## THE DOMINICAN REVOLUTION

**Bombardment of San Domingo Averted**

**A PEACEFUL ENDING POSSIBLE**

BOTH SIDES TO LAY DOWN THEIR ARMS AND THE GOVERNMENT TO BE PUT IN COMMISSION PENDING THE HOLDING OF A GENERAL ELECTION AND THE SUBSEQUENT INSTALLATION OF A PRESIDENT—ACCEPTANCE OF THE PROPOSAL HOPED FOR.

Santo Domingo City, Saturday, April 4.—The warship President in the hands of President Vasquez, and the Revolutionary gun vessel Independencia arrived here this morning.

The commander of the United States cruiser Atlanta immediately notified the commander of the President that he must not bombard the town until he had given 24 hours' notice. An interview between the two commanders took place and afterwards the President steamed away.

The Atlanta's doctor is helping to care for the wounded in the recent engagement. Direct telegraphic communication from this city continues interrupted.

In view of the critical situation, the arrival of further foreign warships is expected. Milk, meats, and other country provisions are difficult to obtain here and prices are rising.

San Domingo City, Santo Domingo, Sunday, April 5.—The revolutionists who have possession of this city have erected barricades and have adopted other measures to repel an attack of the Government troops under President Vasquez which is expected to take place should the intervention of the foreign consuls prove unsuccessful.

The consuls maintained a suspension of hostilities in order to enable them to arrange a settlement of the questions in dispute and prevent further bloodshed.

They proposed that both parties should lay down their arms, appoint a commission to govern the republic and then proceed to hold elections and install a President. A decision on this proposition is momentarily expected and hopes are entertained that it will be accepted.

## EXPLOSION ON A U. S. BATTLESHIP

**While Practising at a Target in the Gulf**

**SHELL BURSTS IN THE GUN**

THREE MEN KILLED AND FIVE INJURED BY THE PIECES OF THE EXPLODED GUN—THEY CRASH THROUGH THE SPAR AND GUN DECKS AND ARE ONLY STOPPED BY THE ARMORED DECK.

Pensacola, Fla., April 10.—The damage to the battleship Iowa caused by the premature explosion of a shell in the forward port 12-inch gun has developed to be more serious than was thought when the first examination was made, and as a consequence the ship has been ordered to the New York Navy Yard to go out of commission. It is known that three decks, including the upper deck, in the forward part of the ship, will have to be entirely removed and rebuilt.

It is feared that the steel supports under the 12-inch port turret are sprung to such an extent that they will have to be removed. The gun itself is a hopeless wreck. The services over the grave of the three men killed by the explosion of the gun were conducted by the fleet chaplain, assisted by the chaplain of the Iowa, and were concluded by a naval salute over the graves and "taps."

Pensacola, Fla., April 9.—A disastrous explosion occurred on the United States battleship Iowa to-day while the vessel was at target practice in the Gulf. The forward port 12-inch gun burst from the premature explosion of a shell, 12 feet of the piece outside the turret being demolished. Three men were killed and five injured two seriously.

The men killed and injured were on the second or gun deck at mess. Three pieces of the exploded gun, each weighing over a ton, passed downward through the spar deck, falling upon the men, instantly killing three. All of the men were horribly mutilated.

The heavy missiles, after passing through the gun deck, continued down to the third deck, where they came into contact with the armored deck, the heavy steel bringing them to a stop, thus saving the engineers and firemen who work below.

Although the upper decks were covered with men, no one there was seriously injured.

The explosion occurred just as the mess call had been sounded. Firing was to have ceased after the shot for the dinner hour. The range had been set, and the Iowa was steaming at a speed of twelve knots an hour when Lieut. Reed, in charge of the forward 12-inch turret, gave orders to load and fire. The time fuse was cut for the range, the piece charged, breech closed and the word given to fire. Following the report of the gun there was a smothered noise as the shell exploded midway in the gun, and pieces of the gun and shell were scattered broadcast. Three great holes were torn through the deck. Those who were below began coming on deck, some bloody and mutilated, while lying on the floor crushed almost beyond recognition were the three unfortunate men.

## NOTES FROM THE CAPITAL

A PROTEST AGAINST CARICATURES OF IRISHMEN ON THEATROAL POSTERS—NO TARIFF CHANGES THIS SESSION—LADY MINTO'S COTTAGE HOSPITAL SCHEMES.

(Special to the Chronicle.)

Ottawa, April 9.—A deputation of prominent Irishmen waited upon the Chief of Police tonight and protested against certain theatrical posters on the boards of the city, and in which the Irish race was caricatured. The chief replied that he had no jurisdiction in the matter, his authority being limited to the prohibition of posters that were immoral or indecent. The deputation will see the manager of the theatre to-morrow to ask for the removal of the posters, and if this is not done they promise a warm time to the performers on Monday.

Then auditors of Hull report to Mayor Gendron that the water rates are wholly inadequate to meet the interest and sinking funds on waterworks debentures.

It is stated that the Government has decided not to make any tariff changes this session. The duty on steel rails will be adjusted as soon as the Government is assured that rails of the proper quality can be made in Canada.

Local Scotchmen talk about erecting a statue to the memory of General Hector Macdonald.

A scheme for raising an endowment fund of \$125,000, producing interest not less than \$5000 per year, in aid of the Cottage Hospital movement of Her Excellency the Countess of Minto is being promulgated at Government House. Her Excellency met a number of prominent gentlemen of the city and discussed the matter, with the result that initial steps towards raising the amount were taken. Her Excellency explained at some length the work of the Victorian Order of Nurses, and commented particularly upon the desirability of establishing in connection with such work a system of cottage hospitals. Up to date \$25,057 has been subscribed. Eleven hospitals have been substantially aided; in Manitoba at Dauphin, Shoal Lake and Swan River; in British Columbia at Vernon, Revelstoke and Kaslo; in the Territories at Regina and Yorkton; in Ontario at Port William and Thessalon, and in Nova Scotia at Pictou.

Lady Minto explained that in furtherance of cottage hospital work, an endowment of \$125,000 was needed, and a few Montreal gentlemen had subscribed \$36,500. Senator Edwards was elected chairman of the local committee. All the principal cities in Canada will be asked to assist in this laudable movement.

Year by year the North West Mounted Police patrols are being extended, and this season it is expected they will reach beyond the Arctic circle. Last year one patrol went as far as Slave Lake, 500 miles north of Edmonton. By the end of the present season a police post will be established at Fort Macpherson, at the mouth of the Mackenzie River, 1900 miles north of Edmonton. Superintendent Constantine will have charge of this year's party, which will leave Edmonton towards the end of May. The Mackenzie is navigable from about June 10th to October 20th, so that if any of the party are to return in the autumn they will have to make quick time. The establishment of a police post in the delta of Mackenzie will be beneficial, as it will put a stop to the debauching of the natives by Americans engaged in the Arctic whale fisheries, who have established a depot at Herschel Island. Eventually the Yukon will be extended up Peel River to the Porcupine in Yukon, where communication will be made with the police force stationed in the Yukon territory.

The Minister of Labor has acceded to the request of Ralph Smith, M.P., British Columbia, and arrangements to enquire into the labor difficulties in the province for the appointment of a commission are now being made for the selection of the men who are to act.

About \$5000 in addition to what has already been subscribed is necessary for the construction of a suitable memorial in South Africa for the graves of deceased Canadian soldiers. Any persons desirous of contributing to this object may hand in their subscriptions to any chartered bank in Canada, or forward the same to Lt.-Col. Irwin, Ottawa. Subscriptions to date amount to \$5,896.17.

### A NOVEL SITUATION.

There is an old proverb on the dwellers in glass houses of which the moral is based on the fragility of those constructions, coupled with a hint of their inability to secure the secrecy and privacy of the interior, but the 'march of intellect' has gone ahead of the proverb and deprived it of all its point. There is a curious account in Chambers' Journal for this month, of a house built by a Hollander, Mr. Van der Hayden, in Yokohama, which is an ideal one in every respect, heat proof, cold proof, microbe proof, and even earthquake proof; a house whose walls and roof are of glass, which can be rendered opaque at pleasure, unbreakable, and without doors or windows to create draughts; whose inhabitants live in an equable temperature with a minimum of expense for warming, and which has been declared by the many engineers who have inspected it to contain all the conditions most necessary for an absolutely healthy mode of living.

The foundation pillars revolve easily in excavated semicircular hollows as a protection against earthquakes, three hundred of which it has successfully resisted. The house is about 40 feet by 21, and 16 feet high, and the glass of which it is composed is used in the form of rough plates, nearly three feet long, about two feet wide and a foot thick, enclosed in cast iron frames and united laterally by nuts and screws in such a manner as to form glass tiles, ranged one above the other, and separated by felt and wood to the height of the roof. There are, in fact, two walls, a foot apart, and the space is filled up with a strong solution of a sodium which may be colored at will so as to admit of a soft and agreeable light, and which maintains an equable temperature, since the heat of the sun warms the liquid instead of penetrating the glass, and melts a greater quantity of the salt, while at night the solution has a tendency to re-crystallize and part with its acquired heat. The ceiling is also of glass, with the interstices filled with India rubber, and over the tiles is a layer of fine ashes, covered over with thin wood, and this again with cement.

Pipes placed vertically at some distance from the building, and communicating with others opening into one of the lower chambers, supply the air, which is first filtered through cotton, and then driven over plate glass covered with glycerine to catch any remaining impurities. The floor of the rooms, which are double, separated by a bed of sawdust, contain gratings through which the purified air can be admitted at will, while outside, and at a level with the ceiling, is a sort of glass pipe communicating with openings through which the foul air is driven out. The heat generated by this pipe, either by the sun, a stove in one of the lower rooms, or an ingenious discharge of rain water, set up a draught which drives the contaminated air up a chimney. The whole edifice is surrounded by a shallow verandah, closed by ordinary glass, which prevents the heat engendered at night by the re-crystallization of the sodium from escaping from the building.

We have said that there are neither windows nor doors, that is in the ordinary sense; and the entrance is very ingeniously managed. Four plates of glass light an underground room, through which the interior of the house is reached, the visitor passing through a corridor and rising to the level of the ground by an enclosed corridor, whose doors are so adjusted that only a minimum of air is allowed to enter. Such is a brief description of this curious house, and it remains to be seen whether the example will be followed.

### THAT MULLOCK SURPLUS.

Some four or five months ago Mr. Mullock, Postmaster General, made a speech in Toronto, in which he announced that for the first time in the history of Canada the post office department would show a surplus for the fiscal year ending June 30th.

1902. "It is not a large surplus," he explained, "but a real surplus of \$5000." Whereupon the subsidized press sent up a great shout, as though the imposition of newspaper postage and the doubling of postage on nearly everything except letters were great gains to the Canadian people. But since then several things have happened. In the first place the official report of the Post Office Department appeared, and in it the revenue and expenditure of the department for the year named were given as follows:—

Not a surplus, as Mullock said it would show, but a deficit of \$82,375. Following this the Public Accounts for the year appeared, and in this official blue book the revenue and expenditure of the Post Office Department were given as follows:—

This was worse still. The public waited to see what the Auditor General would say about the matter. Well the Auditor General's report is now public property, and this is what he says are the correct figures of the Post Office revenue and expenditure for the fiscal year 1901-2:—

Notwithstanding the \$750,000 additional postage that he is extracting from the people of Canada, by increasing postage, his department is still nearly \$400,000 behind paying its way. But humbug it great and J. William Mullock is its prophet.—Halifax Herald.

### LIBERAL VIEW OF THE CENSUS.

A return brought down to Parliament shows that the cost of the census up to March 1st was \$1,112,000 as contrasted with the total cost of the last census of \$570,000. There are reasons why the expenditure should be larger than it was ten years ago, but the extraordinary increase, the doubling of the expenditure, gives the opposition good ground for criticism. A larger territory was covered in the last census than was covered in 1891, and more enumerators were required, and probably a larger amount of information obtained, but while these things would account for an increase in the expenditure of say twenty or twenty-five per cent., the actual increase, coupled with the amount of bungling and dissatisfaction connected with the whole affair, calls for some information as to why we should be going back in the management of these things instead of going forward.—Ottawa Events.

### COOKED AND DRIED.

The Toronto Mail points out that Ministerial journals are giving particulars of the coming redistribution. The division of the Hurons is announced. By the Brantford Examiner the proposition for Brant has been given out. There is to be a South Brant, composed of Brantford, West Brantford and Oakland, while the other portions of the county are to constitute North Brant. In the west the organs in Kent declare that Bothwell is to go, and that Lambton and Kent are to have four members between them. Passing beyond Ontario it is noticeable that the Vancouver World declares that the Government has decided upon the redistribution of British Columbia, and the particulars are given. To these add the fact that the division of Hamilton has been authoritatively announced, and the evidence that the whole business is cooked and dried is quite good.

### LABOR UNIONISM.

The hardest blow that labor unionism has received in years was the Taff-Vale decision in England. That decision limits the right of unions to striking, but forbids them endeavoring to enforce their demands upon employers by interfering in any way with non-strikers or by boycotting, inducing others to boycott or in any way injuring employers or adversely affecting their interests otherwise. In a word, workmen who go on strike can do nothing but withdraw from employment and take the chances of their late employers being able to fill their places without being allowed to interfere in any way with the measures taken to accomplish that. That decision has been followed in the United States in half a dozen notable cases, and now we have the decision of Judge Meredith at the instance of the Krug Furniture Company, of Berlin, who imposed a fine of \$100 and costs on the Amalgamated Woodworkers' International Union, and granted an injunction against boycotting and interference with non-strikers. In his judgment he characterized the conduct

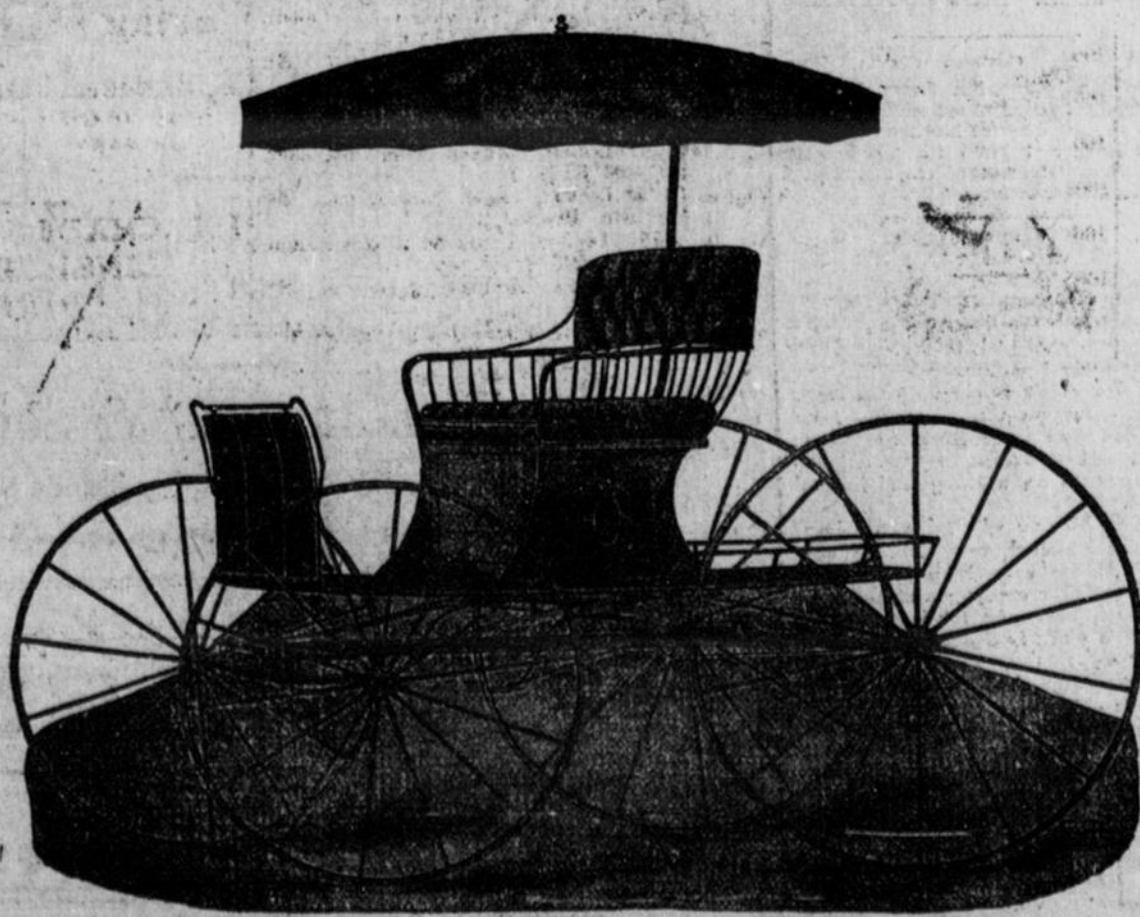

# Correspondence.

To the Editor of the Chronicle.

Sir,—In your issue of the 4th inst. I find two of several questions asked: "Where do oels breed? Can they travel over land?"

My nephew Colonel Stewart Bruce, has an eel fishery at Toome, County Antrim, Ireland, and while stopping with him I took great interest in fishing out all I could about them. The eels or silver eels are carried away at the sea and come up the rivers all the way at the same time that the salmon fry are going down. On the river Bann which separates County Antrim from Londonderry, where my nephew has the fishery—when the water is low they put over the falls, which are from six to eight feet high, straw ropes about the thickness of a man's wrist, these ropes I have seen fully a foot in circumference with young eels crawling up. At times these ropes are carried away when I have seen the eels close to the falls fully a hundred yards in length and from six inches to a foot in width one mass of eels fry about 2 to 2½ inches long which could not get up the falls making their way to the water above and so on to Lough Beg and Neagh.

The work is wide reaching and numerous commendations by those acquainted with it. \$71 was kindly contributed last year in its behalf which the Missionary gratefully acknowledges. 8th ROYAL RIFLES.  
Yesterday's Turn Out-Lieut. Colonel Ray's Regimental Order.  
This popular regiment had its first turn out yesterday afternoon under Lt.-Col. Ray, and notwithstanding the fact that the regiment has only commenced its annual drill, a good number of the men turned out. The regiment was preceded by its bugle and regimental bands, and marched through the principal streets of the city, the marching of the men being highly commented on. On returning to the Drill Hall, the following order was read out:  
No. 9. Regimental Order by Lieut. Col. Walter J. Ray, commanding 8th Regiment Royal Rifles.  
Quebec, 31st March, 1903.

Lieut. Col. Ray, in taking over command of the 8th Regiment Royal Rifles, with which regiment he has so long been connected, both in the ranks and as an officer, desired to refer to the long list of distinguished officers whom he succeeds in the command, and to the high reputation which the regiment has gained for itself under those officers.

Lieut. Col. Ray feels that all ranks will consider it a duty to maintain unimpaired, the position of the regiment in the Active Militia of the country as regards drill, rifle shooting and general efficiency.

To attain this object it is necessary that every member of the regiment be a recruiting agent, and that the ranks of the companies be filled up to full strength with that superior class of young men for which the corps has always been noted.

In addition there is required from every member strict attendance at all parades, and a determined effort to become, individually and collectively, efficient soldiers of His Majesty whose uniform we wear.

That the regiment is not without generous and influential friends, among our fellow-citizens of both nationalities, is proved by the fact that an endowment fund has been formed and \$7,000 already subscribed by these friends, as a token of their goodwill towards the regiment. There is a good prospect of this fund reaching the ten thousand dollar (\$10,000) mark, and the revenue derived from its investment is to be used for the furthering of the efficiency of the regiment-more particularly in developing and encouraging accurate rifle shooting, which now stands at the head of the indispensable qualifications of the modern soldier, and in which the 8th have always excelled.

It is Lieut. Col. Ray's intention should the attendance at drills during the present season's training be satisfactory to him, to put the regiment under canvas for some days, in which, as a preparation for inspection, practical work will be undertaken, and it is hoped that these few days of camp life can be made to afford both pleasure and instruction to all concerned.

Lieut. Col. Ray looks confidently for the cordial cooperation of all ranks in order to promote the well being and to maintain the prestige of the regiment.
