Council Plans To Spend \$77,300 On Local Streets And Equipment

Nine-Point Project Is First Phase Of Improvement Plan

The Westmount City Council this week authorized the expenditure of \$77,300 on the first phase of a program to improve a number of the city's streets, sidewalks and general equipment.

General Manager, T. J. Hughes said that the taxpayer's money will not be spent to replace faulty streets and equipment but to "make improvements and replace those which show initial signs of becoming faulty."

"We don't give our roads the chance to go bad," Mr. Hughes told The Examiner, "they are fixed at the initial sign of old-age."

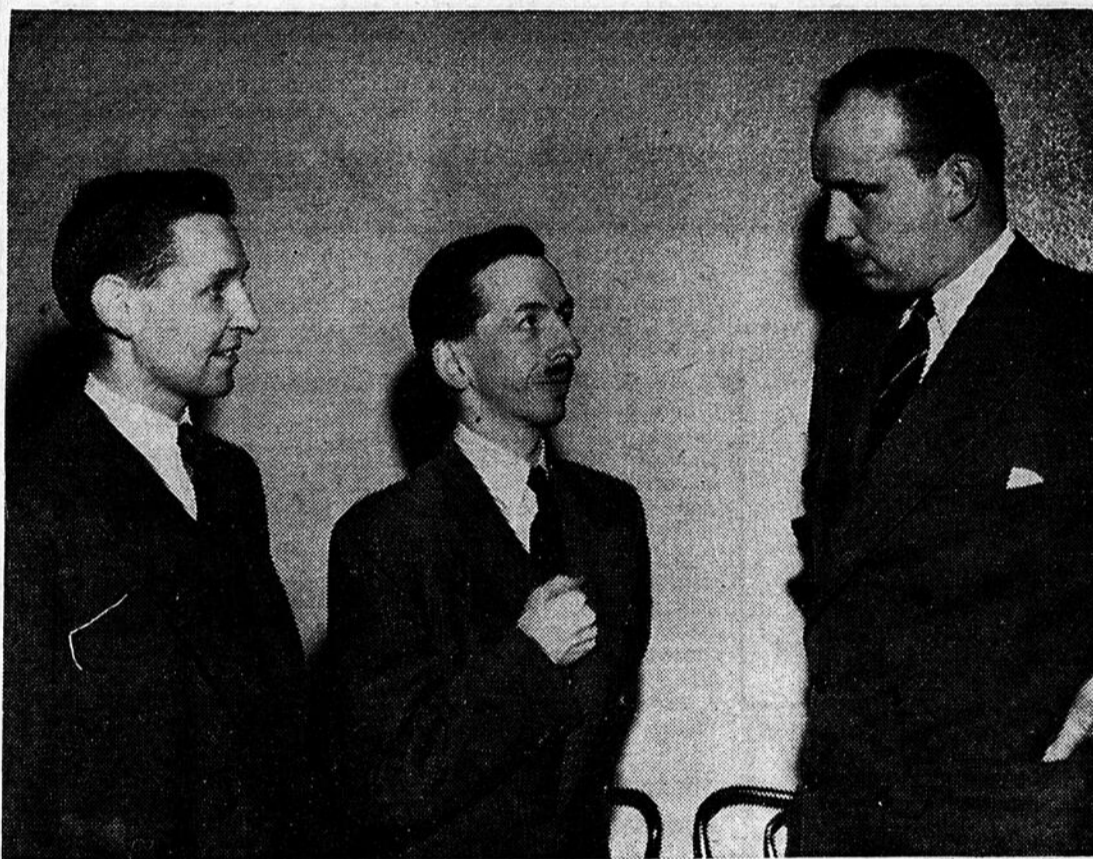

Idealism, Enthusiasm Of Youth Needed In Politics, William Hamilton Says

Idealism, enthusiasm and energy are qualities which youth should contribute in large measure to the political life of Canada, William Hamilton said, at a meeting of the Young Progressive-Conservative Association of St. Antoine-Westmount. Mr. Hamilton is Conservative candidate for Notre Dame de Grace riding.

Pointing out that as people grow older they become subject to many forces which make it difficult for them to participate actively in the public life of the country, the speaker said that politics offered great opportunities for younger people to make a career for themselves while serving their country. It is not necessary to be a candidate for election, said Mr. Hamilton, to participate actively and effectively in politics; every constituency and every party needs a continuing infusion of new blood if our country is to progress and this must largely come from the younger generation.

"Idealism is the driving force which has led man to accomplish most of his great advances, but idealism alone is not enough; it must be coupled with the enthusiasm and energy which can translate vision into accomplishment," the speaker said. "Because youth has not yet acquired vested interests, has few preconceived notions, and is not yet firmly established in business or social life, it has a comparatively open mind on the questions of the day and should make up its mind on the basis of the facts presented to it rather than prejudice," Mr. Hamilton advised.

Viewpoint Needed

The viewpoint of younger people

was needed more today than ever before in the public life of Canada, the speaker said. All too often those with years of experience in a particular field continued to follow policies which had outlived their usefulness, simply because they had become accustomed to them. The viewpoint of younger people is "unbiased and unrestricted, even if it is sometimes immature; we may be ignorant on occasion, but we are almost always sincere," the speaker added.

Older people welcomed the interest and help of the coming generation, he said. Almost without exception those now in control of business, industry and the public life of Canada were seeking people who could follow them, and who could be trained to take over the reins of leadership. They might grumble a bit at times because it was not easy to give way to new ideas and new concepts, and some-

times they were antagonized by youthful aggressiveness, but these were passing phases. Far more important was the desire of senior men to give a hand on the ladder of life to those on the way up.

List Three Reasons

Listing three reasons why young people had a very personal interest in the public life of their country, Mr. Hamilton said that they must control their destiny and the future now being shaped for them, because they must assume the obligations of the future. Life was a blank cheque, he said, which everyone signed as they were born; the generation which would have to pay the cheque should certainly have a hand on the pen which filled in the details and the amount.

Public life offered younger people a great opportunity to get ahead and make a name for themselves while serving their country and their fellow citizens. Their was little competition in the field, because all too few people realized and accepted their responsibilities as citizens. These responsibilities, he said, went far beyond the mere casting of a vote on election day; they required that everyone learn something of the government of their country and the issues of the day, and participate actively in the support of a political party by helping in its organization and administration.

cement of street name and traffic signs on all city streets. Three fifths of this project has already been completed. A more easily read type of lettering is used on the new signs.

8. The purchase of a "low-bed" trailer. The "low-bed" is designed for the purpose of towing tractors from one construction site to the other. The Council has discovered that the continual run of a tractor over summer streets in the summer does "considerable" damage to the pavements and with the use of the trailer vehicle, which runs on ordinary wheels, the damage is completely eliminated.

9. The purchase of plumbing equipment, including a pipe threader. Mr. Hughes told The Examiner that the Council considers the pipe threading device an important money-saving machine. The City buys the pipe in large uncut quantities at a considerably cheaper price and cuts it into suitable sizes by use of the machine.

Two-Man Painting Exhibit Opens Tomorrow

Tomorrow, the Waldorf Galleries, 1479 Sherbrooke street west, will offer an exhibition of paintings by Paul Beaulieu and William Armstrong, it was announced by gallery director Henry Abramson. In this exhibition Westmounters will be given the opportunity of seeing the most recent works of two distinguished Canadian artists who have been living abroad, one in France the other in Italy.

Paul Beaulieu is a native of Montreal. A graduate of the Ecole des Beaux Arts, he left for Paris in 1938 where he has lived ever since, with a studio in the heart of Montparnasse. His tastes and talents soon allied him to the community of young Spanish painters led by Dominguez and Clavé, and later he became identified with the Groupe de L'Echelle, along with Calmettes, Cortot and Patric. His work was exhibited with this group in France, South America, and Mexico. The French government has bought one of his paintings for the Musée d'Art Moderne in Paris, and, more recently, a Beaulieu canvas was chosen for the Bezalet Museum in Jerusalem.

William Armstrong, the artist sharing this show with Beaulieu, was born in Toronto. On completion of his University studies he coupled his career as a painter with that of a lecturer on history of art. At the invitation of Dr. Arthur Lismer, he joined the teaching staff of the Montreal Museum of Fine Arts and later the Faculty of Fine Arts at McGill University. He has exhibited many times in this city, twice at the Museum, and one of his figure paintings won the Jessie Dow Award. Armstrong moved to Florence, Italy, in 1952 where he lives in a villa overlooking the historic Arno river. The Tuscan countryside and the streets of Florence have provided the subject matter for the present collection of paintings.

Westmouter Not Certain Who Won War

A Westmount resident, travelling in Europe told The Examiner by mail today that he "wonders just who won the Second World War."

Charles A. James, Victoria avenue, said in a letter from Hotel Konigshof in Bonn, Germany, that he found that there is a real shortage of meat and butter in England, while in the "fatherland" there is no rationing and the shops are full.

As to Germany's cost of living, Mr. James describes the situation as "awful". "We in Canada don't know what a high cost living means," he stated, "75 cents for 20 cigarettes, \$3.50 for dinner (fish and boiled potatoes, no other vegetables, and small bottle of beer) and \$1.25 for a small piece of cheese and crackers."

Mr. James said that he was fortunate enough to get a covered seat for the Coronation, but as soon as that is over "I'm heading back—I've had just about enough of travelling."

"World Calendar" Outlined To Westmount Rotary Club

A major improvement, called "The World Calendar" is now necessary if mankind's way of keeping time is to keep pace with a streamlined "world", Edward F. Flynn, a member of the U.S. Advisory Board of the World Calendar Association, told members of the Rotary Club of Westmount at their weekly luncheon meeting Wednesday.

"From the time man learned to use numbers and figures, counting sometimes on his fingers and toes, which constituted a wonderful and marvelous accounting machine, he has made improvements in his method of keeping time," Mr. Flynn stated.

The speaker added that the World Calendar is the answer to all those who wish to improve the present calendar. The plan for a new system, as outlined by Mr. Flynn follows:

Revised Calendar Plan

"At present except in leap year there are 365 days in a year divided into 52 weeks of 7 days, leaving that one trouble-maker day to be added to another week. This one orphan day could be made very proud of itself if it were made a World'sday and merely added at the end of the year as an extra day, with no affinity or relationship to the week — there all by itself, proud of the fact that in so acting it would give us always a year of 52 weeks of seven days each — 364 days and one World'sday — and in leap year a Leap-year Day, or whatever you may wish to call it. Thus we would have a stable calendar, balanced and regular, with every date and day always thereafter on the same day of the week, and no hit and

miss, hop, skip and jump arrangement, as at present. Then, by making some adjustments in the number of days in each quarter and in certain months, we will have a year divided into 52 weeks of 7 days with each quarter beginning on Sunday; January, April, July and October each having 31 days and all other months 30 days each; February, May, August and November beginning on Wednesday; and March, June, September and December beginning on Friday — or 91 days in each quarter-year and 182 days in each half-year. Counting Saturdays we would have 26 weekdays and five Sundays in the first month in each quarter, and four Sundays in each of the other months, always and forever without change."

The department has asked all applicants to bring identification for proof of their residence with them. Cards will be issued to Westmount residents only.

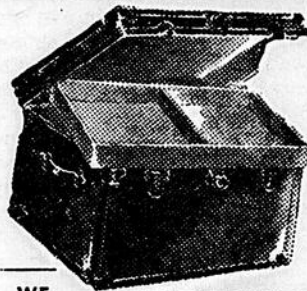

Jamaica, Canada Have Much to Gain Through Unification

Canada appears to be heading for her most spectacular development since Confederation. The British West Indies want to be incorporated as an eleventh province. If they are, Canada will stretch from the north pole to the equator.

In the current issue of MacLean's Magazine Trinidad-born Eric Hutton reviews the controversial Caribbean situation. After a careful survey, he says West Indians are

eager for union because it means leaving the sterling bloc and joining a dollar country.

He quotes W. A. Bustamante, unofficial Prime Minister of Jamaica: "Canada and Jamaica should unite. Both countries have everything to gain and nothing to lose."

Many Canadians, especially in Western Canada, oppose union on the grounds that an influx of colored workers would lower our living standards and drain off welfare benefits.

On the other hand, Hutton says that union would open up the three-hundred-million-dollar West Indian market eager for Canadian goods which is closed at present by trade restrictions on sterling areas.

Right now Canada depends on the West Indies for essential products such as sugar, coffee, bananas, asphalt and bauxite. The Maclean's article says, "Canada's aluminum industry is literally built on West Indian bauxite." Alcan has invested forty million dollars in a project for shipping Jamaican ore to Kitimat. British Guiana supplies nearly three hundred tons of bauxite annually to the Alcan plant at Arvida.

Extra inducement for Canadian businessmen is the unexplored interior of British Guiana which contains unestimated quantities of bauxite, hardwood, gold, diamonds, manganese and mica.

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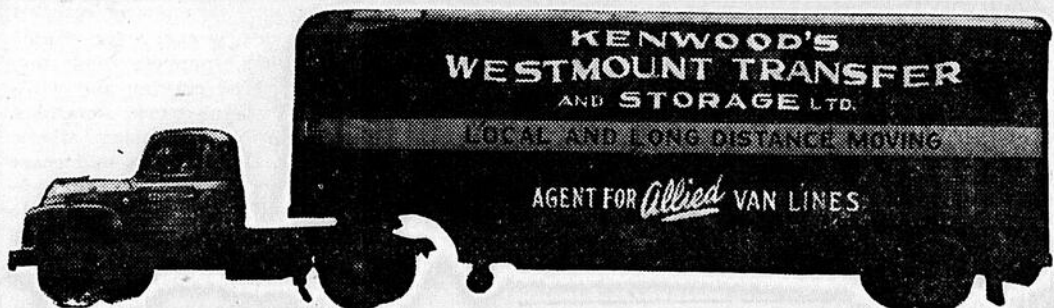

Your Child,
and You

ART AND THE ELEMENTARY SCHOOL (Part III)

Through the elementary school the children create, with ideas, desires and attitudes tactfully stimulated and guided by the teacher. Sooner or later the children will come to realize their limitations. They will need help in seeing, help in drawing, help in manipulating colours, help in the spatial arrangement of shapes and objects, help in the handling of tools and materials. This is the time for instruction; not as a class, not at any specific time or year, but as the children themselves feel the need, and request it. Even then, the teacher should give just the minimum of assistance to overcome the immediate difficulty, and only after the child has tried, and become aware of his difficulty. Gradually, and individually, the teacher will guide the pupils towards the recognition of satisfying arrangement, unity, variety, colour harmony, colour suitability, and underlying rhythms. Gradually, the children will come to recognize functional appropriateness, good taste and the weakness of over-decoration. Rules and laws, didactic instruction and required assignments are out of place in the Art program. Expression pre-supposes intense interest, and without the vital desire to say something there is no art.

As the child progresses through the school, new fields should be constantly opening to him. New modes of expression should become available, introduced to him as his powers of concentration expand and his mechanical ability develops. Use may be made of co-operative murals, scenery for drama presentations, puppets and marionettes, wood carving and whittling and metal work, ceramics, block printing and many others. Gradually, the stimulus will cease to be the activities of the individual child, and will widen to include the school, community and nation. Children, as they develop, will show deviations in their preferences for media and modes of expression, and this should be regarded as entirely normal and allowable. We are interested in the whole development of a child as a personality, and not in the least whether he has received instruction in drawing, painting and modelling. Some children will evince a distinct preference for non-objective pattern and picture-making, or even paper sculpture,

which may, or may not develop later into a preference for abstract expression, while others will remain substantially objective in their approach; it matters not at all to the teacher so long as each child has complete freedom of thought, mode and medium of expression, and sustains a vital interest in his small but expanding world.

By the time the pupil reaches adolescence he will have an almost instinctive recognition of the qualities of good art, whether it be painting, sculpture or kitchen fittings, though he would be sorely tried to express these qualities in words, and on such a foundation the cultural development of the new generation can be guided with confidence in its permanence and approval of its stability.

Spiritual Obligations Of Lay Persons Are Outlined To Xavier

Children's Tantrums Subject of Lecture

Speaking at the Japanese Citizen's Assn. on Friday evening, Sigrid Day, of the Mental Hygiene Institute, a Red Feather Service, said that fears and tantrums in children continuing beyond the age and stage at which such behaviour is normal, can be compared with fever in infectious diseases. They are symptoms indicating emotional pressures and are also methods of fighting the pressures for the purpose of maintaining equilibrium.

Treatment does not lie in trying to curb the symptom, but should be aimed at assessing the pressures and dealing with them. Often effective treatment is achieved in the home, when the child's feeling of worth is built up, by a modified parental approach.

However, professional help may be needed and should be sought if their symptoms continue. It is true that children eventually outgrow many problems, but unnecessary scars and weak spots may remain. The film "Preface to a Life" was shown to illustrate certain points raised in the discussion.

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More Women In Uniform Needed For Defence By RCAF Reserve

The many young airwomen you see in uniform today, may not have an opportunity to wing their way across the skies in Sabre Jets or CF-100 Canucks, but nevertheless, the jobs they fill in the ranks of the R.C.A.F. are just as vital in helping in the gigantic task of making Canada's air defences strong. They are critically needed to man plotting boards at radar stations, to punch typewriters, drive trucks, duties that will release airmen for pack parachutes and fulfill other operational responsibilities.

In the R.C.A.F. Auxiliary particularly, young women are vitally needed for operational training as fighter control operators. In fact the largest percentage of part-time airwomen are being recruited for these duties in reserve operational training units such as 2401 Aircraft Control and Warning Unit at 20 Laurier Avenue, West, in Montreal. At this busy station in the heart of the city, young women are being trained two evenings each week to react with quiet efficiency in emergency, to trace and plot the approach of hostile aircraft and pass this important information along to fighter control officers, who in turn relay it to the fighter squadrons in the area.

These airwomen become an integral part of the whole procedure of spotting, identification, interception and "kill," and even under synthetic training conditions manage to feel the excitement of action.

In a training unit, such as 2401 Aircraft Control and Warning Unit, a great number of girls are continually needed to work on the radar screens, the tote boards and plotting tables. Their presence is vital in the overall training picture, since they are needed to undertake special duties, which, if they are not performed will hinder the training plan of Fighter Control Officers who form the basic strength in Canada's defence warning system.

Squadron Leader J. L. Bourke, the Commanding Officer of 2401 AC & WU stated this week, that until more airwomen were recruited in his unit it would be difficult to take more officers into the unit to train for this important task of Fighter Controller.

S/L Bourke stated that recruiting officers would be in attendance every Wednesday between 8 and 10 p.m. at the Unit Headquarters at 20 Laurier Avenue, West. He stated further that the young ladies who were interested in spending two nights each week assisting in Canada's defence effort would receive equal pay and equal privileges as airmen. There are many other interests for trainees, entertainment dances, occasional flights in RCAF Aircraft, and week-end operational training tours with the regular force.

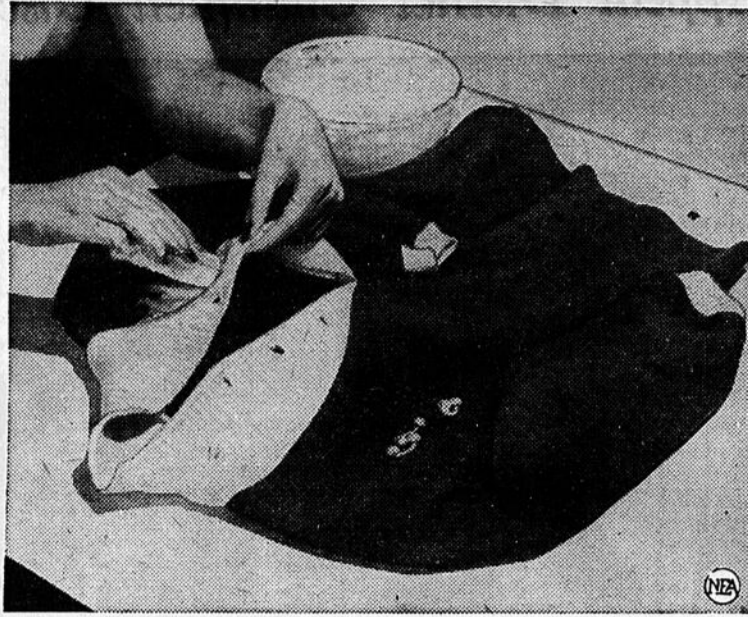

Bedrooms For The Youngsters

Does the decorative scheme in your children's rooms look like your idea or their idea of a child's room? You know what the answer to this question should be. It should be full of colours and designs that they would choose and with which they would be happy to live.

Recently studies have been completed on colour preferences shown in youngsters and adults. The results are that at the age of six months the baby can distinguish primary colours but not till the age of two years will a child show any particular colour preferences. Then at the age of two the favorites are red and yellow. With age the child will develop more of a liking for blues, greens and violets.

This suggests that a baby's room might well be decorated with primary colours so that when they attain the age of six months they can distinguish the colours and designs which surround them. Then at the age of two years you can ask them about the colours and designs they would prefer in their rooms.

Now don't be horrified when they ask for strong raw colours and want two or three large dominant patterns in their rooms. Remember, they see the rooms a great deal more than you do, therefore it should please them. Similarly, as they grew older decorate the rooms to please their tastes . . . they may not be what you consider "refined" tastes, but if they please them at the moment that is the important consideration.

A very wise mother who recently consulted me about a bright colourful wallpaper pattern for her child's room accepted my choice and took a piece home to try. She showed such a lack of enthusiasm when we gave her the sample that we felt it was a wrong choice. But a week later she called and exclaimed most enthusiastically that the wallpaper was just right, they all liked it and she would like to order it. Then she explained her lack of interest in the design when she first saw it. "I fell in love with it when you first showed it to me but didn't want to say anything till my child saw and approved of it. He was thrilled and delighted with the bright colours and loved those nursery rhyme figures". She was a very wise mother to leave the decision to her child.

It is good for youngsters to make decisions and to take an interest in their home surroundings. I am sure your children will take great delight in choosing patterns and colours for their rooms.

new coins.....old chaos

We were handed a silver dollar the other day — one of those bright new ones with our Queen's head on it. It made us think how, nowadays, we take our money for granted. Perhaps we feel it isn't going to stay around long enough to matter.

Even 100 years ago, though, we might have watched our coins more closely. For coinage in Canada was in chaos. There was Sterling; there was the decimal system we know now; there were "York Shillings" and "Halifax Dollars" — and quite a few more.

Still, in spite of variety, there wasn't enough coinage to go around for the country's business. That was the day, therefore, when Molson's issued their own "token" bills and coins with which, for instance, they bought barley. These interesting bits of currency carried symbols of the brewing process. They're collectors' items today.

By 1858 the Province of Canada (Ontario and Quebec) had adopted decimal currency — though in the early 60's Bonsecour Market prices were still quoted in shillings and pence.

Molson's ceased issuing their token coins years ago. But it is pleasantly reassuring to reflect that other Molson's production continued — for the refreshment and enjoyment of succeeding generations of Canadians.

"I'd venture a guess, Chef: it's because they have not been over-successful in preparing veal. It may have turned out to be dry and flat in taste, and so they don't care for it."

France's Favorite Meat

"I protest, Madame, against this indignity to the favorite meat of France. With your permission, I would like to address the ladies on this important subject.

"Mesdames: Veal comes from the young calf. It is a very tender meat, without much fat, and it is not old enough to have acquired much flavor. It should be thoroughly cooked.

"To prepare it successfully, extra fat must be used and plenty of seasoning. The French home-makers use a choice of marjoram, thyme, fresh tarragon, lemon juice or onions with veal. In roasting or broiling, they use plenty of butter, and serve with a tasty sauce. With a casserole or ragout, they may add soured cream to the gravy. Sometimes they combine veal with ham or smoked bacon.

"Cooked any of these ways, veal is tasty, tender and satisfying."

Banana Marlow

Cut 15 marshmallows into 4 pieces each. Add to ½ cup water and heat in a double-boiler until melted. Then add the juice ½ lemon and ¾ cup mashed peeled banana. Cool. Fold into ½ pint heavy cream or undiluted evaporated milk whipped stiff. Transfer to a refrigerator tray or food-freezer and freeze until firm, from 2 to 4 hours.

Whipped Evaporated Milk

Evaporated milk is made from plain fresh milk from which nearly 50 per cent of the water has been evaporated. It is because of this high protein (casein) and cream (butter fat) content that evaporated milk can be whipped, and generally used in place of whipped cream in making frozen or "cream gel" desserts.

To whip: Add 2 teaspoons lemon juice to each ½ cup well-chilled evaporated milk. Beat until thickened. Add 2 tablespoons sugar, one at a time, and a few grains salt; continue beating until the whipped milk stands up in points. Use at once.

Wheelchair Wonders Seek Funds For Overseas Trip

Wanted — Five Thousand dollars!

Next Monday night, the Montreal Basketball League's annual all-star game will be played before a capacity house at the Mont St. Louis court as the nightcap to a double bill, featuring the Wheelchair Wonders. All proceeds of the evening will go toward swelling the fund of \$5,000 needed by the paraplegic team in order that it may take part in "Disabled Persons' Olympics" to be held in England, starting July 25.

This Disabled Persons' Olympics is indeed well named as it is truly Olympic competition of the highest order. In it, wheelchair people of many different nations take part in a varied program of athletics in realistic Olympic style, not only as a means of acquainting the world with the independence and resourcefulness attained by the disabled today, but, what is most important, enabling them to regain some of the keen sense of rivalry and competition, which is part and parcel of athletic contests, and which seemed lost to them when their particular affliction struck.

First For Canada

This year marks the third annual meet which is held at the Stoke Mandeville Rehabilitation hospital at Aylesbury in Buckinghamshire, just south of London. However, this is the first time a Canadian team has been invited to attend. The Montreal Wonders will represent all of Canada at the event. Reason for this is that the only other organized wheelchair teams are in Toronto and Vancouver, though neither have been in action for more than a year. The local team was founded two years ago this coming fall.

Started Group

Co-organizer of paraplegic basketball in Montreal and defence star on the squad is Harry Ward, of 4807 Westmore avenue, who doubles also on the executive of the Quebec branch of the Canadian Paraplegic Association, with headquarters in the Queen Mary Veteran's Hospital.
