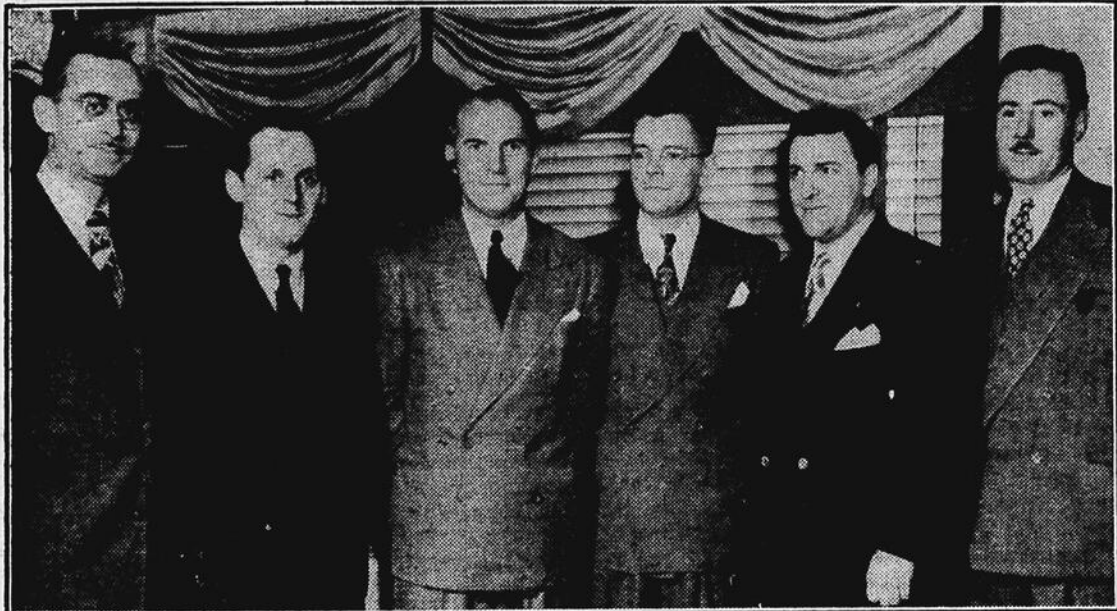

### Election Costs Run High Here

Election costs come pretty high according to figures giving the expenses of candidates in the federal elections held last June, as reported in the House of Commons, Ottawa, this week.

In the St. Antoine-Westmount riding, the candidate's expenses are given as follows: Hon. D. C. Abbott, Liberal, the successful candidate, \$27,000; J. A. De Lallane, Progressive Conservative, \$19,616.87.

C. T. Ballantyne, P.C. candidate in St. Lawrence-St. George topped the list in the Montreal area and for the Dominion with expenses of \$33,149.01, while The Hon. Brooke Claxton, Liberal candidate, who retained the seat, spent \$13,646.71, Miss Jeanine Theoret, C.C.F. in the same riding showed expenses of only \$200.26.

The smallest figure reported was by G. W. Claude Vanbuskirk, C.C.F. candidate in Queens-Shellburne, who lost his deposit. He showed expenses of \$16.42.

The total spent by all candidates was \$2,213,006.05.

### Westmount Shares Major Part Of Red Cross Drive

In every part of Westmount, volunteer workers for the Red Cross are poised today for the official opening, tomorrow, of the Society's annual campaign for funds.

Westmount has a major part in the campaign. Of the total objective of \$875,000 in metropolitan Montreal, this city has by far the largest single share — \$50,000. The target was set on the basis of Westmount's contributions in the past to the maintenance of Red Cross work.

The national objective this year is \$5,000,000 and the province of Quebec's share \$1,250,000, to finance all the services by which the Red Cross saves lives and eases suffering through its blood banks, disaster relief, outpost hospitals and mobile clinics, home nursing, missing persons bureaus,

### Better Facilities Needed For Sports - Obeck Says

"A great deal can be done to provide better facilities for sports in the Montreal area, Victor Obeck, Director of Athletics of McGill University told members of the Westmount Rotary Club, Wednesday.

Speaking on the "Value of Athletics" Mr. Obeck said that moral standards was one of the most important points of education, and that athletics on a competitive basis are one of the best ways to develop this quality.

"The last thing I worry about is building good muscles," the speaker said. He pointed out that there were more tangible assets than this to look for in a prospective player, citing perseverance, courage, self-sacrifice, discipline and sportsmanship as the main goals.

#### No Short-Cut

Enlarging on these various points, Mr. Obeck said that perseverance is the only way for an athlete to become a star, and that they must learn there is no short-cut to success. Recalling his days

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### Westmount Dad Hits Night Clubs As Youth Menace

Following on the vice expose which has been appearing in local dailies, The Examiner is in receipt of a letter from a resident who signs himself "Westmount Parent", and who expresses keen concern over what he terms the menace to family life, and to the peace of mind of every Westmount parent of teen age boys and girls.

He refers to a previous letter which appeared in The Examiner of December 2nd, in which "Protesting Citizens" suggested that the Westmount City Council should make representations to Premier Duplessis regarding the illicit activities of certain night clubs in the sale of liquor and the conduct of the establishments.

#### Churches Should Act

He cites the Sacred Heart League, who are taking a leading part in the anti-vice crusade, and asks why more positive action has not been taken by churches as a whole, to remove a cancer which is prone to wreck many a normal family. The letter reads as follows:

The Editor,  
The Examiner  
Dear Sir,

I have been following in the public press reports concerning the vice conditions which are said to exist in Montreal.

The expose of conditions as told by two newspapermen of their experience in some so-called night clubs where they were openly solicited by women, who apparently ply their trade with approval of the management is alarming.

It is difficult to understand how such things can go under the surveillance of the police. As a father of a family I am particularly disturbed in the thought that my children are exposed to this menace to their future wellbeing.

#### Painted Ladies Health Menace

It is all very well believing that my boy is not likely to fall for the attractions of the painted ladies, but human nature being what it is, and the fact that youth today enjoys a freedom not permitted their parents, leaves one with an uneasy feeling that in a moment of weakness, perhaps induced by the too easy availability of liquor, the health and future of my son or yours may be impaired permanently by associating with these women of the streets, who frequent the liquor selling clubs.

According to the newspapermen, night clubs which are supposed to close at no later than 2 a.m., are apparently allowed to run on until early morning.

#### Save Youth from Snake Pits

It is unfortunately true, that many of the patrons of such places are boys and girls of good families, who rightly or wrongly think it the smart thing to do, and it is in an endeavour to protect them from the possible snake-pits, that I have penned this appeal to our Westmount Council to use all their influences to have these disgraceful conditions remedied.

Similar action was requested in a letter which appeared in The Examiner on December 2nd, and it may well be that our city council have already protested to Quebec regarding the abuse.

"In my opinion he was the greatest coach for the influence of good that ever lived," Mr. Obeck declared.

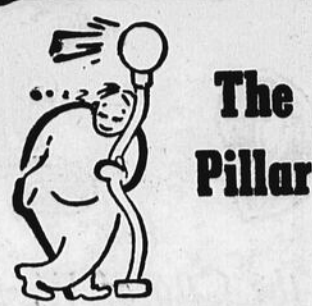

### ELECTION NOTE

Britain's millions of electors went to the polls yesterday to choose the men who will govern them for the next five years. That scarcely rates the label of news — but this does: Among the hundreds running for Parliament was a young man who less than a decade ago was a student at Westmount Intermediate School, now Westmount Junior High.

The lad is David Freeman, bespectacled Englishman who won a host of friends in this city back in the early days of the war when, as one of the British Isles youngsters evacuated to this country for safety reasons, he took up an abode on Dorchester street and spent two happy years as a Westmount student. He was at W.I.S. for grades eight and nine, from 1940 to 1942, and then returned to his beloved homeland.

Freeman, now 22 years of age, ran as a Liberal candidate in East Fife. In a letter to this department written January 23, Dave says that his chances of election are slim as the sitting member for the constituency, J. Henderson Stewart, appears to have things pretty well wrapped up. Stewart is a Liberal National, which to Freeman is "exactly the same thing as a Tory."

The papers this week have been filled with the long-range forecasting of prophets who attempt to predict the results of an election some 3000 miles away from their typewriters.

Freeman, who has been right in the thick of the political fighting, believes, "Apart from East Fife, in which I am too involved to observe accurately, I think that the election will be close in the matter of votes cast but distribution of seats is anyone's guess. Personally, like most, I expect a narrow Labor majority

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## School Crossing Guardians on Job; Plan Working

Westmount has now four School Crossing Guardians, and the plan according to Police Chief Robert Byford is working out wonderfully.

The guardians are organized to direct traffic at school intersections, when students are on their way to and from school.

The creation of the guardian force was suggested to the Westmount City Council by Chief Byford. The Chief advocated that men and women be hired on a part time basis, and that they should be invested with the power of traffic officers to guard the safety of students at crossings.

The guardians presently on duty are: Mrs. Edith Dengate, who is stationed at Cote St. Antoine road and Roslyn avenue; John McCaffrey, who is at Lansdowne avenue and Sherbrooke street; Robert Kennedy, at Roslyn and Western avenues, and Miss Linda Pasco on duty at Western and Clarke avenues.

All four guardians have other full time occupations and are at their posts only between the hours of 8 and 9 a.m., 11:45 a.m. to 12:15 p.m., 12:45 p.m. and 1:30 p.m., and 2:30 p.m. and 3:45 p.m.

## Greene Avenue Changes Mooted

It is learned from a usually reliable source that Greene avenue, from Sherbrooke to St. Catherine, will soon become a still more important business section than it is at present.

It is stated that occupants in several out-moded buildings have received notice to vacate the premises, which will be either demolished entirely to make room for new construction, or remodeled to suit present day requirements.

Construction is likely to start at an early date, with the prospective owners eagerly waiting to make Greene avenue an up-to-date shopping centre.

## City Health Department Makes Favorable Report On Students' Health

Of the 354 students examined by Westmount City Health officials during the month of January, 323 were categorised as good, a statement to the Westmount City Council revealed this week. However, 140 defects noted for immediate attention were listed; 68 to be put under observation, and another 16 for corrections.

It was also reported that the City Nurses inspected 611; 87 students were given treatment and 55 home visits were carried out.

## Leo Burns Voices Speed Complaint

Two recent traffic fatalities, one at the corner of Wood avenue and Sherbrooke street, and the other at the intersection of Wood and Western avenues, has brought forth several complaints from Westmount citizens, who describe the two corners as amongst the most dangerous for pedestrians in the city.

Leo Burns, of 474 Wood avenue, who is well known for his connection with sporting associations, states that one is taking his life in his hands to try to cross Sherbrooke street at Wood avenue.

Mr. Burns points out that there is a traffic light at Greene avenue with the next light being at Atwater.

In their attempt to beat the light, motorists seem to step on the gas between the two points with cars often travelling two abreast on both sides of Sherbrooke street at break neck pace, making it virtually impossible for persons to cross with any degree of safety.

The two deaths on Wood avenue would appear to bear out Mr. Burns' complaint.

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### Flight Record Set Montreal-New York

Montreal is only 78 minutes distant from New York now. A Colonial Air Lines D.C.-4 aircraft piloted by Captain S. C. Barnitt, made the 355 mile flight between the two cities on Monday in 78 minutes flat.

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### Westmount Police Hand Out Tickets

Westmount police were on the job on Thursday night, handing out tickets to motorists who had parked in no parking zones in the streets adjacent to the Forum, while attending the Canadiens vs Toronto hockey N.H.L. game.

This action on the part of the Westmount force, was in sharp contrast to the Montreal police, who permitted cars to park on both sides of the nearby streets, even though the heavy fall of snow had left only very narrow thoroughfares on most of the streets around the Forum. The result of course was utter chaos as far as traffic conditions. Some street cars were held up for as long as 30 minutes before the tangle was unravelled.

Owners of well over 60 cars which were parked on the Westmount side between St. Catherine and St. Antoine, as well as in the upper sectors of Tupper and St. Catherine streets, and Western and Wood avenues, returned from the Forum to find a parking ticket under their windshield wipers.

Parking was allowed on the north side of Western avenue, but not on the south side. About a dozen trucks and cars parked on the wrong side were given tickets. Likewise on all streets off St. Catherine, subject to parking regulations varying according to the street — on Wood avenue for instance, parking is allowed for 60 minutes on the western side but four hours parking on the eastern side. Some cars on Wood avenue were ticketed.

Westmount police explained that sufficient warning had been given motorists through radio and press announcements and also by street signs. The illegal parking also interfered with efficient snow removal so action was taken to stop the nuisance.

### Private Funeral Held For Mrs. James H. Webb

### Tremendous Increase In Westmount Building

A total of 10 building permits were issued by the City of Westmount, a report to the Westmount City Council revealed this week.

This covered the month of January while applications for three additions, 39 alterations, six conversions, 10 dwellings, 14 garages, one assembly building and three commercial buildings were also approved.

The estimated cost of the 10 permits for buildings approved was set at \$106,650, a tremendous increase of nearly \$95,000 over January 1949.

Peter William McLagan, former mayor of Westmount, died suddenly on Thursday at the home of his daughter Mrs. R. B. Hall, 4378 Western avenue, Westmount. He was in his 93rd year.

Despite his advanced age, Mr. McLagan had been active in his business as a produce merchant, until a few months ago, and had enjoyed comparatively good health since.

A native of Perth, Scotland, he came to this city 75 years ago, and settled in Westmount, when it was considered one of the most outlying places on the island.

All his life he was associated with the dairy produce business which bears his name, and is one of the oldest established firms of its kind in the metropolis.

He developed extensive relations with British importers of Canadian dairy and farm produce. He was vice-president of Packers Products (Canada) Limited, besides being president of the firm which bears his own name. He was also a member of the Montreal Commodity Exchange.

#### Mayor For Eight Years

Alderman and mayor of Westmount for more than a quarter of a century, and a founder of the Montreal Metropolitan Commission, Mr. McLagan introduced the city manager system to Westmount.

The City Hall and the War Memorial were erected during his tenure of office as mayor, which lasted for eight years 1919 to 1927.

Mr. McLagan served four two year terms as mayor, the longest tenure of that office in the history of Westmount.

Throughout his life he maintained his Scottish ties, and in 1948 at the age of 90, he visited his brother in Scotland, making the trip by air.

He was a life member of the Montreal Board of Trade and of the Royal Montreal Curling Club and a member of the Montreal Club.

Mr. McLagan is survived by a son, T. R. McLagan, executive vice-president and general manager of Canadian Vickers Limited; a daughter, Mrs. R. B. Hall; and four grandchildren. His wife died two years ago.

The funeral which was largely attended took place on Saturday, from the Chapel of Jos. C. Wray & Bro., Mountain street, with interment in Mount Royal Cemetery.

STOP and GO printed in black on each side, to use in directing traffic.

Chief Byford said that he has requested the co-operation of motorists in obeying the instructions of the guardians. He also said that drivers who disregard directions of the guardians will be liable to prosecution.

Regular police officers will make periodical visits to the corners where the guardians are posted, to give assistance if necessary, and to check on motorists who may flaunt the authority of the safety guardians.

Chief Byford stated that, in his opinion, the new force will be very helpful to his department, as a corresponding number of officers will be relieved for other duties, some of which will be checking on careless and fast drivers, which action in itself will give additional protection to the children.

The guardians will be on duty on schooldays only.

If the plan continues to work satisfactorily, additional guardians will be appointed to guard strategic crossing points.

## TRUTH ABOUT WAGES, PRICES

### One Cause of Unemployment

Once upon a time a Canadian publication raised this question: "Will a general increase in wage rates increase purchasing power? The answers were many and varied — they ran all over the map — all sides were presented. Here is one of the answers:

"Here are 100 cubes, two inches to a side. They are coloured — 22 green, these represent labor; 53 red, for the raw materials; 25 white, these represented 'all other costs'."

"Put these on top of your desk, stand back, look at them from a distance, the colors blend. Snap out of it, come closer, you have before you a product into which has gone labor, raw materials,

and an omnibus item, which we call 'all other costs'."

"Green, that is labor, wants more, a larger share of the total product, claims that it can take some from the others paint them its own color."

"If it can be done, then the reverse is true: Red and White can take from Green, and Greens will be just as numerous as they were before. As Mr. Euclid remarked upon one occasion: 'This is impossible!'"

Even the Federal Minister of Labor admits this argument. Once in a letter over his signature, the Hon. Humphrey Mitchell made this statement:

"Increase in wage rates where they cannot be taken care of by the employer out of profits are bound to increase the costs of goods and services."

There is a means by which all can get more. It is a very simple way, produce more. Volume production tends to lower costs, makes the dollar of each worker buy more. This is the highway to the possible, the only way in which real gains can be secured by all.

If you can find a better way hop to it, but don't be fooled by nominal wage increases — they mean nothing.

Again in the words of the Honourable Humphrey Mitchell: "Wages have value only in regard to purchasing power".

### Christian Science

In reply to John's inquiry, 'Art thou he that should come,' Jesus returned an affirmative reply, recounting his works instead of referring to his doctrines, confident that this exhibition of the divine power to heal would fully answer the question. Hence his reply: 'Go and show John again those things which ye do hear and see: the blind receive their sight and the lame walk, the lepers are cleansed, and the deaf hear, the dead are raised up, and the poor have the gospel preached to them. And blessed is he whosoever shall not be offended in me.' (Page 131).

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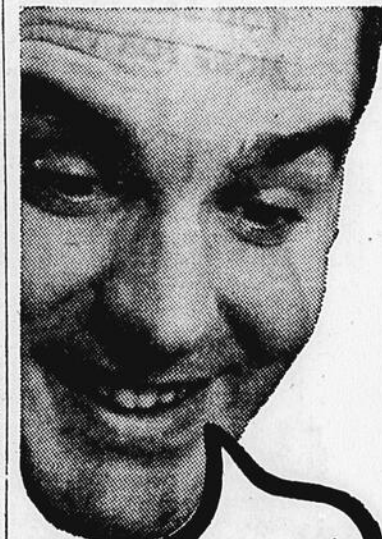
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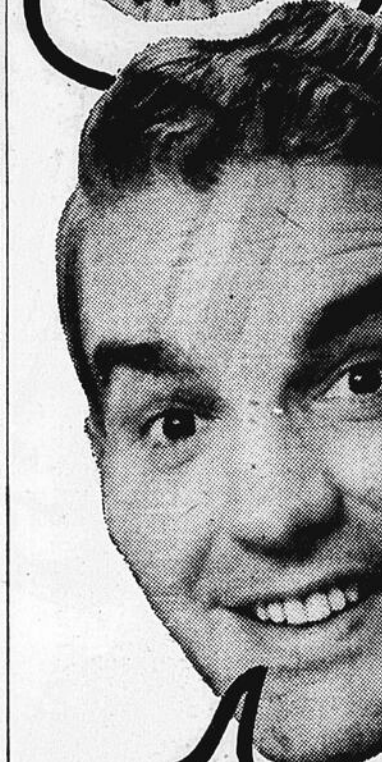
