SEVERAL MINERS WERE KILLED AT DORTMUND

Member For Brome To Vote For Progressive Amendment

Dortmund Scene Of Riots--Crowd Attacks Police

Several Miners Have Been Killed and Others Wounded in a Conflict with Police—Police in Endeavoring to Disperse Crowd of Miners Holding Demonstration, Shot into Crowd, Killing Several Persons and Wounding Many Others—Angered Crowds Attacked Police, of Whom Many Were Wounded—Similar Demonstrations Held at Schanhorst Mine Nearby, Where Several Workmen Were Killed and Others Wounded by Police.

DUSSELDORF, May 23.—Rioting is in progress today in the Dortmund district. Several miners have been killed and others wounded in a conflict with the police.

According to reports received at French headquarters here, 30,000 striking miners held a demonstration in the square in Dortmund. The Dortmund police in endeavoring to disperse the gathering fired several shots into the crowd, killing several persons and wounding many others.

The angered crowds attacked the police of whom many were wounded. Similar demonstrations occurred at the Schanhorst Mine nearby, where several workmen were killed and others wounded by the police.

The miners' strike was brought about by Communist agitators on demands for higher wages, and they are now reported to be trying to effect a general strike throughout the Dortmund area affecting 200,000 workers.

STATED ORDER HAS BEEN RESTORED AT DORTMUND

BERLIN, May 23.—Sharp fighting between police and Communists occurred at Dortmund last evening. The Communists, after a meeting, formed a procession and attacked the police station. Police reinforcements were greeted by pistol fire and four of the officers were wounded. The attacking force suffered casualties, but the exact number is unknown. Order has been restored.

BANDITS HAVE NOT CARRIED OUT THREATS

Reported that Foreigners Held by Chinese Outlaws Have Not Been Put to Death.

SHANGHAI, May 23.—Relief workers at Tsaochow, the nearest point to the stronghold of the Szechow train bandits, today reported the arrival of messengers from the bandits' mountain retreat with the information that the outlaws had not carried out their death threats against the foreign captives. The prisoners, it was stated, are in good health, except G. D. Musso, the Italian lawyer of Shanghai, who has been ill for a number of days.

CLAIMS LIQUOR BIGGEST SINGLE BUSINESS TODAY IN THE UNITED STATES

Stated There Is Not a Flat Building in Chicago that Does Not House at Least One Representative of Liquor Industry.

CHICAGO, May 23.—There is not a flat building in Chicago that does not house at least one representative of liquor industry, the Chicago Daily News charged yesterday in a story in which it asserted that liquor is the biggest single business, legitimate or otherwise, in the United States today.

Every apartment building in the city has at least one tenant, and in many cases, all are buyers or sellers of liquor, it asserted.

THE WEATHER

FINE AND COOL

Break with Soviets Is Expected

Soviet Official Expected to Present Moscow's Latest Decision to British Foreign Minister Today.

(Associated Press Despatch)
LONDON, May 23.—Whether the Anglo-Russian trade agreement has weathered the storm aroused by the British ultimatum to the Soviets is expected to be known today when Leonid Krassin hands the note containing Moscow's latest decision to the British Foreign Minister.

There is a general feeling in London that unless the Bolsheviks make an eleven-hour concession to Lord Curzon's demands, a rupture is unavoidable.

DECLARED A HOSTILE ACT

(Associated Press Despatch)
RIGA, May 23.—A despatch received here from Moscow says the Izvestia declares that the visit of the Earl of Ypres to Bessarabia is a hostile act toward Russia and a violation of the Russo-British trade agreement.

The above despatch is the first intimation that the Earl of Ypres, who as Field Marshal French was commander of the British Army in the field for a time during the late war and later was Lord Lieutenant of Ireland, had intended visiting Bessarabia.

SWISS REPLY TO RUSSIA'S NOTE

(Associated Press Despatch)
BERNE, May 23.—Terminating Soviet Russia's note on the Vorovsky assassination "audacious and arrogant," the Swiss reply says that it would have remained unanswered but for the possibility that silence on Switzerland's part might be misconstrued. After full consideration, the reply declares, Switzerland finds "nothing for which to reproach herself."

The Swiss Government disclaims responsibility for the assassination of Vorovsky, pointing out that the Near East Conference specifically notified the Government that Vorovsky was not participating, as the Russian delegation was not accredited, further that Vorovsky did not ask for police protection, although he was nevertheless discreetly guarded.

WARNING REGARDING ICEBERGS

NEW YORK, May 23.—Warning that large icebergs have floated directly in the path of trans-Atlantic steamship routes and that the drifts were farther south than for several years, was received in a radio message from the coastguard cutter Tampa last night.

Suggested That Movement Of Allied War Ships Towards Dardanelles Is Connected With Landing Of Turk Troops At Bulair

Threats of Fresh Trouble in Near East Attracting Considerable Attention in London Official Circles—The Daily Telegraph's Correspondent Says "Budding Turkish Menace Cannot Be Dismissed as Bluff."

LONDON, May 23.—Threats of fresh trouble in the Near East are attracting attention here. Referring to the reported wrecking of the bridge across the Maritza River, connecting Adrianople and Karagatch, the Daily Telegraph's diplomatic correspondent says that although the railway bridge has not yet been damaged, it is in danger, and recalls that the Turks are known to have mined it.

The Maritza explosion, says the writer, is merely an incident. He adds: "It coincides curiously enough, with the landing of troops in flagrant violation of the Mudania convention at or near the Isthmus of Bulair, which joins the Gallipoli Peninsula to the mainland. This is regarded with far greater seriousness in British circles than what has been happening near Adrianople, for it aims at the cutting of overland communication between the Allied garrisons at the Dardanelles and Constantinople. This already awkward position will be aggravated if the Maritza river bridges, made it impossible for the Greek army to re-enter Thrace without grave delay in the event of the Allies being suddenly attacked at Constantinople.

"The budding Turkish menace cannot be dismissed as bluff, and there is some realization in competent quarters that it must be promptly dealt with."

It is suggested that the reported movement of Allied Mediterranean ships of war towards the Dardanelles is connected with the Bulair landing, but there is no official confirmation of this.

Newspapers State Appointment Of Stanley Baldwin As Prime Minister Of Britain Is In Accordance With The Popular Wishes

No Incoming Premier Could Wish for Better Reception from Press Than That Accorded Stanley Baldwin—Comments of Labor and Liberal Newspapers Are Influenced, of Course, by Political Considerations, But None Has a Word Against Mr. Baldwin Personally.

GREAT BRITAIN'S NEW PRIME MINISTER

Stanley Baldwin was born August 3, 1867, son of the late Alfred Baldwin, M.P. In 1892 he married Lucy, the daughter of the late E. J. Ridsdale, of Rottingdean. They have two sons and four daughters. After having been educated at Harrow and Trinity College, Cambridge, where he showed proficiency in mathematics and political economy, he contested Kidderminster in 1906, and was defeated. Aside from a business career he had always received some in politics, as a member of the Worcestershire county council. Two years later he tried again. This time at a by-election in the Bewdley division of Worcestershire, a vacancy caused by the death of his father. Here he was successful.

For nearly ten years he attracted little attention. In fact, business affairs principally absorbed him. Then he acted as a parliamentary private secretary to the man he has now succeeded in the premiership, and early in 1917 he was appointed junior Lord of the Treasury. In the following summer he was invited to become financial secretary to the Treasury, as Sir Hardman Love had retired to stay in America, and the Chancellor of the Exchequer (then Mr. Bonar Law) in his budget speech paid a warm tribute to the assistance he had received from the member for the Bewdley division, whose speeches showed "that he possessed much financial ability and a special capacity for dealing with figures."

Some of the newspapers. Mr. Chamberlain, who has been on a vacation in Southern France, and who is expected to stay there several days longer, has suddenly departed and is reported to be returning here today.

LORD CURZON'S PLANS NOT KNOWN

The one lost sheep whom the Tories seem more than willing to leave in the wilderness is Lord Birkenhead. His bitter tongue has made enemies for him and the newspapers think there is little likelihood that Mr. Baldwin will offer him any government post.

It is still unknown whether Lord Curzon has agreed to retain his place as Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs. The Conservative press offers him its hearty sympathy for his failure to attain the position which would surely have been his except for the exigencies of the time, which seem to demand that the premier be a member of the House of Commons.

CONTRIBUTED ONE-FOURTH OF HIS FORTUNE

A. R. McMASTER DECLARES THAT HE WILL OPPOSE THE BUDGET BECAUSE HE BELIEVES THAT IT IS PROTECTIVE

Member for Brome Announced in House Last Night that He Intended to Vote for the Progressive Amendment, and that When the House Resumed He Proposed to Take His Seat at "the Place Which in This House Is the Nearest Approach to the Cross-Benches"—Debate on the Hudson Bay Railway Route Was Adjourned After Discussion in the Senate.

OTTAWA, May 23.—From the oldrums, House of Commons debate on the budget swung yesterday into the spotlight. Public galleries were packed. On the floor rows of members of all parties filled places which for the past few days had been largely empty.

Right Hon. Arthur Meighen, leader of the Opposition, first held the floor. He sharply charged the Government with having relieved taxes on luxuries and added taxation on necessities, "in direct and brazen violation of the pledge they made to the people of this country." "Now they flout," Mr. Meighen proceeded, referring to the Liberal tariff platform of 1919, "not without authority, not through a mere backbencher, but through the mouth of the Minister of Finance, who is in charge of the policy, they flout on the allegiance to their commitments of only four years ago."

The Minister of Finance, Mr. Meighen added, said he was not bound by the commitments, that his Government was not bound by them because he did not vote for them at the Liberal convention.

"The Minister of Finance," continued Mr. Meighen, "has done no credit to the politics of Canada when he makes that assertion, nor has he done any credit to his own record in our public life. The Minister of Finance was a party to the present act, and took an active part in the framing of the very resolutions he now repudiates."

Mr. Meighen criticized the Government for not balancing the budget, and charged it with increasing expenditure "in all services where it took strength of character to reduce."

The Government's action in regard to tobacco during last year had resulted in a loss of \$1,327,000 to the Treasury, he said. The tariff changes in the budget were criticized, and Mr. Meighen once more declared his faith in a policy of moderate protection for Canada. Living in a world every country of which was protected, it would be madness for Canada to march ahead of them all toward free trade.

HON. MACLEAN REPLIES TO OPPOSITION LEADER

Hon. A. K. MacLean, Liberal member for Halifax, who followed, held that criticism of the Government because of its failure immediately to put the 1919 platform into force was unfair. A Government must to a great extent be guided by conditions. He suggested that operation of the Canadian Government merchant marine be discontinued. Thus, he claimed, there would be a saving of nine million dollars a year.

Spirit Of Hawk Chief Fled From Editor When Latter Seized Warrior's Trumpet

Seance Conducted by Scientific American Turned Out to Be a Lively Gathering—So-Called Spirit Retired Before Cynicism of Editor-in-Chief and Would Not Reappear—Further Investigations to Be Conducted.

NEW YORK, May 23.—A seance conducted by the Scientific American last night nearly broke up when one of the sitters grabbed at the hand of a "spirit" that was waving a trumpet about in the air, and so startled the "spirit" that in pulling away he whanged the editor-in-chief of the magazine over the head with his trumpet and nearly broke his glasses. There was quite a noise and rumpus, and when it quieted down the "spirit" had fled in a fit of pique and would not come back all evening.

It was the second of two seances held on successive evenings in the offices of the magazine at the Woolworth Building, in carrying out the conditions of the \$5,000 in prizes which were offered by the Scientific American for any authentic psychic phenomena. It was a decidedly lively affair, but as to the genuineness of it, none of the judges present would commit themselves. They will hold other seances with the same two mediums under test conditions, at which electrical and other apparatus will be used to check every movement in the room. The mediums were George Valentine, of Wilkes-Barre, Pa.

The first night's seances did not disclose much, perhaps because the famous Dr. Walter F. Prince, of the Psychic Research Society, and Dr. Carrington, of the American Psychological Institute, were present. Last night both Dr. Prince and Dr. Carrington were absent, although the latter sent a substitute, Frederick Keating, who has investigated mediums with him. Others in the circle were J. Malcolm Bird, associate editor of the Scientific American, and chairman of the investigating committee; J. B. Walker, editor-in-chief of the magazine; A. C. Lescarboura, managing editor, and a reporter from the Times.

When the lights were turned off a voice came. It was that of Hawk Chief, an Indian spirit. He stayed and talked a while; said he was glad to be there, and manipulated the trumpet quite a bit. He went about the circle, hitting people with the trumpet, and all went well till he came to where Mr. Keating sat. Keating, being a cynic, reached out and grabbed. He got a hand about the trumpet, and as the hand was yanked away, the voice of "Hawk Chief" burst out excitedly: "Don't do that."

There was another bang, an exclamation from "Hawk Chief," and the trumpet dropped to the floor with a clatter.

This broke up the psychic atmosphere for a while, and it was necessary to sing a hymn to get it back, but there was no answer from "Hawk Chief." He was off the seance for good.

QUESTIONS MR. McMASTER'S STAND

He spoke from his old place to the right side of the Speaker, but declared his intention, when next he sat to the House, "to sit where it is nearest the approach that we have to the cross benches." He would vote for the Progressive amendment and against the budget.

"I am a Liberal," Mr. McMaster added, "and I was never more a Liberal than I am tonight."

Why did he vote against the budget? "Because I believe," he said, "that it is not a Liberal budget. It is a protectionist budget with a strong Maritime Provincial flavor."

RUNAWAY CAR CAUSED A GREAT DEAL OF DAMAGE

Street Car Got Away from Motor-man in Front of Hospital and Ended Mad Career as It Struck House on King Street.

A stove-in street car, a smashed wagon, a broken telegraph pole, a cut-up lawn and a damaged verandah are the results of the wild career of a runaway street car this morning, which rushed uncontrolled along Park avenue and across King street east, crashing into the house of Mr. R. G. Milford, situated at the corner of King street east and Second avenue. No one was hurt, although one man barely escaped being seriously injured when the car struck the rear of the heavy wagon in which he was riding.

The car, No. 17, running on the Portland-Park route, commenced its career in front of the Sherbrooke Hospital as the motorman was outside changing the trolley for the return trip. The car began to move while the motorman was at the rear, and he was unable to get into it before it got away from him.

The car, unoccupied, picked up speed rapidly and rushed down the hill past the Exhibition grounds at a terrific rate. It ascended the opposite grade with little slackening of speed. As it reached the corner of King street east it left the rails at a switch, and instead of turning the corner, careered across the street, and after smashing into the rear of a heavy wagon belonging to the E.T.A.A., struck a telephone pole, snapping it off at the ground. The car then ploughed across the lawn on the property of Mr. R. G. Milford and came to a stop as it struck his verandah, which it damaged considerably.

The whole front of the car was smashed, and the trolley had been torn off as it struck cross wires during its course.

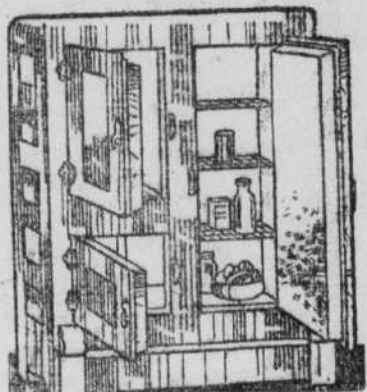

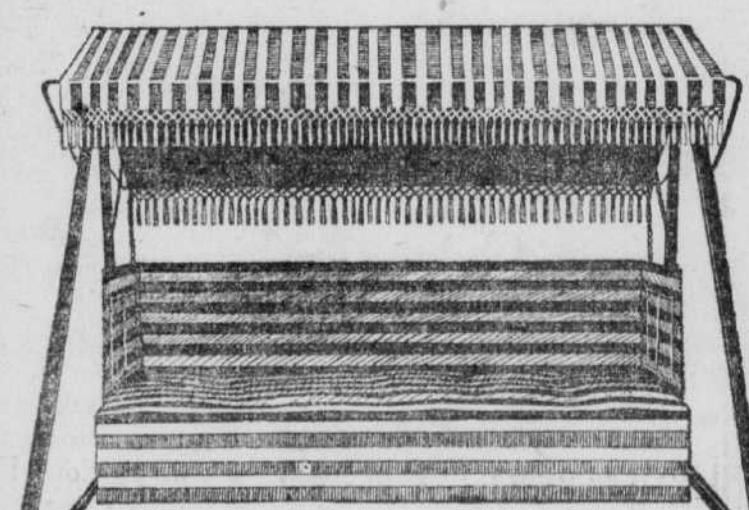

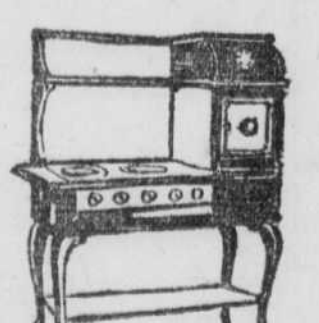

CHORAL SOCIETY SUCCESSFUL IN 'THE CREATION'

Fine Rendition of Haydn's Great Work Was Heard—Montreal Soloists Made Good Impression.

The Choral Art Society of Sherbrooke and Lennoxville made its premier bow to the public last night, and although it is still youthful in days, the Society gave a performance worthy of a veteran organization, well tried by time and rich in experience. From the opening chorus, success was assured, and with the able assistance of the three soloists from Montreal, an excellent interpretation of an intricate masterpiece was rendered.

When the Society came into existence a few months ago, it was rather a problem to choose a suitable work, which would offer plenty of opportunities for the chorus, presenting at the same time difficulties not too great to be overcome. When it was finally decided to sing Haydn's "Creation," there was an element of scepticism present in certain circles, because the Austrian musician's great composition is complicated, intricate and requires a delicate interpretation to produce the specific effects. Although Haydn was a tottering and feeble old man, when he wrote "The Creation," he still had great mastery and force over his subject and the whole work vibrates with power and shows all the qualities of clearness and symmetry. The Austrian, moreover, was a wonderful hand of descriptive music. By his perfect control over the notes, he could call up visions from the vast deep, creating beautiful mental pictures through the combination of sounds. In the story of the beginnings of the world, Haydn found plenty of opportunities for this type of music and he clearly demonstrates his power from the opening depiction of chaos to the closing chorus after the creation of Adam and Eve.

In consequence it is easily seen that a satisfactory rendition of "The Creation" is a difficult thing, but the Society, carefully trained and skilfully conducted by Mr. R. Havard, successfully accomplished the task which was set before them. The chorus, consisting of about eighty voices, was well balanced and worked together with a smoothness and finish that was delightful to listen to. The same was true, either in unison or in part, and the singers at all times showed a vigor of attack and ability of co-ordination. It would be a difficult thing to pronounce judgment, if one was asked to pick out the most impressive chorus in the composition, for Haydn kept his work at a very consistent level. Those in the first part, telling of the early days of creation, are particularly fine, for they vary from the fury of chaos to the placidity of pastoral description. The chorus accompaniment, in the third part, to the duet, "By thee with bliss," was another outstanding achievement and the final chorus, with its wonderful range of power, carrying the listeners along with its irresistible force, was a magnificent conclusion to an impression.

The Soloists.

The soloists for the evening were Miss Mary Maciver, soprano; Mr. Gerard, tenor; and Mr. Germain LeFebvre, bass; all of Montreal. These three artists had a very heavy part to fill but they all demonstrated that they are capable musicians.

Miss Maciver has a delightful voice, clear, pure and ever accurate. She has a wide range and though her voice is richer in the lower registers, it is only slightly less pleasing when the ventures into the higher. Her interpretation was keenly sympathetic throughout and she rendered her selections with a dramatic simplicity that thoroughly pleased the audience. Her rendition of "On Mighty Wings Uplifted Soars," was one of her best bits of work but individual opinion may differ in this.

Mr. LeFebvre sings with all the fervor and dramatic intensity of the Gallic race and he has a deep, rich voice which never jars or grates with harshness and which has good range and is under excellent control. His recitative portions, to descriptive accompaniments, were outstanding and he showed himself to be in harmony with the immortal thoughts of the eighteenth century composer.

In the air, "In Native Worth," Mr. Poisson was at his best and he created an exceptionally favorable impression in this piece. Mr. Poisson's voice is not always crystal clear but it never branches off into inaccuracies and is always at the singer's command. This tenor has plenty of power and force and showed that he has had abundance of experience.

It was an unfortunate fact, but nevertheless true, that Mr. Poisson and Mr. Gerard both had, at times, slight difficulty with their pronunciation, their Gallic tongues refusing to handle portions of the Anglo-Saxon vocabulary. This, however, did not detract from their musical abilities which were consistently pleasing throughout.

The three soloists were called upon to sing together in several portions of the composition and they accomplished this in perfect harmony and synthetic rendition.

Fine Accompaniments.

The playing of Mr. Roy Kendall, L.R.A.M., as organist, was especially noteworthy and it is the opinion of many that he has never been more successful in his work since his arrival in Sherbrooke. Throughout the whole evening he was perfect master of his instrument and he brilliantly rendered the most difficult selections. His accompaniment to the parts describing the coming forth of the "living creation" after his kind, cattle and living thing" produced a specific effect that beggars description, says

VICTORIA DAY.

Tomorrow morning will be ushered in with the roar of cannon crackers. Sky-rockets, with their brilliant tails of flashing lights, will bid the day farewell. Business houses will be closed and men will enjoy a holiday. The nation will don its festive garb and rejoice. And all this outward show is for what? Nominally it is a nation doing honor to the name of a great and noble queen, who is dead and gone these past twenty-two years. Actually it is a nation doing what we know not what, for how many of us on the morrow will actually bear the name of Victoria in our hearts? How many of us even know or care to know of the acts and deeds of one of Great Britain's most democratic monarchs?

Thus we deem it a wise thing to quickly cast our gaze backwards and catch at least a fleeting glimpse of a great reign that is no more and of a wonderful age that is past.

Victoria, late Queen of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland and Empress of India, only child of Edward, Duke of Kent, was born in Kensington Palace on May 24th, 1819. She was a niece of William IV. and on the death of her uncle, June 20th, 1837, the girl of eighteen became the head of the world's greatest nation. But she did not shrink from her task and during the next sixty-four years she labored consistently for the good of her people and for the benefit of the Empire. It is said that "no former monarch so thoroughly comprehended the great truth, that the powers of the crown are held in trust for the people, and are the means and not the end of government." The statement without a shadow of doubt contains a vast element of truth, for before her death Victoria had become the beloved of her subjects and was honored and esteemed throughout all the nations of the world.

But Victoria had to guide the nation not only through times of peace but also through times of strife and war. The days of the Crimean War, the Indian Mutiny and the Boer War were filled with anxiety and doubt, but the prestige of the Queen never wavered and throughout her whole life she showed herself to be blessed with wisdom, kindness, clemency, sound judgment, and all those qualities that are essential to true womanhood and to the successful ruler of nations.

The so-called Victorian Era is often frowned upon by pessimistic moderns as an age of prudery, stiff conventionalities and snug self-concentration. However, in spite of these terrific criticisms no one can deny that it was an age which was productive of great social reform; it was an age which gave birth to Disraeli and Gladstone; it was an age which brought forth a Dickens and a Thackeray; and it was an age of general art, culture and prosperity.

It was a great era, ruled over by a great Queen and it is in remembrance of her that the nation celebrates tomorrow.

EMPIRE DAY.

Although it is not generally observed throughout the Dominion, today, May 23rd, is Empire Day. It is the one day of the year which is dedicated to the British Empire, with its glorious past and its magnificent present. It is at least one day on which we should remember the deeds of those who have gone before us; the actions of those who have built a massive nation from the Little Island; the accomplishments of those who in their separate realms of labor have added glory and honor to the name of Britain. But when we start to speak of the Mother Land, the Empire or the nation, there is always a latent and treacherous possibility of bursting out into a cheap jingoism, a blatant, empty boasting. We are liable to spin a tale "full of sound and fury, signifying nothing." Nothing could be more disastrous than that.

And so the first thing to admit is that the Empire and the British in general have made mistakes, for we are all human and consequently not infallible. But the blunders have been offset by the successes, and if the past one thousand years were placed before our eyes we would be hushed with awe and would be overcome with the enormity of what has gone before. But the best we can do is to catch a cursory glance here and there, to look at history in small sections or skeleton outlines. And so when we look through a history of the Empire we see the gradual and consistent growth from a small island race of semi-barbarians, with their many dialects and their petty feuds, to the present Empire that stretches from the Occident to the Orient and from pole to pole. The first signs of welding are found when the islanders began to develop a more or less uniform language and, from the age of Chaucer down, the growth of national politics, culture and unity was rapid. The era of Elizabeth appeared, with its statesmen, its courtiers, its wonderful poets and dramatists. And with it came expansion, for the spirit of adventure pervaded the air and soldiers were bold and seamen reckless.

So with expansion, we find an Empire in the embryo. Gradually lands are added abroad; colonies are established and unity is established at home. By 1801, the king is the King of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, and several decades afterwards he is also the Emperor of India. Today the limit of growth is about reached but the welding is still in process. The war brought forth magnificent proof of the faithfulness of the colonies to the Mother Country and it served to make the links firmer than before. Today co-operation and mutual support within the Empire is a prime necessity, if success is to be attained. Britain perhaps holds the key position in the League of Nations. She is one of the central cogs in that unhappy European machine and her statesmen are trying to unite the Gordian knot of the world's troubles.

The task is a mighty one but a solution will be reached if we maintain a spirit of solidarity, if we remember and exhibit that spirit of boldness and perseverance of those who are no more, our ancestors of over a thousand years.

VALUATION OF PROPERTY.

The discussion in the City Council this week indicated that the valuation question is still a controversial one in that body. A couple of years ago the scandal of property valuation methods in the city became such that ratepayers demanded that some more systematic method should be evolved. The hit and miss valuations had resulted in inequalities throughout the city. Some valuations were excessive and some far below the mark. The roll was a guess-work product. Citizens were indignant and demanded a change.

As a result a scheme, known as the Newton plan, borrowed from advanced cities and adapted to the Sherbrooke situation, has been worked out. The Council made an appropriation to cover the preliminary work in

this connection. Details of all properties have been listed, cards provided for each, and the plan brought to the point where it can be put into immediate effect.

The only purpose is to produce equitable and just valuations of land and improvements in place of the present haphazard system.

In spite of this a proposal is made to appoint valuers to proceed with the valuation of property on the old plan.

Action has been deferred but no doubt a decision must be reached very shortly. Surely, the Council does not propose to perpetuate the oft condemned valuation methods of the past.

This matter is one of greatest importance and it is the duty of the Council to protect the citizens against the injustices which have been perpetrated through the valuation rolls in the past.

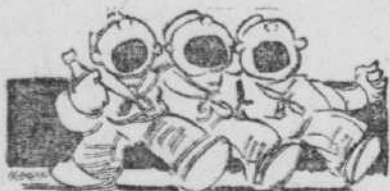

HANDS ACROSS THE BARRIER.

(Chicago Tribune.)

A new relationship between the United States and Canada, of tremendous potential benefit to both countries, is suggested in the speech of W.S. Fielding, Canadian Minister of Finance, on the occasion of the presentation of his annual budget. Mr. Fielding announces that Canada is ready to enact a treaty of reciprocity with the United States whenever we are ready.

Such a statement makes the first diplomatic steps necessary to a sound business arrangement. It remains, of course, for Washington authorities to acknowledge the desirability and to negotiate details. But ultimately the decision rests in the thought of the inhabitant's daughter finding a place in a New England textile mill, in the mind of the Grand Banks fisherman seeking opportunity and success in Boston, in the opinion of the Nebraska farmer who sells his costly land to buy cheap acreage in Saskatchewan, in the Chicago sportsman whipping Canadian trout streams, and in the Montreal or Winnipeg social lights parading Michigan boulevard or Fifth Avenue.

Those are the persons who are bringing the thought and mutual interest of Canada and the United States together. Such are the associations which are spreading the belief that, however definite our political boundaries may be, the two countries are properly an economic unit. To place an economic barrier along the lines of political demarcation is an arbitrary interference with the natural course of trade on this continent. It can hardly be more justified than would be the erection of such barriers around the Mississippi valley.

APPARENT CURE FOR CANCER IS AGAIN CLAIMED

Stated that Dr. Bell, of Liverpool University, Has Treated Satisfactorily More Than Fifty Cases.

(Associated Press Despatch)

NEW YORK, May 23.—An apparent cure for cancer, consisting of a solution of colloidal of lead, which is an enemy of diseased tissues, has been discovered by Professor Blair Bell, of Liverpool University, according to Dr. L. E. Houghney, of Concordia, Kansas, who returned today on the President Adams, after studying surgery abroad for several years.

Dr. Bell, professor of Gynaecology, has spent eighteen years in developing the cure, said Dr. Houghney who added that during the last year Dr. Bell treated more than fifty cancer cases and in none of these did the disease return.

The cure has not been made known to the world because of Dr. Bell's reticence and his desire to treat more cases before making it generally known.

RUTH BROKE UP GAME WITH SOX IN FIFTEENTH

Slammed Out a Homer With Dugan on First to Win Battle for Yanks.

(Associated Press Despatch.) NEW YORK, May 23.—The New York Yankees closed yesterday their most successful western invasion since Miller Huggins became their manager, and a great deal longer than that, and after resting today, as do other American League clubs, go to Philadelphia for a tussle tomorrow with the Athletics, their nearest rivals.

Relatively the Yankees and Athletics are about on a par as 1923 sensations, for the performances of both were wholly unexpected. Connie Mack has not had as much success in the west as had Huggins, but considering what was expected, he has accumulated as many headlines. The Athletics are advertised as the lowest priced club in the majors, and the Yankees the costliest.

With a blast that brought him within one mark of the present league leadership in his specialty, George Herman Ruth closed the

Yankees western tour by breaking up a fifteen inning duel with the Chicago White Sox by knocking the ball out of the Sox park with Joe Dugan on first. The score was 3 to 1.

It was the ninth straight win for the Yankees and gave them twelve out of thirteen games in the west. They won two from Cleveland, took three and lost one in Detroit, won for in St. Louis and three in Chicago.

Ruth now has eight home runs this year, one less than Ken Williams, of the St. Louis Browns.

The Athletics lost their second straight to Detroit, after winning the first by 4 to 3, and suffered the temporary loss of Sammy Hale, third baseman, who broke a thumb in practice.

Cleveland kept half a notch ahead of Detroit by scolding the Boston Red Sox by 3 to 2, and will be on the heels of the Athletics if they repeat in the only game in the league today.

Washington ended a fair to middling invasion by dropping the odd game of the series to St. Louis by 12 to 7, sinking below the Browns.

The Giants continued their journey through western clubs invading the east by blasting St. Louis in the first inning, winning finally by 7 to 3. The Giants now have proved their superiority over all their strong contenders at home.

Profiting by their easy picking, while the Cardinals were having the fight of their lives, Pittsburgh grabbed a stronger hold on second place by again downing the Quakers by 13 to 6. Cy Williams made his fifteenth homer of the season and now leads both leagues, but it was not enough for the Philadelphians.

Brooklyn climbed over the Reds into leadership of the season division, 3 to 2, by showing entire disrespect for Pete Donohue, the Red twirler, who led the league last year.

Had Boston beaten Chicago, instead of losing by 8 to 2, the Reds would be within half a game of seventh place.

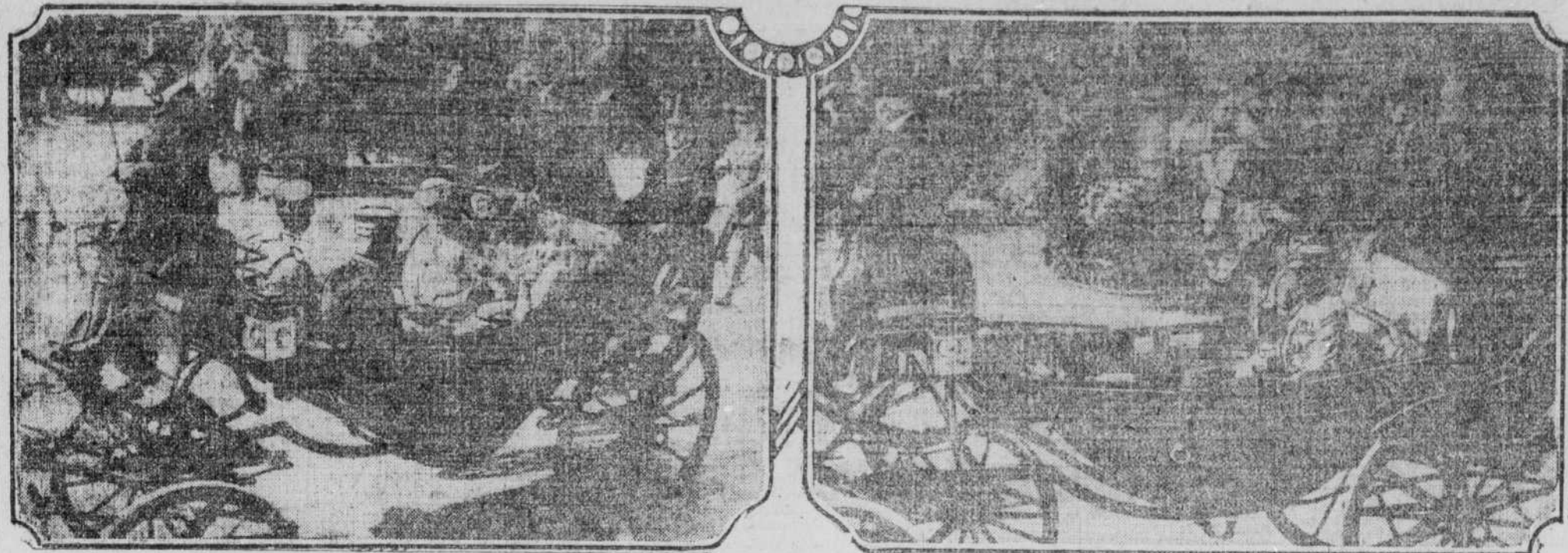

Exodus of Youth from Western Isles.

FROM homes such as the one in front of which the little group is standing, and from scenes such as that in the picture above the Canadian Pacific liners Marloach and Metagama recently carried well over six hundred of the ablest of young Hebrideans. These are not very inspiring pictures, you say? Every place is inspiring that has a home atmosphere, and those who have now joined forces with Canadian tillers of the soil in Ontario and Alberta loved these homes and associations. Bearing the common load in trial and adversity has knitted these people of the Western Isles so closely that they are each a part of the other.

For generations the Isles have been sending out their sons on colonizing enterprises, emigration scarcely ever ceasing though subject to fluctuations as surplus population in relation to means of livelihood has varied. Apart from the crofts, which are too small and unproductive to maintain the whole of the population, the Hebrideans depend on the fisheries to make their livelihood, and that industry is at present in a state of unprecedented depression owing to the loss of the German and Russian markets. It is simply the urge of poverty reinforcing the call of the blood in the young Islesmen to go adventuring that brought these folk to Canada.

They have been well received and welcomed as the most promising immigrants to Canada in years. The Ontario government assisted a number of them to pay for their passage and about half of them have contracted to work for Ontario farmers for one year before seeking lands of their own. The others have gone to Red Deer Alberta where they will form a colony and build their own school and church. These latter were accorded an outstanding reception on their arrival at Red Deer, and Mayor John Collinson, in a short address of welcome, told the newcomers that the people of his town and the surrounding district had not the least doubt but that they would be able to live in comfort if not amidst fortune.

GREAT PROGRESS MADE IN USE OF INSULIN FOR TREATMENT OF DIABETES

Treatment Has Been Most Effective—Used Now in Almost Every Part of World.

(Associated Press Despatch.)
NEW YORK, May 23.—Remarkable progress has been made during the past year in the use of insulin treatment for diabetes, and over three thousand patients in the United States alone were being helped by it, it was said yesterday by Dr. F. G. Banting, of Toronto, discoverer of the treatment, who spoke before the seventh annual convention of the New York State Medical Association. The treatment has been most effective, and its use has steadily grown until it is now employed in almost every part of the world, Dr. Banting said, but as yet it is impossible to say whether insulin supplies an absolute cure for diabetes.

THE MONTREAL CATTLE MARKET QUOTATIONS

Prices Paid for Cattle at the Montreal Stockyards—Other Details.

(Associated Press Despatch.)
MONTREAL, May 23.—(Dominion Live Stock Branch Report.)—Live stock for sale on the two markets today amounted to 50 cattle, 32 sheep and lambs, 300 hogs and 420 calves. Trading was fairly active under the small supply. The cattle consisted mostly of common and medium cows of dairy type, a few common heifers and bulls. Sales ranged from \$2 for canners to \$3.75 and \$5 for the medium cows, with one or two good cows close to \$5.75. Bulls sold from \$3.50 to \$4.25. Calf prices were a shade stronger and good calves were in fair demand. Medium to fairly good lots sold from \$5.50 to \$6, with a few at \$6.50. Common calves were from \$4.25 up. Sheep and lambs were steady. Straight lots of fairly good light sheep sold generally at \$7. Spring lambs ranged from \$5.50 to \$7, with a few of the best going at \$18 per hundred pounds. Hogs were steady at \$11.50 to \$11.75 for good lots; Sows sold from \$8 to \$9, depending upon weight and quality.

Rumors of various activities on the part of the Greeks are causing much uneasiness in Constantinople.

WHEAT AVERAGED LOWER IN EARLY TRANSACTIONS

CHICAGO, May 23.—Wheat averaged lower in price today during the early transactions. Initial prices, which varied from unchanged figures to 1/2 cent lower, with July at \$1.17 1/2 to \$1.18 1/2 and September at \$1.16 1/2 to \$1.17 1/2 were followed by a moderate rally but then a fresh setback. Corn and oats were easy with wheat. After opening quarter cent lower to 1/2 cent advance with July at 80 to 80 1/2 cents, the corn market underwent a general setback. Oats started unchanged to 1/2 cent higher, with July at 42 1/2 cents, but later receded somewhat. Lower quotations on hogs weakened the provision market.

STOCKS RALLIED TODAY ON WALL STREET 'CHANGE

EASTER ISLAND HAS NOT SUNK OUT OF SIGHT

Schooner Returns with News that All Is Well on the Island.

(Associated Press Despatch) SANTIAGO, Chile, May 23.—Recurrent rumors that Easter Island had sunk beneath the Pacific during the intense earthquakes of last November, have been proved unfounded. The fishing schooner, Falsen, which left for the island in February, returned yesterday, reporting that all was well. The island, which is used by the Chilean Government as a penal colony, has a population of about 1,200. It is the easternmost inhabited member of the Polynesian group, and is remarkable for its giant pieces of sculpture, apparently the work of a prehistoric people. The island lies 2,500 miles west of the Chilean coast.

U.S. PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH

Defeated Move to Bar Schools Permitting Teaching of Evolutionary Hypothesis from Use of Church Funds.

MANY HOUSES ARE SEARCHED FOR FUGITIVE

Police Believe that Rogers Is Sheltered Somewhere in North Bay District.

(Associated Press Despatch) NORTH BAY, Ont., May 23.—It is estimated that more than one hundred houses, including the homes of a number of farmers in the vicinity, were searched and their occupants questioned yesterday by squads of provincial police following Commander Williams' decision to put out a dragnet in the town for the fugitive, Leo Rogers. Despite the activity of the police, however, not the slightest clue of a definite character could be said to have been secured.

It is evident that the provincial forces consider the situation in a more serious light than appears on the surface and Inspector Moore, of Cobalt, intimated last night that something had to be done to awaken a great many people to their responsibility as citizens. After the day's search the police returned to North Bay more than ever satisfied that Rogers is sheltered in the district.

MANY MILITARY BLANKETS WERE STOLEN AT LEVIS

Three Men Placed Under Arrest in Connection with Robbery by Mounted Police.

(Associated Press Despatch.) QUEBEC, May 23.—Military blankets to the number of six hundred, valued at \$4,000, were stolen May 10th, at Lauzon, near Levis, and the Royal Canadian Mounted Police have now completed what they believe is the round-up of the gang involved, by the arrest of three men.

One of them, Jules Champagne, was taken, it is said, in the act of prying open the windows of the store house, shortly after the burglary. Last week Almaraz Barras was arrested and yesterday Achille Desbiens was in the toils. The latter will be arraigned today.

TWO MEN SWEEPED INTO RAPIDS TO THEIR DEATH

Boat Was Caught in Powerful Eddy—Bodies Have Not Been Recovered.

(Associated Press Despatch) SHERBROOKE, Ont., May 23.—Word was received here today of the drowning of Paul Turcotte, twenty years old, and Victor Gagnon, twenty-three years old, on the Demoin River, on Sunday. Turcotte and Gagnon and two fellow workers, with the Pembroke Lumber Company, brought a large supply boat down the river and were about to make a landing above Popular Schute, when an eddy caught the boat and whirled it into the rapids. The companions escaped by jumping, while the other two men were carried over the Schute. The bodies have not yet been recovered.

MANUFACTURE OF BOX TOES IN SHERBROOKE

Interesting Address by H. L. Van Roden—Campaign for Child Welfare Clinic a Success.

Splendid success was reported at the Rotary Club last night in connection with the Child Welfare campaign for membership and already a total of approximately \$775 has been collected for this purpose. A large number of reports are still outstanding and effort is being made to get them all entered by next Tuesday, May 29th. The rotarians have done exceptionally well during the campaign, in fact they have out-classed the men folk.

Following a discussion of the work and the reports in connection with same, Rotarian W. D. Van Roden, local manager of the Beckwith Box Toe, Limited, gave a most interesting resume of the work associated with the manufacture of vulco-unit box toes, an industry of comparatively recent date and one which is known to few of our citizens.

With a view of emphasizing the importance of the box toe to the shoe, Mr. Van Roden reviewed conditions existing prior to his company's inventions.

"The shoe manufacturers," he observed, "were using, in the finest shoes, leather box toes and experiencing trouble at times through the cracking of the leather, due partly to the action of the perspiration of the foot. Cheaper shoes had for box toes largely, a piece of cheap felt cut to the shape of the toe, and moistened with gum or cement, just previous to assembling the uppers for the lasting operation. The shoes, being lasted while the toes were soft,

had to remain on the last from ten to twelve hours to dry out, before the last could be removed, and the work of making proceeded with. This required an extra number of lasts, of each size and style, to keep the work moving through the factory. These lasts are expensive, and with frequent style changes, especially in the making of women's shoes, many of the smaller manufacturers could not keep up with fancy lasts and tried to keep to more staple lines that would carry more than two or three seasons. Using these box toes it was impossible to preserve the fine quality of the last, the toes often having a bulky appearance and no waterproof qualities.

Development of Vulco-Unit Box Toe.
"Mr. H. H. Beckwith, the founder of our business, had been a shoe manufacturer in Lynn, Mass., he had been through all these troubles and about ten years ago started his experimenting with materials to produce a box toe that would bring out the fine lines of the toe of the last and outline the shoe, and he finally developed the vulco-unit box toe. He patented both method of making, and process of use, our process being known as the hot and cold one. This method was hard to introduce as our box toes required to be heated for the pulling and lasting operations, and the use of steam on leather was not favored. It took a long time to convince them that it could be done with safety. We developed a line of both steam and electric heaters for factory use which helped out this situation. Having produced the box toe it was now necessary to build special machinery to produce same as none was to be had in the open market. This was done under direction of Mr. Beckwith and these machines were also patented for our protection. It was soon realized by the larger manufacturers that by the use of our box toes they not only had an easier lasting operation, and were producing the exact lines of the toe of the last being used, but a great saving in the number of lasts required, due to the fact that our box toes hardened immediately after being lasted and hold their shape for all time. The vulco box toe is heated and placed in the toe of the shoe, between the lining and upper, and worked while in a plastic condition. It then stretches with the pull on the leather, and as soon as lasting is completed hardens. These box toes are also water and perspiration proof, a great advantage in the wearing quality.

POINTS OUT CANADA'S NEED FOR AN ADEQUATE MUSEUM
Stated Canada Has All Requisites for National Museum Except a Suitable and Adequate Home.

(Associated Press Despatch.) OTTAWA, May 23.—Canada's need for an adequate national museum was pointed out by Dr. P. J. McMurich, in his presidential address before the Royal Society at an open meeting last night. The present museum, while acknowledged to be fair, in view of the circumstances which had governed its existence, was said to be in a state of "suspended animation." It was a state of responsibility, Dr. McMurich said, that Canada should have a national museum for the collection of information and where research material might be kept. It would prove a great educational force. Canada had all the requisites for such a museum except a suitable and adequate home and definite organization.

The president described the aims and needs of the Royal Society. Lack of money in recent years had hampered the organization, making publication of papers difficult, and prizes almost impossible. The Society had stimulated collections for a museum, and today saw the paramount need for a suitable place in which to house collections already existing.

LONDON, May 23.—The death is announced of Lady Constance Lytton, daughter of the first Earl of Lytton and notable militant suffragist. She was born in 1869.
