## H. GREENE LEADS AIR CADETS

### Delinquency Down Among Juveniles

Pool halls, restaurants and "corner stores" were called breeding points of juvenile delinquency by Captain Ovila Pelletier on Wednesday when he was speaking to members of the Rotary Club of Westmount at their weekly luncheon meeting in Victoria Hall.

Captain Pelletier, a member of the Montreal Police Force, is head of the Delinquency Prevention Bureau which was first formed in 1936 under his direction.

Although it is now 13 years old, it is only in the past few months that the greatest work has been accomplished, he said. When the war started, personnel was hard to find and it was not till 1946 that their plans that had taken four years to prepare were finally put into effect.

### Club to Attend Parliament and Council Meeting

Fifty members of the Westmount High School Current Events Club, made up of students from Grades X, XI and XII, will attend the meeting of the General Committee and City Council on February 21. This will be the first time in the Council's history that any member of the public has been allowed to sit in on a session where the Council votes themselves into a committee. However, it is felt that this is the only way for the group to actually learn of the inner workings of the Council.

The students will be supplied with a plan of the Council meeting showing where each Alderman sits and what position he holds, so that the agenda may be more easily followed.

This same group will also attend a day's session of parliament in Ottawa on February 25, when they will be the guests of the Hon. Douglas Abbott, Minister of Finance in the Dominion Government, and Member of Parliament for St. Antoine-Westmount constituency.

J. K. Snyder, history teacher at the High School is advisor to the group and Hubert Liverant is president. Other officers are Harriet Abbot-Smith, vice president; Anne Hutchison, secretary and Keith Ham, treasurer.

### Victoria Hall's Oak Room To Be Youth Centre

Due to the great need for additional space to take care of indoor programs for younger people, the Oak Room of Victoria Hall, will be used as a drop-in centre starting Tuesday, February 15th.

Table tennis, shuffleboard, darts and small games will be available in the afternoons and evenings from 4 p.m. until 10 p.m., Tuesday, Wednesday and Friday, and from 10 a.m. until 10 p.m. Saturdays.

Arts and Handicrafts will be taught also.

This is to take care of the children who do not live close enough to the Westmount Athletic Grounds recreational building.

### Melville Church Fire Loss \$1,000; One Fireman Hurt

Although firemen from the Westmount Fire Department had the flames under control in slightly over half an hour, the fire that swept through the basement of Melville Presbyterian Church, 349 Elm Avenue, Saturday afternoon, caused over \$1,000 damage, according to Chief W. C. Cobb.

The alarm first came in from someone at the Canada Bread Company, on the same street, at 1.14 p.m., when they noticed smoke pouring from the building.

#### SERVICES TO BE HELD AT WESTMOUNT BAPTIST

Rev. Charles C. Cochrane, minister at Melville Presbyterian Church announces that because of the damage to the church in the fire, services will be held on Sunday in Westmount Baptist Church, corner of Roslyn Ave., and Sherbrooke Street, at 3 p.m.

Two streams were used, one in the basement and one in the church. There was very little water damage but firemen were forced to cut holes in the church floor to extinguish the flames.

According to the report of firemen on the scene, an overheated furnace caused the fire to start at an outlet of a hot air duct.

Fireman Ed Cooney was overcome by smoke and has not as yet reported back for duty.

### Replaces Former C. O. Wally Conrad

Flying Officer Hugh S. Greene has been named Commanding Officer of Canada's original air cadet squadron, now known as No. 1 West Montreal Squadron. The announcement was made today by Group Captain Roy H. Foss, president of the Air Force Veterans Association, sponsors of the squadron.

An ex-operational aircrew veteran of World War II, F/O Greene was an air cadet in the original squadron, No. 1 (Westmount) Squadron, which he joined in 1940. Repatriated to Canada on the last troopship in 1946, he is a member of the Executive Committee of the A.F.V.A. In 1948 he was named adjutant of the air cadet squadron,

which position he held until his present appointment.

F/O Greene succeeds the former C.O., W/C W.G. "Wally" Conrad, D.F.C. and Bar, who has been appointed Canadian sales manager

### Father McMahon Ascension Parish At AFVA Meeting

The consecration of the colors of the Air Force Veterans' Association, No. 84 Branch of the Canadian Legion, highlighted the branch's regular monthly meeting last night at the Legion Memorial Hall on Mountain Street.

Officiating at the consecration ceremony were the Rev. de Courcy H. Rayner, chaplain of the Association, and Father McMahon, Church of the Ascension, Westmount. Also participating were Major-General C. B. Price, past president of the Dominion Command of the Legion; W.V.G. Neish, president of the Quebec Command of the Legion and Keith Woolley, managing secretary of the Quebec Command.

### Veterans' Names To Be Displayed

City Hall officials have announced that a new service roll book including all the names of Westmount citizens who served in World War II, will replace the plaques on both walls of the entrance to Victoria Hall, and will be put on display in a case in the Westmount Public Library.

The new book will be covered by hand-sewn Morocco leather, with gold lettering on the front. The pages will be of genuine parchment skins and a hand-illuminated coat-of-arms of the city will follow the title page. Size of the book will be ten-and-a-half by fourteen inches. Each day a new page will be turned over so that all names will be on display, but at different days of the year.

The original compilation of names for the plaques in Victoria Hall was a project undertaken by the Westmount Municipal Association. The names on the plaques, numbering over 2600, were stamped in gold letters seven inches long by five-eighths of an inch wide. The plaques were handed over to the keeping of the city at a public ceremony in October, 1944.

It is also announced that anyone interested may purchase a less expensive version of this

service roll book which will feature an imitation leather cover. It will be an exact replica of the original book to be deposited in the library but will be a printed copy.

City officials are very anxious to find out just how many of those whose sons, daughters, friends and husbands who serv-

ed or gave their lives in the war, are interested in obtaining such a copy. The Examiner is co-operating in this venture and anyone interested is asked to fill out the coupon at the end of this story and send it to the City Hall. Thus, they will know how many copies to have printed, in advance.

It was this humble reporter's great privilege and single honour to accompany Mr. Fish and to record some of the bright sayings which this far-famed art instructor gave out with as he tramped over the snow covered roads of Mount Royal.

Mr. Fish admired the shapes of several female skiers, the coats of several horses, and the chalet. He paused briefly to consume a soft drink, mumbled that dancing should be permitted there in the chalet, and then proceeded to the lookout where he pointed out to me such fascinating sights as the Sun Life Building, St. Helen's Island and the St. Lawrence River. All of these Mr. Fish was able to see with his naked eye.

While peering at these magnificent points of interest which tourists come to see annually from such far-away places as the junction of Claremont and Sherbrooke, Mr. Fish dropped the following pearl of wisdom: "I am becoming aged and decrepit. I am now 28. In two more years I shall be 30."

I was, as you can imagine, greatly amazed at this truly astounding revelation. But I managed to keep calm as Mr. Fish went on to say:

"Look at that mass of humanity—the great unwashed. The only thing wrong with the world is the people who live in it."

for American Airlines in Toronto.

A well-known Montrealer, F/O Greene, who resides at 2112 Claremont Avenue, has long been identified with the air cadet movement in Canada and with regular air force activities. In 1940, he joined No. 1 (Westmount) Squadron of the air cadets of Canada. In 1941, he was promoted to Corporal and in 1942 to Flight Sergeant. In 1943, he joined the R.C.A.F. as aircrew and was graduated as an airgunner and proceeded overseas.

In 1944, he was commissioned in the field during a tour of operations with Bomber Command No. 166 "Bulldog" Squadron of the R.A.F. He completed 37 operational trips and was credited with shooting down one enemy aircraft and damaging another, with credit for one other probably destroyed.

In 1945, he attended Gunnery Leaders' School at Oxford, England, and upon graduation was posted to No. 24 Operational Training Unit, Honeybourne, as an operational instructor. Upon cessation of hostilities he was posted to R.C.A.F. Overseas Headquarters in London, and attached to the Entertainment Branch.

He produced and directed entertainment units and toured with one of these shows, "The Repat Review", as O.C.

In 1946 he was repatriated and in 1947 F/O Greene was named adjutant to the No. 1 West Montreal Air Cadet Squadron.

World Government and the Canadian Political Scene were topics of a joint round table discussion held last week, at which the Current Events Club of Westmount High School played host to the United Nations Club of West Hill High School.

Dave Usher, from the latter school, defined World Government and Shirley Heptinstall discussed its possibility.

Westmount's speakers began with Heather Adair, who discussed the B.N.A. Act. Terry Seaman talked about the Liberal Party's present program and Allan Gordon discussed the coming Dominion elections.

David Usher said that world government would reduce "red tape" and barriers. It would help us to know the other countries, he said.

There would be an international language, and no war. Garry Davis, an originator of this movement, has many followers, which suggests that there may be something in his idea.

Shirley Heptinstall mentioned the League of Nations. She discussed the British Commonwealth and told of the great anti-national feeling after wars.

A heated discussion followed. The U. S. had a threat with the atomic bomb, so countries had to join her, it was suggested. The topic was purely suggestive, so many arguments could be raised. World government would have an economic authority, rather than a political one, it was decided.

From West Hill High, Mr. Carter summed up. He said that world government would do a great deal of good. The main question is, can we live together? he said. The difficulty of organizing universally was great, but not insurmountable.

Heather Adair of Westmount High said that the B.N.A. Act is the nearest we have to a constitution. She mentioned the topics which come under Dominion and Provincial jurisdictions. To make an amendment, the decision would have to be almost unanimous. If it is passed, then it is sent to the House of Commons in England. No amendments have yet been made, she stated.

Terry Seaman held that Canada's living conditions are much better than those under Communism. The North Atlantic Pact is now before the government. The biggest event of the year is the entry of Newfoundland. The highest court of appeals is going to be the Supreme Court, no longer the Privy Council in England. Some of the surplus will be spent on the St. Lawrence Seaway Project, steel industry development and enlarged family-bonuses. Multi-lateral agreements and easier trade

## World Service In Action

FROM DAVE CREIGHTON IN GREECE

I have before me a photograph that shows a crowd of small boys, ages eight to fourteen, surrounding three young men playing guitars and an accordion. The faces of the boys look to be very happy — but that is because melody has a magic effect upon the spirits of children. What the eyes of these boys have seen, the young men — members of the Athens Y.M.C.A. — are trying to help them forget.

From their villages in Macedonia and Thrace, these boys were sent to Athens by their parents who feared their being kidnapped by the Communists, who have offered "hospitality" in Bulgaria and Yugoslavia to all Greek children. (It has been reported that 12,000 have already been forced to accept this

★ hospitality of General Marcos.) The Minister of Welfare asked the Y.M.C.A. to supervise the recreational program for those boys who had seen their friends and neighbors killed — and some of whom had seen the body of a village priest nailed upside down, on a tree. This wasn't during "the last war" — this was only four weeks ago.

Two senior staff members and a dozen volunteer leaders take the Y.M.C.A.'s athletic equipment, moving picture projector and musical instruments to the temporary camp set up for these boys on the outskirts of Athens. I was present for the first of the moving picture programs, and when the light first flashed upon the screen I wondered why the boys were so silent. It was a Mickey Mouse cartoon and inasmuch as Mickey is an international celebrity the reaction from a juvenile audience is usually instant and highly vocal.

So it is here, in our Athens building, just as it is in Detroit, or Dallas, or Montreal. The reason was, quite obviously, that the kids from the northern frontier had

Senate's powers, but this would be dangerous, he concluded.

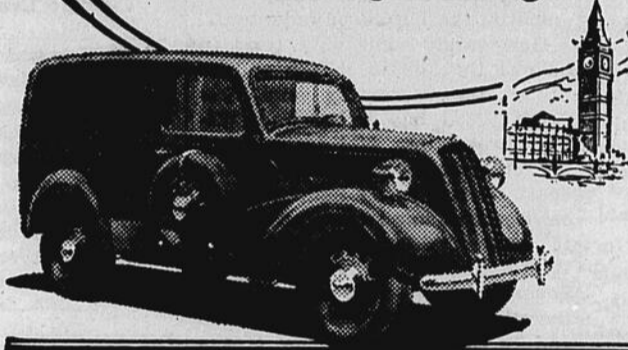

## MAN BITES DOG — IN NICOLET

When a man bites a dog — that's news. And when a Conservative wins any kind of election in Quebec — that's also news.

So the victory of the Progressive-Conservative candidate in Monday's by-election in Nicolet-Yamaska was the biggest political news in months.

All kinds of interpretations will be read into the result — Mr. Drew's influence, his dynamic personality, championship of Provincial Rights — the race and religious cry raised by the Liberals which, for once, didn't swing an election along the banks of the St.

Lawrence — high taxes — intra-party strife among the Grits, etc., etc. Take your choice. Conservatives will naturally be optimistic, but it would be short-sighted of them to look upon the Nicolet result as indicating a trend. The truth of the matter is that the liberals have nobody to blame but themselves for the loss. Liberal headquarters chose the candidate without reference to the wishes of the Liberals of the constituency, indeed, they foisted a candidate the voters didn't want and dislike for whom they had plainly showed at the 1945 general election when they elected an independent Liberal, chosen by themselves.

Perhaps the result will shake the Liberal Party out of a tendency that has been growing of recent years—a tendency to lose touch with the rank and file, to ignore local feelings, and to make political spots for the friends and relatives of party stalwarts all over the province. The attitude toward the riding workers has been increasingly one of cynicism and arrogance.

You can get away with that, and win, when you have a leader like Mackenzie King pulling rabbits out of the hat every time one is needed. But the Liberal pitching staff has been missing the plate, lately, while the Tories are beginning to throw strikes.

## 2 Appointments You Must Keep

"And as it is appointed unto men once to die, but after this the judgment." (The Bible, Heb. 9:27.)

Life has its varied appointments. Some of these, men make for themselves while others are made for them. Some men take their appointments seriously and keep them scrupulously, while others are careless and frequently let them slide.

Here, however, are two appointments made for man, not by himself, nor by any of his fellows, but by an Almighty God, and these appointments, sooner or later, every man must keep.

Every man has an appointment at the door of death.

The fact of the appointment as stated by the death notice is not timed. It is not a notice for the calendar or diary, but for the heart. Death has taken a serious toll these days. There has been a congested one way traffic into the life beyond. The death lanes have been crowded with the flower of the world's manhood, many of them suddenly precipitated into what someone has called That Vast Unknown. Just one minute as you read, dear friend, You, too, are going that way. Already most likely you have made preparation for those whom you will leave behind; but have you prepared for the fact itself as it concerns your own soul? Remember, whatever may be your philosophy of life,

you must face the fact of death. It is appointed unto men to die. Every man has also an appointment at the Throne of Judgment.

How vainly some have tried to believe that death is the end of things for a sinning soul, but God's Word has an entirely different revelation. No! death is not the end; and deep down in the heart no one really believes it to be. Death's door leads somewhere. It leads the sinner to a Great White Throne on which sits a Sovereign Judge who has a minute record of life in its smallest details and an absolute knowledge of the inner condition of the heart. That Judge cannot be sought and will not be bluffed. The white light of His awesome presence will search the soul through and through.

Sinner! only one thing will stand you in good stead as death's portal is passed, a personal faith in the atoning merits of Jesus Christ. Hear His assuring word: "He that heareth my Word and believeth on Him that sent me, hath everlasting life, and shall not come

into judgment, but is passed from death unto life." John 5:24.

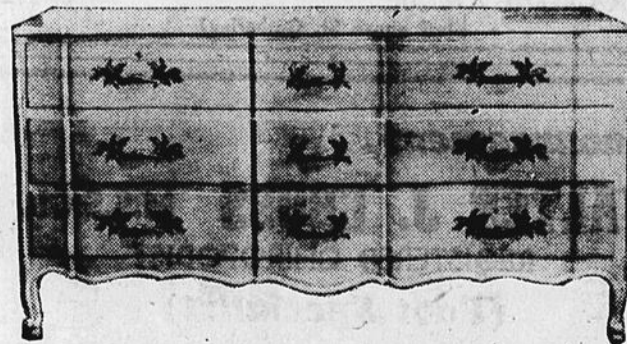

### Face Slackens

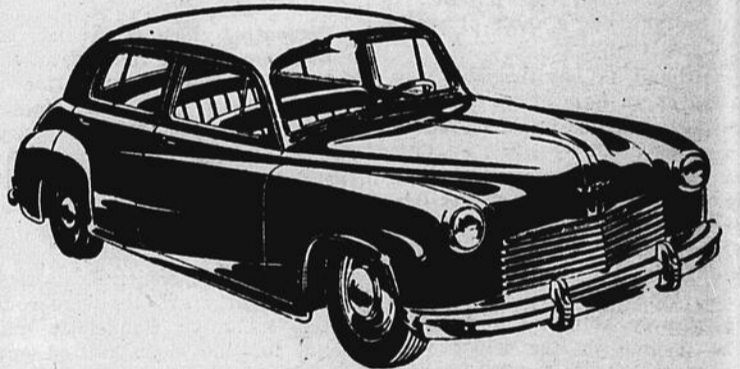

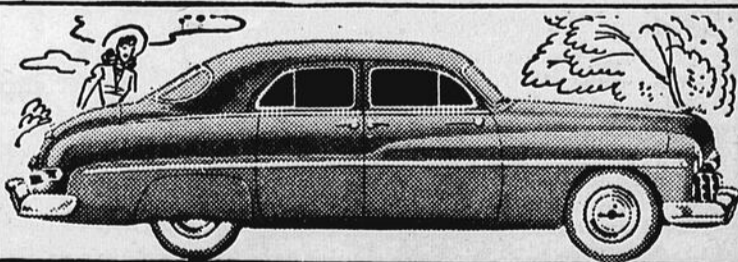

# Sport Topics

## HOCKEY'S PROBLEM

Yesterday's hockey players and officials must be shaking their heads sadly now as they see the unhappy state into which the modern ice game has fallen. Sure, they'll think back to the days of Red Horner and Eddie Shore (with almost three hours a season in the penalty box, but they'll be able to remember that the refereeing in the old days was much stricter and probably much better than it is today, and that men like Horner and Shore didn't have to knock a man into the boards to hurt him. You know, maybe Eddie had something when he stated recently that modern hockey players lacked courage. You don't have to have anything inside you to scrape an opponent along the boards or skate half the length of the ice to belt an unsuspecting player into the promenade seats. Yes sir, hockey has really gone down hill in recent years.

\* \* \*

A couple of good examples can be found in the recent games which the Canadiens played on home ice against the Detroit Red Wings and the Toronto Maple Leafs. In both games, fights seemed to be the rule rather than the exception for in the Red Wing encounter, Maurice Richard battled Gordon Howe and Syd. Abel successively while Detroit's Jimmy Enlo tangled with an unnamed spectator. Then, five days later, the Leafs hit town and the game was again a lively one, with Richard, Bill Ezinicki, Gus Mortson, and Glen Harmon jousting during a wild second period. Incidentally, the Canadiens lost both games.

After the Leafs game, Montreal papers headlined their stories about the tussle with reports of Canadiens winning the fight, although losing the game, evidently a moral victory. Max Bentley, who scored the first two goals in Toronto's 4-1 win, didn't rate as much space as the would-be pugilists or as Bill Barliko, whose claim to fame for the evening was that he sent Kenny Reardon and Normand Dussault to the sidelines as a result of severe boardings and didn't even draw a penalty during the process.

\* \* \*

The businessmen of hockey see what is happening, but they're unwilling to do anything about it, because right now they're cashing in on the post-war boom and don't want to do anything to disturb the merry ringing of the cash register bells. In their reluctance to work out a solution, they're insuring the same type of game for years to come, for every kid who's playing pee wee, bantam, midget, or juvenile hockey, is consciously copying his ideals in the National Hockey League, which means he's fighting, boarding, and slashing like the big timers.

By the time a kid gets to the Junior League he's fully developed into a combination of half-butcher, half-hockey player and if he's smart enough with his stick and can take care of himself, he's got a future in our national pastime.

What a difference this park hockey is from the carefully supervised school hockey leagues, where boarding brings an automatic minor penalty. Watch these same kids playing park and school hockey, and see where they play their best. It's in the school leagues of course, for there a player can concentrate on his hockey without the accessories he'll have to learn to make good in the higher circles.

\* \* \*

Many reasons have been brought forward as to this sudden decline in the quality of hockey in the National Hockey League, but the one we'll string along with is that the teams are playing the kind of hockey they do because that is what the American like. Two-thirds of all league games are played below the border, with four of the N.H.L.'s six clubs run by American capital and the owners know better than to disappoint the people who are paying their salaries.

The Americans thrive on the bodily contact of hockey, and don't let anybody tell you that it's the speed and passing of the game that drags the spectators in. More people will pay to see the blood-thirsty Toronto Leafs than the New York Rangers, hockey's smoothest and classiest team as far as actual hockey goes. The Americans can get all the finesse and speed they want from basketball. What they come to see at a hockey game is action, as can be judged by the not infrequent calls from the galleryites at Madison Square Gardens, New York — "We want blood."

Something is going to have to be done about the game before it dies the same death as lacrosse did, for that is just about what hockey is turning into, lacrosse on skates. The Reardons, Barlikos, Stewarts, Ezinickis, and Richards are beginning to overshadow the league's real hockey players, the Bentleys, O'Connors, Mosienkos, Laprades, and Quackenbushes. This might be the beginning of the end as far as real hockey is concerned.

Of course, the fan will have to be re-educated as to what makes up really fine hockey, but it's a sure thing that the owners won't make any changes until revenues start to decrease.

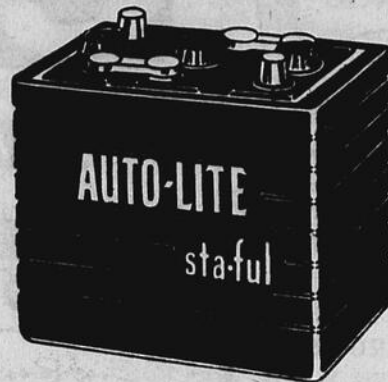

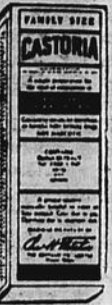

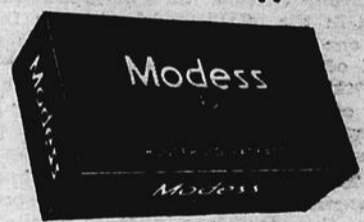
