Conservative Estimate of British Columbia's Loss.

IT WAS CAREFULLY GLEANED

And Computed by the "Star" Correspondent, Who Visited the Flooded Districts.

[SPECIAL TO THE STAR.]

VANCOUVER, B. C., June 19.—The Fraser River in British Columbia is affected by three high tides each year, in the months of March, April and June, the snow melting and running down the mountains at these periods.

In 1932, the year of the high floods, as well as the present year, there were no high tides during the months of March and April, and on account of the unusually cool weather the snow did not commence to come down until May 22, when the water suddenly became very hot, and mountain rivulets changing to raging torrents, poured into the river, raising it a foot an hour, the three highest tides, as it were, had united their forces.

At the narrower portions of the river the water rose with tremendous rapidity, and in hundreds of cases the floods were pouring into the doors of the farmhouses before the farmers realized their peril.

The first rush of waves swept like a tidal wave through the valley, the swift water carrying the trees, uprooting and carrying away everything in its path, and in less than two hours the entire river valley was black with floating debris and in 24 hours 100,000 cattle, swine, sheep and horses, besides many other animals in the district, were lost.

Some of the elderly passengers were cross and restless, and completely out of patience at having to "PLAY CARDS WITH FATE," but the young people appeared to enjoy the novel situation immensely.

In the meantime the farmers and ranchers had been sitting in their homes, wondering what the waters would subside, but as they continued to rise farms and ranches were abandoned, and the people fled to the hills, where they remained for two weeks on rather short rations, but, on the whole, very well taken care of by the railroad company.

Some of the elderly passengers were cross and restless, and completely out of patience at having to "PLAY CARDS WITH FATE," but the young people appeared to enjoy the novel situation immensely.

Now that the waters are rapidly subsiding a review of the situation is in order.

I might mention that the STAR correspondent, who was despatched from the scene of the flood, was the recipient of telegrams from several Montreal papers for details of the disaster, and was treated as such lack of foresight deserves.

The Fraser river farmers for the past twelve years since the great floods of 1922, have been rapidly settling on the bottom lands.

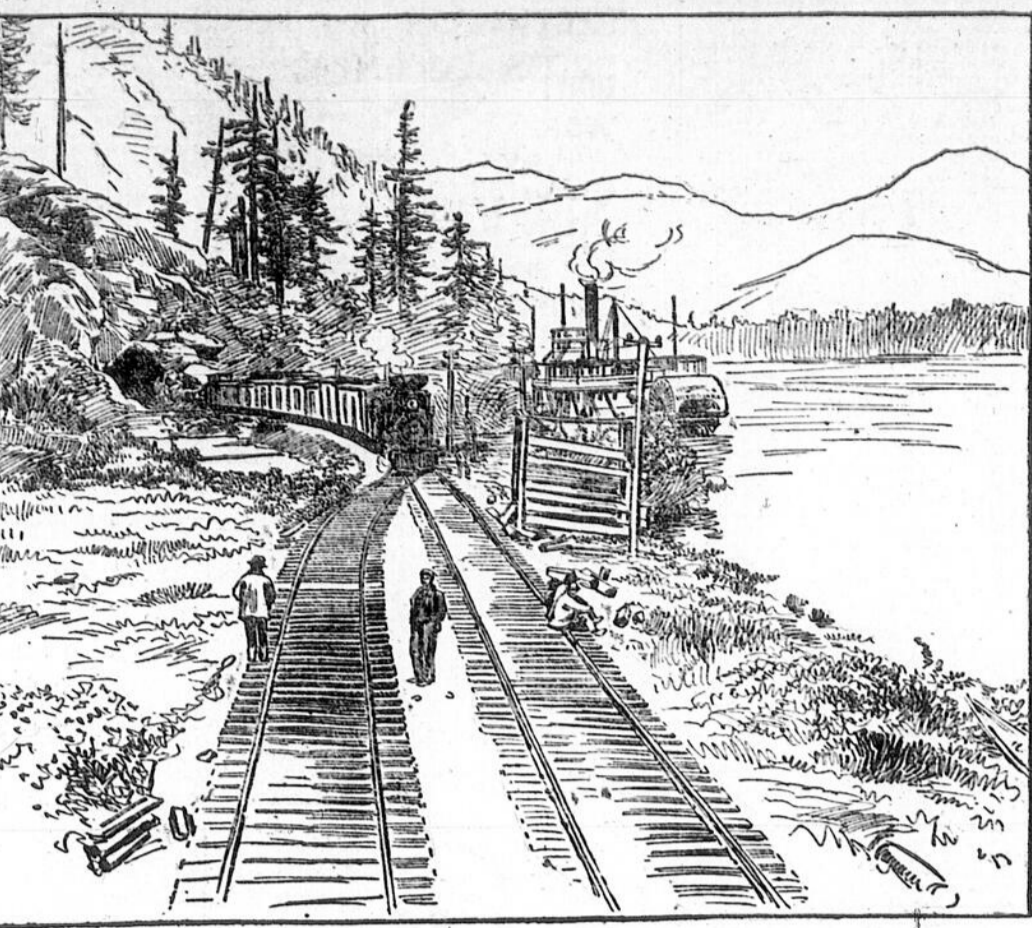

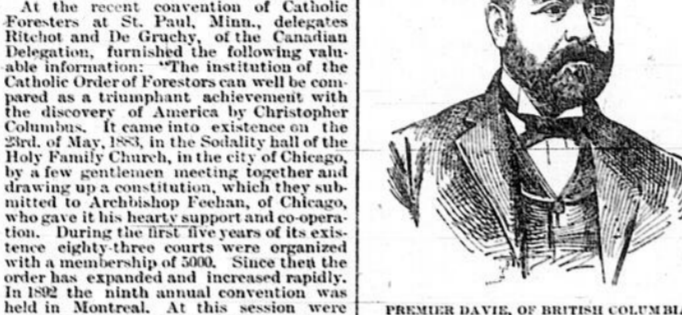

Bicycling in Montreal.

The following is taken by permission from "Our City and Our Sports" issued on the occasion of the C. W. A. preliminary meeting.

Bicycling may be said to date its birth from 1845, when Pierre Lallement a French mechanic invented the first bicycle.

It was not, however, until 1879, that the bicycle became known in the United States.

At the international exposition of that year, held at Philadelphia, a number of bicycles were exhibited.

During the same year two Englishmen, Jno. Keen and David Starbuck, introduced the bicycle into America.

It is stated that Mr. A. D. Chandler, of Boston, imported on May 29, 1877, a wheel and chain drive bicycle.

The American to ride a cycle. The year 1877, saw a score of more riders in Boston, New York and other large cities.
