Rodeo comes to Shawville Sunday Aug 7

The permanent site chosen for this and all future Rodeos here is the beautiful old Thomson homestead farm belonging to the Diamond T Ranch, on the Zion line east of Shawville.

Several members of the Club have spent many summer evenings on the ranch building the regulation rodeo ring, painting it, erecting a refreshment booth, clearing the area which is bordered by scotch pines and otherwise preparing for this great Rodeo.

A CASE FOR PERSONAL ETHICS

During the period when employees have decided to prevent a company from producing, by removing its labor force and discouraging the company from employing others, there is an argument for reciprocal action on the part of the company. To fulfill this reciprocity the company would be empowered to prevent employees from producing by forbidding them employment elsewhere.

The companies involved are usually overburdened with responsible personnel who have a sense of moral responsibility for the communities in which they operate. This would tend to restrain them from taking any action to prevent their striking employees from looking for work to support their families while they are on strike.

The situation worsens though, when these people, for whom the responsible members of the community hold such a lenient attitude, proceed to strike against their second employer.

It has seemed to some newcomers to this area that the work force, for whom the politicians and economic advisors have been trying so hard to provide industry, has now turned against "industry" as an institution. One observer has wondered where are all the people who were so recently celebrating the advent of the new industries at great testimonial dinners. Are they still throwing their weight in favor of industrial expansion here? What are they doing to help?

Some very few are quietly doing a great deal; some are noisily doing nothing. But the salvation of the area, industry-wise will come when individual people who accept jobs will come to their work equipped with a sense of personal ethics — a moral standard which would at least forbid them from producing for themselves while preventing the companies from doing the same thing.

THE PRINTED WORD

We tend to give far too great credence to the printed word, but last week everyone should have learned a lesson once and for all. The reference here is to that big front page story in the Journal about the barroom brawl in Bryson.

Somebody talked a lot and somebody else wrote it all down and somebody else published it and, probably due to the fact that the editor was away, somebody else thought it fit for a front page large headline story. The facts were wild and the story was silly, but there are lots of people who expect everything they read in the big city papers to be correct.

Sorry to say, there is no way of knowing whether a story is true or not unless you were there yourself, and even then two people will see the same thing in two different ways. The person who happens to write the story in the paper may take hearsay if he chooses and is bound to have a prejudice towards or against the people involved. Somebody said, after reading that ridiculous account of the fight in the hotel, that no newspaper would publish such a story without first checking out all the facts. That person is living in a dream world. Who has time to check out all the facts? Count the stories in any paper, particularly in a big daily paper, and imagine how much time it would take to check out all the facts!

They have to rely on their reporters to make an effort at careful attention to the truth but reporters are only people; and papers are only papers — not the gospel.

If anyone got their feelings hurt at that stupid front page epic they might have words with the headline writer who miscued entirely or at the person responsible for putting it on page one. But the best thing to do with last Saturday's issue of the Journal is to enjoy the rest of it as the good paper it always is, wrap the garbage with it as usual, and then forget it.

COURT REPORT

Court was held at Campbell's Bay on July 22 with District Judge Labbe presiding.

Michael Laycock, 21 years of Fort Coulonge was sentenced to 2 months in jail when he pleaded guilty to a charge of theft of \$110 on the person of Robert Henri.

ready spent in jail 11 days.
