

SHAD OF DEATHS OVER THE VATICAN, POPE LEO'S LIFE MAY END WITH THE DAY

Medical Science Lays Every Known Method to Postpone the End—Pontiff Said to Have Grown Suddenly Worse and is Unconscious at Times.

POPE GROWS WORSE; ABSOLUTION IS ADMINISTERED. Berlin, July 8.—A despatch to the Lokal Anzeiger from Rome says the condition of the Pope has suddenly become worse and that Cardinal Serafini Vannutelli (the Grand Penitentiary) has been called in to administer absolution in Articulo Mortis.

Paris, July 8.—A despatch from Rome says: "The condition of the Pope has become worse since morning; his weakness is increasing hour by hour; he is only intermittently conscious, and a catastrophe is imminent."

Ottawa, July 8.—Mgr. Sbarretti's message from Rome this morning, sent at 8:40, was as follows: "The Holy Father's condition to-day continues serious."

Rome, July 8.—The physicians in attendance upon Pope Leo, at a quarter to ten o'clock this morning, posted the following bulletin: "The Holy Father's condition to-day continues serious."

Rome, July 8.—As can be seen by the morning bulletin the Pope's condition to-day is not so favorable as it was last night, due to the fact that the improvement after the operation of yesterday has not assumed the proportions the doctors wish.

While the inflammation of the lungs is decreasing the patient's general condition does not improve and there is a tendency towards a radical change for the worse. The Pontiff is extremely weak and a feverish chill seems to have just its power to give the patient the relief of unconsciousness.

Another great preoccupation of the doctors is the demand of the patient's kidneys as a result of which blood poisoning is feared.

The outlook now is that the Pope's life may perhaps be prolonged for thirty hours more, but the hopes of his recovery are still very small. It is Monday night, the probability of his favor being shown is very small.

How feels his Holiness? "I am afraid I have not much to say," said the Pope. "I am weak and I am weary."

Part of the work referred to by the Pope was to read a Novena to the Madonna of the Carmelites, and so far as the fact, without the Pope's consent, afforded by his Holiness, that he had walked a few steps to his study, and that he was resting and taking into custody.

Enquiries from Abroad. An instance of the strain prevailing among the Pope's illness is the case of a Roman who writes to the Basilica of St. Peter, asking for a novena, the Pope's death. We are all, we must admit, he tried to throw himself from a considerable height, but was rescued and taken into custody.

RUSSIAN OFFICIALS HOLD WAR COUNCIL; BEAR IS READY TO FIGHT JAPAN ALONE

Profound Secrecy Envelopes the Meeting Being Held at Port Arthur To-day—Russia Makes Ready for Probable Conflict Over Manchuria.

Kin Chau, opposite New Chwang, Manchuria, July 8.—All the prominent Russian officials in China, Manchuria and Korea are attending the conference at Port Arthur. Among them are Minister of War Kuropatkin, Admiral Alekxiev, the Russian Ministers at Seoul, the political agents in China and Korea, including M. Pokotloff, recently director of the company.

The proceedings at the conference are enveloped in profound secrecy. It is popularly supposed that the Russian officials are considering war questions. The foreign commercial officials at New Chwang and Port Arthur believe that the possibility of war is increasing steadily.

The Russian policy is believed to be to hold the present position in Manchuria, including the military agent in China, the civil and military officers at Mukden, Harbin and Kirin and the administrator of New Chwang.

MR. CHAMBERLAIN'S STIRRING SPEECH AT LUNCHEON GIVEN TO-DAY TO COLONIAL UNIVERSITY REPRESENTATIVES BY SIR GILBERT PARKER.

Special Cable to the Montreal Herald and Toronto News. London, July 8.—To-day Sir Gilbert Parker lunched in the Commons restaurant about forty representatives of the colonial universities.

Mr. Chamberlain and Mr. Ritchie were also present, but the latter left before the Colonial Secretary arrived. Sir Gilbert, in welcoming the delegates, urged the importance of co-ordination of university education throughout the Empire.

Mr. Chamberlain said: "I am delighted to welcome you personally and officially. You represent modern ideas in university life, and I am chancellor of England's most modern university, that of Birmingham. We do not desire to compete with the older seats of learning like Oxford and Cambridge, but I at least would multiply universities so that every employer and every foreman of the future will be equipped technically for the performance of his work."

MR. ANDREW F. GAULT PASSES AWAY AT HIS SUMMER HOME. Montreal's Veteran Captain of Industry and Benefactor of Institutes Dies at Georgeville After Lingering Illness.

The death of Mr. Andrew F. Gault, the senior member of the firm of Gault Bros., and connected with several other commercial institutions of Montreal, removes a prominent figure from the ranks of successful business men of this city.

His death was not unexpected by the family and intimate friends, but to the public it came as a distinct shock. Mr. Gault had been a sufferer for some time from Bright's disease. Several weeks ago, along with a beneficial effect, the hope, however, was not to be realized. Mr. Gault became gradually worse, and passed away yesterday evening at 7:30 o'clock.

GREAT DAY'S RACING AT DELOHMIE PARK

It took eight scores to get the field away, any there was additional delay on account of Little Billy breaking a sulky and pulling out a shoe. Edith J. won the heat, with J. P. L. a pulled second. In the second heat Edith J. took blind stagers and was out of it for good. As before J. P. L. a was second, this time to Antidee. The third, fourth and fifth heats were a procession from start to finish for the Muscovite horse. In all heats there was a great contest between Antidee and Winnie J.

In the 2.20 class there was a game struggle between Valencin Boy and Nellie S. Every heat was a race all the way. The Boy got lost in a pocket in the first and could not catch Nellie S. In the other three he got away first and Nellie S. was second. In the fifth James S. made a game fight in the third heat, but the other two had too much speed for the Whitney owned horse. There were also a couple of miles broken, which threw May Day and Sir Knight out of the running, both of them with a chance for a look in at the money.

The attendance was large and they got the work of their money and to spare. The only thing that didn't go right was the balloon which, just as it was almost ready, caught on one of the uprights, which tore it to bits.

A. MEUNIER—Nationale. "I did not see the match on Saturday, but I have heard a good many of the National men who were there praise the system. It is much in favor of adopting the period system here."

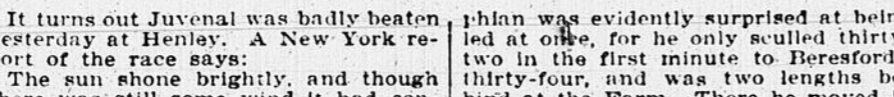
A CAMERON—Montreal. "I think it would be an improvement to have the period system introduced into the N.A.L.U. and I hope to see it done at next annual meeting of the League."

The day he left Detroit he had taken out an accident policy made payable on his daughter, and he wrote a letter in which he expressed the hope that the train he was taking would run off the track or that something would happen to him.

Ed. Delehanty is one of the most famous players in the big league. He was noted for his heavy hitting and had many three-baggers and several homers to his credit. He was the elder brother of Joe Delehanty, who played left field for Montreal in 1901.

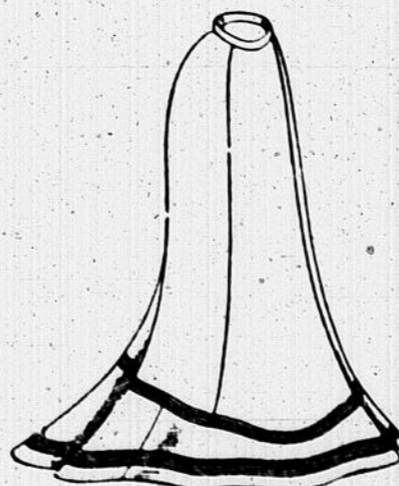
