### Damase Lavoie Assists Children Coming To And From Schools

We doubt if there is anybody in the City of Westmount who gets a bigger kick out of his job than Damase Lavoie, the traffic guardian at the corner of Greene avenue and Dorchester street.

If you were to stand at the busy intersection some noon hour, than you'd know what we mean. Mr. Lavoie has become a familiar figure at this particular spot and it is doubtful if anyone could act as 'Guardian' as well as the rotund little man.

Asked if he liked children the 68-year-old 'guardian', jokingly quipped, "I should, I have two sons of my own, one 46 and the other 47 years of age."

Mr. Lavoie's day isn't short by any means. He reports to the corner at 8.25 a.m. and works until 9 a.m.; he returns at 11.45 a.m. and works through until 1.30 p.m. The final shift is at 2.30 p.m. when he directs the children until 3.45 p.m.

Standing at the corner of Greene avenue and Sherbrooke street at noon with the 'Guardian' will bear out his claim that "this is the busiest time of the day."

Mr. Lavoie takes his job serious-

ly. Although, he is permitted to take the license number of a car if "a smart alec" driver doesn't heed his stop sign, Mr. Lavoie said that "it hasn't been necessary yet."

Mr. Lavoie reports to work on even the bitterest days. He says that he "was born to the cold after working outdoors with the Light Department for 31 years."

"It was when I became restless that I decided on this job," Mr. Lavoie said, "I like it and I hope to do it for a number of years yet."

### "Exercise Clobber" To See Jets Attack Enemy Invaders

Jet aircraft from Westmount's No. 401 Fighter Squadron will race off the Island of Montreal Sunday in an attempt to "wipe out enemy forces" holding the towns of Sorel, Drummondville and St. Hilaire.

What they will meet, minutes after they have taken to the air is the armoured units of the "17th Dneipetrovsk Cossacks" who will have put a blanket on the area and will "defend it with their lives."

All this is part of "Exercise Clobber," an operation designed to familiarize the local squadron in the defence of nearby territory against airborne enemy forces.

It is assumed that Montreal and Eastern United States cities have had atomic bomb attacks today, and by Sunday, airborne troops have taken the area around St. Hyacinthe. It is these troops, the 17th Hussars (portraying the 17th Dneipetrovsk Cossacks) proceeding to Sorel, Drummondville and St. Hilaire, will be attacked by fighters of No. 401 Auxiliary Squadron.

By 2 p.m., the "enemy" will be destroyed and the 17th Hussars will visit St. Hubert where "Clobber" will be discussed between pilots of 401 Squadron and the ground forces.

"Exercise Clobber" will recall a similar scheme carried out 22 years ago when both units took part in the first co-operation of a Canadian non-permanent active militia unit with aircraft.

The operation will be under the command of Lieut. Col. James

Domville, C.D., and Wing Commander H. J. Everard, D.F.C., Commanding Officers of both units.

District residents will not have to be content with hearing far off sounds of "the boys" in "battle." The entire exercise will be televised by CBC, making this the first time Army and Air Force units have been filmed together.

### Westmount 'Y' Will Be Host To NY Fencers

The Westmount YMCA Fencing Club will be hosts to six fencers of the George Santelli Salle D'Armes from New York on April 4 at 3.30 p.m. A three weapon exhibition will be given.

Following are the names and qualification of the six representatives from across the border: Ralph Goldstein, a former Metropolitan épé champion and a member of the 1948 U.S. Olympic Team; Dr. Paul Moss, who was a spare man for the 1952 U.S. Olympic Team; Norman Lewis, who is now in South America (if he arrives at New York in time, he hopes to be able to participate). He was a member of the 1943 U.S. Olympic épé team (ranked ninth in the finals), also was a former U.S. épé and Foil Champion; Albert Axelrod, who was a member of the 1952 U.S. Olympic Foil Team and the highest scorer for the foil team event for U.S. 1952; Leonard Turk, one of the most promising fencers from Santelli's Salle D'Armes; Alan Quarter, a member of the 1952 Olympic Saber team and twice winner of the Joey Richmond Saber trophy; and George V. Worth, a member of the 1952 U.S. Olympic Saber team who was recently awarded the "Friendship Trophy" given to the outstanding competitor of the year.

Also taking part in the exhibition will be the following members of the Westmount "Y" Fencing Club: Foil Exhibition: Alan Howard who was Dominion Foil Champion for 1952 and Roland Asselin, Provincial Foil Champion and Canadian Representative at the 1948 and 1952 Olympic Games. Duelling Sword (épé): Ed Brooke, Dominion Epé Champion and Representative at the 1950 Empire Games and the 1952 Olympic Games and Karl Schwendie, former Dominion épé champion and Provincial épé champion. In the Saber Exhibition, Bob Cardoza, Provincial finalist and George Krupski, one of Canada's best saber men, will compete.

## McGill Chamber Group Schedules Final Recital

For its fourth and final concert the McGill Chamber Music Society will present a concert composed of works by Mozart with a chamber ensemble under the direction of Douglas Clarke, Dean of McGill Conservatorium of Music.

The concert will take place on Tuesday evening, March 31, at 8:30 p.m. in Moyses Hall, and Dean Clarke has chosen the Viola quintet in G minor K 516; the oboe quartet in F major K 370 with Real Gagnier as soloist; and vocal selections are to be sung by Ellen Reynolds, soprano.

Critics regard the string quintet in G minor as the most deeply felt composition of Mozart's with the exception of the G minor symphony. Its composition was impelled by purely personal reasons, as a means of artistic expression, regardless of the lack of demand on the part of the musical public for the works of this character. It is scored for two violins, 2 violas and cello, and will be played by the whole ensemble under Dean Clarke's direction.

The oboe quartet in F major is a charming work written for Mozart's friend, Friedrich Ramm. It is written for oboe, violin, viola and cello, but will also be performed by the whole ensemble.

## Glass As Fertilizer

Provides Six Minor Mineral Elements For Plant Growth

Home-grower was given some good news last week with the announcement by Canadian Industries Limited that its agricultural chemicals division has started marketing of FTE—fritted trace elements—a new and almost revolutionary aid to plant life.

FTE, manufactured by Ferro Enamels

(Canada) Limited, at Oakville, Ontario, contains 83 per cent glass, with 17 per cent of the six minor mineral elements most essential to full plant growth—iron, copper, zinc, manganese, boron and molybdenum.

The six elements supplement the basic growth elements, phosphorous, potassium, calcium, and nitrogen.

The high content of glass in FTE will make the six trace elements slowly soluble, so that they will not wash out of the soil. Other advantages of the new mixture are that it will not leach, won't harm plants even when used in excess, and will remain in the soil for several seasons.

FTE is available to the farm trade now and will be sold across counters to home growers within the next month. It can be used for anything from a six-inch flower pot to the 1,000-acre farm.

Strange as it may seem, minute particles of glass are going to play an important role in Canada's agricultural future.

## Glass As Fertilizer

Provides Six Minor Mineral Elements For Plant Growth

Home-grower was given some good news last week with the announcement by Canadian Industries Limited that its agricultural chemicals division has started marketing of FTE—fritted trace elements—a new and almost revolutionary aid to plant life.  
FTE, manufactured by Ferro Enamels

(Canada) Limited, at Oakville, Ontario, contains 83 per cent glass, with 17 per cent of the six minor mineral elements most essential to full plant growth—iron, copper, zinc, manganese, boron and molybdenum.

The six elements supplement the basic growth elements, phosphorous, potassium, calcium, and nitrogen.

The high content of glass in FTE will make the six trace elements slowly soluble, so that they will not wash out of the soil. Other advantages of the new mixture are that it will not leach, won't harm plants even when used in excess, and will remain in the soil for several seasons.

FTE is available to the farm trade now and will be sold across counters to home growers within the next month. It can be used for anything from a six-inch flower pot to the 1,000-acre farm.

Strange as it may seem, minute particles of glass are going to play an important role in Canada's agricultural future.

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## Favorite Irish Poet Subject Of Talk To Xavier Guild

"The Making of Moore's Melodies" was the subject of a talk to the Xavier Apostolate Guild by Rt. Rev. Msgr. Martin P. Reid, Pastor of St. Augustine of Canterbury Church, at their monthly meeting in Victoria Hall.

"Ireland" said Msgr. Reid "is the only country which bears a musical instrument upon its national flag."

A wealth of folk-music was employed by the ancient bards or minstrels who were both composers and poets as well as singers. But the man who has been most closely identified with Irish music down through the years and whose name is fondly inscribed in the hearts of Irish people everywhere, was neither a composer nor a great poet, but a singer of songs with a rare gift for adapting sentimental lyrics to beautiful melodies, which have come to be called — after him — "Moore's Melodies."

Though born in Ireland Thomas Moore spent most of his life in England. He was not an active patriot like his friend and colleague Robert Emmet, but he was able to fire Irish hearts with patriotism by the sheer beauty of his songs, and as he was a favorite

in London drawing-rooms it may be said that he did much to influence public opinion in favor of Ireland.

The speaker stated that Moore wrote 126 lyrics in all, slight and sentimental in structure, the poetry of which would never have survived but for the song.

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## Wartime Travails Recalled By Prof. B. Zaborski At Luncheon

The story of his wartime experiences in World War II when he escaped from a Northern Siberia prison camp where later many of his fellow political prisoners were murdered, and of his wanderings as a Polish refugee from the edge of the Arctic Ocean to the borders of Afghanistan, was told on Friday by Professor Bogdan Zaborski, Dept. of Geography, McGill University, when he spoke at the 35th charter day luncheon held by the Westmount Women's Club in the Sheraton Room of the Mount Royal Hotel. When the poor food at the Siberian camp made him so weak he was sent to a primitive sort of hospital, he said "It seemed like heaven — to sleep in a bed for the first time in 20 months.

He told of the difficulties he encountered trying to leave Siberia when he was freed upon the signing of an alliance between the west and the Reds. He worked in Omsk, Western Siberia, in a factory and then went to Tashkent, Turkestan, near the Afghan border before the Polish Government in Canada called him to London.

To get to London, was no easy matter. By train and plane he travelled back to Archangel where he expected to board a vessel for Britain, but upon his arrival at that port he found that the White Sea had frozen over and that he must make his way to Murmansk. Fortune was with him, however, and he escaped death when German planes bombed the train on which he was travelling between the battle lines. And his good luck still held when a terrible storm allowed the ship on which he was a passenger, to slip through a danger area usually infested with German submarines and bombing planes. He landed safely in the north of Scotland.

From 1942-45 he was head of the Geographical Section and Cartographical Printing Office of the Polish Government in exile in London. From 1946 to 1948 he was professor of geography at the Polish University College London. In 1948 he came to Montreal with his wife and two children.

At the March meeting of the Women's Auxiliary of the Reddy Memorial Hospital, held recently, Dr. Malcolm Mackenzie and Dr. Jean-Pierre Jean, the guest speakers, took as their subject, "A Radiologist and a Pathologist look at Cancer". Father McDonagh was even able to find some consolation in his illness, by not being able to be present to witness so many of the senior team's losses.

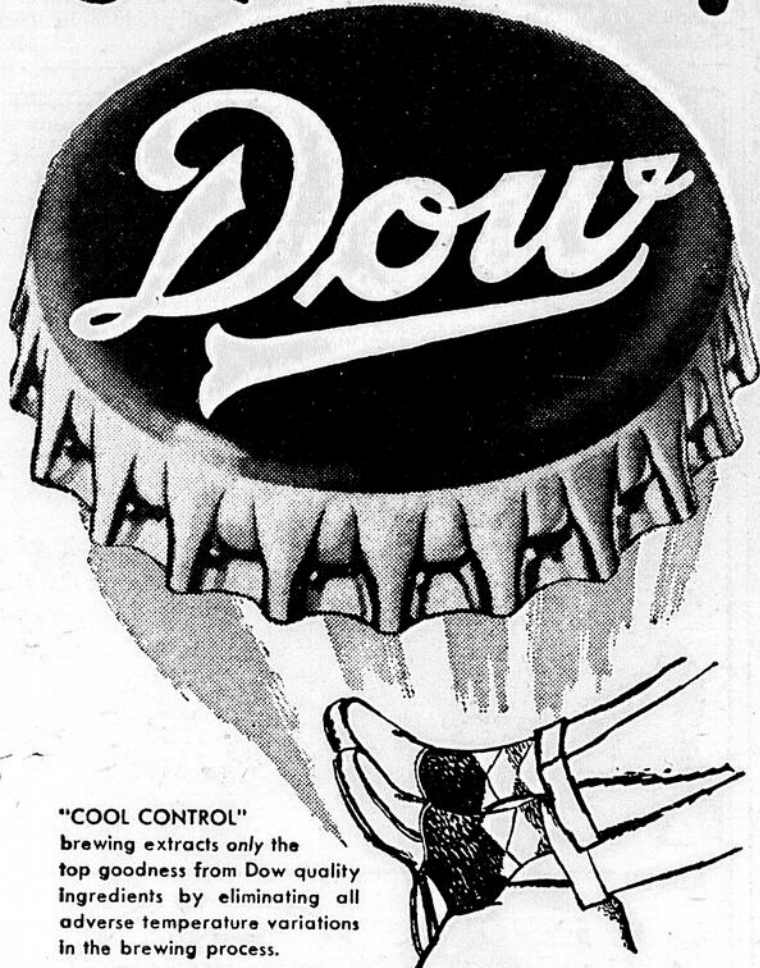

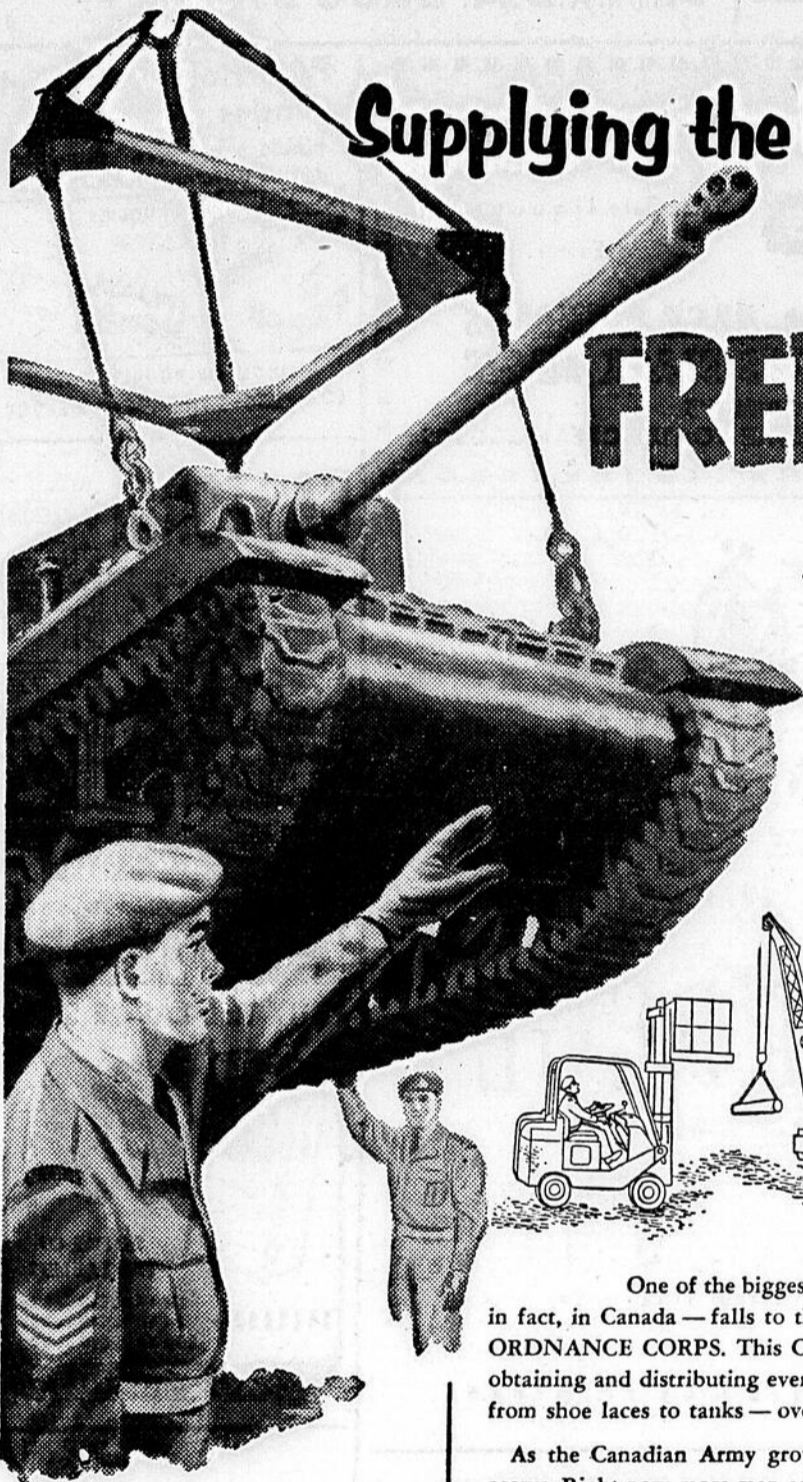
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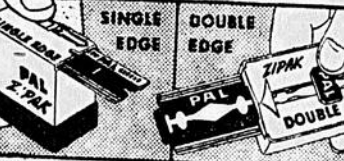
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
