MOVING STONES. We have been politely favoured with a letter from a gentleman of respectability in Ulster county, which we now lay before our readers: and we think it will stagger the most incredulous.

SIR,
Having been informed that you had expressed a desire to receive a detail of the extraordinary occurrence which has lately taken place in this vicinity, I embrace the opportunity of communicating to you the following particulars, as the result of my enquiries. Reports had become so various, that in order to avoid, if possible, all misrepresentations, I resolved to visit the place said to be the scene of the transaction, and make my enquiries of those who had been its witnesses. Accordingly, on Tuesday the 4th of this month, the Rev. Mr. Gosman, of this village agreeing to accompany me, we went to the spot and told the person living on the farm, what our business was, and requested him to relate as precisely as he could, what had occurred. He said, that on Wednesday the 20th Sept. his son, a young man about 18 years old, and a lad of 14, were in the field topping corn; that while thus employed, the former was hit on the back by a small pumpkin, which appeared to have proceeded from a small wood adjoining the cornfield; supposing that it had been thrown at them by some person concealed in the wood, they thought no more of it, until they saw several stones falling in succession about the cornfield, and apparently coming from the same wood: they then were confirmed in their suspicion, and immediately searched the wood, but found nobody. One of the stones had hit the lad, but so gently as to do no injury. They then told the owner of the farm, (Mr. Snyder) what had happened, he thought as they did at first, that the stones had been thrown from the wood, and was resolved to ascertain it; for this purpose he went to the field with the young man and soon witnessed what they had before related. All three then went in pursuit, but could find no person. After having left the field for some time, about 4 o'clock in the afternoon they returned to it, and on going across the cornfield towards the wood, Mr. Snyder was hit on his back by a stone: but as in the former case, so gently as to do no injury. At this time they saw several stones moving in different directions about the field, and contrary one to another, as made it impossible that the whole were thrown by one, two or three persons. The stones were generally from a half to two ounces in weight, but some much larger; one in particular, which was seen coming over a tree about 30 feet high and landed about 115 yards from it, weighed 3 pounds. This stone, upon the principles of projectiles, describing a parabola, must have moved through a distance of 230 yards; I have the stone in my possession.

The field on which all this occurred, is a low level piece of ground, remarkably free from stone and of a fine loamy soil.

The next day (Thursday) the same two young men, together with a boy of 10 years of age, went to another field, a quarter of a mile distant from the former, and were there also at work topping corn; they had not been long there, before the same phenomenon appeared. Stones moving in every direction, and in great numbers, some falling perpendicularly from a height of about 30 feet; others appearing as if they had been tossed a distance of 10 or 20 yards, some apparently proceeding from an orchard at the foot of the hill, upon which this field was situated: others, by their motion, seeming to have commenced and ended their movement in the corn field.—

One of the stones struck the young lad on his knee, but as in the former cases was perfectly harmless. The astonishment of the family now became so great, that they were induced to send for two of their neighbours, who came, and together with the female part of the family, making a number of nine persons, who stood and witnessed the scene.

On this day, the moving of the stones ceased, and was not renewed until Friday, 30th Sept.; before this time they had finished topping the corn, and consequently the field was so cleared that appearances were still more distinct. The following fact, I think, deserves particular notice.—Mrs. Snyder went to the field, and as she was walking where there was no other person, a stone of about 2 1/2 lbs wt. passed closely by, and fell a few feet before her; she immediately looked around, but saw nobody. She followed the stone, took it up, and found it moist on one side, as if just taken from its bed on the ground. She returned towards the place from whence it appeared to come, and perceived an indented spot on the ground moist, and designating, evidently, that a stone had lately left it. She applied the stone to the hole, and found that they exactly corresponded—here that stone remained until Mr. Gosman and myself saw it, and were convinced of the fact. The distance which it moved is 14 yards.

Since that day nothing further has been seen—I have now related in a simple manner the principal facts as they were stated to us by Mr. Snyder and his family; and with respect to them, generally, I have only to remark, that in no case what ever, has there been seen, a stone immediately leaving its position; though in many instances they were observed at a distance of two feet from the earth, slowly ascending and descending—some even appeared to have a kind of retarded motion. Nothing violent, but every thing mild, seems to have marked the dispensation. No volcanic effect appears either on the stones or on the ground—all around that stone, which has been particularly noticed, was firm and undisturbed.

As it regards the credit due to the whole narrative, Mr. Gosman and myself can say, that not a doubt exists in our minds, independent of the consideration, that no motive can be assigned, for misrepresentation or deception. The character of Mr. Snyder is such, that no person acquainted with him, can question his veracity—not only is he a man of acknowledged truth, and of high religious standing, but he appears to have a mind perfectly free from all superstitious prejudice or bias; thus placing the transaction as remote from all imposture or deception, as can be conceived.

This establishment shall be held in shares of ten dollars each.

The proprietor of each share shall have the liberty of voting in all meetings of the subscribers, and shall have the privilege of sending one child, to be instructed at the School ten per cent cheaper, than the children of non-subscribers are admitted. And provided any person take two or more shares in this establishment the same privileges will be granted for each share. The plan of instruction to be adopted, shall be that which has been found most successful in G. Britain and Ireland.

Great attention will be paid to the morals of the children; but no interference shall ever take place in the school, respecting catechisms and religious creeds. All the children shall be requested to attend divine worship at such times, and at such places as their parents and guardians shall direct.

The trustees shall be chosen annually: by whom school instructors shall be provided, and all necessary business, with respect to the school transacted.

At a meeting of the subscribers for erecting a public School House in Kingston, held at the Grammar School House on Tuesday the 24th January, 1815, for the purpose of making the necessary

arrangements for carrying the design into effect.

The Rev. Mr. Stuart was chosen chairman, and Mr. William Merrill secretary.

In order to meet the wishes, and carry into operation the benevolent designs of the committee formed in London, for the promotion of education in this country.

Resolved.
I. That a school House be built in Kingston, sufficiently large to accommodate 400 children. It shall be constructed of durable materials, under the direction and management of twelve trustees, who may be chosen annually by the subscribers.

Resolved.
II. That we respectfully petition the Legislature of this Province, for an act of Incorporation, empowering the trustees to hold property for the benefit of the school, and transact business according to law.

Resolved.
III. That this house which is to be erected be completely under the control, and subject to the management of the trustees; and the plan of instruction adopted in it, be the same which is adopted by the British and Foreign school society in London, which is patronized by the Prince Regent and several branches of the Royal Family.

Resolved.
IV. That the Rev. Mr. Geo. O. Stuart, Allan McLean, Esq. Thomas Mackland, Esq. Lawrence Herchmer, Esq. Peter Smith, Esq. John Kirby, Esq. Mr. George Mackland, Col. Hagerman, and Mr. Thomas Strickland be a committee of arrangement for presenting a petition to Parliament and take the necessary steps for carrying the design into operation.

Here follows the petition which was sent by the committee of arrangement to the Legislature.

To the Honorable, the Speaker, to the Honorable, the Members of the House of Assembly in Provincial Parliament assembled,

The Petition of the committee in behalf of the subscribers for the establishment of a School Society of Upper Canada—

Humbly sheweth:—
We the subscribers beg leave to represent to your Hon. House that a society of respectable, of benevolent characters in London has been formed, who have raised, by subscription a sum of money, and thereby have established a fund for the purpose of promoting the education and moral improvement of the youth of every religious denomination in the Canada.

We further represent to your Honorable House that the subscribers for the above beneficial and laudable object have appointed Trustees in London for the management and disposal of their fund designated "The committee for promoting the education of the Poor in Upper and Lower Canada," whose professed object is to send out Teachers for the more general diffusion of instruction throughout this Province.

We furthermore represent that the teachers sent out to this Province by introducing a new system of education will be able to embrace a much larger number of Pupils within their schools, than by the present established mode of education they can receive; and also, that the expense incurred by this plan of instruction is very much lessened.

We further represent to your Honorable House that, from a desire to avail ourselves of the services and labors of a Teacher, and to co-operate with the London Committee in aiding and promoting their benevolent views and designs, we have subscribed the sum of five hundred Pounds currency for the purpose of erecting a School House in the town of Kingston that shall contain four hundred children of both sexes.

We the subscribers humbly request and pray, that your Honorable House would take these representations into your consideration, and would extend to us legislative aid, empowering the subscribers to perfect their plan of education.

We therefore pray, that your Honorable House would incorporate the Trustees to be nominated by the subscribers, and invest them with the rights and privileges of a corporation for the receiving, managing and disposing of the contributions of such persons as would be disposed to extend their benevolence to the general diffusion of instruction in reading, writing and arithmetick, &c. and that the aforesaid Corporation, with a succession, may be designated and known by the name of the Trustees of the School Society of Upper Canada.

And we further pray your Honorable House that such pecuniary aid may be afforded and granted to the Incorporation, as shall be the means of enabling them to carry into effect the most important object of the establishment, which is, the fitting and preparing of School-masters, to carry this plan of instruction to the townships and villages of the province.

And we further represent to your Honorable House, that by extending the means of acquiring a common education, a great proportion of the children so instructed in this school, will be by these means qualified for admission into the higher, or Public Grammar Schools, and thus the general welfare of the community will be promoted:

And, your Petitioners, as in duty bound, shall ever pray, &c. &c.

Whereas there was this day read at the board a report from a committee of the Lords of His Majesty's most honourable Privy Council, dated the 29th of this instant, in the words following: viz.

Your Royal Highness having been pleased, by your order in council of the 10th of December last, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, to refer unto this committee a letter from Earl Bathurst, one of His Majesty's principal Secretaries of State, to the Lord President of the Council, transmitting copy of a letter from Sir George Prevost, Acting Quebec, the 18th of March, 1814, forwarding an address of the House of Assembly of Lower Canada to your Royal Highness, with certain articles of complaint, therein referred to, against Jonathan Sewell, Esq. His Majesty's Chief Justice of the Province of Lower Canada, and James Monk, Esq. Chief Justice of the Court of King's Bench for the District of Montreal; and also transmitting a memorial from the Executive Council

Judges in the Court of Appeal, and of the puisne Judges of the Court of King's Bench for the District of Quebec, and of the Court of King's Bench for the District of Montreal, in the said Province of Lower Canada, praying to be included in the examination and decision of the said articles of complaint, together with a petition from the said Jonathan Sewell, Esq.; in which letter the Earl Bathurst requests that so much of the said complaints of the House of Assembly, as relate to the rules of practice stated to have been introduced by the said chief justices into their respective courts, may be submitted to your Royal Highness, in Council, in order that, if such rules shall be found to have been introduced, it may be decided whether in so doing the said chief justices have exceeded their authority; the Lords of the Committee, in obedience to your Royal Highness's said order of reference, have taken the said letter and its inclosures into consideration, and having received the opinion of His Majesty's Attorney and Solicitor General, and been attended by them thereupon, and having maturely deliberated upon the complaints of the said House of Assembly, so far as they relate to the said rules of practice, their Lordships do agree humbly to report as their opinion to your Royal Highness, that the rules, which are made the subject of such complaint of the said House of Assembly of Lower Canada, against the said chief justice, Jonathan Sewell, Esquire, and James Monk, Esquire, which their Lordships observe, were not made by the said chief justices, respectively, upon their own sole authority, but by them, in conjunction with the other judges of their respective courts, are all rules for the regulation of the practice of their respective courts, and within the scope of that power and jurisdiction with which, by the rules of law, and by the colonial ordinances and acts of legislation, these courts are invested, as consequently that neither the said chief justices, nor the courts in which they preside, have, in making such rules, exceeded their authority, nor have been guilty of any assumption of legislative power."

His Royal Highness the Prince Regent, having taken the said report into consideration, was pleased, in the name and on the behalf of his Majesty, and by and with the advice of His Majesty's Privy Council, to approve thereof; and to order, as it is hereby ordered, That the said complaints, so far as they relate to the said Rules of Practice, be, and they are hereby dismissed this board.

His Royal Highness the Prince Regent having been pleased to refer to the consideration of a committee of the most honourable Privy Council certain articles of complaint against you and Mr. Monk, so far as related to the rules of practice established by you in the courts in which you respectively preside, it now becomes my duty to communicate to you the result of that inquiry; which, having received the entire approbation of his Royal Highness, is expressed in the order, of which the enclosed is a copy (No. 1).

The officer at present administering the government of Canada, has received his Royal Highness's commands to communicate this decision to the House of Assembly; and, in making this communication, to state the grounds upon which his Royal Highness has declined considering as articles of complaint against you, the advice which you are at different times stated to have given to the preceding governors of the province. It is highly satisfactory to me to assure you that, although his Royal Highness felt compelled, upon general principles, to exclude those particular charges from consideration, and thus to preclude you from entering upon your justification, yet his Royal Highness entertains no doubt as to the general propriety of your, and Mr. Monk's conduct, or as to your being able to offer, with respect to them, a full and satisfactory explanation.

Sir,
I have had the honour of receiving your letter, of the 21th instant expressing your apprehension, that as the instructions transmitted to the officer administering the government of Canada do not embrace any other charges brought against you and Mr. Monk, than those which relate to advice given by you to the governor, and the rules of practice established in your respective courts, the House of Assembly may be induced to consider you as not free from blame, on the other points of charge, not strictly falling within that description.

As the letter, addressed to the officer administering the government of Canada, bears testimony to the uniform propriety of yours and Mr. Monk's conduct, I do not conceive that there can be any ground for the House of Assembly to doubt that your justification is complete; but I am glad to have an opportunity of stating that the charges, not specifically adverted to in my letter, appeared to be, with one exception, of too little importance to require consideration, and that, (the one against Mr. Monk, which charges him with having refused a writ of habeas corpus) was, as well as all the other charges which are not founded on the rules of practice, totally unsupported by any evidence whatever.

To the Editor of the Quebec Mercury,
SIR,

All foreigners who have travelled in this country, concur in giving Montreal a decided preference over Quebec, notwithstanding that the latter city is the seat of Government and consequently the Capital of the Province; on account of the inhabitants, as they say, being a more public spirited people, as is evidently evinced by the beauty and elegance of the public edifices of the former city; the cleanliness of its streets, which in general are well paved; the regularity and neatness of its markets, with many other particulars in which we, in the capital, are deficient.

It must be admitted by every candid person that our city, in point of improvement, is far behind Montreal, chiefly owing to the almost universal spirit of aversion to all kinds of innovations; whether for the embellishment of the city or the convenience of the public, which seem to prevail among us, and for which we certainly deserve the obloquy of strangers. Our streets, even where paved, are shamefully muddy, and in many of them the filth is allowed to accumulate to such a degree as to render them,

particularly in the fall and spring, in some places nearly impassable. Some of our Churches are without enclosures, and as far as regards the outside, in a woeful state of dilapidation. Our market places are in a sad condition, it is true the upper town market will, perhaps in the course of the ensuing summer undergo some alteration in the shape of improvement, but that of the Lower Town, although equally in want of repair, has not hitherto been thought of; and will, in all probability, remain in its present miserable state for another century.

The citizens of Montreal have lately set us another laudable example highly worthy of imitation, in the lighting of their streets; and the hint, it is to be hoped, will not be entirely lost upon our excellent magistrates, who must be confessed have uniformly exerted to the utmost their universally acknowledged brilliant talents for the benefit of their fellow citizens; but their most strenuous efforts to bring about a reformation, in many cases, have too often proved fruitless, however great changes for the better may be expected from the recent increase of that venerable and learned body.

PHILO QUEBEC.

MR. EDITOR,

A critique having appeared in one of our provincial papers, on a General Order of the Adjutant General of Militia, which was published in the Mercury of the 21st ult. I beg leave, through the medium of your paper, to make an observation or two in justification of the General Order, I do not mean of its substance, which requires none; but of its language.

I shall waive the idea of respect due to an official document, emanating under the authority of His Excellency the Administrator in chief; whatever weight such a consideration might have on minds not daring enough to go all lengths, upon all occasions.

The charge of contradiction in the order I maintain to be unfounded. What is the case? Certain militia-men are prosecuted for disobedience to orders, and to law. It appears on the trial that they were not regularly commanded; and are, in consequence, acquitted. From the circumstances that came out on the trial of these men the General Order admits, that they were not legally commanded. Is there any thing of contradiction in this admission after it had so appeared on the trials? Oh but the order charges the militia-men with availing themselves of a pretext, notwithstanding that the command was admitted to be illegal.

Let us try this question in a court of equity. Certain militia-men are commanded to do a certain duty. The command was justifiable in point of right; but deficient in point of form. The men, by the intervention of lawyers, plead the want of the requisite form in the command for their letting the public service stand still. Is it because the law finds this plea valid, that equity shall not name it a pretext? The essential question in equity is, whether the men were called on to do any thing that was not their duty to do. This is not, and cannot be pretended to have been the case.

But the great ground and principal cause of the critique is, the bringing of the lawyers on the tapis though nothing more was set forth in the order than the simple statement that, by means of lawyers, employed by the militia men so refusing to obey, the latter were discharged.

I can very well excuse lawyers, in this country for their appearing in small causes that should be decided summarily, notwithstanding that such interference cannot be justified by English practice; I repeat that I can excuse such a custom here, because the spirit of litigation has reigned in the country highly deserves to be punished through its pursuers. Were not such the case I should be disposed to pronounce such interference a heavy grievance, not only by picking the pockets of the parties, but by being highly subversive of substantial justice. And this I would dare to maintain at the risk of being interred alive, under whole mountains of folio,

quartos and octavos, from Coke to Christian; from Cujas to Pothier. But, considering the appetite for prey to be universal; and particularly that pigeons are made to be plucked by kites; lawyers and law-officers may be allowed to start and follow up their game as well as all others; and so gentlemen of the robe go on and prosper; and Plutus be with you.

QUEBEC, DECEMBER 5, 1815.

THROUGH the United States we have London dates to the 19th and Liverpool to the 21st of October. The advices they bring are far from being unimportant. Louis XVIII had opened the session of the Legislature on the 7th and addressed the two houses in a speech of a conciliatory nature. Advices are said to have been received in London of the signing of the new treaty. The Emperor of Austria and King of Prussia had left Paris; the Emperor of Russia was immediately to follow.—Talleyrand was at the head of the French ministry and had been highly complimented by the French monarch: The Prussians were still besieging the fortresses in Lorraine.—The Military tribunal was proceeding against the state criminals.

In Spain the gallant but unfortunate Porlier, the leader of the insurgents, had been taken and executed. We deeply lament this brave man's fate, because he had taken up arms in a good cause; but the weight of monks and ecclesiastics on minds predisposed to receive their impressions, was too powerful for him. Ferdinand has lost the former dependencies of Spain, in South America. A day may come when his old dominions may shake him off also. Come when it will, he will not find many nations disposed to re-establish him, as they have done Louis. The Floridas, it is confidently asserted, he has made over to the British crown, as some compensation for the blood and treasure Great Britain has expended in his cause. How far this acquisition may be beneficial to Great Britain a judgment may be formed from the consideration of the soil and climate being generally remarkably good. Its extent is 100,000 square miles. The road of Pensacola, the chief town of West-Florida, is one of the best in the gulf of Mexico, where vessels can lie in safety against all winds. Cotton can be advantageously cultivated in the Floridas. In short their value to Great Britain will unquestionably be great; and consequently a great eye sore to the U. States, when again made a jewel in the British crown.

The London papers say that Lord Forbes is to succeed Sir Gordon Drummond, in the government of this country.

In our columns will be found the very interesting proceedings of the Prince Regent, in Council, on the complaint of the House of Assembly, against the two Chief Justices. It will unquestionably be satisfactory to the greater part of our subscribers to learn that the Complaints were dismissed in a manner that must be highly gratifying to the feelings of the gentlemen immediately interested, as well as to that of the other Justices and Judges of His Majesty's Courts. To the lovers of peace and harmony the decision must be congenial, on account of its tendency to set completely at rest, for the future, questions which, for the time of their existence, so much agitated the society.

Major General Proctor is condemned to be publicly reprimanded, and suspended from rank and pay for six months.

PARIS, OCT. 8.

To judge from the news, Germany it would appear that the Ottoman Porte intends declaring war against Russia. The Turks are making great preparations and also the Russians.

COMMERCIALLY IMPORTANT.

Extract from a letter from NEHEMAH I. INGRAHAM, Captain of the Ship Bulah, to his owners in Boston, dated Civita Vecchia, Sept. 10, 1815. "I shall sail to-morrow or the next day, as soon as the coast is clear of the Turks; there are three in sight at present, and they rob every vessel which they cannot make a prize of."

The French funds have again arisen one or two per cent.

The British funds are, Consols at 58 1/2, Omnium 9 1/4.

It is said the allies contemplate the restitution of Gustavus to the throne of Sweden.

Spain still refuses to ratify the Act of the Congress of Vienna; and Portugal has not decided.

A revolution has taken place in Smyrna; the Dey deposed, and a Regency appointed.

Extraordinary assault—As Mr. Phillips was walking on Sunday last near Merriem square accompanied by two friends, a lady elegantly dressed, whom he soon recognized to be the unfortunate Mrs. Guthrie, rushed on him in the most frenzied manner, exclaiming— "Sir you have ruined an innocent man," and struck him several times, repeating the same exclamation. She said the witnesses from Wales were perjured, but admitted that she had deeply injured Mr. Guthrie. She then took the pamphlet reports of the trial, which she tore in pieces scattering it in all directions, declaring that she came from England for the purpose—and deliberately retired in a private carriage, which with a footman and postillion in elegant livery remained in waiting for her at the corner of the square. Thus ended a scene, unparalleled, we will venture to say in the bar experiences or the history of female desperation. [Dublin Paper.]

MONTREAL, Dec. 2.

POSTSCRIPT

The Swanton mail did not arrive till after 10 o'clock this morning. Our time is consequently so limited, that only a few articles are copied from the New York papers of 1st Saturday.—These give London accounts to the 20th October inclusive, and advices from Bordeaux of the 18th. The number of vessels that were about to sail from the British and French ports, for the United States exceeds all former precedents—the quantity of goods they will bring with completely glut the American markets.

LONDON, Oct. 3, Evening—Paris Journals to the 1st speak of the Treaty's being signed; but we have a private letter on which we can rely, affirming that no treaty had yet been signed. Probably however, some arrangement has been agreed upon, as the emperor of Austria and King of Prussia have actually taken leave of Louis 18th, and set off for Dijon, and the emperor Alexander was immediately to follow them. Courier.

Government intend proposing to the next Parliament, a tax of 17 1/2 per cent, on property as a substitute for the assessed taxes of every kind.

Ministers have it in contemplation to send another embassy to China, and Lord Amherst is expected to be the great Plenipotentiary.

DUBLIN, Oct. 5.

The Archduke Charles of Austria is expected in England in about three weeks, on a visit to his Royal Highness the Prince Regent.

Lord Amherst has been appointed Ambassador Extraordinary and Plenipotentiary to the Emperor of China, and Mr. Ellis [a near connection, we believe, of Lord Buckinghamshire,] Secretary to the Embassy.

In the course of the present week Subscriptions for lighting the part of St. Paul Street, between the old and new Markets was, we understand, readily obtained.

A London paragraph mentions that, Lord Forbes is to succeed General Drummond as Governor of the Canadas.

- For every foot of water for which Masters or Commanders of Vessels are obliged to pay their Pilots from Bic to Quebec, and from Quebec to Bic—2s. 6d. currency per foot.
- For Transports going to Montreal, or Three Rivers.
- Of 100 to 150 Tons inclusive—£2 currency,
- Of 151 to 200 Tons inclusive—£3 do.
- Of 201 to 250 Tons inclusive—£4 do.
- Of 251 Tons and upwards—£5 do.

And on settling with their Pilots, Masters of Transports are to deduct 1s. in the pound on the amount of the sums due them, which with the rates of Pilot Water, are to be paid as above directed.—And as the greater part of the Transports that have arrived in Lower Canada for some years past, have not conformed to the foregoing regulations, although enjoying the benefit of the Light House and Buoys, in common with other vessels, such Masters, as shall be guilty of a like neglect in future, will be prosecuted as directed by the Statute in that case made and provided.
