THE NEW JERSEY SCIENTIFIC AGRICULTURE SCHOOL.

This is another name for an agricultural college, and it is connected with Rutgers College, at New Brunswick, N. J., and was established by the trustees for the education of young men, gratuitously, who reside in the state.

The course of instruction extends over a term of three years, during which it is proposed to give young men suitable instruction in the science and practice of agriculture, to enable them to conduct the management of a farm in a scientific manner.
