## Bill 37 Discussed at Special Meeting of Ministerial Association

A special meeting of the Shawville and District Ministerial Association was held on Monday morning with the Rev. H. Kiely, the chairman, presiding.

The chief matter for discussion was the proposed Bill 37, now before the Dominion Parliament as a private member's bill. The object of this legislation is "to prevent public utterances or writings of material calculated to cause discrimination or disharmony on account of race or religion."

It is intended to prevent any word or writing that might cause hatred, contempt, discrimination, ridicule, insult or injury for race or religious reasons. It was felt by the Association that this Bill, if passed, would create disunity instead of preventing it, and was contrary to the principles of the Atlantic Charter, in which it is declared that the United Nations are fighting for liberty of conscience, liberty of speech and liberty of religion.

Accordingly it was decided to send to the leaders of all political parties and to the Pontiac member a request that they vote against this legislation. The Association also decided to ask all interested citizens to send letters of protest personally to members of the Parliament or leaders of the parties on this matter.

## Blood Donor Clinic

The first visit of the Blood Donor Clinic from Ottawa will be made on Thursday and Friday, May 4 and 5. Already new donors are handing in their names to Miss Katie Elliott, and more are urged to do so soon.

All former donors are asked to get their cards and also have a check-up with the doctor. It is important that all former or new donors plan to help this time as the clinic is staying two days, and for that period there ought to be about 200 sign up.

As many of the donors coming this time are from Bryson and Calumet Island, where there is no doctor near them, it is especially urged that those close to the doctor arrange for their check-up before the days of the clinics, or otherwise the doctors will be made so busy that the clinic may be slacked up.

And if an offensive begins soon on the Western front or the Balkans, the need will be even greater. ## Fat Salvage Needed to Assure Glycerine Supply

In summing up the reasons for the present acute shortage of glycerine, Paul C. Cabot of the WPP salvage division stated that following a loss of normal imports of fats and oils from the Philippines and the Far East the War Production board had reduced the permitted use of glycerine to 70 per cent of 1940 consumption.

"While this somewhat eased the situation," Mr. Cabot added, "it was found necessary to place glycerine on an allocation basis, thus drastically cutting its non-military use and curtailing the amount manufacturers were permitted to use in their products."

"In spite of these efforts it was found that the wartime glycerine requirements could be filled only by effective salvage efforts in the home, restaurants, and army and navy camps throughout the nation."

"The naval establishments of the country," he said, "are contributing approximately one million pounds of waste fats per month, and the army cantonments are salvaging about five million pounds each month. Restaurants and hotels have also been doing a fine job in salvaging greases."

"If every housewife in the nation saved as little as one tablespoonful of waste fats each day, the total would produce a pound per month per family, or between 350,000,000 and 450,000,000 pounds per year, an amount which would greatly help in providing for the war needs of our own forces and those of our Allies. To obtain this result the co-operation of the retail meat dealer, and the food locker operator is indispensable."

## George Drummond, Well-known Bristol Farmer, Dies

An outstanding farmer of Bristol township, George Thomas Drummond, died at his home in Bristol on Friday morning at the age of 88 years.

Born in Almonte he was the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Daniel Drummond, and came to Bristol 40 years ago, settling on the farm where he had lived ever since. He was married in 1907 to Miss Jean Logan Russell, of Bristol, who survives him. Also left are one son, Alex on the farm; one daughter, Mrs. Gilbert Carmichael, of Braeside, Ont.; one brother, David of Carleton Place and four sisters, Mrs. A. W. Stewart and Mrs. Lawson Stewart, of Arnprior; Mrs. Robert Dunlop, of Carleton Place, and Miss Marion Drummond, of Almonte.

The late Mr. Drummond was very active in community affairs. For many years he was secretary of Bristol Municipal Council and School Board, and for over twenty years was manager of Bristol Live Stock Shipping Unit at Bristol. He was a member of Bristol Memorial Presbyterian Church to which the funeral was held from his home, service being conducted by Rev. Mr. Beattie.

Interment was made in Norway Bay cemetery. The pall-bearers were, Messrs. Fred and Julius Wiggins, Thomas McNeill, Irwin Ballantyne, George Russell and Donald McVey.

## Washing Walls

Modern water-thinned washable paints on walls may be cleaned by lightly sponging or wiping with a soft sponge or cloth, well wet with water. If necessary, a little mild soap may be used. Adding of 2 to 3 per cent of ordinary 40 per cent formaldehyde to the washing water the first time the wall is washed after painting, in order to prevent the paint film from absorbing water and to toughen its surface to abrasion, is recommended. Washers are cautioned to always start at the bottom of the wall and work up. Otherwise the water will run down over the soiled dry wall below and cause streaks that may be very difficult to remove.

## Automatic Bale Loader

Hay harvest, from cutting to storing the baled product, has become almost an automatic process, with machinery so well doing most of the labor that women can replace men in haying and baling. Mowers long have been used to cut hay and leave it in windrows; balers that pick the hay up in the windrows, bale it and dump it in the field, have been in use for some time. Now is announced by the agricultural engineering division of the College of Agriculture on the Davis campus of the University of California a home-made bale loader that will pick the bales up from the ground, carry them up into the truck and dump them there.

The loader obviates the necessity of men picking up bales and lifting them into the trucks. In fact, say the agricultural engineers, the work is so light that aside from unloading the bales from the trucks and storing them, women can do all the work in the hay harvest field.

## Invades Food

Bacteria can invade food in a very short time if it is left exposed, and the thrifty homemaker finds out how each food keeps best and stores each article in the right and correctly cared for cupboard, cooler, can or jar. It is very important to have a refrigerator, which should be kept clean and in the best possible condition. Bread and cake containers should be scalded, sunned, and aired at least once a week.

**WHAT SCIENCE  
IS DOING**

**Grain Alcohol**

The dedication last week of the world's largest single-unit grain alcohol plant in Omaha points to one of the major developments of the future—setting up near the farms industries which will utilize the great chemical properties of grains and other crops, says the New York Sun. Built at a cost of \$5,000,000, this plant is designed to produce 17,500,000 gallons of alcohol a year which, during the war, the Defense Supplies Corporation will allocate to the manufacture of synthetic rubber, explosives and other munitions. Operating at capacity, it can utilize 20,000 bushels of grain daily of which 45 per cent will be corn, 45 per cent wheat and 10 per cent barley malt. As by-products it will turn out eighteen pounds of highly concentrated stock feeds from each bushel of grain; yield annually 5,000,000 pounds of corn oil, valuable in seasoning food for the human palate; and, in an annex yet to be built, manufacture 120 tons of dry ice daily by crystallizing carbon dioxide gas drawn from fermenting grain.

Since chemurgists have found more than 700 uses for grain alcohol and its derivatives—these include the making of plastics, medicines, dyes and aviation fuel—it is easy to understand the post-war value of such an establishment. It will multiply by many fold the diversity of nature's products.

**Britons Afflicted

**How Can I???**

Q. How can I make a transparent cement for glass?

A. Dissolve 1 part India rubber in chloroform and add 16 parts by measure of gum mastic in powder. Allow to remain for two days, shaking the bottle frequently; apply with a fine camel's hair brush.

Q. How can I add a better flavor to baked apples?

A. Try filling the cavity of apples cored for baking with orange marmalade and a little butter and sugar.

Q. What can be done if a mustard plaster leaves the skin very tender?

A. Immediate relief can be given by applying pure olive oil to the affected parts.

Q. How can I fasten the handle of a cooking fork or other piece of cutlery when it has become loosened?

A. Seal it by pouring melted resin into the hole alongside the metal part. Or, fill the hole with finely powdered resin and push the metal prong on handle, heated very hot, into the resin filled hole. It will be as good as new.

Q. How can I make a gargle for a sore throat?

A. Alum dissolved in water makes a very effective gargle for a sore throat.

who heard it—though a good wholesome scare would do a lot to arouse people to the urgent need of action. If Canada is as close to starvation as Mr. Thomas suggested, it is high time the governments and the people got busy.

It is not that the people have not been warned of the inevitable result of what they have been doing for so many years. They have been told, time and again, what was bound to happen if they persisted in cutting down trees, draining swamps—doing everything to hurry the moisture off the land instead of having it sink in and seep away gradually. But they have just gone ahead although they have been

troubled by wells going dry, streams rising to flood levels in spring and fall, and dwindling to trickles in summer, crops failing—all the signs that the land was playing out.

How many abandoned farms are there right in this country—farms abandoned because they had been "mined" instead of farmed? How many in other counties?

We were glad to see that the Ontario Government proposes to embark on a comprehensive program of forest conservation; and it would pay every county to have its Council go in for a similar program, to take over a lot of those abandoned farms and plant trees.

It would be a long-distance proposition, of course; when a person has been sick for some years and has been gradually growing worse, one dose of medicine will not put him on his feet right away. But unless we are going to let our country become a desert, we shall have to realize that it is in bad shape. And that something has to be done about it—at once. It will not do to sit idle and expect the disease to cure itself.

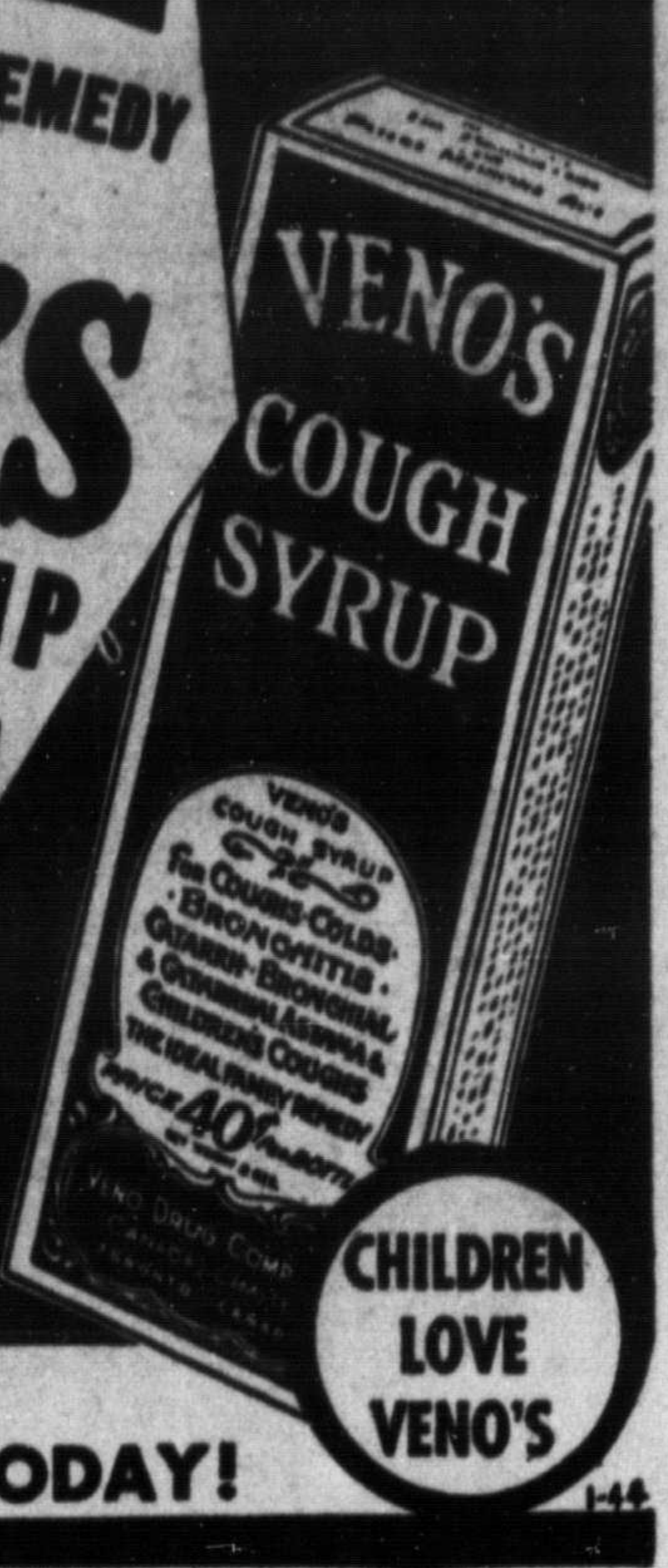

## OTTAWA REPORTS

**That Question on Subsidies On Dairy Products May Be Re-opened Before May 1**

Protest over the failure of the Federal Government to continue the subsidies on dairy products throughout the summer months has been registered by a delegation of some 30 members of the Dairy Farmers of Canada. This group, representative of all branches of the dairy industry, met in Ottawa earlier this month with the Agricultural Food Board and also with the Hon. J. G. Gardiner, Minister of Agriculture, and put their case in plain language. The Minister was urged to have the Cabinet re-open the question of subsidies before May 1 when most of the subsidies now being paid on dairy products will be reduced.

There is hope that appropriate action will be taken. Dr. G. S. H. Barton, Deputy Minister of Agriculture and Chairman of the Agricultural Food Board, said recently, "Of all the food products needed urgently, dairy products are the first." The reason for this, he said, is due to the wide range of demands for butter, cheese, concentrated milk, fluid milk and other milk products as a result of war.

Canadian civilian consumption of milk and milk products jumped 18% in 1943 over the previous year. In addition huge quantities were provided for our Armed Forces and for shipment abroad, while to-

tal milk production was up only slightly, according to Bureau of Statistics figures.

In the current year increased demand is anticipated while prospects for greater production are none too cheerful. Information from other Allied countries, notably the United States, New Zealand and Australia, reveals a situation similar to that existing in Canada.

It begins to look as though there will be a serious shortage of these vital foods in the face of critical need once the starving peoples of Europe are liberated and the United Nations are faced with the task of feeding them, in addition to meeting present needs. Unless the hard-pressed dairy farmer gets immediate and substantial aid, what's going to happen?

Oats, the most important cereal crop in Prince Edward Island, is liable to injury chiefly from leaf rust, and to a lesser extent stem rust. Department of Agriculture grain experts are recommending Erban as outstanding among the varieties resistant to leaf rust. While it is pointed out that it is resistant to only two of the many forms of leaf rust, these are the ones causing most of the damage in the Maritimes. Erban has no resistance to stem rust but is highly resistant to both loose and covered smut, and over a period of years has compared favorably with Banner and Victory in yield. The kernels are large so that increasing the regular seeding rate by one or two pecks per bushel is advised when this variety is used.

Speaking of oats, a new variety of hullless oats named Brighton is announced by the Central Experimental Farm, Ottawa. Developed from a cross of Markton with Laurel, it is resistant to smut like its Markton parent, while in yield it surpasses the Laurel side of the family. In tests it outyielded both Banner and Victory on a kernel basis. It is also reported apparently well adapted to soil and climatic conditions in many parts of Canada. Seed stocks are still scarce but officials say there should be enough at the end of the 1944 season for all who may be interested.

Prices for seed potatoes this spring are based by the Wartime Prices and Trade Board on the ceiling price per pound for Canada No. 1 table stock in any zone during the period March 6 to April 2, plus a premium of one cent a pound for Certified Seed, 1½ cents a pound for Foundation 'A' Seed and 2 cents a pound for Foundation Seed.

## Why Not Turkey Eggs In February

Turkey eggs in February! That is the story of a district feed merchant who specializes in select poultry foods, says the St. Catharines Standard. One of his farmer customers presented him with a turkey egg the other day, and even the farmer wanted to know: How come? The answer was that the turkey had been getting the proper food, some of that which made the Leghorns produce an egg a day.

On Canadian farms, for decades past, the turkey has been considered a semi-wild fowl given to the greatest secrecy in nest hiding and laying just enough for one brood a year. The young turks come out in all the hazards of weather and, if the season is rainy, the casualty toll is very heavy. No special feeding of turkeys has ever been felt necessary, on the average farm; they always roam far afield.

The turkey shortage last Christmas was just one of those things which intelligent breeding and handling will obviate in the years to come. If turkeys lay eggs in winter, under proper conditions, there will soon be a turkey hatchery on a big scale, as complete a domestication as that which applies to the chicken family.

THE WAR - WEEK — Commentary on Current Events

## Axis Troops Pour Into Hungary And Occupy All Strategic Points

Out of the welter of confusing and contradictory reports about Hungary there emerges this one certainty: Hitler has taken over another country. He has converted it rapidly into a vassal and is rapidly wiping out any distinction between those who hoped to share in his victory and those he has conquered. Moreover, he appears to have accomplished this new coup with the same old methods of treachery, surprise and fifth column preparation that proved so successful in the cases of Austria, Czechoslovakia, Denmark and Norway, and to some extent even in Poland, the Netherlands, Belgium and Yugoslavia. For while the heads of the Hungarian Government were still conferring with Hitler at his headquarters, more than 190,000 German and Rumanian troops marched into Hungary with the aid and connivance of Hungarian Nazi elements; occupied all its important points and communication centers; arrested hundreds of Liberals and Socialists, and rapidly crushed any opposition. Now Hitler is searching for a compliant puppet government under whose nominal authority he proposes to incorporate Hungary into that greater German Lebensraum which is rapidly turning from a living space into a region of death, says the New York Times.

**Hitler Must Hold Balkans**  
The reasons for Hitler's action seems clear enough. The Russian advance across the Dniester into

Rumania heralds the end of the battle of Russia and the beginning of the battle for the Balkans. Hitler must hold the Balkans because he needs their raw materials, and in particular the oil of Rumania, without which his war machine would be in danger of breaking down. But after the severance of the Odessa-Warsaw railway by the Russian armies his main communication lines to the Balkans lead through Hungary. Hungary was his ally; it joined both the Antifascist pact and the Axis pact; it granted Germany military transit rights long ago, and it joined in the war against Russia with its own troops. But, using treachery as a normal device of his own diplomacy, Hitler trusts nobody. He does not trust the Germans whom he keeps in line by the terror of his police; and he trusts his allies even less—unless his own troops and Gestapo are in control. The German occupation of Hungary is thus Hitler's notice to the world that he is determined to fight for the Balkans and that the Carpathians are his main line of defense.

**Hungary's Recent Growth**  
Just what the attitude of the Hungarian Government has been in this situation is still unclear. There are reports that it refused Hitler's sweeping demands and has been put under arrest. That is not implausible, for proud Hungary has always been jealous of its sovereignty. But that does not absolve the Government of responsibility for the plight of the country. Hungary joined Hitler partly under the compulsion of its exposed geographic situation, but also because of the spoils promised it. With German aid, it acquired the Carpatho-Ukraine from Czechoslovakia, Transylvania and Rumania and the Banat from Yugoslavia. The country grew from 35,800 square miles, with a population of 9,100,000 to 61,700 square miles and a population of 12,700,000. Now Hitler is exacting payment for his aid at the cost of Hungary's independence.

**Again The Iron Fist**  
There still remains the question why Hitler adopted methods which are bound to antagonize the Hungarian people. There can be no doubt that the Hungarians would resist a Russian attempt at invasion. But if they could escape an invasion and get out of the war even at the cost of heavy sacrifices they would probably jump at the chance. There have been numerous reports that not only Hungary but also Rumania and Bulgaria were eagerly seeking a way out,

## FINE REPORT OF C.N.R.

Management and personnel of the Canadian National Railways are to be congratulated on the report on 1943 operations tabled in the House of Commons last week. The statistics presented by the president and chairman, Mr. R. C. Vaughan, constitute a new high all around. After payment of all operating expenses, there is a net revenue of \$116,140,000, or \$29,484,000 more than in 1942. A cash surplus of \$35,639,000 remained after meeting taxes, interest due the public and the Government, and providing \$19,000,000 reserve for pension contracts. This exceeded the surplus of 1942 by more than \$10,000,000.

The unprecedented success was due primarily to the heavy traffic of a war year. It shows nevertheless the earning power of the system when the possibility exists. Obviously expenditures were closely watched. Operating expenses increased by \$35,476,000, while operating revenue gained \$64,961,000. The operating ratio for the year was 73.64 per cent, compared with 81.99 per cent in the most favorable peace year, 1928.

The way in which the railway systems have risen to the extraordinary demands must be gratifying to the public as well as those directly concerned with the job. A standard has been set which indicates that only sufficient traffic is required to make operations successful at any time.

and Russia's recognition of the Italian Government, with which Hungary always maintained closer relations than with Germany, may have suggested possibilities for Hungary as well. Hitler, mindful of Italy's switch and embarrassed by the Finnish-Russian negotiations for a separate peace, apparently determined to crush all such efforts in the Balkans with an iron fist.

## Plan Frozen-Food Units For Farmers

Ontario farmers after the war may be able, through "quick-freezing" units at low cost, to enjoy in midwinter the berries and vegetables they produce in summer. As soon as the war ends, Ontario Hydro proposes to send out mechanized units to display to the farmer and his wife latest electrical machinery and "gadgets" available. The plan was disclosed in the Legislature last week by Hydro Commissioner G. H. Challies.

Mr. Challies said the "quick-freezing" unit was not a dream but had been worked on for months in Hydro laboratories to sell at a very low cubic-foot cost. Hydro was not merchandising but would provide cheap power to bring modern equipment within the reach of every farm home.

He knew, he said, of one unit already in operation which could hold 60 dozen ears of corn, six crates of strawberries, six crates of raspberries as well as poultry and meat. Through their use farmers could enjoy in winter their summer surplus.

### Volcanic Ash

Ash and dust thrown out of Paricutin volcano in Mexico extends for 125 miles around, and in nearby towns it must be shoveled off roofs to prevent lightly constructed buildings from collapsing. The bombs are heavy black basalt, six inches to three or more feet in diameter, and land with a strange "thug" sound.

The minerals in the Paricutin field are among the best of any known volcanic eruptions, and the crystal masses of ammonium chloride and iron chloride in the fumaroles are the finest specimens ever found.

The fumaroles are really vents that occur all around the volcano, some emitting hydrochloric acid, others ammonia and volatile salts which crystallize in snow deposits of ammonium chloride or red and yellow iron chlorides. The hydrochloric acid is not dangerous because it quickly dissolves.

### Muddy Water Carries Fine Particles of Fertile Soil

When muddy water leaves your field, fertility is lost. To remain suspended in water, the soil material must be very fine. This fine and superfine material carried by the running water is richer in nutrient than the coarser soil material left behind.

In one study, the fine material contained twice as much phosphorus and nitrogen and nearly 50 per cent more potash than the coarser material. This fine colloidal material may contain most of some of the minor elements, such as boron. The average for 21 soils showed 2½ times as much boron in the fine clay colloid as in the whole soil.

The high fertility of river bottom soils is due in part to the richness of the sediments, representing the best of the soils from many farms. River sediments contain some of the coarser and less fertile particles, but they carry also much of the best of our cultivated fields.

Sediments brought down by the Ohio river in flood were shown to contain 26 per cent of the very fine, rich sediment supplying abundantly those nutrient elements so essential to high production.

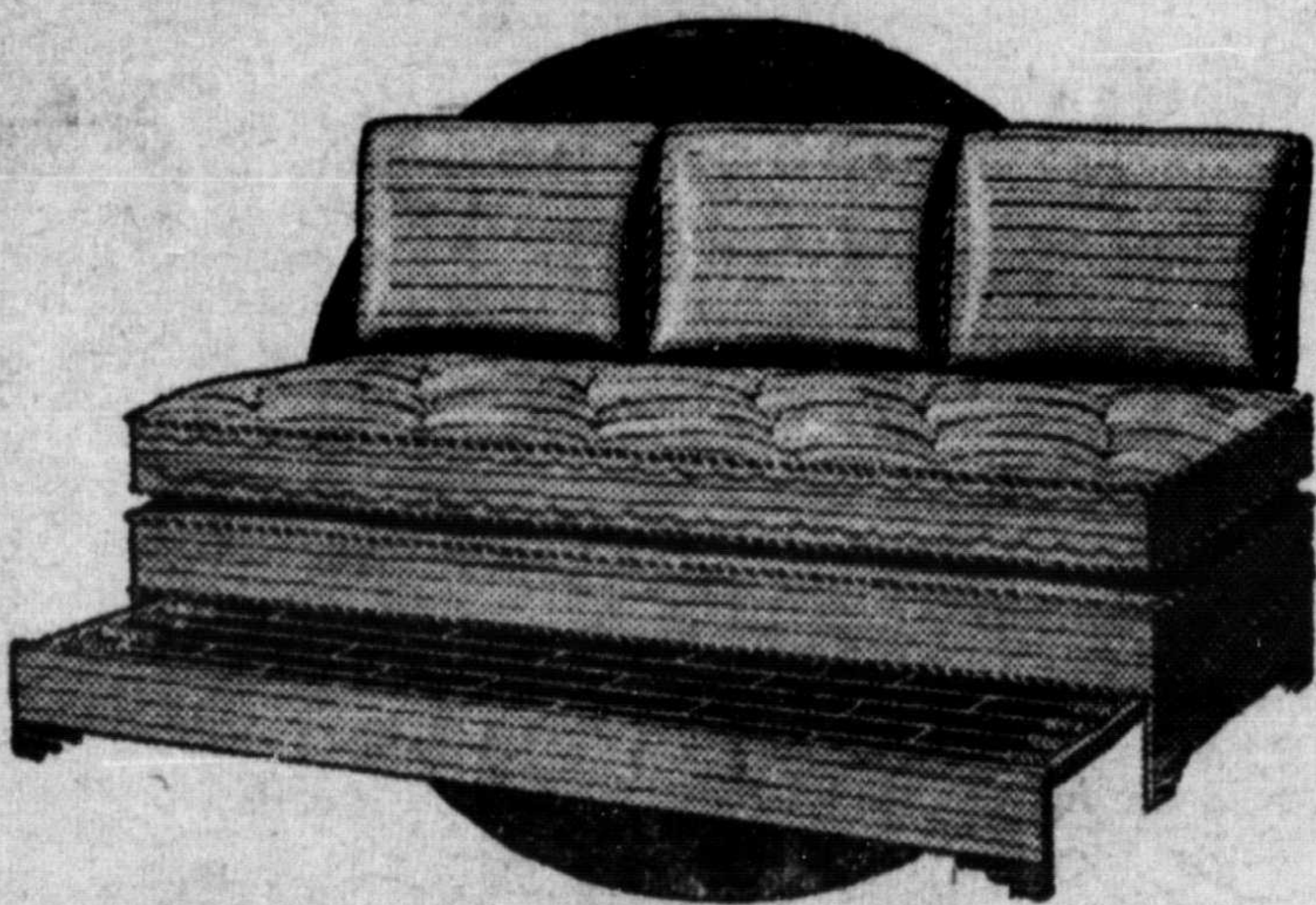

CHRONICLES of GINGER FARM

We are living in a different world, Partner and I. A different world, that is, from the one we were in last week. We are living where there is comfort, and warmth, and a feeling of intense satisfaction. All that as a result of having a furnace installed.

You people who have been used to warm furnace heated houses all your lives; you who have never had to spend half your time running from one stove to another—and then not have the house warm—you don't know what it means to feel that you are finally through with an annual fight to keep some semblance of heat and comfort in your house. Of course I don't mean to suggest that a house cannot be properly heated without a furnace. Many can be, and are. It depends on the house—on its construction, its position and its size.

We have tried our best with stoves and after figuring things out from every angle we decided that a furnace would take less fuel and give better results than three stoves. Why haven't we installed one before? Well, consider farm prices for ten years previous to the war and you have the answer.

Well, I had no idea putting in a furnace meant so much work, took so much time, and made so much confusion. The plumber tells me that this job in a new house is a cinch—installing one in an old, solidly built house is something else again. But he didn't need to tell me—I could see for myself. We have three cellars under the house, divided by stone walls twelve inches thick. Holes had to be made in these walls for the pipes to go through—and some of the pipes were twelve and fourteen inches in diameter. Partner was helping the plumber, and the two of them were pounding away with picks and crowbars. There was a time when I wondered if the job would ever be finished.

I don't know what the plumber thought of me—every day I would say—"Shall we be able to light the furnace today?" Finally, last Friday, came the answer for which I had been longing—"I think we can light the furnace about four o'clock today!"

I had to go out that afternoon but believe me I was back by four o'clock. However it was six

Highway Rule For Pedestrians

Pedestrians on the roads and highways of the province often cause motorists a near-fright by their apparent indifference to traffic, whether slow or speedy.

The rule for persons walking on the highways should be to walk towards approaching traffic, always on the left side of the road. Then there is no danger of being overtaken by traffic, to be injured thereby. Thus, during darkness, the pedestrian always has sufficient warning by the vision from a distance of approaching cars. Also it is just a step off the pavement should that step be necessary, without having to look around, as would be required were the walker on the other side of the road.

If pedestrians always walked on the left side of the road there would seldom be an accident to report involving them. It is the rule of the road in the sections and a common-sense method and worthy of universal adoption.

CHRIST'S VICTORY OVER DEATH (Easter Lesson)

Mark 16: 1-8; 1 Corinthians 15: 15-58.

GOLDEN TEXT — Thanks be to God, who giveth us the victory through our Lord Jesus Christ. 1 Corinthians 15: 57.

MEMORY VERSE: Thou art nigh, O Jehovah. Psalm 119: 151. THE LESSON IN ITS SETTING Time.—The appearance of our Lord to the women on Easter Sunday morning took place on Sunday, April 9, A.D. 30. The first epistle of Paul to the Corinthians was written to the great Greek city of Corinth somewhere between A.D. 57 and 59.

Place — The first appearance of our Lord to the women took place near the empty tomb, probably in the garden surrounding the tomb of Joseph of Arimathea. The church of Corinth, to which this Epistle was addressed, was in the great city of that name in central Greece.

State of Incorruption "There is one glory of the sun, and another of the moon, and another glory of the stars; for one star differeth from another star in glory." Paul simply draws attention to the many differences that appear in bodily forms.

"So also is the resurrection of the dead. It is sown in corruption; it is raised in incorruption. Incorruption is a timeless state, perfect, constant, changeless.

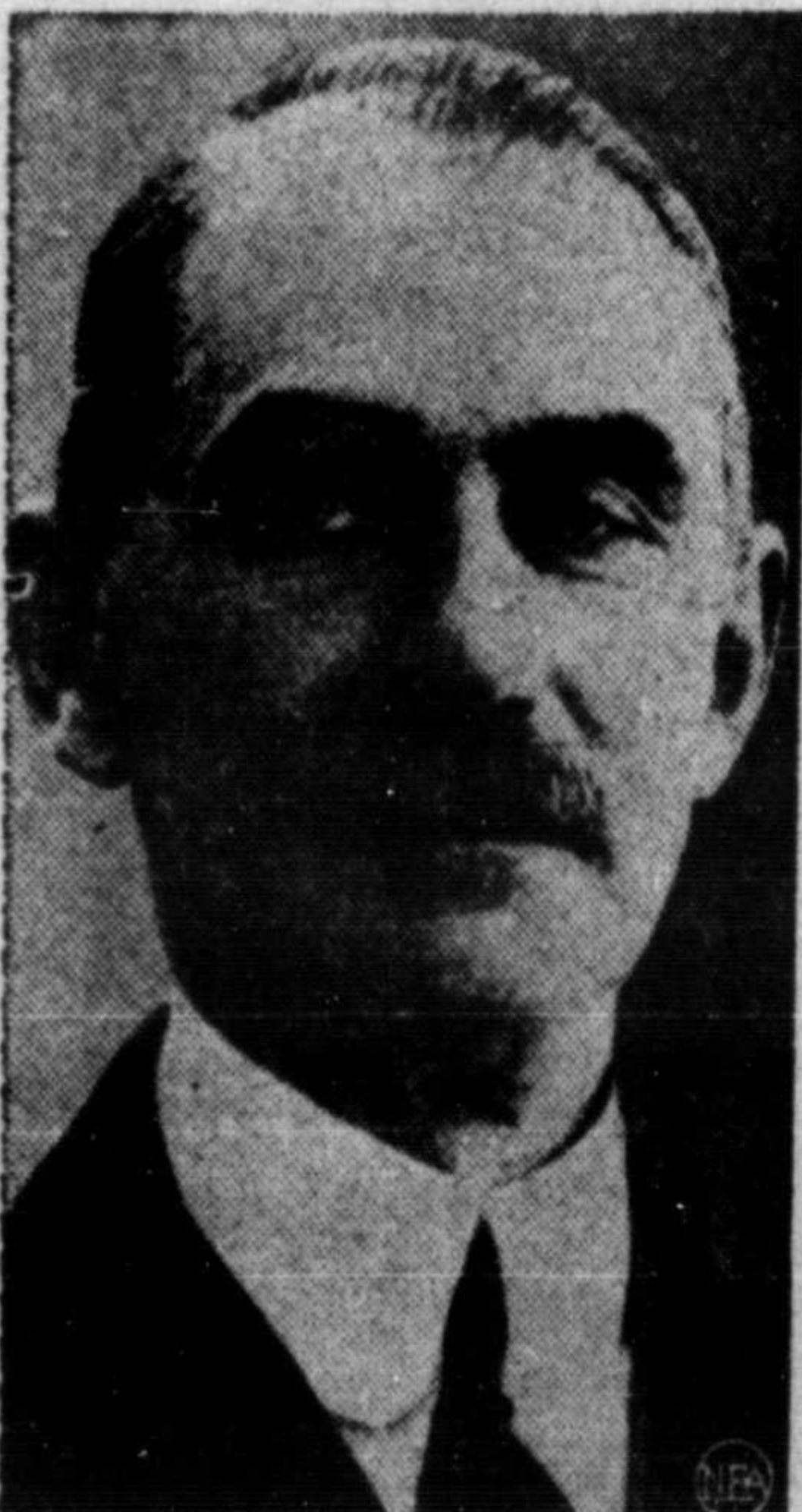
Dishonor and Glory "It is sown in dishonor; it is raised in glory." The apostle has no thought of any positive dishonor inflicted either by God or man upon the body during the present life — dishonor is simply in contrast with glory.

"It is sown in weakness; it is raised in a natural body; it is raised a spiritual body. If there is a natural body, there is also a spiritual body." As the phrase "a natural body" means a body like ours, formed by the energy of the principle of animal life, so must the phrase "a spiritual body," which describes the resurrection body, denote a body which shall be formed by the energy of the immortal spirit, a body specially adapted to the cravings and necessities of the spirit, as this present body is to those of the animal life.

In The Image of Christ "So also it is written, the first man Adam became a living soul. The last Adam became a life-giving spirit. Howbeit that is not first which is spiritual, but that which is natural; then that which is spiritual. The first man is of the earth, earthy; the second man is of heaven." The first Adam here, of course, is the first man God created. The last Adam is none other than the Lord Jesus Christ. The Apostle contrasts the first and second Adam. The one was a man; the other infinitely more.

Electronic Express For Speedy Travel

Aboard an "Electronic Express," travelers leaving New York would reach Chicago in half an hour and the Pacific Coast in an hour, according to Dr. Irving Langmuir, natural scientist who has won the Nobel prize for his researches.

Writing in "Mechanix Illustrated Magazine," Dr. Langmuir says "there is no fundamental reason why we could not travel at a speed of 2,000 to 5,000 miles an hour through a vacuum tube in which electronically controlled air-tight vehicles are magnetically suspended in space."

In agriculture, Dr. Langmuir envisions an orchard operated entirely without workers, in which fruit-bearing trees can be cultivated, and the fruit picked by machines operated and controlled electronically.

Parachutes Made Of The Finest Silk

It takes a jerk of 5½ tons to break the 28 cords of the British Army's parachute. Each rigging line is made of the finest braided silk cord, tested to a breaking strain of 450 lbs. The canopy to which they are attached is made of the finest silk. The whole business weighs 30 lbs., including harness and container bag, and costs £70 (280).

As a consequence it is now calculated that parachute jumping is no more dangerous than jumping off a slow bus. Minor injuries, such as sprained ankles and wrists, are down to less than three per thousand. Careful packing is an additional factor in this record. A flight-sergeant, who has been responsible for the packing of 38,000 parachutes, has never had one fail to open.

Record time for a man to run 440 yards (quarter-mile) is 46.2 seconds; this record was established in America.

### Some Mushroom Suggestions

We feel that the fine quality of mushrooms on the market just now entitles them to our respectful attention. Here are one or two recipes worthy of the best efforts of the best mushroomers and the best cooks.

**Mushrooms Au Gratin**  
 1/2 lb. mushrooms  
 1 sliced onion  
 3 tablespoons shortening  
 3 tablespoons flour  
 1 cup mushroom stock made from stems

3/4 cup bread crumbs  
 dash of pepper  
 1/4 teaspoon paprika  
 1 tablespoon butter  
 3/4 teaspoon salt  
 juice of one lemon

Peel mushrooms and sprinkle salt over them to extract the water. Fry onion in shortening; add flour and brown; add stock and then seasonings; cook until it is thickened. Drain mushrooms and add to the sauce. Place in baking dish, sprinkle with buttered bread crumbs and bake until crumbs are slightly browned.

 1 teaspoon chopped parsley  
 2 tablespoons chopped carrot

 3/4 teaspoon poultry seasoning  
 The amount of mushroom may be varied. This recipe makes 3 cups. When making for turkey of ten to twelve lbs. use 10 cups of bread crumbs and add 1 beaten egg.

### Hydro May Build More Rural Lines

Three hundred miles of rural Hydro lines will be constructed in Ontario next summer if the problems of labor and materials do not interfere with the program, Hydro Chairman George Challies (P.C., Grenville-Dundas) informed the Legislature recently.

Mr. Challies said the commission has accepted 4,000 farm contracts and 2,000 urban contracts for electrical services, the largest volume in the history of the Province for a like period.

"Last year 44 miles of rural Hydro line were constructed," said Mr. Challies. "We are asking the Dominion authorities to let us construct 300 miles of rural line this summer. If we can get labor and materials we will carry out this program as fast as possible."

In reply to an Opposition question, Mr. Challies said the 300-mile program would be divided among all parts of the Province on the basis of need. Abolition of the rural service charge would result in a possible loss of revenue to the commission of \$527,000, but increased use of power would offset that, it was explained.

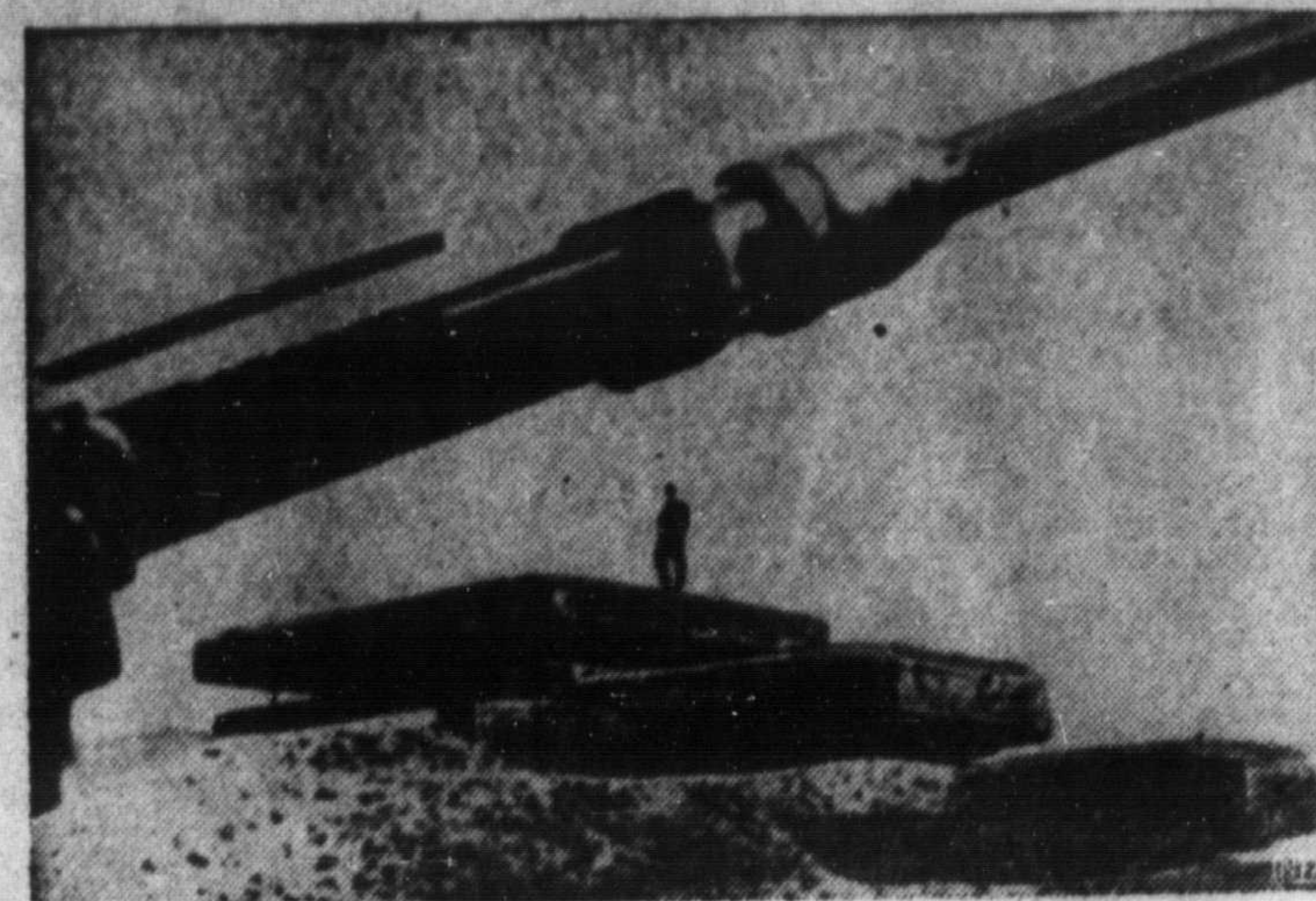

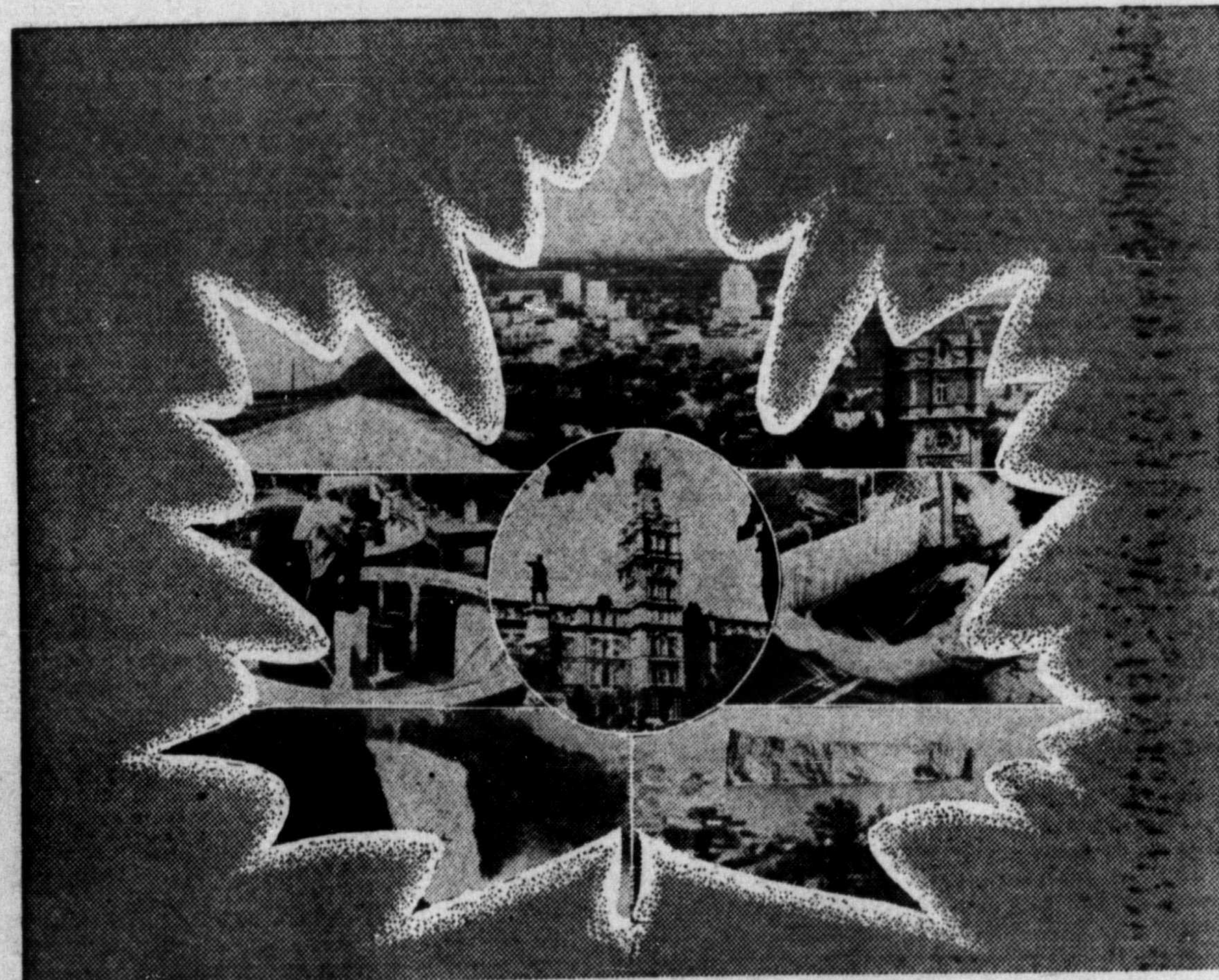

### Estimate Budget for

#### Single Working Woman

It will cost the single working woman \$1,497.60 as a minimum for healthful and adequate living in 1943. In the three years 1939-41, the average cost was \$1,113.42; if this is taken as the base income and increased by the rate of increase in the cost of living index from those dates to September, 1942, contemplated in the wage formula of 20 per cent, the income figure would be \$1,350. Consequently, with increased taxes, and despite economies figured at the maximum, there would be a deficit of \$147.60. These statements are made by the Heller Committee for Research in Social Economics, on the Berkeley campus of the University of California.

The budget, it is stated, indicates possible retrenchments in consumption in order to pay taxes, invest in war bonds, and still remain within the income limits set by the freezing order of October. It is pointed out that this program is not entirely feasible, because it assumes that the single working women's peacetime standard had sufficient slack to pay taxes, invest 10 per cent in war bonds, and still leave enough to cover cost of essentials at prices prevailing in March, 1943.

The wartime budget includes \$239.29 for taxes, \$62.50 for purchase of war bonds, leaving \$1,195.81 for consumption items. These are tabulated as follows: room and board, \$782.92; clothing, \$149.90; and miscellaneous, \$262.98. This last item includes these provisions: medical and dental care, \$44.51; care of the person, \$29.66; recreation, \$37.15; cigarettes, candy, etc., \$24; association dues, \$19.52; church and charity, \$11; gifts, \$7.72; stationery and postage, \$3.02; incidentals, \$9.14. Savings are diverted to purchase of war bonds.

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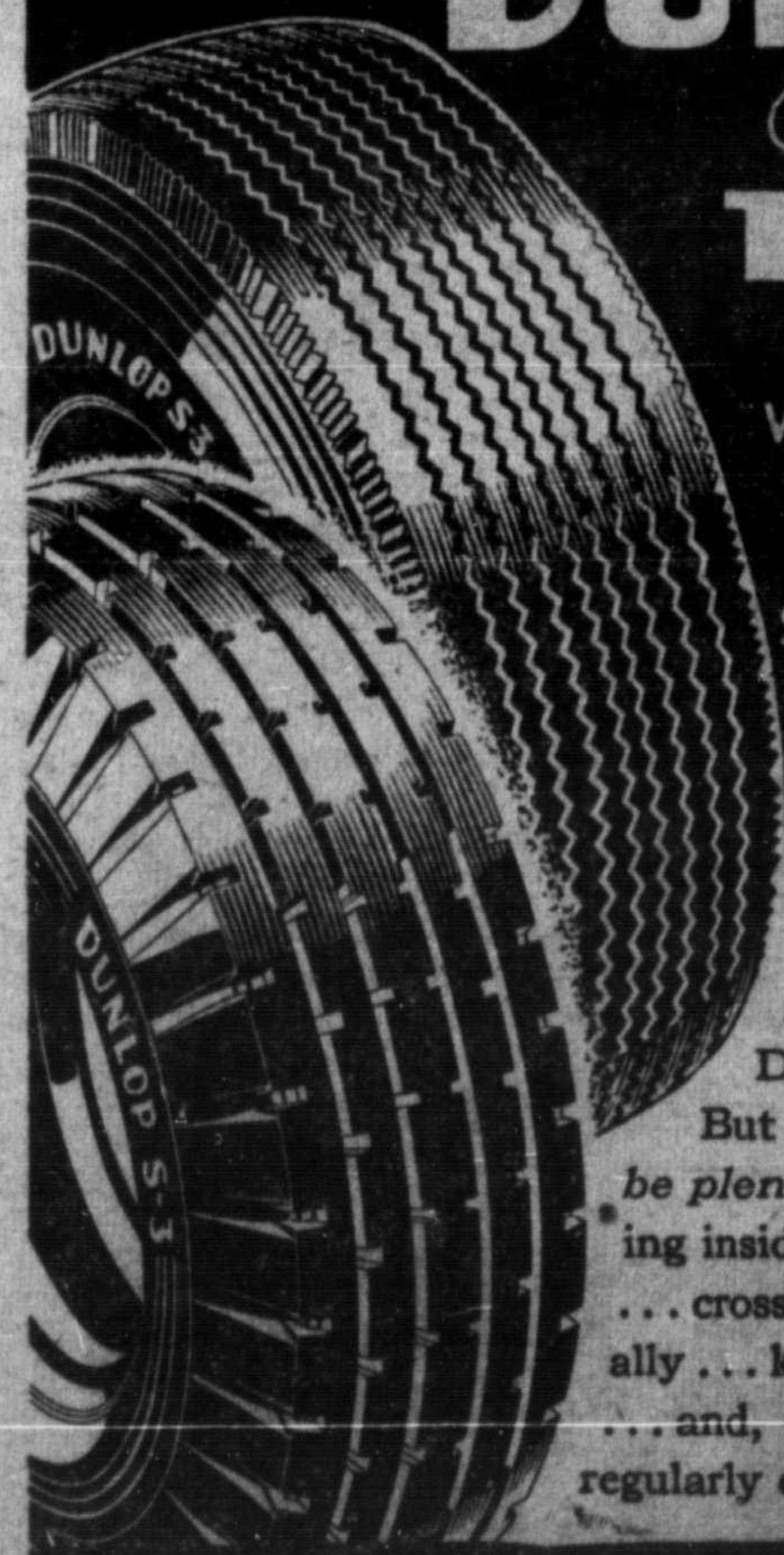
