A CIVIL ENGINEER.

REPELLED NAVIGATION IN A FOE.

A correspondent of the Boston Advertiser, who writes from London, after completing his voyage across the Atlantic says: The Siberia, of the Cunard Line, sailed from Boston, July 1, on the new southerly course for Liverpool, and striking into the fog on the first day out, did not meet with fifteen minutes' clear weather, when an observation could be taken, for almost eight days, but no pains were spared by the officers to make the dead reckoning accurate. The log was thrown every two hours day and night. On the evening of the eighth day, our latitude was estimated to be north 43.25, but the fog was still dense enough for the fog whistle to be blown. A little later it lifted very suddenly, then the clouds broke, disclosing the pointers of the Dipper, and a moment later the North Star itself was visible. The chief officer hastened for his sextant, carefully took the altitude of the star and found it to be 49.36 to a second. And on the tenth day we came in sight of the Skelligs, and bore up to the coast of Ireland to the Fastnet Light without changing the course a fraction of a point. And this was the first time the Siberia had sailed upon the new course, and during three-fourths of the time she had been developed in fog.

THE TORONTO MAIL SAYS.

The Commissioner has power, by writ of attachment, to compel Mr. Huntington, or any one else whom they choose, to appear before them and give evidence on oath. The public will expect them, if necessary, to use that power to the utmost. It will expect them to bring Mr. Huntington, or any other unwilling witness, before them, and endeavor to obtain such evidence as they can give. These men cannot longer be permitted to evade on delay on the part of others, and themselves cause further delay in preparing for the meeting of Parliament. The evidence must be brought out now if possible. It is only a mercenary factiousness which will prevent this being done. We have no doubt the Commissioners will exercise their powers to the fullest, and endeavor to enable the Governor-General to call Parliament together within the time stated by him in his prorogation speech. Be the blame on the heads of those who may prevent his Excellency's expressed intentions being carried out.

THE MASONIC FRATERNITY.

The Masonic fraternity have under way at least \$1,000,000 worth of new halls, most of which will be completed this year. The one in Philadelphia is the most magnificent structure of the kind in the country, and when finished and entirely completed will be worth at least \$1,000,000.

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Writing from Berlin on Aug. 13, the correspondent says: The German public opinion appears that Capt. Werner's capture of the Prince's man-of-war 'Princess Friederich Carl,' barely escaped court-martial for aiding the fugitives. His instructions being to interfere only in case the lives of the crew were threatened, he was regarded as having committed an unjustifiable act in taking a vessel on the mere suspicion that she might some day be employed in plundering a town where there were German residents. But although the admiralty was of opinion that a proper regard for the sanctity of the service left them no choice but to recall the impulsive officer, the public seem to think that the punishment awarded is out of proportion to the offense committed. It is very curious to observe how public opinion has veered round in favor of the captured Captain since his recall. When the first news of his adventure arrived people were nearly unanimous in blaming him for all his unnecessary interference, but no sooner was he reported than public opinion became a general outcry that he had been ill-used, and that if there was any offense it had only, after all, been committed against an insurgent rabble and professional patriots. A similar opinion seems to have prevailed in the German Foreign Office. Although Prince Bismarck did not for a moment attempt to support the notion advanced by the admiralty, he has not been slow to state his opinion to the effect that the service left them no choice but to recall the impulsive officer, the public seem to think that the punishment awarded is out of proportion to the offense committed. It is very curious to observe how public opinion has veered round in favor of the captured Captain since his recall.

ANOTHER LETTER FROM SIR SAMUEL BAKER.

In a letter to Lord Warrington, Sir Samuel Baker gives some account of his march to that which was published yesterday. He writes: 'The slave hunters, or rather brigands, from Khartoum were in large force (about 1,100) on the east bank of the Nile, south of the Victoria Nile, and the Government troops with their officers of various grades, had indicated the natives against the Government, and eventually they had the audacity to break out in open rebellion. Gambia Rega, the King of Uyo, on the right of the Nile, had sent his messenger, tropus by poison, and on the following morning, considering that most of the troops were hors de combat, we were treacherously attacked by about 7,000 men.'

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ANNOUNCEMENT.

London, Aug. 29. The Times this morning has an editorial on the iron question, the burden of which is that iron is being gradually closed to her. The directors in this direction are not yet ended. The United States are competing successfully for the control of the iron traffic with Canada, South America and the West Indies. England cannot afford to idle and sleep away her time, and waste her money while competing with active and intelligent nations.
