ROYAL CANADIAN BANK.—Mr. Yorker, Manager of the Bank of Montreal agency in Toronto, who had been appointed to examine the liabilities and assets of the Royal, in his report to the directors, stated that on the last day of July the liabilities had amounted to \$865,531, which were made up of cash on hand amounting to \$558,252, the deficiency of \$307,279 (that is, set off by the value of customers and real estate to the value of \$1,448,824. The notes of the entire paid-up capital, Mr. Yorker estimates the loss on them at \$148,500, which was an overdraft account at \$15,641, and the amount of the debt preliminary expenses, \$1700 to solve it, who took the \$10,000 of the capital stock can be made available after all debts and liabilities have been discharged, which would give seventy-nine cents in the dollar of the entire paid-up capital.
