Ottawa, June 1.—(Special.)—A deputation, consisting of Mr. Sanderson, representing the Canada Life, Mr. Bradshaw, of the Imperial Life, Mr. McCabe, of the North American Life, and Mr. Junkin, of the Manufacturers' Life, waited upon Hon. W. A. Fielding, and Sir Richard Cartwright this morning regarding the insurance bill, of which some mention has already been made in the House of Commons by the Minister of Finance.

Committee of Railways and Canals Considers the C. P. R. Bill.

Ottawa, June 1.—(Special.)—The Committee on Railways and Canals this morning took up the C.P.R. bill giving the company power to extend the branch line from Stonewall to the west shore of Lake Winnipeg, between Gimli and Arnes, with a branch line from the above extension in a northwesterly direction to a point on the east shore of Lake Manitoba at a point between Marsh Point and the north boundary of township No. 25.

GEORGE B. BURLAND LOST THE LAW SUIT.

Chief Justice Armour's Judgment in Which He Finds For the Plaintiff in the Important Trial.

Burland, president and manager of the British America Bank Note Company, which is referred to in the judgment as "the defendant company."

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EIGHT MILES AN HOUR THE LIMIT.

The Police Committee Orders the Street Railway to Go Slow Till it Gets a Fender That Will Save Life.

The campaign for better street car fenders yesterday received the approval of the Police Committee, who passed a resolution which is calculated to hasten the choice of a serviceable fender by the Street Railway Company. Section 11 of the agreement between the city and the Street Railway Company reads as follows: "The speed of the cars shall never be more than eight miles an hour, nor faster than a horse walk when turning curves at or at street crossings, but the corporation shall have the right to change the speed in the different routes."

THE ORANGE GRAND LODGE.

Annual Convention Was Concluded Last Night.

Hon. N. Clarke Wallace Was Again Re-elected Grand Master.

Toronto, May 31.—The Orange Grand Lodge of British America closed its annual convention to-night, to meet next year at London, Ont. All the business before the meeting was disposed of by 8 o'clock in the evening, when adjournment was made to the Horticultural Pavilion, where the delegates were banqueted by the City Council.

For the place of meeting for next year, invitations were received from Sarnia, London, Winnipeg, Charlottetown, P.E.I., Fredericton, N.B. and several other cities and towns. London seemed to be the most desirable, and after some discussion, the vote to hold the meeting there was made unanimous.

The change in sentiment in the Grand Lodge in regard to the temperance question was illustrated by the passing of a resolution, moved and seconded by Bros. Pitts, of Fredericton, N.B., and Schulz, of Balduf, Man., that no man engaged in the sale or manufacture of spirituous liquors shall be eligible for membership in the order. A warm discussion followed the introduction of the resolution, which, however, carried by a small majority. The standing of present members of the Order will not, of course, be affected.

Dr. Noble, of Toronto, introduced the following resolution, which was carried on a technicality:

"That this Grand Lodge views with extreme regret the growth of Romanizing influences in the Episcopal Church in the Old Land, and more recently in our fair Dominion and the United States, the mere so as this Church has always been considered as the bulwark of Protestantism, and we sincerely hope that prompt measures will be taken by the Imperial Parliament and the authorities of the Church to eradicate these heathen practices, in which can be plainly seen the machinations of Rome."

THE BOUNDARY QUESTION

Washington Officials Unwilling to Enter a Controversy.

Official Record of Proceedings at Joint Commission Not to be Made Public Just Now.

Washington, D.C., May 31.—The officials here are unwilling to be drawn publicly into a controversy over the Canadian boundary question, even though the matter has been made the subject of a statement in the House at Ottawa by Sir Wilfrid Laurier, which in the ordinary course, would require them from the obligation to maintain silence. They take the view, however, that the pendency of the negotiations with Great Britain on this subject make it inadvisable at this time to make public the official record of the proceedings of the joint commission.

It can be stated, however, on authority, that there is no disposition to question the accuracy of the statement made by Sir Wilfrid yesterday, as to the position respecting arbitration of the Canadians. But there is subject to the important qualification that the statement referred to a state of affairs existing when the commission was in session, and at its termination, and not later. Since then there have been negotiations directly between the British Government and the Government of the United States, and of what has taken place there Sir Wilfrid Laurier's statement takes no account. It is reiterated in the most earnest manner by officials here that in these negotiations, Canada stood in the way of an agreement which the British authorities, after mature consideration, had accepted as eminently fair and just.

Respecting the Canadian demand for the possession of Pyramid Harbor on the Lynn Canal, pending the decision of an arbitration, or some other competent authority that her title is good, it can be stated that the position of the United States Government remains unchanged. It does not recognize any parallel between the Canadian claim to Pyramid Harbor and the United States claim to Dyea and Skagway. To the latter the title has never been questioned. Canada, on the other hand, never asserted any claim to Pyramid Harbor until lately, and has never been in even temporary possession. The proposition from the British side to declare a neutral strip of the country leading from the head of the Lynn Canal back across the mountains to the Canadian line has not commended itself to the State Department, which fails to see why the United States should voluntarily surrender absolute title to territory belonging to the United States.

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that staff had moulded into shape so to speak, and fit out with intellectual equipment sufficient for the task of teaching. A very able address was given by Professor Kneelands, who acknowledged the kindly sentiments expressed in the valedictories of the students. He spoke of the value of teachers being able to think for themselves and express themselves in their own language now that they were going out into life. He feared that it was the tendency of a good many never to express themselves outside the covers of a book. To those who would say that their own language and their own words were their own, he would say that this might seem rank heresy to some but nevertheless they would find the advice good. Having discussed the faculty of parents expecting teachers to be encyclopedias of knowledge upon all subjects and to be able to answer all sorts of questions, on all sorts of subjects at all sorts of times, he went on to point out what the teachers ought to possess in the way of positive qualities. But among the things that ought to be avoided he mentioned tobacco, smoking and chewing gum and theatre-going. Above all things parents had a right to demand elevation of character in the part of the teachers and lives that were beyond reproach. He pointed out that just attention should be given by teachers to their relations with the parents of the children. There were two sides to the life of every child attending school—the parents side which the teacher ought to take and the teacher's side, as presented by the child at school. These two sides were necessary in order to grasp fully the whole life of the child whose mind was being developed.

Dr. Wear, the newly appointed recorder, who was present, spoke of himself as an early graduate of the school, in whose welfare he had never ceased to take a lively interest and in whose progress he cherished a feeling of pride. The rector of the High School, the Rev. Mr. Rexford, also spoke of his associations as a pupil in the school upwards of thirty years ago. He approved of and accentuated the remarks of Prof. Kneelands and urged upon the teachers the need of the most patience and consideration in their dealings with parents. The proceedings which were most successful and harmonious throughout, were brought to a close by the singing of the national anthem.

"This is the best month's work yet. It beats the record by \$6,000. The actual running time was thirty days. In that time the Fort Frances boat arrived and arrived in Duluth on the freight at midnight last night.

BRUTAL MURDER OF MRS. GREGOIRE

An Old Lady Keeping a Little Store at 338 St. Timothee St. Meets a Violent Death Yesterday—Murderer Not Caught.

Some time between the hours of three and four o'clock yesterday afternoon Mrs. Sophie H. Gregoire, was murdered, and her body was found resting on a lounge in her bedroom at 338 St. Timothee street.

had of something being wrong in her cousin's house when the driver on Christie's delivery van had come to her to enquire if Mrs. Gregoire was out.

Mrs. Gregoire was an old lady, sixty-seven years of age, and lived with her nephew, George Vallancourt, a young fellow, 18 years of age, a plumber's apprentice.

"I did not think she was out," said Mrs. Robinette, "because when Mrs. Gregoire left her room for any time she always left the key in my house. I told the driver Mrs. Gregoire must be asleep, and I offered to go in the morning to find out if I went in by the back way, and the man came in by the front entrance. He stayed in the store, and I called my cousin by name, saying several times, 'I got no answer, so I went into her bedroom, thinking perhaps she would be asleep. I saw her on the sofa, and I told her to get up, that the cabman was in the store. My cousin did not move, so I went to her, and taking her hand I pulled her up. The sight of her frightened me, and ran out of the room screaming. The man then came in, and I saw what had happened, and all I could do was to point to the corpse on the lounge, without even daring to look back at it."

One theory generally circulated is that a man well known as a frequenter of the store was the perpetrator of the crime.

According to Mrs. Robinette, who has been a neighbor of Mrs. Gregoire's for three years, that lady was a quiet and respectable person. Who could have committed the crime she could not imagine.

Mrs. Malvina Desroches, daughter of deceased, who lives at 1073 Volle street, says that the person referred to has often been caught stealing from her mother's store and on different occasions quarreled with Mrs. Gregoire because she upbraided him for his conduct.

### THE DOMINION BANK

Annual Report Which was Presented Yesterday Was Most Satisfactory

Toronto, June 1.—The annual report of the Dominion Bank, which was presented at the general meeting of shareholders yesterday was most satisfactory. The statement showed the net profits for the past year to have been \$205,326.00, to which was to be added a balance to profit and loss account carried over from last year of \$32,388.05, making a total of \$237,714.14. Dividends of 12 per cent, equal to \$150,000 were paid, and the sum of \$15,000 was written off the bank premises, leaving a balance of \$41,714.14 to be carried forward on profit and loss account. The general statement of assets and liabilities also indicated a sound financial condition of the institution, and the shareholders expressed their gratification at the good showing made.

BOARD OF TRADE COUNCIL

Many Questions of Interest Were Discussed Yesterday.

Council is Sorry That the Government Could Not Proceed With Insolvency Bill Just Now.

The weekly meeting of the Council of the Board of Trade was held yesterday afternoon, the president, Mr. Charles F. Smith, in the chair. The other members in attendance were: Messrs. Robert Mackay, first vice-president; Henry Miles, second vice-president; Fred W. Evans, treasurer; Thomas Harding, A. J. Hodgson, James W. Knox, H. Laporte, John Macfarlane, R. W. McDougall, James McBride, William McMaster, M. J. A. Prendergast, David Robertson and Hon. J. K. Ward.

The Philadelphia Commercial Museum had forwarded diplomas of membership of that organization to the Montreal Board of Trade, to the president and to the secretary. The letter accompanying the diplomas stated that the officers of the museum trusted that the Montreal board would co-operate with them to the fullest extent, and that its members individually would feel free to address them on all topics of mutual interest; further, that matters of a public or private nature were all equally interesting to them, and they were glad and always ready to assist in making individual business connections and in advising about purchases or sales of merchandise.

Letters were submitted from the Ottawa Board of Trade with reference to the resolution adopted by that board respecting

ing the proposed Pacific cable, and asking the Montreal board to give expression to its views in that matter.

A lengthy letter from a resident of Fort Colborne, respecting the need of improving that harbor, copies of which had been sent to various newspapers in Toronto and Montreal, was laid on the table.

The Metal and Hardware Manufacturers' and Merchants' Association had communicated the following resolution:—"That this association regrets that there has been no legislation at this session of Parliament in the passing of a bill for the equitable distribution of the assets of insolvents throughout the Dominion, and respectfully requests that the Council of the Board of Trade would so express itself upon this subject."

Mr. McMaster, chairman of the Insolvency Legislation Committee, reported on this subject, to the effect that a letter from Mr. Fortin had been received, stating that, being unable to secure the Government's support to his bill, he had no alternative but to drop it, and mentioning the reasons given by the Prime Minister for not favoring such legislation had been published.

The Council then adopted the following resolution with respect to the Government's action in declining to support the passing of insolvency legislation during the present session:—"That in view of the earnest representations of the commercial communities of this country in favor of insolvency legislation, strengthened as they have been by frequent unfavorable public and private references in Great Britain to the lack of such legislation, and to the iniquitous character of some of the Canadian provincial laws governing assignments, the Council of the Montreal Board of Trade expected that the Government would, at this session of Parliament, secure the passage of a bill for the equitable distribution of an insolvent's estate, that expectation being greatly strengthened by the circumstance that the commercial and banking interests in the anxiety to secure such legislation, had agreed to compromise their divergent views on certain points of Mr. Fortin's bill, introduced last session."

"That the Council, therefore, learned with keen disappointment of the Government's decision not to support the adoption of insolvency legislation at this session of the Dominion Parliament, and the Council hereby expresses its conviction that if the Government does not take early opportunity to ensure the passage of such a law will have a most unfortunate effect upon the commercial future of this country, and that, as in the past, Canada will continue to suffer in the opinion of other countries whose laws secure justice to the creditors of an insolvent debtor."

Hon. J. K. Ward and Mr. M. J. A. Prendergast reported that, with the secretary, they had, as authorized by the Council, accompanied the deputation of citizens which had that morning waited upon the Hon. Mr. Marchand, provincial Premier, to present a petition for the appointment of a royal commission to enquire into the civic administration of this city, and that they had presented and spoken to the resolution adopted by that Council endorsing said petition; and that Hon. Mr. Marchand had assured them that the matter would receive the Government's earnest attention, and that a speedy reply to the prayer of the petition would be given.

Enquiry was made as to the authority of the City Council to require manufacturers to furnish a blank form as to the quality and value of machinery in use by them, with a view to taxation, and it was ordered that a copy of the new city charter be procured, with a view

to giving the matter consideration at the next meeting.

A conversation ensued on Senator Dandurand's bill respecting usury, now before the Senate, after which Messrs. Furness, Withy & Co., Limited, of this city, were admitted to membership on the board, on nomination of Mr. James Thom, the firm's manager.

It was agreed, unless prevented by unexpected business, that the Council should, at the next meeting, adjourn for its usual summer vacation.

New Grand Trunk Coaches.

The Grand Trunk Railway Company have decided to construct ten new first-class coaches at their workshops, to form part of what is known as the "800 series." The chief feature of these cars is the greatly improved seating accommodation and smoking rooms of the Pullman pattern. These coaches will be built in the company's workshops, under the direction of the superintendent of the sleeping car department, Mr. Macwood.

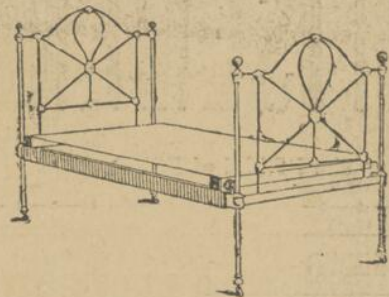

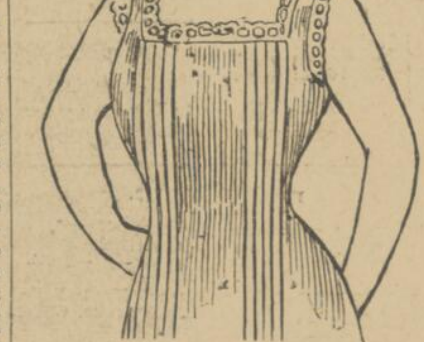

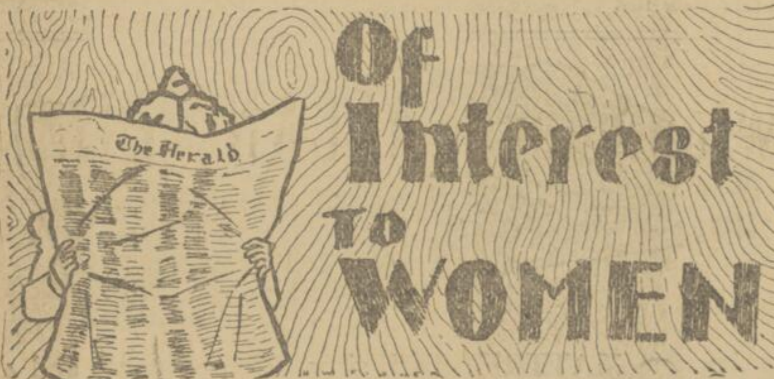

## Of Interest to Women

### TO HOUSEKEEPERS.

All housekeepers interested in this column are invited to contribute recipes. Only favorite, true and tried ones must be sent, and great care should be taken that all directions for mixing ingredients, etc., be very explicit. More skeletonized recipes, such as some cook books give, are not desirable. Once in a while it is well to give a little physical peck as well as a moral one, therefore I intend this morning to chronicle some advice that will, if followed, I am sure, result in the welfare of women both old and young. Very few women read as they should, for the very simple reason that they do not know how. They think that to be thoroughly comfortable they must undress and go to bed, but this is quite a mistake. Provided there is a footstool in the room on which the feet may rest and a comfortable chair for the body there is no reason why a quiet half hour spent in this manner should not refresh a tired woman as nothing else could do. If you want to gain the maximum of rest in the minimum of time you should employ the masculine method of kicking up the feet occasionally higher or than the head. Fashionable women, to whom the necessity of ever looking their best has taught this knack fall into this position whenever they are in the seclusion of their own rooms.

Cracked and Faded Varnish.

Next to scraping and refinishing there is nothing so good as oil for varnished surfaces that have faded and cracked through exposure to sun or other heat. Rub once a week with boiled linseed oil, being careful to rub the oil in well with a swollen cloth. After a few weeks the surface will become smooth, soft and of a good color. Water and soap never should be used on polished furniture unless the surface is first soaked in oil. The oil softens the dirt and prevents the water from soaking into the wood.

### THE CUISINE.

Some Good Recipes Specially Prepared for the Herald.

Some good recipes, specially prepared for The Herald:

Neapolitan and Caramel Ice Creams.

All neapolitan creams contain eggs; the same flavours in the same way are used for both caramel and Neapolitan cream. Put a pint of cream into a double boiler over the fire; beat the yolks of three eggs and half a pound of sugar together until light; add to the creamy, cook just a moment. Whisk the whites to a stiff froth, pour the hot mixture into them, and pour it backward and forward from one vessel to another until the whole is light. When using chocolate or cocoa dissolve three tablespoonfuls of caramel and one teaspoonful of vanilla; strain and freeze. The yolks only must be used.

Apple Pasties.

Peel, core and stew eight apples, adding flavouring of lemon peel and an ounce of butter. When tender, beat with a fork and place on rounds of short pastry. Wet the edges and fold them over, brush lightly with water and sprinkle with powdered sugar. Bake for about half an hour.

To Can Strawberries.

For one pint can take one basket berries (be sure and wash thoroughly every berry), add two-third cup sugar, stir well until dissolved. Heat twenty minutes and can while hot.

Bake for three-quarters of an hour in a well buttered pan placed in a larger pan of water. Serve with a dressing made of the oil from the two cans, one beaten egg, one level tablespoon of cornstarch dissolved in one cup of sweet milk, the juice of half a lemon and a little minced parsley.

### WHAT IS A PRIVATE LETTER?

Manitoba Election Prosecution Expenses Under Discussion.

### The Public Accounts Committee Met in Ottawa Yesterday Morning

B.C.O. Also Had a Sitting.

Ottawa, May 31.—(Special).—The enquiry into the payments for legal expenses in connection with the Manitoba election prosecutions was resumed before the Public Accounts Committee this morning. The sitting was taken up in discussing a letter which Sir Oliver Mowat, Minister of Justice, had written to the Minister of the Interior, criticising the amount of the accounts sent in by the Winnipeg lawyers through Mr. Sifton for taxing. Mr. H. M. Howell, Q.C., told the committee last year that Mr. Sifton had sent him the letter. The Auditor-General this morning stated that the letter was on the file when it came to him, and as he considered that private letters should not remain in the public files he had sent it to Mr. Sifton. He gave as one of his reasons for considering the letter private the fact that it began informally: "My Dear Sifton," "My Dear Mr. Sifton." He declined to give further reasons without an order from the committee, a long argument ensued as to what constituted a private letter between Ministers, and what right the Auditor-General had to take it from the file and

### return it. The Solicitor-General raised an objection to the Auditor-General revealing the contents of the letter.

Mr. Foster remarked that there was evidently a hot letter from Sir Oliver Mowat in existence somewhere.

The chairman, Mr. Fraser (Guyebour), ruled against the admissibility of the question, but finally the Solicitor-General withdrew his objection. The Auditor-General stated that as he remembered the letter it was addressed "My Dear Sifton," and his attention was drawn to it by one of his clerks as a private letter. He had consulted the present Minister of Justice, who agreed with him that it was a private letter.

Sir Herbert Tupper asked if the contents were confined to the Manitoba legal bills. To this the Solicitor-General objected, and the chairman sustained him. This ruling being appealed against was sustained by a vote of 13 to 10.

The matter then dropped for the present.

### Banking and Commerce.

The Banking and Commercial Committee spent the morning in consideration of a bill to incorporate the Canada Permanent and Western Canada Mortgage Corporation and amalgamation of the Canada Permanent Loan and Savings Co., the Western Canada Loan and Savings Co., the Freehold Loan and Savings Co., and the London and Ontario Investment Co., limited. The company may also acquire the business of any other similar companies in Canada. The clauses relating to investment by the company were left over, pending the introduction of a Government bill regulating the general manner of investments by loan and insurance companies.

### REV. MR. GRAHAM OBJECTS

Does Not Like the Educational Policy of Quebec Catholics.

Baptist Convention at Toronto Closed—They Want \$150,000.

Toronto, May 31.—(Special).—The attendance at the closing session yesterday of the Baptist convention of Ontario and Quebec was not very large, many delegates having left for home. The first business considered at the morning session was the annual report of the mission of the Province of Quebec, which was presented by the Rev. W. T. Graham, of Montreal. The speaker strongly denounced the educational policy of the Church of Rome in that province, which, he declared, had kept the people of Quebec in ignorance and was a curse to the country. The report, which also spoke highly of the work of the Feller Institute, was unanimously adopted.

The afternoon session was devoted almost entirely to the discussion of the Young People's movement in connection with the coming Prof. G. N. Masse, principal of the Feller Institute of Quebec, delivered an address on the Grand Ligne work in Quebec. Mr. Bosworth, secretary of the Grand Ligne mission, was appointed official representative of the conference of Ontario and Quebec to the British Baptist convention, which meets in England this summer.

Toronto, May 31.—(Special).—The forty-ninth annual meeting of the Upper Canada Bible Society was held last evening. Hon. G. W.
