CLASS I.

RAW MATERIALS, PRODUCTS OF THE SOIL, &c.

Section A.

(From the Geological Survey.)

- Bog Iron Ore, containing about 50 per cent of pure iron, from Tilsonburg, in the Township of Deerham, C. W.
- Do do containing about 50 per cent of pure iron, from Côte St Charles, Seigniory of Vaudreuil, C. E.
- Specular Iron Ore, containing 58 per cent pure iron, from a bed of 25 feet thick on Lot 6, Range C and D, Township of Macnab, C. W.
- Magnetic Iron Ore, from a bed 200 feet thick on the 26th and 27th Lots of the 6th Range of S. Crosby, C. W., belonging to Messrs. Chaffey & Brothers. This ore-bed is situated on an island in Mud Lake, on the Rideau Canal, and the ore, which contains between 60 and 70 per cent of pure iron, is mined by the proprietors and transported by barges to Kingston, where a stock of it is held in readiness for sale. It is placed on board of lake craft at \$2½ per ton and carried to Cleveland, and thence to Pittsburg, where it is smelted. In the year 1859 about 4,000 tons of this ore were thus exported; and within the last few years the quantity exported from this bed, and a bed of 90 feet thick in Hull, is about 15,000 tons.

Titaniferous Iron Ore, from a bed 90 feet in thickness in the Parish of St. Urbain, near Bay St. Paul, below Quebec.

Ore of a similar character occurs in various other localities in Brome and Sutton, as well as in St. Armand, in beds ranging from 1 to 8 feet thick, with a produce of from 20 to 50 per cent of pure iron.

Chromic Iron, from Hatley. Beds of Chromic Iron of 1 or 2 feet thick occur in Serpentine in the Township of Bolton and the augmentation of Ham, as well as at the eastern end of the Shichshock Mountains in Gaspé, a part of the Notre Dame range.

Magnesite or Carbonate of Magnesia, from a great stratified mass of the rock in Bolton, Range 9, Lot 17. Carbonate of Magnesia is the only known substance yielding a cement capable of resisting the decomposing effect of sea-water. For the construction of marine docks, it is at present manufactured in France from the sea at a cost of \$30 per ton.

Sawn Slabs of Soapstone or Compact Tale, from Bolton, Range 6, Lot 24

Do Potstone or Compact Chlorite, from do, Range 2, Lot 26.

These two minerals occur in thick beds accompanying the Serpentine and Dolomite of the Eastern Townships, from Potton to Broughton, a distance of upwards of 100 miles, and probably much farther to the north-east.

Mica, from Grenville, Range 6, Lot 9

Graphite or Plumbago, from Grenville, Range 10, Lot 2.

These two refractory minerals are found associated with the Limestone bands of the Laurentian series of rocks.

Roofing Slates, from Shipton, belonging to the Shipton Slate Company.

Do from Melbourne, Range 6, Lot 22.

Roofing Slates accompany the Lower Silurian series of rocks from Potton to Cranbourne, and are known again on the River Marsouin, below Cape Chat.

Granite dressed as a Millstone, from the Seignior of St. Joseph, Beauce, C. E.

Granite of a similar character occurs in intrusive masses in various parts between Lake Memphruggog and the River Chaudière, which would yield inexhaustible supplies. There is no doubt that it would give a building material of an enduring description; the feldspar being potash feldspar, which is the variety belonging to lasting granite, in opposition to soda feldspar, the presence of which generally leads to early decay under atmospheric influences. This granite is of Devonian age, and is in every respect the same as that of Maine, so extensively used for building purposes at Portland and elsewhere. The stone is split with facility into rectangular blocks by the application of wedges, and is not very difficult to dress.

Syenite dressed as building stone, from Grenville, Range 5, Lot 13, belonging to Mr. J. Lowe.

In Grenville, Chatham, and Wentworth, C. E., there are about thirty-six square miles occupied by an intrusive Syenite of this description, which breaks through the Laurentian rocks. The feldspar is potash feldspar, and as a building stone it would be a lasting material, though somewhat less easily dressed than the white granite of the Eastern Townships.

10 blocks, and 4 slabs of Serpentine, from Melbourne.

The band of Serpentine from which these specimens have been obtained is of Lower Silurian age, and has been traced from Potton to Cranbourne, upwards of 120 miles; it has again been met with at the eastern end of the Shickshock Mountains, nearly 300 miles farther, and in Mount Serpentine, about 15 miles north-west of Gaspé Bay. There can be little doubt of its yielding a great variety, and an inexhaustible supply of material applicable to decorative construction.

3 polished slabs of Marble, from Dudswell, Range 7, Lot 12, C. E.

These variegated marbles are of Upper Silurian or Devonian age, and occur in great abundance.

3 polished slabs of Marble, from the vicinity of Phillipsburgh, St. Armand, C. E.

1 polished slab of Marble, from St. Lin, Seigniorship of Lachenaye, C. E.

- 1 polished slab of Marble, from Gloucester, C. W.

These variegated marbles are of Lower Silurian age, and occur in great abundance. The St. Armand black marble is from a quarry on Missisquoi Bay which was formerly worked, the produce of it being exported to the United States before the opening of the black marble quarries of Glens Falls. The red marble from St. Lin is from the same band of limestone (the Chazy formation) as that of Caughnawaga and Isle Bizard, where the stone is grey and only spotted with red.

These marbles are from the limestones interstratified among the gneiss of the Laurentian series of Canada, being the oldest series of the continent. Of the Arnprior marbles, the two with the corrugated (or tiger skin) pattern would meet with a ready sale if the stone were extensively worked. The marble from the Augmentation of Grenville is similar to a marble formerly worked in Grenville by Mr. Charlebois, but of a somewhat better description. The green spots in it are composed of Serpentine.

- An undressed block of jasper conglomerate from the North Shore of Lake Huron.

This rock occurs in mountain masses, and represents one of the divisions of the Huronian series of Canada, being the lower of the two Copper-bearing formations of Lakes Huron and Superior. Ornamental vases have been manufactured from the rock by Mr. G. Hermann, of Paris, who has an extensive establishment for cutting, turning, and polishing granites, syenites and other descriptions of hard stone of large dimensions.

A large Centre Stand or Epergne representing a Maple Tree, 27 inches high; at its base an Indian in full costume holding in his hand a flag on which are the words "Welcome most noble Prince". A Wigwam is cut on the opposite side and a canoe with paddles, from the top four branches extend with glass dishes or nozzles for candles surmounted by a large glass dish for flowers or fruit.

A large Silver Pitcher of Hebe, very richly chased, a view of the Chaudière Bridge and Rapids on the Richmond and Quebec Section of the Grand Trunk Railway, on the reverse a view of a Bridge between Sherbrooke and Island Pond, each have a Locomotive and Train passing them, there are six Cups to match on each of which is a different Railway Scene. A Silver Claret Jug of Louis Quatorze style, elaborately chased and finished, with a variety of Cups and Goblets of various styles, all elegantly chased and gilt inside.

Three Silver Coffee and Tea Sets of novel styles and designs, one having branches representing Maple mounted or laid on the surface, a wreath in the same way is placed around the top of each article.

A Mahogany Case containing a dozen of each kind of Silver Table and Dessert Forks and Spoons, Tea, Salt, Mustard and Egg Spoon, &c., of the Albert Pattern.

A vase made of Native Silver, about fifteen inches high, with two vine handles finished off with leaves: on one side is chased a view of the Victoria Bridge, and the reverse a Shield surmounted with a Bust of H. R. Highness Prince of Wales and the Plumes. At the base is a bough of Maple with a large Beaver at work on it—it has a cover, the handle of which is an Indian scout seated on a Rock with Rifle in hand. A case containing a very elaborate finished Fish Knife and Fork also of native Silver, and in a Tray some specimens of native Silver as found in the Mines. Also a quantity of Jewellery, consisting of Chains, Bracelets, &c.

A. Hoffnung, jeweller, Glass Case containing the following articles of his manufacture:—A Dressing Case for a gentleman, made of Canadian Birds-eye-Maple, richly clasped and bound with silver in the Mediæval style. The fittings in the interior are of solid silver, of the most chaste description; each of the pieces are engraved with a circle of maple leaves surmounted with the Prince of Wales Plume, and a beaver at the bottom; the lining of purple silk velvet; and it contains every requisite instrument for the toilet. Also, a Lady's Dressing Case exactly similar to the above. A large Work Box and Writing Desk, manufactured of

morocco leather. The novelty of this article is the fact of the Work Box and Writing Desk being contained in one, and yet both complete. A morocco leather Jewel Case very beautifully fitted up. CANADIAN NAIL PLATE.—VICTORIA IRON WORKS.—The manufacture of this article was commenced a year ago for the first time in Canada, at the Victoria Iron Works in Montreal. The iron used for cutting into nails, in Canada, had, up to this time, been confined to sheets and hoops, imported from England; but the want of a stronger and tougher iron (such as had been made in the United States for nails) caused attention to be drawn to the manufacture of a similar article here. At present the Canadian Nail Plate is made from scrap iron alone, but it is intended by next spring to erect furnaces in which pig metal will be made malleable by a process known as puddling, and rolled into plate as from scrap. The establishment is under the management of Mr. Wm. H. Snell, formerly of the Marmora Iron Works, Canada West, and has during the last 12 months turned out twelve hundred tons of this material.

R E P O R T .

*To the Sub-Committee of the Board of Arts and Manufactures for
Lower Canada,—*

YOUR COMMITTEE appointed to revise the awards of the several juries (except those under the direction of the Board of Agriculture, and the Horticultural and Fine Arts Associations,) and prepare a complete Prize List, have the honor to report:—

That in entering upon the discharge of their duties, they conceived it to be within the scope of the functions assigned to them, not to alter the respective positions in the Prize List assigned to exhibitors by the juries in the several classes, but so to apportion the rewards for excellence as to render—so far as possible—equal justice to all, and assign to each department of the Exhibition its due share of importance and awards. This was found to be the more necessary inasmuch as the reports of the several juries were made up upon very different understandings of the nature of their duties. Some merely assigned first or second places to exhibitors; some only reported on the quality of the goods exhibited; some awarded medals most profusely, some most parsimoniously—all, however, we are convinced, with an honest desire to do their duty towards the board and the exhibitors. Strict adherence to the letter of these awards and not their spirit would have been unduly to reward some departments, unjustly to rob others of the proportion of rewards to which they were entitled. The thorough performance of their duties involved the careful examination by your Committee of all complaints, protests, &c., and frequent reference to the members of

the several juries for explanation and re-consideration of their awards. Hence the delay which has occurred in the issue of the Prize List.

The inauguration of the new system of rewards by medals, according to merit, and not according to the precise terms of a detailed prize list, was one cause of the additional labor thus entailed on your Committee and of the additional delay referred to. But your Committee are satisfied that this plan, so strongly recommended in the report of the delegates from this Board sent to the Provincial Exhibition held at Kingston last year, is much better than that of money prizes, as applied to the great staple manufactures of the country. It has been objected that the rewards, more especially the bronze medals, are of little intrinsic value. But it has been the aim of your Committee so carefully to regulate their distribution that they may be esteemed far beyond their intrinsic value, for what they represent rather than what they are. The highest mark of distinction with which a British soldier can adorn his breast is a simple bronze cross of trifling intrinsic value. It should be the aim of the Board to make its medals the representatives of so high a degree of excellence as to cause them to be esteemed a distinction by any mechanic or manufacturer in the country. It is not practicable to enforce rigidly the rule of proper parsimony in the distribution of awards at the inception of a new system; but your Committee have endeavored, while doing what was esteemed practicable in this direction now, to open the way for still greater carefulness in the future. It has been their aim in all cases to act on the rule of rewarding absolute rather than merely comparative merit.

In the instructions printed for the use of the judges, it was stated that gold medals would only be awarded for original inventions, or for the introduction of new and important manufactures. Only two gold medals were awarded by the juries. One was for a machine which, although hardly coming under the strict letter of the above definition, was yet recommended very strongly by the jury as combining a number of ingenious improvements, which united, had so largely added to the productive powers of the machine, and to the quality of its work, as to possess the value of a new invention. Your Committee therefore have allowed this award to stand. The other was for a collection which your Committee recognize (in common with the jury) to have been of very superior excellence. But to award a gold medal simply for a

large and varied collection of great excellence in design and workmanship was, as your Committee conceived, quite beside the purpose for which the gold medal was struck. To award it in such cases might be a policy calculated to induce exhibitors to fill exhibitions with large displays of goods; but it would leave the Board without the power of conferring adequate distinction upon the highest merit in an inventor or manufacturer. This medal has therefore been withheld. No case has been made out before your Committee of any other original invention of sufficient importance or demonstrable utility to entitle it to a similar award. Nor has any case of the successful establishment of a new and sufficiently important manufacture since the last Provincial Exhibition been established as the basis of a similar award. To go beyond that period were to open up the claims of those who started nearly all the leading manufactures of this city and many in other parts of the country, carrying the investigation back ten years or more. This, it was believed, was not the intention of the Board. But your Committee are of opinion that this report should not be considered conclusive against any claims to the gold medal which may hereafter be established. On the contrary, they would strongly recommend that the Board's gold medal should be always open for the competition of inventors and the founders of manufactures. It will be more carefully and judiciously awarded after a patient investigation of each separate case, than it ever can be during the hurry and confusion necessarily attendant upon an exhibition.

The silver medal it was announced would be awarded for large and excellent collections, and for the highest merit in design, workmanship or manufacture. In revising the awards of these medals, two courses were suggested to your Committee—the one to grant only one silver medal to one competitor for a collection, however varied, granting the bronze for the highest merit in the several departments; the other to confirm the grants made by juries in many instances of a silver medal for great excellence in any great branch of manufacture. After mature consideration and a reference to yourselves the latter course has been adopted.

The bronze medals were to be awarded for excellence of manufacture in a less degree, or upon articles of a less importance than those obtaining the silver medal. In many instances it will be seen a bronze medal represents a first prize under the old system.

Honorable mention was to be awarded for all other articles of marked merit.

Money prizes have been given for household manufactures and articles of minor importance or minor utility.

Upon these bases the Committee have revised the awards of the several juries, and prepared from the data they afforded the following prize list.

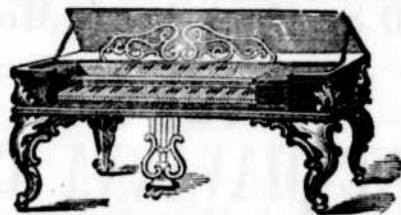
