French referendum could bring overhaul

PARIS (Reuters) — President Charles de Gaulle has announced his long-rumored plan for a referendum which could simultaneously introduce a radical overhaul in French local government and strip the sometimes-hostile National Senate of many of its present powers.

Observers saw the move, announced Sunday, as a politically-astute manoeuvre lumping together two apparently dissociated issues in a single plebiscite.

There have been years of sub-

dued agitation for the regional reforms and approval of such measures in the dual-issue referendum would automatically reduce the status of the National Senate to a purely consultative level.

The Senate, a traditionalist body often spurned and rejected under the Fifth Republic, has tended to be hostile toward the Gaullists and Gaullist programs.

De Gaulle has argued that the Senate heavily weighted in favor of rural areas, has ceased

to be representative of an increasingly urbanized and industrialized nation.

But the Senate also has tended to reflect the views of rural Frenchmen who never have been particularly pro-Gaullist.

TEST HIS STANDING

The referendum also gives de Gaulle a chance to measure his public standing following his recent statement that he intends to remain in power until at least the end of his present term in 1972.

The effect of the proposed reforms, which would create regional councils for each of the 21 French provinces, would be to transfer to the provinces a large slice of regional administration currently conducted in Paris.

The councils, made up of municipal and general councillors, delegates from economic, social and university circles, and National Assembly deputies, would assume control of certain services in their regions.

Part of the national budget would be allocated to the councils for regional projects such as schools and roads without consultation with the Paris government.

De Gaulle, announcing the referendum in a speech at the Breton farming centre of Quimper Sunday, described the proposals as "the great reform which we must bring to France."

Although he gave no date for the referendum, political observers here regard March 23 as the most probable time.

Deplores it

LONDON (CP) — The Sunday Telegraph says in an editorial that "Gen. de Gaulle, who fomented separatism in Quebec, naturally deplores it in Britain."

"He is consistent only in audacity," The Telegraph continues in a comment on the French president's visit to Brittany.

A French cabinet minister backs Que.

TORONTO (CP) — The Star says a French cabinet minister told a Paris television audience on the state-run network Friday night Quebec has the right to sign agreements with foreign countries in the field of industry.

Jean de Lipowski, secretary of state for foreign affairs, said France "is interested in Quebec partly for its 'prodigious resources of the rare metals which are indispensable in the race for progress of the 20th century. He mentioned uranium as a Quebec resource."

Under a treaty signed with France in 1965, the Canadian government permitted Quebec to enter into cultural and educational agreements international-

ly. Industry was not included in the subjects permitted.

Asked how France can co-operate with Quebec without co-operating with the rest of Canada, Mr. de Lipowski replied:

"Quebec is a province, but since there is a federal statute, it is also a state."

"It has an assembly elected by universal suffrage; it has a parliament, a government and ministries, according to the Canadian, directly with foreign countries."

"This is notably the case for the ministry for education. Quebec's ministry of national education has the right to deal directly with a country like France and to sign agreements as does the industry ministry..."

Rockets hit Arab spot

Two Israeli jets slammed a rocket barrage into a suspected Arab guerrilla position inside Jordan today, the Israeli army announced.

The Israelis said they were sent over Jordan shortly after an army patrol was fired on near the border settlement of Neve Ur, nine miles south of the Sea of Galilee. For about 15 minutes the jets strafed the desert Jordanian village of Mansiya from which the army said the patrol was fired on.

No Israeli casualties were reported. It was the first time Israel has reported a jet attack on Jordan since Jan. 16.

The Lebanese-Israeli border also flared briefly when small arms fire was directed from Lebanon at the Israeli settlement of Zar'it, 12 miles east of the Mediterranean and a few hundred yards from the border, the Israeli army said.

An Israeli spokesman said that the Lebanese fire was returned and there were no casualties in the settlement.

In the occupied Gaza Strip, scene of violent rioting Sunday, an explosive charge demolished a small railway bridge near Rafiah.

GIRLS WERE INJURED

About 100 Arab schoolgirls were injured in the Strip Sunday

when Israeli police charged with nightsticks to break up a three-hour riot involving 4,000 girls. The girls were protesting the jailing of three Gaza women convicted by an Israeli court of slaying and aiding guerrillas.

Newsweek magazine reported, meanwhile, that Egyptian President Gamal Abdel Nasser has made a six-point proposal for

peace with Israel and hinted he might agree to talk directly with the Israelis. Nasser told the magazine the Arab states would agree to a five-point program if Israel would withdraw from the territory it seized from Jordan, Egypt and Syria in the 1967 war.

Nasser offered a declaration of non-belligerence, freedom of

navigation on international waterways, recognition of each middle East country's right to live in peace, a guarantee of territorial integrity within "recognized and secure borders" and a just solution to the Palestine refugee problem.

Nasser's offer followed the lines of the UN Security Council's November 1967 resolution on the Middle East. But Israel refuses to give up the Arab territories—its chief bargaining card—until it has formal peace agreements with the Arab nations and until it negotiates what it considers "recognizes and secure border."

Time magazine reported that the Israeli cabinet has decided to build 30 permanent fortified settlements and three new towns in occupied territory even though this would make a peace settlement with its Arab neighbors more unlikely.

Time said this reflected the thinking of Deputy Premier Yigal Alon, who believes "all intermediate arrangements of the past led to new wars."

"We must take no more risk with our future," he is quoted as saying.

Nixon accepts French proposals for talks

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Nixon has decided to accept a French proposal for early talks among great power representatives at the United Nations on ways to break the deadlock in Middle East peace efforts.

He hopes particularly for parallel action by the Soviet Union.

A reply to the Paris government is due to go out this week. It is expected to make clear that while the United States sees hope in consultations with the Soviet Union, Britain and France, its primary purpose is to move off dead-centre the UN peace-seeking efforts of Swedish Ambassador Gunnar Jarring.

In a related move, Nixon will

send a friendly message to Gamal Abdel Nasser in the near future, replying to a note of congratulations he received from the Egyptian President.

His note will be designed to indicate that if Nasser, as reported, will propose resuming diplomatic relations with the United States he will find Nixon responsive.

Nixon has set in motion a plan to visit several Western European capitals the next two months. He expects to visit Paris, site of the Vietnam peace talks, and meet with President Charles de Gaulle. Other capitals which figure in informed speculation are London, Bonn and Rome.

Chiefs back money issue

WINNIPEG (CP) — Prairie premiers have agreed that fiscal matters should take precedence over constitutional topics at this month's federal-provincial conference.

They also stand together in denouncing changes in estate tax legislation and in demanding that the Official Languages Act be referred to the Supreme Court of Canada.

They found the common ground at a meeting Saturday of the Prairie economic conference which consists of the three premiers—Harry Strom of Alberta, Ross Thatcher of Saskatchewan and Walter Weir of Manitoba.

"The most important thing we accomplished... is that we have agreed to a unified Prairie approach at the constitutional conference," said Premier Thatcher.

All three told reporters they expect to carry more weight at the conference with the rare display of solidarity. They said the Prairies have been overshadowed in the past by Ontario and Quebec.

"We have strong feelings on some basic issues," said Mr. Thatcher. Telegrams on most of their views were sent to Prime Minister Trudeau at the end of the meeting.

BACK WEIR'S STAND

Endorsing the stand of Premier Weir, the council told the prime minister that finance is

the first priority for the Feb. 10-12 conference in Ottawa.

Premier Weir said Friday he had a letter from Prime Minister Trudeau which indicated Manitoba was the only province feeling strongly about fiscal

matters.

A telegram signed by the premiers expressed "the strongest opposition to the (estate tax) changes... proposed without consultation with the provinces." An ultimate result

Quick order

Commons expected to give third reading

OTTAWA (CP) — The Commons is expected to give third reading in quick order today to four non-controversial government bills before returning Tuesday to the problems of western wheat farmers.

MPs will be asked to give final approval to three bills first introduced in the Senate outlining amendments to the Aeronautics Act, the Canada Evidence Act and the Navigable Waters Protection Act as well as third-reading of a Commons bill amending the Veterans' Land Act.

The veterans legislation includes a section which would free the interest rate, now fixed by statute, on loans between \$6,000 and \$18,000, to veterans, and follows a pattern set by other government bills intro-

duced this session.

Passage of the four bills would clear the way Tuesday for a return to debate on second reading of a government bill to give interest-free loans to western farmers for damp grain drying operations.

FARMERS SUFFER

Western farmers were hard hit last fall when grain had to be left in the fields long past normal harvesting time owing to wet weather.

The government has been under almost daily attack for its handling of this emergency as well as the wheat-marketing problems faced by farmers.

Western MPs, led by former Conservative prime minister John Diefenbaker, have said the problem should be considered a national emergency

could be the loss of family farms and businesses.

"We urge most strenuously that you and your cabinet colleagues give serious consideration to withholding further action on these proposals pending consultation with the provinces."

They also urged that no changes take place in mining taxes.

Mr. Thatcher said that former finance minister Mitchell Sharp "flatly told premiers and provincial treasurers that before changes in tax measures were introduced, we would be consulted."

He listed four major changes, including the social development tax, which have been introduced without consultation.

He said Finance Minister Benson's handling of the proposed estate tax changes has been a fiasco. The legislation, toned down from original proposals, was introduced in the Commons Friday.

The premiers asked for a court ruling to determine whether the official languages bill is constitutional.

Mr. Thatcher said if Prime Minister Trudeau failed to seek a court ruling, "we will."

He objected to federal civil servants in his province having to be able to speak both languages and to the option of either language in criminal court cases.

News in brief

On fire
TORONTO (CP) — Peter Thomas, 60, of Toronto suffered third-degree burns to nearly half his body early Sunday when he set himself on fire near the home of his estranged wife in north Toronto.

Two unidentified motorists saved Thomas' life by smothering the flames with their coats. Police found an empty gasoline can nearby.

Thomas is in hospital where his condition was described as favorable.

The burning was the second such incident in two days in Toronto.

China may test fire rocket

29 die

At least 29 persons died in accidents in Canada over the weekend, 19 in traffic mishaps.

A survey by The Canadian Press from 6 p.m. local time Friday to late Sunday also showed that seven persons were killed in fires, two died of asphyxiation and one was drowned.

Burst into

TOKYO (Reuters) — Leftwing students burst into the United States Embassy today and hung anti-American signs from the rooftop.

The white banners with black lettering proclaimed "down with U.S. imperialists" and "abolish Japan-U.S. security pact."

Others said "withdraw B-52 bombers from Okinawa" and "support Okinawa general strike tomorrow."

He doubts

VANCOUVER (CP) — Major-General Mattityahu Peled, logistics chief of the Israeli Army during the 1967 six-day Arab-Israeli war, said Sunday he doubts the tense Middle East situation could lead to a third world war.

"I don't expect any settlement, and settlement meaning normal relations of peace and friendship, within my lifetime."

First move

MONTREAL (CP) — The administration at Sir George Williams University may make the first move to end its dispute with students arising out of charges of racism against an assistant professor.

LONDON (AP) — New Western estimates suggest China may test fire a 6,000-mile range rocket in 1969.

These estimates were made known Sunday by Asian and European diplomats who said they are based on intelligence information pooled by several non-Communist countries, including the United States.

The informants reported that, if the Chinese test of an intercontinental ballistic missile proves successful, the Peking government will be able to begin stockpiling the weapons by 1972.

And in 1975, or thereabouts, the Chinese at their present rate of progress should be in a position to deploy 5 or 20 ICBMs.

If these forecasts turn out to be accurate they would denote a three-year gain in China's nuclear weapons program as envisaged in recent times by top American and other authorities.

Red Chinese defector may be in States

THE HAGUE (AP) — The Red Chinese envoy who defected in The Netherlands is believed to be in the United States.

Dutch officials said Liao Hoshu, who was temporary charge d'affaires in The Hague, was flown to Bonn last week for interrogation by the U.S. Central Intelligence Agency about Chinese spying activities in Western Europe. The Dutch said they expected Liao to be flown to the United States Sunday.

West German officials and U.S. sources in Bonn said Sunday they did not know where Liao was.

Former U.S. defence secretary Robert S. McNamara told the north Atlantic Council in mid-December, 1965, the Chinese then had begun work on an ICBM development program.

A Chinese entry into the high-

ly-exclusive long-range missile club would pose far-reaching military and political implications, notably for the United States.

Militarily it could generate stronger pressure for the extension of the limited anti-ballistic missile system already under development in the U.S.

Politically it could generate stronger pressure for ending the policies that have isolated the Chinese giant from the rest of the world.

The latest estimates of China's weapons program have taken into account the Dec. 27 test when the Communist state exploded its eighth nuclear device in the atmosphere.

The diplomats gave these other details of the revised Western appraisal:

—During 1969 too the Chinese are expected to be able to test their intermediate range ballistic missile with the capacity to carry 100 kiloton warheads

Dutch Justice Minister Chf Polak is said to have told the parliamentary justice and foreign affairs committee that Liao "knows an unbelievable lot."

Dutch officials approached Romanian diplomats because they have good contacts in Peking. Two weeks ago at a reception at the Romanian embassy, Liao learned that his family

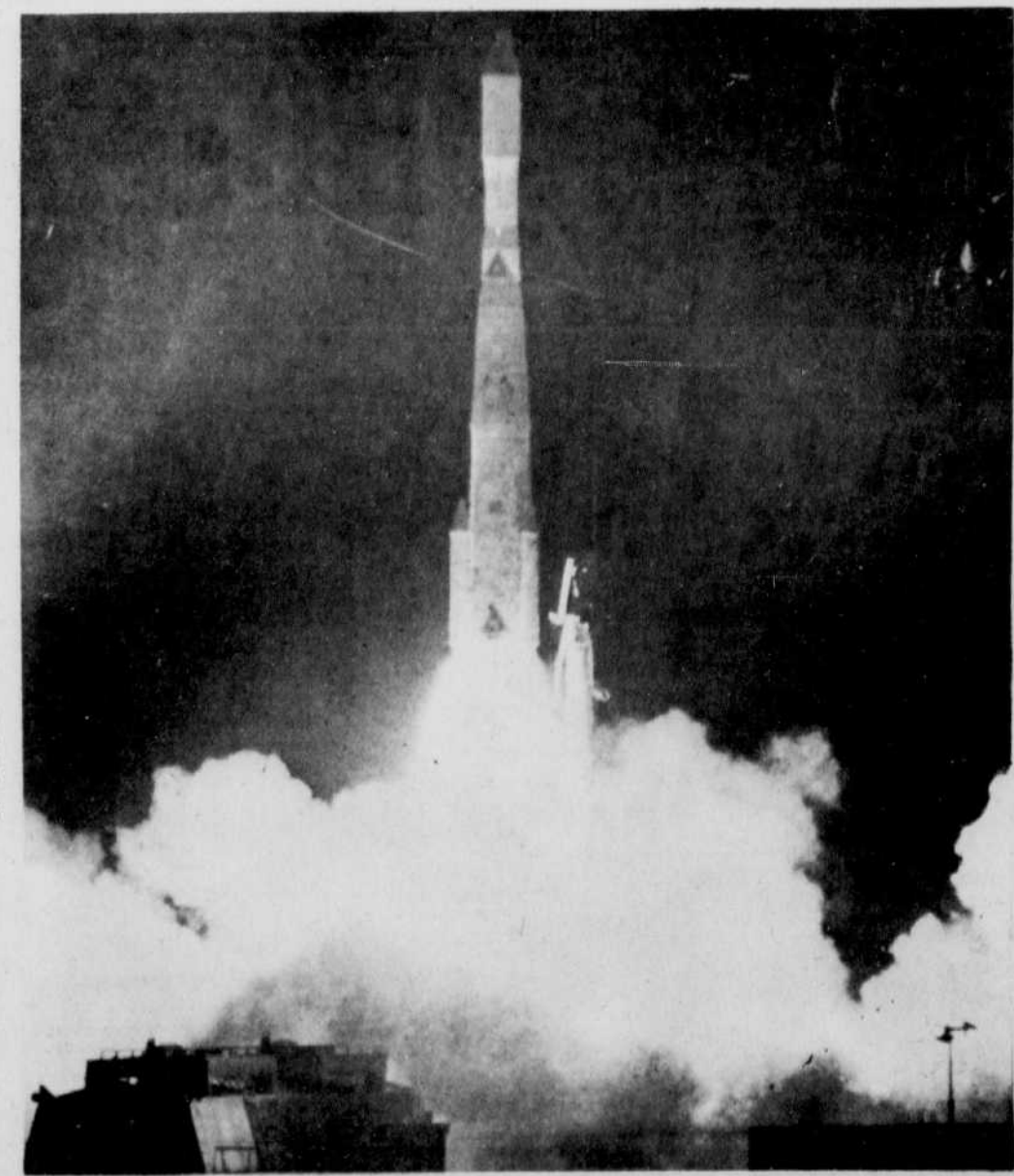
was safe in Hong Kong.

In one of his routine visits to the Dutch foreign ministry several months ago, Liao indicated he wanted to defect as soon as his wife and children were safely out of China. He told the Dutch he had been ordered home to account for the death in The Hague in 1966 of a Chinese scientist said to have sold a secret nerve gas formula to U.S. agents.

The movie column

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — From an office on S. Beverly Drive, amid smart dress shops and talent agencies, Argentine-born Lalo Schiffrin pours forth a seemingly endless supply of music, from rock to symphony.

Schiffrin is the hottest new composer in films today. His album of themes for Mission: Impossible won him two Grammys from the recording academy and a gold record, having sold more than 250,000 copies. His score for Cool Hand Luke netted an Oscar nomination.

Among his other recent scores: The Fox, The Brotherhood, Bullitt, Hell in the Pacific, Coogan's Bluff.

He now is working on the score for 20th Century-Fox's Che. Other projects include a jazz-and-symphony piece commissioned by the Los Angeles Philharmonic.

PASSED UP LAW

Except for a number of happenstances, Schiffrin, 37, might now be practising law in his native Buenos Aires. That was what his father, concert master of the Buenos Aires philharmonic, planned for him. But young Lalo had other ideas.

During his law studies, he discovered jazz. His musical ability won him a scholarship at the Paris Conservatory of Music, where he studied classics by day and played in jazz cellars by night.

Returning to Argentina, Lalo continued combining the two forms, composing serious music for films and TV and leading a jazz band as well.

"My whole life changed when 'Dizzy' Gillespie came to Argentina on a state department tour in 1956," he declared. "He liked my work, and I joined him as pianist-arranger-composer. Actually, I had been thinking of coming to the United States anyway. Dizzy made it happen sooner."

His work with Gillespie, Stan Getz and Count Basie for MGM records brought him scoring assignments for such films as Rhinoceros and Joy House. Then he served a year at Universal, scoring Alfred Hitchcock Presents, The Virginian and other TV series to gain experience in a variety of mediums. His training paid off with The Cincinnati Kid, his first important film score.

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Strike-plagued hospital in Windsor to cut services

WINDSOR — (Staff) — It was learned this weekend the St. Louis de Windsor will be transformed into a public hospital for chronically ill patients.

Paul-Emile de Bellefeuille, general-director of the hospital confirmed this morning that the hospital is starting the transformation procedures today but he said it might take until May before the transformation is completed.

When transformed, the hospital will be without an emergency room, an outpatient room, without X-ray and laboratory facilities.

The transformation will force the hospital to dismiss about 15 of its employees.

The news of the transformation was received Friday in a letter from Dr. Jacques Gelin, provincial deputy Health Minister.

St. Louis Hospital has been operated as a general hospital for the past 15 years.

Both the employees and the administration are planning to protest the government's decision.

Compton's Louis St. Laurent 87

QUEBEC (CP) — Former prime minister Louis St. Laurent celebrated his 87th birthday in the intimate company of close friends and relatives.

Canada's leader between 1948 and 1957 was offered gifts and good wishes at a dinner at his Quebec City home.

His son Renault said his father is in "fairly good" health.

In recent months, the employees and administration have agreed on nothing. Strikes have forced the hospital to evacuate its patients and offer only emergency service.

Health Minister Jean-Paul Cloutier made the decision to make the transformation.

It was either to be transformed into a hospital for the aged or the chronically ill.

Mr. Cloutier chose the latter.

The former Liberal prime minister, who was born in the Eastern Townships village of Compton Feb. 1, 1882, has spoken only rarely in public in recent years.

In a lecture on national unity at Sir George Williams University in Montreal in 1961, he urged Canadians to endorse bilingualism, which—intelligently applied—could become a practical as well as a legal characteristic of our society.

He receives occasional visits from old friends in the political world from all across Canada.

He spends most of his days reading periodicals, autobiographies and newspapers.

Although he entered politics reluctantly at the insistence of the late Prime Minister Mackenzie King, Mr. St. Laurent became Canada's 12th prime minister and one of the most popular men to occupy that office.

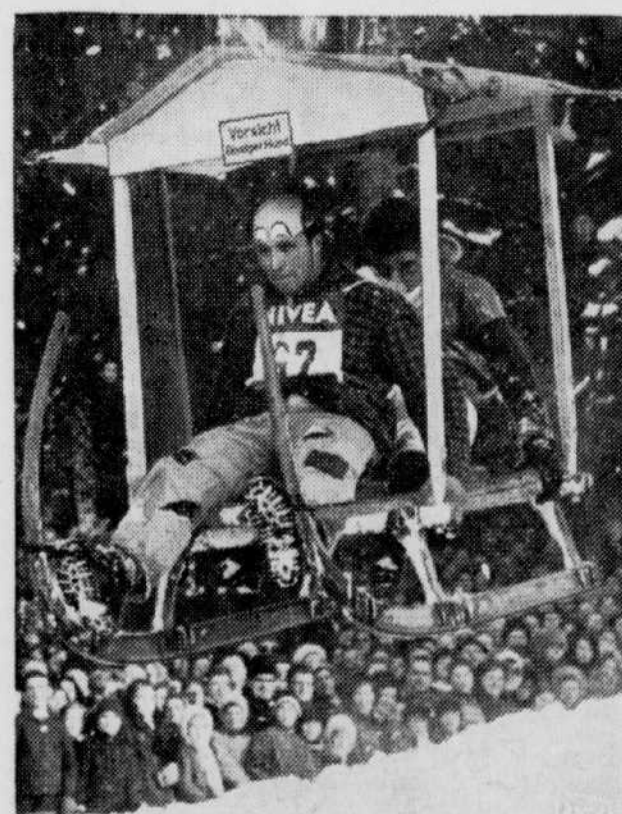

LAVAL, Que. (CP) — The problem of survival for French-Canadians "no longer exists," whatever happens to Quebec, Postmaster-General Kierans said Saturday night.

"Survival now is a negative and sterile objective which should no longer be evoked," he said in a speech to the Chamber of Commerce here.

"It is a battle of the past which has already been won." The problem now is one of building a society where everyone can fulfil himself in all fields. The French-Canadian wanted to occupy the place he considered to be rightly his, whether in business, politics, university circles, labor or art.

"This he has already achieved, and there is nothing that can preclude him from occupying more and more important places."

Mr. Kierans said there now is an exodus of capital from Quebec, although its extent is not known. He urged his audience, as French-speaking businessmen, to maintain an atmosphere of trust in the province and to organize on a "truly competitive basis."

Retired Lowney president

Edmund Littler charged with fraud

MONTREAL (CP) — Edmund Littler, former president of Walter M. Lowney Co. Ltd. of Sherbrooke, will appear Feb. 19 for preliminary hearing on three fraud charges and three conspiracy charges arising from

an alleged million-dollar stock transaction. At Littler's arraignment Friday, Judge Andre Fabien set bail at \$20,000 cash or \$40,000 property.

The charges allege that Littler conspired with Keith Elson, S. G. Bickley and "others unknown" between Nov. 1, 1967, and May 16, 1968.

Details of the alleged frauds and the amounts of money involved were not given, but the charges allege that the frauds involved a total of 31,196 shares

of the Lowney company. Asked by Judge Fabien about the amount of money involved, Fred Kaufman — one of four defence lawyers representing the accused — said this depended on the market value on a given day but would be in the neighborhood of \$1,000,000.

Victims of the alleged frauds were identified as Commercial Trust Co. Ltd., 5,400 shares; J. W. McConnell Foundation Inc., 14,996 shares; and St. Lawrence Sugar Refineries Ltd., 10,800 shares.

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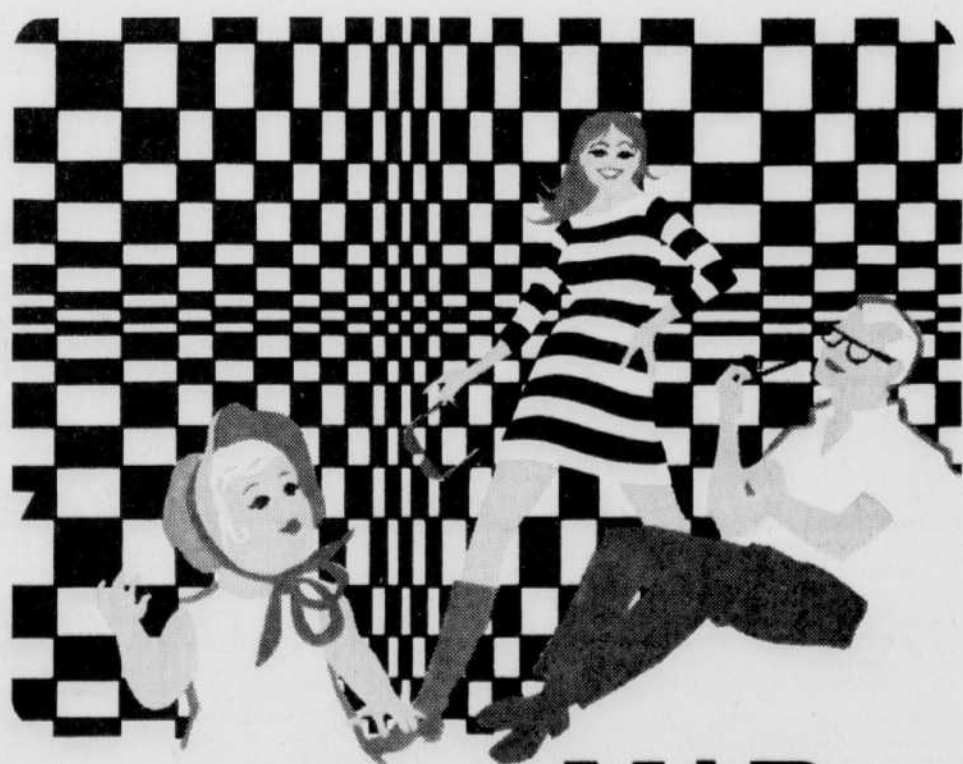

Allen Dulles US super-spy

WASHINGTON (AP) — Allen W. Dulles, who directed the United States Central Intelligence Agency for eight years until retiring in 1961, died of flu and pneumonia Wednesday night. He was 75.

The top-secret agency stirred whirlwinds of controversy during his tenure with the downing of an American U-2 spy plane over Russia in 1960 and the disastrous 1961 invasion of Cuba's Bay of Pigs, masterminded by the CIA.

Dulles took it stoically. "Obviously, you cannot tell of operations that go along well," he said. "Those that go badly generally speak for themselves."

Tall and robust, with a white moustache, Dulles was once described as "one of the world's most sophisticated travellers in the shadowland of intelligence and espionage."

Dulles established his credentials as mater of the craft during the Second World War.

ESTABLISHES CONTACTS

Based in Switzerland for the CIA's predecessor, the Office of Strategic Services (OSS), he established a network of informants throughout Europe. His contacts reached into Hitler's high command. Thus:

—He knew in advance of the plot against Hitler's life in July, 1944.

He was the first source of reports about Nazi rocket experiments in Peenemunde and about V-2 rocket bases being set up to bombard England.

Working through high Wehrmacht and Gestapo contacts, he negotiated the surrender of nearly 1,000,

Where dogs chase 250-pound cats

VICTORIA (CP) — The chase of a cat by a dog in British Columbia can provide some of the best, most rugged and most dangerous hunting available in North America.

That's if the cat is a 250-pound puma and the dog is a carefully trained cougar hound.

The puma, or cougar as the animal is generally known here, still thrives in mountainous B.C. where three-quarters of the population lives on five per cent of the province's 359,200-square-mile area.

A roamer of the wilderness, the cougar is officially classed as a game animal, meaning control and harvest of them is left primarily to sportsmen.

But the actual kill each year is relatively small, since it takes a careful balance of man and dog to hunt the big "cat" successfully.

The number of cougar reported killed in B.C. in 1968 was 1,406, compared with an estimated 70,000 deer taken.

Although indigenous to the Western Hemisphere (the term "puma" is derived from the original South American Inca name), the predator is disappearing from many of

the populated parts of North America where it is known variously as deer tiger, Mexican lion, panther or mountain lion. Adult cougars can weigh up to 275 pounds and stand more than two feet high. A length of nine feet is not uncommon.

POPULARITY GROWS

Officials at the B.C. wildlife branch here say cougar hunting is increasing in popularity and the animal "is highly sought after by sportsmen."

More and more people are going in for cougar as a big-game animal.

Some avid cougar hunters keep and train their own hounds. More and more hunters are turning to hiring qualified big-game guides who keep their own cougar hounds.

"A person doesn't have to have dogs to hunt cougar—but he'd be wasting his time," said one expert.

Most cougar hounds are a combination of breeds, and few successful animals are thoroughbreds. The qualities sought are not exclusive to any one breed. No two dogs, even from the same litter, will perform alike when it comes to tracking and treeing

the big cat.

Ted Rutherglen, a provincial conservation officer stationed in Nelson, B.C., and a man with extensive cougar-hunting experience, says he personally favors the black and tan, a coonhound.

Rutherglen, who has shot more than 130 cougars since he joined the wildlife branch in 1946, said in an interview "there's no such thing as a cougar hound."

"Any hound trained to hunt cougar is a cougar dog," he said.

AWAITS COMPLAINT

Black and tans, Walkers, Arizona Bluebirds and Kentucky Redbones, and fox hounds can all be successful.

Rutherglen, now 48, doesn't kill or hunt cougars for the thrill of it.

"I see no point in destroying a valuable game animal unless there's a specific complaint," he said.

Such a complaint could come from a worried farmer who spots a cat near his herd, or it could come from parents who report a cougar near a school.

The cougars, which prey on deer when they can, usually attack by leaping out sud-

denly, stunning their prey and then ripping open the victim's throat or chest. But they have a tough time catching healthy deer and consequently help keep the herds healthy by killing old or sick animals.

Rutherglen says the successful hunter of the cougar must possess "the ability to train a dog and ambition to get out and really slug it."

In selecting the hound, Rutherglen says two characteristics are vital.

The hound "must have a good voice—a bark that will carry through the forest for miles if necessary so the hunter can locate the cougar treed by the hound."

"Black and tans are great on that bugle," he says.

DOG MUST BE CAUTIOUS

The second requisite is that the dog must have a streak of chicken, or be a coward at heart.

"You don't want a dog that's too courageous," he says. "A dog that stands back and does a lot of bellowing is the dog you want."

"The one that goes in and fights will be quickly killed."

Some hounds perform better for some hunters than others, he says. He has taken promising dogs from hunters who had given up trying to train them.

"As long as you can make the dog understand what you want he'll do the trick for you," Rutherglen himself has al-

most stopped hunting cougars in recent years since "we're trying to encourage others to do it."

But he still keeps a hound, a three-year-old black and tan with part Bluetick blood.

During his career Rutherglen has trained several fine hounds, each of them, often working in pairs, being in on more than 50 kills.

"The last one, Jiggs, I had put away when he was over 15 years old."

"But he was hunting up to that time. The last cat he got last winter was a large one, over 200 pounds."

As a conservation officer, "the same thing as a game warden but with a better-sounding name and no higher pay," Rutherglen is entitled to carry sidearms and prefers a .30 Cal semi-automatic handgun to kill the treed cougars.

Federal statutes ban most hunters from using handguns.

But tracking a cougar through the bush can mean hours of heavy going before the cat will tree.

"I stayed with a cat once for over two days," recalls Rutherglen. "That's when I was young and stupid. A few times I used to kick the dogs loose a little too early."

Rutherglen is just one of 16 conservation officers in B.C. who keep their own cougar hounds.

Would he trade his work for any other job?

"No."

'68 record car sales whet thirst of dealers

Record sales of about 730,000 new cars in 1968 have left dealers across Canada only thirsting for more.

A Cross-Canada Survey by The Canadian Press indicates most of them think they are going to get it—probably four or five per cent more nationally, and anywhere from two to 20 per cent in local areas.

Imported cars, which already hold about 14 per cent of the Canadian car market, will account for some. But many big-city dealers, especially in the West, say their customers are demanding more expensive cars than last year—and have the cash to pay for them.

Only in Saskatchewan and Prince Edward Island are dealers pessimistic. One Regina dealer blames a relatively poor 1968 crop in some areas for a generally glum sales outlook. In Summerside, P.E.I., a dealer said less money is in circulation this year, which is almost bound to affect sales.

Some Montreal dealers say higher manufacturers' prices could hold down sales. And delivery delays and higher shipping costs on some British-made cars may create selling problems.

But this could be offset by bigger sales efforts—higher production and expanded Canadian facilities—by Volvo (Canada) Ltd., at Halifax, Automobils Renaults Canada Ltd., at St. Bruno, Que., and Fiat and Alfa Romeo of Italy.

University of Denver wins International Collegiate Ski Meet at Banff, Alta

BANFF, Alta. (CP) — The University of Denver won the jumping event Sunday at the international collegiate ski meet and completed a sweep of all but two of the team and individual competitions.

Denver skiers took the first three places in the jumping led by Odd Hammernoss, a 20-year-old native of Norway who came to study at the university in September, 1968, on an athletic scholarship.

Hammernoss' best jumps were 212 and 209 feet and gained him 230.5 points from the judges. George Krog, who finished second in the cross-country Saturday, was second in the jumping with 218.2 points and Ole Willman was third.

Krog captured the combined Nordic events, the cross-country and jumping and Hammernoss was second.

Hammernoss said his specialty is jumping and he "just runs the cross-country because I have to."

He said at first he wasn't fond of the cross-country but is "beginning to like it now that I'm getting into shape."

Hammernoss was 15th in the eight-mile event finishing more than 11 minutes behind winner Terge Skoglund of the University of Idaho who covered the distance in 56 minutes, 57 sec-

onds. **BREAK MONOPOLY** Skoglund and Lars Ly of the University of Washington, who took the four-way trophy for the combined Nordic and alpine events, were the only winners not from Denver.

Ly, one of the few skiers to compete in the four events, slalom, giant slalom, cross-country and jumping, amassed 334.8 points to finish well ahead of Jan Wassell of the University of Montana who collected 282.1 points.

Earlier in the meet Denver captured both team and individual honors in the giant slalom and slalom.

In the giant slalom Friday Paul Rochetto was first ahead of Jim Allsop of the University of Washington and Al Vetter of the University of British Columbia.

Saturday, Torry Blann won the slalom with Rochetto second. Third place went to James Schwartz of the United States Air Force Academy at Colorado Springs, Colo.

Rochetto's win and second-place finish were good enough to give him the combined alpine trophy. Blann was second and Schwartz third.

The victory enabled the Habs to keep pace with Boston Bruins, leaders in the NHL's Eastern Division, who kept their unbeaten string alive at 17 games with a 4-2 win over Detroit Red Wings.

The Bruins, with 71 points, are six ahead of Montreal and 11 up on third-place New York Rangers, 7-3 victors over Pittsburgh Penguins.

In other Sunday games, St. Louis Blues stretched their lead atop the expansion Western Division to 20 points over idle Oakland Seals with a 5-3 decision over Toronto Maple Leafs and Minnesota North Stars nipped Philadelphia Flyers 3-2.

In Saturday's games, Montreal drubbed New York 6-2, St. Louis blanked Detroit 2-0, Los Angeles downed Oakland 8-5, Philadelphia and Pittsburgh tied 2-2 and Chicago tied Minnesota 5-5.

Beliveau's 450th goal Saturday in Montreal was his 20th of the season. Only two players in NHL history have scored more.

Detroit's Gordie Howe with 713 regular-season goals and Maurice Richard of Montreal who retired with 544 goals.

Beliveau's three goals and an assist Sunday increased his point total to 1,072, surpassed only by Howe's 1,648.

YVAN SCORES TWICE Also prominent in Montreal's win Sunday was Yvan Cournoyer with his 29th and 30th goals of the season. Dick Duff tallied the other Montreal goal before 16,666 Chicago fans.

Pit Martin, Jim Pappin, Doug Mohns and Stan Mikita scored for the Black Hawks who played most of the game without scoring ace Bobby Hull who suffered a cut hand in the first period.

At Boston, Glen Sather, Phil Esposito, Johnny McKenzie and Ed Westfall gave 14,659 something to cheer about. Dean Prentice, who ended a 172-minute, 12-second Red Wing scoring drought, and Howe, with his 25th of the season, provided the Detroit goals.

The Bruins played the game without all-star defenseman Bobby Orr who Boston officials announced earlier had suffered a slight strain in his left knee during a game at Los Angeles Thursday.

Danny O'Shea, Danny Grant and Jean-Paul Parise scored for Minnesota before 13,294 Philadelphia fans while the Flyers replied with Brit Selby and Forbes Kennedy.

Gary Sabourin's tie-breaker and the winner by defenceman Al Arbor at St. Louis were both set up by Frank St. Marseille who had tallied an earlier Blues' goal. Craig Cameron and Jean Guy Talbot were the other St. Louis scorers.

Norm Ullman, Bob Pulford and Dave Keon scored for Toronto.
