One of these deaths occurred after a very few hours illness, and was that of Mr. Potter, the person who had purchased the patent machine for eradicating stamps, which he noticed a fortnight ago in successful operation on one of the farms of J. Macaulay, Esquire. Mr. Potter appeared in excellent health, of a robust figure, and great bodily strength; and if a cause could be assigned for the disease, perhaps in his case we might attribute it to over exertion and laborious habits.—*Kingston Chronicle.*

It is with no inconsiderable regret that we have to add the name of John Brant, Esq., to the melancholy catalogue of our friends who have fallen victims to the prevailing malady. His death, after four hours' illness took place at his residence at Brantford, in the 37th year of his age. Mr. Brant was the son of the celebrated Indian chief of that name, and distinguished himself as a lieutenant in our service during the late war. Some years ago he visited England, and under the patronage of the Duke of Wellington, Lord Teignmouth, and other influential personages, and from his peculiar urbanity of manners, and high cultivated acquirements, speedily became known and esteemed. His exertions upon that opportunity, in vindicating the humanity of his father's character, from the unjust aspersions cast upon it by the author of "Gertrude of Wyoming," were acknowledged by the accomplished poet, and the next edition of that work rectified the error Mr. Campbell had acknowledged. As a gentleman of strict honor and morality, Mr. Brant has left but few equals; and as Head Chief and Superintendent of the Six Nations, his loss will be seriously felt by the numerous tribes, to whose civilization and moral improvement he had devoted his time and talent.—*ib.*

To the just tribute, paid by the *Kingston Chronicle* to the memory of a gallant soldier and estimable man, we cannot refrain from adding our concurring testimony of his many excellent qualities; amongst the most prominent of which was the humanity, which tempered his courage, or rather which often led him to expose himself to the weapons of his Indian followers, to preserve the life of an overpowered enemy. In the years 1813, 14, we had frequent opportunities of seeing John Brant; ever forward in the skirmish he was also anxious to prevent any needless severity being exercised on the wounded and captives. An Indian by birth, he seemed resolved by every act, to show that Indians were capable of equalling not only the most courageous, but the most generous acts, of European valour. In his manners John Brant was bland and even polished, his temper was equal, and in the many days he lived with the *Glenarry Regiment*, (in which the writer of this article served) we cannot call to mind any act in the conduct of our departed friend, which did not establish his claim to be considered as a gallant soldier, and a correct and high minded gentleman.—*Ed. Q. M.*

MONTREAL, (Wednesday) Sept. 12.—We have only heard of three deaths from cholera during the last five days, and we are of opinion, that travellers visiting our city, run no hazard at present as far as health is concerned.—*Concord.*

The Criminal Term of the Court of King's Bench closed its sittings on Monday. The following were the sentences pronounced:—

Joseph LaChance, Peter Mooney, and Moyses Courval, convicted of petty larceny, three months imprisonment. Charles Gauthier and William Lane, same offence, four months.

Michael Daly, same offence, six months. George Holt, same offence, one month.

John Dumbler and Joseph Semaire, stealing privily from the person, six months.

William Gessington, Charles Harvey, and Patrick Kelly, grand larceny, eight months.

Henry Wilson, same offence, six months. J. Bis. Beauchamps and Antoine Fortier, for obtaining money under false pretences, the former one month, and the latter two months imprisonment, and both £5 fine.

It is to be observed, that this term has not been marked with a sentence of death, either recorded or pronounced.—*Gazette.*

THE CHOLERA.—No report from the Board of Health appears in our paper to-day, nor was any published in our last, since the almost total disappearance of the Cholera from among us last week, induced the Board to order a weekly statement for the future, which will appear in our papers of Saturday. Cases occasionally occur, but they are so few in number, that on the whole, the next bulletin, we are convinced will show the mortality this week to be as low, as at the corresponding period of previous years.—*Montreal Gazette.*

YORK.—We have much gratification in announcing the continued diminution of disease here, as during the four days, ending the 5th instant, only 10 new cases and deaths occurred. No cases and no deaths in private practice for two days. The number remaining sick on the 5th was 5.

HAMILTON.—The *Western Mercury* of the 6th says that for the ten days previous, it had only heard of one case in the town, but several cases and a few deaths have occurred in parts of the surrounding country, which had been almost entirely free from it before.

On the 15th August, upon complaint made before one of the Magistrates, a warrant was issued for the apprehension of certain persons suspected to be concerned in making or preparing to make counterfeit coin, and dealing in counterfeit bills. Under this warrant a man by the name of Jones of Dusham, Simon Clements, Willard Kelly, Smith Curtis, and P. Gibson were arrested. The next day an examination was held by three Magistrates, when Jones, Curtis and Gibson were released for want of proof, but not without strong suspicion that they were not perfectly innocent of the charges preferred against them. Kelly and Clements were held for further examination to the Monday following, and again from that time to the succeeding Wednesday, when they were brought over to appear at the next Criminal Court. The charge against Kelly and Clements was for making a press for some person whom they could not or would not name, supposed for manufacturing base coin. It was found in a shop where they had worked with closed doors, and which they admitted they had been making. The press is of cast iron, in the shape of an oblong square, with a screw of wrought iron three inches and a half in diameter, weighing together nearly two hundred pounds. A large quantity of copper, zinc, antimony, arsenic and other metals, with some tools, were found in a room very closely fitted up in the upper part of the Old Mill at the line. In the shop there was a furnace and crucibles. A quantity of copper, zinc, antimony, and arsenic, was also found in Gibson's shop, which we believe is occupied by him and Curtis together.—*Standard Colonist, Aug. 30.*

QUEBEC SEPTEMBER, 15, 1832.

By the circuitous rout of Halifax, Boston, New York and Montreal, London dates of the 4th August were yesterday received brought to the first mentioned port by H. M. Packet *Lady Ogle*. The letters and papers direct from Halifax will probably reach Quebec on Monday. On the 3d August the amendments of the Lords to the Irish Reform Bill were taken up in the Commons and, after some discussion agreed to on the same day the report of the Committee on the West India Relief Bill was agreed to in the Commons after some opposition, principally from Mr. Hume. Ayes 51 noes 20.—Lord Althorp expressly stated that it by no means implied an approval of all the Orders in Council and that no appropriation could be made until there was proof that the orders had been acted upon.

The Bill to abolish the punishment of death for Forgery was passed in the House of Commons on the 31st July.

August 3d.—Official notice was communicated from the Foreign Office to Lloyd's of the blockade of the Tagus by a squadron of the vessels of Donna Maria, and of the discontinuance of the blockade of the Island of Madeira.

The disturbances continued in Ireland and the general combination not to work for the tythe-payers nor permit it to be done had produced much fighting and some blood shed.

FRANCE.—The death of the young Duke de Richelieu has disappointed the hopes of a party composed of Napoleon's old adherents, and the friends of constitutional Monarchy who see no improvement in the state of things under Louis

Phillipe and turn towards Austria for aid in their projects.—Mr. de Chateaubriand is on the point of quitting Paris for Switzerland disgusted with every thing and every body.

The Cholera report up to the 3d August for England and Scotland gave, 23,098 cases, and 9,057 deaths.

Accounts from Frankfurt state that a report prevailed there that the Austrian Government had discovered through their diplomatic agents, that there was a private understanding between Prussia and Russia, to take away the preponderance she has in Germany, and that Prussia wants to have the Presidency of the German Diet.

There is no fresh news from Don Pedro. According to the last accounts he was on his march to Coimbra.

The German papers state Mahomet Ali is to be crowned King of Egypt by the Sheik of Mecca, in his quality of Prince of the Religion of Mahomet.

Several regiments and reserve companies have received orders to hold themselves in readiness to proceed to Ireland forthwith.

The representatives of the five Powers met on the 31st July, to consider the treaty proposed by the King of Holland. It was modified and signed, and Sir Robert Adair was desired by Lord Palmerston to impress on the mind of King Leopold the urgency of his adhesion to this last protocol, in which the Dutch treaty, with certain modifications, is recognized and adopted by the Conference.

The boundaries of Greece are likely to be settled with Turkey, to the satisfaction of Greece and the Allies.

Admiral Lord Gambier has received from the King a Field Marshal's baton, as Admiral of the Fleet.

London, August 2. 4 o'clock. Closing prices—Consols 83 1/4 do. for account, 81 1/4.

The Lord Chancellor on the 2d August, introduced a Bill, which was read the first time, to abolish sinecure offices connected with the Court of Chancery; the following are the offices proposed to be suppressed:—Clerk of his Majesty's Hanaper, the Patentee of the Subpoena Office, the Clerk of the Patents, Clerk of the Crown in Chancery, Clerk of the Patents, Clerk of the Custodies of Lunatics and Idiots, and the Patentee for the execution of the Laws and Statutes respecting Bankrupts. Should his Lordship's Bill pass these places are to cease and determine on the 15th of April, 1833. Provided, &c. that the act shall not be held to determine any of the aforesaid offices now holden by any person appointed thereto on or before the 1st day of June last, until the death of such person.

The news of the establishment of a Government of the young Queen of Portugal at Oporto, had the effect of depressing Portugal Scrip in the Stock Exchange 1 per cent. on the 2d August, and the greatest anxiety prevailed to obtain further intelligence, but nothing transpired during the day.

H. M. Ship *Sparrowhawk* arrived this morning with the detachment wrecked in the *Leontidas*, on Scatterly Island. The party of the 79th Highlanders proceed by steamboat this evening for Montreal on their route to the Head Quarters of the Regiment at York.

We learn that the baggage of both officers and men was saved.

SHIPPING INTELLIGENCE.

New York, Sept. 3.—Arrived, Gen. Williams, Captain Holdridge, sailed morning of 14 August from Liverpool. August 24, off Holyhead, saw 30 sail of American vessels bound to Liverpool. The packet ship *New America* had not arrived when the G. W. sailed. The packet ship *John Jay*, Holdridge, was the only American packet to port when the G. W. left.

Arrived at Boston on the 8th September, brig *Sarah*, from Kingston, (Jan.) 1st August, for Quebec. On the 14th August her mate died after 8 days illness; on the 2nd the master, after 4 days illness, on the 20th, Mr. Dean, a passenger, of consumption, on the 21st the women. Being left without a stevedore, the vessel 9 days after the death of the mate fell in with the *London Packet* from Boston, from Sierra Leone, took the second mate on board, and he has navigated her to port. The sailors have an impression that the captain and mate were poisoned by the negro before sailing. They appear to be honest men, and there is reason to believe that the officers died of some malignant disease. Spoken with, Aug. 7, 1st, 2d, brig *Dan*, from Quebec for Liverpool.

At the Mohawk Village, near Brantford, John Brant, Esq. Chief of the Mohawk tribe of Indians, and one of the greatest Chiefs who distinguished himself so nobly in the revolutionary and late wars. Mr. Brant was an accomplished gentleman, and died respectably regretted by a numerous circle of acquaintances of the first respectability.

POSTSCRIPT.

From the State of the Exchange Reading Room.

By Steamer St. Lawrence, arrived at two o'clock this afternoon, we received from our attentive Correspondent of the Montreal Exchange, a New York paper of last Tuesday, containing Greenock dates to the 5th August.—It is with much regret we give publicity to what will be found below from Glasg.w. There are no later dates from London or Liverpool.

An arrival at New York from Greenock, sailed 5th August, brings very melancholy accounts of the spread of the Cholera at Glasgow. Some of the most wealthy have become victims. Deaths are numerous and rapid. In one week 619 cases were reported to the Board of Health, and many remained unreported. The names of the victims are not given. The total of deaths were 150.

The rival Don's, Pedro and Miguel, are reported to have fought an action within a few miles of Lisbon. The result not given. Both claimed the victory.

The Light Company of the 66th Regt. commanded by Captain Townsend, arrived to-day in the *St. Lawrence Steamer*, having left Montreal yesterday evening.

VINDICTIVE PROCEEDINGS IN MONTREAL.—We learn from a gentleman arrived from Montreal in the Steam Boat, that Lieutenant Colonel McIntosh and Captain Temple were last night arrested on a charge of Wilful Murder of the persons who fell on the 21st May, upon a warrant issued by a Magistrate of the name of Roy, upon the application of the nearest of Kin of one of the deceased, and it is supposed with the intent of prosecuting an Appeal of Death. This mode of trial is so unusual that we shall endeavour in our next to give some account of it, extracted from different Law-authors. The last time it was attempted to be resorted to in England was in 1819, in the case of Ashford vs. Thornton, which led to the passing of a law abolishing Appeal and thus erasing from the Statutes this absurd remnant of Norman barbarity.
