### AT THE CITY HALL.

#### THE OFFER OF BRIDGE COMPANY ACCEPTED.

Butchers Ask That Grocers Be Not Allowed to Sell Poultry—Library & Reading Room to be Located in City Hall Finances of City in Healthy Condition.

The regular monthly meeting of the City Council was held on Monday evening in the Council Chamber. All the members were present, and Mayor E. B. Worthington presided.

A petition was presented from Mrs. C. Duncan asking the permission of the Council to division of a lot of land which she owned in the North Ward as she was going to petition the Provincial Government to have the cadastral plan changed. The request was granted.

Mr. J. B. Duford and others, butchers in the city, presented a petition to the City Council asking that the provisions of by-law 2/3 be enforced, in which the said by-law deals with the sale of poultry by grocers in the city. The matter was referred to the Market Committee.

A letter was read from Mr. C. H. Fletcher stating that owing to the short notice he had received he was not in a position to give a price on the Bellevue property, but would later.

The Secretary-Treasurer read a letter from Messrs. Brown & Macdonald stating that the case of Moroney vs. the City was dismissed, the tender offered by the city being considered sufficient.

Messrs. Panretton & Leblanc, advocates, wrote stating that after a delay of thirty days they would take action for \$50 damages for one Jos. Laflamme, for false arrest.

The Secretary-Treasurer also read two notices from Mr. John Leonard, advocate, for A. Renaud and Mrs. Langer, claiming damages which they allege they sustained through fire to their property, and which they say was caused by the steam roller. The matter was referred to the Road Committee with power to act.

Mr. A. Lachance, advocate, Quebec, wrote stating that he had been instructed by the Provincial Government to collect the sum of \$324.56 due to them for expense of keeping some boys in the Reform School. Referred to the Finance Committee.

Mr. R. Sampson wrote stating that he would like to see the present premises in the Beckett Block within a month provided the city allowed him the sum of \$200 damages for his trouble in moving.

The question of selling the old buildings in the Square was discussed and it was decided to refer the matter to the following committee: Mayor Worthington, Councillors McManamy, Wilson, Cate, Olivier, Thompson and Jenckes.

It was moved by Councillor Jenckes, seconded by Councillor McManamy, that the tender of the National Bridge Company of New York for the new bridge across the Magog at Wolfe Street be accepted by the Council, and after approval of the city attorney to the contract, as prepared by Mr. J. W. Burke, C.E., that the Mayor and Secretary-Treasurer be authorized to sign the same on behalf of the city.

The Secretary-Treasurer was authorized on motion of Councillor Jenckes, seconded by Councillor Thompson, to call for tenders for the lumber required for the new bridge just as soon as the dimensions and quantity were made known by Mr. Burke.

During the discussion which took place about the new city hall the councillors were of the opinion that accommodation should be furnished in the new building for the library and reading room.

Councillor Cate informed the Council that after paying all disbursements up to the first of December, including over \$9,000 for sewerage and \$1,200 for the property on Factory Street, there was still a balance of over \$2,000 in hand.

The Council adjourned to meet on the 19th December.

## ZEPHRA.

### The Beautiful Scenic Production Last Evening.

#### A HIGHLY SUCCESSFUL PERFORMANCE.

The merry hum of the rising curtain on the first presentation of Zephra at the Clement Theatre last night found a fair sized audience impatiently awaiting the coming of the beautiful queen and her royal retainers, and the whirl of the same painted-cloth as it descended on the grand transformation finale, at the close of the fourth and last act, left that same audience bewildered, surprised, and withal delighted with the spectacle.

Zephra is a glittering pageant of chivalry and song—a vision of fairyland, floating, mythical,—yet indelibly stamped on memory as a thing beautiful. It is a glorious reminiscence of the days

"When maidens danced before the king  
And dainty laugh good luck would bring."

It is a two hours sojourn among the boisterous dells and witching glades of Elfland, where gallant knights and fayre ladies disport themselves with the sprites and fairies, and to the tinkling of the light guitar and creak of the enticing castinet, brave captains and sunny peasant girls dance, sing, and make merry.

Zephra is the strongest scenic production ever presented in Sherbrooke, embracing as it does ten complete stage settings. The costumes are gorgeous and particularly effective in color and design. The story is an interesting one, and the music as sparkling as a sun shower.

Of the cast of characters much could be said, but little is needed for where all did so well it is hard to individualize. Of course there were the little first night hitches, and the evident feeling of nervousness that is somewhat noticeable in both cast and chorus at every first night theatrical, but the lines were delivered with force and the music sung with snap and precision. Mrs. Smith is an ideal Queen, gracious, forgiving, yet inflexible in judgment. Miss Webster, as Neryera, is aptly fitted for the part,—singing and acting admirably. Miss Hubbard, as Flora, has one of the strongest situations in the play, and rises to the occasion beautifully. Miss Fuller is indeed a Fairy Queen, and we must not forget to mention the solo dance in the Brownies by Nita, nor the singing by Louisius Low, by Anthea, which were two of the most enjoyable numbers on the programme.

Of the male cast, perhaps Mr. Shuter, of Lennoxville, had the most difficult role, but he played it with dramatic vigor and consistency. Mr. Dastous is a gallant lover. Dr. Allen a stalwart captain. Mr. Merrill a diplomat. Mr. Merrill a diplomatic old Minister of State, and Mr. Lowe a Courteous Knight, all speaking their lines distinctly, and, while apparently not endeavoring to be stars, showing consistency and much of real histrionic merit in their several parts.

Of the choruses, dances and drill we could write indefinitely, for they are the backbone of the spectacle, but space forbids, and as all are so nearly equal in point of excellence we cannot discriminate.

Hubbard's orchestra should come in for a word of praise for their part in the solos and accompaniments for the solos and the dance numbers. The calcium lights, with their ever changing colors, are also a feature.

The Zephra management, consisting of Mr. Averill, manager; Mr. Booth, stage director; Mr. Foster, costumer; Mrs. Coggins, assistant costumer; Mr. Simpson, electrician; and Mr. Coggins, advertising agent, together with the committee from the I. O. O. F., are to be congratulated on the successful spectacle, which will run for three nights and a matinee more. There are plenty of excellent seats left for each performance, all reports to the contrary. The production is magnificent, and Sherbrooke people who have been clamoring for first class attractions should, and evidently will, show their appreciation of Zephra by crowding the theatre to its utmost capacity.

## ST. FRANCIS DISTRICT ASSOCIATION.

### Good Work Reported By Clergy.

#### MET AT LENNOXVILLE YESTERDAY.

The annual meeting of the District of St. Francis Church Society (Anglican) opened in the Parish Hall, Lennoxville, yesterday afternoon at two o'clock. Rev. Dr. Searth presided.

Among those present were:—The Lord Bishop of Quebec, Dr. Searth, Rural Dean; Revs. Wurtelo, Sykes, Ven. Archdeacon Roe, Dr. Whitney, Principal Bishop's College, Profs. Parrock and Dunn, Dr. Dumbell, Canon Foster, Rural Deans Hepburn and Robertson, Revs. Watson, Stevens, King, Lewis, Wright, Vial, Parker, Dr. Alnutt, Husband, Moore, Wright, Bishop, Murray, Whitham, Brooke and Mr. J. A. Wiggett.

The report of the clergy of the work done in the various parishes and missions were read.

Rev. A. Stevens, secretary, read the report of the work done in the District. He said that the most notable feature connected with the work was the number of changes among the clergy. The removal of the Rev. G. G. Nicolls from the Mission at Fitchbay to England, the resignation of Prof. Wilkinson, of his post at Bishop's College, the exchange by Rev. Mr. Adecock of the mission of East Angus for that of Beauce, the sudden death of the Rev. Mr. Curran, of Durham, and the resignation of the Rev. Canon Foster of the parish of Coaticook, after nearly 40 years of service, 37 of which were spent in the District of St. Francis, left five vacancies to be filled. There are at present three vacant missions, viz., East Angus, Durham and Scotchton, but no doubt the Bishop will have men for them all in a short time, and meanwhile the regular services in these places are kept up.

It is not to be expected that the gradual diminution of our English speaking people, whose places are being filled by those of the French race, that we can report a great increase in church membership; or a great advance in the amount of money raised for church services, yet it is surprising how the numbers of our communicants keep up and how the amount of money required for maintaining the services of the church are forthcoming.

The reports of the clergy shows that the adult baptisms and the numbers of those confirmed in an advanced age show that we are filling the vacancies made by death, and by the exodus of our people by bringing in those who are brought up outside of our fold. One clergyman reports that out of 22 persons baptized 11 were adults, another out of 22 baptized 10 were adults and so on.

Another gratifying feature of the work is that so many of the clergy report that improvements and repairs have been made in the churches and parsonages. During the year there has been baptized 334, confirmed 178, married 79, deaths 215. The amount of money contributed in the district during the year for all purposes has been \$32,691.97, of this \$1761.26 was for objects outside the Diocese, and \$1754.38 was for purposes within the Diocese, but not for any individual parish, and \$23,059 was for parochial objects.

Compton Ladies' College began the year with an entirely new teaching staff, and the whole curriculum has been changed, and the new system of teaching has been based upon English system.

The reports of the clergy show that throughout the District good work is being done, and the church people of these parts have every reason to thank God and take courage.

The election of officers resulted as follows:—Chairman, Rev. Dr. Searth, re-elected; secretary, Rev. A. Stevens, re-elected; treasurer, John A. Wiggett, Sherbrooke; Executive committee, Archdeacon Roe, Dr. Searth, Dr. Dumbell, Rev. Dr. Whitney, with Messrs. H. A. Elkins, J. A. Wiggett, and E. Hargrave, Sherbrooke.

After the Bishop had addressed a few words to the clergy the meeting adjourned until eight when Rev. Dr. Whitney, principal of Bishop's College, preached the anniversary sermon.

Ottawa, Dec. 3.—The customs revenue for the month ending on Saturday increased by \$393,231 over the same month last year. The increase for the five months of the fiscal year was nearly one million dollars over the five months for 1900. The figures are: \$13,235,676 for 1901, and \$12,392,649 for 1900, an increase of \$843,027 for the past five months.

### BACK FROM ALBERTA.

Mr. C. O. Swanson Says Farmers Are Very Prosperous.

Mr. C. O. Swanson, of Waterville, the immigration agent, returned from Alberta, N.W.T., on Monday morning and in conversation with the EXAMINER gave a glowing account of the condition now existing there. Mr. Swanson is employed by the Government, more particularly in looking after the Scandinavians who come to this country, and since October 12 he has conducted two parties to Alberta, N.W.T., one from Montreal and one from Minneapolis. "Large numbers," says Mr. Swanson, "are coming from the United States, particularly from Minnesota, North and South Dakota. To give you an idea of how land is being taken up in this section of the North West, our land office in Wetaskiwin, Alberta, has made between 1,000 and 1,100 entries for free homesteads, and about 60,000 acres of C.P.R. land has been sold at the same place to Scandinavians from the United States.

"This land is 30 miles from a railway, and some of it is even sixty miles. The trouble that was facing the Government agents was not so much the securing of settlers, but the securing of suitable locations that are near a railway. Those people who are coming in from the United States have every confidence in the country, and now that the choice lands in the United States are scarce they are beginning to realize that they can do ever so much better under the Dominion flag. In this particular section of Alberta alone, no less than 1,200 Scandinavians came in this year from the United States. This number, of course, did not apply to other sections of the North West where the influx of settlers was just as large. Next year the indications are that this number will be doubled, because numbers of prospecting parties from the States have gone over the ground and have reported favourably upon the land.

"The season has been very good for the farmers," continued Mr. Swanson. "The Government creameries are doing a good business, and the farmers get the benefit of the high prices for their butter. The purchase of half a million bushels of oats by the Government for South Africa has been a great boon to the farmers, the price paid being 29 cents a bushel. As showing how quickly the land is being settled, eight years ago there was not a threshing machine to be seen around Wetaskiwin, and this fall there was six steam threshers, besides those driven by horse power. The Government is doing everything in its power to assist those settling on the soil, and are building iron bridge and laying out roads. All that is missing is the railway facilities, and that must of course come in time." Mr. Swanson stated that the farmers were prosperous and happy, and the climate is not at all severe, as the first snow that he saw, of any account, was at Fort William.

### LIVE STOCK MARKET.

Montreal, December 2.—The receipts of live stock at the East End Abattoir market this morning were 800 cattle, 250 sheep, 250 lambs, and 25 calves. There was no improvement in the market. The supply was excessive, which consisted chiefly of common stock, and as the demand for such was slow a number were left over at the close. The sudden change in the weather checked the demand to some extent, as butchers only bought sufficient to fill actual wants; consequently, trade on the whole was slow, and prices ruled low. The best beefes offered sold at 4c, and fairly good stock at 3c to 3 1/2c, and common stock at 2c to 2 1/2c. The inferior went at 1 1/2 to 1 1/4c per lb. There was a fair demand for sheep and lambs, and as the supply was small prices ruled steady. Sheep sold at 2 1/2 to 3c, and lambs at 3 1/2 to 3 3/4c per lb. Calves met with a fair sale at prices ranging from \$3 to \$8 each. There was a good demand for live pigs, and as the supply was only fair the tone of the market was firm, and sales were made at 5 1/2 to 6 1/2c per lb., weighed off cars.

### SHOWS A DECLINE AT LIVERPOOL.

Liverpool, December 2.—The tone on this market since this day week has been weaker, and prices for both cattle and sheep show a decline of 1c. Choice Canadian cattle sold at 11c, and sheep at 12c.

A private cable from London quoted Canadian cattle at 11c.

A private cable from Liverpool quoted Canadian cattle at 11 1/2c and sheep at 10 1/2c.

The inspector appeared to be well satisfied with the result. While packing up, one two inch nozzle was put on stream from hydrant at machine shop, which gave a magnificent stream. All of the tests were made under reservoir pressure only, no assistance from either the pumps or stand-pipe.

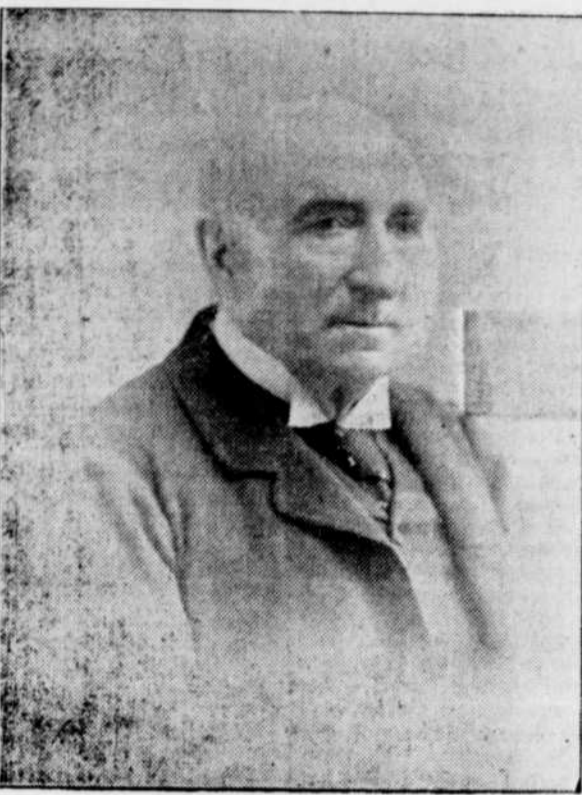

Burned to Death

Major E. L. Bond's Body Found Among the Ruins of His Summer Home at Phillipsburg.

Phillipsburg, Que., Dec. 4.—(Special)—The charred remains of Major E. L. Bond, one of Montreal's well known citizens was found today at his summer residence in this place, the building being entirely consumed by fire and the body was found among the ruins. It appears that Major Bond went out to Phillipsburg from Montreal a day or two ago and spent the night at his summer house alone. The cause of the fire is unknown.

Death Of Wm. G. Wyatt.

Mr. William Gaskell Wyatt, formerly president of the Quebec Central Railway, died on Saturday in Montreal, after a prolonged illness, at the age of eighty years. Mr. Wyatt was born in London, and entered the profession of engineering. About 1878 he came to Canada, settling at Quebec and becoming president of the Quebec Central Railway. He held this position until 1883 when he retired and came to Montreal. He was a prominent member of the St. George's Society, and uncle to Dr. Wyatt Johnston, of Montreal. The remains were interred in Sherbrooke yesterday.

FUNERAL OF LORD AYLMER.

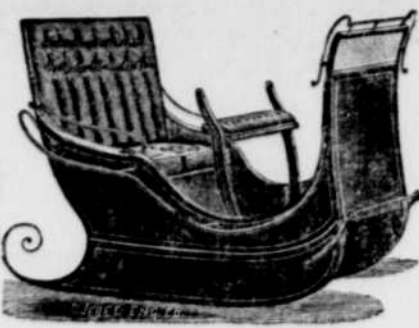
The Interment Took Place At Richmond.

Richmond, Dec. 2.—The funeral of the late Baron Aylmer took place in Richmond to day. The coffin was borne by six privates of the 5th Regiment, under F. T. Mappin, master of ceremonies. The funeral cortege formed in the following order: The hearse, the chief mourners, who were Matthew, Lord Aylmer, Hon. Henry Aylmer and Hon. Paget Aylmer; nine veterans of the Fenian raids of 1866 and 70, wearing their medals; then a large detachment of the 5th Regiment, under Lt.-Col. Harkom, marching two by two as citizens in uniform; the St. Francis College School trustees, of which body Lord Aylmer was the first president, and then a large number of citizens and prominent men from the whole district of St. Francis.

Amongst them were M. T. Stenson, ex-M.P.; Jos. Bedard, ex-M.L.A.; Mayor McMorin, Richmond; Mayor Allen, Melbourne; Mayor Crombie, of Kingsbury; and ex-Mayor Wilcox, of Richmond; Col. Williamson, Kingsbury, and Lt.-Col. Bernard, W. L. Ball, Jno. Ewing, Richmond; Wm. Morris, J. F. Morrell, of Sherbrooke, and James Murphy, Jos. Denison, S. Fraser, W. E. Jones, and A. J. Hudon, of Richmond.

Lord Aylmer was a member of the Anglican Church, and the funeral services were conducted by Ven. Archdeacon Roe and Rural Dean Hepburn, of St. Anne's Church, Richmond, after which a large concourse followed the remains to their last resting place in St. Anne's Cemetery, Richmond.
