## At St-Regis Reserve 14,440 Sticks to Play Baggataway



When Christopher Columbus discovered America, the Indians of the Six Nations were already banging away at a game they called baggataway! The French settlers called this sport lacrosse because the curved stick used by the players resembled a bishop's crozier in shape. This

rugged sport, played outdoors and indoors, was regarded for a long time as Canada's national game. The only lacrosse stick manufacturing plant in Canada is owned and operated by Mohawk Indians, at Cornwall, in Ontario.



Lacrosse sticks are made of sturdy hickory. The end of the stick is steamed for about one hour so that it can be bent without breaking. After the end has been given the desired shape, it is wired and left for one year to cure. Tom White is seen at work.



Dick Seymour, one of the 12 Indians employed at the factory located on St-Regis Reserve, uses a draw knife to shape a stick. The plant produces more than 14,000 sticks a year, sold mainly to teams on the West Coast and the United States.

## Outdoor Cooking Tips Save Drudgery

Turn a cool shoulder to the hot kitchen when summer swings its weight toward record-breaking temperatures. Use your ingenuity in planning meals to take advantage of modern picnic equipment and small electrical appliances instead of the kitchen range.

Electrical saucepans, skillets and cookers can brew up a meal wherever you have an outlet to plug them into.

The idea of sitting down on the porch while a thermostatically controlled appliance simmers up dinner without attention is particularly appealing to me after a day spent canning, blanching and freezing vegetables and fruits in a steamy kitchen.

WITH AN INSULATED food carrier and a portable charcoal grill you have a miniature kitchen ready to prepare and serve a well-balanced variety of hot and cold foods wherever you like. On nights when insects plague

the outdoor dinner, plant the grill where food can be cooked outdoors and whisked inside for serving.

Recipes for charcoal grill cookery abound in newspapers, magazines books and booklets. They range from the ever-favored hamburger to individual dinners cooked together in aluminum foil packages.

If the man of the house doesn't consider charcoal cookery his special province, you don't have to urge him into the job. With improved fuel and a few tricks, it no longer takes the skill of a Boy Scout and a philosophic attitude toward smoke and smudge to get dinner on the table.

MY FIRST step to more frequent, everyday use of the grill was to learn a few tricks about starting the fire.

About three inches between fire and food is recommended. After the fire is ignited, allow about 20 minutes for the charcoal briquets to heat to the right intensity.

For easy clean-up and a more economical fire, line the fire pit with two or more thicknesses of aluminum foil. The foil reflects the heat upwards, makes ash removal simple when the fire is out and prevent fat drippings from accumulating in the fire pit.

Packages of charcoal briquets can be picked off the shelf easily in supermarkets or hardware stores. The briquets are shaken out of the package directly into the firebox—no handling necessary.

New granular starters, packaged in foil envelopes, can be sprinkled over the charcoal and ignited with a match without a flare-up of flame.

Space the briquets close together for a quick, hot fire; farther apart for a slow fire. In cooking fatty foods and steaks, a slow fire is preferred to avoid a flare-up from dripping fat. If fat should catch fire, pull the food aside with tongs and quench the flames with baking soda.

A CHARCOAL fire will usually hold cooking temperatures for an hour. If you need more time for late arrivals, sprinkle on additional briquets.

After the fire has gone out and ashes are disposed of, clean the grate with paper towels, newspaper or—if it is crusted with food—with detergent and steel wool. To keep it clean between

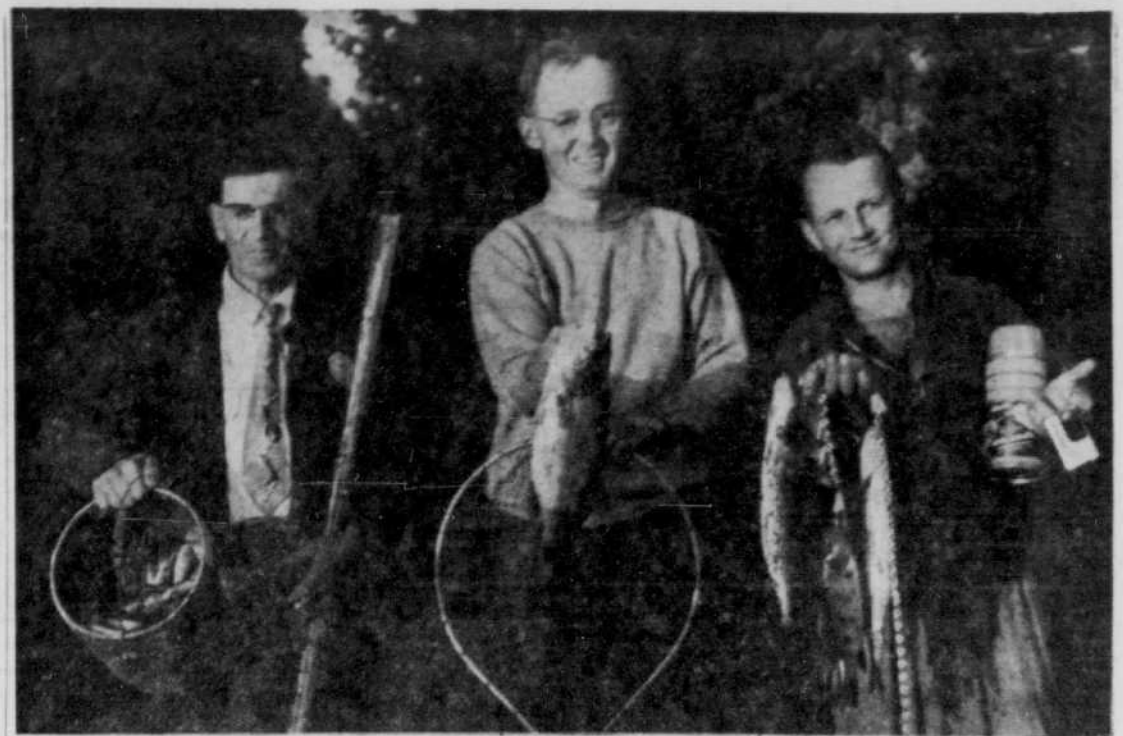
