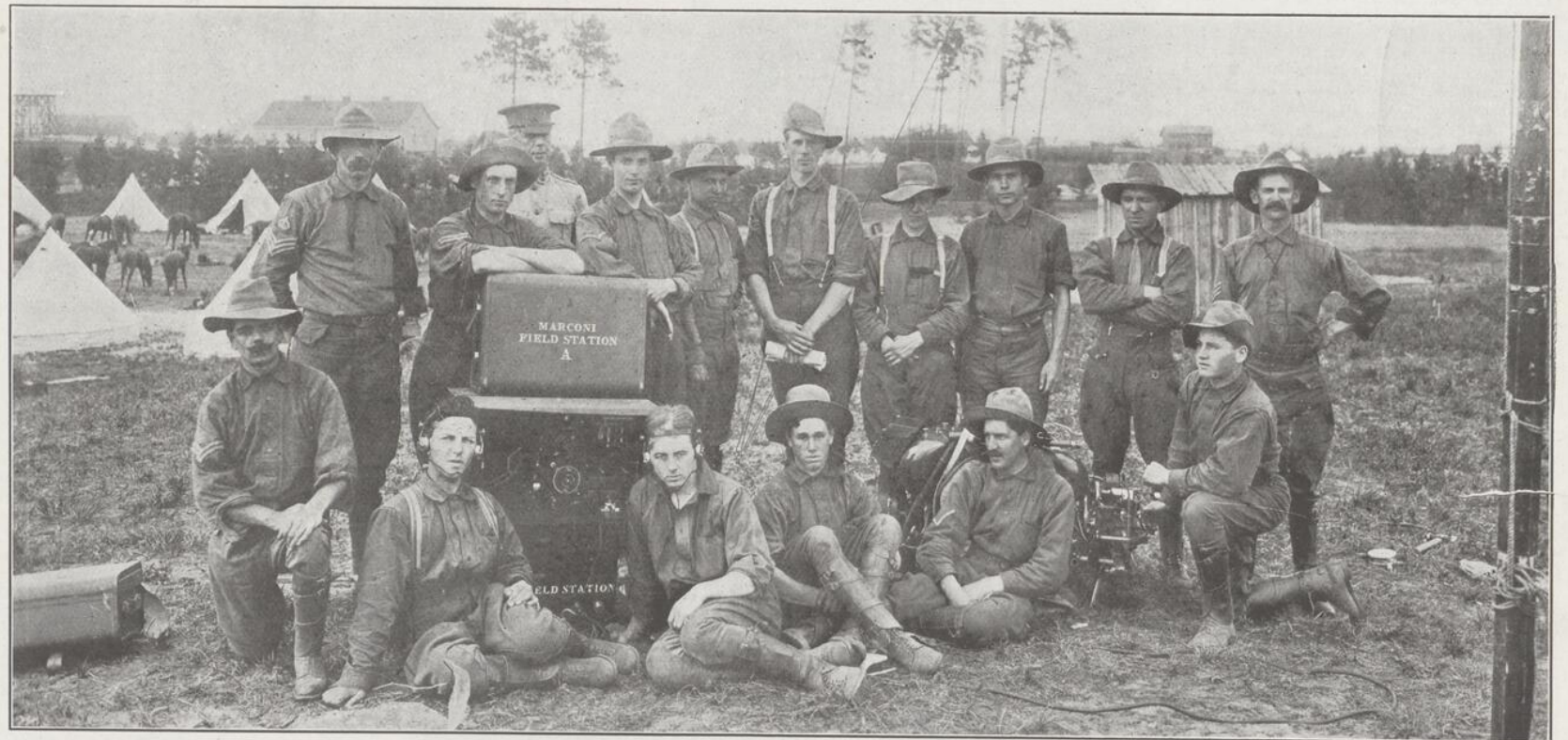

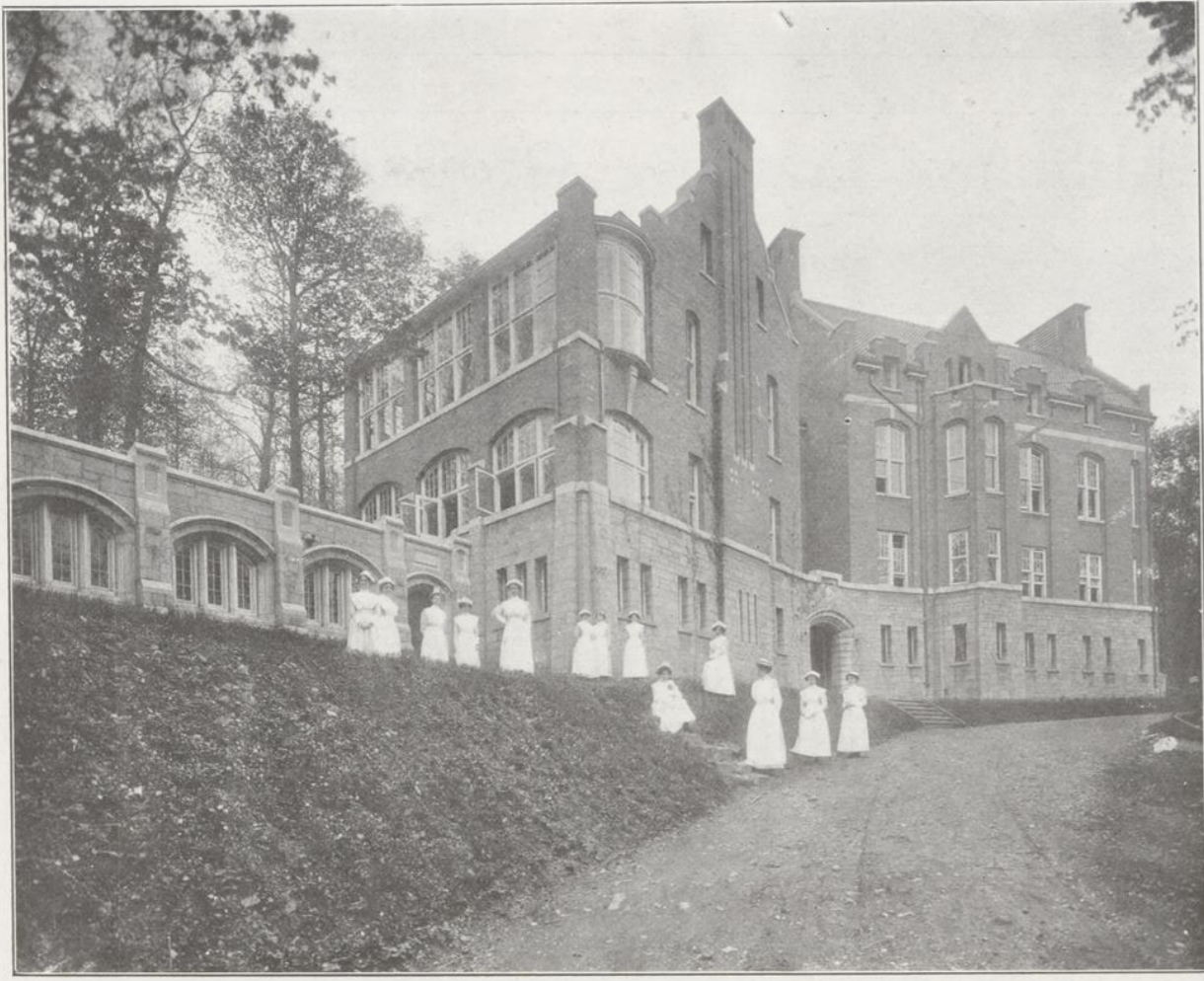

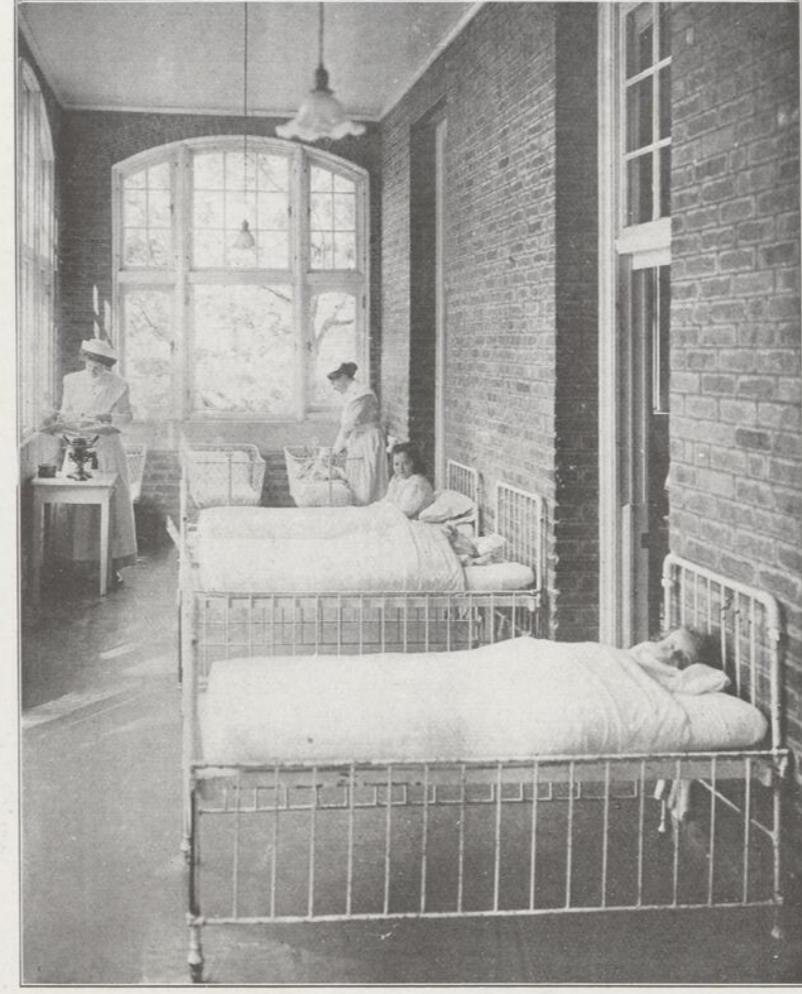

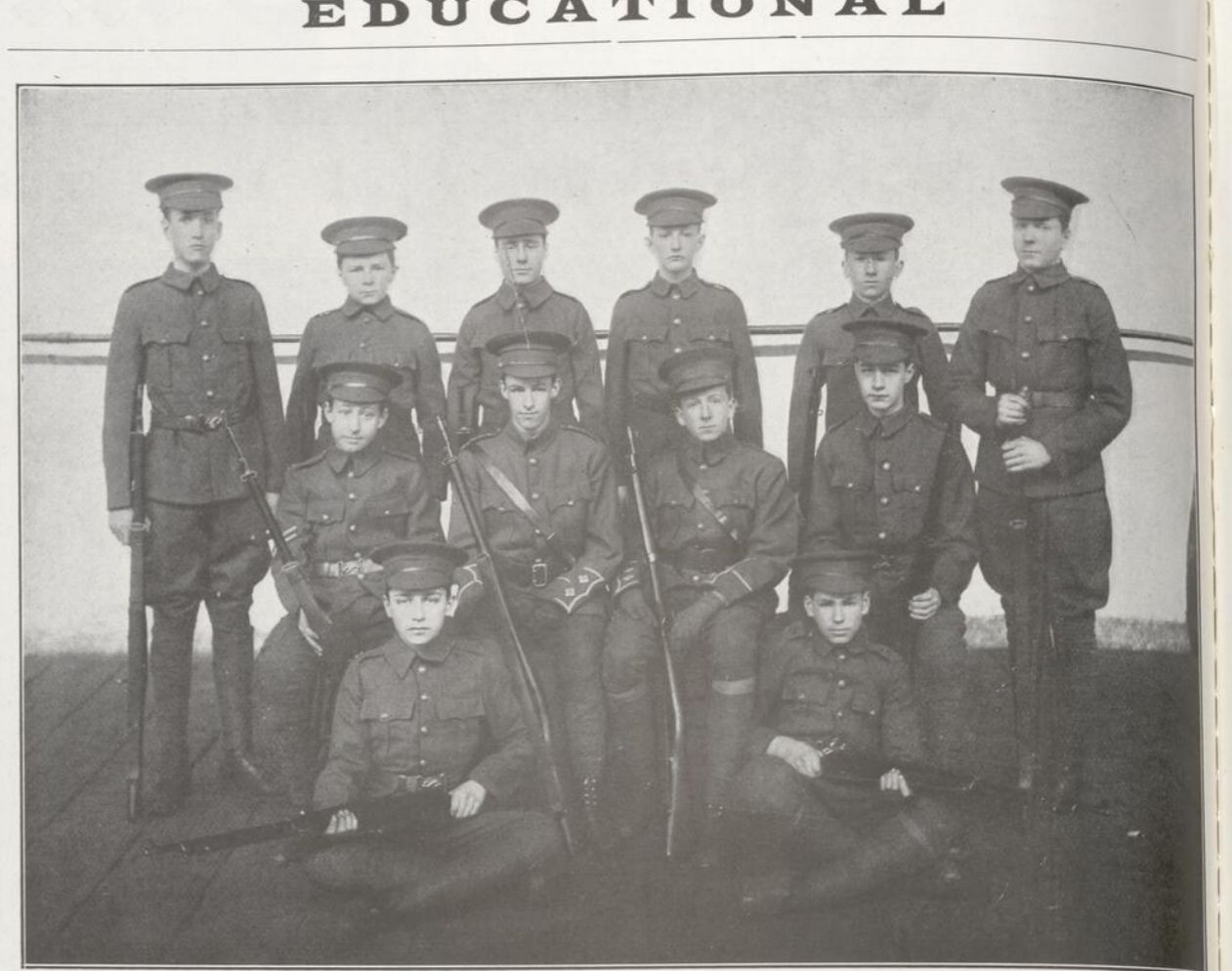
# Glimpse of Every-day Life in the Children's Memorial Hospital, Montreal; A Notable Event Commemorated

## EDUCATIONAL

### Where Crippled Children Are Cared For.

THE Children's Memorial Hospital, Montreal, Canada, was founded to perpetuate the memory of Queen Victoria, and to care for, treat and educate crippled children, until then unprovided for.

The first meeting of the Committee of Organization was held in November, 1902, and at that meeting the aims of the founders were expressed in these words:

"It is the desire of the Committee of Organization of the proposed Children's Memorial Hospital to organize and build a small hospital for children in the neighborhood of Montreal.

"It is to be built as a memorial to our late Queen and will be called the Children's Memorial Hospital to Queen Victoria.

"It will be large enough to comfortably house at least from twelve to fifteen children.

"This hospital will be primarily for crippled children, but if at any time there should be unoccupied beds those suffering from other surgical or medical affections may be admitted.

"If at a later date it should appear necessary to enlarge the field of our work it is our hope to convert this institution into a children's general hospital, but at present our expectation is to build an hospital especially adapted to the treatment of the class of patients which can at present be but inefficiently treated at our general hospitals owing to their situation and inability to take advantage of the curative effects of the sun.

"It is to act as an adjunct to the General Hospitals of this city (The Montreal General, the Royal Victoria and others) and will even be prepared to receive children convalescing from chronic surgical affections who have been already treated in these hospitals.

"This hospital should be built either on Mount Royal or in the country immediately adjacent to this city, where the children being treated therein can

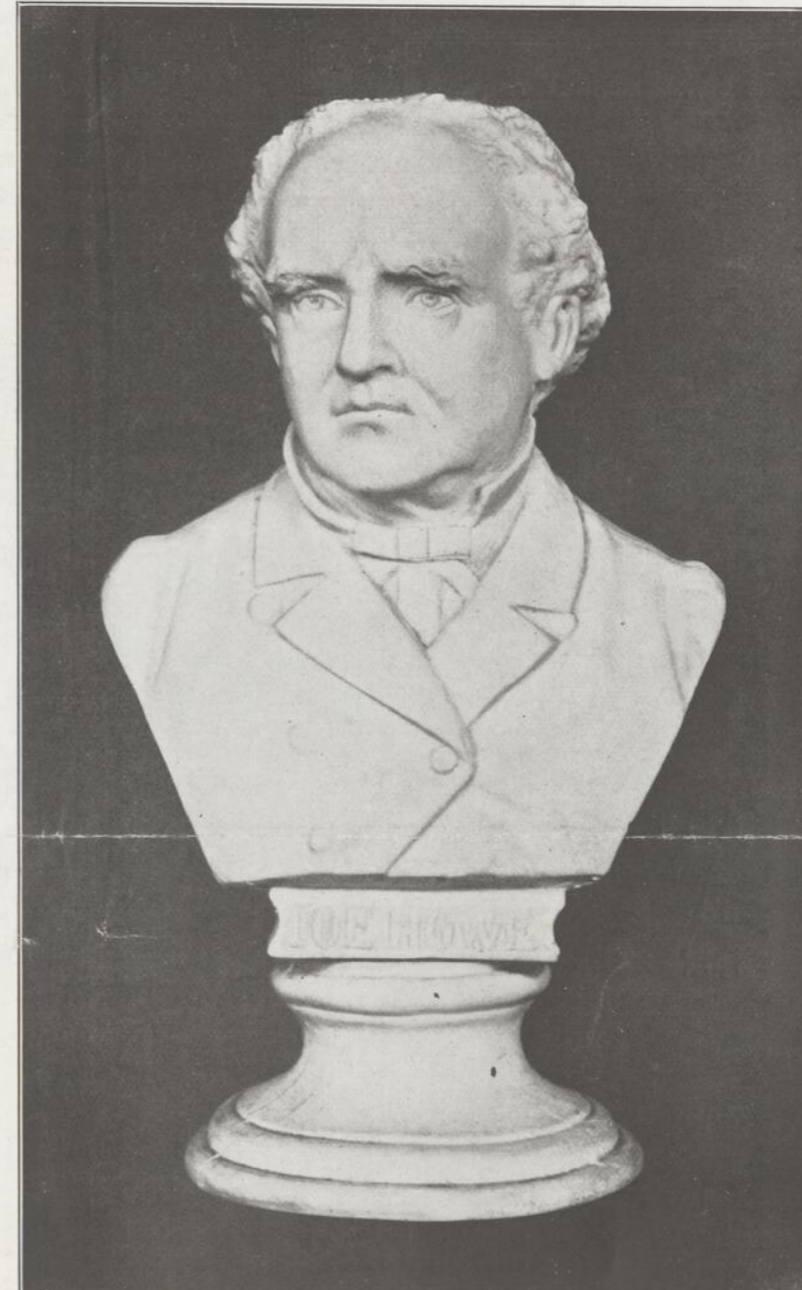

receive the full benefit of the sun and fresh air (essentials to the treatment of consumptive disease of the bone), and also the attendance of surgeons and physicians in this city.

"It will be built with large verandahs for the use of the children during the summer months, and will be surmounted by an edifice built of glass, simulating a large conservatory, which will be artificially heated during the winter months, and into which our children will be carried each day during that season, that they may obtain every benefit derivable from the sun."

"These aims have been the guiding star of succeeding committees of administration, as almost ten years have rolled by since the first meeting of the founders was held, and yet, whilst the aims then expressed have been adhered to, the rapidly changing conditions of a new country with an ever increasing population has made it imperative to enlarge and extend not only the hospital buildings and its lands but to so extend its ambitions that we see in Montreal's hospital for children an institution planned for the care and education of about two hundred children. These plans are being gradually consummated and at present the Hospital's architects are calling for tenders for the building of a cottage for the care of infants, and are drawing plans for an out-patient department and a school house, all of which it is expected will be approaching completion before winter sets in.

The Children's Memorial Hospital was founded to do what was not being done by the then existing institutions

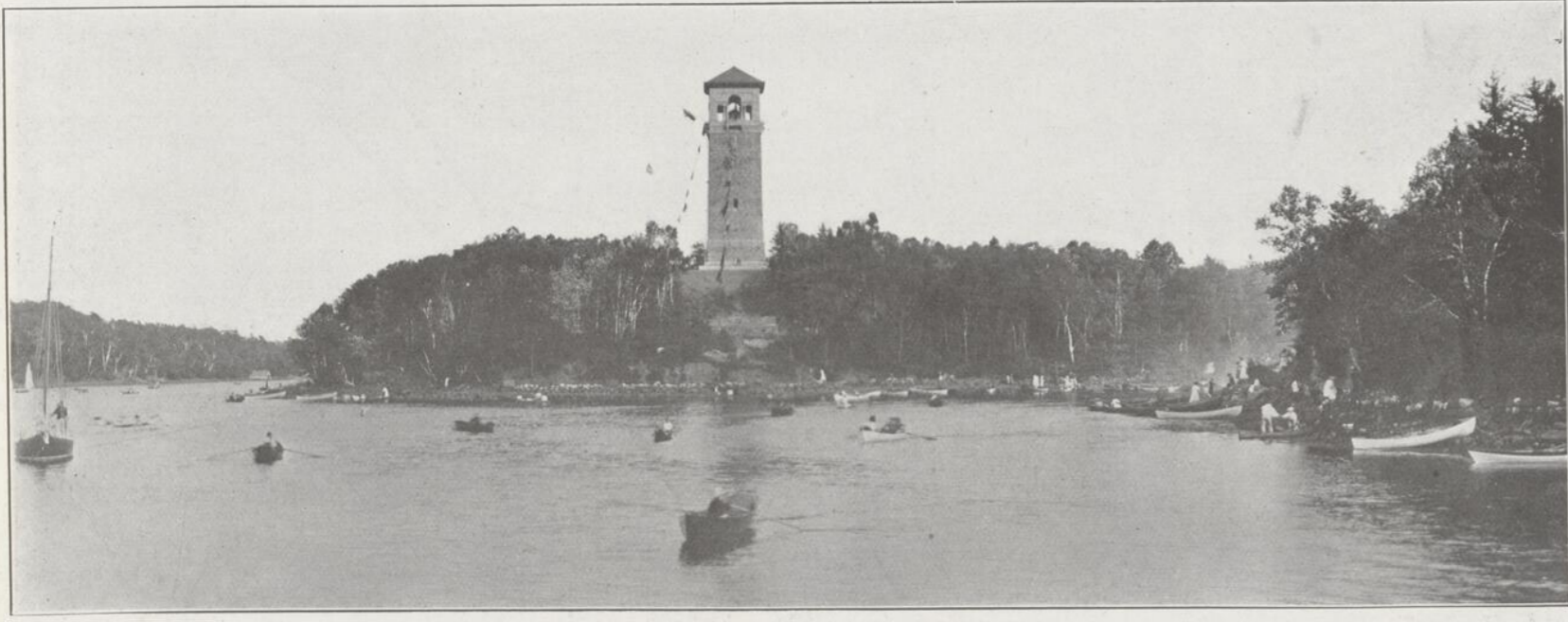

THE NATIONAL MEMORIAL TOWER AT HALIFAX, ERRECTED TO COMMEMORATE THE ESTABLISHMENT OF REPRESENTATIVE GOVERNMENT IN NOVA SCOTIA—On one of the picturesque hills which give diversity and beauty to the City of Halifax, a lofty and beautiful stone tower has been erected to keep in the grateful memory of a loyal people the grant by Great Britain of representative government to Nova Scotia and to the other Provinces of Canada. The Memorial will shortly be dedicated by H.R.H. the Duke of Connaught, Governor-General of Canada, in the presence of a distinguished gathering. The foundation stone was laid by Duncan Cameron Fraser, Lieutenant-Governor of Nova Scotia, on Oct. 2, 1908—the 150th anniversary of the first meeting of the General Assembly in Nova Scotia. This Assembly—the first elected legislative body in Canada—was constituted in accordance with the settled colonial policy of Great Britain and in obedience to the terms of the commissions issued to the early Governors of Nova Scotia. The Park in which the Tower stands was the gift of Sir Sandford Fleming, K.C.M.G.

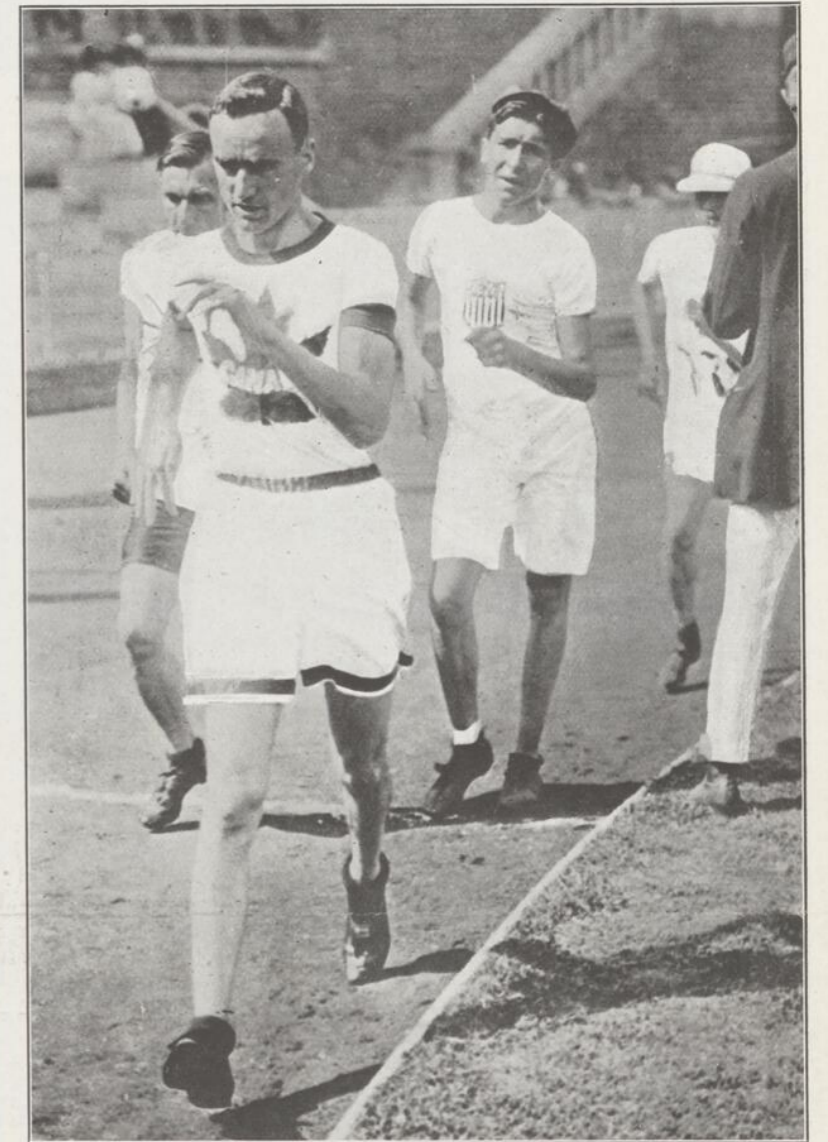

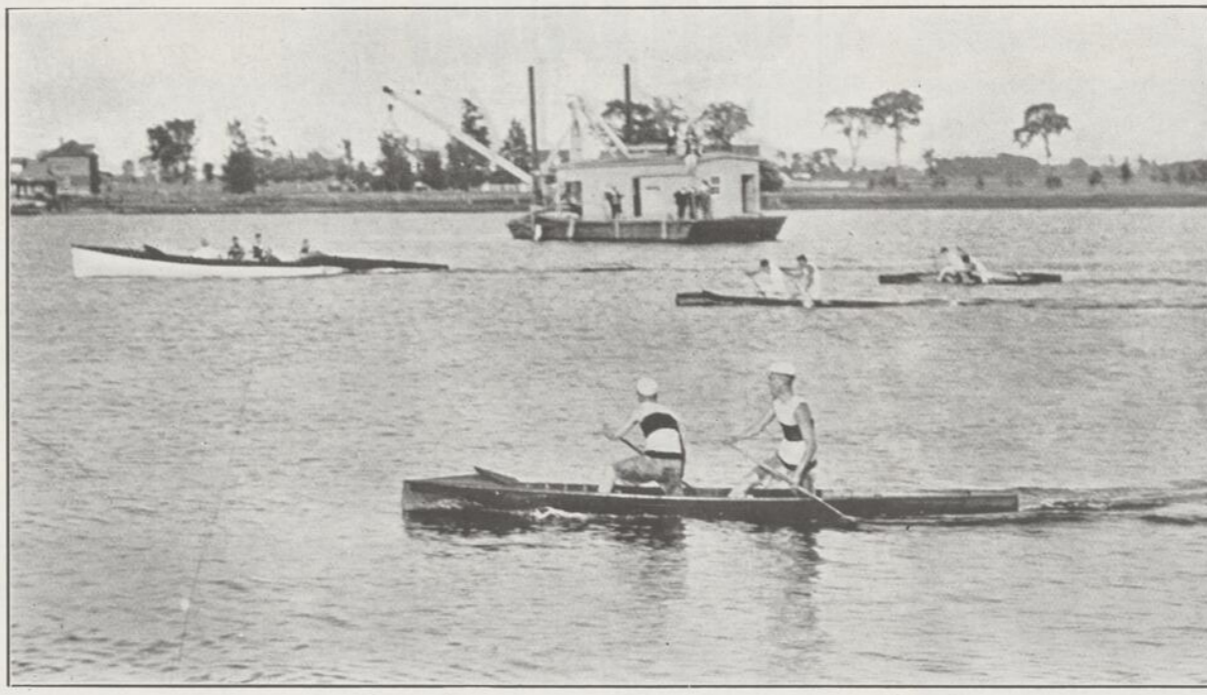
a general hospital for children; yet it was founded primarily for crippled children. Necessity forced it to become a general hospital. It was found impossible to maintain in a nursing and medical staff of prime order without broadening its work. Yet the object of the hospital remains the same. Its work is done principally amongst children suffering from deformities. The Children's Memorial Hospital has undertaken not only to treat medically, children who, by reason of their deformities, are handicapped in life's race, but it endeavors through the efforts of its teachers and nurses, to act as a mother to its patients, to gain the confidence of its children, to enter into their lives and so learn the peculiar capacities of each that every individual may be so trained that he or she may become a factor in the industrial life of the community. It is with a view to meeting the re-

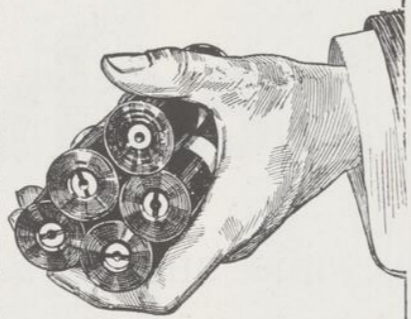

It is with almost maternal instinct that the future education of the crippled children of Eastern Canada has been planned. The school is looked upon as equally useful with the operating room, the natural gardens and solarium as more beneficial than the wards.

In the Children's Memorial Hospital treatment directed to relieve physical deformities goes hand in hand with treatment directed to make use of mental attributes. With great forethought some years ago the committee of the Children's Hospital secured one of the most charming spots on the side of Mount Royal on which to build this hospital. There, amidst trees and flowers, overlooking the noble St. Lawrence the children spend their days and there are being built the buildings which are to complete the institution.

Montreal, and George Goulding, of Toronto, at the Olympic Games at Stockholm, established new records. Hodgson is now the amateur swimming champion of the world, as he outclassed his competitors in the 1500 metres Olympic swimming race. In winning the race he broke three world's records and his performance will go down in athletic history as a marvel. Goulding won the 10,000 metres (6.214 miles) walk defeating A. J. Webb of England, F. Altmani, of Italy, and A. Rasmussen, of Denmark, three great European walkers. A new world's record was also set by "Confidence" the Hon. Clifford Sifton's horse, at the Olympic Horse Show in London, when the animal surpassed its own record. In the shooting world the work of Corp. Mortimer, of Quebec, at the recent Bisley meeting, was regarded as something phenomenal, a new world's record being established in one of the competitions by the clever marksman.

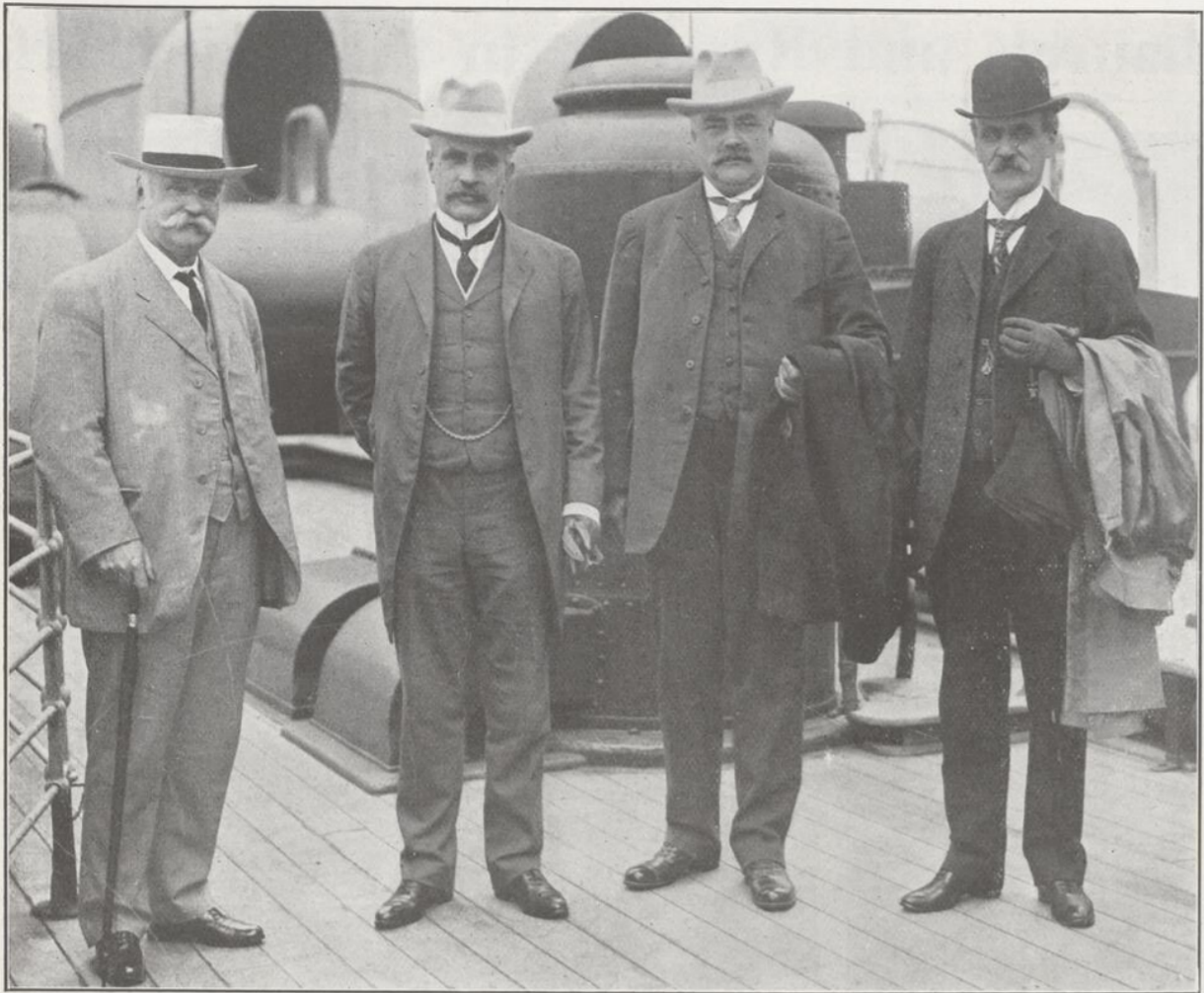

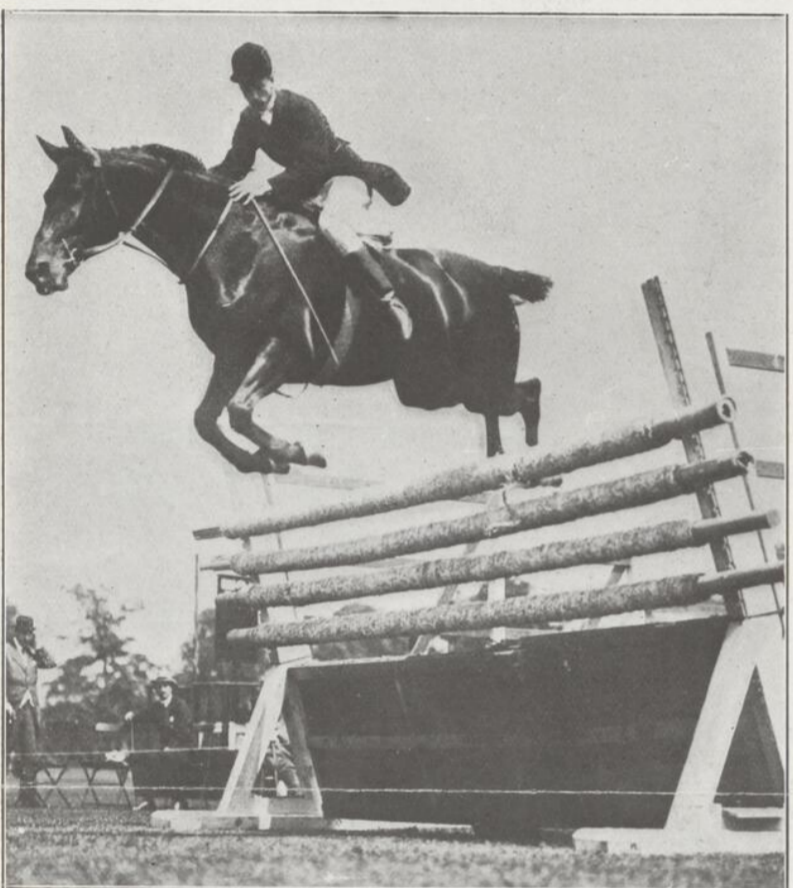

The Taming of the Shrew



CANADIANS WHO ARE AIDING THE IMPERIAL GOVERNMENT TO FORMULATE AN IMPERIAL NAVAL POLICY—The present visit of Canada's Prime Minister and three of his colleagues to England is regarded as an epoch-making event in Great Britain, and it is anticipated that, as a result of their conferences with the Imperial Government on naval matters, Canada will shortly make a substantial and an effective contribution to the Navy. The exact nature of the contribution will not be known until the return of Premier Borden and his Ministers to Canada, but it has already been announced that Canada is to share in the naval defence of the Empire. WORLD'S GREATEST JUMPING HORSE.

"Confidence," the great Canadian jumping horse, whose picture appears on this page, is known all over the civilized world, wherever Horse Shows are held; and though it is at present owned by the Hon. Clifford Sifton, and thus can claim Ottawa as its residence, Montreal and Toronto have just as much claim to this distinction. The horse was originally the property of Crow & Murray, of Toronto. Afterwards, it became the property of Lieut.-Col. W. H. Evans, of Montreal, though Crow & Murray continued to look after it. When it became their property again, it was purchased by Mr. Sifton, but in the meantime it had made a name in Europe. "Confidence" is ten years old. It was last exhibited in Montreal during the Horse Show in the Arena last spring, although it was not then given a chance to show the best it could do. At the Toronto Horse Show, however, it had cleared 7 feet 5 1/2 inches, and this accomplishment was bettered at the last Olympia Horse Show in London this year, when a record of 7 feet 5 1/2 inches was made. This is officially considered the world's record, for, although other horses have made better records than this, these were supposed to have been made over tied poles, whereas "Confidence" jumped over loose poles. "Heatherbloom," for instance, a horse which is also well known here, in 1902 jumped 7 feet 8 inches; in 1903 7 feet 1/4 inches; and in 1905, in Norfolk, Virginia, 7 feet 10 inches. "Confidence's" record is said to have again been beaten considerably by a horse called "Bifuto," ridden by a Lieutenant Capone, of the Italian Army, some six years ago. But, as stated before, these records were made over tied poles.

THE WORLD'S GREATEST JUMPING HORSE—"Confidence," the property of the Hon.
