CHURCHILL MAY RESIGN TOMORROW

World News In Brief

Winnipeg — Floodwaters brought on by ice jams and a sudden spring runoff are being battled today in at least three southern Manitoba communities.

Temperatures that soared into the 50's ate into the thick blanket of snow and sent torrents of water into sections of Brandon, MacGregor and Plum Coulee.

Buffalo, N.Y. — An irate father early Sunday shot and killed a 16-year-old boy who had been dating his twin daughter for three years, police reported.

The victim, Gordon Thuman, died of a shotgun wound in the neck before the eyes of his girl friend, Jean Klein, 19.

Three Rivers, Que. — An ice jam at Sorel Sunday prevented the Manchester Spinner, first ocean freighter to travel up the St. Lawrence this season, from making the 80-mile trip to Montreal.

The transport department ice-breaker N. B. MacLean will make another try at breaking loose the tightly-packed ice today.

Winnipeg — The Royal Winnipeg Ballet, knocked out of action last spring when fire destroyed all its property, will be back on stage this fall.

R. A. Kipp, president, announced Saturday a fund campaign had raised \$44,861, 88 per cent of its objective, and he was confident the balance could be obtained by a special committee.

London (Reuters) — Only three newspapers were printed in all Britain Sunday as the strike of technicians against London newspaper publishers went through its second week-end.

The work stoppage by 700 mechanical maintenance and electrical staff has had its greatest impact on the public on Sundays. On normal week-ends the 12 Sunday papers published here are bought by about 30,000,000.

Tokyo Conference Bid Turned Down By U.S.

Tokyo — (AP) — U.S. State Secretary Dulles today declined an abrupt Japanese request for immediate top level talks in Washington.

Opposition politicians here pounced on the turnaround as a slap at the conservative government of Prime Minister Ichiro Hatoyama.

Newspapers talked of a possible political crisis. Government leaders discounted this and admitted they had not given the United States enough notice.

Only Friday, Japan had proposed sending Foreign Minister Mamoru Shigemitsu to Washington this week to try to iron out growing differences between the

Dinner With Queen Seen Significant

London — (AP) — Sir Winston Churchill made ready to entertain the Queen at dinner tonight and most Britons believed it was the last time the 80-year-old statesman would be host to his young sovereign as Britain's prime minister.

Observers and members of Parliament generally expected the veteran Conservative chief to drive to Buckingham Palace tomorrow and hand his resignation to the Queen. She is considered certain to summon Foreign Secretary Sir Anthony Eden to take over the top post for which he has waited so long.

The Queen and the Duke of Edinburgh were to dine tonight with Churchill and his wife at the prime minister's official residence, 10 Downing Street. The rarity of the occasion was viewed as still more evidence that Churchill finally was stepping down.

Violence Continues In Cyprus

Nicosia, Cyprus — (Reuters) — Anti-British terrorists set off new explosions on Cyprus Sunday night despite stiffened police patrols in every town of this British Mediterranean colony.

As the violence continued into its fourth straight night, a British woman was seriously injured when a bicyclist hurled a hand grenade into her living room. It was the first serious casualty of the campaign by the terrorists, who are believed to be agitating for union of Cyprus with Greece.

The victim, Mrs. Gwendolyn Hamilton, wife of a British army doctor, was wounded by flying glass when the grenade exploded on the windowsill, making a shambles of the living room. Military jeeps chased the cyclist but lost him when he dodged down a dark alley.

At Episcopi, south Cyprus, a bomb damaged a water pipe supplying the British military camp. Throughout the night, heavy detachments of police patrolled every Cypriot town and city in an effort to avert further violence.

Some members of Parliament think Churchill will make only infrequent visits to the House, or even accept a peerage and move to the House of Lords. In a lengthy political article Saturday, the Manchester Evening News said Churchill might "want to sound the whole gamut of parliamentary experience by going to the Lords."

Churchill will preside at noon Tuesday over a cabinet meeting. "No official news of Sir Winston's intentions can be given until after he has tendered his resignation to the Queen. Even the fact that he has an audience with the ruler will not be announced officially until after it has taken place.

The House of Commons has no official part in the change of prime ministers. The outgoing man submits his resignation to the Queen and recommends his replacement. She carries out the recommendation.

Churchill's retirement as Prime Minister should dissolve American-British differences on the question of four-power talks.

Diplomatic sources are convinced that when Churchill steps down he will take with him his dream of East-West "talks at the summit."

Plans are being made for talks with the Russians, but not the kind of negotiations the 80-year-old Prime Minister had in mind.

He wanted to participate in a meeting of the top government leaders of Britain, the United States, Russia and France—to sit with these men around a table and talk out the world's problems without a formal agenda. It was his hope that in this way a gentlemen's agreement could be worked out to keep the peace.

President Eisenhower and State Secretary John Foster Dulles have remained cool to this idea despite transatlantic telephone calls and notes from Churchill.

No Apology Says Bevan

Ebbw Vale, Wales — (AP) — Anthony Bevan told a cheering audience in his home constituency Sunday night that he intends to go on disagreeing with Labor party policy whenever he sees fit despite last week's truce with the party leadership that saved him from expulsion.

"I solemnly declare that I am not prepared to buy a successful public life at the cost of shameful silence about things I think should be heard," he said at a party rally.

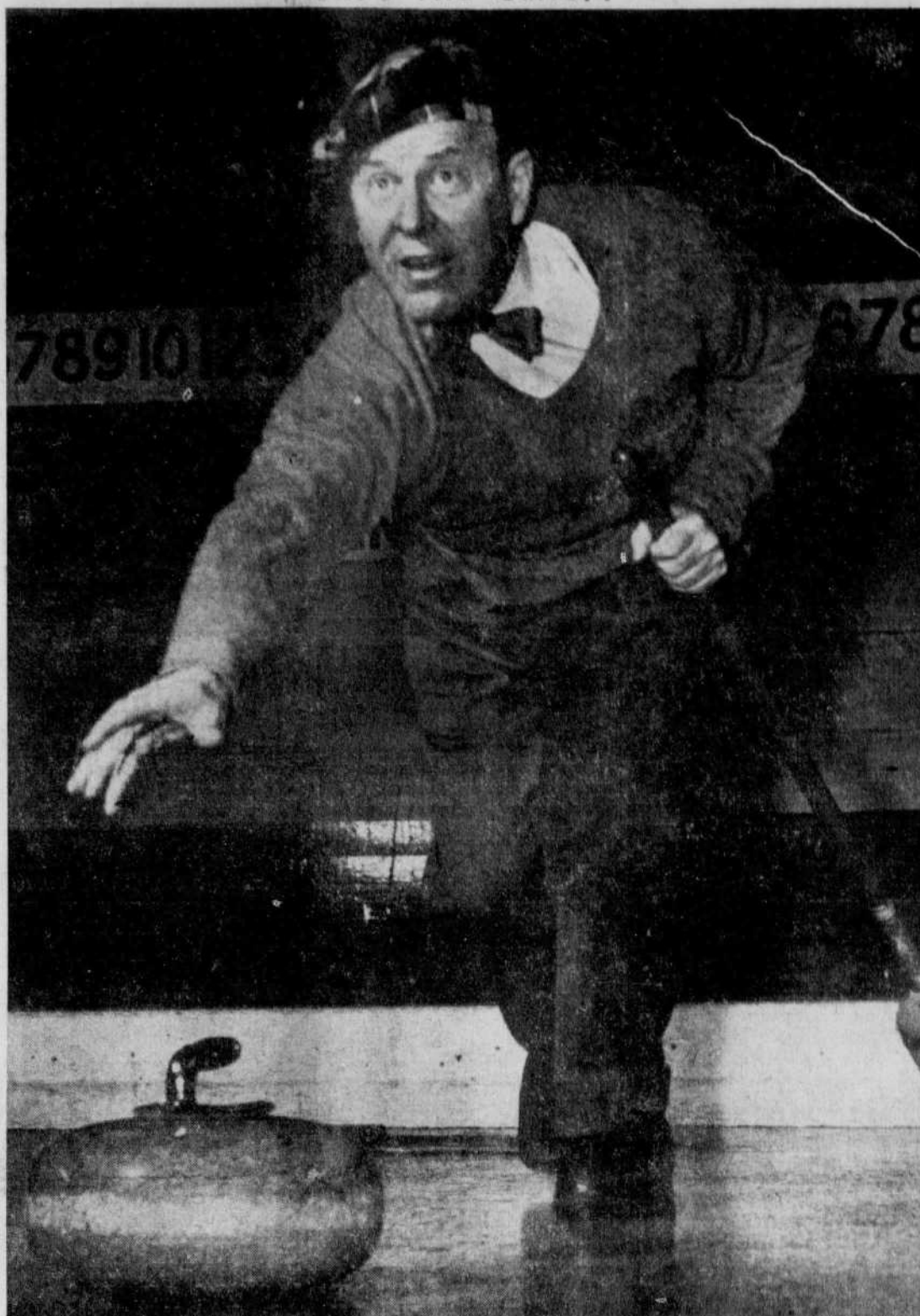
Bevan, who last week apologized to the party executive for any embarrassment his attacks may have caused to party leader Clement Attlee, said Sunday night he believes the argument inside the Labor party is so important that "it ought to be carried on before the eyes and ears of the people."

"Therefore I make no apology to anybody whatsoever."

Bevan's public differences with his leader, climaxed by a speech on the floor of the House of Commons attacking Attlee's support of manufacture of the hydrogen bomb, caused last week's crisis, which ended with the executive offering the fiery left-wing leader one more chance to toe the party line.

Malenkov Is Still Missing

Moscow — (AP) — It has been 11 days since Georgi Malenkov was last seen at a public function in Moscow. With Tass and the Soviet press keeping mum on the subject, the former premier's whereabouts are as big a mystery as ever.

Requests by Western reporters for an official statement on Malenkov's activities to clear up the rumors centring around him have

been fruitless. The nearest thing to a reply was the informal comment by one high Soviet official: "A man has a right to take a day off."

The first secretary of a Western embassy claims he saw Malenkov last Thursday in a limousine leaving the Kremlin. There was no confirmation.

Saturday night, Western correspondents rushed from a party

at U.S. Ambassador Charles Bohlen's residence to be on hand for a concert commemorating the 10th anniversary of Hungary's liberation from the Nazis. They thought Malenkov might show up with other high Soviet officials. But no one in the Soviet top bracket showed up.

Telephone calls to Malenkov's office in the power stations ministry did not furnish a categorical answer. A secretary indicated without saying it outright, that he was in but busy.

Malenkov resigned as premier Feb. 8, blaming "inexperience" for "failure" in his job, particularly in promoting Soviet agriculture. Marshal Nikolai Bulganin was named to succeed him. Malenkov was made a deputy premier and given direction of Russia's electric power stations.

Australia To Have U.K. Atom Tests

Canberra — (Reuters) — The Australian and British governments have reached agreement on the establishment of a testing ground for atomic weapons in the south Australian desert. Supply Minister Howard Beale announced today.

Certain tests planned for later this year would be held there, the minister said.

Cod Catch Down In P.Q.

Quebec — Cod fishing, perennial giant of the Quebec fishing industry, dropped behind herring in yield and behind lobster fishing in value in 1954 for the first time in history, the Quebec Bureau of Statistics reported Sunday.

The bureau says the overall fishing yield last year was poor and the catch fell more than 24,000,000 pounds from the 1953 level and was 33,000,000 pounds below the 1952 mark.

Fish landings in 1954—a year of hazardous weather—totalled 84,981,700 pounds and were valued at \$2,408,915. The 1953 catch was 109,194,600 pounds and gave fishermen a gross income of \$2,610,387. The 1952 yield was 118,115,900 pounds valued at \$3,052,442.

A major factor in the decline in cod this year was a 4,000,000-pound decrease in Gaspe peninsula yields, caused chiefly by poor weather conditions which kept fishermen in port for long stretches.

Economic Revolution In P.Q.—Barrette

Montreal — Quebec Labor Minister Barrette said Saturday that Quebec has gone through an era of social and economic revolution since the Second World War.

He said that during his 11 years as labor minister he has witnessed vast economic changes in the province and that a return to the past would be "like going from civilization to jungle—from light to darkness."

"Big powerful unions have emerged from big powerful corporations," he said. "The firm is no longer owned by a private individual but it's now a corporation with more shareholders sometimes than there are workers."

He said the government is contemplating amendments to the Quebec Labor Relations Act, but did not indicate what form they would take.

Mr. Barrette spoke at a banquet marking the end of a three-day convention of the Quebec Federation of Labor.

Earlier in the day, Roger Provost of Montreal was re-elected president of the QFL and Armand Marion, also of Montreal, was re-elected secretary-treasurer.

Claude Jodoin, president of the Trades and Labor Congress of Canada, parent body of the QFL, was present but did not speak.

It was thought he might elaborate on his remarks at Thursday's session when he called the unemployment situation a "ping-pong game" with federal authorities shifting responsibility to

provincial authorities who in turn blame civic administrations. Mr. Barrette said he was pleased to see the QFL strong and reminded the delegates it was their duty to make the wants of labor known to both management and government. He said their demands had always been reasonable and urged them to continue with reason and justice.

Seven vice-presidents were elected at the afternoon session. They were: Roy M. Bennet, Montreal; Pat O'Farrell, Hull; Jack Lambert, Trois-Rivieres; Rene Frenier, Sherbrooke; J. B. Hurons, Quebec; George Metivier, Valleyfield; and Marcel Charbonneau, St. Jerome.

New Battle Reported In Gaza

Gaza — (AP) — Egyptian and Israeli troops traded heavy mortar and automatic fire for one hour Sunday in the latest skirmish inside the Egyptian-held Gaza strip.

No Egyptians were killed or wounded, but Egyptian army officials claimed heavy casualties on the Israeli side.

Egyptian officials said three truckloads of Israelis crossed the armistice line near the headquarters of the United Nations mixed armistice commission and began pumping automatic fire into an Egyptian post.

As the firing grew brisker, Israelis and Egyptians were reinforced, both sides using mortars. The Egyptians claim the Israelis withdrew as darkness fell.

The Gaza area was the scene of an Israeli attack Feb. 28 in which 38 Egyptian soldiers and civilians and eight Israelis died. The attack was condemned by the UN Security Council as premeditated.

Egyptians have complained Israel sallied across their lines four times since the Feb. 28 battle.

Jerusalem — (AP) — An Israeli army spokesman said Sunday that two Israeli soldiers were killed and 16 wounded Sunday afternoon in a clash with Egyptian troops near the Egyptian-held Gaza strip.

The Israelis were on patrol near Nahal Oz, not far from Gaza, when they were fired upon from an Egyptian position, he said.

The spokesman said reinforcements were brought up and "advanced toward the Egyptian position and silenced its fire to make possible the removal of the dead and wounded."

The engagement lasted two hours, the spokesman said. Both machineguns and mortars were employed in the clash, he said, adding that during the night the Egyptians had fired mortar shells at the settlement of Nahal Oz itself.

Pope Appears Fit, Vigorous

Vatican City — (AP) — The Pope, appearing fit and vigorous after last winter's illness, made his first Palm Sunday appearance in two years Sunday. The Pontiff, 79, took part in ceremonies opening Holy Week, held an audience for 1,000 persons and made a long address.

76 Students To Red China

Washington — (AP) — The state department announced Saturday 76 technically-trained Chinese students have been granted permission to leave the United States — meaning they can go to Communist China.

Orders barring their departure were rescinded on joint decision of the state, justice and defense departments.

Half a dozen more cases will be decided shortly by the immigration and naturalization service. It is expected that they, too, will be cleared to go to Red China.

Decision to release the students was taken in the hope that it would result in the release of 15 American airmen and 41 U.S. civilians held by the Chinese communists.

Some 40 Die In Belgium Fire

Sclessin, Belgium — (Reuters) — A 13-year-old girl was hailed today as the heroine of a sudden fire which roared through a movie theatre here Sunday night killing about 40 persons, many of them young children.

Eye-witnesses said the girl, Jeanne Rombout, lost her own life trying to rescue other children trapped in the blaze.

Jeanne, who liked to play "mummy" in games with her friends, had taken three younger children to the theatre to see a showing of children's shorts.

As the building suddenly burst into flames she ran out with one of the children, then dashed back and dragged out another.

She plunged into the flames a third time, and was not seen again.

Police were trying today to identify the remains of victims of the fire.

They said there was doubt whether 38 or 39 persons perished in the blaze which roared through the cinema in a matter of seconds.

They had established that 22 children, 14 women and one man died, but other remains were so mutilated that it was impossible to say whether they were of one or two bodies.

Several mothers perished with their young children in the flames, according to a provisional list issued by police of those reported missing by their families.

A police officer said "we are counting on families to help by letting us know if anyone is missing, or by giving some details

which may help us to identify the bodies."

The fire was the worst of its kind in living memory in Belgium. It swept through the theatre packed with workers from the nearby steel plants and their families in a matter of seconds.

The 200 people in the audience rushed panic-stricken for the only visible exit. It was soon blocked by flames.

Some 50 people were injured in the blaze and rushed to nearby hospitals.

Firemen from all neighboring towns in the Liege district fought the blaze for more than an hour and a half.

The theatre, the Rio, had been open only a few days.

The fire is believed to have broken out in an oil tank behind the screen.

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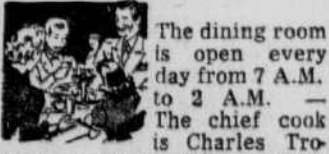

Do M.P.s Earn Their Pay?

In the face of Ottawa reports that many Members of Parliament are campaigning for another increase in their indemnities, which now amount to \$10,000 a year, a recent article by Vancouver Columnist Elmore Philpott, who represents a Vancouver riding in the House of Commons, should give rise to considerable soul-searching among the Canadian legislators.

According to Mr. Philpott, barely two-thirds of the members "really work hard," at their jobs and he cites the case of one member who has made only two appearances in the House during two sessions.

And another despatch from Ottawa says that when Finance Minister Harris presents his annual budget to the House of Commons tomorrow evening, he is likely to be greeted with a large number of empty benches because many of the members have decided to start their Easter vacation early.

Certainly this tendency to absenteeism among the M.P.s is something to cause concern among the people of Canada, especially when it concerns such a vital matter

as the tabling of the budget. And it is a direct contradiction of the claims made by the members in approving their last pay increase that the position of Member of Parliament has become a full-time job.

The average Canadian is willing to pay adequate remuneration for work well done — and this applies to his elected representatives — but he certainly can see little justification for increasing parliamentary indemnities for members who do not work at the job.

One of the weaknesses of the present indemnity system is that each Member of Parliament is supposed to be a man of honor and the payment is made on his mere declaration that he has attended the required number of House sittings to qualify himself for the salary. There is no daily roll call or any other means of checking just how often he shows up.

The introduction of a time clock in the Parliament Buildings might be a rather drastic innovation, but it might also give the people of Canada an idea of just which member works and which swings the lead.

From Enemy To Ally

Germany, just ten years ago our bitter enemy in the greatest war of all time, is now seriously on the way to becoming a firm ally of the Western powers in the long struggle against communism.

The last major obstacle to this development was removed when the French Senate, in an historic day-break decision of March 27, voted to rearm the Bonn government of West Germany and admit the Germans to NATO, the keystone organization of Western defence.

A week earlier the German upper house had approved the Paris agreements embodying these developments. Thus the completion of French and German action leaves only endorsement by a few Western power — all considered certainties — to give the pacts full legal force.

Assuming other countries proceed with reasonable dispatch, the creation of the projected West German army of 12 divisions — some 500,000 men — is still a good way off.

Both the French and the Germans will have many opportunities to delay and even subvert this rearmament. But the free world hopes that neither nation resorts to such efforts. The pacts have been solemnized by the nations most closely affected, and they are in honor bound to execute them with fair speed.

The crucial decisions taken by France and Germany do not, of course, end with Bonn's rearmament and admission to NATO. They pro-

vide for nearly complete political sovereignty for the Germans, and for a settlement of the controversial Saar issue that prescribes internationalization of the industrial region with heavy economic commitments to France.

Only time will show whether the Saar settlement has sown the seeds of future trouble between the two countries.

As for Germany gaining sovereignty, it means Bonn can now undertake diplomatic relations with other powers, including the Soviet Union. There is some speculation that Moscow, seeing that the Paris pacts could not be blocked, will at the earliest change propose a two-way meeting with the Germans to discuss German unity and related questions.

Being what they are, the Russians would naturally try at such a meeting to exact a price for unity which would nullify Germany's defense link to the West. We, and the Germans themselves, have a high stake in seeing that no agreement for unity is reached at the cost of Germany's new ties to the West.

But undoubtedly such possibilities lie well ahead and there is no need to borrow trouble at this moment. It is enough to voice gratification that this historic step — the drawing of Germany into the Western family — has at last been made possible.

Not since the adoption of the NATO pact in 1949 — has such a significant event occurred in free world diplomacy.

More To Life Than Money

Polio Serum Inventor Pure Research Worker

Pittsburgh. — Behind the desperate and ponderous race to wipe out paralytic polio stands the man who has given most of his professional career and his name to what may be an effective vaccine—Dr. Jonas E. Salk. It has not been an easy job. It has not been the most satisfying. It has not made a fortune for anybody. But it has led Dr. Salk to conclude:

"There is more in life than money."

His career proves it. In 1931, when he was 17 years old, Jonas Salk entered the College of the City of New York. He hadn't a single course in science in high school. He did not know anything about it.

Out of curiosity he enrolled in several introductory science courses. That sealed his future. By the time he was graduated he had abandoned his old ambitions of a career in law.

He went to New York University's medical school. He was a small fellow, with dark hair and a high forehead and a hungry look behind his eyeglasses. He told them he wanted to become a doctor. And after that he wanted to go into research. They said he was foolish. They said times were bad and he ought to practice medicine and make money. They said research took a lifetime and left no time for family or rest.

By the time he was a senior medical student, he had found himself. Or, rather, Dr. Thomas Francis, Jr., had found him working late into the night at the laboratory.

What was so interesting to the young man? Dr. Francis asked. The answer was simple: Dr. Jonas E. Salk was learning about viruses.

He was graduated from New

York University and went into internship at Mt. Sinai Hospital. He was a practicing doctor.

Within four years he was writing to Dr. Francis who had gone to the University of Michigan.

Was there a place there for his former student? He didn't need much money. He and his wife could live simply. But the laboratory—that was the important thing.

Dr. Francis called him, told him that he had a March of Dimes grant from the National

Foundation for Infantile Paralysis. They were working on isolating the polio virus. There was a job open.

Five years later, in 1947, Dr. Salk left Ann Arbor for the University of Pittsburgh. His post: Associate Research Professor in Bacteriology.

Today, he sits in the professor's chair and also holds down the job of Director of the Virus Research Laboratory at the University's School of Medicine.

Most of his time has been

spent on work in the polio virus area. In the past six years he has seen \$1,700,000 spent on infantile paralysis research. He has also seen 1,830,000 children take part in controlled experiments using the vaccine he and his associates have discovered.

He doesn't see much of his family. The three children go to school early in the morning and are asleep long before he comes home at night.

He talks with his wife over a late cup of coffee and at breakfast. But she is usually fast asleep in the pre-dawn hours when he gets up to scribble an idea or formula that has come to him.

For the rest of the time, he is in the laboratory.

How does it feel to know that an untried vaccine—that bears your name—is being injected into thousands of children?

"The worrying is done ahead of time," Dr. Salk says, "while calculating all the possible risks. Then the die is cast and there is nothing to do but wait. Time will take care of the rest."

The problem of the vaccine is far more urgent and mammoth: "Is it going to protect children against naturally-occurring polio?"

IMPROVED RURAL SNOW-FIGHTING EQUIPMENT ESSENTIAL

Dear Sir:

I think after the experience of the recent storm there are a few lessons which should have been learned and that some action must be initiated primarily by the Provincial Government and to some extent by individuals.

Anyone who has not experienced a storm such as we had, in the country, has little idea of how really rough the elements can be and just how impossible it is to travel by car or even with a team of horses. I have heard of two instances where death has occurred which might have been averted, had it been possible to obtain a doctor, also of financial losses due to it being impossible to get farm produce to the city.

The government has done a good job to a point by keeping the roads open and making it possible to get back and forth with products in each direction so much so that if a storm does come people are pretty helpless. In most cases the roads are now open but there are still a great many roads closed and children unable to get to school.

The situation was altogether beyond the local equipment to cope with. Had a powerful snow blower been available to keep the sides of the road down before the storm this situation would not have developed. In going through the country now you would note that there are comparatively few places where the snow really piles up. If a windbreak of trees were planted or even high snow fences placed in these spots (as they were years ago) a lot of the difficulty would be alleviated.

We pay a good deal in gas taxes and the government, as well as the individual, loses when the roads are closed. A powerful blower could take care of a large area, avoid this trouble and pay its way. At the same time the local man who maintains the road would be assured of help when needed and base his contract price accordingly. Otherwise he will not be interested at all except at an exorbitant price.

True enough, this has perhaps been an unusual winter but we cannot afford to say it will not happen again. It is very fortunate the storm did not start with rain which would have disrupted power lines and what a situation that would have been, with no kerosene or even lanterns, let alone heating—even in cities.

It is a matter that should be very seriously considered and one which could easily develop into a catastrophe, with our main source of power north of the St. Lawrence River, a long, vulnerable line which does not follow the railway.

Determined To Return

Woman M.P. Battles Party Ousting

Liverpool — (Reuters) — Battling Bessie Braddock, Labor member of Parliament for Liverpool's dockland area, appears to "have had it" politically in this constituency.

After 10 years of rhubarbs and ruckuses, her Labor party constituents decided last week not to nominate her as their candidate in the next general election.

But Bessie, a born fighter—and an honorary member of a London boxing association—gave warning there would be a few more rounds to come. "We're not beaten yet," she said.

Bessie (real name Elizabeth) is a woman of magnificent proportions—her measurements running 50, 40, 50 in that order. She is five feet two and weighs 200 pounds.

When the seaman on the submarine Scythian unanimously decided that they were "tired of all these pictures of silly glamor girls," they wrote Mrs. Braddock: "We would like it very much if you would be our heart-throb for 1955. Please send us a picture, but not a full-size one for this is a small submarine."

She accepted the compliment with her usual good humor and sent seven autographed pictures of herself.

For most of her 55 years, Bes-

sie Braddock has been wrapped up heart and soul in Britain's Labor party. In local government and in the House of Commons, she has championed the working class, pleading for anything from better housing to more stylish, inexpensive dresses for working class women with figures like her own—women with "decent-size hips."

Bessie has a reputation for being forthright in her speech in a country which is rather proud of its gift of understatement and self-control.

She wound up her first speech on housing in 1945 in the Commons with a blast of wrath.

"Throughout the country," she said, "and particularly in industrial areas, our people are living in flea-ridden, bug-ridden, rat-ridden, lousy hell-holes. I will continue to agitate and kick up a row until we get rid of these evils." She has been agitating ever since.

Bessie went to work after finishing grammar school when she was 15, putting seeds into packets. On the first day she went to work she remembers her mother calling after her "and don't come home until you join the union."

She joined the union. Later, she joined the Communist party. But that alliance didn't last long. Bessie became disillusioned and

didn't like the idea of taking orders from Russia.

So, she became an ardent anti-Communist — the first in her lengthy list of "antis." She is anti-Tory, anti-capitalist, anti-snobbery in the navy, anti-war and anti Aneurin Bevan, the Labor party's left-wing spokesman.

It is her anti-Bevanism which last week caused her pro-Bevan constituents not to endorse her as their candidate in the next general election.

Bessie Braddock is the only woman MP ever to be suspended from sitting in the House of Commons. This was her penalty for once refusing to sit down at the chairman's request.

When she took her seat again, unrepentant after a five-day absence, she said she wished to avoid a recurrence of the situation because she would "hate to put the sergeant at arms to the difficult task of attempting to carry me out physically."

Philippine Quake Toll 432

Manila. —(P)—The death toll from the worst quake of the century in the Philippines reached 432 Sunday, the Philippine news service reported.

The Philippine Red Cross said 12,000 were homeless. It estimated 300 injured. But Philippine news service said the number had risen to 2,000 as fresh reports came in from remote districts.

Hardest hit in Friday's great quake was the Lake Lanao district in northern Mindanao, second largest island of the Philippines.

Most of the casualties came from this region, where the earth cracked open, stone buildings came crashing down and sleeping villagers were swept to their deaths by a tidal wave.

Property damage was in the millions. The Philippine Red Cross hurried food, clothing, medicine and tents to the stricken areas.

R. C. Church Said 'Crafty' In Argentina

Buenos Aires. —(AP)—Two key pro-government newspapers Sunday waged what may become an official campaign by the Peron regime to end Roman Catholicism's status as Argentina's state church.

The newspapers, Democracia and La Prensa, always reflect the thinking in President Juan Peron's administration. When he is planning a new step, he usually prepares public opinion in advance through editorials in their columns.

Democracia launched the fight for a constitutional change to remove the Catholic Church as the state church and put it on par with other churches. La Prensa, which the government expropriated and turned over to the pro-Peron General Confederation of Labor, took up the fight.

It was the latest development in the five months of conflict between the Catholic Church and the government. It may foreshadow action by Peron to change the constitution when Congress meets next month.

La Prensa said the Catholic Church is engaged in a "crafty" campaign to create disturbances and undermine Peron's "national doctrine." It added the "malicious position" of the clergy amounts to subversion.

La Prensa said that if clergy continue to create a climate of disturbance in Argentina, the country should follow the example of "other advanced countries" and change the constitution, thus eliminating the "bad faith of sectarianism."

Graham Jokes About Illness

Glasgow. —(P)—Billy Graham fought off an influenza attack Saturday, then joked about it Sunday night in his sermon as he continued his all-Scotland revival campaign.

The young American evangelist became ill in his hotel room and was obliged to let his assistant conduct Saturday afternoon's meeting in Glasgow's Kelvin Hall.

But Saturday night he was back on the platform in fine shape. Thumping his chest, Graham told the audience of 16,000, "If you want to pray, pray for my throat, not for me."

Nehru Raps S.A. Policy

New Delhi. —(Reuters)—Indian Premier Jawahar Nehru Sunday called on the United States and Russia to declare their stand on the "tyrannical oppression" of Africans and people of Indian origin by the South African government.

"I challenge every country in the world to give its opinion unequivocally on the naked racial persecution being perpetrated by the capitalist white government of South Africa on African and Indian people there," Nehru said in a speech here.

"India is not prepared to tolerate this racial persecution under any consideration of anti-Communism or Communism. Let the South African government forget about Communism and anti-Communism and learn some decency," Nehru criticized the United Nations treatment of the South African racial question. He said the United Nations passed some resolutions now and again, then set back "with folded hands in a state of complete inaction."

Mexican Train Goes Over Cliff At Least 9 Dead

Colima, Mexico. —(P)—Nine persons were known dead today and 78 injured after nine cars of a holiday-packed passenger train plunged over the rim of Colima state's "Canyon of Death" Sunday night.

Colima state governor Salinas Roynosa, returning here from the wreck scene with the dead and wounded, said quite a few of the passengers still were missing. But he added they might have wandered off in the darkness or left the scene by other transportation.

Eight of the injured were reported in serious condition.

Customs, Excise Collections In Sharp Decline

Customs and excise collections for the Port of Sherbrooke, Department of National Revenue, registered a decline of \$30,977.57 during the month of March, 1955, as compared with the corresponding month last year, to bring the cumulative decrease for the fiscal year ending March 31 to \$227,058.18.

Total collections for the 1954-55 period were \$3,401,316.62, with the 1953-54 collections amounting to \$3,628,374.80.

Overall revenues in March, 1955, were \$297,950.85, while in March, 1954, \$328,928.42 was taken in. The chief factor in this decline was a drop in excise tax collections, mainly the sales tax, from \$268,714.48 in March, 1954, to \$230,085.43 last month, which more than offset a modest increase in customs import duties from \$59,747.71 in March, 1954, to \$67,389.06 in the past month.

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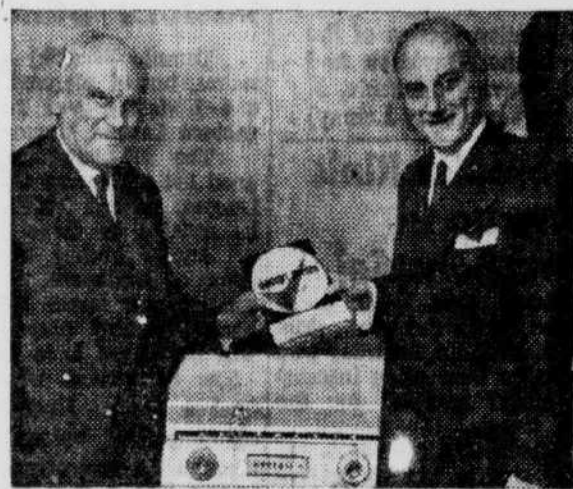
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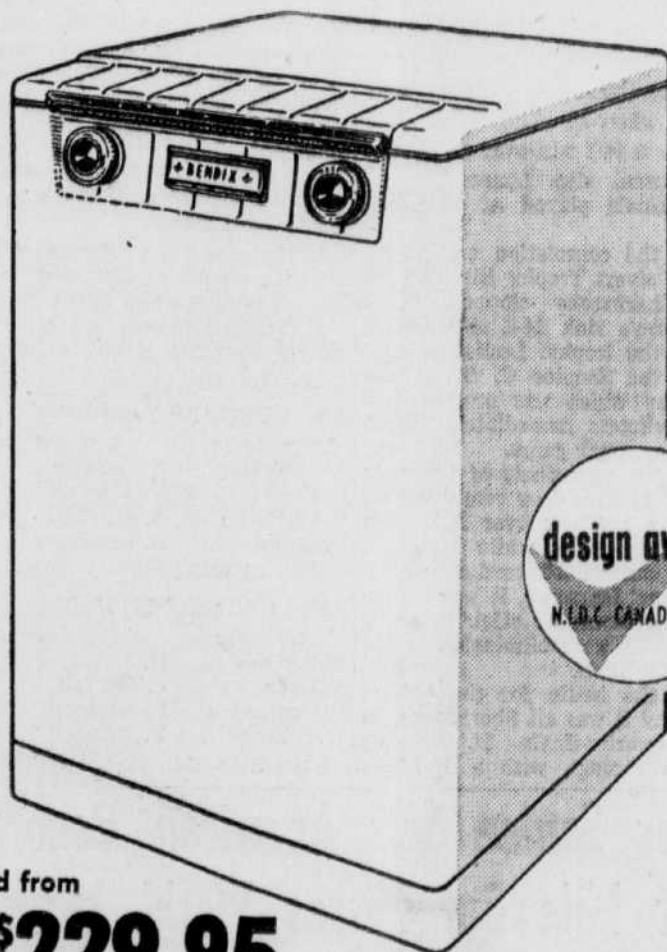
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Red Wings Rally In Third To Down Canadiens 4-2

Last-Period Splurge Gives Detroit Opener; Marty Pavelich Notches Big One; Tie Record With 14th Win

Detroit — (CP) — Detroit Red Wings came from behind twice Sunday night to turn back Montreal Canadiens 4-2 in the opening game of their Stanley Cup final.

Marty Pavelich scored the tie-breaker late in the third period on a galloping breakaway and Ted Lindsay settled it 18 seconds from the end with a lift into the open net.

It was a bitter, bruising battle in which the Red Wings twice turned on their power plays full tilt to catch up with the Montrealers who went in front in the second period and again in the third on goals by hard-working Floyd Curry.

Alex Delvecchio pulled Detroit even in the middle period and Vic Stasiuk again in the third before Pavelich put the Red Wings in front for the first time while his own team was short-handed.

Up to that time it was pretty much of a toss up between the teams, taking up where they left off last season—a seven-game final that went to the Red Wings.

Lots Of Fight
Canadiens showed lots of fight, but were always under terrific pressure every time the Detroit power play went into action. The Red Wings let few opportunities pass and had lots of drive down to the finish.

The victory was Detroit's 14th in a row-nine league games and five in the cup series—tying a National Hockey League record set in the 1929-30 season by Boston Bruins, who amassed their string of 14 in league schedule games.

Pavelich's big goal at 17:07 of the final period came with a suddenness that sent the crowd of 13,862 into a frenzy of acclaim. Newspapers and programs were tossed to the ice.

Less than a minute earlier Howe had been sent off for slashing and Canadiens were storming into the Detroit end trying to crack through and get a third goal past Terry Sawchuk in the Detroit nets.

Solo Effort
The puck flew out from the wild melee and Pavelich snared it at centre ice and was away all alone. He pulled the trigger on goalie Jacques Plante from about 15 feet and the game was as good as over there.

Billy O'Ree Leads Merry Pace As Frontenacs Down Marlboros 4-1 In Eastern Canada Memorial Cup Final

Toronto — (CP) — Billy O'Ree, 18-year-old goal-scoring sensation, turned playmaker Saturday to lead Quebec Frontenacs to a 4-1 victory over Toronto Marlboros in the first game of the eastern Canada Memorial Cup final.

The 175-pound leftwinger, a native of Fredericton and a good bet to become the first Negro player in the National Hockey League, amazed 5,653 fans with his speed and heady playing as he assisted on three of the four Quebec markers.

Junior hockey observers, who predicted a short series in favor of Marlboros, altered their views after watching the much smaller and faster Quebecers baffle the Dukes with the near perfect passing plays. Second game of the best-of-seven series will be played here Tuesday. The set then moves to Quebec.

The Frontenacs, who won the Quebec Junior Hockey League championship before breezing through the rest of the playoffs, forged into a 3-0 lead in the first period and increased it to 4-0 in the second before allowing Marlboros their only goal.

Sixteen-year-old rightwinger Michel Lagace and centre Walt Bradley each fired two goals for the Frontenacs, who advanced to the eastern final by overwhelming North Sydney Franklins and Ottawa Shamrocks.

Glen Cressman scored Toronto's only goal midway through the third period.

Marlboros advanced into the eastern final by winning the Ontario Hockey Association Junior A title — their first in 23 years.

A "gift" goal only two minutes and 29 seconds after the start of the game started Quebec on the way Saturday. Lagace sent a shot in front of the Toronto net and Marlboro cap-

tain Mike Nykoluk, trying to clear the puck, batted it past Johnny Albani.

Seven minutes later O'Ree made a dazzling play to set up Quebec's first "legitimate" goal. He stole the puck from a Marlboro player at the side of the Toronto net and passed behind the defence to Lagace, who drove a 15-foot backhand into the goal.

Another brilliant move by the Negro star started the Fronts on the way to their third marker. O'Ree carried the puck into the Marlboro end and left it inside the blue line for Bradley, who scored on a partially-screened 20-footer that hit the top left corner of the net at 13:55.

Gerry James of the Dukes was sitting out a high sticking penalty at the time.

Bradley's second goal, scored at 3:33 of the second period, was a return of O'Ree's hard shot, which rebounded directly in front of Toronto goal.

As Santee headed into the last lap with the announcer giving his unofficial time, the 14,000 fans began screaming encouragement, and the Texas longhorn band began playing a fast number.

When Santee's official time was announced, the Kansas race was expressionless.

After a couple of rainy days, In supposedly sunny Florida, the skies finally cleared, thus enabling the spring training sessions to continue. The rain, over one inch, which fell on Monday was badly needed however as Florida had just gone through a 40-day drought. The days are long when it pours.

There's very little to do, except to sit around, talk baseball and discuss the various players in camp. Everyone at Indianville talks, sleeps and eats baseball.

Manager Edd Hartness, of the local Indians, is slightly worried over his second base problem. Edd isn't too keen on some of the outfielders either, so his problems are beginning to mount with the opening of the 1955 season less than a month away.

"Some players have looked real good so far in spring training," commented the local skipper the other day. Among those who have impressed Edd to date are: Ken Retzer, a 21-year-old backstopper who caught 130 games for him at Tifton last year. He was voted all star catcher in the Georgia State league. He hit .307 in 450 times at the plate, scoring 54 runs, Retzer hit 24 doubles, one triple and eight home runs, driving across 75 runs. Edd is high on this boy and would like to have him in Sherbrooke this summer.

At first base, Edd would take Roy Nixon, a 20-year-old youngster who maintained a .323 average at Jacksonville Beach. Second base is Edd's number one worry. There's no Jim Fishback in camp this year. He was released by the Indians organization on account of his age.

There are two promising shortstops in Alan Meyer and Bob Pedigree, the latter needs no introduction having played in Sherbrooke last year.

Meyer, was at Jacksonville Beach and in 138 games came through with a .286 average. He drove across 83 runners. The 23-year-old shortstop laced out 23 doubles and 18 triples. The hot corner position may go to Robert Wilson, a colored boy who performed for Orlando last season where he finished with a .280 batting mark. Wilson clouted seven home runs.

The outfield is Hartness' big problem at this early stage but once some of the A and B rosters are cut, he expects to receive some good ball players. There's an outside chance that centrefielder Bill Williams will return to Sherbrooke. Bill was strong defensively last year but another year in C ball may improve his hitting.

Edd likes the work of three pitchers in camp. One is Bill Dailey who worked under Pinky May two years back. Dailey had arm trouble last summer at Fargo, pitching in only a few games. While in Sherbrooke the tall rightlander, who gained weight in the two years, held a 6-1 mark. The two others are Richard Hogg, a lefty with a 12-9 mark at Jacksonville Beach and Harold Larned another lefty with a 6-5 record at Tifton, a 7th place ball club in '54.

The records of these pitchers may not be outstanding, but Edd isn't the type of manager who looks at the won and loss columns of a hurler. He's interested in their strikeout mark and earned run average. Before we leave camp, we may have a few more notes on the ball players who will represent Sherbrooke this summer. In the meantime we'll keep our fingers crossed as do all managers.
