

'MUSHROOM' OVER WESTMOUNT

A simulated H-bomb explosion — complete with mushroom smoke cloud — will highlight a public demonstration of a nuclear attack at the 17th Duke of York's Royal Canadian Hussars Armory Monday night at 8.30 o'clock.

The demonstration, to be known as 'Operation ground zero', is under the direction of Lt.-Col. Julian R. Benbow, CD, commander of the Hussars, and is designed to show the public the sequence of events that might be expected in the event of a guided missile attack.

It will include brief talks by experts on missile weapons and nuclear explosions. Prominent speakers will include: Dr. J. Sternberg, professor of civil defence and nuclear hygiene, University of Montreal and chairman of the North American Nuclear Radiation Committee; Mr. J. T. Wallace, MC, deputy commandant, Canadian Civil Defence College, Arran, Ont. and Dr. Frank Perrier, an authority on intercontinental weapons systems development.

Featured will be an "attack" on a model city, accompanied by an audio play showing its effects on the people and a display of first aid methods, with simulated casualties by the St. John's Ambulance Brigade. There will also be models of guided missiles and a display of photographs of weapons systems and launchings.

Civil and military leaders and



representatives of various organizations interested in disaster defence, will attend the demonstration.

Army sources stated, that while the militia can in no way attempt to organize or assume the responsibility for civil defence, being a purely civic matter, it is believed a demonstration on this subject will render a much needed public service at this time.

The organizing of this demonstration by the 17th Hussars, underlines the fact that today, all militia regiments are devoting

part of their training to civil defence subjects and disaster training. Through the years, it has been a function of the militia to be trained and ready to serve the civil power if called upon in an emergency.

It is hoped the Monday demonstration will encourage formation of civil defence study groups by other organizations, such as service clubs and various civil associations.

The St. John's Ambulance Brigade, which would be a key organization in any disaster,

Marler plays major role in convention of Liberals

Ottawa — Something over 5,000 Liberals are sleeping late this morning, recovering from the effects of the week-long series of meetings, voting, debating and other activities connected with the National Convention which wound up in a blaze of publicity yesterday.

Of all the 5,000, no one has a better right to be feeling a mite fatigued than Hon. George Marler. For the better part of a month prior to the Convention, the former Transport Minister spent all the time he could spare from Parliament in burrowing through a pile of some 325 separate resolutions which flooded in from all over the country.

Each one of those resolutions had to be processed well in advance of the convention, in order that the best of the hatch would be ready for the 150-man Resolutions Committee, which was chosen during the first day of the Convention.

After that, the Committee, under Mr. Marler's chairmanship sifted the resolutions and picked out those which best expressed Liberal thought. These were then combined into a dozen or so master resolutions.

In addition, there were the resolutions presented from the

convention floor. They too had to be carefully considered by the Committee.

In spite of the magnitude of this task, it was, to a certain extent, almost a by-product of Mr. Marler's main job. Everyone

Realty sales in Westmount hold position

Figures released by the Montreal Real Estate Board placed Westmount 10th among the suburban municipalities for real estate sales in the month of October. 28 sales made during this time amounted to \$560,304.

For the ten month period from January to October, Westmount is 8th with sales totalling \$2,743,610.

Overall figures showed that though total sales in the City of Montreal were down from the corresponding period last year, sales in the suburban municipalities were appreciably greater.

Gas change is coming

Although preliminary adjustments for natural gas have been made in Westmount homes, individual appliance adjustments and conversion from manufactured to natural gas will not take place until February 20 in some residences and May 5 in others.

According to the Quebec Natural Gas Corporation change-over schedule, individual appliance adjustments will begin on February 20 in district 13 bounded by Kensington and Argyle on the east, Queen Mary Road and Dupuis on the north, Grey and Cote St. Luc road on the west and the CPR tracks on the south.

On May 5, conversion will begin in district 33. This district is bounded by Guy and Remembrance Park on the east, Remembrance on the north, Kensington and Argyle on the west and the CPR tracks on the south.

About 400 specially trained gas adjustment men will move into each district on the scheduled day. Within two to three days the district change-over

Modern construction methods at rink site

A monster exhibition of modern construction methods is scheduled for Westmount residents later this month in conjunction with the new Skating Rink presently in the process of completion. The rink, being erected at a cost of \$580,000.00, is expected to be ready by June 1st.

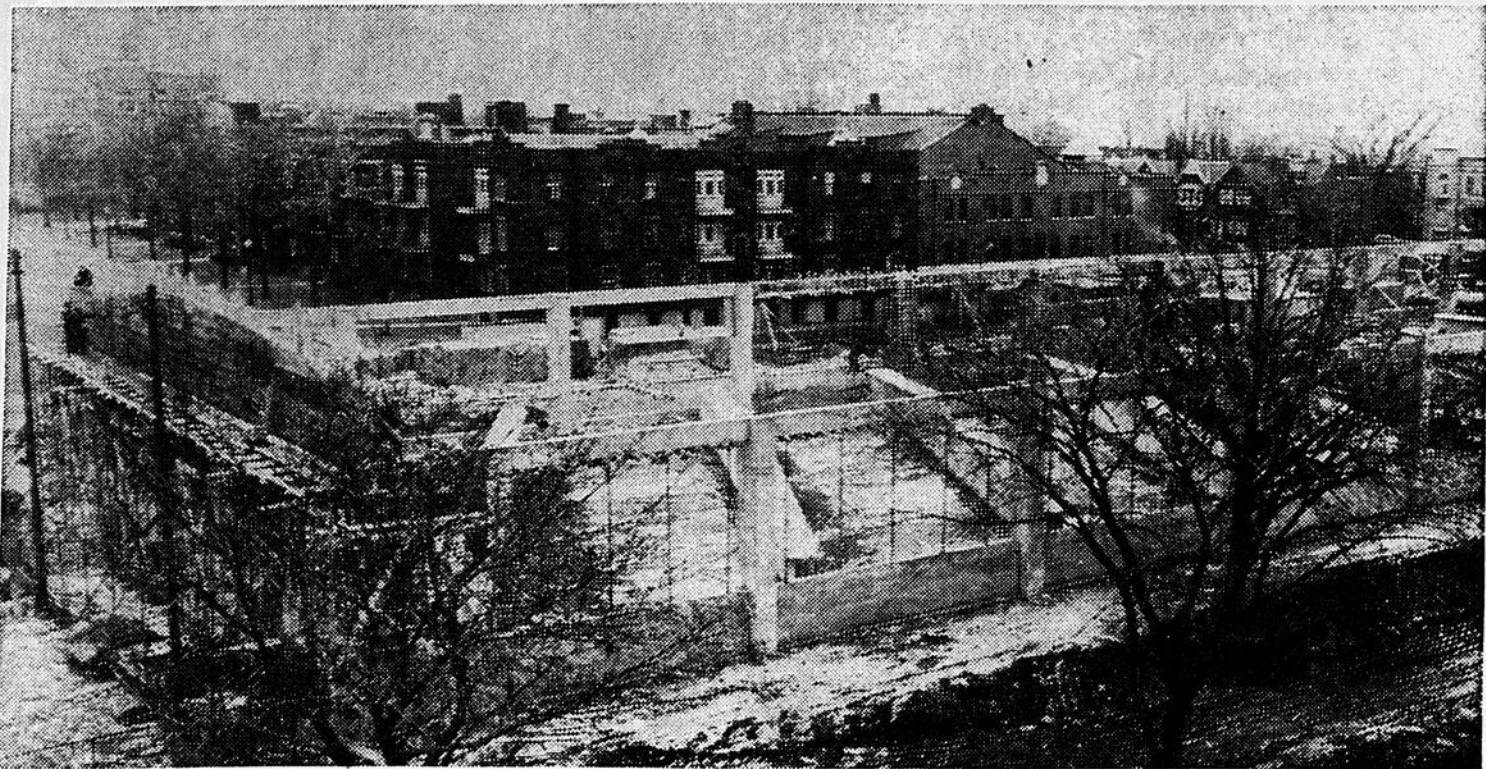
All the foundation work has been finished and the structure will be completed very shortly. The most massive part of the job, however, will start on January 24th.

On this date, according to Mr. Bill Dawson, a representative of Douglas Bremner Construction, and supervisor of the building project, erection will commence of the 9 pre-stressed concrete beams which will support the rink.

These supports, each 106 ft. long and weighing 60 tons, are a relative innovation in the construction industry, and were conceived as a replacement for the steel girders which formerly were necessary to bridge large gaps of space.

In contrast to the steel, concrete beams need no protection from fire or excessive heat and do not need to be painted for protection. While their cost is slightly in excess of the old method (about 5%), they represent a long run saving of the many maintenance charges which steel demands. They are, moreover, much more attractive for this type of semi-open structure.

The method of bridging space with concrete was developed about nine years ago in Europe. It consists of pre-stressing or compressing the concrete, which has no tensile strength and cannot be pulled apart, by, figuratively, pushing the ends of a column of concrete together. This is accomplished with a system of thin wires, threaded through the column, which are stretched by specially constructed "jacks". The equipment for this work, which will be done on

Two 60 ton mobile cranes will be required to erect the beams. It will take a day to place the cranes and approximately one week to secure the columns in place.

Though it might seem strange to speak of delicacy in connection with this gigantic operation, the fact remains that it must be done as delicately as a ballet. A fraction of a wrong move and the entire structure will be crumbled to dust and rubble. For all their 60 tons the machinery and the columns must be handled to within a hair's breadth.

To assist in the operation Douglas Bremner have called in Creaghan and Archibald Ltd., a Montreal firm skilled in the preparation and erection of pre-stressed concrete, who will supervise the work.

The Westmount skating rink has brought more than its share of controversy to this city. It appears that it will soon bring an equal amount of delight to the sidewalk engineer.

WE SAY

It can be great throughout '58

WITH the advent of a new year, so-called experts are in the public prints hinting darkly at a possible recession, with some of them supplying even more somber overtones and mumbling about the probability of a partial depression.

Certainly there is nothing to be gained by a head-in-sand attitude, whistling to keep up the courage, and ignoring sure or almost sure signs.

The trouble is, however, that few of the so-called experts can be looked to for such signs.

Before each previous large-scale business setback there were but a handful of experts who called the tune correctly, and in as many cases there were those on the other side who said "Nonsense, this prosperity is good for years yet".

All of which is a preamble to the thought that one of the best ways to launch a vulnerable attack at even a suspected recession is to provide whatever impetus can be given business wherever one finds it.

The Federal government, in a special promotion campaign, has been urging those who have repair work to be done to houses or business premises, to issue the orders for the work while the construction and allied trades are comparatively slack.

This is one thing that can be done.

And there are others. In this community there are sufficient employers of labor and directors of business organizations to make a big difference in the local economic picture.

It can be great — in '58 — it's up to you.

Public relations and the churches

THROUGH its board of information and stewardship, the United Church of Canada has just issued a booklet entitled *The Church and Its Publics*.

This is a highly intelligent and worth-while

effort. In stating the principles of and making a plea for public relations, the booklet offers church workers a concise insight into what makes good public relations and offers a few suggestions on how to avoid some of the obvious pitfalls.

Speaking of the relationship between the church and the press, the booklet says: "The responsibility of building a bridge of understanding between the local church and the local newspaper rests mainly upon the local minister."

We couldn't have said it any more succinctly ourselves. The booklet suggests the minister study the local paper, over a period of months. This will enable him, it suggests, to have accurate information regarding the amount of space the newspaper gives to religious activities in the community.

At this point we invite inspection and comparison. Week in, week out, over the years this newspaper has carried and is carrying a very high percentage of church news in its columns. It also offers church advertisements at a greatly reduced rate — actually below cost.

In asking seven pertinent questions of clergymen in helping them to assess their relationships with the local newspaper in their area, the booklet asks: "Have you considered that the existence of your local newspaper depends upon circulation and advertising; and do you do your part in helping your local editor in these matters?"

We would like to feel that local clergymen — who have not already done so — will consider this an invitation to visit the editor and discuss the situation as suggested in this new booklet. Our doors are always open.

Serious

Kathleen said she definitely intends to continue in the field of music even if she marries. She'd like to hit the big spots with her singing.

The other two sisters love singing in the trio and will continue to do so while they are altogether. But they have outside interests. Susan would settle for a career in marriage. Maybe that is not far in the offing. Susan, who sings second soprano in the trio, has a steady boy friend, Baldwin Van de Water, a new Canadian from Holland. She also has a steady secretarial job with a construction firm on Monkland Avenue.

Stephanie, who sings alto, is in her third year science at McGill. She has the noble aspiration to teach mentally retarded children later on. Stephanie resembles not so much her singing sisters but her older sister Theresa, 28, who has been a nurse at the Margaret Hague Medical Centre in Jersey City for the past three years.

The sisters have been singing professionally on a steady basis for the past seven years. In other words, Kathleen, the youngest, was a pro at 11! At that time CKVL signed the sisters to a regular weekly program called "Songs of the Kasper Sisters" and they have been going ever since. Their current time is Sunday evenings from 9 to 9.15.

Their second radio show is on CBM from 7.30 to 8 p.m. It's called "Designed for You" and features Art Morrow's band, the Kasper sisters and Fred Hill.

With Lewis

A big thrill in their lives was the night they sang with Ted Lewis at El Morocco. They appeared with their piano player, Billy Munro, who wrote Ted's theme song "When My Baby Smiles At Me." Ordinarily the girls do not sing in night clubs. Their mother thinks they are too young. However, they accept supper engagements at various hotels. They enjoyed

singing for a convention at the Seignior Club last fall.

At Christmas, their busiest time, they always tour the veterans' hospitals to sing carols and ballads. They sang "Silver Bells", other carols and a few pop songs for the Women's Press Club Christmas Party at the Ritz.

The sisters live with their father, mother and older brother Gerald, 29, a graduate of Loyola College and an employee of McColl Frontenac, at 2239 Girouard avenue. Their father, George Kasper, who came to Canada from Poland in his late 'teens, is a clothing manufacturer who speaks several languages. Their mother, Florence, who is of Irish descent, has been teaching music—piano, violin and harmony—since she was 16. She taught her three daughters who say she is their best critic. "Mum never interferes in our business engagements," said Susan. "She figures that we are old enough to manage our own affairs."

Another member of the family is Hubert, 27, a mechanic who is married.

Susan is a graduate of St. Willibrord High School, Verdun. The other two girls graduated from D'Arcy McGee High School. Susan and Kathleen both took a year's business course at the Mother House.

Mrs. Kasper makes many of her daughters' clothes. At Easter time the girls usually go on a shopping spree to New York.

Own style

The girls say their singing has been compared to that of the Maguire sisters although they have their own style and do their own arranging. They like doing ballads best and their favorite numbers are "Blue Moon" and "I'm Going to Live Till I Die."

Their favorite dance band is Les Elgart and their favorite singers Frank Sinatra and Perry Como. "I believe we have every record Frankie ever made," said Stephanie. "As for classical music, my mother's collection is huge and we are free to use it."

The girls, bright-eyed, friendly, matter-of-fact, are good friends, share the same friends and date together.

National Canadian Bank has 83rd annual meeting

The 83rd annual general meeting of the shareholders of National Canadian Bank was held at the head office of the Bank, Place d'Armes, Montreal, Tuesday, under the chairmanship of Mr. Charles St-Pierre.

Mr. Ulric Roberge, general manager, read the Board of Directors' report on the results of the past year's operations. Profits for the financial year ended November 30, 1957, amount to \$4,567,573, an increase of \$670,951 over 1956. After deduction of \$656,982 for depreciation on bank premises and of \$1,830,000 for taxes, net profits add up to \$2,080,590. They are the equivalent of \$2.97 per share, against \$2.71 in 1956 and \$2.29 in 1955. A sum of \$1,050,000 was paid in dividends and an amount of \$1,000,000 was transferred to rest fund, leaving a balance of \$755,057 in profit and loss account.

A sum of \$5,000,000 was transferred from inner reserves, after provision of \$4,340,000 for income taxes, to the rest fund which now stands at \$21,000,000, an amount three times as great as the paid up capital of the Bank.

Total deposits increased during the year from \$618,608,806 to \$627,824,741, a new high.

Total assets are at the record figure of \$664,353,931, against \$643,514,380 as of November 30, 1956. Cash assets stand at \$105,602,445 and quick assets at \$328,269,536; they represent 16.66 and 51.79 per cent, respectively, of liabilities to the public.

Current loans and discounts aggregate \$310,606,239, the highest figure ever recorded. Mortgages insured under the National Housing Act amount to \$14,606,187, against \$11,322,382 at the close of the previous year. The value of the Bank's portfolio of securities rose during the year from \$206,481,619 to \$210,223,008.

Charles St-Pierre, president of the Bank, made a general survey of business conditions. He remarked that, while credit restrictions may have had some part in the decrease of speed in Canada's economic growth, this slowing down seems to be above all a reaction from too rapid an expansion. Never, in any country, did statistics show an unbroken chain of records. Progress is always proceeding by stages, passing through alternate ups and downs. The national economy has attained a very high level. It must consolidate its position before reaching a new stage.

As to the prospects of Canada's export trade, Mr. St-Pierre noted that the world economic situation is not quite the same as in these last few years. Conditions are likely to deteriorate in many countries. The development of industrial equipment in

Europe and even in Asia intensifies international competition. Canada will no doubt find markets for its raw materials of which the world is in need. But if the manufacturing industry is to secure such outlets as its enlarged capacity of production requires, employers and employees, conscious of their solidarity, will have to co-operate loyally. In the course of the last twelve years, while primary production was expanding considerably, the manufacturing industry showed a relative decline. Whatever other reasons there may be for this fact, heavy taxation is doubtless a contributing factor. The Government would greatly help by granting larger facilities for amortization.

Referring to concessions the Government granted recently to taxpayers, the president declared that, however timely the initiative, the relief they entail will not afford the incentive the Canadian economy requires. A substantial reduction of taxes would be one of the most efficient ways to assure a resumption of economic expansion.

The president concluded by saying that it would be neither wise nor prudent to disregard the fact that 1958 has in store many difficulties and problems, but that there is no lack of sustaining factors and that we are justified in looking to the future with confidence.

We spoke of the light which Christ casts on the world. Our understanding of the world is quite different from the understanding of a Buddhist. I should have guarded myself against a misunderstanding of that word "world," for in the New Testament it has more than one meaning. When St. John spoke of God's love for the world he thought of the sum of material things and the men and women living in it. But when he said "The whole world lieth in the evil one" he thought of that world deliberately organized in opposition to God. It is to that world that man is not to be conformed. It is from that world that he is to be transformed. The play on words is St. Paul's.

That world to which we are not to conform is the world of men and women. It is the same world of which our Lord spoke when He prayed to His Father: "I pray not that thou shouldst take them out of the world, but that thou shouldst keep them from the evil."

Faith in Christ does not remove us from our relationships

with people but it does change them. It is our changed relationship with people that has led us to build hospitals, to engage in works of mercy, to abolish slavery and child labor, and to pass factory acts. Those things came out of the conscience of Christians before labor as such had the power to act, and before governments had even thought about them.

They happened because a new light and a new understanding had come into the world. There had always been a great deal of good will, a love of one's neighbor. That does not belong to Christianity. It is characteristic to the human race. The oldest rules of human conduct are: Thou shalt love the Lord thy God, and thou shalt love thy neighbor as thyself.

What Christianity brought into the world was a deeper understanding of the God whom we are to love, and new light on the meaning of the word "neighbor." In the teaching of Jesus the love of God is world

should be complete, and Westmount residents will know they are using natural gas when they see the corporation's test flare. There will be a testing device every few blocks, turn from gold to bright blue.

Between 7 a.m. and 9 a.m. of the scheduled conversion day, the gas adjustment men must be able to enter the premises of every gas customer in that district. If they are unable to enter, it will be necessary to disconnect service temporarily at the location.

The type of work to be done in local residences will in general be the insertion of new orifices at each burner, such as stove burners, to restrict the gas flow. It takes about half as much natural gas to do the same work as the old gas. Air mixers will be adjusted to admit more air.

Special work such as on automatic appliances and gas furnaces will be done by special crews.

Since the war, the IODE has sent continuous aid to the destitute children abroad. But, Mrs. Latimer said, overseas help is only 20% of the more than half-a-million dollars spent annually from the services departments; 80% is spent in Canada on local projects such as: clinics, veterans' hospitals, sanatoria, senior citizens, immigrants, libraries, summer camps, nurseries, historic sites, Canadian disaster funds and emergency welfare.

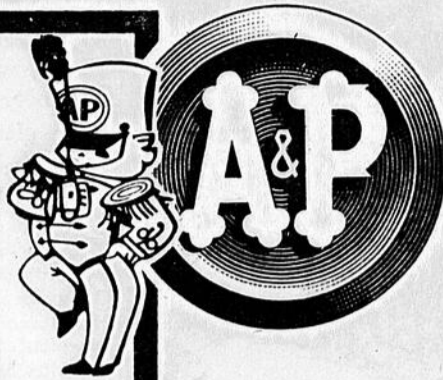

The report of the president, Mr. Ogilvie, recorded that during the past twelve months the hospital has had the greatest number of in-patient days in its history; the highest percentage of occupancy in its history; and the lowest deficit in the last four years.

"We are now approaching the end of our third year in our new building," said Mr. Ogilvie, "It might be appropriate if I suggested that the first year was one of transition, the second one of consolidation, and the past year one of achievement."

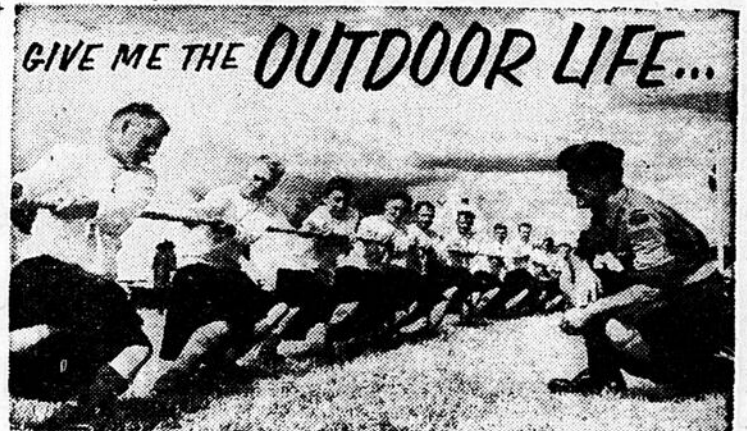

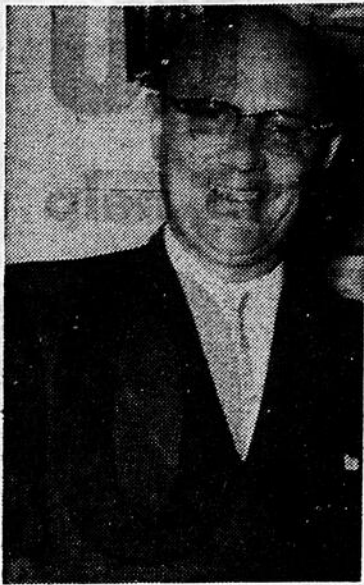
Dotted amongst the four clubs you'll find many members of the Dominion Verdon Argyles, who also competed in an international tournament in Greece two years ago.

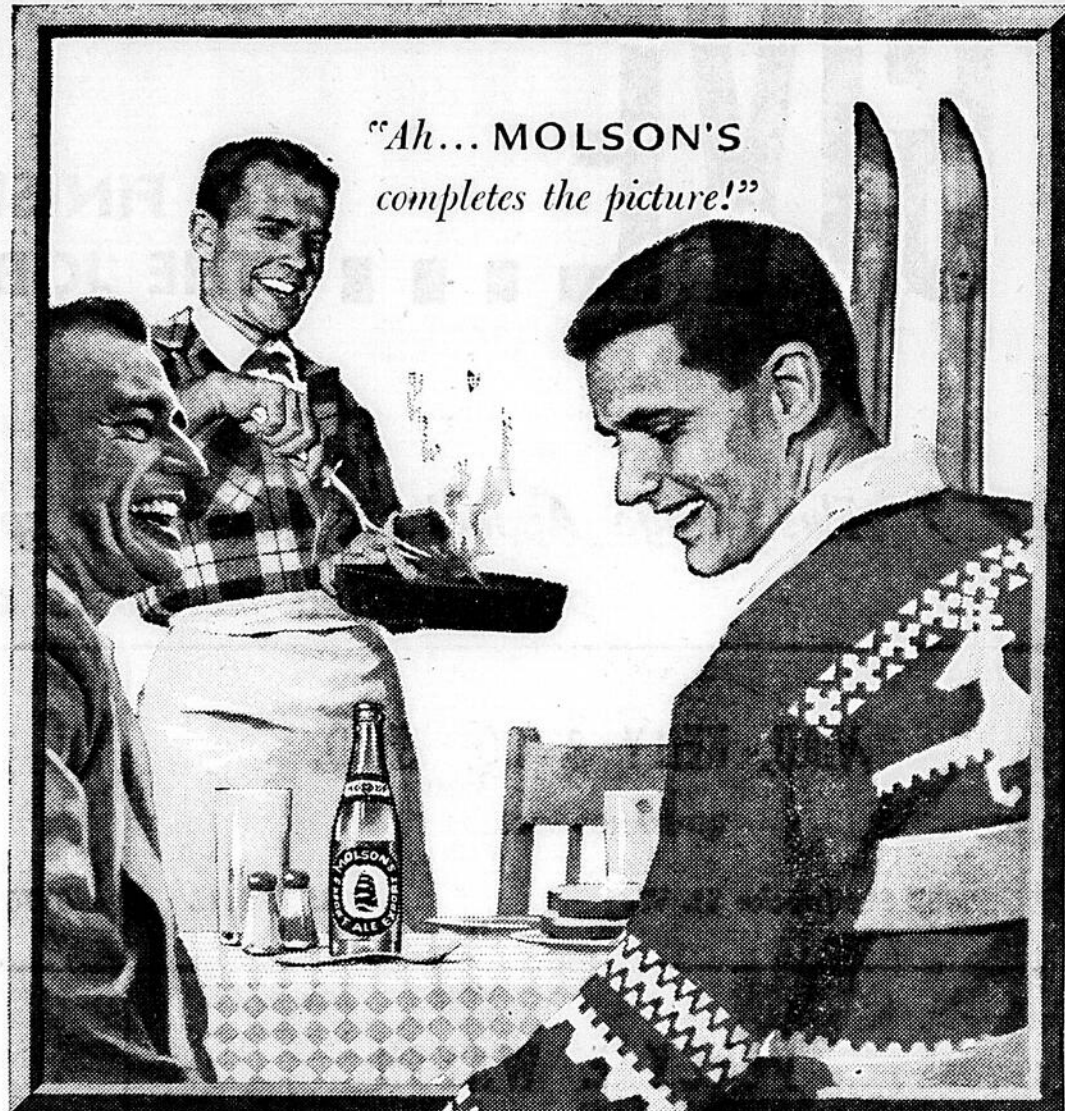

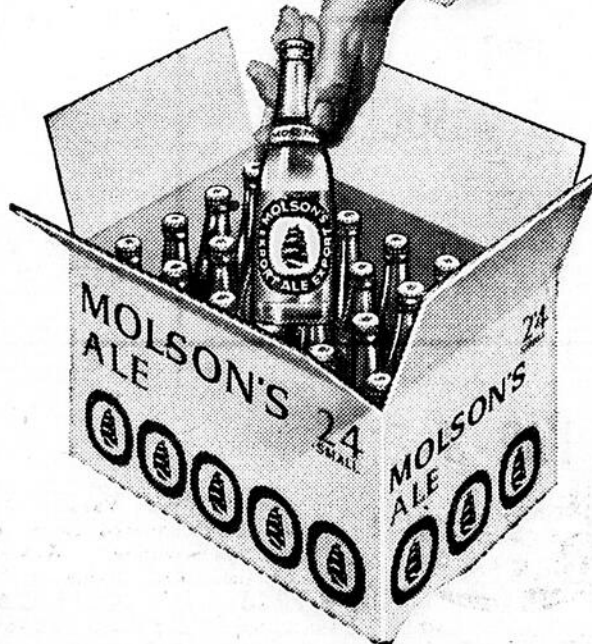
