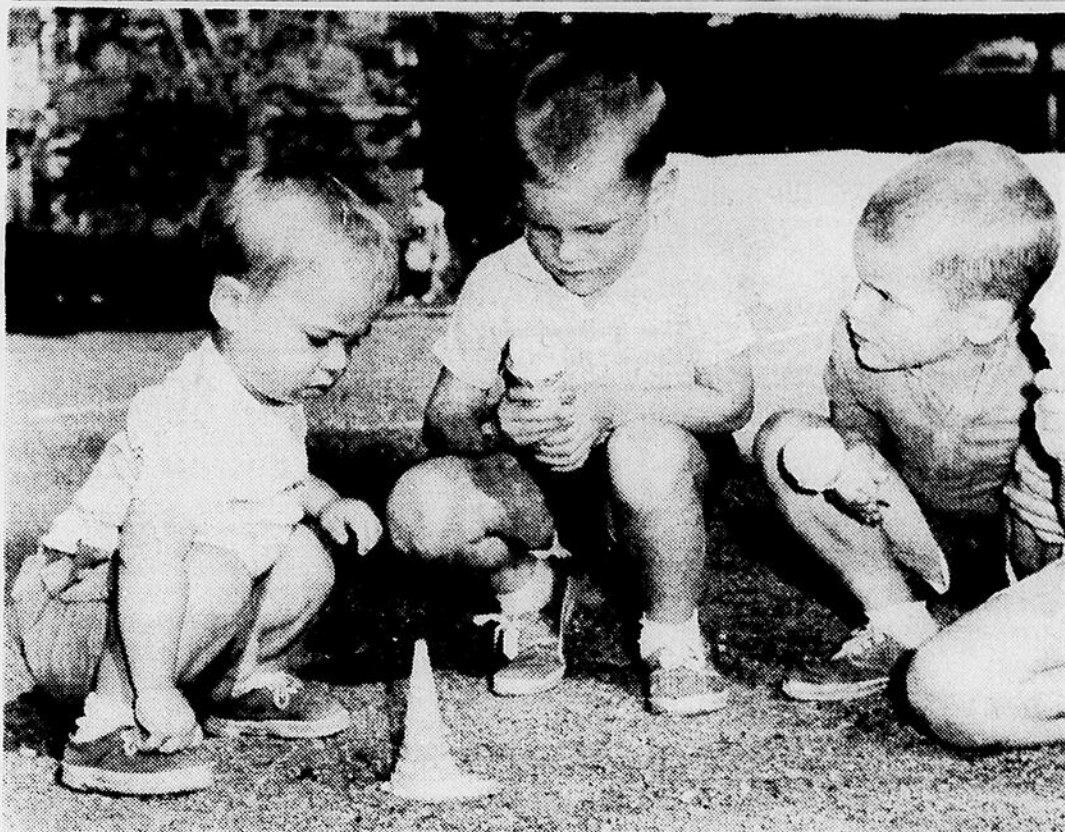

CCNR elects J. W. Sancton

The publisher of *The Westmount Examiner*, John W. Sancton, Tuesday was elected president of Canadian Community Newspapers Representatives at the annual meeting of that corporation in Toronto.

He succeeds George Tatham, publisher of *The Listowel, Ont., Banner*, who has been chief executive since CCNR's founding just over two years ago.

Mr. Sancton, as a director and executive committee member of the Canadian Weekly Newspapers Association, has been associated with the country's advertising sales organization, CCNR, from its conception.

CCNR, with headquarters in Toronto and branch sales offices in Montreal and Vancouver, provides a nationwide liaison between 371 large and small weekly newspapers from coast to coast, and national and regional advertisers and their agencies. It offers a one-order,

papers which greatly simplifies procedure and reduces cost of advertising in "grass-roots" newspapers, in groups of any size, anywhere in Canada.

Mr. Sancton is president of Monitor Publishing Company Limited, proprietors of *The Westmount Examiner* and specialty printers of newspapers, house organs and mass-produced circulars and flyers for the retail trade throughout Canada and Great Britain. Monitor's plant and head office is in the City of Cote St. Luc.

Mr. Sancton received part of his education in Westmount schools, is a former resident of Hampstead, and now resides near Ormstown.

Succeeding Mr. Sancton as vice-president of CCNR is Irwin McIntosh of North Battleford, Sask.

Examiner gains picture award

The Westmount Examiner this week was awarded the second-prize position for the best local spot news picture in 1963 in the Better Newspapers Competition of the nation-wide Canadian Weekly Newspapers Association.

Subject of the award were the photographs carried in the issue of May 24, 1963, at nearly the precise moment a

terrorist-placed dynamite bomb blew up in a letter box



at Lansdowne and Westmount avenues, seriously maiming

Sgt.-Maj. Walter Leja of the Canadian Army who was seeking to render the bomb harmless.

The J. A. MacLaren Plaque, emblematic of the award, is being presented at the CWNA annual convention in Toronto this week.

First-prize winner was the *Ladner, B.C., Optimist*.

Installation of service lines is scheduled next

Final widening operations on Dorchester boulevard will not begin until next Spring, at the earliest, for completion in the Fall, a City Hall spokesman said this week. Expropriation in the area is complete but the city needs time to install an entirely new network of underground utilities and is reluctant to close the street for reconstruction until Western avenue reopens, it was explained.

Westmount officials are currently working with Montreal to co-ordinate the installation of a larger sewer system to service "the entire western part of town." An extensive survey of existing facilities has just been completed by the Foundation of Canada Engineering Corporation.

In addition, new gas and telephone networks will be installed to meet the demands of the West End Plaza and the high rise apartments proposed for the Dorchester area.

Tie-up with Montreal

"Our prime concern right now is the installation of these facilities in conjunction with Montreal," the spokesman said. Beside this complicated business, the actual widening is a fairly simple job.

Pending satisfactory agreements with Montreal, Hydro Quebec, and the Bell Telephone, this work may begin by January.

Traffic flow is problem

Another major concern is traffic flow, the spokesman said. Westmount may wait until construction of the West End subway terminus is completed and Western reopened before blocking Dorchester for widening.

Latest reports indicate that subway construction in this area is well ahead of schedule and may be completed by Spring. Work is done by the City of Montreal, under contract.

The spokesman had earlier denied reports that the Dor-

chester project was held up by Montreal which has tentatively planned to widen the street west of Guy.

He stated that in this regard, Westmount was proceeding independently of Montreal. "If Westmount wants to go ahead it will, whether or not Montreal does anything about widening the boulevard east of Atwater."

3,700 pupils expected

The Protestant and Catholic School Boards in Westmount expect only a "slight increase" in enrolment when classes reopen September 8 and 9. About 3,700 pupils — old and new — are anticipated.

Westmount High, largest of the local schools, expects about 1,300 while Roslyn and Westmount Park schools have planned for 825 and 475 respectively.

On the Catholic side, St. Leo's expects about 520 and St. Paul's, about 580.

Registration day for all pupils attending Protestant Schools is September 9. New pupils come in the morning while former students return after lunch.

Those attending St. Leo's or St. Paul's return to classes at 9:00 a.m. September 8.

'I'll never forget that courageous man' says photographer of Sgt. Major W. Leja

The prizewinning photographs above which appeared in The Examiner on May 24, 1963 were taken by Roland Sirois, formerly of Roger Brunelle Studios, now

with Ed Bermingham Co.

Mr. Sirois this week recalled the awful events of the morning of Friday, May 17.

"I was still making breakfast

when the call from the Editor came: 'There's a bomb in a mailbox beside Westmount High about to go off. Get up here — and fast!' The trip from Verdun

took less than 10 minutes and I won't forget the ride either. "Sgt. Major Leja and Lieut. Simpson had just arrived. First they tried to get the mailbox attached to a ladder from a fire truck so they could swing the whole thing across the street away from the houses but the box just fell over with a clatter that gave us all heart failure.

Then Leja, he seemed so calm, so efficient, just reached in, picked up the dynamite and ran across the street and placed it behind a tree. I've never seen a braver man.

"We rushed on to Claremont and Sherbrooke where they dismantled another bomb without any trouble.

"Then up to Westmount avenue to Lansdowne. Leja started to reach into the box, we were standing back about 20 yards. The Sgt. Major said something to Lieut. Simpson and reached in again.

"The box suddenly blew up with a terrible sound. Everyone hit the ground. Pieces flew over our heads the length of the block.

"Leja was on the ground. It was horrible. A young fellow ran in to give first aid. It was a miracle he was still alive.

"We took other pictures later that day but I'll never forget that moment and that courageous man."

We Say Expanding role seen for weekly papers

ENTHUSIASM exhibited this week by representatives attending the annual convention of the Canadian Weekly Newspaper Association (of which The Examiner is a member) presents further tangible evidence of the vigor of weekly newspapers in Canada.

Many people tend to feel that the weekly newspaper is something of an anachronism, a thing remaining from the past like the general store with its little pot-bellied stove in the corner, where one occasionally lounged for a half-hour or so to learn what is happening around the town.

Certainly it is true that the weekly has the general store's character of being homely and informal in its presentation. And there is no doubt that it shares more than a few of its news sources with the "Hot Stove News Syndicate". But what is certainly not true is the story that the weekly is gradually fading away into the mellow dusk along with that unpretentious mercantile market-place of which it is the literary counterpart.

The actual fact is that the weekly is coming into its own, even more right now than ever before. And the reason rests as much with the daily and other forms of publication, as with the weekly itself. Because, of all the changes that seem to be coming over the daily newspaper, none presents itself more strongly than the trend away from the "folksy" sort of news, towards the "hard news", the stories about world affairs, prominent persons, and the goings-on

of governments, both our own and those of our neighbors.

And this very emphasis of the "hard news" coverage tends to overlook "Mr. Average Citizen," for it is not often that he manages to see his picture on the front page of a weekly, never mind a daily. Involvement in hard news events occurs only once or twice in the life of the average person, if at all.

And yet, at the same time, Mr. Average Citizen still likes the idea of seeing his name in print, even if he doesn't always admit it — and this is quite often the case.

And so, this is where the weekly comes in. It fulfils a place in the life of a great many people. It may be true that the weekly represents more to one brought up in a small town than to one who has lived always in the city. But this in no way detracts from the real value of the smaller paper.

Undoubtedly, the greatest justification for the weekly is the very fact that, by its nature, it devotes itself to news and activities of the person who seldom, if ever, makes the columns of the daily papers.

The fact that news of the world-sweeping type is treated little, if at all, is certainly no indication that the paper does not contribute its part to the information of the people.

In everything about its approach to the news-gathering and dispersing business it is less pretentious and formal. And it is for this very reason that it finds the opportunity to lead and persuade in the unique way that only a weekly can.

YOU SAY Westmount is worth a tour

Sir: I must hasten to say that Miss Frances Goltman's touristic essay "Holiday in Our City," on "Seeing Montreal" (The Westmount Examiner, Fri. Aug. 7, 1964, page 12), was very topical and timely, and very welcome to me and to your many readers.

However, I would like to suggest that a "Collard" tour of Westmount would be equally most rewarding, to lovers of Westmount historic lore. To be sure, Westmount has civic treasure troves that people of Westmount seem to little accept. Our churches, synagogues, and public buildings are architecturally second to none in Greater Montreal, or even in Canada.

A portion of a day's time spent in the City Hall, Victoria Hall, or in the captivating Temple Emanu-El, the Shaar Hashomayim Synagogue, or the Mother House of the Congregation of the Sisters of Notre Dame, or other magnetic points of architectural importance could be most rewarding to Westmounters and to Montrealers, generally.

In fact, the Museum of Jewish and Biblical art, liturgical objects, and information, located in Temple Emanu-El is relatively one of the finest in America, and, yet, few Westmounters have seen it. So let us be happy that we have such fine things of great cultural value to see right here in Westmount, to compare easily and equally well with the booming Megalopolis of Montreal.

Watch your diet on long trips

On motoring trips, during summer vacations and throughout the rest of the year, there are three things you have to beware of in your driver's diet:

Hamburgs, custards, and unpasteurized milk.

These few hints on happier, healthier motoring, especially in summer, were passed along today by the public service branch of The British Motor Corporation of Canada Limited, after consultation with the Health League of Canada.

Motorist should beware of roadside food stands, according to the League, particularly with regard to hamburgs and custards, which rapidly go bad and cause severe food poisoning in warm weather. If the appearance of the place gives you any doubts as to its cleanliness, pass it up for the next one along the way.

This IS a surprise!

Surprising as this may sound to most people, pasteurization of milk is compulsory in only two provinces: Ontario and Saskatchewan.

When driving through the other eight provinces, make sure that the milk you are served is pasteurized, particularly where children are involved.

In out-of-the-way areas, it is wise to bring along your own canned or powdered milk.

Ordinary milk that is suspect can be pasteurized by boiling and cooling it.

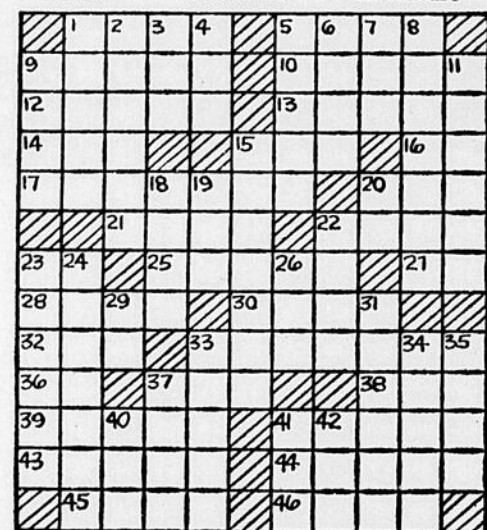

ROVING REPORTER

Well-worth a visit next time you are in City Hall is the \$17,000 scale model of Westmount occupying most of the Council Chamber, your house will certainly be shown, perhaps in some detail if it is a large one.

A glance at the lower right hand corner of the model is perhaps, revealing. But draw your own conclusions. The West End Plaza project on the old Atwater Ball park is shown completed, while the Westmount Centre complex scheduled to rise two blocks between Wood and Elm is not shown at all. Both have legal petitions against them to be sure, but the Wood-Elm project was approved last Fall by both rate payers and the City while the West End Plaza did not gain their re-zoning until Spring.

Not a shovelful of earth has yet been turned at Claremont and Western but the 16-storey Campeau Construction Company apartment is also shown as a "fait-accompli."

* * *
The Westmount High School auditorium has become quite popular with producers of all kinds of shows. The Westmount School Board, however, would like to remind residents that it is neither a ticket agency nor an information centre for these productions. "We rent out the auditorium to these groups and they are responsible for all publicity and tickets," said an official.

CAT OWNERS BE WARN-ED: The Animal Protection League warns cat owners that infectious enteritis is "rampant" in the Montreal and Dorval districts and has probably spread into Westmount. They note that cat owners should exercise the greatest watch over their pets as this disease is highly contagious — particularly with kittens. It does not affect humans.

Symptoms of feline enteritis may include a rise in temperature, loss of appetite, running eyes and nose and a sore throat. Any cat owner suspicious of their pet's health should tele-

phone a veterinarian without delay.

The League has learned of a number of cases in which cats boarded out have contracted the disease. Anyone losing a cat or kitten with this disease should not obtain another for at least six months, the league warns.

Approval is sought for new apt.

The Westmount Architectural Commission is studying a proposal to construct a 12-story apartment building at the corner of Clarke and St. Catherine, behind the 4300 Apartments.

No zoning changes are called for as 12-stories is the maximum permitted under regulations.

The city-owned parking lot on Greene avenue should open within the next two weeks, a City Hall spokesman said Wednesday.

mount avenue.

The work also includes improvement to the Mount Pleasant avenue wall and the Glen Power House retaining wall as well as sundry curb repairs and restoration work and installation of parking meters at the new Greene avenue parking lot.

'Music for Very Young' classes set

Prominent musician, Gabriel Bartha has now opened registration for his "Music for the Very Young" classes which start this Fall.

Leaving Hungary during the Revolution, he proceeded first to Vienna and then to Canada. Since arriving in Canada Mr. Bartha has composed and played back-ground music for over 60 short T.V. Films.

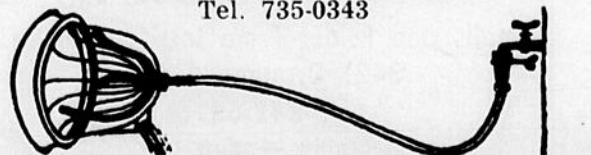

Tea Time Topics...

Suggestions for
press conveners

By Millicent Hickmore

FOLLOWING Labor Day, women's clubs, church groups and other organizations will re-convene and notices will be received for publication on the women's pages. Many groups have changed press conveners, and these women, not familiar with newspaper policy, will find the following rules helpful.

Copy should be typed — double spaced — on one side of paper only — with a generous margin. It is important that names have initials.

Printing is not acceptable and punctuation should be used sparingly. Names of persons and places are always capitalized, such as H. J. Smith, but not fully capitalized as Mr. BLANK, no words should be fully capitalized no matter how important they are, that should be left to the editor.

Brackets and underlining of words and sentences should not be used.

Certain words are spelled out fully such as — street, avenue and boulevard — with a small first letter. Time is written as — a.m. or p.m. with space and period between and not capitalized.

In order to give fair coverage to all circulation districts, it is advisable that items be kept as brief as possible.

Adventure by Air and by Sea

The Autobiography of Francis Chichester, *The Lonely Sea and the Sky*. The Musson Book Company Ltd., 339 pages — \$6.95.

Seldom has there been written an adventure story so absorbing and thorough as "The Lonely Sea and the Sky." This is not a book one wishes to rush through, but one to pick up at intervals and become absorbed in each chapter, which is complete to the smallest detail.

Commencing with his young life, the author tells of events during his schooldays in England, and his term at Marlborough College. Due to stay in college until the age of 25 preparing for Indian Civil Service, he left Marlborough at 18 and set off for New Zealand with ten pounds in his pocket. Life was not easy and among the many jobs he worked at were fireman, herdsman, coal miner, etc.

Married at 23 to a pretty little brunette, he separated from his wife and son George three years after. Some years later he got word that his wife had died.

Spurred on by ambition to make a fortune, he became a successful land agent and was able to save a considerable amount of money. He founded a business with a New Zealand partner and was earning ten thousand pounds a year by the time he was 26. Later they founded an aviation company.

Ten years after leaving England he returned and received his "A" flying licence permitting him to fly an aeroplane alone.

His achievements included the world's first solo long-distance seaplane flight in 1931; the first solo sailing race across the Atlantic in 1960; top award for air navigation; and top award in 1961 for single-handed navigation.

On one of his trips to England, he meets and falls in love with a girl called Sheila Craven, whom he marries and they have a son Giles. In later years Sheila saved his life when he was threatened with lung cancer.

Marianopolis adds a music program

Marianopolis College will add a faculty of music course to its arts and science program this fall, the girls' school announced yesterday.

The course, directed by Sister St. Mary Terence, CND will lead to a bachelor of arts degree with a major in music.

"The arts degree with a major in music differs from other music programs offered in Quebec in that students receive a definite proportion of courses in fields other than music. The aim of such a program is to provide students with a solid foundation of general knowledge in addition to specialized training in music," the release said.

Candidates for music major arts degree may take piano, organ, violin or voice study. Courses in the history of music, theory, form and analysis will be required study also.

"The study of a secondary practical subject is required for at least one year."

Francis Chichester relates his true story of adventure, hardships, drama and excitement in the most interesting manner making this book one of the great autobiographies of the times.

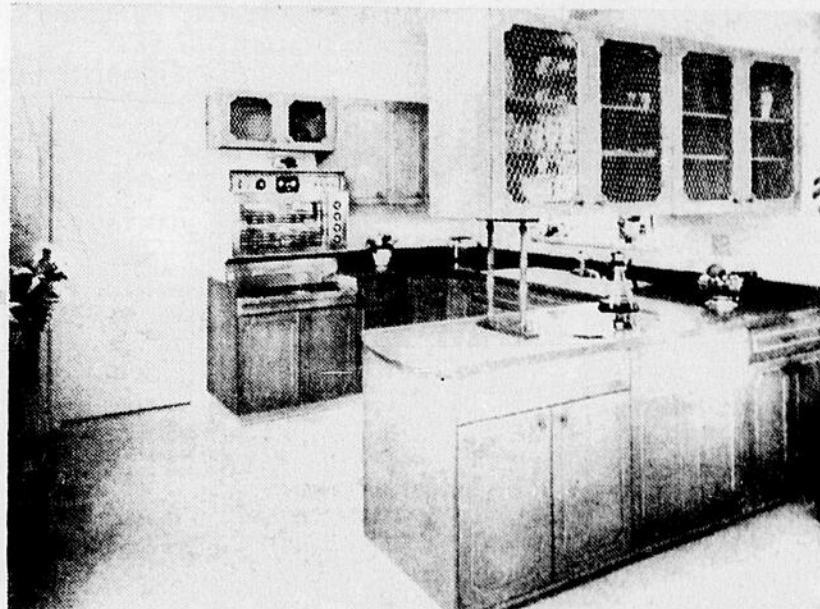

CWL Centennial project a secret

Three hundred delegates representing more than 150,000 members of the Catholic Women's League of Canada started their annual convention in P.E.I. earlier this week, and pledged to come up with a national centennial project before the meeting ends Friday.

"Of course, it is a secret just now, but if this project I have in mind is accepted by the convention, it will affect people all across the country."

Frosst Co. sales top 10 million

Consolidated sales of Charles E. Frosst & Co. Montreal, went over the ten million dollar mark during the year ended May 31, 1964. Chairman Eliot S. Frosst of Westmount and President John B. Frosst report that sales were \$10,276,283, an increase of \$438,682 over the previous year.

Net earnings were \$717,966 or \$1.35 a share, an increase of \$24,411, or four cents a share over 1963.

Earnings before taxes on income of \$1,359,295, or \$2.56 per share, were the highest in the history of the company and were \$124,150, or 23 cents per share, greater than in 1963.

Dividends paid on Class A shares listed on the Montreal and Toronto Stock Exchanges, and Class B shares were 65 cents a share and totalled \$344,995.

Retained earnings at the end of the fiscal year were \$3,980,391, a decrease of \$384,289 due to the provision of a reserve of \$757,300 against investments in other companies. These investments, say the company officials, were required for the financing of companies acquired in 1962. Sales volumes of these companies have been increasing but "they have not reached the point of profitable operation."

The 1964 O'Keefe Amateur Golf Championship has been scheduled for Saturday, August 29, at Boucherville Golf Course, when 33 amateur zone champions, from all areas of the province, will compete for the provincial title in their class.

First tee off, in the 18 hole medal play event, is at 11:30 a.m., according to the draw announced by John Costigan, Chairman of the O'Keefe Amateur Golf Circuit.

The provincial title match at Boucherville brings together the class A, B and C winners of the 12 zone championships held throughout the province during the summer months, and includes many of Quebec's finest amateur golfers.
