THE EIGHTEENTH PLATE IN THE STANDARD'S SERIES OF GREAT CATHEDRAL PICTURES—An interior view of York Minster, showing a portion of the choir and the screen. This Minster, otherwise known as the Cathedral of St. Peter, is surpassed by some other English Cathedrals in certain special features, is as a whole the most striking and imposing specimen of ecclesiastical architecture in England. It is in the form of a Latin cross, consisting of nave with aisles, transepts, choir with aisles, a central tower and two western towers. The extreme external length is 524 feet, the breadth across the transepts 250 feet, the height of the central tower 213 feet, and the height of the western towers 202 feet. The Cathedral occupies the site of a wooden church in which King Edwin was baptized by Paulinus on Easter Day, 627. After his baptism Edwin, according to Bede, began to construct "a large and more noble basilica of stone," but it was partly destroyed during the troubles which followed his death, and was repaired by Archbishop Wilfrid. The building suffered from fire in 741, and at the time of the Norman invasion was almost totally destroyed—the only part left standing being the central wall of the crypt, which still exists. The present edifice was built at various periods between 1070 and 1472, the choir being completed in 1400. This portion of the Cathedral is a magnificent specimen of Late Perpendicular, the great east window being one of the finest in the world. In February, 1829, the woodwork of the choir, including the beautiful stalls, etc., was set on fire by Jonathan Martin, a madman, and totally destroyed. The above illustration, therefore, shows the modern stalls and screen. The Cathedral, in recent years, has undergone extensive improvements.

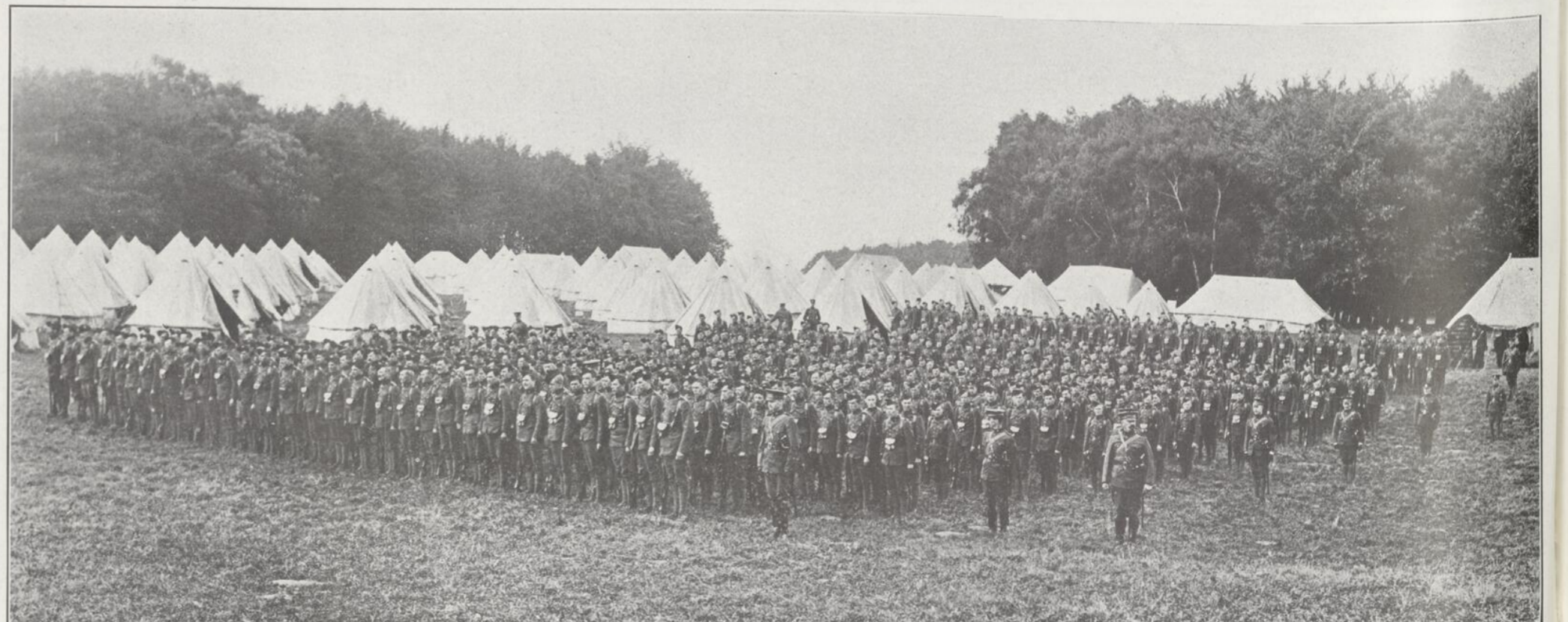

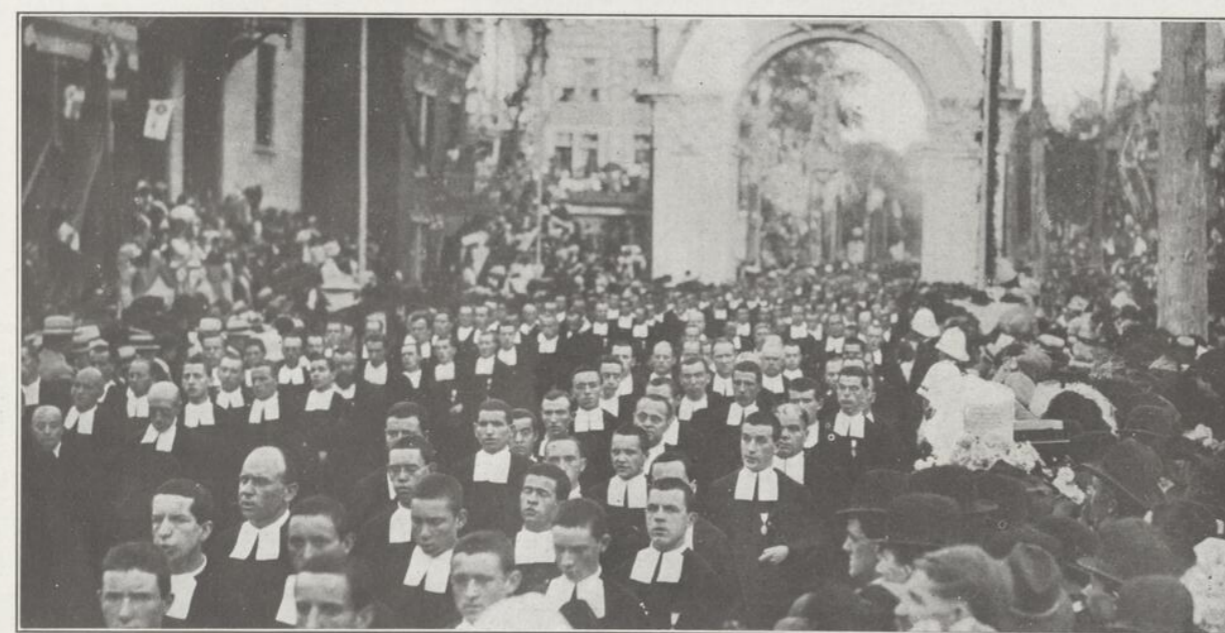

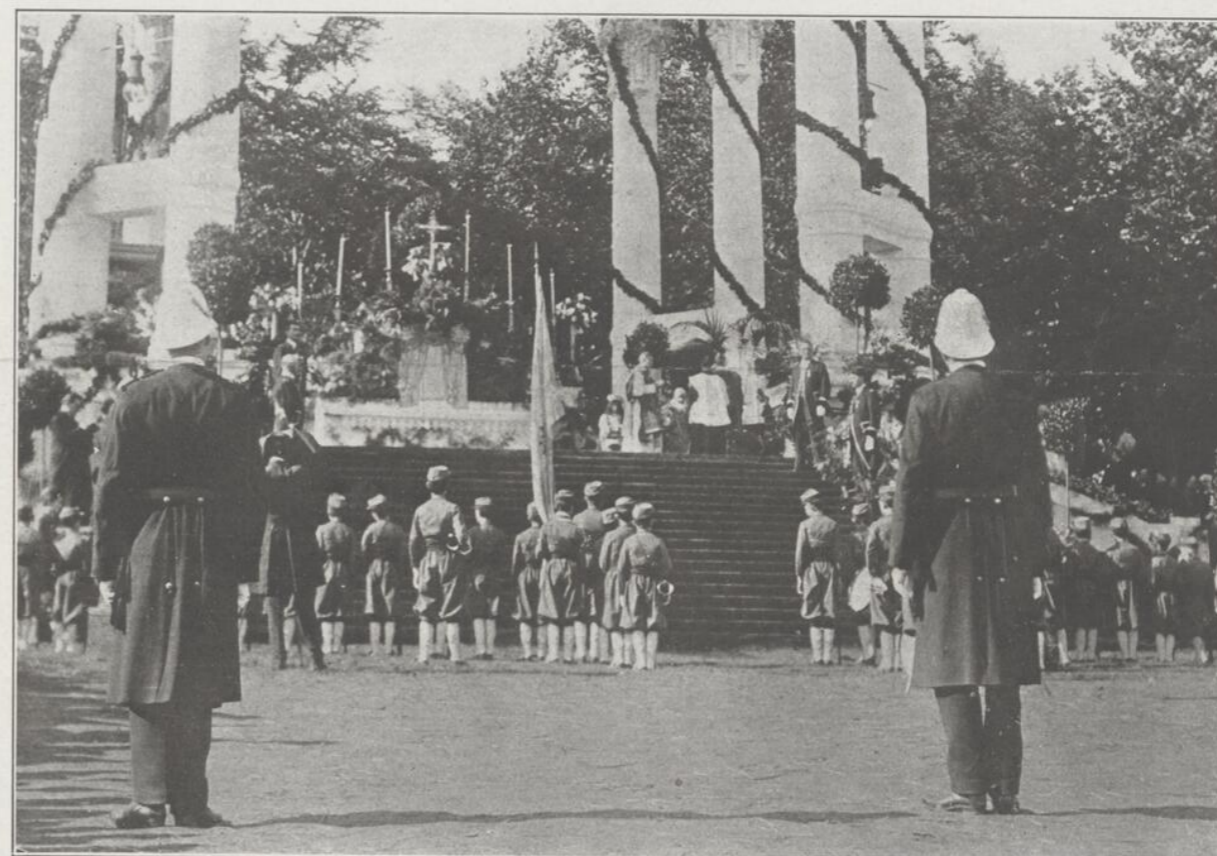

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IRELAND'S DECLINE.

Ireland at the end of last year had 890 fewer inhabitants than in 1908. The Registrar-General's report, just issued shows that the population, 4,371,570, has fallen by 130,000 in ten years. Emigrants last year numbered 28,876, 6,379 more than in 1908, and 800 more than the excess of births over deaths.
