ONTARIO municipal bodies are moving for the abolition of the law by which ecclesiastical property is exempt from taxation. Any reform in this direction must come from Ontario. It is scarcely to be expected that it will come from Quebec, where there is so much ecclesiastical property enjoying the benefit of exemption.

ANOTHER instance of the barbarity of the present mode of capital punishment is shown by the failure at the first attempt to hang a murderer at Louisville yesterday. The rope slipped from his neck and caught him around the chin and he had to be carried up to the scaffold and a new rope adjusted. The first hanging was a complete failure, the second succeeded. An execution is being made in the republic over the change made by the New York Legislature by which it is intended that capital punishment shall be carried out by means of electricity. It is being said that an electric chair may be sufficient to do the work. It is not instantly that it is evident that nothing could be more barbarous and revolting than a hanging on the gallows which fails to accomplish the object in view and subjects a condemned man to the tortures of being kept in the trap door the second time. It is to be hoped in the interests of civilization that the introduction of electricity for the purposes of the law will doubtless lead to its adoption by other
