THE Commissioners appointed by His Excellency Sir George Prevost, Governor in Chief and Commander of the Forces, in virtue of the Provisional Act of the 52d year of His Majesty's Reign, intitled, "An Act to facilitate the circulation of Army Bills" (the provisions thereof being extended, and further regulated by an Act of the 53d year of His Majesty's reign,) have fixed on the rate of Exchange for Government Bills, at 30 days sight, for the next fortnight from this date, at Five per cent. sterling discount.

N. B. The said Commissioners meet every Monday fortnight at 10 o'clock, at the house of Mr. Monro, St. Anne street, where written communications on the subject of Exchange will be received and duly attended to.

PROCLAMATION.
 WHEREAS it graciously pleased the King's Most
 Excellent Majesty, by Letters Patent, under
 the Great Seal of this Province, bearing date the 5th day
 of April one thousand eight hundred and two, to grant
 to certain persons therein named, all that certain Tract
 and Parcels of His Domain Lands, situate, lying and being
 on the north side of the River Saint Lawrence, in the said
 Province of Lower Canada; commonly called and known
 by the name of the King's Posts, together with all and
 every the Wharves and Buildings thereon erected and being,
 and all and every the Appurtenances; and together also,
 with the right of carrying on an exclusive Trade with the
 Indians and upon the said Domain Lands, & an exclu-
 sive Fishery or Fisheries thereat, for the Term of twenty
 years; for the purpose therefore of securing to the Lessees
 of the said King's Posts, the peaceable and full possession
 and enjoyment of the said Domain Lands, Posts and Fish-
 eries, and the exclusive right of trading thereat during the
 continuance of their lease, free from intrusion, hindrance
 or molestation, by any trader or traders, or any other per-
 son or persons whatsoever, within the limits of the said
 Domain Lands and Posts, and dependencies thereof; I
 have thought fit to issue this Proclamation hereby strictly
 warning and forbidding all manner of persons whatsoever
 (excepting those who shall be duly authorized by the said
 Lessees) from going to trade with the Indians, or other-
 wise obtruding themselves within the limits of the said
 Domain Lands, Posts and Fisheries, or any of the De-
 pendencies thereof; and from seducing or enticing away any
 of the Indians therefrom, as well as from interrupting, dis-
 turbing or molesting the said Lessees, or their Agents or
 Servants, in their exclusive right of Trade, in any manner
 whatsoever, as they will answer the contrary at their peril.
 Given under my Hand and Seal at Arms, at the Castle
 of Saint Lewis, in the City of Quebec, the Seventeenth
 day of August, in the Year of our Lord, One
 thousand eight hundred and fifteen, and the fifty-fifth
 Year of His Majesty's Reign.

M'ALLISTER, Surgeon, formerly patronized by Doctors Hartigan and Wilnot, Professors of Anatomy and Surgery, Trinity College, and from his practice and attendance at the different Hospitals in the city of Dublin, respectfully informs the public, that he again purposes practising in the different branches of his profession as hitherto, as he is, at present, disengaged from the government service.

For the information of those persons desirous of inoculating, Mr. M'Allister begs leave to make the following observations, hoping they will prove acceptable.

During his practice throughout the North and South coasts, he found that gentle Cathartics, administered a day previous to the introduction of the Virus, were certain in producing a most favorable pustule on the third day; as also, being a good precaution against high fever and great inflammation—that often are otherwise the attendant symptoms.

With the Indians he found the appearance of a red speck, very often the same day of the operation, attended with high fever; which he has every reason to believe was occasioned by inebriety, their sole delight.

That their children, no strangers to cold and wet, regardless even at the period of inoculation, were attacked with violent pains in the head and stomach, and often fell senseless; and only for the immediate assistance of heat and emetics, in all probability would never recover.—That in cases where no alteration was caused in the circulation of the blood, infection was quite uncertain.

Due notice will be given of the arrival of vaccine matter from England.

From a London paper.

EXTRAORDINARY PHENOMENON.

The following (copied from the Sun paper) contains a further account of the singular phenomenon already related.

Other papers, we understand, both in America and England, have noticed the remarkable circumstance to which we are now alluding. The following is an authentic and correct account, for the truth of which Captain Hayes, of his Majesty's ship *Majestic*; now lying in Plymouth harbour, and the whole of his officers and ship's company, may be appealed to:—

On the morning of the 27th August, 1813, the *Majestic* being then off Boston, the sun was observed, at the rising of the sun, the complete figure of a man in the centre of that luminary, with a flag, divided by three lines, in his hand. He was at first on his back, but as day advanced, he gradually assumed an erect posture, and at mid-day stood upright. Towards evening he gradually declined, descending with his flag head foremost. We have seen a drawing of the phenomenon, and nothing can be more correct than the human figure, its dress complete, and the flag.

On the 28th it retained the same outline, but had become a skeleton.

On the 29th the figure was disjointed, and its parts gradually assumed the appearance of six separate flags, united in a circle by an apparent cord or line. After this, nothing more was observed on the sun's disk but a few small spots.

The American papers, we believe, notice only the extraordinary appearance of the Sun on the above-mentioned days. Perhaps the observers on that continent were not in a position to catch the precise appearance which the particles of matter presented to the ship's company of the *Majestic*. There could be no optical delusion on the occasion, as the phenomenon was observed by so many different eyes, and for so long a time. The first figure was seen during the whole of the 27th, the skeleton the whole of the 28th, and the six flags during a great part of the 29th.

The above is an occurrence which may merit the attention of the philosopher. It is singular, we conceive, but nothing miraculous or portentous.—indeed, as the sun is the centre of a system of planets, several of which are much larger, and probably more important than ours, we do not know why the common luminary should shape his face, or have it shaped for him, so as to indicate the particular occurrences to this earth. The Sun is, no doubt, a material luminous body;—perhaps liable to an internal irregular motion of its parts; at least this phenomenon would seem to prove it so; and most people have observed how frequently the ignited cinders of a common fire present, at different times, the various appearances of men, trees, horses, houses, &c. The evidence, however, for the phenomenon itself we must again add, is of the most undoubted and respectable kind.—We have seen, and have by us, copies of drawings made by Captain Hayes on the occasion.—Sun.

Further particulars relative to Bonaparte while on board the *Bellerophon*.

Nothing escapes his notice: his eyes are in every place, and on every object, from the greatest to the most minute. He immediately asked an explanation of the ropes, blocks, masts, and yards, and all the machinery of the ship. He sent for the Boatswain, to question him; that officer always fitting out the French ships. He requested the Marines to pass in review before him, examined the arms, evolutions, dress, &c. &c. and expressed himself highly pleased. He enquired into the situation of the seamen, their pay, prize-money, clothes, food, tobacco, &c. and when told of their being supplied by a Purser or Commissary, asked if he was not a rogue.

"In conversing with the Admiral he said, 'I have given myself up to the English; but I would not have done so to any other of the Allied Powers in surrendering to any of them, I should be subject to the caprices and will of an individual: in submitting to the English, I place myself at the mercy of a nation.—Adieu.'

The following particulars are equally curious

and interesting. We derive them from Headquarters:—

ON BOARD THE *BELLEROPHON*.

By some passengers who came in the *Bellerophon* it appears, that Bonaparte was quite at his ease on board that ship; took possession of the Captain's cabin, saw *cerecamente*, invited the officers of the ship to his table, talked with great freedom on the present state of things, said it was impossible for the Bourbons to govern France, and that Napoleon II would be very soon recalled to the Throne; that Fouché was an ass, and totally unfit for the office assigned to him. He acknowledged that England alone had ruined all his grand plans, and that but for her he had been now Emperor of the East as well as the West. He walked on the poop and quarter deck, conversed with the seamen, and affected great gaiety and unconcern. In short, such is the talent of this "Child and Champion of Jacobinism," that before they arrived in Torbay, he was considered by all on board a *devilish good fellow*.

From *Flindell's Western Luminary*, July, 21.

Several gentlemen from Exeter have been down to Torbay to-day (23 miles from Exeter), and left it this evening. They bring many particulars. Multitudes are flocking to the coast to see the ship; and many gentlemen have gone off and sailed round her; but no one, that we hear of, has been admitted on board, though some have been along side.

"Bonaparte, we are told walks the deck freely, and sometimes talks to the sailors. The officers treat him with great politeness.

"There are six general officers, we are told, in his suite.

"From the manner in which Capt. Maitland appears to be waiting for instructions, we fear the *Bellerophon* will be off as soon as he receives them, without landing her prisoner here, to gratify the anxious curiosity of the neighborhood.

List of the principal personages embarked on the *Bellerophon* with Napoleon Bonaparte—Lieutenant-General Count Bertrand, grand Marshal of the Palace.

The Countess Bertrand and three children.—Lieutenant-General the Duke de Rovigo.—Lieutenant-General Lallemand.—Major General the Baron Gourgaud, aid-de-camp to Napoleon.

Major General Montholon Semonville, the Countess Montholon-Semonville, and one child.

The Count de Las Casas councillor of state, and his son.—M. de Resigney, chef d'Escadron, officier d'Ordonnance.—M. Planet, chef d'Escadron, officier d'Ordonnance.—M. Autric, Lieutenant, officier d'Ordonnance.—M. Schultz, chef d'Escadron.—M. Pointkosski, Captain.—M. Mareher, Captain.—M. Maingault, Surgeon to Napoleon.

[He follows the names of forty persons, composing the suite of Napoleon, and of the other passengers embarked with him.]

FORTSMOUTH, July 29.

It is at length finally determined that the ex-emperor of France, shall be sent to the Island of St. Helena. An arrangement is to be made with the East India Company for taking the island entirely into his Majesty's hands, so that in future the garrison will be composed of King's troops, and be under a Governor and Officers of the royal appointment. It is not supposed that all his suite will be permitted to accompany him, and of course, it is too early for any rumour even as to the wish of the ex-Emperor to share his fortune, or to abandon him in his exile. All the inquiries that have been made serve to convince Government that St. Helena is, of all the earth, the most proper place for his security. It is the Island the most distant of all islands from any other land. It stands in the midst of a tempestuous ocean, perpetually beating and dashing on its perpendicular rocks, but totally out of the reach of all the storms that annoy the world beside. Though its sides are boisterous, its atmosphere is unclouded, and there reigns a perpetual serenity within. The sky is always clear—a slip of

thunder was never heard of—and from the top of Mount Diana, the highest point in the island, ships at sea may be descried at the distance of 6 miles. The consequence of which is, that no vessel can approach without being on lead in time for preparations being made against attack. The point of safety from escape, if the person to be watched be resident at the Governor's house, that is on the high lands, it is totally impracticable without treachery.—Desertions have been effected, by decoying obscure individuals who were down in the valley on board ships ready to sail, in want of hands; but where vigilance was exerted, or where the individual was no member of the mountains, escape has been impossible.

The *Northumberland*, Capt. Ross, is ordered round to his port from the Eastward, to be fitted for further service, and to receive the flag of Rear Admiral Sir George Cockburn, K. C. B.; and of so pressing a nature are the orders, that all her stores are got ready to be sent on board the moment she makes her appearance, and it is expected that she will be ready to proceed on her voyage in a few hours after her arrival at Sunhead. It is believed that the *Northumberland* is to receive Bonaparte on board, and proceed with him to St. Helena.

The 53d Regiment, on duty in this place, commanded by Col. Sir George Bingham, K. C. B. and a detachment of the Royal Artillery, consisting of Capt. Grevilly, Lieut. Hitchens and Matthews, and 40 gunners, have received orders to hold themselves in readiness to embark at an hour's notice and are expected to go out to St. Helena in the *Bucephalus* and *Ceylon*, which have been fitted for foreign service, and it is supposed they will sail with the *Northumberland*.

LONDON, July 29.

Yesterday, about 12 o'clock, the Earl of Liverpool had an audience with the Prince Regent, at Carlton House; after which the Noble Earl went to the Foreign Office to a Cabinet Council, which was summoned for 1 o'clock, and did not break up till past four. After the breaking up of the Council, which was supposed to be again assembled to deliberate on the fate of Bonaparte, we understand that Mr. Guv, the King's Messenger, was ordered to hold himself in readiness to proceed with dispatches to Plymouth, which, it was said, contained the decision of our Cabinet as to the destination of Bonaparte, and that St. Helena was the place. It was said to be arranged for Admiral Sir George Cockburn to convey him. Sir George is within these few days had several interviews with the Earl of Liverpool, the Earl of Bathurst, and Viscount Melville upon the subject. It is also said, that a house is to be built on the Island for the person who is to have the care of him.

Several regiments are, we understand, to be sent out with all convenient speed to reinforce the King's troops in India. The 89th, commanded by Lieut. Col. Morrison, which distinguished itself in Upper Canada, during the late war, and which is now quartered at Chichester, is one of the regiments under orders to proceed to Ceylon.

WAR-OFFICE, July 29.

The Prince Regent, as a mark of his Royal approbation of the distinguished gallantry of the Brigade of Foot Guards in the victory of Waterloo, has been pleased, in the name and on the behalf of his Majesty to approve of all the Ensigns of the three Regiments of Foot Guards having the rank of Lieutenants, and that such rank shall be attached to all the future appointments to Ensigncies in the Foot Guards, in the same manner as the Lieutenants of those Regiments obtain the rank of captain.

His Royal Highness has also been pleased to approve of the 1st Regiment of Foot Guards being made a Regiment of Grenadiers, and styled "The 1st, or Grenadier Regiment of Foot Guards," in commemoration of their having defeated the Grenadiers of the French Imperial Guards upon this memorable occasion.

Extract of a letter from Paris, July 23.—"The capital of the great nation is at this moment a sad picture of humiliation and distress. Such strange appearances present themselves, that one can scarcely bring his imagination to suppose himself in the city of Paris; its palaces occupied by foreign Princes and Generals, ostentatiously surrounded by the military pomp of their respective nations; its pleasure Gardens and public squares covered with tents and baggage, and artillery, of foreign troops; its streets crowded, and houses occupied by soldiers wearing the uniform of every nation in Europe, excepting only that of France. No idea can be obtained from the

French Papers of what France suffered from this short but glorious campaign. Never was there a more decisive and disastrous battle than that of Waterloo. The progress of the Prussians from the frontier to the capital was a dreadful torrent of national vengeance and military execution, and they were allowed free quarters upon the inhabitants, for several days, after their arrival in Paris. The expense of subsisting the allied troops quartered in the city of Paris, and its vicinity, amounts, I have been told, to 400,000 francs a day. But what is most complained of is the total subversion of all domestic arrangements, and the indiscriminate pillage of articles of value by some of the foreign troops in the houses of the inhabitants upon whom they are quartered; yet this produced no real agitation in Paris, for this simple reason, that the Parisians have not strength enough left to sustain a state of agitation; and partly because they remember so well the conduct of their own troops, for so many years in foreign countries. The Louvre has been stripped of several pictures by the Prussians, and the beautiful garden of the Luxembourg has been completely destroyed by them; yet no murmur is publicly heard from the Government or the people of Paris. The Allies are supposed to have at least 600,000 men at present in France, for whose subsistence, and the expenses of the war, France must provide. The French people are disabled by this single campaign, or rather single battle, not only from aggression, but resistance, for several years. It would take a long period of uninterrupted prosperity to infuse into the nation the quantity of blood, wealth, and spirit, of which it has been drained.

A paper of this morning says—"Instead of eight millions of francs which was to be paid to the allies as a general acquittal for the expenses of the war, and which we thought an extremely small sum, we should have read 800 millions, upwards of 32 millions sterling; and this sum the French hope their King will have the influence to reduce to 600.

We have been favoured with a letter from an officer of the Bellerophon, containing the particulars of Bonaparte's surrender, part of which we have omitted, being in substance the same as the account given in our second page. The following are extracts:—

"Bellerophon, Plymouth Sound, Feb. 26.

"The Bellerophon, Capt. Maitland, had been employed since the end of May, in company with the Eidannus, and occasionally a corvette and brig in closely blockading Basque Roads and all its passages, in order to prevent the escape of two frigates, two corvettes, and a brig, lying in Aix Roads. After the news of the battle of Waterloo, and the declaration of war, the most vigilant steps were taken by captain M. to prevent the departure of any vessel, of whatever nation, from the limits of France, without being first most strictly examined and minutely searched, particularly as he had reason to suppose that Napoleon would endeavour to escape to America, in one of the frigates, or other vessels in Aix Roads."

[Here follows the account of the Duke of Rovigo, &c. coming with a flag of truce, to request a free passage of the frigates, &c.]

"The Eidannus having gone to England with a ship from Martinique, bound to Rochefort, with 300 French soldiers on board, detained by the Bellerophon, Capt. M. dispatched the Falmouth, who had that day joined, with the intelligence to Sir H. B. Ham, off the Isle de Die, and went into Basque Roads, where he anchored out of gun shot of the Isle de Aix. Every precaution was taken, in order to give the enemy a warm reception, in case they should have sufficient temerity to come out and attack us with their frigates, while one of

the smaller vessels might try to get away in the interim. The ship was kept constantly clear for action, and there is no doubt from the excellent fighting order that the Bellerophon was in, and the precision of aim which the ship's company had been practised to take, though the incessant and indelible exertions of the Captain in directing them at the great guns, and particularly in firing at a mark, their passage to America would have been most effectually prevented. The masterly dispositions made by Capt. Maitland, of the small force under his command, is equally entitled to commendation, as the vigilant manner in which he prosecuted the blockade." After detailing the embarkation of Bonaparte and his suite, and giving a description of his person, the writer proceeds:—

"The emotions experienced in beholding this great man hurled from the greatest pinnacle of Power and Glory that ever any preceding mortal had attained (or perhaps even aspired to), and reduced to ask an asylum from a nation to whom he had been such a formidable enemy, are not easily described. Certain it is however, that all previous sentiments towards him were effectually disarmed; all the calamities he had been instrumental to were forgotten; and imagination only figured him in the midst of his most brilliant victories. He is extremely affable, possessed of an amazing fund of information on almost every subject, gentlemanlike, and condescending in his manners. An incident occurred in the battle of Waterloo, which deserves to be generally known, and which seems to shew that he is not that blood-thirsty tyrant which he has been described in some of the diurnal journals:—An English officer of rank (nephew to Admiral Lord Keith) was dangerously wounded, made prisoner, and lay on the ground, bleeding to death. This attracted Napoleon's notice, who went up to him, sent for a surgeon directly, had his wounds dressed, and caused him to be carried into a house. This is an undoubted fact, as, since his arrival in England, Lord Keith has sent to return him his thanks for saving his nephew's life, and the officer is alive to testify it."

NEW-YORK, SEPT. 9.

Capture of Ceylon.—By the arrival at Alexandria of the ship America, Luckett, intelligence has been received of the capture of the island of Ceylon. This information was communicated to Capt. L. on the 27th July, by the British frigate Nigar, 49 days from the East Indies, bound to England. The Nigar had on board the Crown and Throne of the King of Ceylon, valued at eight millions sterling. The Island was captured by the English after a hard fought action, in which the British lost two general officers and many men.

Some days ago several French gentlemen of distinction arrived in this city from France. They were landed on Long Island by Capt. Messervey, of the Schr. Commerce bound from Bordeaux to Charleston. Speculation has ever since been wide-spread, and rumour cease in determining who these strangers were. They remained INCOGNITO until this day, when it appears to be ascertained, that they are Joseph BONAPARTE the EX King of Naples and Spain, and his suite. We understand they have taken up their abode at Mechanic Hall.

The Declaration of England, which replaces us, in respect to that nation, in the state of peace in which we were before the 20th of March last, has inspired the greatest confidence in the generous intentions of the allied sovereigns. We hope that the noble effort of England to cause to cease the evil which she has already sought to render as light as possible, will be completely imitated on the continent; and that the measures ordained to regulate

the charges of the war will be followed by measures to lessen them. The interests of the farmer and of the mechanic, are, without doubt, in the eyes of the powers allied to the King of France, as precious as those of the merchant. Every thing announces that this wish will be fulfilled in a few days. It is said that M. Carnot has retired to Switzerland.

The Prussian troops have quitted Orleans and its environs, for the purpose of advancing.

More than 20,000 white flags flying from the windows and other places in the city of Bordeaux. On the 24th at the theatre of that city, they made a bonfire of the tri-coloured flag.

Cardinal Maury has been imprisoned in the castle of St. Angelo: he is accused of intrigues connected with late events.

MONTREAL, SEPT. 16th, 1815.

Although the New York papers of Saturday do not announce his arrival, yet it is certain from the assertion of several gentlemen who arrived in town yesterday morning that Joseph Bonaparte, the Ex King of Spain, had made his appearance at New York some hours before they started for Canada. He is said to have a numerous suite; some Generals are reported to have been with him, names not known;—Ney is mentioned as one of them. It was believed by many that Commodore Decatur had dictated a peace with the Dey of Algiers; but the Editor of the N. Y. Evening Post did not place any confidence in the news. His opinion is much to be depended upon.

Extract of a letter, dated "Cadix, July 24, 1815.

"Commodore Decatur, we learn, has scolded the account with Algiers; after taking their frigate and a sloop of war, he appeared off the city of Algiers and sent a flag ashore, with an intimation that he must release all American and American vessels, and that he should have four hours to deliberate; but that if no answer should be received at that period, he should lay the city in ashes.

"An Algerine corvette from off Tunis hove in sight during this period, and landed a number of Turks of distinction; the palace of the Dey was surrounded, and he was menaced with decapitation at the end of the third hour, the flag returned with the submission of the Dey to the terms dictated by Commodore Decatur; all Americans were released; the Dey engaged not to demand tribute hereafter from the United States; and that all Americans, who ever taken, or on board whatever ships, shall be released without ransom.

"The Commodore and suite went on shore, and upon representations by the Dey of the danger he was in, the Commodore made him a present of the captured frigate. This has ended the third African war. We have these advices by way of Carthage."

ALBANY, SEPT. 17.

His Excellency, Governor GORR, of Upper Canada, and suite, arrived in this city on Wednesday last, from New York, on his way to Canada.

Col. Barclay, who came passenger in the Galen, arrived at Boston, is one of the Commissioners for running the boundary line between the U. States and the British Provinces.

The Prince Regent of Portugal having declined returning to Lisbon, Mr. Cauning has resigned his ambassadorial office by permission, but remains in Portugal in a private quality, attending the waters of Caidas to restore his son's health.

BONAPARTE

Our last accounts leave Bonaparte in London, whither he was escorted by an armed force; but whether an escort of honour, or one of precaution against insult or injury he might be liable to receive from the mob, we are left to conjecture, from the Government, all things considered, we do not think he has much, if any thing to fear for his person. They have an interest in saving his life, deeper than we were aware of at the first impression. It is the policy of England to controul the affairs of the Continent. It is by this system, that she has so long monopolized so large a portion of the commerce of the world. In Bonaparte she may find a convenient and powerful instrument. Is Louis refractory, she threatens him with

the return of Bonaparte. Do the Allies evince a disposition unfavourable to her views, the same menace may induce submission to her will. Bonaparte, therefore, will in all probability be preserved as a *rod in pickle*, to be applied to Louis or the other legitimates, as circumstances may require.—*Albany Register.*

From the Buffalo Journal, August 29.

We hear that an express arrived to Gen. Brown at Detroit, from Mackina, bringing intelligence from Major Morgan, who commands there, that the Indians had collected in that neighbourhood, and had formally demanded the surrender of that post. Other and more probable accounts state, that the substance of the dispatches was, information that the troops at Mackina were in a state of mutiny, and that appearances were so alarming that general Brown had sent up one hundred troops in addition to those originally intended for that place. The want of pay is the cause assigned for the disturbance. It is to be extremely regretted that our government should have been so forgetful of the rights of our brave soldiers as to give them so just a cause for dissatisfaction on this head. We venture to say that no troops have ever earned the small stipend of their wages with more hardships, and that no government could be more inattentive to their rights. It is a disgraceful fact, that most of the troops which have left this frontier, had fifteen, and many of them eighteen months pay due to them.

QUEBEC, SEPTEMBER 19, 1815.

At length the destiny of the great disturber of the peace of nations appears to be fixed. Since it is not found expedient to put him out of existence; or to immerse him within the circumscribed precincts of four walls; no situation could be found more appropriate than the island of Saint Helena; because no other situation could be found where an incendiary would be thrown to such a distance from the general haunts of men; and consequently, where the evil dispositions of such a malignant spirit would be rendered more powerless, though suffered to breathe the pure air of heaven, and to roam at large as far as there is *terra firma*.

The nearest land to St. Helena is the west coast of Africa; from which it is distant twelve hundred miles; the island is accessible at only one part, where it is fortified in a very formidable manner. If he escape from thence he must be carefully watched indeed. But contemplating no such event, here we think must end his course. To such a situation it ought not, at present, to be difficult for him to reconcile himself; shorn as he is of his power and splendour and particularly of his military reputation. It is said that he has candidly acknowledged on board the *Bellerophon*, that now that the duke of Wellington and him have met and measured swords, he admits the duke to be the ablest general; and has expressed his admiration at the firmness and intrepidity of the troops under his Grace's command, in standing and repelling his (Napoleon's) charges, particularly as those he led to the charge he confessed to have felt the full force of their desperate situation.

Another strong reason for his being reconciled to his exile, must be the consciousness of the numerous and enormous evils he has brought on that deeply distressed country, France; a country which, unless its perversity run counter to the feelings of all other nations must, at this moment detest and execrate the name of Napoleon, as the source of all its sufferings. Had all the evils said to have been contained in Pandora's box been assembled and at once let loose upon France she could not endure more than she has suffered by being misled by this military idol, whom she has

certainly worshipped as the Indians worship the devil.

One of the first steps of Louis's return to the throne we observe was to unshackle the press; a strong proof of his conviction that France is, at present, ripe for a free government, and that a free government she must have. Truly is it said that knowledge is power; knowledge therefore, has but to will to be free; and where is the sceptre than can fetter it? Kings must follow the progress of the human mind. What indeed can be more glorious for a monarch than to be the sovereign of an enlightened and free people.

The subject of freedom recalls to our mind the government of our neighbours, who fancy themselves the freest people on earth; and yet stronger proofs of slavery are scarcely to be found in any arbitrary monarchy, than we daily read of in the state of Vermont. A young man removes from a town or village where his parents live, to another village at a few miles distance. He sets off on horseback or in a carriage of a Sunday morning to see his parents, for the purpose of accompanying them to the place of worship he had been accustomed to. When about leaving town he is stopped by a tything-man, who enquires where he is going; not satisfied with his answer he insists that he is in an unlawful net; that he must stay and attend the place of worship of the town or village he lives in. The youth, notwithstanding, proceeds. For this he is called before a tribunal, and is condemned to pay a fine of four dollars and costs, for a breach of the law. If this be Republican liberty be ours the monarchical slavery of a free will, as well on the sabbath as on any other day, so we are guilty of no offence against decency or the good order of society.—Slavery is slavery, whether the despotism be religious, civil or military.

MASTERS of Transports, although not obliged to report at the Custom House, are bound by Law to pay the following rates of Pilot Water and Poundage on Pilot Money to the Naval Officer of the Port of Quebec, viz.

For every foot of water for which Masters or Commanders of Vessels are obliged to pay their Pilots from Bic to Quebec, and from Quebec to Bic—2s. 6d. currency per foot.

For Transports going to Montreal, or Three Rivers.
Of 100 to 150 Tons inclusive—2s currency,
Of 151 to 200 Tons inclusive—2s do.
Of 201 to 250 Tons inclusive—2s do.
Of 251 Tons and upwards—2s 8d.

And on settling with their Pilots, Masters of Transports are to deduct 1s. in the pound on the amount of the sums due them, which with the rates of Pilot Water, are to be paid as above directed.—And as the greater part of the Transports that have arrived in Lower-Cana in for some years past, have not conformed to the foregoing regulations, although enjoying the benefit of the Light House and Buoys, in common with other vessels; such Masters, as shall be guilty of a like neglect in future, will be prosecuted as directed by the Statute in that case made and provided.
