

Fear The Miners May Join Railroaders' Strike

CLAIM IMPROVEMENT IN STRIKE SITUATION IN LONDON THIS MORNING

Official Statement Says that Distribution of Food is Being Carried Out Without Friction and Volunteer Help is Being Freely Offered Today Throughout Great Britain—Premier Lloyd George, Sir Auckland Geddes and Sir Robert Horne Were in Conference All This Morning, While Strike Committees Were Also in Constant Session.

LONDON, Sept. 29.—Improvement in the situation created by the general strike on the British railways was announced in official quarters this morning. The distribution of food was being carried out without friction and volunteer help was being freely offered, it was stated.

The official statement from Downing Street read: "The general strike situation is improving, the government measures are working satisfactorily. Food distribution is proceeding smoothly and offers of voluntary assistance are still pouring in."

Premier Lloyd George, Sir Auckland Geddes, the Minister of National Service and Reconstruction, and Sir Robert Horne, the Minister of Labor, were in conference throughout the forenoon today, while the strike committees were also in constant session.

James Henry Thomas, the secretary of the National Union of Railwaymen, declared at noon there were no new features in the situation.

Hundred Thousand Miners Idle in South Wales Owing To Strike

LONDON, Sept. 29.—One hundred thousand miners are idle in the South Wales coal fields as a result of the railroad strike. Many collieries are closing down, and the Swansea harbor trade is paralyzed.

Railroads running out of London will attempt to operate trains on skeleton schedules today, according to announcement. It is hoped thus to cope with the strike situation, which brought about an almost total suspension of traffic yesterday in this city, and which has virtually paralyzed all English roads.

Ninety per cent. of the railway workers in Scotland are idle, but a few trains were run there on Sunday for the carrying of passengers and perishable goods. Reports state these trains were operated by union men who were desirous of getting to their homes, and that these men have nearly all joined those who obeyed the first call from the National Union of Railwaymen. Irish roads are not as yet involved in the strike, but the men there have been instructed by union headquarters to hold themselves in readiness to walk out at any moment.

Concern is felt over the possibility of the strike spreading to the miners and transport workers' unions which are affiliated with the National Union of Railwaymen.

James Henry Thomas, leader of the railroad workers, said yesterday he would ask the assistance of the "triple alliance" only in case he "cannot fight the railroad question alone."

Robert Smilie, leader of the Miners' Union, speaking at Glasgow last night, said that because the railroads and mines are so closely related, coal diggers of the country would be idle in a few days. This could automatically bring about strike conditions without an actual order being sent out. Mr. Smilie advised members of the union to be calm and to conduct a "passive campaign."

London is being fed by fleets of motor lorries, which bring milk and other foodstuffs to the city. The government has appealed to the people to economize as far as possible in petrol, fuel and food.

Miss Eleanor Hopwood has been placed in charge of food distribution in this city.

CONFIDENT THE STRIKE IS DOOMED TO FAILURE

ENGLISH CREW ARRIVES TO TAKE GERMAN LINER

Officers that Have Been Sent Over to Operate Prinz Frederick Wilhelm Arrive in New York.

NEW YORK, Sept. 29.—Sent here from England by the White Star Line to take over and operate the former German liner Prinz Frederick Wilhelm, a crew of 255 British officers and men arrived here today on the steamer Baltic. The Prinz Frederick Wilhelm, one of the eight German ships originally allotted to Great Britain by the Inter-Allied Naval Commission, was rented to the United States as a troop transport.

Last Saturday, however, it was announced from Washington that the ships would be retained by the United States Shipping Board. This announcement came but a short time prior to the hour when it was expected that the Imperator would be turned over to the Cunard Line.

DEMAND FIUME BE MADE ITALIAN CITY

PARIS, Sept. 29.—A resolution demanding that Fiume be made an Italian city has been passed by the Italian Chamber of Deputies, according to information by the Italian delegation here.

Claims That The Germans Are Playing Very Important Part In The Bolshevik Operations

Russian General States that Bolshevik Armies are in Many Sectors Led By German Staff Officers and the Germans, in His Opinion, are Working for the Establishment of a Monarchical Russia in Sympathy With Germany.

STOCKHOLM, Sept. 29.—A Russian general, who had made his way out of the country into Finland, reports that Germans are playing an important part in the Bolshevik operations in the regions of Petrograd and Moscow, which cities, he says, are in direct communication with Berlin, according to a despatch to the Tidningen from Helsinki. The Bolshevik armies in many sectors are led by German general staff officers, he declares.

The Germans, in this Russian's opinion, are working for the reestablishment of a monarchical Russia in sympathy with Germany.

TEXT OF NOTE MADE PUBLIC.

PARIS, Sept. 29.—The text of the note sent by the Allied Powers to the German Government concerning the evacuation of the Baltic provinces has been made public. The note says the evacuation must begin immediately and continue uninterruptedly. That German soldiers and officers who were demobilized from the German army and have enlisted in various Russian corps must be recalled is also a stipulation of the note, and rigorous measures must be taken to prevent further enlistments in these corps.

RUMANIANS MAKE COUP.

GENEVA, Sept. 29.—Rumanian troops have seized a big German biplane carrying three hundred million paper roubles and a miniature, but complete, printing press at Hotin, Bessarabia, according to the Rumanian bureau at Bern. The biplane, which was en route to Moscow, was forced to land at Hotin because of a leak in the gasoline tank. It was manned by four German officers who are said to have resisted their arrest. The roubles were all said to have been new notes.

NAURA ARRANGEMENT PASSED.

MELBOURNE, Sept. 29.—(Reuter)—The Federal House of Representatives has passed the so-called Naura arrangement provided that the control of the former German islands in the Pacific, south of the equator, shall pass to Australia, New Zealand, and those north of the equator to Japan.

INDICATIONS OF THE GOVERNMENT TAKING G. T. R.

Long-Discussed Measure Seems to Be Going Through—Mr. F. H. McGuigan Passed Through Here.

That the Grand Trunk Railway is soon to be taken over by the Government, after long and involved consideration, is the present indication, and rumors which seem to have some degree of sound foundation on fact, are current in railway circles here today; that not many days will pass before the deal is closed.

Mr. F. H. McGuigan was in town recently, looking over the territory in Sherbrooke and district, and is now inspecting the entire eastern section of the line, it is understood for the purpose of appraising this section of the railway, and it is believed that the taking over of the Grand Trunk will soon be consummated.

SERBIAN FRONTIER CLOSED. ROME, Sept. 29.—The Serbian frontier has been ordered closed for a period of thirteen days, according to a despatch from Trieste.

SHIPPINGS ARE CANCELLED. WASHINGTON, Sept. 29.—All sailings to ports in Great Britain have been cancelled by the Shipping Board because of the strike of railway workers there.

BRITISH SHIPPING LOSSES DURING WAR

LONDON, Sept. 29.—(Reuter)—An official return just issued shows that the British warships lost during the war numbered 254, including thirteen battleships, three battle cruisers, thirteen cruisers, six light cruisers, sixty-four destroyers and fifty-four submarines. Auxiliaries lost during the war totalled 815, including 244 colliers and 246 trawlers.

MR. MACKINNON TO REPRESENT CITY AT MEETING

Prominent Canadian Manufacturers Will Hold Important Meeting.

MONTREAL, Sept. 29.—Prominent Canadian manufacturers from Central and Western Canada arrived in Montreal Saturday night, completing the first leg of their journey to St. John, N.B., where they are attending a meeting of the executive council and the executive committee of the Canadian Manufacturers' Association. This morning an executive council meeting was held here in the board room of the C.M.A. This evening the party will proceed by C.P.R. to Fredericton, N.B., where on Tuesday a meeting will be held. On Wednesday they proceed to St. John for the executive council meeting, and on Thursday the annual meeting of the Maritime Provinces branch will be held in St. John.

The delegates who will go from Montreal are T. P. Howard, president of the Association; C. Howard Smith, F. W. Stewart and P. E. Joubert. From Sherbrooke, G. D. MacKinnon will represent the Association, while J. A. Picard, of Quebec, will be in attendance from that city.

WOMAN GIVEN APPOINTMENT.

MONTREAL, Sept. 29.—Professor Carrie E. Derick, of McGill University, has been appointed to fill a vacancy on the Provincial Council of Public Instruction. This is the first time a woman has been given such an appointment in Quebec.

South Africa Does Not Need To Have Republic To Be Free, But Is Free In The British Empire

Premier Smuts Makes a Strong Appeal for the Abandonment of the Republican Movement—His View of the British Empire is an Alliance, of Which the King is the Bond.

CAPE TOWN, South Africa, September 29.—(Reuter).—Speaking at Carnarvon, Premier Smuts strongly appealed for the abandonment of the Republican movement. He pointed out that he had fought to the bitter end for the Transvaal Republic, but at Vereeniging he and other Boer leaders recognized that the course of a republic was not God's course for South Africa and must result in the tearing asunder of various sections of the white population. He was deeply convinced by their wisest leaders did not allow them to succeed. Moreover, General Smuts said he felt they could not change the constitution without blood and tears. They could only change the King for a republic by revolution. South Africa would then be a ruined country. The Afrikaner people would again come off worst. "Do not let us run after delusions," he appealed, saying it seemed to him that the Nationalist leaders were still animated by the spirit which he deplored, but that did not deter him from doing his utmost to revive the spirit which had brought about the union.

General Smuts said his view of the British Empire was an alliance of which the King was the bond. "Under this alliance we keep together, protect and help each other, financially, with advice and otherwise, each according to his own light. That is the right conception and the one which triumphed in the councils at Paris. You do not need to have a republic to be free. You are free in the British Empire." (Cheers)

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WALK-OUT OF BETHLEHEM STEEL COMPANY EMPLOYEES WENT INTO EFFECT TODAY—FEW DISORDERS

Opening of Second Week of Steel Strike Found Employers Making Efforts to Operate Their Plants Full Handed, While Union Leaders Make a Big Effort to Extend the Walk-out to Include the Men Who Have So Far Remained at Work.

PITTSBURGH, Sept. 29.—The opening of the second week of the steel workers' strike in the Pittsburgh district was marked today by efforts of employers to operate plants full handed, and an intensive campaign by a large number of Union organizers to extend the walk-out to include the men who have remained at work.

While early reports did not indicate to what degree of success either side met, it is known that many workers voted last week to return to the mills today and resume their duties, and today the employers viewed the situation with optimism.

From strike headquarters came forth the statement that with the additional organizers brought into the field during the past few days, there would be very few desertions and a large number of additions to the strikers' ranks.

Strike leaders watched with interest developments in the walk-out of Bethlehem Steel Company employees which went into effect today. They expected that this strike would tie up all Bethlehem plants.

Meetings of strikers were held throughout Allegheny County yesterday under supervision of the Sheriff. Deputies attended the gatherings. No outbreaks were reported. The success of the Sunday meetings prompted strike leaders to announce that many such gatherings would be held in the county this week.

A TEST OF STRENGTH BETWEEN EMPLOYERS AND STRIKERS IS EXPECTED TO DEVELOP TODAY THROUGHOUT CHICAGO DISTRICT

CHICAGO, Sept. 29.—A test of strength between steel operators and striking workmen was expected to develop today throughout the Chicago district, following the announcement that an attempt would be made to put in operation a number of plants which were closed.

Union leaders put out many additional pickets early in the day, with instructions to endeavor to prevent the return of men to the mills.

Chiefs of police and sheriffs in districts where steel mills are located ordered out reserve officers and placed them at points where they believed clashes might take place between strike sympathizers and men who attempted to return to the mills.

Mill officials stated they looked for a considerable number of men to return to work today, and that they expected their forces would gradually be increased. On the other hand, union leaders said their ranks were not only unbroken, but that they had made gains.

Meetings were held Sunday by striking workers at several points in the district, and leaders said that many men had joined the union.

Peaceful Penetration.

The establishment of the Hunan Bank, under Sino-Japanese management in China, adds another to the long list of Japanese banking institutions designed to play a very important part in the "peaceful penetration" scheme of Tokyo. Japan apparently considers the location of banks in China an important part of her present and future program, facilitating trade, and going hand in hand with the evolution of such industries as those represented by the Sino-Japanese Oil Company, the Sino-Japanese Spinning Company, the Sino-Japanese Cotton Company, and other business enterprises originating in Japan and now established in China.

The Yokohama Specie Bank is extending its exchange business in China with branches in Peking, Shanghai, Tientsin, and other cities, and is also working in a kind of partnership with the Bank of Korea, which has recently taken over from the Yokohama Bank the right to issue gold notes in Manchuria. The Sino-Japanese Chartered Bank of Exchange is another important institution, and a considerable number of other Japanese banks are now planning to open offices in Chinese cities. So the great Japanese scheme is already seen operating "full blast."

British Archaeologists Intend to Investigate The Ancient Sumerians

A

whose work has probably been more severely criticized than any other by some of his fellow scientists has received an honor at the hands of Oxford University that should go far toward vindication, representing, as it does, a recognition of his scholarship by Dr. A. H. Sayce, one of the leading authorities in this science. Dr. Stephen Herbert Langdon has just been elected to succeed Dr. Sayce as professor of Assyriology at Oxford. Until recently Dr. Langdon was curator of the Babylonian section of the University of Pennsylvania.

Dr. Langdon is a native of Michigan, and has achieved distinction in his chosen field at an age when most men are unknown. He was born in May, 1876, at Monroe, Mich., and studied at the University of Michigan, Union Theological Seminary and Columbia University. He was Fellow in Semitics at the latter institution in 1903 and 1904, International Fellow of Columbia to France, 1904 to 1906, and is the author of a small library of volumes on Babylonia. In recent years he has been devoting virtually all his time to the study of the language and customs of the ancient Sumerians, who had achieved a remarkably high degree of culture in Babylonia long before the Semite influence was known.

It is in this field that Dr. Langdon has made his greatest discoveries and met the bitterest criticism. Shortly after his appointment as curator of the University of Pennsylvania Museum in 1918, he made public the translation of a tablet containing a Sumerian version of Paradise, the Flood and the Fall of Man. The hero of the flood, Taggar, has been identified by Dr. Langdon as the original of the Biblical Noah. The account differs from the Hebrew version chiefly in that Noah is named as the son of the forbidden fruit, and not Adam. He has also published several volumes of Sumerian liturgical texts from the tablets obtained by the University Museum in its expeditions to Nippur—the Calneh of the Bible—prior to 1900.

Prof. Langdon's appointment is understood by his friends to herald the announcement of a still greater honor, this time at the hands of the British Government. It is expected that the work of archaeological exploration to be resumed in the Near East will be under his direction. Plans have been made for a survey of every field known to have been the home of ancient peoples, and for the first time in the history of archaeology its leaders will be enabled to make explorations on a systematic scale, without danger of interruption from the Turks or from wild native tribes.

Even in the more widely known sites such as Babylon, Lagash and Nippur, archaeologists have hardly done more than scratch the surface so far. More than eight years was spent in excavating at Nippur and about 50,000 tablets were obtained half being retained by the Turkish Government, but much still remains to be done at this site. The opinion has been expressed by archaeologists who have studied the ruins that the most valuable records of the past deposited in the temple at Nippur are still to be found, and this is true also of many other cities.

In the early days of archaeological expeditions the explorers were forced to seek something startling and to find it in as short a time as possible. As a result nearly every expedition spent time on the Ziggurats, or stage towers, which were a part of every ancient Babylonian temple. It was the building of one of these edifices that led to the Biblical story of the tower of Babel. As a general rule the temple proper was situated alongside the Ziggurat. In the temple the kings who ruled over cities and sometimes over the whole region then settled, placed their records of conquests, inscribed on cones and tablets. Here, also, they stored the trophies taken from other monarchs.

When all of these regions are opened to exploration it may be possible for science to determine with great accuracy the period of the world's first civilization. At present there are many differences of opinion on this point, but nearly all archaeologists admit that man has been civilized for at least 7,000 years; that is to say, he had become more than a mere hunter at least 5,000 years before Christ; had learned how to build cities, and had started the development of writing, music, sculpture and the other arts. Some leaders in the field are inclined to believe that systematic exploration will trace the history of early peoples back to a point from 10,000 to 14,000 years before Christ. One of the strongest reasons for this belief lies in the chronological lists found in many sites, in which early Babylonian historians attempted to record the reigns of various kings.

Dr. Langdon expressed the opinion some years ago that the world's first library of cuneiform writing on clay tablets would be found at Ur of the Chaldees, mentioned in the Scriptures as the ancestral home of the prophet Abraham. A little work has been done at this site, but the great storehouses have not even been touched. Archaeologists also are particularly interested in various sites to the south, toward the head of the Persian Gulf, such as Lagash, now known as Telloh, and Umma, the modern name of which is Jukha. Undoubtedly systematic exploration will reveal many new wonders of a people—the Sumerians—whose existence was doubted less than fifty years ago by some of the world's leading archaeologists.

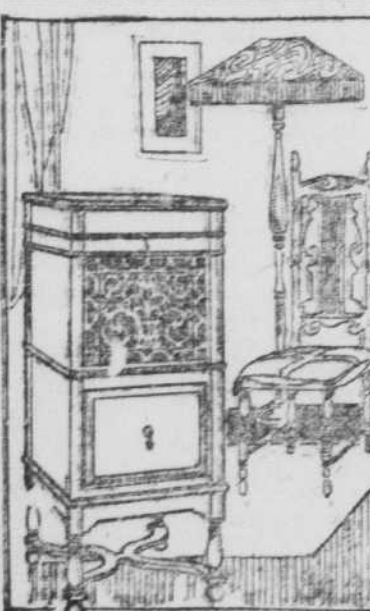

Heneker, D.C.L., and his charming family, when many guests were entertained, cheery open fires blazed in the spacious drawing room, there were dinners and dances, and the sound of young voices in gay laughter, when soon will be heard the hum of machinery and the voices of busy workers.

Dr. Heneker, who was commissioner of the British American Land Company, chancellor of Bishop's College, and occupied a prominent position in the community, returned to England a number of years ago, and his death occurred there. His wife and daughter have also passed away, and Major Fred Heneker was killed after gallantly serving his country in the recent great struggle and giving up his life. The only surviving members of the family are Mr. R. T. Heneker, K.C., Montreal, and General Sir William Heneker, K.C., who has had a most distinguished career.

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CLEVER LINES OF HOPWOOD FARCE WENT OVER BIG

"Fair and Warmer" Was Enthusiastically Received—Cleverness of Comedy Saved Cast from Mediocrity.

A model husband and a wife who presents his eternal calm; a gay Lethbridge; a Mystic Shrine; some advice; such is the stuff of which the modern farce is made, and such are the ingredients which go to make up "Fair and Warmer," which "went over big" at J. L. Majesty's Theatre, before a packed house on Saturday evening.

Yet, such is the humor of Avery Hopwood, such is the cleverness of the lines, and such the delightfully developed situations, that even portrayed by a company which hardly measured up to the standard which the farce deserves, "Fair and Warmer" is one of the greatest comedies of its type now playing on the American stage.

The threadlike plot, on which is hung the bits of choice cleverness, is the well-told tale of a model husband, and a wife who is dissatisfied "because no other woman wants him." In the apartment above is a young couple, the male partner of which makes weekly visits to "the Mystic Shrine," while his better half remains at home.

Said husband advises his troubled friend below to "keep your wife guessing," as the only way to hold her.

Enter then, the mouse-like wife of the Mystic Shrine, and the gay husband of one and wife of the other having left, the two quiet little bodies decide to "show them." Follows then, a scene which is one of the best sustained bits of comedy in modern farce, where the two mix cocktails of such varied ingredients that the audience actually feels woozy from contemplating the terrible mess thereof. The returning husband and wife find their respective soused spouses together, and the act comes to an end amid the usual spicy complications.

Here also ends the plot, but the third act carries on so well the cleverly worked up action, and contains so many new and uproarious situations, that the playwright is pardoned for his rather obvious padding. Denouement, of course, follows further complications, and the curtain falls with the model husband reinstated in the good graces of his better half.

Not a very markedly original or hugely amusing plot, perhaps, yet the delightful cleverness of lines, which would seem naughtiness in print, but are only innocently chuckleable from the stage, make "Fair and Warmer" a farce which stands out among rather a large collection of mediocre follow-ups.

As to the cast, it may be said that the lines saved them from third-rate mediocrity. None of them could be picked out as having great ability, yet scarcely could any company have failed to get over the humor of those lines. As the model husband, Anthony Blair works hard. The mouse-like wife is played by Florence Macerlin, who is a dainty, Dresden-china sort of a little person, and whose portrayal of her role is acceptable, if never great. Pearl Kincaid, as the other wife, is the weakest member of the cast, her characterization lacking finish and poise. Other members hold up their ends in a fairly effective manner.

Strange Story Is Told About Lord Lansdowne And His Famous Letters

STARTLING revelations are to be made now that peace is signed. Soon the world is to hear the inside of the Lusitania investigation regarding which the most extraordinary tales went about. If there is any inside story about Kitchener, his mission to Russia, and his tragic death on the Hampshire, that, too, will doubtless come forth. Many secret things will be cleared up, many mysterious events explained.

The following tale may be one of these revelations, but it sounds suspiciously like an after-the-war yarn and should be discounted as such: A Canadian lately returned from England brings a curious tale concerning the sensational letters to the press with which Lord Lansdowne electrified the world in the spring of 1918, and which letters brought a storm of execrations upon the head of that venerable peer. If the tale told by a highly placed British official in the sanctuary of a West End London club is to be credited, Lord Lansdowne was simply a martyr, and not the pacifist for which the world branded him.

It is well known that a ring of powerful families wield enormous influence in British politics. Their representatives hold high places both in the House of Lords and in the Commons. And in the last analysis it is this strong clique with its ramifications and affiliations which decides great questions of policy. Lord Lansdowne and Mr. Arthur Balfour are said to be very prominent among its members. Well, about the time the great Hun drive

was sweeping back the allies and it looked as though the Americans had come in too late, when the British Army Council was actually debating the possibilities of having to give up either Paris or the Channel ports, matters were pretty desperate. With Paris in German hands the French, gallant as they proved themselves, might have thought seriously about giving up the struggle. With the Channel ports in Hun hands Britain would have been terribly menaced, and the war protracted for possibly years. So it was thought by well-informed military men who even at that late date had not perceived the feat of clay on which the still formidable German Colossus was standing. Things looked bad then.

At this juncture, so the story goes, a meeting of the great family party, patriots one and all, was held, and it was resolved to test public opinion. Germany, for all her successes, would have eagerly snatched at a suitable offer of peace. This would have meant a return to the pre-war status for all the belligerent nations. Germany might even have given Belgium a good round sum to save her wounds.

Did the war-weary people of Britain want peace on these terms, or were they united in their desire to fight it out to the end? That was the question to be decided. Someone must ask the question, and ask it in a very carefully guarded manner. It would never have done to debate such a matter in Parliament. The public pulse had to be tested. So it was resolved to test the sentiment of the people by a letter in the press, written by a highly placed Briton. Two names were said to have been put forward—those of Lansdowne and Balfour. Lansdowne then, without a moment's hesitation, volunteered to write the letter. He pointed out that his career was at an end, whereas Balfour was one of the strong men on whom the Empire was relying. Hence Lansdowne willingly became the goat and sacrificed his name and fame to find which way the wind blew, to discover, by raising a controversy, whether the people of Britain wanted peace at once or a fight to the knock-out.

Canadians will recall the furious wave of indignation aroused by publication of Lansdowne's first letter and the amazement that even he, for all his reputation as a former statesman, should have gone so far after this and a succeeding apparently pacifist effusion. Lansdowne's letters certainly read like the cowardly whines of a reactionary old aristocrat who feared that the war would end in Britain's defeat, in revolution, and in the sweeping away of the British upper classes, with all their lands and riches and privileges. But many people in London at that time thought they saw some strong backing behind the letter. Else how would the writer dare, and how would he escape punishment?

SOLDIERS' BOARD RECEIVES GREAT MANY LETTERS

Labor Question is Gone into at Session of the Board Today— Fifty Thousand in Canada Out of Work at Present.

OTTAWA, ONT., Sept. 29.—At the opening of this morning's session of the special committee of the Soldiers' Civil Re-establishment, there was a large number of communications on hand. Hon. J. A. Calder thought letters were coming in such large number that the reading of all of them would seriously hamper the work of the committee. Mr. Calder suggested that as many of these were coming from individuals and societies, they might be turned over to a sub-committee, which would judge as to that should receive attention of the full committee. Many of the letters, Mr. Calder said, could go directly to department heads as they dealt with routine matters in connection with the work of the D.S.C.R. or Land Settlement Board. It was decided to refer all letters to the committee on printing, Messrs. Morphy, Arthur and Copp.

Mr. C. G. MacNeil, of the G. W. V. A., will be consulted by the committee in regard to the various communications.

Bryce M. Stewart, director of employment service, Labor Department, was the first witness called. He said one or more representatives of the D. S. C. R. was in each of the employment offices in Canada to meet the needs of returned soldiers. These officers are maintained by the operation of the Provincial Governments, Federal Department of Labor and the Department of Soldiers' Civil Re-establishment.

The cost of the Federal Government to date for administration from Ottawa amounted to \$60,000. In addition to this the provinces will expend \$200,000 this year of which fifty per cent. will be refunded by the Dominion. The total estimated expenditure for the Department of Labor to the end of the fiscal year is \$300,000.

From March 1, to September 6, 152,886 men were placed in regular employment. These were both soldiers and civilians and more than 65,000 were returned men.

Mr. Stewart explained the workings of the "clearing" system in each province, whereby labor is transferred as needed, by means of special transportation rates. There are also interprovincial clearing houses which equalize employment conditions in the different provinces.

The Labor Department bears the cost of the latter system.

Mr. Stewart said it was hard to estimate the winter employment outlook. He feared the unemployment this winter would be more serious than at any time since the war began.

The Labor Department is now working on a plan to find out what work is likely to be closed during the winter. There is little worry about skilled labor, but the unskilled workers must be provided for. Some 50,000 people in Canada are now unemployed and most of these are in the cities.

The farm labor problem is one in itself. Many farmers do not want their men to stay after threshing is over, particularly in the Western Provinces.

UNION LEADER CONFIDENT THAT MEN WILL WIN

LONDON, Sept. 29.—J. H. Thomas, secretary of the Railwaymen's Union, in an interview today said:

"I observe with regret that an attempt is being made to turn this fight into a revolution, despite all my efforts to limit it to the form of a labor dispute. These efforts to transform its character into a revolutionary movement may succeed. I am not responsible for this. The railroad men are neither Bolshevik or anarchists, but know what they are fighting for and are more determined than ever. Let those who are fanning the flames be prepared for the results of their efforts."

"We shall not be beaten. No avenue of settlement will be missed by us. Neither dignity nor pride will prevent us from settling what I know to be a terrible business. I have no fear of the result."

WEAKNESS WAS NOTED ON CHICAGO CORN EXCHANGE

CHICAGO, Sept. 29.—Weakness developed in the corn market today as a result of lack of support. Selling was only of a scattered sort, but shorts had covered freely on Saturday, and the customary demand from them was absolutely absent today.

Foreign exchange rates tended to further depress corn, and also did lower quotations on hogs. Opening prices, which started from a cent off to 3/4 cent advance, with December \$1.25 to \$1.26 and May \$1.24 to \$1.24 1/4, were followed by a material setback all around.

Oats fell with corn. After opening unchanged to 1/4 cent off, including December at 70 1/2 to 71 cents, the market underwent a decided sag. Provisions were dragged down by the action of grain and hogs. There was no aggressive buying.

FOUR TRAGIC DEATHS AT QUEBEC OVER WEEK-END

QUEBEC, Sept. 29.—The week started with four tragic deaths in Quebec. This morning Wilfrid Girard, 56 years old, was instantly killed when caught by a shaft in a tannery on Arago street. This was his first day's work there.

Yesterday, Mrs. O. Laurent, from France, was killed under a wrecked auto near St. Foy.

Yesterday also Dr. L. B. De La Bruere, of Shawinigan, drowned at Lake St. Charles when his canoe upset. Yesterday an old man named Fradet died of injuries inflicted by a motor car on St. John street.

MINERS' DEMANDS MEANS DOUBLING PRICE OF COAL

Six Hour Day and Five Day Week Means Actual Reduction of Hours of From Forty-eight to Twenty-five Hours.

(Associated Press Despatch)
WASHINGTON, Sept. 29.—The present cost of coal to the consumer will be doubled if demands formulated by the United Mine Workers are allowed, a statement issued yesterday by the National Coal Association declared. The estimate of the effect of the demands of the miners said they would add a billion dollars to the cost of coal during the coming year. A six-hour day, it says, means approximately five hours in the working places, while the five day week on that basis means an actual reduction from forty-eight hours a week, the present schedule, to about twenty-five hours a week, "in the face of the fact that we are now short of coal in this country and throughout the world, and that increased and uninterrupted coal production is vital."

"On top of this, they demand a six per cent. increase in wages," the statement says. "The effect of these demands, if granted, would be to almost double the present cost of mining coal."

PARIS, Sept. 29.—(Reuter)—The French aviator Poulet departs on his attempted flight to Australia on the morning of October 1. In an interview with a Reuter correspondent, Poulet said he had flown ten thousand kilometres since July, getting to know his machine. He spoke appreciatively of the British authorities, which have requested consuls at landing places en route to render every assistance.

GUN MEN STAGED FATAL BATTLE IN N. Y. TODAY

Safes in Seven Cafes Were Blown Open at Same Time—Two Men Were Killed.

(Associated Press Despatch)
NEW YORK, Sept. 29.—Two men were killed and one wounded in a revolver battle by gunmen on the East Side, and seven safes in one Canal street building were blown open by burglars early yesterday. An automobile conveyed the gunmen to Catharine and Madison streets about two a.m., and three men, revolvers in hand, leaped from it and ran to the corner, where they opened fire on three others standing there. One of the gangsters was arrested at pistol point by a patrolman arriving on the scene during the shooting. The others escaped in the car. Two of the men attacked were killed instantly, their bodies being riddled with bullets. Other arrests followed in Brooklyn, where the police claim to have traced the murder car.

In a building in Canal street, about the same time as the East Side shooting, burglars dynamited seven safes. The police made one arrest later in the day on "suspicion of burglary."

SGT.-MAJOR MORLEY DEAD.

(Associated Press Despatch)
VANCOUVER, B. C., Sept. 29.—The death occurred here at the General Hospital of Sergeant Major J. Morley, formerly of Winnipeg, where he was connected with the 90th Rifles. He was one of the best shots in Canada, and had been at Bixley several times. He died from pneumonia.

LABOR CONGRESS URGES FORTY- FOUR HOUR WEEK

Pressure is to Be Brought to Bear on Both Provincial and Federal Governments.

HAMILTON, ONT., Sept. 29.—The remarkable ability of members of the Dominion Trades and Labor Congress to deal speedily with resolutions, controversial and otherwise, Saturday when scores were disposed of at the closing sessions of what was probably the most important convention in the history of organized labor in Canada. Well over one hundred resolutions were introduced during the week and owing to pressure of routine business the majority of these were left over until the last day, and the delegates, after five days of strenuous work, seemed only too willing to shout "question, question," when Fred Bankroft, chairman of the resolutions committee, submitted them for consideration.

Labor executives and officials throughout the Dominion were urged to bring pressure to bear on the Dominion and provincial governments to establish a minimum wage and a 44-hour week. The executive council were instructed to prepare a statement regarding the cost of living for submission to the Board of Commerce, and in this connection the Congress went on record in favor of the establishment of co-operative societies. The delegates protested against military intervention in countries which, since the war, have "changed their social structure," and also expressed themselves in favor of the self-determination of nations. This action was embodied in a resolution submitted for the one introduced by George Armstrong of Winnipeg in which recognition of the soviet form of government administering affairs in the best interests of the working class was advocated.

The right of unions to strike was dealt with by the committee, a resolution being carried which pointed out that the logical development of united action in the use of economic power is within the international trades union movement, where ample scope is provided for united action of various trades with common interests and with the strength of the international unions behind them. The right of free speech, free assembly and a free press was demanded.

Indicating that there is a general demand on the part of workers throughout the Dominion to take advantage of the federal housing scheme, but declaring that its restriction and guarantees demanded by the Federal Government, and the varying requirements of Provincial Governments make it practically impossible for workers to acquire a loan, the special committee on housing laid before the assembly a number of suggestions which received unanimous endorsement.

The suggestions recommended establishment of a system of loans by the Government available through chartered banks at a low rate of interest, the appointment of a commission where it is desired, to operate in the building of homes; grants to groups of workers desirous of co-operating for the purchase of buildings; adoption of a system that will expedite the placing of loans for land or buildings; taking of measures to correct evils arising out of the rising unearned increments on urban and rural properties, and preventing of speculation in land for housing purposes; granting of power to housing commissions to build and sell houses at cost, and to make advances to workers desirous of building their own homes, and the erection of homes by the Government where necessary to be sold on conditions similar to those contained in making of loans.

The report also suggests that the same system be applied to the centralization, distribution and purchasing of war supplies should now be applied to the acquiring of land, supplies and labor.

MANY SHIPS ANCHORED AS A RESULT OF STRIKE

(Associated Press Despatch)
DETROIT, Mich., Sept. 29.—Twenty two ore carriers, including many of the largest ships on the Great Lakes, were anchored in the Detroit River last night because of the closing of lower lake ports, caused by the closing of the steel mills by the strike of steel and iron workers. All dockage room at Cleveland, Ashland and other Lake Erie ports is reported occupied, while it is also understood the strike has prevented removal of ore from the docks. The anchored ships are awaiting orders from their owners.

METAL WORKERS' STRIKE IN BERLIN SPREADING

(Associated Press Despatch)
BERLIN, Sept. 29.—The metal workers' strike is spreading, and twenty-four thousand out of sixty-six thousand men are now locked out. Sixty-one firms are involved and 115 more are preparing for the strike.

ENGINE DRIVERS. Men Who Have Travelled Some Millions of Miles.

TOOK PLANES WHEN THEY MISSED CHANNEL BOAT ON ACCOUNT OF THE STRIKE

(Associated Press Despatch)
HAYRE, Sept. 29.—A British hydro-airplane, with six passengers who missed the Channel boat on account of the strike in England, became separated from two other machines in a snow squall over the Channel last night and arrived here this morning. The fate of the other machines is unknown.

THEATRE WORKERS ARE WILLING TO ARBITRATE

(Associated Press Despatch)
PARIS, Sept. 29.—Directors of theatres and the Federation of Theatre Workers have accepted offers of arbitration from the Government with a view of settling the theatre strike.

The strike of stable boys at nearby tracks has not been settled, and the tracks at St. Cloud scheduled for this morning have been called off.

Steel Corporation was very little affected this morning by the strike which has been called from Pittsburgh, and there was no trace of disorder at the entrances to the various plants when the shifts changed at 8 a.m. and again at 7.30 o'clock.

Officials of the company said that virtually the same number of employees reported in the various departments as worked last week, except that a number of machinists left with their tools. The latter were said by the company officials to be mostly of the floating order, who had been employed during the war.

Advices from Harrisburg said every department of the Steelton plant of the Bethlehem Steel Company is operating this morning with but slightly impaired forces.

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SHERIFF LOST IN NINE HOUR FIGHT WITH LARGE MOB

Effort Made By Mob to Lynch Mayor, Who Lies in Critical Condition.

OMAHA, Neb., Sept. 29.—William Brown, colored, alleged to have assaulted a white girl, was dragged from the county jail at 11 o'clock last night and hanged to an electric pole, following a struggle of nine hours by an immense mob to wrest him from Sheriff Michael Clark. The sheriff and his deputies held the fort in the top storey of the court house, where is located the jail, with a hundred prisoners, until the building, to which the mob had set fire, became a seething mass of flames and he was forced to submit.

The riots, which are the most serious in Omaha's history, resulted from the attempt of the mob to lynch Brown, who was charged with an assault a few days ago on a white girl, Agnes Lobeck.

The rioting began in the vicinity of the Douglas county court house. By 8 o'clock in the evening the situation had got quite beyond the local police force, and a request was made to the War Department to send troops from Fort Crook and Fort Omaha to the city.

Troops started from both Fort Omaha and Fort Crook at 11 o'clock. Before they could reach the city, a patrol wagon was stopped by the mob, overturned and burned. The mob appeared to be bent on still more depredations.

Just after dark a crowd began sacking a downtown gun and ammunition store, the police being powerless to intervene for the time being. The crowd reached large proportions during the evening, every street within a radius of four or five blocks being jammed with humanity. Two negro policemen who were among the officers rushed to the scene were badly beaten by the crowd, one of them receiving dangerous injuries. Several other officers received serious but not dangerous injuries.

An attempt to lynch Mayor Edward P. Smith was made by the mob which later hanged William Brown, a negro. The Mayor is said to be in a critical condition at a hospital, although his physicians decline to say just how seriously he is injured. A rope was thrown around his neck and he was pulled off the ground twice before two police officers succeeded in cutting the rope and getting him into an automobile and away from the mob.

Ancient Furnace Discovered.

A lady member of the Cumberland and Westmoreland Antiquarian Society of England has had the good fortune to discover what is believed to be a Roman bloomery, or ancient smelting furnace. It was found in a drain to the place by the work of moles, which recently exposed some of the remains, and again later by the burning of the whins formerly concealing the hearth and other features of the bloomery, near Forest How.

By some exploration with a spade, she traced the foundations of a large hearth, twelve yards in diameter, and a number of heaps of cinders, slag and ore; and she also turned up specimens of Roman tiles, with pottery, slag and hematite. The size of the hearth of the Forest How bloomery marks it as quite different from the ordinary north-country medieval iron furnaces, which run from seven to nine or ten feet in diameter, for the one just found is twelve yards across. This site appears to be worth further explorations and probably money for that purpose will be found.
