from it.

"Our organization is now beyond the experimental stage. We have a complete list of fifty players. We gave eight symphony concerts in Sherbrooke and district last winter. All this has been accomplished without begging. All this is the result of sustained effort on the part of its members covering a period of twelve years.

"It will advance as you co-operate with it. Its possibilities are legion. It has only scratched the surface of what it may reach. From experimental stage it should now take its leap to a fuller and more aggressive policy.

"It now needs a committee of business men who will study its aims and arouse a sustained public interest. In Europe influential gentlemen consider it an honor to be associated with such enterprises. Why should it not be so here?

AN APPEAL

"I unhesitatingly state that there never was a nobler or worthier cause presented for your consideration, and there never will be a greater satisfaction than that derived from pioneering this objective to its highest issue; a position by virtue of its worth it deserves in your hearts a symbol of the artistic—the ethical standard which Sherbrooke shall maintain in the eyes of the world. Given this co-operation there is no earthly reason why it should not at once attain this higher objective without any individual financial responsibility. To be of real value these concerts should be given at least forthrightly; as it is, I repeat, we only scratch the surface of their usefulness.

"Gentlemen, you have given millions to build churches and charitable enterprises. This is not an appeal for bricks and mortar or for money; its appeal is for the very heart and soul of things, its appeal is to create the atmosphere where the essence of religion, the character building of your sons and daughters may be helped in its highest and noblest sense: a condition where old and young, performer or listener irrespective of race or creed can equally share and participate, and be it said without your Symphony Orchestra that condition can only be developed in part and your community correspondingly suffers.

"This is an age of luxury. There are some luxuries we can do without, but this orchestra is not a luxury, it is an imperative necessity in the advancement of community service. We have our many fraternal societies, all emulating the highest and best principles that life gives, in short: The Brotherhood of Man. May I without offering reproach or criticism ask if the present condition is the best we can offer? Should we be satisfied with anything below the best? Is our intellectual standard in keeping with the natural beauties of the Eastern Townships, our beautiful homes, and our glorious heritage. Can our pioneers look down on us and say, "Well Done?" Gentlemen, we cannot answer that question satisfactorily. We are sadly behind the times in ethical standards. Apart from the Churches all we possess is the Movies, the dance hall, and your card parties. In this twentieth century of opportunity knowledge and greater demands upon the intellect are you content that your sons and daughters shall have no better environment than any ordinary village can offer?

"We talk of harnessing the energy of Niagara; The waterpower of the whole of Canada is a mere shadow in comparison to the enormous waste of this more precious substance we call soul vibration. Further, something should be done to sustain that moral force which shall exalt confidence between employer and employee and provide that environment where every one irrespective of age race or creed can alike co-operate on the common ground of domestic community and national uplift.

MUSIC PRACTICAL SOLUTION
"The Symphony Orchestra is the most practical solution. The members of this orchestra are splendid examples of citizenship. They have always given unselfishly of their time and talents and if they have not received the compensation they deserve or have not reached the artistic standard the symphony orchestra ideal demands the fault is rather with the general public in not co-operating with their efforts. In their way they are ministers of

THE CORRECT SLICE

STOPPING THE CLUB INSTEAD OF FOLLOWING THROUGH WILL CAUSE BALL TO GO TO RIGHT



WHEN THE INTENTION IS TO MAKE A HOOK THIS HAPPENS SOMETIMES

Pushing the ball to the right, a shot that usually finds a resting place in the tall uncut grass or a waiting sandtrap, is often mistaken for a slice.

There is considerable difference, however, as the slice is caused by a different method of hitting. The club comes onto the ball from the outside of the line while a ball pushed to the right is caused by the attempt to make a hooked shot and stopping the club at the impact.

If one intends to hook a ball it is necessary to send the club on through completing the swing. Otherwise the club coming from the inside of the line merely pushes the ball out to the right. The ball leaves the club before it has taken a full grip on it. Don't in any case try to stop the club head until it has completed its work.

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PRINCE PAID VISIT TO QUEEN CITY TODAY

Arrived Early This Morning at Windsor on Board Mr. Henry Ford's Yacht.

WINDSOR, Ont., Oct. 15.—The Prince of Wales arrived here on board the Henry Ford yacht Silla, at 2.40 this morning. He boarded his special train and left ten minutes later for Toronto.

CAUGHT BUT FLEETING GLIMPSES OF PRINCE

(Associated Press Despatch)
DETROIT, Mich., Oct. 15.—All that was possible in the way of privacy was given yesterday to the visit of the Prince of Wales, who spent a little more than two hours here as a guest of Henry Ford. From the time he left the British throne from the observation car of his special train waved his hat to the assembled throng which crowded the Highland Park yards of the Ford Motor Company until the Ford yacht Silla took him across the Detroit River early today, Detroit residents caught but fleeting glimpses of the Prince.

As soon as the Prince left his train the Ford organization threw an impenetrable wall of secrecy around the movements of the Royal guest. But despite the attempt to shield the Prince from public view, several thousands gratified their curiosity for a glimpse of the future British ruler. Crowds thronged the sidewalks as he passed the large windows of the machine room of the Highland Park plant of the Ford Motor Company. Other thousands were massed on the sidewalk near the Detroit Club, where a buffet supper was served to sixty-five guests. A like crowd watched while the Prince went to the suite reserved for him at the Detroit Athletic Club and saw him leave to go to the residence of Edsel B. Ford for a dinner and dance in the evening, and many curious ones remained until after midnight on the Edsel Ford residence hoping for a chance to see the British heir leave for his trip to Canada.

FOX HUNT ARRANGED IN PRINCE'S HONOR.

(Associated Press Despatch)
TORONTO, Oct. 15.—The Prince of Wales and his party arrived here from Detroit at 9.25 this morning, and after greetings had been extended by Lieutenant-Governor H. Cockshutt, Premier G. H. Ferguson, and members of the Ontario Cabinet, and Mayor W. W. Holtz, the Royal party motored to the King Edward Hotel for breakfast.

At eleven o'clock the heir to the British Throne left for Aurora, twenty-five miles north of Toronto, where a fox hunt had been arranged in his honor by the Toronto Hunt Club. The chase is expected to last the greater portion of the day.

ENDED LIFE BY LEAPING FROM SECOND STOREY WINDOW OF HER HOME

Mrs. Woodruff Was Regarded as One of Most Beautiful Women in World.

NEW YORK, Oct. 15.—A leap from a second storey window of her home yesterday took the life of Mrs. Helen Smith Woodruff, author and playwright, declared by Henry Stanslaw, the artist to have been one of the most beautiful women in the world. Lewis B. Woodruff, her husband, is a noted lawyer and scientist.

Mrs. Woodruff, who was born at Selma, Alabama, thirty-six years ago, suffered for several years from nervous disorders, and for two years of the time was totally blind. She was constantly under a physician's care.

EX-OFFICIALS ARE HELD IN NEWFOUNDLAND

Were Implicated in Charges of Corruption Brought Against Sir Richard Squires.

(Associated Press Despatch)
ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., Oct. 15.—True bills were returned by a grand jury here yesterday against four former officials of the Provincial Government who were implicated in the charges of corruption brought against Sir Richard Squires, former Premier. The jury last week reported no bill against Sir Richard, against whom charges of larceny of public money were preferred by Crown Commissioner Hollis Walker.

The bills were returned against Dr. Alexander Campbell, the former Minister of Agriculture; John McNeely, former liquor controller; W. H. McNeely, former chief clerk in the department of agriculture; and Wm. O'Reilly, former magistrate at Placentia. Against Dr. Campbell a single count was sustained in which he was charged with the larceny of \$72 paid for cab hire. Two others, charging larceny of \$602 were rejected. The counts against O'Reilly charged larceny of six different sums totalling \$9,000.

JURY FAILED TO REACH AGREEMENT IN MURDER TRIAL AT HALIFAX

Were Discharged in Case of Lewis Bevis, Who Is Held on Charge of Murdering Police Officer.

HALIFAX, N.S., Oct. 15.—The jury trying Lewis Bevis on the charge of murdering police officer Charles Fulton in July last reported a disagreement this morning and were discharged. They were given the case at nine-thirty o'clock last night. Fulton was shot dead while closing in on Bevis after a twenty hours' chase. A second police officer, Steve Kennedy, was seriously wounded by gun fire during the same pursuit.

SEVENTY-TWO THOUSAND PERSONS ARE IN PRISON IN RUSSIAN REPUBLIC

Of the Total, 26,000 Are Awaiting Trial and 3,000 Are Awaiting Deportation.

(Associated Press Despatch)
MOSCOW, Oct. 15.—Seventy-two thousand persons are in prison in the Russian Republic at the present time, according to a report made yesterday by the Commissioner of Justice. Of these 43,000 are serving varying terms of criminal and other offences, 26,000 are awaiting trial and 3,000 are awaiting deportation. The prison statistics for the other parts of the Soviet union were not made public.

man Langis assured Mr. Ewing that it was quite possible to have work done on Quebec Street, even with the other paving, but the Council had received no petition from Quebec Street residents and therefore did not think that they wanted paving done immediately. The speaker, however, assured Mr. Ewing that if the residents of Quebec Street sent in a petition asking for paving he was sure that the work could be done immediately, as about \$17,000 would be left over from the other paving and could be used on Quebec Street.

Construction of No 1 Station.

Ald. Lacombe, who is fostering the by-law regarding the construction and equipment of No. 1 Fire Station, was called to address the meeting and explained the work called for in that by-law.

Ald. Lacombe remarked that the Fire Department of this city had \$52,000,000 worth of property to protect, and therefore needed very good equipment.

"This by-law calls for four very important and absolutely necessary improvements," the speaker remarked. "The first is to be used for the construction of sheds and a garage, while an automobile ladder costing \$21,000 is also needed.

"The installation of a new and modern alarm system is also called for. This alarm system, with fixtures, will cost \$29,000. The by-law also provides for an automobile patrol vehicle costing about \$2,400," stated Alderman Lacombe.

Ald. Lacombe remarked that he felt sure the citizens would see the need of the improvements called for in the by-law. The Council had tried to make the amount needed for this by-law as reasonable as possible, and they felt that they were asking only for what was absolutely necessary.

BY-LAWS WERE EXPLAINED TO

Alderman Tetreault Explains.

Ald. Tetreault explained to the meeting that some time ago the city had been authorized to borrow \$30,000 for the purchase of a site for a technical school in the city. This school, however, was never built, owing to the fact that the Government did not encourage the work, and in other cities such schools had proved to be very unsatisfactory.

There was also a considerable amount of money left over from different work which the city had undertaken, and the speaker remarked that as this money had been voted for a special purpose, it could not be used for any other purpose unless the city was authorized to do so by the citizens, and the object of his by-law, he said, was to secure the permission of the citizens to turn this money over to be used for other purposes.

Ald. Tetreault said that he felt sure the citizens would see the advantage in turning this money over and allowing it to be used for permanent city improvements.

Paving By-law Brought Discussion.

Ald. Langis explained what the Council intended doing in the way of paving, and stated that the thought that all work which the Council intended doing was absolutely necessary.

The by-law calls for paving on Portland, Moore, Ball, St. Gabriel, Minto, Depot, Windsor, Bowen North, First, Goodhue, Larocque, Belvidere, Queen and Short Streets, while side-walks will be placed on Portland, Queen, Moore, Victoria, King West, Laurier, St. Gabriel, Bowen North, First, Goodhue, Larocque, Belvidere, Galt, St. Louis, McManamy, Short, Courcellette, Perry and King George Streets.

Ald. Langis stated that the present time would be the best time to have this work done. He said the present employment situation was none too good, and it was going to be out of work this winter unless something else arises. This work, which will require a little over a year's time, could be done very well by men who otherwise would be out of work. The speaker also remarked that if in the spring work should suddenly pick up and labor become very expensive, then the city would not try to compete with labor departments, but would discontinue their work until a more favorable time.

This idea was heartily endorsed by Mr. E. J. Page, who said that he was very much in favor of Mr. Langis' idea of supplying work, and also of not trying to compete with labor departments should the present condition improve.

Mr. Robert Ewing addressed the meeting and remarked that according to the paving programme, work was to be done on Victoria Street. Already Queen Street had been paved, and now work was to be done on Victoria Street, while London and Quebec Streets, two very important streets, had been omitted. Ald. Ewing while in town.

EXPANSION OF WORK PLANNED FOR NEXT YEAR

National Council of Women of Canada Accept Budget of \$10,000 for 1925.

(Associated Press Despatch)
TORONTO, Oct. 15.—Tremendous expansion of the work of the National Council of Women of Canada, it is expected, will result from the acceptance yesterday of the \$10,000 budget for 1925, which was presented by the finance committee, of which Mrs. J. Wesley Burday is head. This budget, which is greatly in excess of those of former years, will allow for an expansion along every line of work.

"Maternity Care in Canada" was again the subject of a heated discussion, and a resolution was adopted to the effect that the National Council ask the Federal Health Department to recognize the fact that they urge the licensing and training of midwives as one method of reducing Canada's deplorable maternal mortality.

The Show was organized under the auspices of the Stanstead Wool Growers Association. The President of this Association is Mr. C. P. Young, Hatley, the Secretary is Mr. E. E. Temple, Ayer's Cliff; W. The other 35 were ewes and wethers weighing less than 70 lbs., and ram lambs that had not been docked or castrated.

The following shows what was realized from the sale: 319, No. 1, Lambs weighing 29,301 lbs., at 0.90, \$29,079.35; No. 2, Lambs weighing 2726 lbs., at 8.90, 24,261; Total: 354 lambs weighing 32,027 lbs., \$314.40.

Stanstead County won third place on best six market lambs in an Inter County competition at Ottawa Fair in September, where there were sixteen counties competing. These lambs were raised by W. E. Hunt, Ayer's, B. W. Brown, Tomifolia, C. P. Young, Hatley. They were selected by A. E. MacLaurin of the Live Stock Branch and W. G. MacDougall, Demonstrator. It is the intention of the Association to send a similar exhibit to the Ottawa Winter Fair.

The prices obtained at this show clearly the benefit of docking lambs and castrating ram lambs. If there is any farmer in the County who does not dock his lambs and castrate the rams, he should get in touch with the Secretary of the Association, or the Agricultural Demonstrator, and they will arrange to have some one show him how to do it. Lambs should be dipped in the spring as a farmer cannot expect to have lambs fat in the autumn if they are troubled with ticks. It was readily seen that those who used good Pure Bred sires had the best lambs. Any farmer who purchases a registered Pure Bred Ram of any recognized breed for use in his own flock, and who has not before at any time used a Pure Bred Ram in his own flock shall be entitled to the Annual Premium of \$5.00 for two consecutive years, provided he has at least ten breeding ewes. Furthermore, the farmer must agree to dock all his lambs and to castrate all ram lambs that are from grade ewes. This premium is offered by the Federal Livestock Branch.

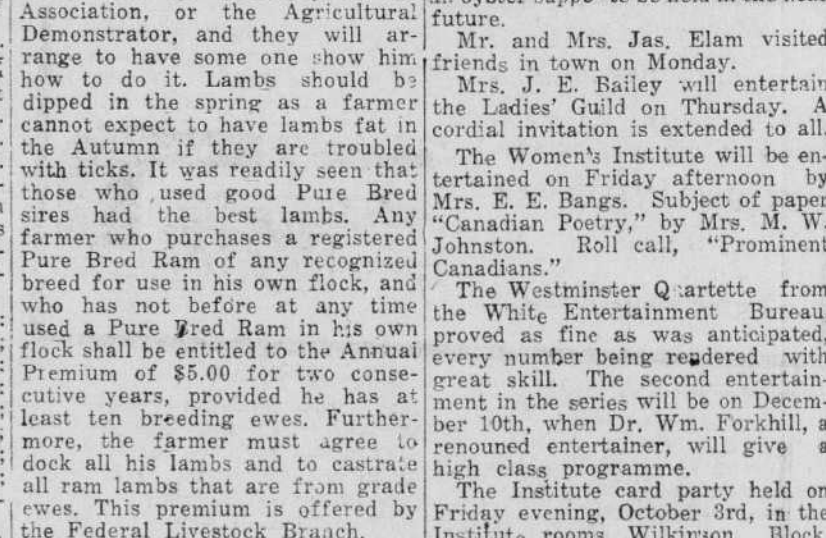
