# McENTYRE, PINARD TALK RAMP CHANGE

Alleviation of hardships—which could mean either relocation of the Trans-Canada Highway ramp in Westmount or the provision of alternate housing for those displaced in West-

mount—appeared to be the aim of a top-level meeting Monday afternoon between a city team headed by Mayor Peter M. McEntyre and a provincial government group led by Roads

Minister Bernard Pinard. Various alternatives were discussed. They are to be examined by Quebec's engineers and a second meeting is scheduled for next Monday.

Both sides were non-committal after their session at the Cremazie boulevard offices of the provincial government. Mayor McEntyre confined his reply to questions from *The Examiner* to

generalities, mentioning that the meeting was most cordial and in a spirit of co-operation.

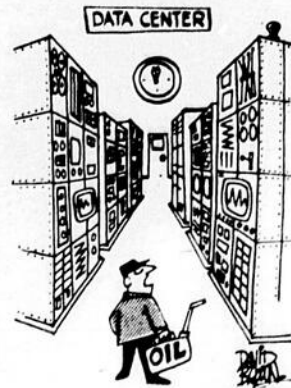
business as usual Monday morning.

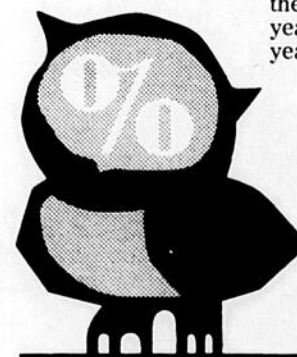

## Somerville group

# New type citizens' organization springs up

Out of the bitter conflict over the attempt of Trizec Corp. Ltd. to construct a nine-storey old people's apartment building on Prince Albert avenue has sprung a type of citizens' organization new to Westmount.

It is a permanent organization called SARA, the Somerville Area Residents' Association, and its function is not only to ensure that citizens' needs are not ignored by city hall, but to find out what residents want and to plan neighborhood development based on their wishes.

To achieve this end, a planning committee has been set up within SARA and questionnaires distributed to every resident in the Somerville area. The questionnaires which were designed with the aid of sociologists and psychologists, will determine what people want for their neighborhood - what they want to keep, what they want to get rid of and how they want the neighborhood to evolve.

The results of the survey will be fed into a computer and will form the basis of the planning committee's proposals. To the knowledge of SARA members, this type of neighborhood planning has never been tried in Westmount before. The Somerville neighborhood is bounded by Winchester avenue, Claremont avenue, de Maisonneuve boulevard, and approximately Victoria avenue.

### Body 'a must'

Rudi Franchi, an articulate gregarious American of 16 Somerville avenue and an active member of SARA, says that this new type of citizens' organization is a must if middle-class citizens



are to preserve their neighborhoods.

"We were brought up to believe that 'progress' is a good thing and we should step aside for it," he said. "But now people are becoming suspicious because often so-called progress—like high-rise apartments for instance—is causing more problems than it is solving."

Mr. Franchi, a journalist, is enthusiastic about the Somerville area and believes strongly that SARA will be a forceful tool in preserving and enhancing the neighborhood.

"A real sense community developed during the crisis over the high-rise," he said. "People were shook up by the crazy rumors that were circulating at that time and they banded together for protection. They knew there were plans for a

Metro stop in the area and as the neighborhood is surrounded by commercial areas, they knew it had a great attraction for developers. They feared the destruction of the neighborhood.

"Once we got to know each other we realized what an interesting and diverse little community we had. We found that not only are we an ethnically diverse group but almost every profession is represented in the community. SARA is able to draw on help from lawyers, accountants, architects, public relations men, writers, engineers, college professors and others."

SARA would probably never have come into existence, he said, if there had been better communications between city hall and the Somerville neighborhood. "People were upset over the method by which plans for the building of the high-rise were made known. Rightly or wrongly, people felt they were being pushed around. They were afraid of the large corporation and they didn't know what was going on.

"There were hardly any com-

munications between the neighborhood and city hall and all kinds of fantastic rumors were circulating. Of course, we were as much to blame as anyone for not making it our business to know what was happening. But now we're trying to overcome the communications problem. We've formed a committee to attend city hall meetings and report back to the association and we send out a newsletter.

### Become positive

"What has happened," he said, "is that we've changed from a

negative group to a positive group. At first we joined together to protect ourselves from a threat. Now we're involved in helping to plan and develop our neighborhood. And that's a big step - and it makes us very different from the protest kind of group."

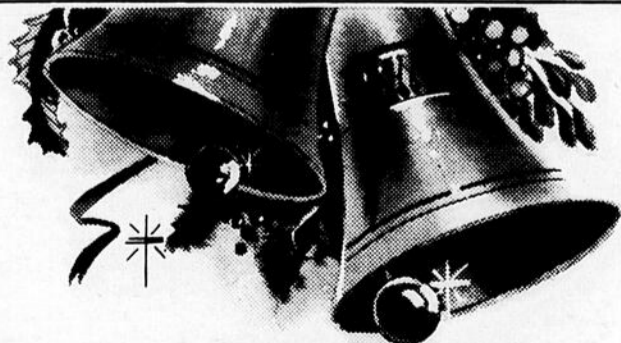
No specific proposals or plans for the Somerville area have yet been developed by SARA, but in discussing ideas for the neighborhood's future, no lack of imagination has been shown. The idea of creating a mall out of either Prince Albert avenue or Burton avenue has been discussed. Other thoughts are the widening of sidewalks and the creation of a complex series of one way streets in the area which will prevent motorists from using the neighborhood as a short cut between de Maisonneuve and Sherbrooke.

SARA has also created a traffic committee to develop ideas to solve the area's perennial parking and traffic problems. "As it stands now," said Mr. Franchi, "the Somerville area is a little enclave boxed in by commercial areas. Unfortunately, people who use the commercial areas use the Somerville neighborhood as a gigantic parking lot. The residents don't park there because of the parking laws and as the houses have no garages, they are forced to park outside the area. But non-residents continue to use the area for parking."

Another traffic problem is, according to Mr. Franchi, the bus route through the area. Buses are required to turn a blind corner at Claremont and Somerville and

## Christmas bonus for MPs?

Last week the House of Commons was a wild scene for all Christmas-spirited committee chairmen. Report after report was tabled in the House, to the point where one began to wonder whether the committees would ever get around to producing anything if there were not holiday deadlines which they had to meet.

Of course, the standing committees were not the only ones who squeaked in under the gun. A special committee of the Senate recently delivered the first volume of its study of our science policy, about which I hope to have more to say before very long. My colleague, the minister of national health and welfare, tabled a white paper on income security which I hope will receive considerable attention from one and all.

And, of course, the government tabled the Beaupre report, more uncommonly known as the "Report of the Advisory Committee on Parliamentary Salaries and Expenses."

This committee was commissioned by the president of the Privy Council last February to inquire into the financial arrangements made for senators and members of Parliament, to recommend any appropriate changes, and to suggest a procedure whereby similar reviews could be undertaken from time to time without having to revert to independent committees and other solutions of an ad hoc nature.

### Broad concerns

The three-man committee interpreted "financial arrangements" rather broadly, and their recommendations cover many aspects of the working life of the members of Parliament and of the senators. For example, included are provisions for constituency offices and assistants to operate them. Increased office space in the parliament buildings. Reimbursement for travel to and from the constituency for the MPs and their wives, and an allowance of \$200 per month in support of an Ottawa residence.

More controversially, the report contains recommendations calling for the elimination of all current tax-free and non-accountable expenses. Which currently amount to \$6,000 per annum for each MP, and half that for each senator. Instead of

acquire their home and have paid their full taxes these many years.

this provision, it is proposed that members of Parliament receive an increase in salary to \$23,000 annually, retroactive to Oct. 1 of this year, and a further hike to \$25,000 following the next general election.

### Little improvement

In terms of take-home pay, there is little improvement, or as Beaupre would say, relief, for the average MP even though he has not undergone any increases whatsoever since 1963. The situation is not altogether the same for cabinet ministers who would receive, under the Beaupre plan, a taxable income of \$48,000 per annum (of which \$23,000 would come automatically as an MP) instead of a taxable salary of \$27,000 and a tax-free allowance of \$8,000.

By virtue of our rather all-powerful position, members of Parliament are really quite embarrassed about discussing salaries and expenses, and this is why this pressing problem has gone unnoticed for so long.

In my own capacity as your representative, I am very anxious to receive your opinion.

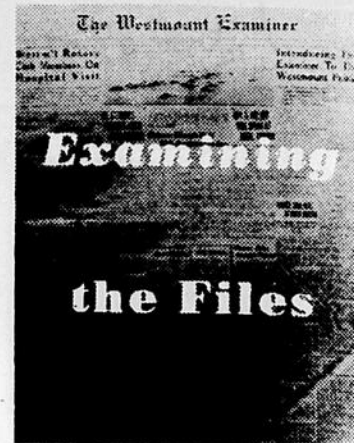
## 4424 studied in sociology at Dawson

A seminar was held at Dawson College sociology department recently at which Mrs. Marjorie Bedoukian, psychiatric social worker, and Rod Newman, a volunteer detached youth worker, both of the 4424 Youth Centre, and Sgt.-Det. Brian Hunter of the Westmount Police were guest speakers.

The Dawson students were interested in the growth of the centre and clinic as an innovative approach to how a community can fulfil both the stated and felt needs of its youth population.

As 4424 does not exist in a vacuum, but must necessarily relate and interrelate with various institutions in the wider community, the work of the police as well as schools, hospitals, parent groups, the outreach services of the YMCA, etc., is of primary importance, says Mrs. Bedoukian.

She went on to add that, being an unique experimental experience and the only one of its kind in Canada, the history of its development is of primary interest to the students of the sociology of social movements.

## Local canines suffer '67 invasion of ticks

Westmount's canines, according to a citizen living on Metcalfe avenue, may be in some danger from ticks.

She reported that she found several ticks on her dog which has short hair, and later on she found four more around the house.

The dog is walked regularly in Westmount Park.

Worried, she called on Mrs. Pamela Mack, a former resident of Westmount, who operates a kennel in Pointe Claire.

Ticks, until 1967, were a thing almost unknown in Canada, says Mrs. Mack. Then, during the Centennial celebrations, American tourists brought their dogs to Canada bearing many ticks. The area in the U.S.A. they mostly came from was New England. To an American, Mrs. Mack claims, a tick is nothing to particularly worry about. However they are.

### Hard to eradicate

The tick is an extremely hard insect to eradicate. In an experiment at an American university, ticks were frozen in commercial deep freezers, which are a lot colder than our refrigerators' freezing compartments, then later thawed out. They merely woke up and apparently had no physical bad effects.

Mrs. Mack made it quite clear that there was no particular epidemic of ticks here in Westmount, but that ticks inhabit most park areas, including Westmount Park.

The thought of there actually being a tick problem in epidemic proportions is to Superintendent of Recreation and Parks B.R. Rockwell "absolutely ridiculous." Dr. Angus Boright says that this is the first complaint that he has heard in two years. Dr. Boright, the medical officer of health in Westmount, says that ticks will infest park animals like squirrels. Many times they will invade a house,

and breed in the woodwork.

### Causes discomfort

There are ticks in Westmount, but they also are in all parts of Montreal. The problem is that "Man's best friend," especially the longer haired type, can pick up a tick and it can go un-noticed, causing the dog a lot of discomfort.

As far as the CSPCA is concerned, the only prevention against ticks for dog owners is not to let the dog out of the house, and to have the house more clean than a hospital. They feel that a dog, like any animal, will get ticks and, to remove them, a visit to a veterinarian is the best cure.

## Majors and Minors

For last-minute shoppers

While shopping in a large, beautifully decorated department store a few days ago, I met a friend who was really in a muddle—just couldn't think of what to give to a couple of friends "who have everything." I suggested records. She was delighted: "I hadn't thought of that."

Both couples have excellent stereo sets, she added, "but it will be hard to choose."

"Not at all," I answered, "because if you know what kind of music appeals to them, it is easy."

One can buy records in advance or at the last moment.

"Have you had lunch? Let's have a sandwich and you come with me to help select the records." Since I had enough time, we ate then headed for the record department.

This is what she chose. One couple likes classical, and remembering hearing them talk about their enjoyment of Shostakovich, she selected Symphony No. 5 (RCA-VCCS 1380) Washington Symphony conducted by Howard Mitchell, and Piano Concerto No. 5, same composer, (RCA-LSC 3121) Pianist John Browning and Boston Symphony under Leinsdorf.

For the other couple, who love plays, she chose "Hair" with the original cast (RCA-LSO 1143) and "Fiddler On The Roof" (RCA-LSO 10930).

Was she happy? Indeed.

### For collectors

For people who collect records—for music lovers, for children—nothing could be a nicer gift than some well-chosen discs. I have just finished listening to the complete recording of Chopin's 51 mazurkas, three records by the great Artur Rubinstein (RCA-LSC 6177). I got out the music and followed his performance with

the score. Rubinstein is just fabulous. Enclosed is a 12-by-12 brochure with a biography of Chopin, a smiling picture of the pianist at the keyboard.

Another magnificent record—the complete Chopin waltzes (RCA-LSC 2726)—which I am sure that nobody could play better than Rubinstein. Just one disc. This is a new recording by the master pianist (he recorded the waltzes first 10 years ago) with a grand picture on the front and a familiar caricature on the back of the jacket.

Two French-Canadian artists have made recordings for the festive season. Richard Verreau, with orchestra and choirs, in Chansons Noel is in top form in this record (RCA-LM 2390) which has 14 numbers. Appropriate and familiar Christmas music.

Some time ago, I was told that organist Lucien Hetu has sold more records than any other Canadian artist. He is immensely popular in concert and always draws packed houses. This special Christmas record (RCA-CGPS 343) is titled simply "Noel" and includes religious themes, melodious carols and jolly tunes that make for real happy listening.

# Toys: tokens of love

Toys are tokens of love. It is fitting that they should be chosen with care. But children change and toys change and parents are often faced with confusing and glittering choices. Common sense in buying toys is important but the following general guides should be kept in mind.

1. A toy should be suitable for the age and ability of a child.  
Every child is an individual. A parent must take into account the mental and physical ability of a child in selecting a toy. Toys that are too complicated for the child's stage of growth may be disappointing.  
Parents should keep toys for older children away from infants.
2. Durability and ruggedness are important.  
Children are destructive. Some toys are going to be chewed or dropped or banged about. They should be made to take punishment. For some others, washability is important.
3. Toys should tickle a child's fancy.  
Toys are often a part of a world of make believe. Colorful and simple things will sometimes open up a delightful world of play and fantasy.
4. The design of toys should be appealing.  
Children learn about colors from toys. They also learn how things fit together. Attractive colours and good design will give children some appreciation of artistic harmony.
5. Toys should function properly.  
Children expect functional toys to work. When a toy is supposed to make a noise, to move on wheels or fit together in some way, a child is going to be frustrated if it doesn't.
6. Careful shopping for toys is sensible.  
Prices of toys often vary from store to store. By checking on prices, it is often possible to save money. The child won't care but the parents should.
7. Quantity is not a substitute for quality.  
Children should not be overloaded with toys. It is better to buy carefully a few selected toys of high quality (not necessarily expensive) than a large hit or miss collection.
8. Above all, toys should be safe.

street, just east of St. Antoine, to make way for an eastbound ramp to the limited access highway, which Mr. Pinard said yesterday was to go ahead. Indeed, it is believed contracts are in hand for commencement shortly at the Turcot interchange end of the extension.

A number of alternative ramp sites have been suggested, by both the city and by private groups in behalf of the citizens directly concerned. Some of these ideas engineering problems which would greatly enhance the cost.

However, one suggestion believed to have been put before the roads department yesterday would provide essentially the same link to the highway without requiring the demolition of any houses on St. Antoine and perhaps none on Greene. This would use the existing line of Selby street east from Greene, rising to the highway.

Representing the city with Mr. McEntyre were General Manager Norman C. Dawe, Director of Services Fred Davis and Acting City Engineer Ed. McCavour.

A number of readers have asked me to elaborate on the life of an airline pilot.

I suppose, like all my colleagues in the aviation business, we don't think of it as a romantic way of life. If we stopped long enough to think of it in that light, I guess we'd have to agree with them.

Having made that statement, I thought I'd give you, over various weeks, an idea of what goes on inside the cockpit of the big jets and the type of person who flies them.

This week I'll tell you generally what the makeup of a pilot is. To do this I must go back to the beginning of flight.

Man has always wanted to fly. The lucky ones, the people who had the flair for it, did. People called them daredevils—or reckless.

Reckless? No! Daredevils? Well, if you call a man who loves life and lives it to the fullest—has most probably met death face to face in the air many times and has known the greatest exhilarating thrill of all, that of winning. Maybe then you'd call him a daredevil. I wouldn't.

The intense training a pilot goes through makes him too responsible a person to be tagged thusly. But love life he does, never doubt that. An extrovert and an egotist, yes. I've never met a good pilot who didn't think he was the best in the world. Frankly, I would not hire a man as a pilot who did not think this way.

A pilot is also, believe it or not, a lover of nature. The beautiful sunrises and sunsets he sees flying above the clouds gives him a view and a closeness to nature very few people have a chance to appreciate. The Northern Lights dancing all over the sky on a crisp wintery night. All these things he would be lost without.

When a pilot is out of the sky for too long, his feet are pawing at

the earth, waiting to get back into the air again. Wanting to transform that big piece of complicated metal into the complete flying machine. Subject to his every whim, his every command.

To sum it all up, a pilot loves life - he loves people. They go hand in hand. As John Gillespie

Magee jr. wrote and expressed all our feelings for us in his poem "High Flight": "Oh, I have slipped the surly bonds of earth, and danced the sky on laughter-silvered wings;...

See you on the flight deck. Over and out.

That is what our life is all about.

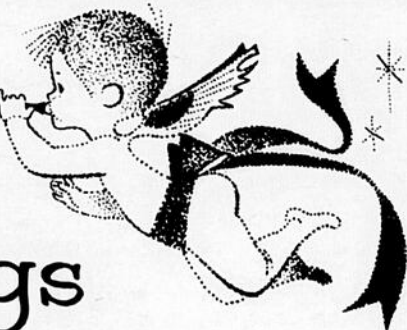

SARA because they increase citizen involvement in local affairs, but he believes there is a danger that such organizations can become too inward looking.

"The questionnaire idea of SARA is excellent," he said, "and it will be a great help to city hall, but I hope the group is taking into account city needs as well as local needs. We at city hall must face the taxpayers and we have to be aware of the economic impact of changes as well as the sociological impact. At city hall we have to look at the overall community. We have to put all the pieces together."

Prof. John Jackson, chairman of the sociology department at Sir George Williams University, sees the growth of citizens' groups such as SARA as part of an urban trend which is linked to a ground swell demand for public participation in the decision making processes.

"The trend for public participation in municipal government is paralleled by a demand for participation in all organizations," he said. "Many different kinds of groups are demanding a broadening of the decision-making base."

"Citizens' groups usually don't develop unless there is a threat or an issue, but once people organize to solve the problem a community develops, although a sense of community may never have existed before."

**Expression of faith**

He believes citizens' groups are an expression of faith in the existing system. "What they are saying is this: 'if we form a group we will be listened to and will get results.' The optimistic point of view is that this is good, that people are shedding their apathy and getting involved. However, I'm inclined towards the pessimistic view. If the groups get results, fine. But I speculate that these groups - especially low income groups - will reach a point where they will be blocked. The level of frustration will increase when objectives are not met and social conflict will result."

But at present there seems little chance of conflict between SARA and the more established civic groups. "We're not a militant group," said Jeff Henry of 76 Somerville avenue, an active member of the association. "We don't expect to get everything we ask for, there will be compromises. But the kind of work we are doing is the kind of work city hall would have to do anyway. City hall can't know what we want unless we tell them. We can give them some sort of direction."

As for the site of the proposed high-rise - the stimulant which brought the Somerville association to flower. It is still there - empty, an eyesore and an attraction to children in summer, a topic for conversation in winter.

"But most residents," said Mr. Franchi, "are glad the high-rise bid was defeated. If allowed, it would have been a death blow to the community. It would have left the neighborhood wide open to developers."

**Site improved**

The lot is presently owned by Ogilvie Flour Mills Co. Ltd. Already SARA has brought about some improvement in the lot by voicing concern about the danger of holes in the loosely filled basement of the old bakery which once stood on the site. Ogilvie is at present filling in the holes and making the earth in the basement more compact.

Now the problem is the appearance of the site. Ogilvie executives have said that in the Spring they will perhaps have the lot sodded or fenced or both.

The future of the site? There are no concrete plans by SARA yet. "As far as we know," said Mr. Franchi, "it is now

economically feasible to build townhouses on the site. It was not possible before because the price of the land was based on the assumption that the bylaw would be changed. Now it is realized the bylaw won't be changed, the building of houses is a possibility."

"But any group wishing to

develop the site will have to take SARA into consideration. You might say we're taking preventive action. We're not waiting for problems to develop."

Brief cases are those things carried by lawyers who hope that the ones they are working on won't be.

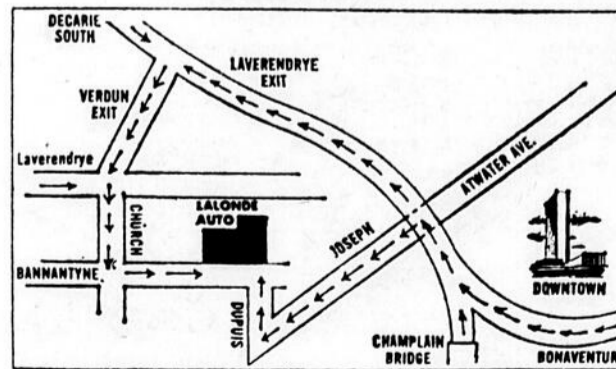

# November property prices 13 percent over valuation

Property sale prices in November in Westmount were 13 percent higher than the city valuations.

The 14 sales totalled \$503,300, \$65,000 higher than the city valuations of \$438,300. This is a distinct rise in the markup percentage of October, which was only 2.2 percent.

Total transfers were down from the October total of 40 to 30, representing city values of \$1,776,710 and \$1,032,950 respectively. Last November's transfers amounted to \$2,126,770.

In addition to the 14 sales indicating price, there were three donations valued at \$117,900, seven declarations of property to estates valued at \$209,900, and five sales for other considerations valued at \$226,850.

## Fire Brigade wishes you merry—and safe—Yule

The Westmount Fire Brigade had a comparatively quiet week. They hope it will remain that way through the holiday season and beyond and, to all Westmount residents, they extend greetings, and wishes for a merry and fire-safe Christmas.

In this cold season, it is good to keep warm, Captain-Inspector Bill Timmins warns, but it is also essential to be safe.

When using central heating, make sure that the unit is clean and its controls checked by a serviceman. Flu pipes should be clean, hole-free and well supported. Chimneys should be checked for loose bricks, and be cleaned yearly.

Near the furnace, make sure that there is enough air for combustion and ventilation. Trash, papers, paint and other combustible items must be kept away. Individual room heaters should be kept out of halls and

doorways where they might block an escape route. Don't overfuse electric heaters. Avoid over-filling units.

When retiring for the night, put room heaters out. Sleep with bedroom doors or the hall door closed so that fire may be held back long enough to escape.

Remember that as temperatures drop, fire dangers rise.

### Choosing a tree

When choosing a tree for Christmas, try to find a fresh looking one, and no bigger than you need. The larger the tree, the greater the hazard.

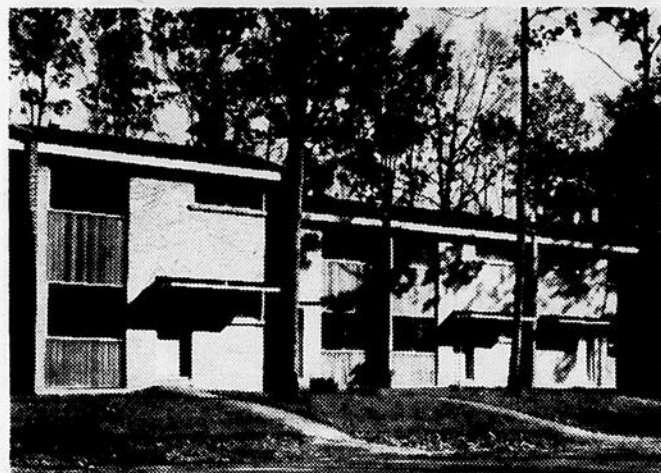
