The blinds remain pulled behind "open" City Council meetings

MAYOR Bruneau takes Westmounters for chumps. He says the matter of open or closed City Council meetings is "much ado about nothing." Our respected lawyer-mayor told Westmount Municipal Association members last Thursday evening that "In law and in fact, Council meetings are open to the public."

Technically so. "Meetings" are held at the appointed place and time, Council's votes recorded in open session.

But Mayor Bruneau knows that this is not what The Examiner and others repeatedly have challenged as an indefensible practice.

Council's most recent performances best demonstrate our point.

The meeting of Monday, May 5, began at 8 p.m., ended 8.05 p.m. The adjourned meeting Monday evening, May 12, lasted but two minutes longer.

Efficiency is to be admired. But it is beyond credulity that the full, free and open discussion of the public business of the City of Westmount for two successive weekly sessions should last but 12 minutes, or an average of six minutes each occasion!

* * *

His Worship himself provided the clue: "Before any public meeting," he said, "it is further our practice to meet privately in the informal atmosphere of a committee and chat over the business with freedom so that we may exchange views and gather all the light that is available between us. It is only when we are reasonably satisfied that we understand the matters involved that we enter the Council room, ready to recommend to the Council the action that should be taken. We would be only wasting your time and ours if we did otherwise."

In other words, all debate is in private. Public discussion is a "waste of time". The open meeting is but the sterilized, cut-and-dried conclusion.

No one is ever to know who among those highly intelligent, respected and able citizens are the good aldermen and who are the better ones. No one is to know why a motion is put forward or which one is shelved. The ratepayer cannot discover if his representative's views coincide with or differ from his own.

We are not alone in deprecating such situations. Last week, in a full-page advertisement in The Financial Post, The Toronto Star had this to say:

"Time and again, legislators have sought to pull the blinds on their meetings for reasons political, personal or purely perverse. They forget or they ignore the fact that they are dealing in public business or public money and that they are morally bound to make a full disclosure.

"In these situations, we (the press) are useful as battering rams . . ."

The Examiner, as the paper of Westmount, would like to report Council debates for citizens' information. Under the present system it cannot do so.

For this reason and because, however traditional, short-circuiting of the democratic process is folly, we support any move within or outside the Municipal Association to end this nonsense.

Rites in Kingston today for Lt. Col. C. M. Strange, once Westm't Rifles C.O.

Final tribute will be paid in Kingston, Ontario today to Lt. Col. Courtland MacLean Strange, a former commanding officer of the Royal Montreal Regiment, who died Wednesday in Kingston at the age of 90.

Active until his death, he had presided April 23rd at a meeting of the Kingston Historical Society, of which he was founder and president.

In his business career, Col. Strange worked for 18 years with Lewis Brothers in this city, and later became secretary-manager of the Engineers Club.

He joined the Prince of Wales Own Regiment as a private in 1886 when the unit was the centre of Kingston social life, and the men paid out of their own pockets to belong to it. Here he

took command of the Westmount Rifles in 1914 on outbreak of the First World War and held the post until 1932 when he returned to Kingston.

Through his efforts, and those of Maj. Gen. W. B. Anderson, the state of ill-repair of Fort Henry was brought to the attention of the Ontario government in 1936. Many of Col. Strange's own mementoes went into the museum at the fort when it was reopened to the public shortly after.

\$169,725 is surplus for 1957

A surplus of \$169,725.00 was gained by the city during the year 1957 according to the recently released annual report. Expenditures were \$3,005,699.00.

Largest sources of revenue were the municipal tax (\$1,523,976) and the school taxes (\$1,058,451). Business tax brought in \$90,534.00 and the Montreal Sales Tax amounted to \$364,004.00. Total revenue was \$3,175,424.00.

SCHOOL — ROADS

After the full school taxes which had been collected were transferred to the school boards, the largest expenditures were made by the roads department which operated on a budget of \$695,710.00.

Born near Bremen, Germany in 1900, he was educated there and married the former Elia Schroeder, also of Germany, in 1931.

He came to Canada over 30 years ago and became the owner of the Select Pastry Shop in Westmount for 18 years. He later owned the Westmount Pastry.

Mr. Buthmann lived at 2479 Park Row east for almost eight years prior to his death and was a Master Mason as well as a member of the Royal Arts Association.

He is survived by his wife; his brother, Al Buthmann, New York; his sister, Mrs. R. Weithan, New York; and a brother and sister in Germany.

Attending the funeral were his two nephews, Richard and Edward Buthmann, who flew from New York Wednesday, and Mr. and Mrs. Feldman, Newark, N.J., sister and brother-in-law of Mrs. Buthmann.

Street lighting amounted to \$73,369.00.

There was little difference in the budgets of the police and fire departments with fire requiring \$253,244.00 (salaries, clothing and uniforms: \$229,015.00) and police, \$232,009.00 (salaries, clothing and uniforms: \$205,028.00).

More than 85% of the health department budget of \$34,081.00 went for salaries.

The parks department spent \$144,536.00 including: salaries, \$20,072.00; general maintenance, \$47,602.00; and greenhouse maintenance, \$28,850.00.

Investment houses, banks, trust companies and representative groups such as municipal associations, school commissions and the clergy will also receive the report.

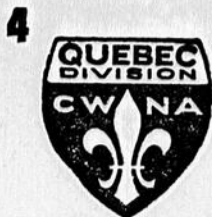

Running city big operation

RELEASE this week of the annual report for the year 1957 for the City of Westmount reveals once again that running a city of the size of this municipality is a big operation.

Departmental expenditures for the twelve-month ran very close to the \$2,000,000 mark — and that's a lot of money.

A vote of thanks is due the employees of the city, from general manager to the office boy, for the fine team-spirit that is shown, in every phase of the undertaking.

Each year miles of streets have to be patched in the spring after the frost is out, cleaned, patrolled by the police, cleared of snow in the winter; more than 2,500 sewers and all streets and lanes have to be kept in order; more than 12 thousand tons of garbage is collected a year; the roads department spends over a half million of dollars; 3,000 licenses are issued for various types of business activities; the fire department handles 150 fires; nearly 3,000 buildings are inspected; Victoria Hall was used a total of 1,246 times during the twelvemonth; the library listed 236,919 books borrowed; the gross earnings of the light and power department reached close to three-quarters of a million.

It's a big operation and the permanent staff handles it with a despatch that is pleasing, particularly to the tax-payer who realizes that his money is spent wisely.

Sports activity reaches a peak

THE annual report of the city for 1957 points to a wealth of sports and recreation activity here, a great deal more, probably, than the

average resident realized went on within the boundaries of the municipality and under the jurisdiction of the city.

The list includes skating, tennis, hockey, touch football, golf putting, softball and even checkers. More than a thousand residents registered for the various sports and games, and participation total is chalked at 117,851. A total of 84 teams took part in 513 matches or practices. The 11 rinks were open 57 and a half days. The athletic grounds were used on a total of 222 occasions. Revenue from rent of the grounds and clubhouse totaled nearly \$10,000.

Among the organizations using some of the city facilities were: Montreal Football Club, Selwyn House, Westmount High and Junior High schools, Little League Baseball, Lower Canada College, Quebec Rigger Union, Dominion High Schools, Civil Defence, Friendship Club, Old Timers Club, Red Feather, Sight Conservation and Blind Committee, Westmount YMCA, Shrine East-West Football Game.

When awards were presented to those who participated on championship football and hockey clubs, more than 500 players were present to witness the presentations, made by members of the city council.

Jack Lang keeps his promise

On June 20, one month after his sixtieth birthday, breezy Jack Lang retires after serving 28 years as physical education director of the Montreal force's 90 Protestant schools.

ley has been to decree that children are unfit in order to stimulate their interest to become fit," said Mr. Lang, a firm believer in the good, hard work-out.

Five foot eight, 175 pounds, Mr. Lang, with blue eyes full of zip, has a very trim figure. He keeps it by doing exercises for 20 minutes religiously each day. He demonstrated the exercises with great agility. Flat on his back he raises his legs one foot from the floor 500 times each; does 25 deep knee bends, 35 pushups and 25 sit ups.

The Fourth John Gilbrand Lang was born in St. Thomas, Ontario, the fifth child in a family of 10 children — six boys and four girls. His grandfather was born in Cornwall, England. His father was a carpenter turned tea and coffee merchant.

Grid star

Mr. Lang graduated in 1917 from St. Thomas Collegiate where he starred in football and basketball games, track and field events. He trained as a pilot during the first World War but spent his time in Canada.

At war's end in 1919 Mr. Lang went to Halifax to work in the YMCA for a year and married Mary Covey whom he met there. In 1920 he entered Springfield College in Massachusetts from which he graduated in 1924 with his Bachelor of Physical Education. After teaching in a junior high school for two years, Mr. Lang joined Western University in London, Ontario, in 1926, as director of Physical Education. During his four year term there he got Western in senior football and hired the famed Joe Breen as football coach.

Mr. Lang lives with his wife on N.D.G.'s Hingston avenue. They have two married daughters — Mrs. Patricia Dimeo, and Mrs. Barbara Ross, and three grandchildren. They lost their son when he was 15 years old.

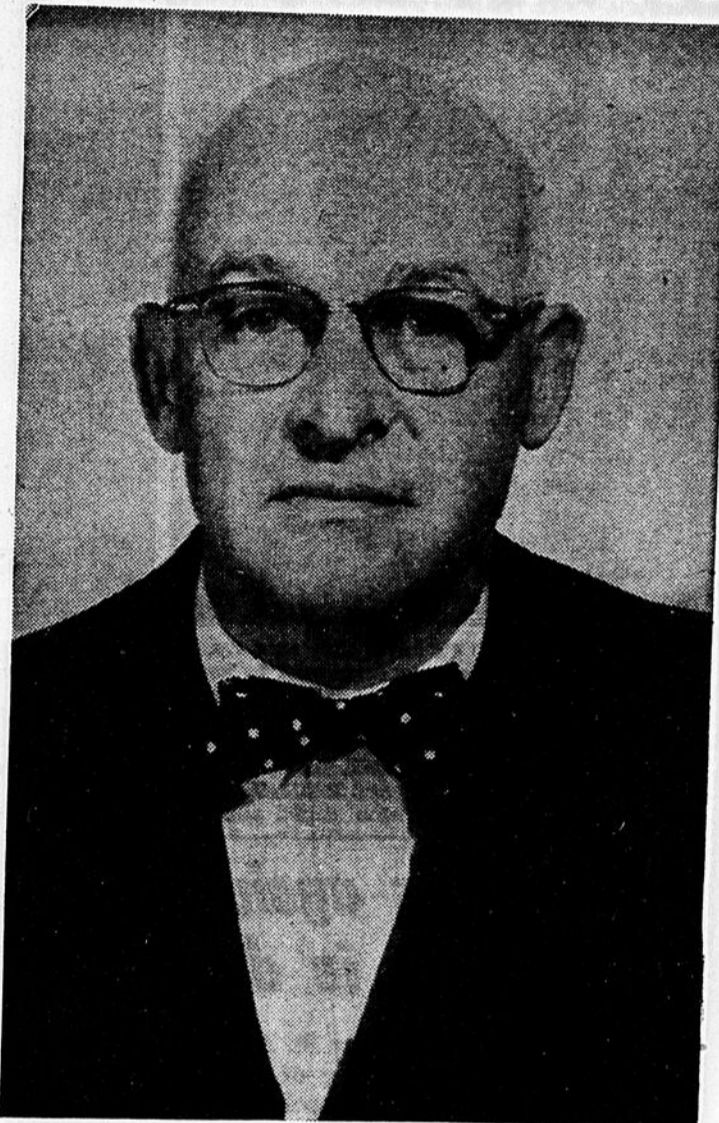
The newly elected president of the Parks and Playgrounds Association, Mr. Lang also is track and field director of the Amateur Athletic Union of Canada, a board member of the N.D.G. YMCA, and past president of the Canadian Association for Health, Physical Education and Recreation. He is very proud of the latter Association's honor award he received in 1945 for outstanding service in his profession. He is one of the four people in Canada to have received the counterpart American honor award. He travelled to Boston to receive it in 1954.

A man who has loved his work, chess and fishing, Mr. Lang finished: "I wouldn't be happier if I had a yacht or drove around in a Cadillac. I like driving a small car. I like people, and I like kids best of all."

and cheerful Mr. Lang admits it will be quite a wrench to give up his active job, he is quite philosophical and adjusted about the whole thing, and intends to plunge immediately into the activities of Macauley Camp, a camp for needy mothers and underprivileged children which he has been managing for the past 28 summers.

"I always said I would retire at 60, so when I was invited to stay on I said no; after all you have to make decisions when they come," said Mr. Lang during an interview the other day at Gilson school on Harvard avenue.

His retirement probably won't catch up with Mr. Lang until some time next year because Mr. Lang's summer days will be filled to the full with 350 mothers and children to look after. "I hire the staff, plan the meals, do the repairs, give advice to the people who run the program, settle the hair pulling between the mothers, spank the youngsters," he laughed. "I believe a good spanking on the BTM is a good deterrent for anti-social behavior."

Mr. Lang loves to work outdoors, likes to work with his hands, to build buildings, do plumbing and electrical work. He is a first rate curler and vice-skip for the Heather Curling Club, Westmount. He is not so competitive in golf which he plays for fun as a member of the Abenaki Golf Club at Hawkesbury.

In the dance programs Mr. Lang has initiated in Montreal schools, the girls help the boys in following the rhythm and in gymnastics and skills the boys can help the girls.

Since he came to his present job in 1930, Mr. Lang has seen mixed classes introduced in 75 per cent of the schools. It's still up to the individual principals whether there are mixed classes or not.

Another memorial to Mr. Lang, a winner of the Queen Elizabeth Coronation medal, is the Greater Montreal Interscholastic Athletic Association which is known as the GMIAA. City health department is active

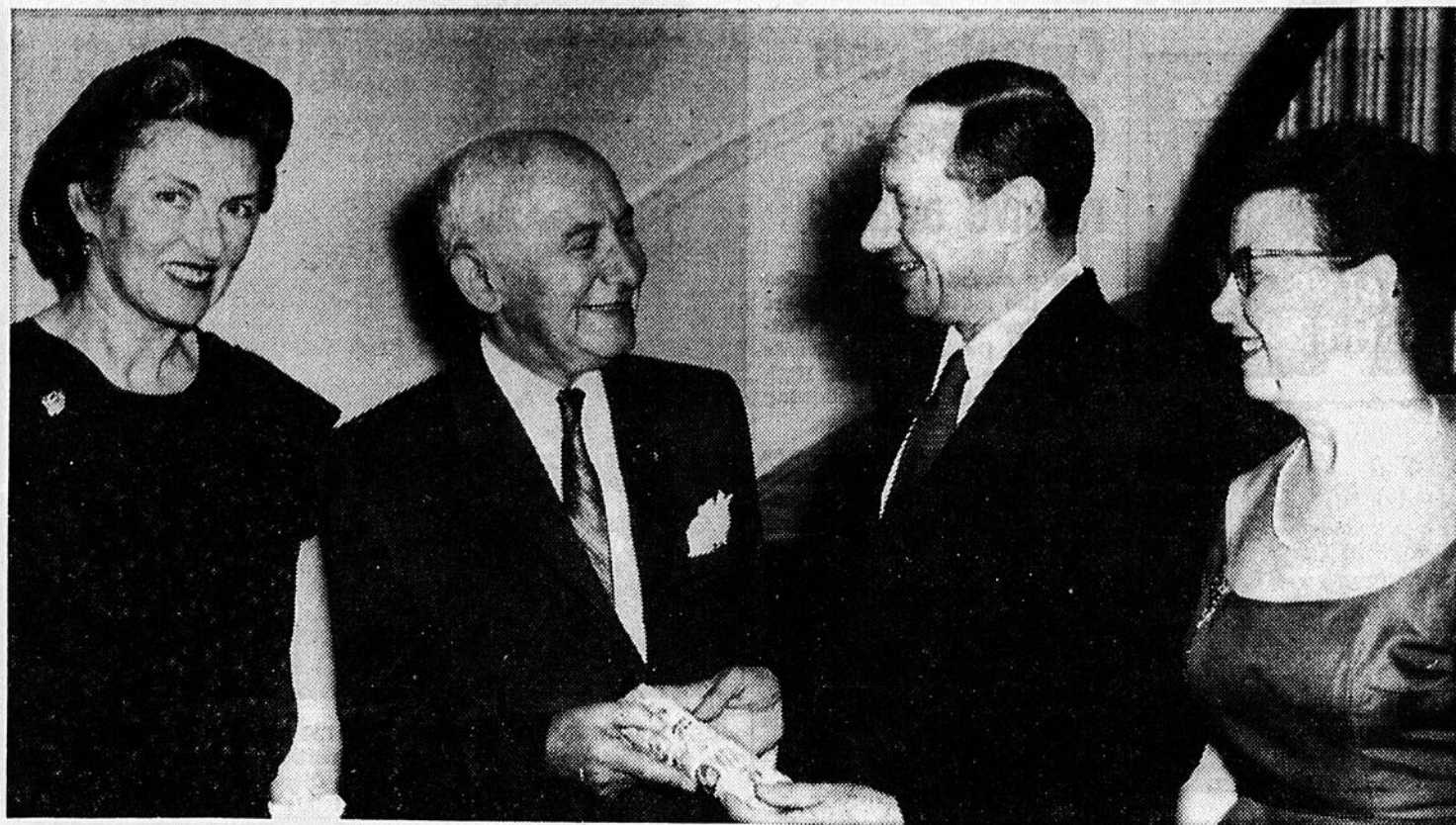
The 1957 annual report of the City of Westmount in the section dealing with public health, shows a total of 210 registered live births to establish a birth rate of seven per 1,000 population. There were 265 reported deaths, including 120 in the 70-90 age group, for a death rate of nine per 1,000 population. Leading causes of death were: diseases of the circulatory system—104, cancer—61 and diseases of the nervous system and organs—31.

There were only 319 cases of communicable disease, the lowest figure in six years and less than a third of the cases detected in 1956. Measles, mumps and chickenpox accounted for 217 of these cases. There were 19 cases of tuberculosis and one of polio.

STUDENT EXAMINATIONS

Almost one-third of the 3,944 students in Westmount schools were examined by doctors from the Montreal Children's Hospital. In the course of these examinations an aggregate of 548 defects requiring immediate attention were found. 371 defects were dental. Correction was made of 272 defects and 274 were noted for observation. The school nurses made 291 visits to scholars' homes, visited 169 classrooms to give health talks and make examinations for cleanliness, skin conditions, communicable diseases, etc. They also made 5,142 individual inspections, excluded 137 scholars, readmitted 163, gave 1,088 treatments for minor injuries, and held 118 teacher and 98 parent conferences.

Under the city's free service, 86 children were vaccinated, 126 were re-vaccinated, and 66 children were given a first inoculation of triple toxoid (diphtheria, tetanus and whooping cough), 78 a second, 78 a third and 85 booster inoculations. 15 typhoid inoculations and 4 cholera vaccine were administered. The Salk polio vaccine received from the Provincial Government enabled the department to give immunization injections to 1454 children in 1957. Among these children 1375 received the first and

second injections while 79 received the booster (third) injection. From the inception of the Salk Polio Vaccine program in 1955-56, to December 31, 1957 over 1775 children have received immunization.

The doctors and nurses each held 47 clinics with a total registration of 543. This represented 282 families with 339 babies and 204 pre-school children. Of these, 416 children had previously attended the clinics and 127 were new registrants.

INSPECTIONS

The sanitary inspector made 485 visits to food handling establishments, 44 inspections of beauty parlors and hairdressing establishments, 38 inspections of laundries, and 269 inspections of boarding and rooming houses. Permits for rooming houses were issued to 212 operators. Periodic inspections were also made of public and private schools, public buildings, comfort stations, gasoline stations, public institutions and large commercial and manufacturing premises.

The two indoor swimming pools, using filtered and chlorinated water, were inspected regularly. 170 samples were taken from these and municipal swimming pools for analysis, with all samples meeting the required standard.

Five hundred and sixty-one samples of milk and cream were taken for chemical and bacteriological analysis. 15 permits were issued to dairies and 33 permits to food stores retailing milk in the city. Three permits for retailing butter and eggs were issued and four permits were issued to bread companies.

Library to be extended

Preliminary plans for an extension to the public library and renovation of the existing facilities have been presented to the library board and to the Council for study and approval. The plans were prepared by the firm of Durnford, Bolton, Chadwick and Ellwood, 1980 Sherbrooke street west.

They call for an addition on the south side of the present building which will double the book capacity of the library. Provision has been made for book space for the next twenty years.

Present facilities allow for a capacity of approximately 50,000 volumes however this is already greatly overextended (latest figures 55,984). The additional space will allow for 100,000 volumes.

BOOKSTACKS MOVED

All the bookstacks will be moved to the proposed two-storey and basement structure and will occupy the basement and ground floor. The second floor will be given over to a children's library, more than

doubling the present capacity for the youngsters and incorporating such additional features as a small room for story telling. The present children's section will be converted into work rooms and staff space.

The space presently filled by bookstacks will be given away to the youth section.

The extension will be connected to the main building only on the west side, leaving a court between the two. This measure has been taken to preserve all the windows on the south side of the reference room.

Also to be incorporated in the alterations will be the removal of the check out desk from its present position and its reloca-

tion to the south side of the main entrance. This move is calculated to allow a better control of books being carried out of the library and to eliminate any pilfering.

EXTERIOR PLANS

Plans for the exterior of the building (provision has been made in loan-by-laws for an expenditure of \$150,000.00) are being drawn up and will be submitted within the next few weeks. It will be a functional structure designed to harmonize with the existing Victorian building. Tentative approval has already been given to the interior designs.

It is expected that work on the addition will start early in 1959.



An appeal for more canvassers, both adults and children, for the tag day Saturday, May 30, of the School for Crippled Children, 1585 Cedar avenue, has been made by Dr. L. P. Patterson, principal.

Westmount Hospital workers

Additional names of volunteer workers who will canvass in Westmount on behalf of the \$12,000,000 Joint Hospital Fund 1958 are announced by Mrs. Peter Barott, district chairman in the Women's Division of the campaign.

The two-week public appeal opens this Tuesday, May 20, in support of five Montreal teaching hospitals: The Royal Victoria, the Montreal General, the Royal Edward Laurentian, the Montreal Children's and the Alexandra.

At an organizational meeting held at the school, Dr. Patterson said it was hoped that more canvassers would put the \$20,000 objective over the top for the first time this year. Last year 4,000 school children canvassed throughout the city. "We have come close twice to our objective but never just quite made it," Dr. Patterson said.

More canvassers were needed particularly in Lachine, Park Extension, Rosemount and Saint Laurent. A total of 4,200 collection boxes are ready to be distributed to organizations in the city.

Dr. Patterson said that the 179 children belonging to the school ranging in age from five to 19 years were the best salesmen of tags. They collected \$4,680 of the \$19,000 total last year. The children of Notre Dame de Grace accounted for \$2,908 and Westmount, \$2,280. For instance Roslyn School children had increased their effort from \$400 to \$1,393 last year.

Douglas Taylor, vice-president of the school and board member of the Montreal Children's Hospital, stressed the worthiness of the cause and exhorted organizers to do their utmost to reach the objective.

Arthur Webster, treasurer of the school, said \$160,000 annually was required to operate the school with its six buses to collect the children and take them home again each day. In addition there was the operational cost of the summer camp, Ayer's Cliff,

at Lake Massawippi, run by Murray MacFarlane.

Dr. Patterson said that 61 children were suffering from cerebral palsy; 31, congenital deformities; 21, polio; 13 epileptics; 11, Legge Perthes; 11, cardiac; 10, spinal diseases; 9, haemophilia; 5, muscular dystrophy; 5, rheumatic arthritis and 15 miscellaneous. Thirteen children were suffering from two of these disabilities.

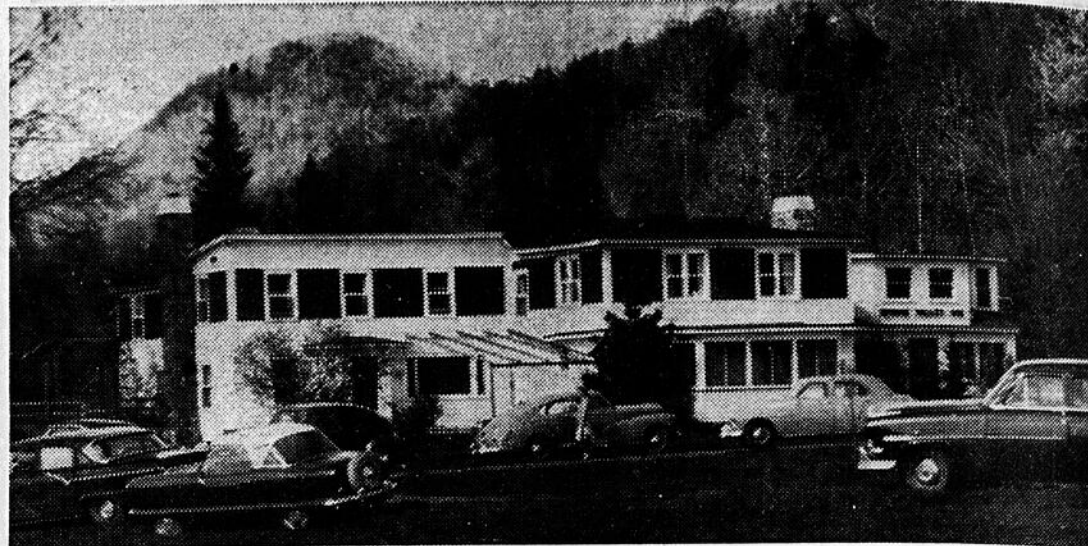

The program which began at 10 a.m. and ended at 4 p.m. was designed by the Board of Trade to give members of the clergy "an opportunity to see business in action and learn at first hand some of the problems confronting industry in their operations". 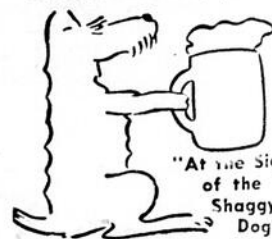

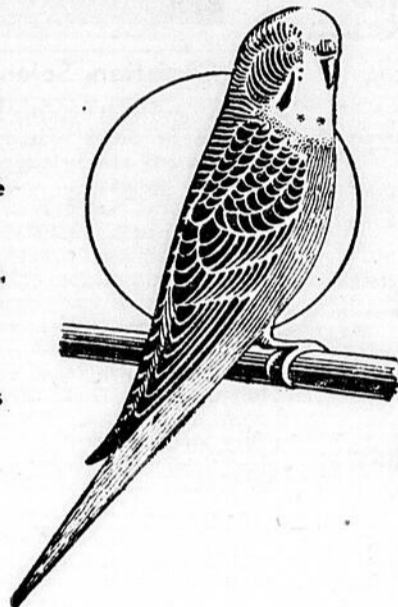

The end of a chapter

Today we observe the end of Our Lord's earthly
Ministry. For nearly six months in our Churches we have
marked week by week the mighty acts of God in working
out the salvation of man. We noted in Advent the ages
of preparation in which God was providing a seed-bed
for the Gospel in the universal law of Rome, in the uni-
versal language of Greese and the one true religion of
Israel. Along with that was the breaking down of the
barriers of first century nationalism that there might be
one universal Empire, in which a missionary might travel
in the second century from the River Euphrates to the
Wall of Hadrian, to declare the Good News.

Then we observed the Good
News itself that there had been
born in Bethlehem a Saviour who
is Christ the Lord; His name
was called Jesus, because He
would save His people from their
sins.

Next we observed the coming
of the Gentile world to the In-
fant; then the coming out of the
obscurity of a home in Naza-
reth this same Saviour who be-
gan His Ministry with Tempta-
tion and ended it with Death

astonishment and exaltation of
Easter; a rejoicing not simply
because Jesus had risen from
the dead, not only because it was
a display of Divine Power, but
also because it was a new revela-
tion of the nature of the uni-
verse. For it showed that the
universe is of such a kind that
it would not hold Jesus in the
grave: "It was not possible that
He should be holden of it," as
St. Peter said. Then we noted in
our Services the great days after
Easter when Jesus in His Spirit-
ual Body consorted with His dis-
ciples.

That is what we do year after
year because Christianity is a
religion based on historical facts
- the things which God has done
and the response which man has
made.

And so the recital comes to an
end with the withdrawal from
our sight of the Chief Personage

turned to that Heavenly Place

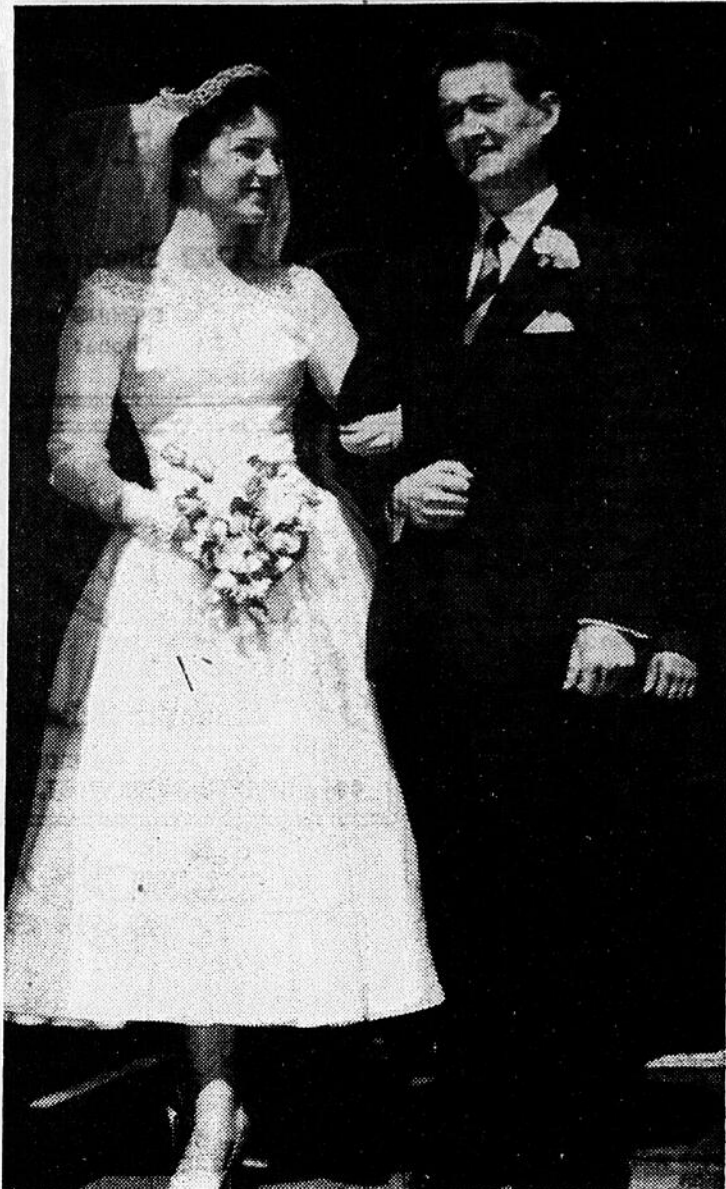

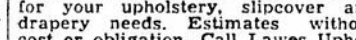

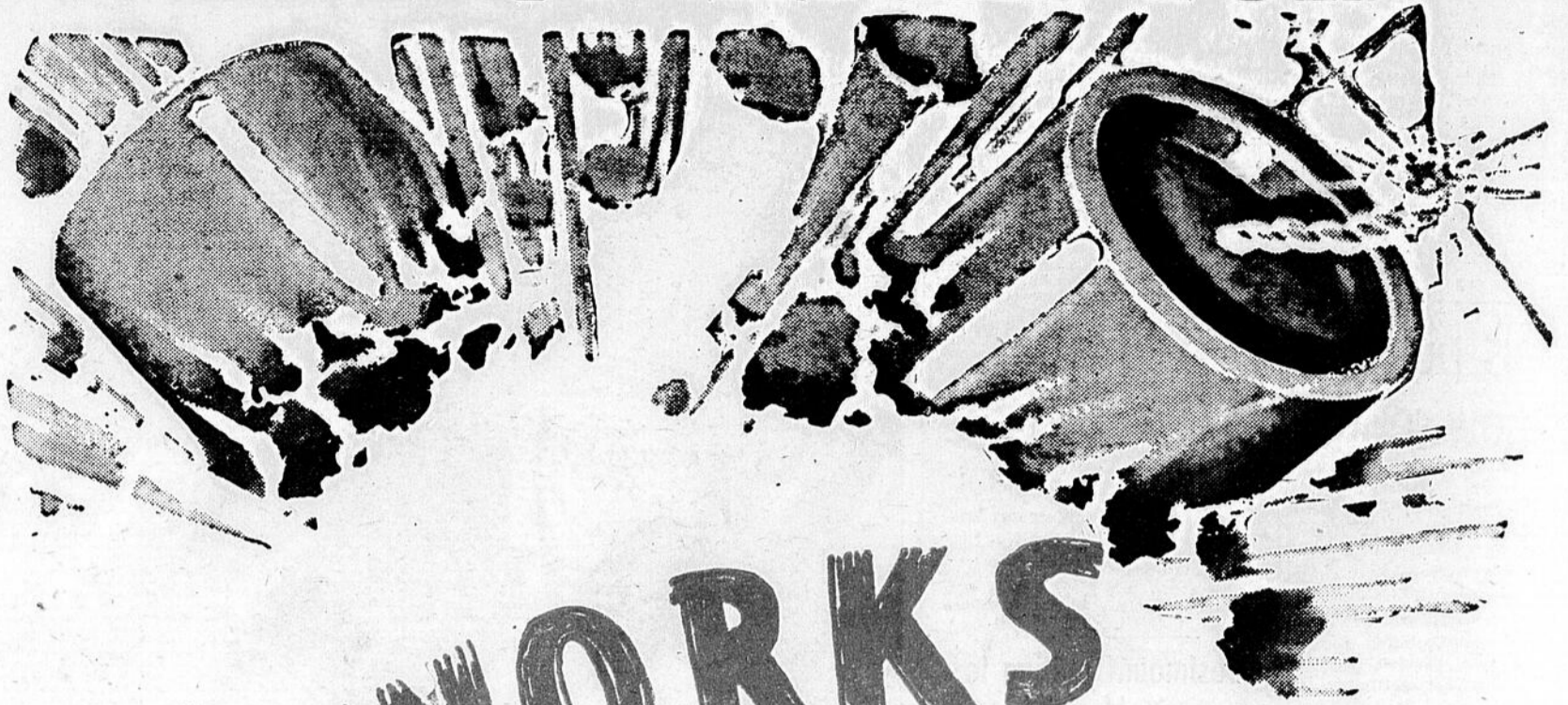
