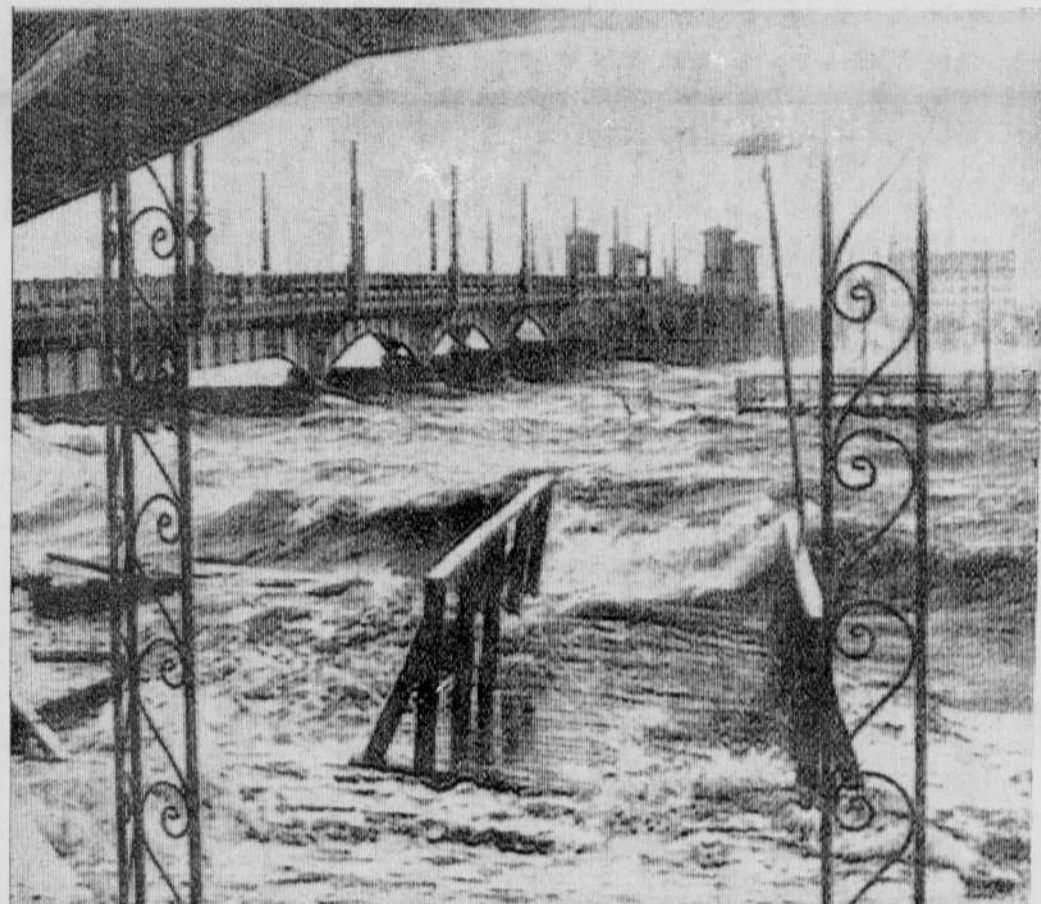

Dora's destruction moves west inland

ST. AUGUSTINE, Fla. (AP) — Hurricane Dora swirled directly into St. Augustine today with 115-mile winds, a 10-foot tide and torrential rains.

The hurricane's massive sweep also battered Jacksonville and Brunswick, Ga., and pushed gales into South Carolina.

Water flowed hip-deep in the ancient Slave Market Square in the heart of St. Augustine. Most streets were closed. Power was out. Trees were uprooted.

When Dora's calm eye pressed ashore, St. Augustine and Jacksonville beach had already been hammered by hurricane force winds, slashing rain and huge waves for more than 12 hours.

With Dora moving only seven miles an hour, the weather bureau warned the area to expect at least six more hours of beating as Dora plunged inland on a westerly course, expected to shift northward.

Rains of 10 to 15 inches were predicted for the rest of northern Florida and southeastern Georgia, producing flooding in rivers and streams, some severe.

Hurricane warnings flew as far as Charleston, S.C. SEAWALL CRUMBLES

Dora was a nightmare at Jacksonville Beach, 35 miles to the north. Pounded by hurricane force winds and crashing waves, the seawall began to crumble.

Floodwaters swirled three or four blocks from the beach and ran in some streets like a small river. Live wires hissed like snakes.

The top of a 47-year-old hotel was destroyed. The roof was ripped from a motel. The living room of a home was swept away. Flood waters sucked at the foundations of other buildings.

Twelve hundred refugees from the storm tried to sleep on the floor of a high school gym as rain swept in through broken windows.

Store windows were smashed at mainland Jacksonville, 18 miles from the beach. Police reported some looting. At least three men were arrested.

Power was out to 92 per cent of the city. Trees were bowled over and minor debris littered the streets.

Most of the power was also knocked out at the vacation city of Brunswick, about 100 miles north of St. Augustine. The roof of one building was blown completely away.

Damage figures were expected to run high in St. Augustine when people were able to leave shelter to take stock.

The only reported death caused by Dora was in Brunswick, where a man was missing and presumed drowned after he tried to retrieve a boat broken loose from its moorings.

Two navy flyers died in the crash of their plane being flown from Sanford, Fla., Naval Air Station out of Dora's path.

Quebec borrows from B.C.

QUEBEC (CP) — Two provinces almost a continent apart will come together financially Sept. 16 as Quebec borrows \$100,000,000 from British Columbia on short and medium-length terms.

The loan was hailed by the leaders of both provinces Wednesday as a symbol of co-operation and good relations between the provinces. One of the two premiers involved called it unprecedented.

Premier Jean Lesage announced the deal here while a similar announcement was made by Premier W. A. C. Bennett in Victoria.

The money will come from the \$275,000,000 British Columbia is to receive Sept. 15 from the United States in connection with the Columbia River hydro-electric project.

Mr. Bennett told a press conference British Columbia will earn "more than five per cent" on the deal.

He also said orders-in-council will have to be passed by both provinces to provide for the loan.

Mr. Lesage said he didn't know whether such an interprovincial loan has ever been concluded before but Mr. Bennett pronounced it unprecedented. Sept. 16 is the effective date for the transaction.

Mr. Bennett said the money will be paid back over a period of years with the first loans due back in one year.

He said details of plans for disposition of the Columbia prepayment will be announced in the next few days.

Picketing farmers die under wheels of truck in livestock 'strike'

BONDUEL, Wis. (AP) — The death of two members of the National Farmers Organization under the wheels of a heavy truck and the cries of other demonstrators that the driver be lynched have brought a truce in the Wisconsin part of a campaign to withhold livestock from the market.

Governor John W. Reynolds said Wednesday night that Open Lee Staley, president of the farmers group, had ordered cancellation of all previously planned Wisconsin demonstrations pending a meeting in the governor's office today.

Reynolds referred to the deaths as "the senseless shedding of blood."

Staley said at the organization's headquarters in Corning, Iowa, that the deaths while tragic "should serve as a symbol for greater effort on the part of farmers in an orderly and determined manner to price their products at the market place."

The two farmers were killed when a cattle truck lurched forward as hundreds of angry demonstrators attempted to block its entry into the yards of the Equity Cooperative Livestock Sales Association in this north-eastern Wisconsin community.

Killed were Howard Falk, 64, and Melvin L. Cummings, 43.

Charges of American manipulation have been voiced privately by some government officials. Premier Nguyen Khanh was asked at a press conference Wednesday whether the U.S. embassy had exerted any diplomatic pressure on his government during the recent crisis.

"Why don't you ask the embassy about that?" Khanh replied.

Hai Trieu Am particularly criticized American press coverage of recent developments in Viet Nam.

The truck was driven by Ivan Mueller, 40, an independent trucker who hauls livestock for farmers under contract. Authorities said he held a pistol in his hand as officers pulled him through the angry crowd.

Mueller was charged with homicide by reckless conduct, a charge carrying a maximum penalty of a fine up to \$2,500 and up to five years in jail or both. He did not appear in court and was held in jail under extra police precautions.

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The election of the new moderator was the first major business at the council sessions that began Wednesday morning. The entire day was taken up with services and naming of in-council committees.

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United Church's new head differs on episcopal rule

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld. (CP) — Dr. Ernest Marshall Howse of Toronto was elected moderator of the United Church of Canada here Wednesday night at the church's 21st biennial general council.

Within an hour of his investiture, the 62-year-old former Newfoundland differed sharply with former moderator Dr. J. R. Mutchmor on one issue and had stated firm convictions on at least three others.

In a farewell address to the council's 600 delegates earlier in Wednesday night's session, Dr. Mutchmor said he had "a very limited regard" for an episcopally-governed church which would result from a union between the United Church of Canada and the Anglican Church of Canada.

In a press conference following his investiture, Dr. Howse said he would favor such a union but did not see any great possibility of it at this time. "We've had a few great religious figures in recent history but most of them have been of the Anglican communion," he said.

Dr. Howse said he would have no objection to having bishops in such a united church.

HAD A CLEAR MAJORITY — The new moderator was given "a clear majority" of the 392 ballots cast by the council's commissioners. He won the high seat over two other nominees—Dr. Alexander Kerr, retired president of Dalhousie University, and Dr. Elias Andrews, principal of Queen's Theological College in Kingston, Ont. Full results will be disclosed later today.

Dr. Howse favored birth control. He said Canada's regulations on birth control contribute to the disrespect in which some areas of the legal system are held. "These regulations are based on ancient biblical reference which is not now upheld in even Roman Catholic theology."

He said: "Our divorce laws are a scandal to a civilized community. Everyone acknowledges that a revision is something that has to come to pass, but our politicians are running scared. Our legislators are timorous whenever the subject of revision comes up because they fancy the Roman Catholic clergy are against it." He said this is not the case.

Four sentenced

MONTREAL (CP) — Four men were sentenced Wednesday on charges of disturbing the peace during a noisy Sept. 1 demonstration at midtown Lafontaine Park by groups chanting separatist slogans.

A fifth accused, Claude Gauthier, 18, was given the "benefit of the doubt" and liberated by Judge Rene T. Hebert.

The four Maurice Gamache, 30, Real Duval, Rene Martin, and Gabriel Landry, all 19 were sentenced to seven days already spent in jail. In addition, Gamache was fined \$50 and Martin \$25.

Hong Kong hit

HONG KONG (AP) — The riot squad was called out to control thousands of panicky Chinese who rushed aboard ferries to the mainland today as typhoon Sally whirled toward Hong Kong with potentially devastating winds up to 200 miles an hour.

The giant typhoon appeared to be aiming a direct blow at the crowded British colony where typhoon Ruby killed 41 persons last Saturday.

Oct. 15 election?

LONDON (Reuters) — Prime Minister Sir Alec Douglas-Home was believed to have told a cabinet meeting today the date he has picked for the British general election—widely expected to be Oct. 15.

Authoritative sources expected the date to be kept a secret until early next week, with a public announcement probably Tuesday.

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Declared unfit

HALIFAX (CP) — Edward Thomas Boutillier, 18, of Halifax today was declared mentally unfit to stand trial for the capital murder of two young boys here Aug. 8.

Boutillier was arrested Aug. 10 after one of the biggest man-hunts this city had ever seen. He was charged Aug. 11 with the shooting deaths of Gordon Harling, 11, and James Squires, 12, and was sent to the Nova Scotia Mental Hospital for 30 days of mental examinations.

Moscow criticized

MOSCOW (Reuters) — Russians were told for the first time today of sharp criticism of Kremlin policy levelled by the late Italian Communist leader, Palmiro Togliatti.

The Soviet party newspaper Pravda devoted almost an entire page to Togliatti's political testament, written shortly before he died at 71 while on vacation in the Crimea Aug. 21.

In it, he criticized Russia and other Communist countries for slow progress in combating the remnants of Stalinism, and warned the Russians against the dangers of a head-on clash with China.

LBJ, Barry muster stars for foreign policy fight

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Johnson and Senator Barry Goldwater have mustered some all-star reinforcements for the general election campaign battles ahead over foreign policy.

The president announced at a press conference Wednesday the formation of a panel of 16 distinguished citizens "who will consult with the president during the coming months on major international problems facing the United States."

Goldwater, his Republican opponent for the presidency in the Nov. 3 election, announced in Seattle Wednesday during a campaign speech that a seven-man team headed by former vice-president Richard Nixon had been created.

The group, Goldwater said, will confer with free world leaders in "a serious and historically significant attempt to regroup freedom's badly scattered forces while there is still time."

"We do not intend to rubber-stamp four years of mistake, retreat and weakness in world affairs," Goldwater declared. On his part, Johnson made

no references to politics or the campaign and included both Democrats and Republicans on his panel—many of whom have had powerful roles in shaping

Malaysia lacks UN support

UNITED NATIONS (AP) — Malaysia is reported having difficulty trying to line up support for a United Nations condemnation of Indonesia charging President Sukarno's government with aggression.

UN diplomats expressed doubt that Malaysia could get the seven votes necessary in the 11-nation Security Council for any resolution of condemnation. Several members were reported opposed to a resolution that the Soviet Union was sure to veto.

There was a possibility that a watered-down compromise would emerge, but Indonesian deputy foreign minister, Sudjarwo Djondronegoro, has indicated he had invaded Malaysia.

Ancient remains sought in B.C.

VICTORIA (CP) — Excavations have started at Pedder Bay near Victoria into history that may go back 7,000 or 8,000 years.

Don Abbott, assistant provincial anthropologist, four trained workers and five high school students have started digging.

Provincial anthropologist Wilson Duff says the Pedder Bay site has long been considered one of the most valuable store-houses of early history here.

He says the maritime predecessors of present Indians arrived here about 3,000 years ago. And evidence shows earlier men who lived in British Columbia some 7,000 to 8,000 years ago "may have occupied this site."

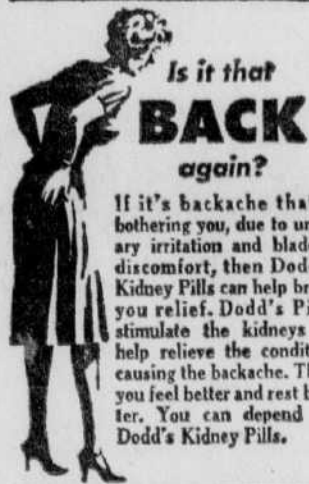

Loneliness of age, boredom of youth are combined for mutual solution

LONDON (CP)—Two of Britain's greatest problems — the loneliness of old age and the violent boredom of youth that produces the "mod" and "rocker" gangs — are being tackled by a young Londoner who believes if you bring the two problems together they will cancel out.

For nearly five years Anthony Steen, 24, and a group of his friends have devoted their spare time to mustering teen-agers in London's tough youth clubs to help old folk in the neighborhood. The help is essentially practical — visiting lonely old-age pensioners for an hour a week, mending a radio or painting a room, doing odd jobs for those unable to get about easily.

Now, with a network of 2,000 young people in the London area marshalled and directed by eight "counsellors" in their 20s, the movement has gained government recognition and a £3,000 (\$9,000) grant from the department of education. From Oct. 1 it will expand and intensify its operations as "Task Force '64"—a kind of domestic British peace corps.

LEND SUPPORT

One MP from each of the three political parties has agreed to serve on the executive council, presided over by Steen. Bankers and industrialists have lent their support. Lord Privy Seal Selwyn Lloyd, who is also leader of the House of Commons, has agreed to head an "advisory" council.

The entire operation is the brainchild of the dynamic Steen, a single-minded young man in a hurry.

Steen is convinced that youth—all youth—wants to serve. It just needs to be shown how. He first became aware of the world's misery at the age of four, watching an out-of-work man playing for pennies in the gutter. At 13 or 14 he decided he must do something practical to ease the lives of the unfortunate.

"To me it's simply the natural thing to want to help one's neighbor. I believe it's natural with most people. We just have to stimulate the latent conscience of these dead-end kids. All that frustrated energy must be turned to some use."

"What we want to do is take the knives out of their hands and shove paint brushes there instead."

FIRST STEP HARD

Winning the confidence of the slum-bred youngsters, the first link in the chain of service, was a hard task. They distrusted Steen's "counsellors," young upper middle-class men and girls, university-educated, smartly dressed, speaking a different language from the argot of the east end streets.

Steen impressed his own philosophy on his friends — what these kids really want is to be

accepted into our world, though they pretend to despise it. Make them feel accepted.

Once he took a party of leather-jacketed toughs to a concert at the Royal Festival Hall. They greeted the prospect of two hours of classical music with horror—ended up by buying tickets for another concert.

The counsellors' next step is to fire the teen-agers with enthusiasm for helping the old. Once they feel "accepted," they usually join in the communal projects with vigor, especially if challenged to finish a task in a certain time.

PAINTED APARTMENT

Recently a group volunteered to decorate an old lady's apartment in 48 hours. They each brought their own paint and when the job was done, one wall was green, one mauve, one orange and one pink. Fortunately the old lady was delighted.

"She said it was modern and what she'd always wanted."

The movement has many beneficial side-effects. Young people from Europe and all the Commonwealth countries are involved; the color bar is non-existent and international understanding is promoted.

The weekly Spectator magazine, which has been carrying a stream of letters and comment on Steen's activities, remarked in a recent editorial: "He has shown what any sensible person knew already despite lurid headlines, that there is a great willingness to be of service among today's young people: More than that, he has shown a way of using it."

Convicts, guards friendlier now official finds

WINNIPEG (CP)—The ice is breaking between prisoners and guards in federal penitentiaries, says John de Varennes.

The new deputy warden of Stony Mountain penitentiary, 15 miles north of Winnipeg, said recently he thinks a friendlier feeling has grown between guards and prisoners in his 19 years of service in federal prisons.

No longer does the convict "consider the guard just a guard."

Twenty years ago, said the deputy warden, the man who made friends with "the crews"—prison slang for guards—wasn't trusted by the prisoner body as a whole.

At his new post he said "I found a spirit of co-operation among the inmates here and I was agreeably surprised."

Mr. de Varennes, 51, started in the federal prison service at Montreal's St. Vincent de Paul penitentiary in 1945 after serving in the Royal Canadian Signal Corps.

His move to Stony Mountain puts him behind bars for the first time in nearly four years. He had previously been the first superintendent at the minimum security prison at Springhill, N.S.

He finds his job interesting and "if a person wasn't interested, I don't see how he could stand it."

"I think it's because you're dealing with people. Even though they're not a particularly satisfactory group from most people's point of view they're still just people too."

He says he often thinks of the convicts he tends "there but for the grace of God go I."

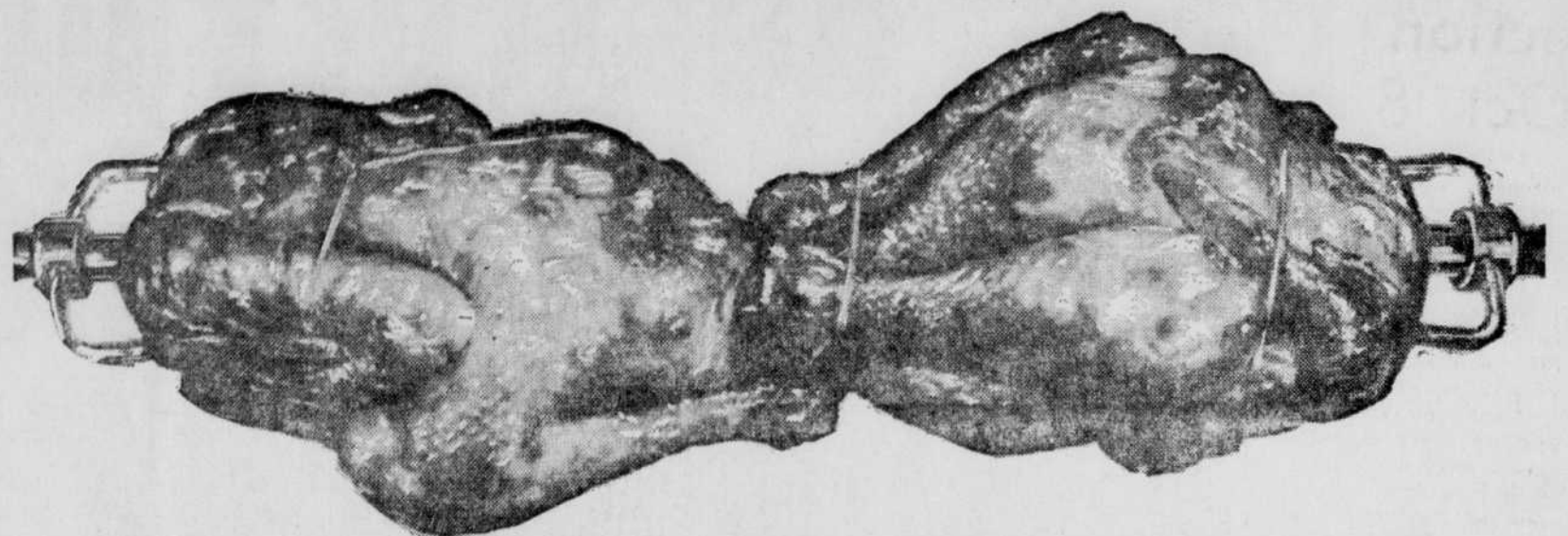

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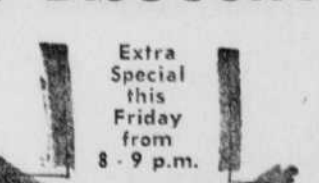

He is charged with having received a percentage in Coaticook's dealings with Couillard Construction Ltd., Couillard Automobile Inc., and Couillard Cement Products Ltd., companies in which Mr. Couillard had financial interest.

The charge and its denial by Mr. Couillard had been registered at Superior Court register over a year ago.

Parking lot is sought

ROCK ISLAND — (Special) — The Rock Island Town meeting was held in the town hall on Tuesday evening, under the presidency of Mayor Albert Fregeau.

Mr. Fregeau noted he is still negotiating for lease of a piece of land near the Main street Canadian Customs to be used by the town as an additional parking lot.

INVERNESS — (Staff) — Citizens of Leeds Village are demanding that justice be administered quickly to those responsible for the desecration of monuments in St. James Anglican Cemetery in Leeds last week.

According to C. W. McVetty, the vandals returned or broke some 32 monuments, and the marks are quite clear where they attempted to overturn larger stones but found them too heavy.

"The people of Leeds are aghast at this desecration and vandalism, especially since it is the second in a series of similar destructive acts, the first of which took place only a few years ago," Mr. McVetty said.

Unaware who fired fatal shots

MONTREAL (CP) — Mrs. Helen Dallos of Hamilton, Ont., told a special court hearing Wednesday she does not know who did the firing in the "Santa Claus" slaying of two police officers during a bank holdup in suburban St. Laurent in December, 1962.

The 27-year-old woman appeared at the hearing before the Quebec Appeals Court in connection with the case of Georges Marcotte, convicted a year ago of capital murder in the slayings.

A judge at the Wednesday session said her appearance at the trial would not have helped Marcotte.

Marcotte so far has received two stays of execution and his lawyer was allowed the hearing to permit presentation of new evidence after the Supreme Court of Canada turned down his appeal of the conviction last May.

Mrs. Dallos came upon the shooting scene as she was going to a nearby office in search of employment.

The pretty, Hungarian-speaking waitress told the court through an interpreter what she already had said in an affidavit — she saw two policemen being shot down by a "single volley of shots" in front of the bank.

New city hall recommended for Magog

MAGOG — (Staff) — The city of Magog has grown to a point where the existing city hall no longer has the facilities to handle Magog's municipal affairs as efficiently as it should.

This was the main point stressed in a report to the mayor and city councillors of Magog Tuesday night, by a special committee appointed last April to study the question of a new city hall for Magog.

Members of the committee unanimously agreed that it was necessary for Magog to construct a new city hall.

The committee said in the press release that in view of long term considerations it did not recommend any immediate steps be taken towards starting construction until a competent plan director had been appointed by the city.

This would ensure a proper integration of the proposed city hall with the factors determining the choice of a site, future city expansion, automobiles, future bridges, etc. The committee stated in the release that they did not feel qualified to make any definite decisions with regard to such matters.

LEFT TO ARCHITECT

The decisions governing choice of design and structure must be left to a competent architect, the committee stated. The committee could only recommend that it be large enough to cover future needs as well. Even though this might mean considerable amounts of unused space at present, it would be a guarantee for the future needs of the city.

By visiting several communities, the committee was able to compile the following information concerning the construction of city halls. Coaticook, with a population of 7,000, has spent \$232,000 on its city hall built in 1955. Victoriaville, population 25,000, spent \$250,000 in 1952 to construct its city hall. Cowansville, population 14,000, built its city hall for \$250,000 in 1961. Waterloo, population 4,500, spent \$250,000 in 1954. The community of Pierrefonds, 20,000 people, rents its city hall for \$9,000 a year.

The committee stated in its release that the price of building city halls has gone up enormously in the last 10 years. The methods of financing the project already known to the committee are the following, but not necessarily the only ones nor the best: bond issues, winter work, federal govern-

The challenge of the E.T. autoroute

That was a glittering prospect painted for the Eastern Townships area by Quebec Autoroutes Authority director of technical services Jean Major the other day.

In a talk to the Sherbrooke Rotary Club, Mr. Major foresaw new industries, new employment facilities, new taxes for municipalities and for schools, expanded tourist trade, all coming about as a result of the Eastern Townships autoroute now a-building.

It is, of course, part of Mr. Major's job to be enthusiastic about autoroute developments. But we don't think he was overstating the case. In fact, for all his optimism, Mr. Major was careful to make some pertinent qualifications.

He pointed out that while the autoroute will make good things possible for residents of the Eastern Townships, benefits are not just going to fall into our hands like ripe apples from a tree.

It will be necessary for business and professional men in this area, and for municipal authorities to take action if

the bright potential held out is to become reality.

In a number of areas, this action is being taken, particularly as regards the tourist industry. But in too many other areas, attitudes are not satisfactory.

On the one hand, there are those who assume that increased population and business will come automatically along the completed autoroute, like water about a pipeline. They sit with folded hands, awaiting the deluge.

On the other hand, there are those who fear the new developments the autoroute can bring; people who are attempting to resist change and who are apprehensive about the future.

Both groups do themselves and those whom they represent an injustice.

There is a harvest that must be reaped. There are going to be inevitable changes that must be controlled and shaped to the advantage of the Eastern Townships. This will require imagination, vigor, and above all, the will to progress.

Time for action on butter subsidy

Indications that Canada's huge butter surplus, which has been a headache to the government and the taxpayers alike, may shortly disappear makes this an opportune time for a complete review of the subsidy program which has been operating for the past several years.

Except for a slight excess of consumption over production in the past few months resulting from unfavorable weather conditions, the reduction of the surplus has been brought about by large sales in the export market. Most of these sales have resulted in a loss to the government of thirty cents or more per pound — the difference between the 33 cents paid by most importers and the 64 cents support price paid the farmer.

The problem faced by the government is simple but the answer to it is filled with political implications.

Basically the administration must decide whether the support price system should be abolished and future prices left to the normal law of supply and demand or whether it should continue the subsidies with the possibility that

reserves may again reach unwieldy proportions.

Removal of price supports might result in some temporary dislocations for the dairy industry but when a degree of balance between supply and demand has been reached, it is not unreasonable to expect that prices will be maintained at a point giving a fair return to the producer and a reasonable price to the consumer.

To maintain artificially high prices to the producer would encourage excessive supplies which could not be absorbed by the domestic market. To dispose of the surplus abroad, the government would have to underwrite huge losses.

To permit the dairy industry to adjust itself to the new conditions, the removal of the subsidy should be on a graduated basis, aid being reduced by a few cents a pound at predetermined intervals.

The government is concerned for the welfare of the dairy farmer, but it must also consider the interests of the taxpayer and the consumer.

Politics make strange bedfellows, so it is said.

And there will be many a wry smile apparent over the announcement that the Province of British Columbia has made a loan of \$100,000,000 to the Quebec Provincial Government.

Few provincial governments have as little in common as those led by Premier Jean Lesage and Premier W. A. C. Bennett.

Whereas the Quebec Premier has been loud in his demands for greater recognition of the rights and privileges of the French Canadians, his British Columbia counterpart has been almost as virulent

in his insistence of the preservation of the Anglo-Saxon aspect of Canadian life.

And Mr. Bennett has made no secret of his sympathy for Real Caouette as opposed to Robert Thompson in the Social Credit movement, a support that may well have placed Mr. Caouette in the position of being the chief opponent of Mr. Lesage in the next Quebec election.

But nothing must be placed in the way of a good horse trade.

So we see financially-pressed Quebec touching its treasury-bulging Pacific coast confere for the odd hundred-million just to carry it over.

Robert Thompson and hate sheets

Some hate sheets are more rabid in their anti-Semitic and anti-Negro sentiments than others, but all use the line that they are defenders of the Christian capitalistic society.

This is the bait used by divisive organizations to trap the unwary, and Social Credit leader Robert Thompson seems to have fallen for it.

Any political party, however minute, which shows even a tenuous interest in a program sponsored by hate operators will be judged in this light.

Some months ago, Mr. Thompson, on House of Commons stationery, expressed confidence in the leadership of the Christian Action Movement. The director of this organization is also the editor

(Toronto Telegram) and publisher of the Canadian Intelligence Service which advertises, recommends and sells the Protocols of the Elders of Zion, a classic-Semitic sheet.

In the same communication the Social Credit leader said he was doing all he can "to fight for the principles which are represented in the Christian Action Movement."

He is not a member of this movement and he now repudiates its leadership, but he still supports its principles. Ostensibly these are Christian and anti-Communist, yet how would Mr. Thompson explain their association with the infamous Protocols?

If any party needs to exercise care in this area, it is Social Credit. Some of its

members have been openly anti-Semitic. The party itself has been touched by the shadow of this scourge.

Surely Mr. Thompson can avow his belief in Christianity and free enterprise without reference to the Christian Action Movement. If he has erred, let him say so. If he refuses, we shall know where he stands.

Medway Queen

Dunkirk heroine is now catering, saved from death in a scrapyard

LONDON—(NEA)—A wartime heroine who saved the lives of 7,000 British troops in 1940 has just been given a last-minute reprieve from the death sentence.

She is the Medway Queen, a 316-ton side-wheel steamer, credited with rescuing under fire more British soldiers from the flaming beaches of Dunkirk than other non-naval vessels.

Since the war the Medway Queen has been plying the Thames River as a pleasure boat, her glorious wartime record all but forgotten. But when it was announced last October that the famous paddle steamer, now a dowager of 40, was to be broken up for scrap, a group of sentimental Britons decided to do something about it.

They formed the Medway Queen Trust with the goal of raising \$24,000 to buy the side-paddler by August this year. They were far short of their goal, however, when a catering firm stepped in with a sizeable last-minute contribution. Now it looks as though the Medway Queen will finish her days as a restaurant anchored along the Thames.

The catering firm has assured the boat's original backers that it will do everything possible to preserve the Medway Queen's original character and dignity.

The Medway Queen's fame goes back to May 1940 when half a million British troops found themselves bottled up on a narrow strip of beach at Dunkirk by the advancing Nazi offensive.

Not even the most optimistic British general thought that more than 30 per cent of these troops could be evacuated. But a fleet of small craft, including the Medway Queen, set out from Britain to try to bring the boys safely home.

The "Mosquito Armada," as this motley assortment of vessels was called, included oyster dredgers, cockle boats, as well as coal-burning minesweepers and private yachts.

They had such fanciful names as the Royal Daffodil, the Brighton Belle, and Yorkshire Lass, and there was even a Dracula and a Frightened Lady among the craft.

What distinguished the Medway Queen from the others was that she was not only one of the first ships in at Dunkirk, but one of the last ships out, making seven round trips.

Her crew was under almost continuous shellfire and aerial strafing, and managed with only a few hours' sleep and very little food for six days.

Robert Brett, a crew member, describes the weird sight that greeted him when he

took ashore one of the big boats the Medway Queen had towed to Dunkirk.

"I sighted a causeway about eight feet wide heading out into the water," Brett relates. "To my surprise I found it to be a perfectly ordered straight column of men about six abreast, standing as if on parade."

"When I reached them a sergeant stepped up to me and said, 'Yes, sir. Sixty men, sir?' He then walked along the column, which remained in perfect formation, and detailed the required number to follow me."

On one of its trips home the Medway Queen was following in the wake of the Brighton Belle, another paddle steamer, when the latter hit the hulk of a wrecked ship and ripped off her bottom. The Medway Queen closed on the Brighton Belle as she sank, picked off the 800 troops which the doomed ship was carrying, plus her crew, her captain, and even the captain's dog.

Some Britons are critical of the decision to turn the Medway Queen into a restaurant. It would have been better if she could have been preserved as a Dunkirk memorial, they argued, tied up at a permanent mooring like the clipper ship Cutty Sark. All, however, agree that the Medway Queen's new role is better than inglorious death in the scrapyard.

WASHINGTON (CP)—Outside of the presidential race, no contest seems likely to generate more interest in the Nov. 3 United States elections than the choice of a single U.S. senator from New York state.

Attorney-General Robert (Bobby) Kennedy seeks to unseat moderate Republican Kenneth Keating. That by itself promises a good scrap.

But a lot of other factors elevate this encounter.

The outcome will help decide, for example, where the golden name of Kennedy is headed in American politics—now and in the next presidential election of 1968.

Robert Kennedy, 38, could not get the vice-presidential nomination that he wanted and President Johnson gave it to Minnesota Senator Hubert Humphrey.

Promptly, Kennedy began working for the New York senatorial nomination. The state machine from New York Mayor Robert Wagner on down closed behind him officially, but his welcome was not wholehearted.

Kennedy lives in Virginia and votes in Massachusetts and is therefore vulnerable to the charge of "carpetbagging" made by Senator Keating.

He also launched his New York campaign for the nomination with the help of some votes or 50.7 per cent of the total votes. His majority was only 32,992.

He probably would have a much better chance in another off-year, or non-presidential election. But that is just one of several unknowns that make this particular contest a more

than usually difficult calculation.

There will be a third candidate, a Conservative splinter party representative loyal to Senator Goldwater. How much will that hurt Keating?

How many voters, angered by northern race riots, will vote against Kennedy as an architect of civil rights and a Johnson man? How many moderate Republicans will vote for Keating as a protest against Senator Goldwater?

How many Democrats will resent the Kennedy appearance in the state? How strong is the effective Kennedy appeal?

Judging by the Democratic party convention, the name still packs a mighty emotional wallop. Robert Kennedy got a 13-minute ovation in attempting to introduce a memorial film about the late president at the convention in Atlantic City in August.

It remains to be seen how much was for the younger Kennedy himself. Some observers feel he has mellowed and become a more appealing figure in the last few months, less obviously determined than the man who, for example, hounded labor leader Jimmy Hoffa into a court conviction.

If he wins in November, he will be 42 years old in 1968 and armed with four years of experience in the Senate, which is regarded as essential training for honing a sense of achieving the politically possible.

Stoker, of Montreal, said that his plans had been considered this last summer, but the location had to be submitted. He also said that the new theatre will be within easy range of the new autoroute which will be welcome to all from around and Montreal as well.

The Guild hopes to present each year a full season of professional theatre on a non-profit basis, with proceeds to go back to promote dramatic art in North Hatley district. A drive is now going on to raise funds for the venture for which a goal of \$30,000 has been set.

Better understanding at Cowansville

Police, fire departments undergo reorganization

COWANSVILLE (Staff)

Ernest Deschamps, municipal police chief of Cowansville, disclosed Monday that the police and fire departments of Cowansville had undergone a period of stiff re-adjustment last year. He said that they have been reorganized for several weeks now and an atmosphere of better understanding has resulted.

During the month there were 94 cars kept under surveillance, and 2,949 business establishments kept under surveillance by alarm systems.

The police chief stated that formerly the two departments were hampering each other's operation, but since they have arrived at a workable solution to their problems they are able to provide the city with a more adequate system of public safety.

Police chief Deschamps gave an account of the activities carried on by the police and fire departments of Cowansville in the month of August 1984:

According to the report by the chief of Cowansville's municipal police force, the department received 410 calls, 37 complaints, and made 17 investigations.

The police received 243 reports, three of them concerning the condition of roads and sidewalks. The police made three reports to the municipal department of roads and highways.

There were no articles found by the police in the course of their rounds.

The police found the doors to 25 stores opened after closing hours, and five thefts were reported. The value of stolen articles amounted to \$2,560.

The value of stolen property traced, recovered and returned to owners was \$2,552.

The number of accidents reported to the police was 18, five people were hurt in these accidents, but no one was killed. Three children were reported missing, all were found. There were four reports of lost animals.

The police patrolled 681 hours in the month of August, and 40 hours of patrol for traffic duties. During the patrol hours 46 reports were made.

There were 13 persons detained in police cells during the month.

Cases presented before the court numbered three, and the Cowansville police force gave assistance to other police forces on 16 occasions.

The police made 31 inspections of the reservoir, gave out 462 tickets for breaches of the law, and collected \$791 in fines.

There were 281 radio calls. During the month there were 94 cars kept under surveillance, and 2,949 business establishments kept under surveillance by alarm systems.

The Cowansville police car travelled 7,811 miles during the month, and the police motor-cycle travelled 301.

The police department collected \$750.80 from parking meters, \$438 from the sale of dog licences. The total revenue for the police department in the month of August was \$2,204.90.

The fire department received 5 calls during the month. None of these calls were for chimney fires. Three fires during the month caused damages, but there were no damages to furniture.

There was \$800 in property damage, but no damage to merchandise was reported.

There were 69 who reported to the fires.

The Cowansville fire department conducted two fire drills, and 42 persons took part.

The number of feet of hose-pipe used at the fires was 180 feet. The number of gallons of chemical products used was one extinguisher of Co2 weighing 30 pounds, four 20 pound containers of dry chemical, and 20 gallons of Unox.

There was one false alarm. The time spent fighting the fires was one hour. The average time it took to answer the calls was one minute and a half.

There was no indication after the Conservative caucus that any change would be made in the party's position, but the gap between Opposition Leader Diefenbaker's stand, and Mr. Douglas' proposals, was not wide.

The opposition leader had said he would agree to a time limit on the debate providing the committee returned a verdict by an 80-90 per cent majority. Under Mr. Douglas' proposal, this time limit could be negotiated after the committee report was handed down.

Meanwhile, Mr. Diefenbaker's Quebec lieutenant, Leon Balcer, suggested in the Commons Wednesday that a committee majority of only two-thirds should be required. His speech, the first he has made in the marathon debate, differed in several respects from the views of his leader.

AGAINST PLEBISCITE

The Quebec MP opposed the idea of a plebiscite, suggested earlier by Mr. Diefenbaker in a form of an amendment. And he came out firmly in favor of a single-maple-leaf design.

Mr. Balcer, former Conservative transport minister, said he was disappointed with the stand

CRUMBLE TOP TART

6 oz. Graham wafer pastry shell
1/2 cup currants
1 cup chopped seeded raisins
1 cup sultanas
2 teaspoons cinnamon

A little cornstarch
4 bananas
4 teaspoons lemon juice
1 1/2 cups water
1 tablespoon butter
1/2 cup flour
3 tablespoons sugar

METHOD:

Chop bananas small and boil with 3/4 cup of the water, 1 tablespoon of sugar and 2 teaspoons of the lemon juice for a few minutes, then thicken with the cornstarch. Beat until creamy, then spread in a dish lined with the graham wafer pastry shell.

Boil sultanas, raisins, currants, remaining lemon juice, cinnamon, 1 tablespoon of sugar and remaining 3/4 cup of water for a few minutes, thicken with cornstarch, then spread over the bananas.

Rub flour, 1 tablespoon sugar and butter together until very crumbly, spread over fruit and bake till golden brown in moderate oven, 350 degrees. Serve cold with whipped cream.

Tattle-tale-grey

CHICAGO — (AP) — Some laundering advice for housewives:

That tattle-tale grey is harder to avoid in washing many chemically-treated cotton clothes and fabrics than untreated cotton materials. The reason is they attract more dirt in the rinse water.

The same thing may happen with other natural fibres, two chemists told the American Chemical Society recently.

Protective coatings to make clothes and fabrics resist water, oil and food stains, or to give them a softer feel and other desirable qualities, are being used widely.

In actual use, such fabrics don't attract as much dirt as untreated cotton, they said. The coatings repel dirt and stains because they have a lower "surface tension."

But once in hot water, even with detergents, they don't get as clean as untreated cotton fabrics, said Henry Peper, Jr. and Julian Berch, of the Harris Research Laboratories, Washington, D.C. Their surface tension rises, to grab onto dirt particles and oily stains in rinse water. The dirt that has gotten in is harder to get out.

Peper described tests made for the U.S. department of agriculture with cotton fabrics coated with silicones, fluorocarbons and acrylic materials.

He said the findings do not apply to wash-and-wear clothes. Further research may lead to chemical finishes that do clean just as well as untreated cotton, he said.

DEAR GIRLS — Often when we want to get a job done quickly or to do a more thorough one, we may be tempted to mix household cleansing agents under the mistaken impression that if one does a good job, two will do a better one. Walter Reuther sees Ford deal in his very near future

DETROIT (AP) — Walter Reuther, president of the United Auto Workers Union, will begin a drive at Ford Motor Company Friday for the equivalent or better of the new Chrysler agreement which he estimated to be worth 54 cents an hour during the next three years.

Reuther said that after Ford he would proceed to General Motors Corporation.

The union also is expected to demand the same pattern—including a possible pension in 1965 of up to \$400 a month at age 60—from American Motors Corporation, scores of supplier

plants and the agricultural implements industry. The big three of GM, Ford and Chrysler employ more than 500,000 UAW-represented workers. Their contracts often set national patterns.

The UAW began contract negotiations with GM of Canada Wednesday with higher wages one of the key issues.

George Burt, Canadian regional director of the UAW said in Toronto that the union wants less disparity between wages paid its 42,000 Canadian members and those in the United States.

He said negotiations with Canadian plants of Chrysler open Sept. 15 and with Ford Sept. 30.

BONUS RETIREMENT PLAN Most significant gains at Chrysler announced Wednesday were in areas of earlier retirement, where workers would get a bonus for quitting at 60 instead of 65, and in higher pen-

sions generally. The union kept its cost-of-living escalator clause and won company agreement to payment in full of hospital-medical insurance premiums for retired workers as well as regular employees.

The new Chrysler contract, yet to be signed but agreed upon in principle, was described by Reuther as "the most historic agreement in the American labor movement."

The UAW chief said the agreement was non-inflationary and would require no price increase. As a matter of fact, Reuther said, the company could cut car prices "and still make a profit much more satisfactory than for the average American industry."

John D. Leary, Chrysler vice-president, agreed the settlement was non-inflationary, but said no decision had been made as to what effect, if any, it would have on prices of 1965 Chrysler models.

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Urges more spending on education

MONTREAL (CP) — Canada will fade out of the picture as an industrial nation unless Canadians spend double the proportion of their national income on education by 1980, George Hees, president of the Montreal and Canadian Stock Exchanges, said today.

"Education today has become the greatest single factor in our economic growth," Mr. Hees said. Either "we hitch our wagon to the explosion of new knowledge and learn how to make use of all that the scientific revolution brings to us or we retreat into obscurity. He was speaking at a luncheon meeting of the Montreal Real Estate Board. A text of his remarks was made available to the press before delivery.

"Another factor in assessing why it is that education has become so vital to our economic growth is (that) we are confronted by the competitive rival social systems of the Communist countries. Just staying in that race means for us a much greater concentration on knowledge, a much greater expansion of new educational facilities."

The problem in Canada was similar to that faced by Great Britain. In order to keep pace with the rapidly growing need for scientific education "we will have to do the same as Great Britain, and by 1980 will have to spend on education double the proportion of our national income that we are spending today."

"It will be an expenditure that we will be making in our own best interest, to make sure that we are able to stay in business and continue to make a profit. To fail to make this expenditure will be to fade out of the picture as an industrial nation."

Show Business

HOLLYWOOD (AP)—For 30 years the Country Church of Hollywood has dispensed its old-time religion, and it's still going strong.

You'll find it not many steps from Hollywood and Vine, yet when you enter its grounds, shaded by tall jacaranda, camphor and pine trees, the din of the city seems far away. As you enter the white-stepped church, you are transported to another, simpler era.

At services on Sunday morning and evening and prayer meetings Wednesday night, the rafters ring with the sounds of gospel singing and the word of the Lord is spoken by Rev. Rudy Atwood.

Martha Hogg, daughter of the founder and member of the board of trustees, talked proudly of the building, modelled after a small church in Ashland City, Tenn., her father had visited as a circuit rider.

He was William Bennett Hogg, a high school principal in Mississippi until he entered the service of God. He became a Methodist minister, served as chaplain with the U.S. Army during the First World War.

Hogg returned to the ministry, but in 1928 suffered a nervous breakdown and was confined to a veterans' hospital for two years. After his recovery he turned to evangelism, appearing at large tabernacles in Chicago and Los Angeles. It was here that he found himself without a job, and he suggested to radio station KEAC a program about a country parson.

BECAME FAVORITE

The minister and his wife became known as Josiah and Sarah Hopkins, and their program was a local favorite. Through it he saw the fulfillment of a dream.

"Hollywood is the most preposterous place to build a country church," he said. "That's why I want to build it here. I want a church with none of the high pressure of today's religion. A little church we don't have to fill, one which people don't feel they have to come to or contribute to."

So the Country Church rose on Argyle Street.

"It was a miracle church," said Miss Hogg. "Everyone contributed to building it; the architect was the only person paid."

But the church didn't remain as simple as her father hoped. Prayer meetings were held five times a week next door in a tent seating 3,000. He became a national celebrity with his sponsored radio show, Goose Creek Parson, on the CBS network. Hogg died in 1937, three years after the Country Church was built.

His wife carried on the local radio shows until her illness two years ago. His daughters and others have striven to maintain the church as he conceived it: A simple refuge for the soul in today's complicated world.

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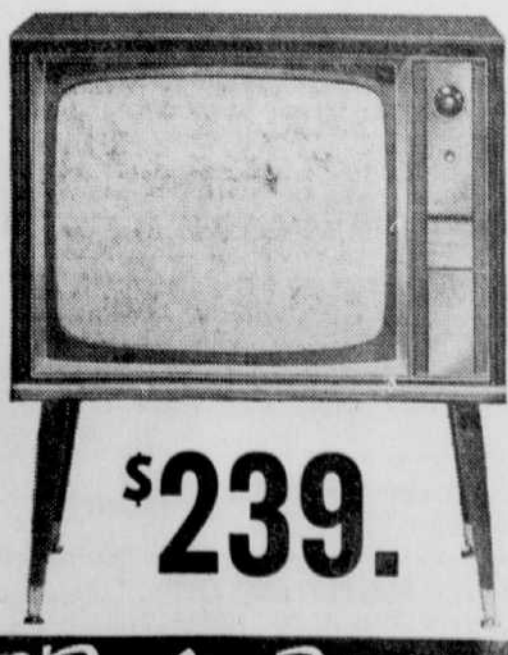

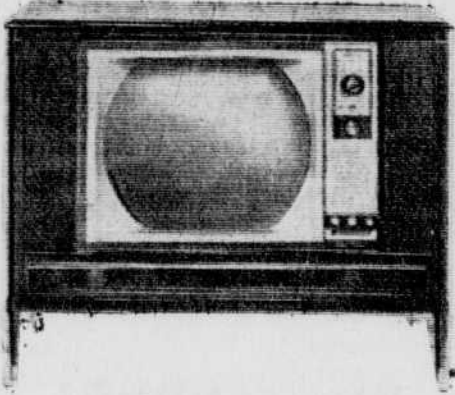

Clubs pinning high hopes on off season deals

Although major league baseball is still drawing the fanfare, rookies and veterans are going full tilt in four National Hockey League training camps.

New York Rangers will be the fifth club to don skates when practice sessions open Monday in Winnipeg. Montreal Canadiens take to the ice at Montreal Forum Tuesday.

The four teams now in action — Toronto Maple Leafs, Detroit Red Wings, Chicago Black Hawks and Boston Bruins — have the usual parade of rookies but it's obvious that all four club coaches are pinning their hopes on their off-season shopping.

Coach George (Punch) Imlach of the Maple Leafs, who has assembled 70 players at Peterborough, is studying the potential of veteran netminder Terry Sawchuk and rookie Ron Ellis.

Sawchuk was picked up from Detroit during the annual NHL player draft and Ellis is up from Toronto Marlboros of the Ontario Hockey Association Junior A Series.

Ellis, 19, signed a two-year contract with the Leafs Wednesday and Imlach said: "This is the best kid we've signed since Dave Keon became a Leaf."

He's also the first player to join the Leafs with a year left to play in junior hockey since defenceman Carl Brewer made the jump in 1959.

At St. Catharines, where the Black Hawks opened their training camp Wednesday with 28 players looking for 18 positions, general manager Tommy Ivan gave close scrutiny to former Red Wing John Miszuk and Doug Mohns and Jerry Toppazzini, acquired from Boston during the off-season.

Chicago's best rookie prospect is Dennis Hull, Bobby's younger brother, who played last season with St. Catharines Black Hawks of the OHA Junior Series.

"We're looking for a little more scoring punch along the left side and Murphy and Hall could provide it, but it's too early for anything definite," manager-coach Sid Abel said.

Abel admitted his biggest problem is fitting netminder Roger Crozier into Sawchuk's pads, "but his work last year for us leads me to believe he can handle the job."

Crozier played in 15 NHL games last season while filling in for Sawchuk who was injured.

Yankee deal approved by AL owners
BOSTON (AP)—"I just hope transaction would result in a thorough investigation by the justice department of baseball's immunity from antitrust laws."

Despite the split, the Orioles increased their lead to one game over Chicago White Sox and 1 1/2 games over New York Yankees. The White Sox lost to Minnesota Twins 5-2 while Detroit Tigers dumped the Yankees 4-0.

Powell returned to action only last Saturday after missing 14 games with a fractured wrist suffered against Boston Red Sox Aug. 20. During his absence, Baltimore managed only an even split.

Powell failed to hit in his first three times at bat after his return but now has seven hits in 11 trips to the plate, raising his average to .291.

He slammed his 33rd homer following Buster Narum's walk to Norm Siebern in the first inning of Wednesday's opener and came back with his 34th after another walk to Siebern in the sixth.

The 23-year-old Powell figured in all the Orioles' scoring in the nightcap. He ignited a two-run rally in the fourth inning with a one-out single and stroked a clutch single in the seventh when the Orioles tied the game 3-3.

SOX EDGE INDIANS

In the only other American League game, Boston edged Cleveland Indians 6-5 in 10 innings.
