

HOW TO IMPROVE THE RURAL SCHOOLS OF PROVINCE

The Relation of the Teacher, Course of Study and Ratepayer Discussed at Convention. Better Salaries Only Remedy For Poor Teaching. Ratepayers do Not Work in Sympathy With School Boards. Bogey of Increased Taxes Retards Work of Education.

The closing session of the Provincial Association of Protestant Teachers of Quebec was held this forenoon in Wesley Hall. Although several of the delegates had left, the attendance was good.

A lesson in French was given by Mr. Robert. This was followed by a lecture on "Iceberg" by Dr. Howard Barnes, Professor of Physics, McGill University.

The result of the ballot for the election of officers will be declared at the close of the session.

IMPORTANT QUESTION DISCUSSED

Many important questions were dealt with at the Teachers' Convention meetings yesterday and the attendances were even larger than on Thursday.

The third lesson in French was given by Mr. Robert. He stated that grammatical work should have a much smaller place than was generally given to it. This feature was brought in, but only as far as its phonetic value could be understood and appreciated by the pupils.

NEXT CONVENTION AT QUEBEC

On the motion of Mr. McBurney, it was resolved that next year's Convention be held at Quebec. This will be the fiftieth anniversary of the Association.

VOTE OF THANKS.

A vote of thanks was accorded to Dr. Parroquet and the authorities of Bishop's College University for the hospitality shown to the visiting delegates on Thursday.

THE FORMATION OF A PROVINCIAL ASSOCIATION.

Prof. Dale read a paper by Dr. Sinclair on this subject, after which it was decided to form an Association of School Commissioners or Trustees and the Secretaries of School Boards. This was following out the action of last year's Convention.

The organization was then proceeded with and the following members of the Convention were formed into a sub-committee to take charge of that section:

Inspector General Sutherland, Quebec; Rev. G. E. Read, Sherbrooke; Rev. R. W. E. Wright, Lennoxville; Rev. J. F. Belford, Windsor Mills; Messrs. Bridgette, Birchton; McLeod, Lingwick; Farnsworth, Eaton; J. C. McCallum, Lochaber Bay; J. C. Stanforth, Arundel; W. S. Todd, St. Andrew's East, and Murray, Shawinigan, with power to add to their number.

Mr. J. P. Bowen, Hatley was appointed Secretary.

RURAL SCHOOLS.

Mr. McBurney dealt with the subject of the "Teacher." In many parts of this Province the only qualification required in rural districts was that the teacher should be a relative of some School Board member. Many qualified teachers were available, but young girls half way through the course had been engaged.

Any number of proper teachers could be found if they were paid as well as washerwomen, and the scarcity was not at all comparable to what was supposed. It was a disgrace to English civilization that their services were so little appreciated.

The supply would never be better until they were paid 50 to 60 dollars per month and given a ten months' engagement. The problems in the country were greater than those in the city; the rural teacher was the head of the educational system, whereas the city teacher was largely a machine working out a defined course. The problems were varied and difficult and called for the very best young men and women available. The rural school teacher required a different preparation to the city teacher. Why were the young men of the Eastern Townships leaving the farms for the city? Because the whole tendency of the rural course was along commercial lines. Another defect in the rural school system was the want of permanency in the teaching staff. To remedy this a sliding scale of salaries should be adopted commencing at \$35 per month and the results would be splendid. The teachers must become well acquainted with the pupils and the general ideas of the municipality.

Mr. McBurney complained of a growing lack of respect of teachers for their art, in not going to appointments when engaged. The task of educating the child should not be lightly treated, and the teacher should do her utmost to improve her methods of work in view of the responsibility of guiding the destinies of her pupils.

THE COURSE OF STUDY.

Dr. Shurtleff gave a brief address on "The Course of Study." He thought they were getting too much Scripture knowledge in elementary schools; he would recommend lessening this and substituting temperance and health. It was essential for children to know something of the history of Canada and also the Mother Country.

He was satisfied with the French teaching based on the three books of Curtis' Oral Lessons. Boys in elementary schools should be taught scientific agriculture and know something more of their environment to increase their interest in the farm. Music and physical exercises should be taught as in the United States. He offered no criticism regarding English and Arithmetic; he favored geographical teaching and thought the course of study was somewhat overcrowded in the superior schools and to a less extent in the elementary schools.

THE RATEPAYER.

Mr. J. C. Sutherland, Inspector of Schools, who took the place of Hon. S. A. Fisher, spoke in reference to the "Ratepayer." The School Boards were the concentrated essence of the ratepayer and under the representative system generally represented the opinions of the different communities. It was true that in rural districts the boards were sometimes in advance of the majority of ratepayers, as in the questions of consolidation and teachers' salaries; they were therefore at times replaced at elections by those of less progressive tendencies. In other instances the ratepayers were more advanced than the boards and consolidation and better schools were kept back because the boards desired to keep the taxes down. He approved of the organization of a Provincial Association just formed and thought it would have to be divided into different sections to meet different problems throughout the Province. The Government contributions to rural school boards had greatly increased during the last six years, but had they been meeting them in the spirit in which they were intended? He had made a comparison with the statistics from the Secretary-Treasurers' reports for five years as to the cost of education and found that although the salaries of the teachers had been considerably increased, yet the whole amount of such increase, supposing the average salary was paid to every teacher, was no more than the increase in the Government grant. In 1907 the Government grant on the average, amounted to about 5 p. c. of the total cost of education in those communities, but in 1912 the grant amounted to about 25 p. c. of such cost. During that period 2 of the rural school boards decreased their rate taxation, 2 had increased and 3 had made no change. It was therefore quite evident that for the Province as a whole the boards were not meeting the new taxes as they should.

SECOND LESSON IN FRENCH.

At the session yesterday morning, Mr. Robert gave the second lesson in French to a class of beginners. His method is to teach one sound at a time and he stated that it would probably take five months to learn all the sounds satisfactorily. During that time some vocabulary is also acquired quite evident that for the Province as a whole the boards were not meeting the new taxes as they should.

SUPERIOR SCHOOL SECTION.

Mr. Chalk, B.A., presided over this section. Several papers were read bearing on Superior School subjects, the first one being on "English Literature" by Mr. E. G. Denton, B.A. This paper was read by Mr. Watson Bain in Mr. Denton's unavoidable absence.

ENGLISH LITERATURE.

This was the most important subject in any curriculum and the medium of all instruction. Literature was one of the fine arts, the adequate expression of sincere feeling and the embodiment of genuine emotions. In its study there was nothing formal or artificial and it was something where the learner put himself in that attitude of mind which enabled him to enter into that thought which was the soul of the book. The study of literature should be a means and not an end in itself. Modern society demanded a knowledge of the past, which was more than history, and only through literature could this be gained. Literature was the mirror in which the soul saw its reflection. According to a man's perfecting in the art, was the fulness and freedom of his intercourse with other men. Art remained the noblest work in civilization and literature stood at the head of all art. When examinations in the subject ceased for children, and the teacher was allowed freedom in selecting memory work, then there would be a charm for the child. The course must be bright and suitable, and find expression in the child's life.

THE FRENCH COURSE.

A paper on the French course was read by Mr. N. Schaefer. For many years different methods had been tried in teaching French and year after year pupils were turned out of the schools who knew a lot of book knowledge, but could not speak French.

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LANDLORDS SELL LAND

Do so Because of the Alleged Burden of Taxation Under Famous Budget

EARL OF PORTSMOUTH AND CRANWORTH DISPOSE OF TWO VALUABLE ESTATES THIS WEEK.

London, Oct. 18.—(Special)—The great landlords continue to show every symptom of being extremely willing to get rid of their estates because of the alleged burden of taxation under Chancellor Lloyd George's famous budget.

Among others sold this week was the Earl of Portsmouth's seat at Eggesford, in Devonshire, of 3,277 acres for \$425,000.

Letton Hall near Dereham, one of Lord Cranworth's properties, which includes three fine farms, was also sold this week.

THOMAS CASE AGAIN ADJOURNED

Motion to Have The Complaint Rejected Set Aside by Judge

DEFENCE CONTENTED THAT ACCUSED HAD ALREADY BEEN CONVICTED AND LIBERATED ON CHARGE.

The preliminary hearing of the evidence in the case of W. A. Tisdale, Inspector of the G.T.R., against Wm. Thomas, on a charge of conspiring with one Robert Dussault, a fellow employee, to steal from the Grand Trunk Railway Co., occupied the attention of Judge Mulvany for several hours yesterday.

Mr. H. B. Fraser, K.C., appeared for the complainant, and Mr. Rioux for the defendant.

Before the examination of witnesses was commenced Mr. Rioux filed an exception to the authority of the District Magistrate to hear the case, on the ground that the accused had been already convicted, sentenced and liberated under a writ of habeas corpus for the breaking and stealing in question, and that the present charge of conspiring to commit this offence was only a colorable variation of the same charge, for which he had already been convicted and liberated.

The Court refused the declaratory exception on the ground that one of this nature did not lie at a preliminary hearing till the evidence was heard, and if the Court had no jurisdiction to hear the evidence, it could only appeal then, and the defendant would still have his recourse intact, by habeas corpus or otherwise.

This was followed by a motion to reject the complaint on somewhat similarity of the offence of breaking and based largely on the alleged similarity of the offence of breaking and stealing previously charged, and that of conspiring to commit the offence, now charged, and based on Chap. 95 of the Consolidated Statutes of Lower Canada, still in force, with regard to the extent and effects of a writ of habeas corpus, and asked that the magistrate do not proceed further with the case under the penalties of the law (a fine of five hundred pounds), and that the accused be discharged.

The Court ruled that the motion was premature, and quoted the article of the Criminal Code ordering a magistrate, when an accused was before him charged with an indictable offence, to hear the evidence of the witnesses brought by the complainant.

The hearing of the evidence was then proceeded with, and many technical objections raised as to its admissibility. It consisted mainly in admissions made by the defendant to the complainant, Mr. Tisdale, and to Mr. Harrison, the G.T.R. agent, of the alleged conspiracy; that these admissions were not only voluntarily made, but were made in the presence of a distinct disclaimer of any desire or intention of the witnesses to interfere in any way, either for or against the accused.

No evidence was offered by the accused, but a lengthy argument followed on the grounds mentioned in the motion.

The Court remanded the accused till the 22nd instant, to allow certain exhibits asked for by the defence to be copied and filed in the record.

THEFT CASE ADJOURNED.

The case of Wm. J. McCallum vs. Fred Cook, for theft of travelling bag, overcoat, etc., from his room at the Continental Hotel, was continued till Saturday morning in view of the number of other cases before the court. Bail was refused pending the hearing of the evidence.

MAGOG ASSAULT CASES.

Jesse P. Bartlett vs. Napoleon Lepine, of Magog, for assaulting complainant at the railway station at Magog on the 1st of October, inst.—The defendant was sentenced to pay a fine of \$5 and costs, or thirty days in jail.

Jesse P. Bartlett vs. Daniel Mullins, Jr.

—The defendant was sentenced to pay a fine of five dollars for assault on complainant, and further to give bonds in the sum of \$100 to keep the peace for two months on account of threats of bodily harm, with costs, or thirty days in jail.

AVIATOR MYSTERIOUSLY LOST DURING FLIGHT.



Albert J. Jewel, a young aviator, who was to have flown a Moisant monoplane as No. 14 in the race around Manhattan Island, started to fly from the Hempstead Plains aviation field, on Long Island, to the Oakwood Heights field, Staten Island, but he did not reach his destination, and all trace of him was lost. So far as could be learned no one knew what became of him after he disappeared from the view of those who watched him leave Hempstead Plains sailing rapidly southwest, and it was feared by many that he had met with some serious mishap. It was variously conjectured that he had been lost in the marshes of Jamaica Bay or had been carried out to sea by the strong northwest wind somewhere between Rockaway Point and Atlantic Highlands.

SULZER ATTACKS TAMANY HALL

His Statement of Reason For His Impeachment

DECLARES BOSS MURPHY WAS JUDGE, JURY, PROSECUTOR AND BAILIFF.

Albany, N. Y., October 18.—William Sulzer ceased to be Governor of the State of New York at noon yesterday. He was removed from office by a vote of 43 to 12, two members not voting.

The verdict of the court was that Sulzer was guilty of falsification, perjury, and an attempt to suppress evidence against him. Of all other charges he was acquitted, the court unanimously voting him not guilty of the four remaining articles of the impeachment not passed upon when it adjourned Thursday night.

By a virtually unanimous vote, also, the impeachment tribunal decided that Sulzer should not be punished by disqualification to hold office of honor and trust in this state in the future. This would have been the extreme penalty under the law.

The outgoing executive issued statement in which he said: "By virtue of a power, beyond the present control of our electorate, I now hand back to the people the commission they gave me, and I hand it back to them—untarnished and un sullied."

MURPHY IN CONTROL.

"Mr. Murphy controlled the Assembly and 'ordered' the impeachment. He controlled most of the members of the court, and dictated its proceedings and wrote the judgment. He was the judge and the jury, the prosecutor and the bailiff.

"When I declined to obey the orders of the 'boss' about patronage; when I refused to call off Hennessy and prevent further investigation of graft, and, finally, when I set in motion the wheels of the machinery of the courts to bring the criminals to justice and stop the looting of the state, then, and not till then, did Mr. Murphy threaten me with degradation and with removal from office. From that day till this all that money all that power, all that influence can do to disgrace me and destroy me has been done. It is a long story, but it will all come out sooner or later.

"Had I but served the 'boss' with half the zeal I did the state, William Sulzer would never have been impeached.

"Looking back over it all, I am frank to say that I now realize I should have been more careful in some matters just fall, but I was so busy in the campaign that I gave no heed to details and trusted others, some of whom have proved treacherous; but so far as my administration of the government is concerned, I have no regrets, as my conscience is clear and tells me truly that I have done no wrong but my whole duty fearlessly and honestly day in and day out—to all the people of the state—as God gave me light to see the right."

Douglas, Ariz., Oct. 18.—(Special)—General Pedro Ojeda, Federals by a trick have succeeded in ousting the insurgents from the vicinity of Guaymas, according to a version of the recent fighting which reached the border last night.

NEW MOVE BY JEROME

Thaw Counsel Are Now Afraid That He May Get an Indictment

GOV. FELKER SAYS HE WILL GIVE DECISION ON OCTOBER 27 WITHOUT FAIL.

Concord, N.H., Oct. 18.—William Travers Jerome's reasons for asking for another week's delay before Governor Felker announces his decision in the Thaw case became known yesterday with the intentions of his New Hampshire counsel, Bernard L. Jacobs, of Lancaster, who declared that early next week he will file with the Governor an important affidavit, and that he expects within a week an indictment against Thaw will be found in New York State.

While Governor Felker has agreed to postpone his decision until October 27, in order, he said yesterday, "to be fair and just to both sides," he declared to-day that that date is the last he will set, and that he will close the case on that day, regardless of further requests for postponement.

Behind Jerome's request for a continuance, it is believed, lies the possibility that one of the alleged "conspirators" who helped Thaw to escape from Matteawan, has turned State's evidence, or is about to tell Jerome what he knows of the case.

EVERLYN HOPES HARRY WILL GO FREE

Providence, Oct. 18.—"I hope Harry is liberated," declared Evelyn Thaw in an interview at the Crown Hotel yesterday. "I do not understand how they can hold him."

She is here fulfilling a dramatic engagement. In her spare time she is busy arranging little surprises for her son, Russell's birthday.

DIVER LOCATES SUNKEN LINER

May Be City of Rio de Janeiro Which Went Down Off Golden Gate

THERE WAS A LOSS OF 122 LIVES AND BULLION VALUED AT \$2,000,000.

San Francisco, Oct. 18.—(Special)—What may be the wreck of the steamship City of Rio de Janeiro, which was sunk inside the entrance to the Golden Gate on Feb. 22nd, 1902, with a loss of 122 lives and bullion valued at \$2,000,000, has been located by Herman Stelzner, a diver who made the descent in 123 feet of water in a diving device which he invented.

Incidentally, Stelzner set a new mark for divers in his descent of 123 feet, the previous greatest depth attained is said to be 92 feet.

MANY ALIENS DEPORTED.

New York, Oct. 18.—(Special)—An unusual number of aliens were deported from the Ellis Island Immigration station today, when 176 persons, excluded as undesirable, were placed on board ten outgoing steamships bound for Europe. Many of the cases were those of diseased persons and several were women with families of young children.

NOVEL USES FOR PAPER.

Germany manufactures annually 425,000 tons of paper; England, 260,000 tons; France, 190,000 tons; Austria, 155,000 tons; and Italy, 120,000 tons. But the United States makes and uses more paper than all Europe. The annual production amounting to 1,300,000 tons. A French journal mentions the following novel uses of paper in America:

Roofs of paper and compressed wood pulp have proved successful. A Chicago firm makes paper garments, which are so light, flexible and convenient that they are largely used in hospitals. The paper is made of the bark of the paper mulberry tree, and is tub-sized, and finely scraped. Several sheets are superposed and sewn together. The garments have narrow woollen bindings, buttons, buttonholes and other fastenings. Paper cigars are made by steeping paper pulp for ten days in a decoction of cigar clippings, passing it between cylinders, and rolling the sheets into the form of a cigar.

Paper bottles and grain bags are made in Philadelphia. A recent invention is the paper horseshoe, which according to the inventor, is more durable as well as lighter than the iron shoe, and eliminates all danger to the hoof, as it is attached, not by nails, but by cement. Two German engineers have invented a sort of reinforced paper, composed of paper pulp, canvas, linen, and raw silk, reinforced with steel wire. The new material is light, waterproof, fireproof, and suitable for the construction of vessels, including warships, motor-cars, and other vehicles, for railways, street pavements and many other uses.

THE THREE CASTES IN BOLIVIA.

Bolivian Society is composed of three strata. Firstly, we have the "gentle deacons," or white people, who show no trace of Indian blood. This class is small, but necessary influential; indeed, all the government of the country is in their hands. Next come the "cholos"—those of mixed Spanish and Indian blood; and, lastly, the pure Indians, who form an immense submerged class; superstitious, ignorant, down-trodden; yet splendid workmen and one of the chief sources of national wealth. It is estimated that of the three million people who comprise the Bolivian nation only about two hundred thousand can read and write. The great mass of these illiterate people belong to the "gentle deacons," while the "cholo" and Indian classes are almost totally submerged in ignorance.

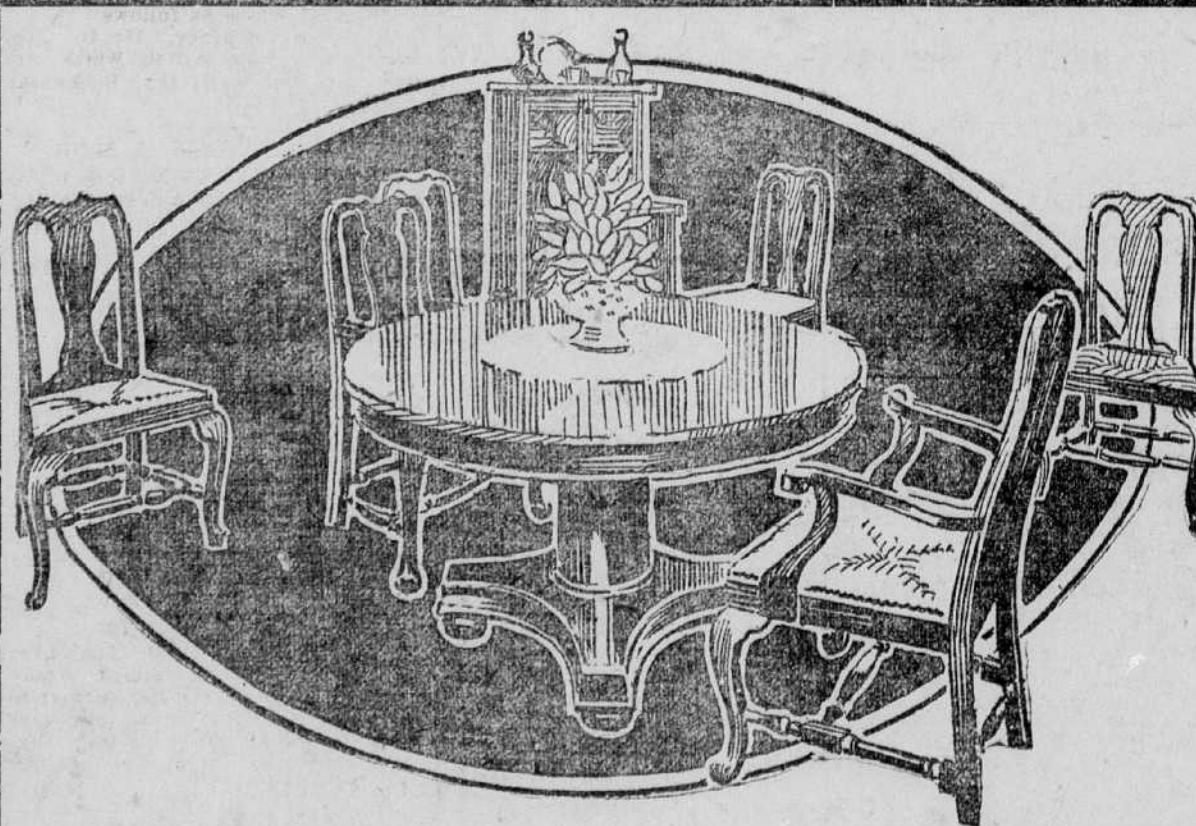

EGG MARKET IS STEADY.

They are paying 28c per dozen in the country for fresh gathered stock with loss off. We quote prices as follows: No. 1 stock 26c to 28c in round lots and 28c to grocers, select 28c to 29c in a wholesale way and 31c to the retail trade. New laid 35c in round lots and 38c to 40c to grocers.

HONEY MARKET STEADY.
Montreal, Oct. 18.—The market for honey is steady, but the demand was rather quiet and principally for small lots to fill actual wants. We quote prices as follows:
Clover, white honey, 15c to 16c;
Dark grades, 13c to 14c; White extracted, 10 1/2c to 11 1/2c; Buckwheat honey, 7 1/2c to 8 1/2c.

TRADE IN BEANS IS SLOW.
Montreal, Oct. 18.—The tone of the market for beans remains steady, but the volume of business doing is small. New crop three-pound pickers are offering for shipment from the West at \$1.85 per bushel in car lots, extract.

MAPLE PRODUCTS QUIET.
Montreal, Oct. 18.—The demand for maple product shows no improvement and the market is quiet with an easy undertone, but prices show no actual change. We quote prices as follows:
Maple syrup, in tins, per lb. 9c to 10c; Maple syrup, in wood, per lb. 7c to 8c; Maple sugar, per lb. 9c to 10c.

FAIR POTATO TRADE.
Montreal, Oct. 18.—The tone of the market for potatoes remains steady with a fair trade passing, and sales of Green Mountains in car lots were made at 70c to 75c per bag, extract, and in a jobbing way at 90c per bag, ex-store.

DAIRY PRODUCE

Montreal, Oct. 18.—The business of the past week has again been slow and disappointing, despite the fact that about a dozen cars of creamery butter will go forward to the Northwest and the Coast this week, seven cars having already been shipped. Of the twelve cars only three are

said to consist of new business, the remainder being held stock ordered on by owners in the West, some of which is high priced, or at least will be by the time it gets to its destination. There are those, however, who appear confident in the future of prices refuse to sell at present. The local market has also been slow during the week, business being confined to sales of a jobbing nature at 26c to 27c for fine and 27c to 27 1/2c for finest. Pastured sold at 27 1/2c to 28c. In order to move car lots the above figures would have to be shaded.

CHEESE MARKET IS EASIER AND 1/2c LOWER.

Montreal, Oct. 18.—The demand has been so provokingly slow from the other side of the salt pond, that some of our purveyors of the curd, have ceased to spend any more money in cabling to English buyers. When they want the goods it will be their turn to cable. And they will want them sooner or later. Of course, there is more or less business all the time, and early in the weeks sales of 1,000 to 1,500 boxes of finest Western were reported at 13c to a fraction over that figure, whilst sales of smaller lots were made at 13 1/2c. Sales of first Easterns have transpired since our last report at 12 1/2c and we quote 12 1/2c to 12 3/4c for Easterns as to quality.

The country markets have gone 1/2c to 3/4c under last week's prices. Considerable comment has been made re the effect the shipments of milk and cream will have upon the market, but it is too late in the season for any very marked difference to be felt this year.

A lot of 500 boxes of finest Eastern cheese was reported sold to an American firm at 12 1/2c. A leading exporter offered on Change 1,000 to 2,000 boxes of finest Western white or colored at 13c.

GRAIN MARKET

TRADE GENERALLY WAS QUIET.

Montreal, Oct. 18.—Corn.—Argentine corn is quoted at 78c in store; sales of car lots at that figure.

Oats.—The market remains quiet. No. 2 C. W. in car lots 40c to 41c in store, extra No. 1 feed at 40c to 40 1/2c, and No. 1 feed at 39c. Local oats have sold at 38c for No. 2 and 39c to 40c for No. 1.

Barley.—Malsters are still in the market for good samples, and we hear of the sale of 10,000 bushels of malting grades at 65c. No. 3 Manitoba barley 55c in store, No. 4 at 53c and feed at 50c.

Peas.—Canadian peas are quoted at \$1.75 to \$2.00. Exports last year for the week 2,335 bushels. The sale of two cars of European boiling peas were made at \$1.75.

Buckwheat.—The market remains quiet. Car lots of buckwheat are quoted at 55c in store. Samples received show good average quality.

Rye.—The exports during the last week were nil. Prices nominal at 72c to 73c.

Flaxseed.—Receipts 25,968 bushels and exports 128,324 bushels. Prices are quoted at \$1.32 to \$1.33 in round lots.

Feedwheat.—Market steady and prices are quoted at 70c to 72c as to grade.

Malt.—The market remains steady, for new malt at 85c.

Hops.—Canadian hops have been mostly all brought up at 25c f. o. b. at shipping points. Sales have been made of B. C. at 30c to 31c f. o. b. at Coast. B. C.'s have been pretty well all bought up. Only about 115 bales unsold. English East Kent 55c to 57c; Bohemian 62c; Bavarian 57c.

HAY AND STRAW

HAY FOR UNITED STATES.

Montreal, Oct. 18.—Since the duty on Canadian hay going into the United States has been reduced from \$4.00 per ton to \$2.00 per ton, American buyers have been heavy purchasers of Canadian hay both in the local market and in the country districts. Thousands of bales have been sold for shipment across the line during the week. The heavy buying has caused a further advance in the better grades of hay of 50c per ton, thus making an advance of \$1.50 per ton within the past two weeks.

Cables from England do not show any improvement. Liverpool cables report the market very firm, but it is impossible to get any ocean space to this port. The lower grades of hay have not advanced any in price.

E.T. LIVE STOCK

PRICES AT LAWRENCEVILLE.
Lawrenceville, Oct. 18.—(Special.)—The Plains Bros., of Valcourt, loaded two cars of live stock here for Montreal, and Mr. A. Lefebvre one car. Messrs. Laing & Daigneau loaded a car of live stock here Monday for Montreal. They all paid from \$15 to \$30 per head for cows. A large proportion of the cows were canners.

Swarms of fish in the Mississippi became indicated as a result of the revenue officers throwing 1,916 barrels of beer into the river. The antics of the fish were extraordinary. Some jumped out of the water in the liveliest manner, while others, becoming exhausted, lay on the water, dazed but happy. Men and boys caught hundreds of pounds in baskets. The finny roustabouts revived when placed in clean water.

PLOUGHMEN OF MISSISQUOI CO.

Annual Competition Was Held at St. Armand Station

EIGHTEEN TEAMS WERE ENTERED, AND THE COMPETITION WAS KEEN IN ALL THE MATCHES.

St. Armand Centre, Oct. 18.—(Special.)—The thirty-sixth annual match of the Missisquoi County Plowing Association held on the splendid 400 acre farm of Mr. O. A. Reynolds about three miles from Freleighsburg, on Thursday was a most decided success in every respect. The weather did not promise to be favorable at early morning, but the day proved ideal as it was cool and pleasant. By nine o'clock there were eighteen teams in the field, each class of which there were five, was well filled. Several old plowmen, those who have for many years competed successfully, were again to be seen directing splendid pairs of horses across the field, turning a furrow straight as a die. At noon one hour was given for feeding teams and passing of lunch, by those taking part in the plowing, along with the directors. Mr. and Mrs. O. A. Reynolds provided a most sumptuous dinner to all. About 75 sat down to the tables heavily laden with all good things. Members of the Association and guests will long remember hospitality of the "Host," and "Hostess." Mr. W. F. Kay, M. P., President of the Association, was seated at the table, surrounded by Directors and members. There were only two charter members present, Mr. C. E. Tittermore, Phillipsburg, and Mr. S. H. Sornberger, of Stanbridge East, who for many years have acted in the capacity of secretary to the entire satisfaction of all concerned. It was stated that four of the men who were instrumental in forming the association were now living. Besides the two mentioned, they are Mr. M. Corey, Stanbridge East, and C. P. Derick, St. Armand Station. Both these men have given much valuable services and were much missed by all present. Perhaps no one man has done more to forward the interests of the Association than Mr. Derick, who is at present in poor health and unable to be present.

There were some most excellent teams on the field and it would be hard to find better in the Province. Messrs. Kay, Montgomery, Stewart, Symington and others showed horses that were a credit to Missisquoi County. A noticeable feature of the contest was that of young men who had never plowed in a match before. This was especially noticeable in the Junior class. There were five competitors, Clare Ransom, Geo. Russell, Clarence Caswell, Thos. Jenkins and L. R. Russell, all being under 21 years of age. Many favorable comments were made on their splendid work by all plowmen and the judges found it difficult to arrive at a decision.

As a whole the work done this season was not up to the average. This was no fault of the competitors but due to the fact that there had been so little rain during the fall, and the ground was not wet enough to enable the turning of a good furrow.

During the day about twelve acres was turned over. At the close of the match all were again invited to the house for tea by Mr. Reynolds. Mr. S. H. Sornberger read the awards and distributed prizes to the winners. He also tendered a vote of thanks to the judges and Mr. and Mrs. Reynolds. This was seconded by the President, Mr. Kay, and strongly supported by those present.

The judges were: On outfits—Messrs. E. H. Hubbard, Franklin, Vt., and J. B. Demon, Highgate Centre, Vt. On plowing—Messrs. T. J. Campbell, Wm. Tait, Freleighsburg; and T. Robert, Stanbridge East.

THE ONLOOKER COMMENTS

Development of Commis- sion Government

Commission Government, to which
Sherbrooke citizens are looking as a
cure for civic ills, is making great
progress in the United States and is
even developing beyond the original
conception.

Dayton, Ohio, has adopted the "city
manager" plan of municipal govern-
ment, to take effect under a new
charter the first of next year. After
that date the city council will con-
sist of five commissioners whose du-
ties, except when they appoint the
general manager, are purely legisla-
tive. They take the place of the
older, larger council and concentrate
responsibility for city ordinances in a
few hands. But the remarkable phase
of the new charter is the concentra-
tion of practically all the executive
power of a large city in the hands of
one man, the general manager. He is
to administer all the city's business
except the courts and the schools.

This is an advance even upon the
charter of Staunton, Va., which
originated the general manager plan,
for in Staunton the control of the
police and fire departments remains
in the hands of the mayor, and the
general manager is entrusted prin-
cipally with business details, such as
the purchasing of supplies, paving of
streets, and similar functions that
involve the expenditure of money.

Dayton puts the whole burden of
administration upon one man. Abuse
of his extraordinary power is pre-
vented by provisions for the initia-
tive, referendum and recall.

Dayton thus approaches the nearest
of all large American cities to the
German system, by which the admin-
istration of municipal government has
become a specialized technical pro-
fession that is undertaken as a life
work by men of the highest intelli-
gence and ambition, who prepare for
the task by years of study and who
find their employment well paid and
stable. So seriously is their work
considered that, a few years ago, a
large German city advertised for
months for a mayor (who corre-
sponds to Dayton's general manager),
offering a high salary, before an ap-
plicant who dared pretend to pos-
sess the necessary qualifications asked
for the place.

An American editor remarks in this
connection:

"It may very well be that Dayton
has taken the step forward that will
place the chief administrator of a
big city's affairs in a position of
such security and dignity that mun-
icipal government may become a field
for the best business ability and the
most statesmanlike intelligence of
the country.

"Years ago, when the recently-
retired Ambassador Bryce wrote
"The American Commonwealth," city
government was the one conspicuous
failure which he had to chronicle.
With the wide spread of the commis-
sion form of government and the
hopeful experiments in city managers,
the present would afford a much
brighter picture."

Business administration of civic
affairs by paid manager or managers
is fast becoming the established form
of civic government in all progressive
cities.

Sherbrooke, in moving towards
government by commission, is not
treading unexplored paths. The ex-
perimental stage is past.

Swift and Cheap Justice

It has appeared to the public in the
Eastern Townships of late that the
dispensation of justice was encumbered
with an unnecessary amount of
technical procedure, which resulted
rather in the defeat than in the
achievement of the ends of justice.
The operation of legal machinery,
civil and criminal, is complicated and
expensive.

It is interesting to note that in
other sections of the country, and in
other countries, the opinion also
exists, and is being expressed very
strongly, that the administration of
justice should be simplified.

World's Work magazine devotes its
leading article in October issue to
the subject, under the caption,
"Swift and Cheap Justice."

The writer of the article referred to
remarks: "The legislatures have
patched together more or less in-
tricate masses of regulations which
confuse and embarrass the courts
themselves and which have no central
idea and which leave the more im-
portant courts in a condition of
chaos. These conditions are at the

basis of a greater part of the lack of
effectiveness of our courts."

The expense and delay of getting
even a minor civil suit through to a
final conclusion are, also, such as to
constitute a serious grievance to
those who seek redress through the
courts. It does not appear, however,
that conditions in this respect are
quite as bad here as they are in the
country to the south. "For delay and
for expense," says a leading member
of the Philadelphia bar, "the present
condition of justice is a scandal of
long standing." He continues:

"Take the typical case of a small
wage-earner who was defrauded out
of his wages, amounting perhaps to
ten or twelve dollars. His claim is
small in terms of money, but it bulks
large in terms of work and sweat
and need. If there is one class who
must have speedy justice it is the
small wage-earner, whose wages are
the very blood of his life. Now, what
kind of justice does he get? First, he
has to go down to a magistrate and
pay about \$5 costs to start a suit.

In a week or so he gets a trial and
automatically the magistrate enters
judgment for him. Then he waits
twenty days and is told that the de-
fendant has entered an appeal and
that the whole case must be tried
over again in the Court of Common
Pleas. Accordingly, he hires a lawyer
for ten dollars, who draws up a
statement of claim and rules the
defendant to file an affidavit of de-
fence in fifteen days. When that is
done, his lawyer then rules the de-
fendant to plead, which takes fifteen
days more. After that, the case is at
last ready for the trial list.

The creditor has spent fifteen dollars and
waited fifty days before his suit is
even begun. His troubles, however,
have just commenced. After the case
is on the trial list he must wait for
about two years before the case is
even reached for trial. I have had
cases appear on the list six times
before they were reached, and they were
finally tried five years after suit was
begun."

Conditions are not so very differ-
ent in St. Francis District from
those in other parts of Canada, or in
Canada from those in Philadelphia or
other parts of the United States.
Swift and cheap justice we have not
got.

Judge White, of Sherbrooke, is
credited with having propounded,
some years ago, but after he
had long legal practice, the following
as the acme of good legal advice,
namely: "Keep out of law."

The late Mr. J. A. Chicoine, of
Sherbrooke, also, recognizing the dif-
ficulty and expense of securing ad-
justment of disputes through the
courts, introduced in the Quebec Le-
gisature a bill known as the "Con-
ciliation Act," which was designed to
facilitate settlement of disagreements
out of court. The public, however,
has never shown any great disposi-
tion to make use of the facilities
thus offered to settle their disputes
by arbitration or compromise.

Appeal to the courts remains the
favorite method. The hot blood of
the litigants demands a fight, and,
like national warfare, the costs are
never counted before the battle.

In the interests of all, however—of
the man who goes to law because he
likes it, and of the man who is drawn
into it in self-defence—a reform is
necessary to the end that swift and
cheap justice under simplified pro-
cedure may be available.

A New E. T. Society

The Eastern Townships Associated
Boards of Trade have, through their
delegation to Quebec, laid before Sir
Lomer Gouin and his Cabinet a busi-
ness proposition relative to immigra-
tion and repatriation and Eastern
Townships publicity work in general.
The plan, as outlined, is sensible and
in no degree extravagant.

A local organization, with office
and permanent secretary, is essential.
It will constitute a publicity bureau
for the whole Eastern Townships, a
receiving and distributing depot for
new arrivals, and, if efficiently con-
ducted, will be capable of important
work on behalf of this section of
country.

The Quebec Government can well
afford to grant the prayer of the
delegation in its entirety. It ought
to do so, as it represents one of the
most important movements on behalf
of agriculture and general develop-
ment which has ever taken place in
the Eastern Townships.

Wireless telegraphy has again dem-
onstrated its wonderful value as a
life saver. The call for help brought
ten ships to the aid of the Voltorno,
and but for this it is not likely that
one of the five hundred persons saved
would have escaped. Those who es-
caped from the Titanic owe their
rescue to the call of the wireless. Of
modern inventions there is none more

"RETROUSSE" SKIRTS AND "GOLFINE" SWEATERS, AUTUMN STYLE FEATURES AT DEAUVILLE, TO BE FASHIONABLE

"GOLFINE," a striped cotton material, the creation of Mr. Rodier, will be 'all the rage' next winter. In the United States it will supersede everything else for fashionable women's wear.

The foregoing statement was made by Mr. Lucien Schloss, head of the commission firm of Adolphe Schloss, 1115 et Cie., to a correspondent for this paper who called at the Paris establishment a few days ago.

Mr. Schloss had just returned from Deauville, where, he said, he had been charmed by the variety, refinement and simplicity of the prevailing fashions. "Simplicity," he said, "is the real characteristic of the French 'mode,' and every dress worn at Deauville corresponded to the moment of the day and the appropriateness of the occasion on which it was worn."

"In the morning in the Rue Contault-Biron one could see and admire the gay character of light white silk and tulle and light taffetas and lingerie dresses. The great fad replacing the colored woollen or silk sweaters, in fashion some weeks previously, was the long coat of a striped cotton material, in yellow, red, orange, blue and white shades, the collar and sleeves trimmed with fur. This is 'golfine.'"

Promises Sensational Novelty. Mr. Schloss, continuing, said:—"For next season Mona Rodier is preparing a still more sensational novelty of broadened designs on the same ground which will be amazingly effective."

"At the Deauville races more elaborate dresses were worn, but they were not overburdened with lace and embroidery, as the ones exhibited in Paris. The dresses worn at the races during 'Grande Semaine' at Deauville produced the impression that one was taking part at a formal garden party or some diplomatic or official reception."

Mr. Schloss showed the correspondent photographs taken at Deauville of charming dresses with double volants effects in white silk muslin or in pink, white or black taffetas, the volants having in many instances borders of skunk or ermine. One photograph showed a captivating dress of black velvet on a white liberty skirt. Then there were dresses of a decided Japanese character, with broad collars set far from the neck, round sleeves and an immense satin bow on the waist line.

Regarding winter fashions, Mr. Schloss said:—"Although every firm has launched some particular creation of its own, the prevailing shades will be red, dark green and living orange. Materials of 'duvety' silk, 'velours de laine' for the tailor made suits, and silk plush and silk velvets for the more elaborate coats, will be worn. For elaborate afternoon or evening dresses rich silks, broadened with gold and silver, and silk muslins and taffetas are to be used."

Back of Dress Is Important.

"The trimmings, other than furs, will be narrow silver and gold tinsel galloons, crystal amulets, white wax beads, and a fair amount of jet beads and pendants. All these will be employed in such a manner as not to overcharge the dress. The drapery effects are quite new, and the back of a dress is to be as important a matter as the front. One of the leading dressmakers is showing evening dresses very décolleté on the back, whereas the front is high and almost 'timid' in character. The neck is always

without covering; even the fur coats are not closed over it, but are round, rolling over themselves from one shoulder to the other, and are worn hanging loose and drooping in the back.

"Skirts are decidedly short, but wider and with numerous wide pleats on the hips and below as well. They have a lifted up, 'retrousse' effect and are of a provocative nature, as if the wearer were inviting attention. The slit is still in favor and its ambition seems to be, in many instances, to find itself at the back instead of the front of the skirt."

"There are no sleeves on evening dresses and the arms are free. A narrow attached 'bride' is all that retains the dress on the shoulders, and this is made of silk, muslin or crystal beads. If a sleeve is desired, light tulle or muslin scarfs, attached to the neck of the dress, can be rolled over the arms."

Indorses Commission System.

"Furs will, as usual, be an important factor. When used as a garniture on coats or on the sleeves and collars of tailor made dresses, German and Russian fitch, skunk, colinsky and civet are chosen. The fur coats in breitschwanz and carneau are worked so soft that the drapery effects are equal to the lightest silks. Ermine and sable furs are combined in wonderful

designs, and the mole coats encrusted with seal are real creations." Mr. Schloss further said:—"If we, as commission agents, formerly objected to the direct delivery from the dressmakers

to our mutual customers, one of our principal reasons was that we considered the measure entirely unnecessary. If some commission houses have been suspected of allowing models to be copied, they are altogether the exception. All of us look upon such ways of doing business as absolutely dishonest, and there is no reason for our being suspected. "In my experience the most courteous and agreeable relations have always existed between dressmakers and commission agents."

Materials for Autumn Elegant

NOT since the reigns of the Louis of France have such beautiful imported fabrics been seen for dress. Last season we had, it is true, the lovely brocades and matelasse materials, but this year the coloring is much more beautiful and the weaves even more elegant. The typical blues and pinks of the days of French elegance in dress, which have come down to us in the costumes and paintings of those times, contrast interestingly with the Chinese and Japanese colorings that are used also in the new materials.

There is as yet no sign of stiffening in silks or woollen material. In fact, one of the principal peculiarities of the new fabrics is their supple limpness. There is a velvet that is perhaps the softest and thinnest velvet that ever has been made. It is extremely light weight, without any hint of transparency, and only that it has a velvet weave and lights might be called by some other name. It is called Venetian velvet, and can be used like satin or any other pliable, soft fabric.

The durable velvet has a mirror glass effect, but is otherwise like chiffon velvet. Velvet is to be high fashion this winter, and is to be combined often with cloth, as, for instance, the new drap de nymphe, which is after the style of the old Venetian cloth. Unborn lamb, duvety and peluche de laine are the novelties in the woollen materials. Chenille cloth, squared off curiously in the weave, is perhaps the high novelty in woollen material, and some very smart tailored suits for autumn and winter are already on view.

In figured materials having broadened effects the great novelty is the peluche. There is broadened plush, voile peluche—

plush figures with a background of voile—voile faconné—a peluche figure on a silk ground, with the plush weave broadened figure so long that it is almost furlike. But quite the richest, loveliest and most desirable for evening wraps is the peluche

on a tinsel, gold or silver ground.

Next come the broadened velvets in odd Eastern patterns and on all sorts of grounds. There is the velvet figure on a faille ground that, because of the design, looks like moiré. A velours frise that is very expensive—about \$25 a yard—has a design that has the appearance of camouflage cutting. There are gray velvet figures embossed on the gay silk colored back-

grounds—deep pink, azure blue and citron yellow. Velvet broadened designs in a coral like pattern cover well the same colored crepe grounds or show up well against faille backgrounds. More wonderful than all, on

voile and chiffon grounds are the broadened velvet figures which hang with a delightfully artistic limpness. Velours faconné is one of the most beautiful materials for an evening wrap that can be imagined. The design is of velvet leaves in relief shaded in two tones, black and a slightly lighter blue. This design covers well the ground, but what can be seen of it is of satin of a vivid tint, for instance a glorious orange that throws the whole design into relief and is as beautiful as a painting.

The designs in all these broadened velvets are mostly smaller than those of last year, and many of them are authentic copies of antique stuffs. There is an old museum in Lyons, France, where all textiles that have been designed during the last thousand years have been collected, and it is there that many of the ideas and copies come from.

In the lighter silk weaves the tinsel brocades are the fashionable novelty. They are ideal for evening dresses and wraps, according to the size of the design. There is a tinsel voile pompadour which is surely a copy of some French court costume, in lovely old pompadour designs and colorings. A voile broché tinsel has tinsel designs on gay colored grounds, and the silver tinsel designs are seen even on chiffon backgrounds. In a lamé broché the satin figure is shot with tinsel and contrasts with a cascade green ground. A crepon fantaisie brocade has the addition of a broadened chintz pattern in the old chintz colorings. One of the matelasse materials has a tinsel thread in the raised figure.

To replace the charmeuse there is a crepe Lucia, a satin on the same order as charmeuse, but with a slight crepe in the weave that gives it an added elegance. Crepe Trianon is like that of last year, except that it seems a little heavier, is more crepe-like in appearance and comes in wonderful Japanese designs. Faillé Trianon has a clear cut rib like old Ottoman silk and has a glorious lustre. Crepe crachet looks like a serpent's skin. In heavier mixtures for afternoon tailored suits the crepe Albanais has an indefinite pattern, and crepe brocade has a little of the velour effect, with an eponge look to the raised weave.

New colors are always interesting news, for even if one is in the habit of wearing dark colors there are always some such colors that are specially fashionable each season. In the dark tones it is the brown which must be given precedence—a color that is always a favorite with American

women. Seal brown is the smartest shade of this color.

Next come the bottle greens, or Russian greens as they are now called. Next come the chinchilla and castor grays and the corbeau blue, which is a little brighter than the midnight blue of last season. The French pinks come in the strong light tones—maison pink, which you will notice directly, as it is something like old crushed strawberry; Beauvère pink, which makes one think of a cinnamon; and pink, and filament, which is a bit deeper,

A NEW OPTICAL DISCOVERY.

The smart little French yacht, Lady Henrietta, flying the British flag, and provided with wireless apparatus and antennae and having Signor Ivi, the Italian engineer and chemist on board, has been hovering about the Norman coast the past few days.

The yacht contains the invaluable secret of the new invention for exploding at distances varying from 60 to 6,500 yards by wireless infra red color spectrum waves, called F Rays by Ivi, all explosive substances in contact with metal which may be on board any vessel of war.

Experiments with astounding successful results have been made with this invention, which Ivi claims will revolutionize modern warfare on land and sea, in the presence of General de Castelnau, assistant chief of the general staff of the French army; Commandant Parrie, director of the wireless telegraphy station of the Eiffel Tower, and Captain Clotilde, representing the French minister of marine. This technical commission has made reports which are kept a profound State secret, but, according to the highest authority, they conclude with a recommendation urging the French government to secure the monopoly of the invention.

Roughly speaking, the application consists in finding, by means of a special projector emitting return infra red rays, the exact distance and exact radio-magnetic capacity of metallic objects. When these have been determined with precision, the U. S. Ray is projected and a long wireless explosion ensues with mathematical accuracy.

Experiments made near Villers by the French Government commissioner on board the Lady Henrietta resulted in exploding submarines mines a thousand yards distant with such accuracy that one of two was only five yards apart was exploded at will, while the second mine remained intact. This invention can

be applied on land as well as on sea, and also to dirigible balloons, such as the German Zeppelins, with metallic armatures.

It also renders a ship containing explosive ammunition more dangerous for those on board than for the enemy. —New York Tribune.

Again, if this is the result what would hinder Stanstead Plain or Rock Island or a combination of the two from becoming incorporated as a Town and having licenses to curse them and all adjoining Municipalities the same as now? In that result the conditions would be exactly as at present and where would be the harm? Why should two thirds of the County be paying exorbitant tribute to the other third, letting the one third have all the profit but only part of the vomit? Let's clean the County not only part of it.

There was no exaggeration in my former letter, no "gross misrepresentation" as Dr. Clouston kindly puts it. It was a simple statement of facts, interspersed with a few questions. Neither Dr. Stevenson nor Dr. Clouston have refuted the former nor replied to the latter. The S. G. R. merely gives us a continuation of the stuff the Forester has on tap, especially after the raise of rates, and Dr. Clouston's "few facts" are nothing new or wholly false. The one medical gentleman hits the point exactly where the other misses it.

A Mr. Avery, some 30 years ago, said in the old Sherbrooke Gazette, that the I.O.F. rates were wholly inadequate, and insurance men have always insisted upon it. To succeed old members for the expectations is, to say the least, in poor taste. Why did they have such expectations? What was the inducement to join? Were we to pay more than the management asked? If the S. G. did not know any better, how should the ordinary members be expected to? Now that their promises have not been fulfilled to say that we should not have been galled by them is somewhat weak. He also says that the order is now 100 p.c. solvent. Show us, for how long? What was claimed in 1907? His ancient history fails to replace that lack of information to which he alludes. But he coyly says we had cheap insurance. We are lucky indeed if we got anything for our money. Now they ask us to put up more than the men responsible for the present situation may, in their wisdom, invest it for our benefit. No charge of extravagance has been made but that is well thought. Take this \$1,000,000. By what right take that money? What was Robbing Peter partially to pay Paul is questionable. I have not Dr. Stevenson's letter before me, but can not recall that he devoted much space to telling us how many of the old members who voted for the assessment are receiving salaries of \$400 per year up. I am satisfied that fraternal insurance is doomed. It does not make a particle of difference to me whether any member leaves the order or not. I have no axe to grind. Revenue is flat, stale and unprofitable. I shall quit while the quitting is good. There are those for whom it is unfortunately, is not. It is a matter for each to decide for himself. The great wrong is that we were induced to join by misrepresentations, intentional or not. The man who risks his money on his fancied ability to locate the nimble pea does not get much sympathy, but that does not let the thimble-rigger off. I have heard no such names as Dr. Stevenson says he has been called. Not being a long distance mind reader, I can't tell what others are thinking. But no sophistry, no platitudes, can hide the simple truth.

Why did not the S. G., years ago, or even three months, send to each Court a plain statement of the financial situation, laying such courses as might be open before them for the majority to choose, say whether to meet the raise squarely, or to go into liquidation?

Instead, they spring it on us about a week before October 1st., as the vote was put before the delegates without adequate time for figuring—the thing is so patent I will not continue further than to say we are not greatly interested in the opinion of the American Commissioner, and will close for good and all with a parable of the Tale of a Bear.

In pioneer days a frontier preacher who eked out a living with cobbler work, set a trap and caught a bear. When the good man went to snoot him the shot failed to finish him and the person promptly climbed a tree, leaving a good deal of his nether garments on the bear's claws and tail. SHERBROOKE'S ARTISTIC SIDE

Prof. Sawdon Has Faith in Development Along These Lines

HAS HAD NO MONETARY RETURN FOR WORK IN PROVIDING CONCERT COURSE BUT FEELS WELL REPAID.

Professor Sawdon, who has been instrumental in developing the Symphony Orchestra and in providing for Sherbrooke a series of high class concerts, in speaking to a representative of the Record, yesterday, with regard to the financial aspect of these concerts, said:

"Of the four years' work developing the Sherbrooke Symphony Orchestra, I have yet to make a dollar profit, and on this series it looks as though that will not be this year either unless there is a larger audience than on October 7th last. You cannot bring renowned artists of the type in this series and make a profit unless capacity houses are assured and there are still 150 good seats to dispose of."

"That sounds discouraging," remarked the reporter.

"Oh, no, far from it. I am gratified for what has been accomplished and sanguine for the future," replied Professor Sawdon.

"Will you continue them indefinitely?"

"While I am in Sherbrooke such a work must go on. Not until we can have a series of Grand Opera performances and a symphony orchestra playing Beethoven's and Tchaikovsky's symphonies and Wagner excerpts, can I be content to leave the work to chance. Having lived in such an atmosphere I know its great influence upon a community, and I should be unsettled without it."

"Do you feel that your leisure is better occupied in this work than in solo playing?"

"Assuredly much better; there are artists galore, who, in comparison with business men do not receive adequate return for their labors. What I wanted the world over is the audience to support them. Many artists resist the vaudeville stage in spite of financial embarrassments. Those that accept it soon deteriorate in their art, and are a great loss to the world."

"I have great faith in the future of Sherbrooke along artistic lines as well as in other respects. After five years in Canada I am convinced that this is God's country. Over and above an excellent climate, no wars or rumours of wars, either internal or external and evidently permanently at peace with our great neighbor, the American, we have the advantage of educating and building cities where one may say, Europeans leave off. That is, we are not hampered with old dispensations or outside influences and in experiments we have a clear field and plenty of it."

"Sherbrooke is a beautiful city with every advantage to further any cause it may undertake. The greatest asset is perhaps that we have no real poverty, but plenty of work, with fair wages for both sexes and chances for development for the skilled artisan or business man."

"So much for business," remarked the reporter, "What think you of Sherbrooke's possibilities along lines in which you have taken a particular interest?"

"That is a delicate question. I do not shrink from answering you, but my motive may be misunderstood. The Almighty Dollar certainly takes first place and you spend money freely. This need not be in Sherbrooke; perhaps we are influenced in this direction by the Americans being so nearly all along the boundary. In Europe—though greatly developed artistically—yet large masses of the population have not learned to seek the arts for their recreation. This may be accounted for by the poverty-stricken surroundings of such. This class of individual, if they ever had finer feelings, have lost them in the continued struggle and hopelessness of their existence. But in Sherbrooke such poverty and failure in life is practically non-existent and therefore correspondingly there should be a keener and better appreciation of the higher consciousness."

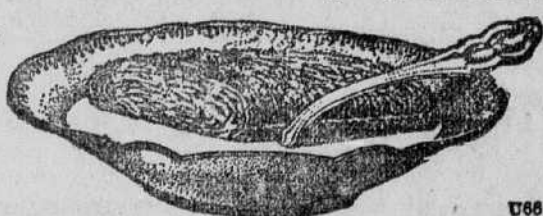

The petition of L. Woodworth for a winter road was accepted and Inspector Westover was ordered to lay out the same according to law. A large number of bills in connection with roads, bridges, etc., were inspected and approved for payment, the whole aggregating several hundred dollars.

SIR EDMUND WAS SURPRISED

Writes of Sherbrooke's Library and Art Union

AN ART COLLECTION OF WHICH ANY CITY MIGHT WELL BE PROUD.

There is probably no one in Canada more competent than Sir Edmund Walker, by wide experience and knowledge, to judge of and write the accompanying letter upon the work and value to this city of the Library and Art Union.

He is an art connoisseur of high reputation, and President of the National Art Gallery of Canada, for which the Canadian Government is now spending very large sums under his guidance, in forming a very important national collection of pictures. He speaks with authority as a literator and well known expert in Archaeological matters, and is prominently connected with the leading institutions for which Toronto is becoming famous; while as President of the Bank of Commerce his wide knowledge of the Dominion and utterances upon broad national questions have made him famous.

In a letter to a Sherbrooke citizen he writes:

Toronto, Oct. 10th, 1913.

Dear Sir—
When I was in Sherbrooke I was as you know, greatly moved by the work being done by the Library and Art Union. There are very few places even among the larger cities of Canada where anything of a definite nature is being done for the benefit of a community on the side of art. To find in a city of the size of Sherbrooke such a large collection of pictures and of objects elsewhere in the building which would be prized by any great museum in the world, was a most agreeable surprise.

I have no doubt that much of what I saw was due to the zeal and enthusiasm of a few, but I hope that the citizens of Sherbrooke generally will appreciate their very unusual advantages in having established in their midst such a centre of intellectual and artistic activity.

CHIEF ENGINEER OF MONTREAL MAKES A REPORT TO COUNCIL.

(Montreal Gazette.)

A larger use of stone, wood and artificial blocks for pavements, the establishment of a plant to treat wooden blocks, the organization of municipal laboratories to experiment and analyze the materials to be used in public works are some of the reforms which Chief City Engineer Janin wants to introduce in the public works administration of this city.

Mr. Janin, who has just returned from a visit to Europe, sent a long report to the Board of Control in which he gives details of the systems used by the different big cities of Europe, and especially Paris, in the execution of their public works. This report shows that the French capital has almost abandoned the use of asphalt pavements for stone or wood; the only exception is made in case of strictly residential streets, where asphalt is used to avoid the noise.

Mr. Janin is anxious to introduce in Montreal the use of the wooden blocks, which he says are now treated in such a way that the wood is rendered durable at a low cost. The process consists of treating the wood of all materials which are liable to decay and replacing them by heavy mineral oils at a slight cost. Pavements treated in this way now cost the city of Paris from \$1.30 to \$2.30 per square yard. It is Mr. Janin's intention to recommend the establishment of such a plant by the city of Montreal, where the wooden blocks could be treated as by the French process. A report to that effect will be submitted shortly by Mr. Janin to the Board of Control.

In his report Mr. Janin says that the city of Paris, which has a population of 2,800,000, with an area of 34 square miles, has a budget of \$10,000,000, out of which \$800,000 are for salaries to the public works technical officials, while Montreal, with an area of 40 square miles and a budget of \$8,720,000, pays only \$215,000 for 350 technical officials instead of 1,100 as in Paris. Paris has 3,500,000 yards of permanent sidewalk and 10,000,000 yards of permanent pavements, while Montreal has 2,800,000 yards of sidewalks and 2,800,000 yards of pavements. In Paris as in Montreal the proprietors pay for the first pavement laid and the city keeps it in order. These pavements are composed as follows: One-twentieth asphalt, three-twentieths macadam (water and tar bound), five-twentieths wood and eleven-twentieths stone and artificial blocks. Mr. Janin also refers in his report to tree planting, snow removal, cleansing and watering the streets by means of automobiles and by means of sewers, public and private lighting, railways, water supply, water sewers and drainage sanitation by means of sewage farms and cultivation.

BANK-NOTES MADE OF SILK
It is possible that before long all bank notes will be printed, not on paper, but on silk of a particular shade. It is by means of photography that most clever bank note forgeries are effected. The Viking Manufacturing Company held a demonstration recently when Mrs. Ernest Hart explained a new process which she has invented for waterproofing fabrics without rubber and drying them in the same operation. By utilizing this process cotton, linen, or other material can be put into one end of a machine white and brought out a few minutes later water-proof and dry! Each machine treats 180 yards in a day, and the materials used are useful in hundreds of trades, from building aeroplanes to hanknote making. As regards the latter the material produced is of

such a color that it cannot be photographed.

Another special "line" is the production of cinematograph screens. At present those sitting to one side of the screen during an exhibition are often unable to see the picture clearly, and the new screen has been introduced to remedy that defect. It is of a silver color, and has small ridges which reflect the light in such a manner that pictures may be seen with equal clearness from any part of the theatre. In addition, the image is whiter, and less electric light is required.—London Standard.

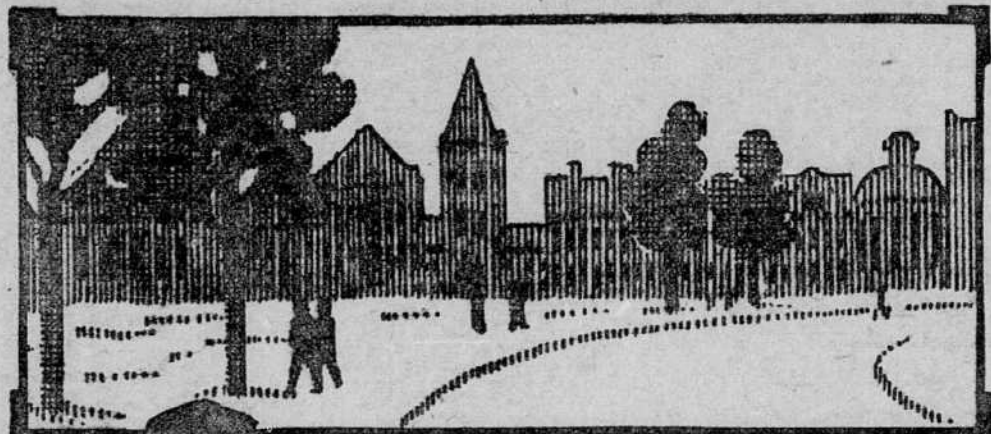

EASTERN TOWNSHIPS WATER POWERS

More St. Francis Storage to be Provided by Government

CONSERVATION OF OTHER EASTERN TOWNSHIPS RIVERS WILL BE DEALT WITH LATER.

While in Quebec, this week, members of the Eastern Townships delegation had an opportunity to discuss with the Hon. N. S. Parent, head of the Waterways Commission, the question of conservation of Eastern Townships waterways.

This question was before the Associated Boards at its recent meeting. Hon. Mr. Parent stated that the commission was busy at work. Contracts had already been let for storage dams on the St. Maurice.

The next river to receive attention would be the St. Francis. Following this other rivers in the Townships and elsewhere would be looked after.

Mr. Parent said the Government had determined upon an extensive and systematic scheme for conserving Quebec province water powers.

E. T. CATTLE FOR THE WEST. Frelighsburg, Oct. 18.—(Special)—Mr. C. H. Devine, Lethbridge, Alta., has purchased 103 head of cattle through the Harvey Bros., consisting of cows and young stock. These will be shipped West and sold to the farmers in that part. Mr. Devine is formerly from Montreal and an experienced stockman who has shipped cattle from the East for several years.

NEW PARK AT KNOWLTON.

Knowlton, Oct. 18.—(Special)—Twenty carloads of gravel have been brought to the club house and will be used to beautify the grounds in the rear, which will be made into a park.

Y. M. C. A.'S NEW FILTRATION PLANT

Is Now Installed and in Running Order

BUILDING WILL BE OPEN NEXT WEEK FOR INSPECTION OF PUBLIC.

Beginning with Monday, the Y. M. C. A. building, equipment, and the new filtration plant, will be open for the inspection of the citizens of Sherbrooke, and it is hoped that every person interested in the work of the Association will make an effort to visit the building.

On Thursday evening the ladies will serve refreshments in the building, and the public will be given an opportunity to see the regular gymnasium class work. The educational classes will begin on the same night.

An idea of the importance of the educational work may be gained from the fact that in one class alone, mathematics, about fifty young men are enrolled.

On Friday, from 3.30 to 5, ladies will be invited to see the girls' gymnasium class.

THE NEW FILTRATION PLANT.

The new filtration plant just installed is well worth seeing. For several months the Association had a committee at work on this scheme, composed of Messrs. H. V. Haight, C. N. Danks, R. Neilson, A. W. Youell and P. H. Skelton. The plant cost \$625, and was purchased at the unanimous request of the directors. It is now in working order, and the water in the swimming pool is now purer than the city drinking water.

Dr. Leo Pariseau, Provincial Analyst and Health Officer, will analyse the water after it has been filtered, and compare it with the city water. His report will be published as soon as completed.

The installation of the plant was recommended in the first place on the ground of the increased efficiency to be derived. Under this head the first advantage is in the heating. Lack of circulation made the old system unsatisfactory, the water at the top being hot, while at the bottom it is cold. The new system will circulate the contents of the tank every day. The next advantage, and an important one, is cleanliness. Refiltration will remove all suspended matter and about 97 per cent. of bacteria, thus giving pure, clear water at all times. During the part of the year when free instruction is given in swimming, the tank is used from 150 to 200 times per week, and the question of sanitation is an important one.

AN ECONOMIC MOVE.

The directors found that the installation of the plant was desirable from an economic point of view. 18,000 gallons of water are now being used per week, the cost of which per annum is about \$101. By refiltration and refilling once in three months, the Association would save 864,000 gallons per year, or \$93. Even if the water were changed once a month, which would be absolutely unnecessary, the saving would be \$78 per annum.

In addition to the saving on water charges there will be a saving of about \$150 on the coal necessary to heat the water in the tank. Under old conditions it required 26 tons of coal per year to heat the tank. With the filtration plant only six tons are required.

In addition to its sanitary advantages, the installation of this plant will mean a great saving to the Association.

RURAL SCHOOL OF PROVINCE

French and very little practical French. Pupils should be offered such an education as would be practical in all its phases.

Mr. W. S. Denner criticized one of the text books used in the last examination a question was set which was not dealt with in the book. He complained 18th century words were used and emphasized the need for the use of modern words as in an English course.

An interesting discussion afterwards took place and Mr. Moore maintained that the present system of teaching French was a failure. He severely criticized the last history examination questions and declared that the course of study for the Model Grade I. had been made too difficult.

A resolution was passed on the motion of Miss Robins, to refer to the motion in charge of the course of study, the whole question of mathematics in Grade III. Model.

ELEMENTARY SCHOOL SECTION.

Under the chairmanship of Miss F. Purdy (Lawrence School), excellent papers were read at the Central School as follows: "Primary Reading," by Miss J. McLeod (East Ward School); "School Calisthenics," by Miss Norma Fales, and "Rapid Arithmetic," by Miss Jennie Moe. The North Ward School was represented by drawings. Many of the delegates, officers and members of the executive visited the school and expressed their appreciation of the programme.

AT THE HIGH SCHOOL.

The teachers of the High School in the first five years were in their classrooms from ten to eleven, and from one-thirty to two o'clock. The work in all the grades was very satisfactory, carried out in the presence of a large number of visitors.

In the Primary Class, Miss Laura Van Vliet gave lessons in Phonetics, which were very highly appreciated. In addition to the Art Exhibits from the Montreal High School there was an exhibition of Art work by the Sherbrooke pupils.

In the Third Year Class Miss Griggs gave a lesson on Color Work. She prefaced the lesson by a talk on the primary and secondary colors introducing the words for the first time. The lesson was given to pupils of the third year.

The painting lesson was introduced by the story of the origin of the growth of the poplar tree. They painted one in black, and then one in color, following the instruction of Miss Griggs, who painted one on a piece of paper on the blackboard. The apple tree was then painted. It was chosen because of the contrast in appearance of growth. The position of the branches was cleverly drawn from the pupils.

The concluding lesson for the morning was one of application. The poplar tree was painted in color on a landscape that had been previously done.

In the afternoon Miss Griggs gave a painting lesson the vegetable.

In the Kindergarten and Primary Sections, Miss Warner, of Strathearn School, Montreal, gave four games, suitable for class room for any number of children. In these games every child had a part and the chief educational value consisted in the fact that each worked not for himself but for the group of which he formed a part.

Miss Seely, of Belmont St. School, Montreal, gave two lessons in Construction Work. One in which no paste was used, consisting of cutting and folding, and the second in which the object was pasted after being folded.

These lessons were extremely interesting and very practical. It is a pity that more teachers did not see them.

Miss Ritchie, of Alexandra School, Montreal, then read a paper prepared by Miss Hibbard on the "Connection between Kindergarten and Primary Work," refuting the idea of many persons that a child who has had Kindergarten Training is unable to "buckle down to work."

This concluded a very enjoyable and profitable morning.

EVENING SESSION.

At the evening session Dr. Parrock delivered an address on the "Development of the Imperial Idea," and Miss S. Cameron, M.A., of McGill University, lectured on "Literature with a Field Glass." Both were listened to with marked attention, and a vote of thanks was passed to each.

Dr. Thornton, of the Dental Department of McGill University, and Dr. Laird, the new Principal of MacDonald College, also addressed the Convention.

Solos were rendered by Miss Lusk and Mr. Johnston, and a pianoforte duet was contributed by Madame Codere and Miss Doherty.

PAID OFFICIAL VISIT TO MASONIC LODGE.

McCabe, Clarenceville; Messrs. Oliver, Brown and Clement, from Granby, and Mr. Walter Nutt, of Sherbrooke.

PROMPT ACTION PREVENTED FIRE.

Cowansville, Oct. 18.—(Special)—What might have been a serious fire in the store room of W. F. Vilas Shops on Thursday morning was promptly extinguished by the factory fire brigade. The factory and store rooms are fully equipped with a complete water system which was brought into use and the fire confined to one corner where there were some office chairs stored, packed in excelsior ready to ship.

HATLEY BOARD OF TRADE BANQUET

Anniversary of Organization Observed by Pleasant Gathering

VALUE OF BOARD OF TRADE ORGANIZATIONS EMPHASIZED BY THE SPEAKERS.

Hatley, Oct. 18.—(Special)—The Hatley Board of Trade observed its anniversary, last evening, by an oyster supper, held in Foresters' Hall. There was a large attendance including members of the board, their ladies, and a number of guests from a distance.

Dr. C. R. Jones presided. A very fine supper was served, in the preparation of which the ladies had assisted.

At the conclusion a short toast list was honored, as follows:

"The King," proposed by the chairman.

"The Eastern Townships Associated Boards of Trade," proposed by the chairman and responded to by Mr. E. Winn Farwell, President of the Associated Boards.

"The Sister Boards of Trade," proposed by the chairman, and responded to by Messrs. V. E. Morrill, Sherbrooke; F. A. Johnston, Ayer's Cliff, and J. A. Cook, Sherbrooke.

"The Ladies," proposed by Mr. Cook and responded to by Mr. Whitcomb, of Ayer's Cliff.

The speakers emphasized the importance to a locality of a board of trade organization. There was much that it could do in the interests of a community. The securing of industries and the development of commerce was by no means its chief work. Many boards and the Associated Boards in fact were giving their chief attention to matters pertaining to agriculture. The membership of many of the village boards consisted largely of men engaged in agriculture.

In the case of the Hatley Board, every farmer within a radius of five miles should belong. Agricultural as well as other topics should be discussed and the opinions of men with practical experience were always welcomed in the discussions before the Associated Boards.

Reference was made by Mr. Farwell to the immigration and repatriation proposals. Government aid had been promised and an office would be established in the Eastern Townships to carry on the work. It was believed that under this new system and with a well organized plan a desirable class of help could be obtained for farms which would be a great aid in the development of agriculture. It was necessary, in connection with this propaganda, that the farmers should do their part. They must be prepared to pay a wage which would enable them to retain good men. Agriculture was the basis of Eastern Townships prosperity and the Boards of Trade felt that whatever assistance could be rendered in this connection would be general benefit.

The speakers emphasized the desirability of every community in the Eastern Townships organizing a board of trade. There was local work to be done. And besides its aid was required in the counsels of the Associated Boards. This organization now covered 26 boards and it was desirable that it should include a representative from every progressive community in the Eastern Townships. The very pleasant and successful

ROAD WORK AT LENNOXVILLE

Council Will Experiment With Gravel on College Street

MUNICIPAL TAX FOR YEAR FIXED AT 9½ MILLS—RENTAL TAX 4 P.C. OF RENT.

At an adjourned meeting of the Town Council it was resolved that the Road Committee should stake out and lay gravel on the proposed sidewalk from the Lennoxville light and power office to the Academy, and that in the spring they would lay a five-foot granolithic sidewalk from the Post Office to the Academy.

By-laws were passed levying a municipal tax of 9½ mills and a rental tax to the amount of 4 p.c. on the rent paid.

A discussion then followed on the respective merits of macadam and gravel roads, and it was decided to engage a number of men and teams to lay an up-to-date gravel road, as a test, between the College Bridge and the Long Bridge. The work on this section of road will commence at once in order that it may have a chance of being well packed down, and also to see how it withstands the conditions prevalent in the winter and spring.

The Secretary was also instructed to write to the Government Road Department to find what proposition the Government was prepared to offer if the town decided to lay down gravel roads in preference to macadam.

CLAIM GOODS OF INSOLVENT ESTATE

Court Found That They Had Been Loaned and Must Be Returned

WERE BEING USED BY LEBEVRE AND BONIN, CONTRACTORS, NOW IN BANKRUPTCY.

The right as to the ownership of certain property held by an insolvent estate was decided by Mr. Justice Hutchinson yesterday, in the Superior Court.

Mr. Bonin, contractor, St. Hyacinthe, father of Mr. Bonin, of LeFebvre & Bonin, contractors, whose estate is now in insolvency, and represented by Mr. J. J. Griffith, curator, asked that certain immovable property used in the building trade, be returned as they had been loaned to his son some three years ago.

The curator raised an objection, and contended that the insolvents had become proprietors of these effects under a three years' term of prescription.

It was, however, clearly proved that the insolvents did not hold the effects as proprietors and, therefore, prescription did not run, and the order of the Court went to deliver up these effects to the petitioner.

The gathering closed with the singing of "Auld Lang Syne" and the National Anthem.

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THETFORD MAN HAD TO PAY BACK BOARD

Serious Offence Now For Boarder Leaving Room Without Paying

W. COUTURE SENTENCED TO PAY FINE OF \$100 FOR ILLICIT SALE OF INTOXICATING LIQUOR.

Thetford Mines, Oct. 18.—(Special)—Judge Mulvena held a term of the District Magistrate's Court here on Thursday.

In the case of the City of Thetford Mines vs. Wilfrid Couture on the charge of selling liquor without a license, it was proved that on the fourth of October instant the defendant had sold a bottle of gin to one Ovide Giguere, and also to one Blaziers at \$1.25 each. It was also proved that he had been convicted of a similar offence in June last. He was sentenced to pay a fine of \$100 and costs, or three months in jail at Sherbrooke.

HAD TO PAY BACK BOARD.

Christina McNay (Mrs. John Watson) vs. Thomas Farmer. The accused was charged with having on the 8th of September last, in the absence of the complainant, his boarding house mistress, surreptitiously left her house and removed his baggage and effects to another boarding house, leaving an unpaid account for board of \$18.00. By an amendment to the Criminal Code, passed at last session, and which came into force on the 4th of September last, an act of this nature was made a criminal offence, punishable with a fine of \$100 and three months in jail. The defendant pleaded not guilty but was convicted on proof.

In view of the fact that the law was only in force four days at the time of the commission of the offence, the accused was allowed to go on suspended sentence on payment of the \$18 to the complainant and the costs of his arrest.

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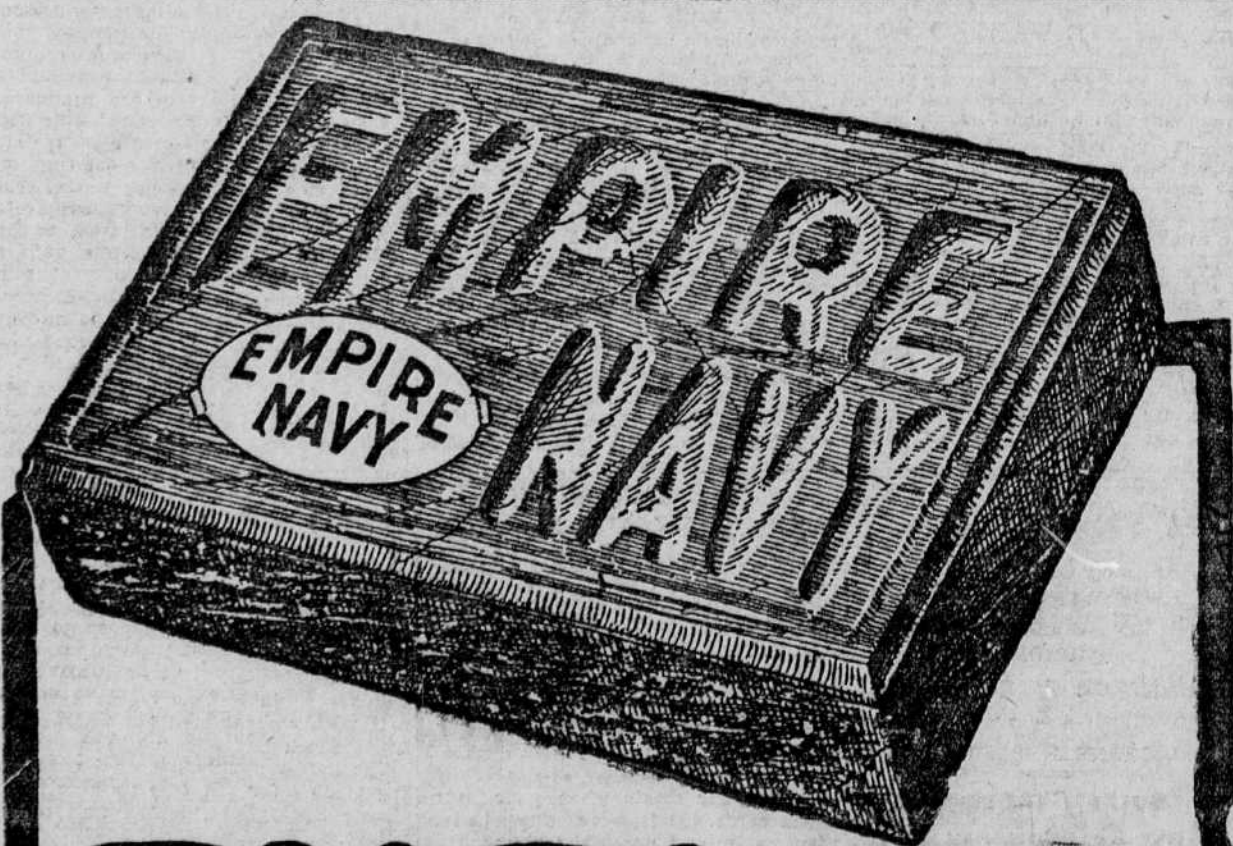
