GENERAL ORDER.

HEAD-QUARTERS, KINGSTON, Adjutant-General's Office, 8th August, 1813.

His Excellency the Commander of the Forces, has received from Major General Sir Roger Sheaffe, a despatch conveying the official report of Lieut. Col. Murray, detailing the operations of a combined movement on Lake Champlain, which took place on the 29th July. The objects of this service have been fully accomplished by the total destruction of all the enemy's arsenals, block houses, barracks and stores of every description at Plattsburgh, Swanton and Champlain Town, and the extensive barracks at Saranac capable of containing 4000 men, have been burnt. All naval, ordnance and other stores on the west side of the Lake, have been destroyed or carried away.

This important service has been performed with a degree of promptness and regularity, highly honorable to the officers directing the expedition, and without sustaining any loss; the American Militia assembled at Plattsburgh having retreated without offering any resistance in defence of their post.

Lieut. Col. Murray reports in strong terms the cordial and spirited co-operation he received from Capt. Stewart, Capt. Fring, and the officers and seamen of the Royal Navy. He also states that he was most ably supported by Lieut. Col. Williams, of the 13th Regiment, and that the cheerful and spirited conduct of the troops, among whom was a volunteer detachment of the embodied militia of Lower Canada, combined with the regularity and discipline evinced on this occasion, afforded a sure pledge that had the opportunity offered, their courage and gallantry would not have been less conspicuous.

The block houses and stores at Champlain Town were burnt by a detachment of the 10th Regiment, under the direction of Capt. Elliot, 103d Regiment, Depy's Ass. Gr. Master Genl. His Excellency has also received from Capt. Everard, of the Royal Navy, to whose prompt, zealous and able assistance, his Excellency feels highly indebted, a report informing him that after having co-operated in the complete accomplishment of the service above stated, he proceeded with his Majesty's sloop Brooke and Shannon, and a gun boat to Burlington, where he found the enemy's flotilla superior in force, moored under the protection of a high bank, on which were placed a numerous artillery, supported by a strong body of regular and other troops; under Major Gen. Hampton, who was reported to have collected all the troops in the vicinity of the Lake, amounting to about 5,000.

Capt. Everard proceeded twenty miles above Burlington, captured and destroyed four vessels within sight of the enemy's armed ships, when finding that they could not be induced to venture from a position in which it was impracticable to attack them, and every object of the service being fully achieved, he returned with the armed vessels to the Isle aux Noix, on the 4th inst.—the land forces under Lieut. Col. Murray having arrived the day preceding.

Memorandum of Swedish Troops arrived at Stralsund.

FORNAN-OFFICE, June 16, 1813. It appears by the latest advices received from His Majesty's servants on the Continent, that successive divisions of Swedish troops had arrived at Stralsund from their different points of embarkation in Sweden, the total strength of which (exclusive of a corps of Pomorians) is stated to amount to about 28,000 men.

A private letter from Lord Wellington's army mentions, that "there was a gallant affair between the 10th Hussar, supported by part of the 18th, and a brigade of French cavalry, under General Dijon, on the 2d, at a village near Toro. Lieutenant Cotton was killed, and Captain Lloyd made prisoner. The 10th and 18th took 207 prisoners, and but for the French having much artillery, the whole brigade would have been destroyed. General Dijon ran away at the first onset. The guards are with the light brigade."

JUNE 16.—Cadiz papers to the 26th ultimo, arrived this morning. Their contents are of considerable importance, as it appears that his STELLIAN MAJESTY is a prisoner to Lord WILLIAM BENTINCK, and his country house had been surrounded by 3000 troops; tranquillity had, however, fortunately been restored.

HALIFAX, July 20. The DUKE OF MONTAGUE Packet, with the May mail for Halifax, was captured by the United States frigate President, on the 10th June, in long 50, lat. 43; and yesterday arrived here, the MANCHESTER Packet, from Wilmouth, in 3d days,

but without a Mail, she having on the 25th June, been captured by the American privateer, York Town, of 20 twelve pounders and 116 men.—On the 18th July near Cape Sable, she was re-captured by the squadron under the command of Sir J. Beresford.—Having fought the privateer for a considerable time; the Packet is much injured, and some time will elapse before she will be in a state to return.

BOSTON, Aug. 5.

Latest from SPAIN.—By several recent arrivals from Spain, we have Cadiz papers to June 28th, which furnish some very interesting particulars of war operations in that country. It appears, from the official letters of Lord Wellington, that the French were retreating towards the Pyrennes; that his lordship's army passed the Carrión on the 7th, and the Pinaro on the 10th; that on the 12th the right of the army made a reconnaissance on Burgos; that the enemy, under Gen. Reille, was dislodged from a position it had taken on the heights on the left of Hornozza, after which it abandoned another position it had taken on the left of the rivers Arlanzon and Urbel, and passed by Burgos, WHICH WAS ABANDONED, and the works of the castle which had been strengthened with so much labour and expense, were destroyed as effectually as their time and haste would admit; that the enemy continued to retreat for the Ebro, on the roads of Breviesca and Miranda, followed by the allied army; that on the 14th June, Lord Wellington's head quarters were in Massa de los Pinos; on the 15th at Quintana; on the 16th in Medina del Pomar, and on the same day his lordship passed the Ebro, at the bridge of Arenas; on the 17th the head quarters were transferred to Quinones; on the 18th the allied vanguard encountered the rear-guard of the enemy, 6000 strong, near Vittoria; here a smart action ensued, when the enemy left the field covered with dead, and 300 prisoners fell into our hands; that on the same day another column of the enemy were attacked, driven into the mountains of Biscay, and their military chest, containing six millions of reals, taken; that the French troops opposed by Lord Wellington, were commanded by King Joseph, in person, and were estimated at 4000 infantry, and 7,000 cavalry; that besides these, there were about 13,000 more in Navarre.

The papers also state that the patriots are reanimated with the highest spirit of enthusiasm; that since the union of the Spanish patriots, their allied force consisted of 100,000 men, whose present supplies were ample, and whose future support was secured through the Bay of Biscay.

MADRID, June 11—8, 1813.

We learn that a British and Spanish force has landed in the neighborhood of Bilbao, and made prisoners of 4 or 500 French dragoons.

All the ministers of Joseph left Burgos on the 12th June; and on the 13th, the Castle was blown up, the explosion of which was heard thirteen leagues. The city was covered with the ruins; but fortunately none of the inhabitants were killed; the injury falling on the Vandals, of whom three companies all but 11 men perished.

CARTHAGENA, (Murcia) June 21.—The corps under the Duke of Parque and General Elio have advanced on Valencia, (south of Spain). On the 10th June, Marshal Suchet left Valencia for Teruel; and General Harispe, since the destruction of the batteries, has retired with the Artillery for Segorbia.

MADRID, June 18.—The enemy having evacuated Valencia and Murviedro, our troops have taken possession of them. The allied expedition from Alicante have taken Tarragona, and the Col. de Balaguer; in the last place they left a garrison of 3000 men. In the capture of this castle, the loss was suffered by the defenders, and we saved the lives of ninety who were prisoners.

CADIZ, June 22.—The Empeinado has taken three detachments of the enemy.

The army of Galicia has passed the Ebro for Remosa. A part of the army of Galicia has arrived at Salamanca.

Extract of a letter from Spain.

CADIZ, June 1.—For the fourth time since the famous 2d of May, 1811, [the French massacre at Madrid] have the French evacuated the capital of this country. Letters from thence state, that the place was abandoned about six days ago. The troops, retired with the greatest precipitation; and the Empeinado entered immediately afterwards, at the head of a strong party of Grenadiers. He found the place completely sacked; every thing valuable had been carried off or destroyed. The royal cabinet of natural history, one of the most extensive in the world, was ceded of every thing rare and curious; the place stripped of its costly furniture; the ware-houses of cloths plundered. In short, every species of depredation, worthy of gothic ages, was committed upon the unfortunate town and inhabitants of Madrid. But their sufferings are probably at an end. The French have retired never to enter the place again.

Admiral Warren's Squadron.

We have no distinct accounts of the position, or views, of Admiral Warren's squadron. It is however, probable, that it lies near the mouth of the Potomac, and will remain there for some days, in order to water and provision the ships. The Annapolis paper of the 29th July, says nothing about the squadron, or of any alarm, from the apprehension of a visit.

From Lake Erie.—Our accounts from Lake Erie are to July 10, at which time it was said, there was five British vessels near our lines, viz. the ship Queen Charlotte, brig Hunter, Lady Prevost, two gun-boats, and a large schooner, supposed to be the Mary, taken at the surrender of Gen. Hull; it is also added, that as the enemy are very strong, and our squadron not only inferior in size and number, but in the complement of men, something serious may be daily expected.

Reports by the late Albany mail from Fort George, mention the deaths of Col. Tuttle and Christie—who have fell victims to the fever which now prevails at that post.

Accounts from New-Orleans state, that the town and fort of St. Louis, in the Missouri Territory, have been taken by the British—force, 200 British, 400 Indians.

Blockade of North Carolina.

The British squadron which lately appeared on the North Carolina coast have wholly left those waters.

Failure of the Mediation.

Our Ministers (says a late London paper,) officially avowed their having rejected the proffered mediation of Russia, between this country and the U. States; and it is even said, that the conduct of Sir J. B. Warren is under censure for having so prematurely granted passports to Messrs. Galatin and Bayard, whose diplomatic mission will, doubtless, have other objects in view upon the Continent, than merely that of a pacification with England.

KINGSTON, (U. C.) August 10.

Extract of Letters from Washington, June 15th and 20th.

"The Enemy's vessels are proceeding gradually but slowly up the Potomac, carefully sounding their way to two divisions; the first consisting of six vessels under Admiral Cockburn, the other several miles lower down, consist of five sail, under Admiral Warren. Much anxiety, bustle and alarm prevails. Every thing has been in motion—the papers in the Public Offices packed for removal if requisite, and the necessary measures are all taken."

We are not surprised at the "anxiety, bustle, and alarm," created by this approach to the Capital of the United States, when the barbarian conduct of the Americans is recollected in burning the Houses of Legislature, Courts, and public Records, in their late occupation of York; and a private dwelling was sacrificed in the same manner, because it once had been a Government house.—Should the Capitol, and the splendid residence of the President at Washington, fall victims to retaliation, the Americans cannot but allow it to be a just retribution of their repeated wanton aggression upon Civil Character, hitherto held inviolate.

The frequent instances of disregard to the usages of War evinced by the American Generals, and their ready forgetfulness of benefits conferred upon their officers and men when prisoners of war, are strong traits of meanness in the National character. While thousands of Americans, taken in arms, have been liberated on engagements not to serve against G. Britain or her Allies, until regularly exchanged, the sacredness of which parole is daily violated; their Commanders, to swell a list of Captives, ransack the wards of Hospitals, and the very cells of Goals for prisoners to parole, in common with the respectable inhabitants, and let loose upon society villains confined for atrocious offences.

MONTREAL, Aug. 14, 1813. It is now ascertained from every quarter of the Province, that the crops of Grain, Hay, Fruits and vegetables will be very abundant. The weather for securing the two former has been for several weeks past uncommonly fine, which has given additional worth to the quality of the harvest.

On Friday last wheat of this year's growth was offered in market for sale. It was said to be remarkably good.

QUEBEC: THURSDAY, AUGUST 19, 1813.

We have received no intelligence from Europe this week, excepting the confirmation of the advance of the British Army into the North of Spain, and the evacuation of Madrid by the French, and the additional fact, that Lord Wellington had crossed the Ebro and advanced to Victoria. It is probable, that Suchet will follow the example of his friends on the western half of the country and retire, if possible, into Catalonia; leaving almost the whole Kingdom in possession of "the insurgents."

The following intelligence, which was received yesterday forenoon by the Steam Boat, has diffused general satisfaction in this city. It relieves us from that anxiety which is the natural attendant on the expectation of a contest in which we are materially interested. It proves that the early and constant exertions of the enemy to make himself master of Lake Ontario, have been rendered ineffectual; and furnishes the best grounds of confidence for the future.

It is probable that the operations on land will now be resumed. We hope, before long, to hear of a suitable catastrophe to Mr. Madison's invasion of Canada; such a one as will convince him and his adherents, that the British Government and the people of Canada are not what they took them to be.

HEAD-QUARTERS, Kingston, 14th Aug. 1813.

By accounts received by His Excellency the Governor in Chief and Commander of the Forces, from Commodore Sir James Yeo, dated off York, at half past 1 P. M. on the 11th inst. the following particulars have been transmitted of the capture and loss of four of the Enemy's Armed Schooners.

On Tuesday Evening last the 10th instant, the Enemy's Squadron under Commodore Chauncey, got under weigh from their anchorage off the mouth of the Niagara river, and with a fine breeze from the Eastward stood towards our fleet, which was becalmed off the Post at twelve mile Creek. At sunset a breeze coming off the land, gave us the wind of the Enemy, when our Squadron stood for them, on which they immediately bore away from us under as much sail as their schooners could carry to keep up with their larger vessels. The Enemy's fleet formed a long line, the Pike, Madison, Onida and six schooners, two schooners being placed to windward for the purpose of raking the masts of our Squadron as it should come up. At eleven the squadron got within gun shot of the schooners, when they opened a brisk fire, and from their going so fast it was more than an hour before the Wolfe, our head most ship, could pass them.

At this time the rest of the Squadron was two and three miles astern of the Wolfe, and on her coming up with the Madison and Pike, they put before the wind and made sail, firing their stern chase guns. Sir James Yeo finding it impossible to get the Squadron up with the enemy, as the Wolfe was the only ship which could keep up with them, made sail between them and the two Schooners to windward, which he captured, and which proved to be the Julia and Growler, each mounting one long 32 and one long 12 pounder, with a complement of forty men. Two of the enemy's largest Schooners, the Scourge of ten and the Hamilton of nine guns, upset on the night of 9th in carrying sail to keep from our Squadron, and all on board perished, in number about one hundred.

By this loss and the capture of the two Schooners, the enemy's Squadron has been reduced to ten vessels, and ours increased to eight. It is ascertained that the Pike mounts 28 long 24 pounders, and has a complement of 420 men, and that the Madison mounts 22-32 pound carronades, with 340 men. Nine boat loads of Troops were taken on board their Squadron on Monday, for the purpose, it is supposed, of repelling the boarders.

The Wolfe has not received any material damage, and a person was hurt on board. The prisoners were landed from her on the 11th, and the damages of the Growler were repaired. She had lost her bowsprit and was otherwise much cut up. Nothing could exceed the eagerness and enthusiasm manifested by the Officers and men serving on board our Squadron, for a close engagement with the enemy, and the only apprehension and regret expressed by all were that their opponents, though so superior in guns, weight of metal and men, would be too wary to afford them the opportunity of terminating by a decisive action, the contest for the ascendancy on the Lake.

The Plattsburgh newspaper has published some infamous aspersions on the conduct of our troops when they were in possession of that place and the vicinity. If any private property has been destroyed, or outrages committed, it was probably by their own vagabonds. Of their expertness at this, we have had some examples, both in peace and in war. This Plattsburgh paper, at least, furnishes evidence, that we did not send an officer and a company of men to take down the Press, burn the wood work, and melt the Types, as was done at York, by order of General Dearborn. It would have been more for the honor of this gentleman, had he let the work be done, as it naturally would have been, by the leaders of the Baltimore Rioters who have the honor of holding Commissions in the American Army. We know the pretext that was made use of for the destruction of the Press at York. We know also that it was false; and General Dearborn might have known it, if he had been so disposed. But of this en passant: we do not mean to justify ourselves for any thin, of this sort, of which we may be accused, by the example of the American Army.

It is reported in town, we believe not without foundation, that His Excellency the Governor in Chief has proceeded from Kingston for York.
